The Woman's Touch in Big-Game Hunting

• In the CBC Times issue of March 9-15, your article on Belle Desrosiers refers to her in the sub-heading as Canada's only female big-game hunting guide. We have a lady living near Rocky Mountain House, Alta., Mrs. Myrtle Raivio, a widow engaged as big-game guide and outfitter who has been carrying on this operation for several years. She started in with her father when she was only about 15 years old. Mrs. Raivio is now 48.

She has been guide and outfitter for big-game hunting parties from practically every state in the U.S. The game consists mainly of Rocky Mountain sheep, goat, grizzly bear and so forth. She is a licensed guide and has approximately 100 horses on her farm for these pack trips. Like Mrs. Desrosiers, she is chief guide and outfitter and is responsible for all the arrangements, hiring wranglers, assistants, cooks, etc.

This is not meant in any way to detract from the capabilities of Mrs. Desrosiers; neither is it a beef against the CBC. We think the CBC is a most admirable and praiseworthy institution, but the idea is to correct the impression given in your heading as above.

CANADA is a long way from home for two charming young ladies from Sarawak, a state on the northwest coast of Borneo, who presently are visiting the CBC's various radio production points across the country.

Habibu Morshidi, 27, and Mildred Bateman, 22, announcer-producers with Sarawak's nine-year-old radio system, are making a general study of the way the CBC puts its radio programs on the air, with an eye for ideas that might be useful to their own work. Arriving in Toronto April 5, they spent some two weeks there, and they have just completed three weeks at CBC Winnipeg. As this issue went to press (May 7) they were leaving for Regina, with Edmonton and Vancouver scheduled as stops before they return for another look at Toronto.

There are many dissimilarities between Canada and Sarawak, but one problem that faces broadcasters in both countries is that of language, explain the visitors. Canada maintains production centres for both French and English programs, but in Sarawak the problem is much more acute: there are five official languages to contend with. Miss Morshidi works in the Malay language section, while Miss Bateman is in the English section. Despite the multiplicity of languages, the system operates only one station, at Kuching, with different hours given over to each tongue. The station has good coverage throughout the small state, about the size of England and Wales combined.

After leaving Canada, the two young ladies will take a three-week course with the BBC before returning home. They are travelling through the help of the Colombo Plan.

IT WAS A pleasant May day in the small town of Roland, Manitoba, back in 1913. In the local schoolhouse, attention was waning as spring fever gripped the boys and girls.

"I was ten years old then," recalls Hart Phillips, now a farmer in the district. "I can still remember Edward Jones of the Department of Education bursting into our classroom with his arms full of potatoes and eggs." Jones told the classroom that boys and girls could learn and have fun by raising their own gardens and flocks. Forming a club then and there, he handed out vegetable seeds and eggs and said in a few months he would see who had been most successful with them.

It may have seemed then to be only the imaginative local project of a conscientious educator, but as the seeds sown by the boys and girls

ETHIOPIA:

ANCIENT EMPIRE STRIVING FOR ITS PLACE

Two programs on THE TWENTIETH CENTURY deal with this unusual country



HIS IMPERIAL MAJESTY, Emperor Haile Selassie the First, King of Kings, Elect of God, Conquering Lion of Judah, is to all intents and purposes the absolute ruler of a medieval mountain kingdom that is one of the most familiar and, at the same time, one of the least-known countries in the world. The emperor shares this paradoxical quality with his country. Since 1936, when he went before the League of Nations to protest the Italian invasion of his kingdom, Haile Selassie has been a well-known world figure; yet few know much about either the man or the position he holds, a position of personal power that is perhaps unequalled in today's world.

As monarch of an African empire 3,000 years old, and the 225th ruler in a line claiming descent from the Queen of Sheba and King Solomon, the emperor appoints all cabinet ministers, senators, governors, judges and other major officials; he is the commander-in-chief of his small but up-to-date army, navy, and air force; he personally checks every piece of information put out by his government; he is venerated as a near-god by his 22 million subjects; and his important role in African and world affairs is evidenced by the respect shown to him by the major powers of both East and West.

Haile Selassie and his small but important country will be the subject of a two-part edition of *The Twentieth Century*, to be presented on CBC-TV on Sundays, May 19 and 26. The programs, filmed in Ethiopia under the direction of Harry Rasky, will include a rare interview with the Lion of Judah himself.

Ethiopia's capital, Addis Ababa, is a modern, western-styled city graced by wide boulevards, comfortable residences, an opera house, government buildings, a university, and a magnificent royal palace. The upper-class Amharas live a life of leisure, having grown rich through the acquisition of vast quantities of land. In marked contrast, most of the other Ethiopians live in uneducated near-poverty: the per capita annual income outside of Addis Ababa is five dollars; the disease rate is high—some estimates say that 80 per cent of the population have parasitic diseases, malaria kills 30,000 people a year, and the infant mortality rate stands at about 40 per cent; the illiteracy rate is estimated at 90 per cent, higher than most African nations that came into independent existence only in recent years.

But gradually the 71-year-old emperor has been improving the state of things in his country. Only 30 years ago, slavery was still allowed in Ethiopia; today, some young people are able to attend a university in their own country.

The reason for Ethiopia's backwardness is also the reason for its independence and freedom. Isolated from the world by its geographical location for almost 2,500 years, the country was ignored by European colonial powers during the 18th and 19th centuries, and thus missed both the advantages and disadvantages of colonial rule. The only outside influence of any importance exerted on the country was that of the invading Italians in the '30s, and that influence was in one way beneficial, since it brought some technical progress and industrial development to Ethiopia. Although industrial production accounts at present for only seven per cent of the total national income, the percentage is rising steadily as Haile Selassie opens the door to more and more investment from abroad.

Christianity to Ethiopia in 340 A.D., flourished, broke with the Greek Orthodox mother church, and remained rooted in the past. Coptic Christianity is the state (Please turn to page 13)

PORTRAIT

of a

MODERATOR



Holder of the most important post in the United Church of Canada, the Right Reverend J. R. Mutchmor, is subject of *HERITAGE*, Sunday, May 19

THE RIGHT REVEREND James Ralph Mutchmor, D.D., the 20th Moderator of the United Church of Canada, has a disarmingly pleasant manner, twinklingly humorous eyes, and a halo of white hair framing his regular features. He looks like everybody's idea of a favourite grandfather. But beneath this placid-appearing exterior is the mind and spirit of a crusading zealot who has stirred up more sensational headlines than almost any other clergyman in Canada's history. Some oppose him, some support his views vigorously, but few who know Dr. Mutchmor and his work are neutral in their opinion of him.

Dr. Mutchmor has earned his reputation by adhering strictly to one of his own rules of life: "I don't think one should dodge an issue." Far from sidestepping any contentious subjects, he has purposely crashed headlong into them, fearing neither opposition nor controversy in putting forward his strongly-held views on liquor, sex, gambling, automation, working mothers, atomic weapons, crime and dozens of other manifestations of modern life.

As Secretary of the United Church's Board of Evangelism and Social Service for 24 years, he spoke out boldly on every topic on which his comments were sought, and in the process he became known and respected, by friend and foe alike, as a fearless, militant fighter for those things he believes in. His detractors accuse him of being a bigot, a meddler, and a black-stockinged puritan with a completely unrealistic, negative approach to problems. Dr. Mutchmor replies that he stands *for* things, not against them, and, regarding his attacks on certain attitudes and activities in our society, points out:

"In the summertime I cut down weeds. I think it helps the good things to grow."

A study of the life and work of this remarkable clergyman will be presented this week on CBC-TV's *Heritage* series, on Sunday, May 19. Entitled *Portrait of a Moderator*, the program will include film footage of some of the places connected with Dr. Mutchmor's career, and will feature an interview with the Moderator by broadcaster Doug Maxwell. The telecast is one of a short series of such "portraits" being presented on *Heritage*. Next week, under the title *Portrait of a Primate*, the program will present an interview with the Most Rev. Howard H. Clarke, the Anglican Primate of all Canada.

Born in the lumbering village of Providence Bay on Manitoulin Island, Ont., 70 years ago, Dr. Mutchmor paid his way through university by working as a pick-and-shovel railroad labourer for five summers. "I know what it means to be sworn at and kicked around," he recalls. During the First World War he interrupted his education to serve as an artilleryman in the Canadian Army, worked his way up to sergeant's rank and was wounded at Vimy Ridge. After the war he returned to Canada, completed his degree at the University of Toronto, then took a master's degree in economics at Columbia University, and a divinity degree at Union Theological Seminary, New York. His doctorate is from United Theological College, Montreal.

Ordained in 1920, Dr. Mutchmor was sent to Winnipeg, where he served in two churches in the city's North End and became active in social work, as

FREEDOM from HUNGER?

A CBC-TV special Monday
examines food shortage and
efforts to combat it

THE WORLD'S population is estimated to be about three billion at present, and of those billions at least half still are hovering just above starvation level. That fact, substantiated by figures issued by the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, may be difficult to comprehend by many North Americans whose chief concerns may be with obesity and other ills associated with over-eating, and with problems brought about by food surpluses rather than deficiencies.

One of mankind's most perplexing situations occurs when some countries have a surplus of food while other nations are on the verge of starvation. In the last 150 years the world population has doubled, and statisticians estimate that in just 40 years the figure will double again. Food production, despite phenomenal increases in some countries, is increasing at an average of only one per cent each year, while the population increase is 1.6 per cent.

To focus attention on the urgent problem of world hunger, the FAO instituted a world-wide campaign in 1960. This "Freedom from Hunger" campaign was intended as a five-year project to bring home to all nations the size and urgency of the problem. In its initial stages, the campaign consisted of the preparation of plans and material for education, briefing of speakers, and organization of conferences, study groups and publicity. A second stage was an international drive for funds to cover the costs of dozens of projects, from supplying banana plants to the Malindi area of Kenya to the improvement of cattle strains in Allahabad, India.

The problem of world hunger and some of the means devised to combat it will be shown this week in a half-hour filmed program prepared by the CBC in co-operation with the FAO in support of the campaign. Entitled *Freedom from Hunger*, the program was filmed in Bolivia, Mexico, Africa, India, and Indonesia by a CBC film unit under the direction of Gene Lawrence. It will be shown on the CBC-TV network on Monday, May 20. The narration, written by George Salverson, will be spoken by British actor Peter Ustinov, and will be translated into French, Spanish and other languages so that the program can be made available to most of the countries of the world that have television broadcasting facilities.

The FAO was the first permanent United Nations organization to be launched, and its relationship to the UN is similar to such other UN agencies as UNESCO and WHO. It officially came into being with the signing of its constitution at Quebec in October, 1945. The policy-making body of the organization is the FAO Conference, composed of one representative from each member nation. The FAO is a world clearing-house of information on methods and plans to improve the world's nutritional supplies, and it also initiates research into means by which to achieve such improvement. FAO experts are sent to various parts of the world to study, advise and help in better food production, and the body also makes recommendations to member countries regarding commodity arrangements and agreements and, where possible, acts as go-between in arranging disposal of food surpluses.

secretary of the Manitoba Welfare Supervision Board and the Child Welfare Board. He returned to Toronto in 1937 and took over his post on the Board of Evangelism and Social Service the following year. After serving for 24 years, and fulfilling a task for which he has been called "the conscience of his church," Dr. Mutchmor was due to retire at age 70. But last September he was elected Moderator at the General Council of the United Church, held in London, Ont., and now will continue to serve his church in its most important post for another two years.

One reason for Dr. Mutchmor's widespread reputation through the press is the "quotability" of his remarks. He protests that the newspapers are on the look-out for controversial issues: "If, in an address of, say, 40 minutes, I spend 30 minutes on the love of God, on evangelism, on brotherhood, on goodwill, and spend maybe five minutes on bingo and five minutes on liquor, the press gets out a big story about gambling and leaves the other out entirely." But he doesn't deny that his outspoken views are

bound to stimulate comment, and he realizes the value of communications media in spreading his ideas: "The church has to deal with controversial issues. You can't win by not talking about them."

Through the years he has had a lot to say about a lot of things, particularly in his annual reports on the activities and findings of the Board. On the novel Peyton Place, which he admitted reading twice: "It's all right to have one bedroom scene if it's pertinent to the story, but after that it becomes obscene." On women: "Canadian women spend too much time in beauty parlours. It's a serious thing when half our population spends more time adorning the outside of their heads than furnishing the inside of them." On Sunday observance: "In many places the Lord's Day is a dollar day. Protection for religious observances in Toronto is little better than in Moscow." On drinking: "It's getting so that you can't have the neighbours in to discuss the weather without serving them cocktails first." On Puritanism: "I would make no excuses for being one. The Puritans had a strong sense of the will of God." On his career as a controversial Canadian: "If I had the time all over again, I wouldn't change my stand on a single issue."

Doug Maxwell interviews the Rt. Rev. J. R. Mutchmor, Moderator of the General Council of the United Church of Canada. The program includes film clips of some of the places connected with the life of Dr. Mutchmor.

Twentieth Century

Ethiopia: The Lion and the Cross. Part 1. A special two-part report on one of Africa's most backward countries in the process of reluctant change and on its 71-year-old absolute ruler, Emperor Haile Selassie, Lion of Judah.

The first program covers the annual celebration in the capital of Ethiopia, Addis Ababa, of the 1930 coronation of the Emperor. The status of the artist and the intellectual are examined. The work of the American Peace Corps in the country and the tour of the Emperor through the countryside are also seen. Host and narrator is Walter Cronkite.

The Valiant Years

A repeat of the documentary series based on Sir Winston Churchill's memoirs and made up of authentic

newsreel film from World War Two.

Today, *The French Agony.* The story of the defeat of Britain's strongest European ally and the division of France. Churchill orders the destruction of the French fleet at Oran. Appearing on the program are Lord Ismay, Churchill's chief of staff; and Michel St. Denis, wartime head of the French section of the BBC.

The Nature of Things

D.N.A., the Thread of Life. What determines whether a cell will grow into a man or an elephant? Once life's blueprint has been established in a new cell's nucleus, how does the building of tissues actually take place? Microbiologist Louis Siminovitich of the University of Toronto and the Canadian Cancer Institute, discusses what is currently known about heredity, particularly recent research and study on the ultimate units of hereditary material, DNA.

Walt Disney

Magic and Music. A whimsical cartoon interpretation of the music of Rimsky-Korsakov and Beethoven. Featuring Freddy Martin and his orchestra, and Hans Conried.

Epitomizing modern rhythm is an impression based on Rimsky-Korsakov's, *Flight of the Bumble Bee* in which a hapless bee becomes caught in a kaleidoscope dream world.

religion—another of the emperor's titles is "Defender of the Christian Faith" — and more than half the population is Christian. One quarter is pagan, one fifth is Moslem, and there are groups of Felashas or Black Jews. One out of every five males is a priest or monk, large numbers of whom can neither read nor write. They chant their liturgy in an archaic Abyssinian language which few understand, since Amharic is the official language of the land. The church is rich and powerful, because, through the ages, it has acquired at least one-fifth of the land, and in a poor feudal country, land is power.

Ethiopia today is an ancient empire striving to find a place in an age in which no part of the world can remain isolated or uneducated. On the two programs in *The Twentieth Century* series, the story will be told of the country's struggle to move into the modern world, and of the powerful, strangely mysterious emperor who is the key figure in that struggle.

EACH YEAR the hopes of thousands of horse owners fade as the stages of the Triple Crown go racing by. Not since 1948, when Calumet Farms' great Citation blistered every track it ran on, has there been a Triple Crown winner.

The Triple Crown races are the Kentucky Derby, Preakness Stakes and Belmont.

This year, the Derby was run May 4. The Preakness goes this Saturday, and will be telecast on the CBC network. The Belmont follows in a couple of weeks.

Doubt has been expressed in many quarters that there'll be a Triple Crown winner this year. Reason for the doubt is a horse named Chateaugay. Owned by John Galbreath, the president of the Pittsburgh Pirates National Baseball League club, Chateaugay came up with one of the strongest stretch runs in the long history of the Derby, to beat out the favoured trio of Candy Spots, Never Bend and No Robbery. Never Bend finished second, Candy Spots third and No Robbery, which rang strong early, gave way to finish fifth.

Chateaugay is an extremely strong colt, winner of all four of its races this year, and victorious in six of nine during two years on the track.

The other horses in the field, however, were considered much superior, particularly Candy Spots and Never Bend. Whether they'll prove to be better come the Preakness and the Belmont no one knows, but it could be the shorter distance of the Preakness will be fitted to the favoured pair.

A horse with Chateaugay's strength might do better in the

CLOSE-UP:

A Visit to The Jingle-Jungle

IN WEBSTER'S DICTIONARY, the word "jingle" is defined, in part, as "continued clinking or tinkling sounds." But in the modern world of electronic communication the word has taken on a new and more specific meaning: Today's jingles are musical commercial messages, the type of latter-day madrigal that has become the ubiquitous selling device of practically all radio and television advertisers.

Few products are mass-marketed these days without having some identifying *leitmotif* attached to them. Everything from underarm deodorants to underground fallout shelters is promoted with cheerful little songs prattling away about the virtues of the product.

The average radio listener or television viewer is exposed to these musical messages at an almost fantastic rate of repetition; he will hear the latest detergent commercial, for instance, much more frequently even than the latest popular song. And, while subliminal advertising was outlawed when it appeared a few years ago, no one seems to be concerned about the "sub-aural" effect of the jingles that penetrate one's consciousness even when one isn't actually aware of hearing them. In the latter sense, the jingles have a sort of anonymous quality, and this characteristic is shared by the creators of the musical messages. Who are all those dulcet-voiced vocalists who sing the praises of this soap or that soup, extoll the virtues of so- and -so cigarettes or such-and-such automobiles, and exhort us all to buy?

To shed some light on the enormous business complex that lies behind the musical messages of the electronic media, CBC-TV's *Close-Up*, on Sunday, May 19, presents a program about the *Jingle Jungle*. Prepared by Jim Carney, the program will include interviews with

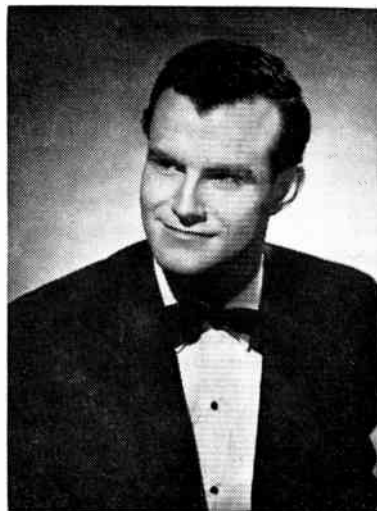

Repeat Program On Robert Frost

POET ROBERT FROST, who died on January 29, a few weeks before his 89th birthday, used to say he would rather putter around his Vermont farm than play the literary lion. "I want people to stand me off, and I want to stand them off," insisted that independent, eighth-generation New Englander with the craggy face, halo of tousled white hair, large, strong hands, and perceptive blue eyes

that didn't miss a trick. He looked the way his poems sound — virile, simple, direct, warm as the sun-drenched furrows of a Vermont hillside, as down to earth and as homey as a churn.

Hailed as great by international critics who are reluctant to bestow high praise, and loved by millions as America's leading poet, he insisted that he wasn't really a poet, "just a verse writer." But he won four Pulitzer Prizes, and until his illness last year he was bustling all over the continent, lecturing, "saying" his poems to adoring audiences (he disliked the term

"reading" in connection with his own work), and reviving the original concept of the poet as a man of the earth, close to the people, expressing their unexpressed feelings.

"A poem," he said once, "should begin in delight and end in wisdom . . . A poem begins with a lump in the throat, a homesickness, or a lovesickness."

Shortly before he died, CBC Radio presented a n hour-long study of Frost and his work, including an interview with him conducted by Eleanor Fischer at his home in Cambridge, Mass. The program will be repeated on *Venture* this Sunday, May 19, at 5:00 p.m. Frost talks about the craft of poetry, politics, government, and other subjects that interested him, and is heard "saying" some of his own poems in his unmistakable New England accent, which conjures up mental pictures of sunny pumpkins on the Persian carpet of a Vermont autumn hillside, maple syrup-flavoured home cooking cooling on a scrubbed deal table, the deep green of sentinel pines against winter snowdrifts, the reflection of a mountain in the blue of a brook-fed lake.

Everybody Talks About It

NOW YOU CAN LEARN ABOUT IT

Likely you will have more sympathy for the weather forecaster after hearing this series on the science of meteorology and its many uncertainties

WE'RE STUCK with weather, good or bad, and we need to understand it. To help make this easier for the layman, CBC Radio will present a series of six lectures, titled *Why the Weather?*, beginning Monday night, May 20, at 10:30 on *University of the Air*. The speaker is Professor J. S. Marshall, F.R.C.S., Macdonald professor of physics and meteorology, McGill University, chairman of the department of meteorology, and director of the McGill Observatory.

Summing up the series, Dr. Marshall says: "It is principally as the operational science of weather forecasting that meteorology has developed, and so it has acquired doctrines that permit decisions to be made when the hour is late and understanding is elusive. Forecasting is nonetheless a highly scientific operation, and progressively more so.

"Meteorology is forecasting, and it is much more. Its increasing breadth in recent decades has fed helpful understanding to the operation of forecasting the weather. Meteorology is the scientific study of the atmosphere, and more especially it is the science of weather. It is our intention to describe the atmosphere and its processes as they now seem to be.

"In discussing forecasting it is our hope to be mindful of the present status in science of its working hypotheses. When we come to clouds, we will be faced with the apparent possibility of their modifications. In this matter of opinion, we will hope to be objective in the presentation of our own opinion.

"On its outer side, the atmosphere faces space. When we reach that side, we will look inward; feeling that meteorology should judge itself by the fuller understanding of the stuff of Earth. For news of other planets, one can look elsewhere."

Dr. Marshall will discuss the atmosphere in his first talk, on May 20. The astronaut's view of the atmosphere as a blue rim around the earth, fading gradually outward, is meaningful. The atmosphere is a thin envelope of compressible air held to the earth by gravity, tending to cyclonic motion induced by the earth's rotation. The sun's radiation passes through cloud-free portions of the atmosphere, to heat the earth's surface and release moisture. This rises and condenses to form the clouds that in turn limit the passage of radiation.

The May 27 talk is on weather maps and forecasting. Simple weather observations are made simultaneously at very many points on the earth's surface. Four times a day a teletype machine sends all the data to the forecast offices around the world, where they are plotted and analyzed to provide "surface maps." Radio-equipped balloons make simultaneous ascents from many points, twice a day, to provide the statistical basis for upper-air maps. Cyclones, fronts, waves and jet-streams are the features of these maps, whose changes are followed and forecast.

Humidity, clouds and snow will be discussed on June 3. The importance of water in the processes

some of the leading jingle creators of both the U.S. and Canada, and will study the effect of jingles, and commercials in general, on the public, particularly the younger members of society.

One of those to be interviewed is Maurice Rapkin, a Toronto composer who is generally regarded as the "grand old man" of the business in Canada. Rapkin believes that he may have written the first jingle ever broadcast—for a Cleveland radio station in the mid-1920s—and he continues to turn out 60-second musical masterpieces at an undiminished rate. One may never have heard of Mr. Rapkin before this, but one has almost certainly heard his music much more frequently than Mozart's symphonies or Gershwin's songs. Another jingle creator to be interviewed on the program is Mitch Leigh, a New York musician who studied with Paul Hindemith, lectured on music at Columbia University, has written the musical score for a new Broadway show, *Too True To Be Good*, and runs one of the biggest jingle production houses in the U.S., Music Makers, Inc.

Leigh's organization is fairly typical of the many production houses that have sprung up to meet the demand for more and more jingles. His staff members not only compose and arrange the music but can also play the musical backgrounds and sing the messages. The company has its own recording studios and can provide a complete service for the advertising agency or sponsor, from the original conception of the commercial to the finished product.

In addition to these completely integrated production companies there are many less-comprehensive operators, who hire the performers or arrangers on a free-lance basis. The free-lancers may include some of the top-flight symphonic instrumentalists, and the singers and musicians are highly-paid experts in their craft. Estimates on the incomes of the most-in-demand jingle performers range as high as \$150,000 a year.

Not only are the jingles remunerative, but they also offer other rewards to the singers and musicians. Their anonymous nature, for example, precludes the danger of over-exposure—a constant threat to popular performers—and it also eliminates the necessity for every singer to look like a matinee idol or Miss America. It's reported that one female vocalist, much in demand for her sexily caressing, intimately inviting voice, tips the scales at just over 300 pounds. In television, she would be laughed off the air; in the commercial field, her voice earns her a small fortune.

Chances are that when one overhears a youngster whistling or humming a tune nowadays, that tune is a commercial. Television, as the omnipresent companion to so many children, cannot help but influence the musical tastes and habits of the younger generation, and one must remind oneself that for any child of 10 or younger there never was a time when television didn't exist. Members of earlier generations may have learned their songs at school or at play, but for many of today's youngsters television is the overwhelmingly influential source of taste and fashion.

of the atmosphere is through its condensations and freezings. Vapour condenses only when there is something on which it can condense. The atmosphere contains many tiny particles that serve as that something, and so are called condensation nuclei. Similarly, the freezing of water requires freezing nuclei. These nuclei are in shorter supply, and adding more to "make rain" is a scientific preoccupation about which, Dr. Marshall says, there is more speculation than understanding.

Dr. Marshall will discuss summer storms in his June 10 talk. In summer the rate at which the earth receives heat from the sun is high, and the rate at which it releases heat and moisture to the lower atmosphere is correspondingly great. This leads to cumulus clouds of great and rapid vertical development. Lightning, damaging hail, severe winds and tornadoes are all products or aspects of the mature, precipitating stage of these clouds. The hurricane, several hundreds of miles across, is a different matter, involving an even greater range of sizes in its study, from cloud droplets to hemispheric maps.

The June 17 talk concerns climate. The parameters of weather vary greatly from summer to winter and from tropics to poles. One day's weather makes better sense in relation to the typical, for a particular place and season, and the observed range of departures from typical for that place and time of year. With all the geographical features of a location taken into account, changes in the climate can be effected by building a big city. These changes tend to be for the worse, but consideration of climate in town planning can ameliorate them.

Dr. Marshall's final talk, on June 24, is titled *From Stratosphere to Space*. The bottom 80 per cent of the atmosphere is in the troposphere. The stratosphere comes next, and contains 80 per cent of what is left. Radiation coming from the sun encounters the stratosphere before the troposphere and undergoes a filtering there that is important to life on earth. From a height of 50 miles up for another 200 miles or more comes the still more rarified ionosphere. It, too, filters radiation from the

sun, and so in the course of it becomes highly ionized. One feature of this ionization is the commercially-important reflection of radio waves around the earth, another the aurora, beautiful but commercially dreadful through radio-wave absorption.

Professor Marshall is a Master of Arts of Queen's University and a Doctor of Philosophy of Cambridge, where he held an "Exhibition of 1851" scholarship and a Royal Society of Canada Research Fellowship. Among other distinctions he has received for his work in meteorology Dr. Marshall was awarded two medals in 1962: the Patterson Medal, named for a distinguished director of the Canadian Meteorological Service, and the Hugh Robert Mill Medal, awarded by the Royal Meteorological Society in memory of a Scots meteorologist. Much of Dr. Marshall's research has been on rain, snow and hail, and the manner of their formation, and has been done in co-operation with fellow members of the Stormy Weather Research Group at McGill.

Dr. Marshall has provided a bibliography in connection with the series, and some bibliographic notes. "Most readable," he says, "is Dr. Sawyer's short *Weather Ways*, prepared as an introduction to weather for training flying personnel. It is a very lucid little paper-back, helped by Norm Steinhaur's illustrations. *Understanding Weather* is a regular paper-back in the Pelican series, an excellent, somewhat deeper treatment of the subject by the head of the British Meteorological Office. *The Restless Atmosphere*, another small book, is between the two preceding ones in depth, very readable, by Dean Hare of McGill. The best small compilation of cloud pictures, carefully catalogued and described, is Ludlum and Scorer's *Cloud Study*. *Flight of Thunderbolts* restricts itself to thunderstorms *per se*, and does very well, while Battan's pocketbook does an excellent job on all severe storms, and is most up to date. The other severe-storm books are equally readable, but larger and more expensive. The two little magazines are for the amateur, well-written and well-illustrated. My own preference is for the British one, although *Weatherwise* reviews the weather for the whole American continent. B. J. Mason's new book on *Clouds and Rain-Making* will likely leave the reader with a pleasant feeling that he understands rain-making. I wish I did."

play, *The Flip Side*, a comedy with poignant facets, is presented on *CBC Wednesday Night*, May 22, at 8:05. Swaying from gentle mockery to vituperative scorn, the play, like *David: Chapter II*, exposes some of the problems of North American culture. It was a BBC radio success earlier this year.

The evolution of *David: Chapter II* began a couple of years ago when Cohen walked into the Toronto office of CBC-TV drama editor Doris Gauntlett for an interview. He had dozens of radio productions to his credit, but had never attempted a 90-minute original TV drama. Mrs. Gauntlett invited him to try. He submitted a number of suggestions. She chose the best three of the seven possible ideas, and talked them over with Robert Allen, supervising producer of TV drama. At the time, Cohen was working on a novel. The core of its first part was the story of a small boy in the area and era in which Cohen had grown up in Winnipeg. He had told Mrs. Gauntlett about it, and she and Allen talked it over. They liked its outlook, but it was about children, and they wanted a play involving older people, so they suggested to Max that he write a play about the next part of the life of David, the boy in the novel. He decided to have a go at it, and that's why he titled his play: *David: Chapter II*, the novel being chapter I. As background, he sent Mrs. Gauntlett his impressions of Winnipeg as he remembered it, and some biographical sketches of people he had dreamed up who would fit into the setting. He had no idea for a plot, just some characters and a situation, and where he would head from there he didn't know, but Mrs. Gauntlett and Allen liked the nucleus, and bought it.

After that it was a three-way effort, involving Cohen, Mrs. Gauntlett and producer Harvey Hart. "We all wrote the play in effect," says Cohen. "Harvey contributed to form, in and out of set. I don't know, now, who wrote what." Over a year the play grew, but each of the three was working

on other things, so the growth was slow and sporadic.

"Eventually we got a draft," recalls Mrs. Gauntlett. "The process was an essay in how not to write a play, by all good script methods. It was the first time in our collective experience that a script had emerged this way, right from the embryo."

"At every stage of the writing," says Max, "one of us went anti-something or other, and the contributor of the idea had to justify it to the others and do a lot of thinking about it. This was excellent for us all. If there are going to be good plays written, this is what should happen, but in the wrong hands, without the sort of co-operation we had, it could be disastrous: The writer must be able to trust those he's working with. The whole emphasis must be on getting the best possible play out of what's there. I can't write with another writer. But this system worked. It requires everyone concerned to realize his or her function. The editor mustn't want to be a writer, the producer mustn't yearn to edit or write. And the editor and producer must give the project their full attention at meetings with the writer, for it's his life.

"The more I worked on it the more I enjoyed it," says Mrs. Gauntlett. She thinks one of the reasons the play worked out so well is that it was written at a leisurely pace, with lots of time for thought. "Good Canadian plays are not going to be dashed off overnight," Cohen insists.

After the second draft Allen had his first look at the script, and his fresh eye saw where some improve-

ments could be made. "The first draft was long," Cohen says, "about 3½ hours of playing time. I don't recommend that to anyone. I write everything in longhand, very nicely. I was accepted as a penman in Grade Five, and as a result I write neatly and legibly. I can do 2,000 words a day if necessary. When editing I rewrite instead of stroking out."

The play concerns a Winnipeg Jewish boy on the threshold of manhood who is harassed into rebellion, and beset by indecision and other people's ideas about what he should do and become. David doesn't like what he sees when he takes a good look at life. Should he accept it or reject it? To reject is painful, he learns, and to take the consequences requires courage, which he isn't sure he has. Harvey Hart calls the play "part realism, part nightmare. It's a different kind of TV play. It's almost as if David is telling his story in retrospect, as the images from that part of his life flash by. It is as 'far out' in terms of technique as any play I've ever worked on, with the possible exception of Ugo Betti's *The Gambler*."

The cast includes Donnelly Rhodes as David; Toby Tarnow as his girl-friend; Powys Thomas as his father; and Lynne Gorman as his mother, with fine supporting performers. After the *Festival* premiere Cohen received over 80 congratulatory letters from all kinds of viewers, most of whom started out talking about the play and ended talking about themselves. Many said they could identify with David, that their families had pressured them to conform.

CHICKEN KIEV

4 large chicken breasts

Salt, pepper

Parsley

Chopped green onion

Garlic powder (optional)

Chilled butter

Cracker crumbs

1 egg

Prepare butter by cutting pieces into small finger size and chill thoroughly. Beat egg with 1 tablespoon cold water. Remove bone and skin from chicken breasts and place on waxed paper. (Cut breasts in half if large ones are used.) Pound flat with mallet to form cutlet about ¼" thick. (Be sure no holes form in cutlet.) On each cutlet sprinkle salt, pepper, onion, parsley and garlic powder. Place a piece of chilled butter on end of each cutlet and roll up like jelly roll, tucking in ends well. Tie with white thread to keep from opening, dip each one in beaten egg then roll in crumbs. Chill rolls thoroughly about 1 hour, fry in deep hot fat about 5 minutes or till golden brown. Allow one per person.

AFTER A YEAR on the panel of *Front Page Challenge* (Tuesdays on CBC-TV), Betty Kennedy says the most noticeable result of her new career is her loss of anonymity.

"It's a bit unnerving to have strangers stop me on the street and greet me by my first name," says Betty. "This 'instant recognition' was disconcerting at first, but I'm slowly getting used to it."

Last summer while on vacation in the Haliburton district of Ontario, Betty and her family stopped at a restaurant in a small town.

"The waitress recognized me. The cook came out of the kitchen to speak to me, and by the time we were finished eating a large number of the townspeople had assembled to see the 'TV star' in person."

For some reason, the viewers Betty meets seem to have made themselves a part of the *Front Page Challenge* family and adopt a very personal approach to the panelists. "After chatting with me they invariably ask 'How's Pierre? How's Gordon? How's Fred?'—all on a first-name basis."

Between shows last November Betty gave birth to her first daughter, Tracy. And for those who have been asking about the baby, she's just fine.

"She's wonderful. And everyone in the family is happy about her," says Betty. "Maybe we're spoiling her, but we're having a grand time doing it."

Betty's life-long interest in current affairs has paid off in her *Front Page Challenge* job.

"I've always read a great deal, and after joining the panel I honed up by reading newspaper files and books dealing with subjects likely to turn up on the show," she says.

"But news stories which have occurred within my lifetime have a stronger impact on me when I realize I'm actually talking with a person who has made some great contribution to our society or been personally involved in a happening that has gripped the attention of the world."

During the past year Betty has found her work as a panelist stimulating and has had no difficulty fitting it into her already busy schedule of activities.

As well as looking after her family of four children, Betty has been women's editor at Toronto radio station CFRB since 1959.

She has an hour-long radio program five days a week on which she interviews interesting persons and reports and comments on events having an appeal to women.

Before moving to Toronto, Betty was hostess on a CBC-TV women's show and an outdoors program from Ottawa. While living in Calgary she was a panelist for four years on a weekly radio program and prior to this was editor of a fashion trade publication in Montreal.

Betty was born and educated in Ottawa and worked on the *Ottawa Citizen*. While with the newspaper, she got her first radio experience. The paper was involved in a composing room strike and turned to radio to keep its readers informed of the news. Betty was commentator for the 15-minute daily program.

Of her work in television and radio, Betty says "I'm not acting. I'm just being myself."

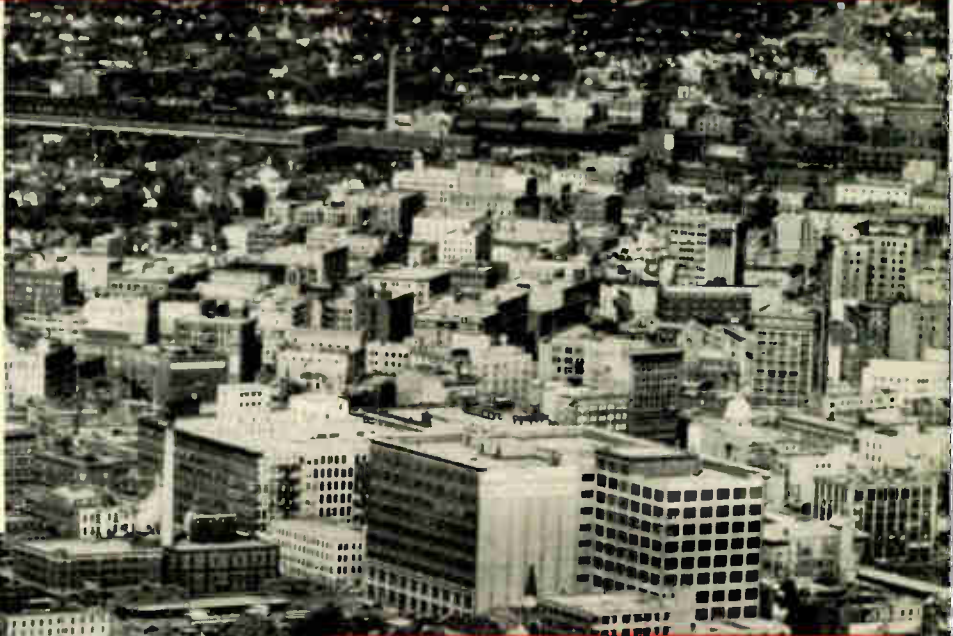
For Betty Kennedy, "being herself" is a formula that has endeared her to viewers and listeners alike.
