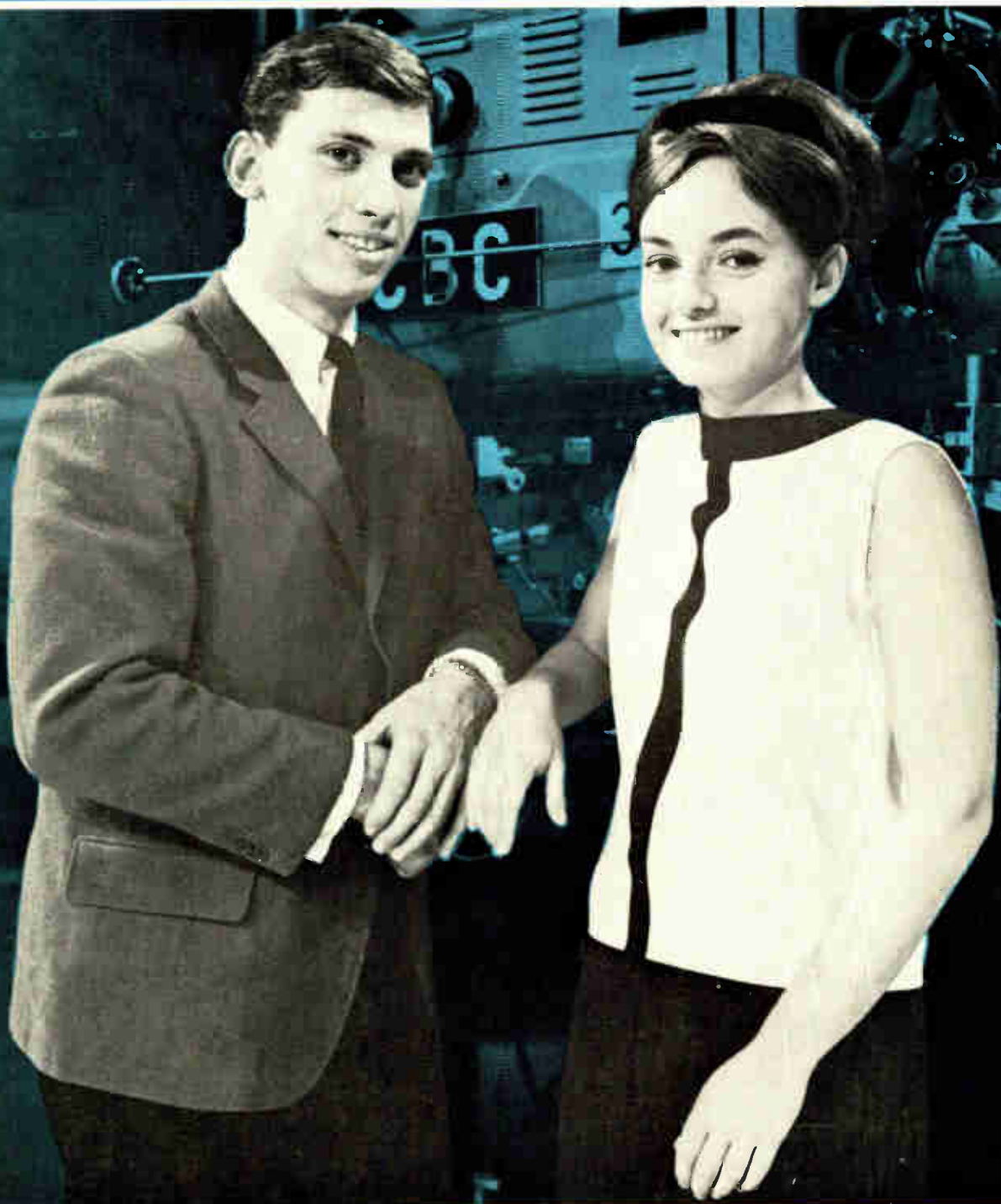

A Voice of Reason

• Rain is falling tonight throughout the American West and some meteorological quirk is funnelling your CBR Calgary signal into my radio. Elk Grove is some 18 miles south of Sacramento, well over 1,200 miles from your transmitter. But the quality of your programming, not the quality of your signal, prompts me to write.

Many thanks for an evening of real listening pleasure. Your *CBC Tuesday Night* penetrates the American airwaves like a voice of reason piercing the uproar of insanity. I listen attentively because it is real, because it communicates. I listen wistfully because it seems like something we are all entitled to, that for some was lost long ago.

I have totally enjoyed a drama commemorating the 80th anniversary of a historic figure's execution, editorial comment from Toronto on the political scene, a highly effective dramatic presentation on the Spanish conquest of Montezuma, an anthropologist's

comments on a Canadian minority group's struggle to regain a true public image, an excellent reading of the *Nymph, Music of Mannheim* from Winnipeg and even the weathercast from Edmonton. While it is 31 degrees in Calgary, it is 60 degrees in Sacramento. While the voice is calm in Calgary, it is hysterical in Sacramento. While CBR appeals to the best in me, KROY panders to the worst. All prophecies of doom aside, a government operation that can strike such a contrast can't all be bad.

Our commercial broadcasters tell a too mildly concerned government that U.S. airwaves are not really a wasteland, that programming merely reflects the condition of society, and because it does, broadcasters bear a burden of high responsibility. From what I have heard tonight I believe you are meeting your responsibility in commendable fashion.

Included in the program: *Let's Go*, an opening riff for orchestra; *Winter Song*, by the vocal quintet; *Soft Snow*, by the quintet; *Purple Turtle*, a jazz waltz; *Boy on a Country Road*, for orchestra, vocal quintet and whistler; *Paradise Island*, for orchestra and quintet; *Carib*, an orchestral composition; *Moonscape*, an orchestral impression of what it may be like on the moon; and a closing swinger entitled *Hitch-hiker*. Jack Bingham is the producer.



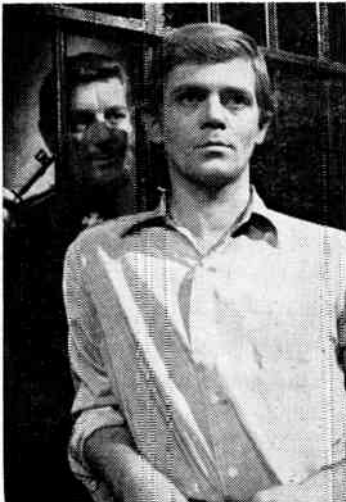

The Just

Albert Camus' drama,
Wednesday, January 26th,
CBC-TV.

WHEN DOES the end justify the means? Since Biblical times men have been arguing moral questions like this, but never going round in circles more than in this century, with its scientific advances and great social and economic changes. And then along came Albert Camus—novelist, essayist, playwright, philosopher, editor—to illuminate the problems of the human conscience with a glowing humanism, tempered by blunt, unremitting skepticism, that spoke for all the confused and inarticulate. Just at the height of his powers, a Nobel Prize-winning intellectual influencing the moral climate of his times more than any other contemporary writer, he was killed in a car crash in 1960, at the age of 46. But his writings continue as an encouraging flare in a world growing more bleakly scientific and complicated daily.

One of the most unusual things about Camus was that he looked more like an urchin than a great moral force, with his crew-cut hair, burning dark eyes, and shy, acutely aware manner. Outwardly still and dignified, he had an inner vitality and a sunny smile that made him seem much younger than his years, although his long, brown face was lined and looked well lived in. His eyes were shrewd and compassionate, and his high forehead moved like an accordion when he talked in his soft, evenly inflected, Algerian-flavored French accent.

In public he took pains to conceal the hard core of strength and conviction behind his gently melancholic, sometimes ironic, even brittle air, for he disliked intensely being on display as a social conscience, and once remarked that if he were to rape his grandmother in a public park, somebody would be sure to remark that it was a moral act. But of course in his writing the real Camus emerged as one of the most hopeful philosophers of the century, pessimistic when it came to the nature of man, but optimistic about the possibility of salvation

SWEDEN and Italy are two lands of many obvious contrasts, the north and south of the continent of Europe both literally and metaphorically. In terms of their economy, population, social conditions, geography, and religion, the two countries differ greatly. For this reason, the U.S. members of Intertel (National Educational Television/Westinghouse Broadcasting Co.) chose these two countries when they set out to examine two aspects of old age for the program *To Live Till You Die*, which will be telecast this Tuesday evening on CBC-TV. The program was written and directed by Robert Morgan.

In Sweden the life-expectancy is placed at 71-75 years (highest in the world), and old age is viewed as a social problem that must be tackled by the state. To demonstrate how the state cares for its increasing numbers of those who reach pensionable age (67 usually, but there is also a reduced rate from the age of 63), the program focuses on Olivia Matilda Goransson. Olivia is 83 and lives by herself in one room on a monthly pension of approximately \$70. To assist Olivia at home, the state provides the services of a home-help worker who visits her several times a week. People like Olivia have the choice of either staying by themselves at home, in a place of their own, or of living at one of the many specially built apartment blocks for the aged. Olivia has decided that she will move to one of these, where every convenience, including professional nurses, is available to her.

Italy has no state program for care of the aged, although there is in every commune an assistance body (*Ente Comunale di Assistenza*) to dispense charity to the needy, drawn from funds provided partly by the assets of the provinces, communes and other public and private *Enti*, and partly by special taxation. *To Live Till You Die* shows how the patriarch of a large family (who is of indeterminate age but well over 65) in the small village of Lucania lives out his old age. Minguccio Filazzola is the head of a three-generation family of farmers in Lucania and he con-

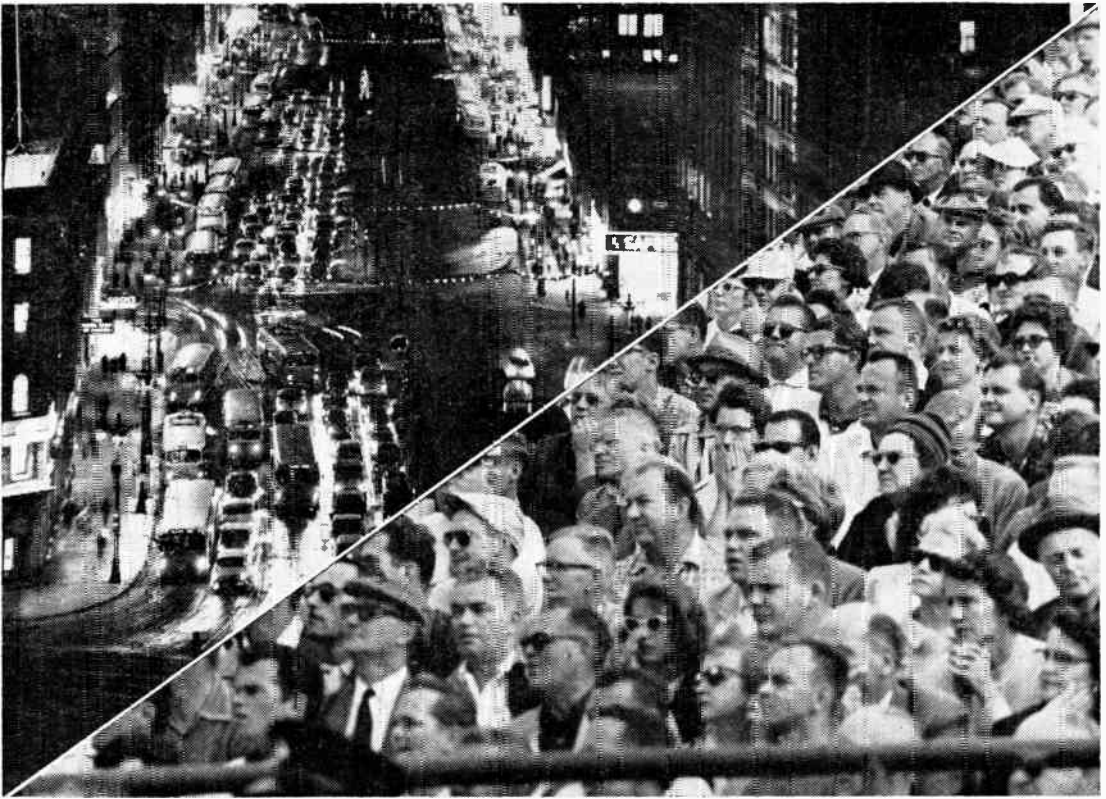

The People are the City

Local government forms in Canada are outmoded, says this expert. The annual Winter Conference of the Canadian Institute of Public Affairs discusses the problem.

THE PEOPLE ARE THE CITY is the theme of the 12th Winter Conference of the Cana-

dian Institute of Public Affairs. The conference is an annual event conducted by the Institute in co-operation with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, and this year will be held on January 28th, 29th and 30th in the Education Centre on College Street in Toronto.

The theme of the Conference has the subtitle, *A discussion of the practice of local democracy today* and theme and subtitle together reflect one of the most pressing concerns which in recent times has emerged in the field of public affairs in Canada. There is the growing realization that our present forms of local government are no longer even certain of what the function of local government ought to be. The emergence of urban regions has not been matched by the creation of new regional government structures, with the re-

sult that present institutions are becoming obsolete. We cannot reconcile the economy and social realities with the mechanisms for ordering growth and change.

This concern is well founded. In all ten provinces of Canada the efforts, which are being made at both provincial and local levels, to cope with rapid change and to formulate new concepts of local government structure and function are evidence that local government, as we know it, can no longer cope with its problems, and that the growth of the urban region is in fact one of the fundamental reasons for the dilemma.

The problems basically have their roots in the fact that our municipal and other local government arrangements and institutions were evolved during the time when Canada was virtually a frontier society. During much of our past, most Canadians lived close to nature, as fur traders, fishermen, woodsmen, or farmers. The predominant form of settlement was either the isolated dwelling, or the very small village community set in lonely isolation in the vastness of the Canadian landscape. As recently as 1900 there were only five million Canadians altogether, and the over-all density of settlement was only 1½ people per square mile. Even in our largest urban centres, over-all density does not exceed 10,000 persons per square mile. These figures can be compared to such densities as 8,600 per square mile which prevail in a highly urbanized society such as England, for example, where urban density in the former County of London exceeds 30,000 persons per square mile.

We have a strong rural tradition, but now we must tame the urban frontier without any extensive urban training. The amazing thing is that we get along as well as we do with inadequate institutions, financial resources, and administrative competence.

Probably the most difficult problem is a vast unconcern on the part of the public; the government of urban units and regions is still regarded as having little or no importance. It is of some consolation that the connotation of corruption is no longer generally associated with local politics, but "let George do it" is still a prevalent attitude in terms of assuming personal responsibility for local self-government.

The theme of the Winter Conference should help to prove or disprove the implied cynicism just mentioned: do we only react negatively to rapid change and, if so, how can we organize our urban society to influence positively its environment, its aesthetic quality and operational efficiency?

WINTER CONFERENCE on RADIO and TV

THE CONFERENCE will be covered on a number of CBC radio and television programs broadcast during the last week of January. On television, the theme of the meeting, The People Are the City, will be explored on two programs on Monday, January 24th, preceding the opening of the Conference. The first, at 10:00 p.m., is a special edition of The Sixties that was filmed in New Haven, Connecticut, where one of the most dynamic city administrations in North America has vigorously attacked many of the problems confronting similar cities on the continent.

The second program, at 10:30 p.m., takes a look at what is happening in the Ontario city of Hamilton. Ed McGibbon interviews His Worship, Mayor Victor Copps, Regional Planner Norman Pearson, of the University of Waterloo; and many of the local citizens, including Ken Soble, president of CHCH-TV and CHML radio.

The television coverage will also include a one-hour program on Sunday, January 30th, at 3:00 p.m., consisting of excerpts from discussions at the Conference itself plus interviews with passers-by, filmed on the streets of Toronto. Among those speaking at the Conference will be theologian Dr. Harvey Cox, of Harvard Divinity School, author of The Secular City; and Dr. Frederick Gutheim, a Washington, D.C., consultant on urban planning. Paul Fox, of the University of Toronto, will be the host. Jim Murray is the producer.

Professor John Wilson, of the department of political economy at the University of Waterloo, will be the commentator on three radio programs on January 28th, 29th and 30th, at 10:15 p.m. on Friday; 10:05 p.m. on Saturday; and 11:00 p.m. on Sunday. These programs include excerpts from the Conference discussions.

Radio's Cross-Country Check-Up, with host Percy Saltzman, will also discuss the Conference on its Sunday, January 30th, edition at 5:30 p.m. CST/4:30 MST. This is an open-line program in which listeners participate.

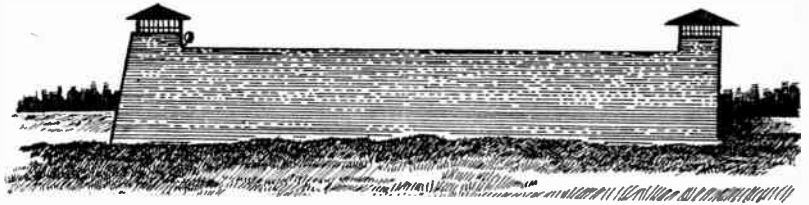

Document: The Penitentiary

SOMETIME LATER this year, or perhaps next year, a special committee will submit to the Federal Government a report concerning reform of Canada's correctional system. The Canadian Committee on Corrections was appointed by former Justice Minister Guy Favreau in May, 1964, to examine almost every aspect of the treatment of offenders, from arrest to release. The committee has a lot of ground to cover, from touring institutions to interviewing scores of people associated in various ways with the correctional system, and a spokesman estimated that the inquiry would take about two years (it began preliminary research in November, 1965). Some of the reforms the committee will probably consider include those outlined in a brief to Premier Robarts by the Ontario Municipal Association, issued last month. Among other recommendations, the association urged instalment payments for fines, more conditional sentencing, probation and parole. The jail population here, it noted, is far higher than in most other democracies, particularly in Europe, and

went on to say that there is "ample evidence" that jail sentences do not act as a deterrent but "actually increase the likelihood that most offenders will repeat unlawful or criminal acts."

This is a point of view to which many inmates themselves subscribe, as revealed in this week's *Seven Days Presents Document* program, Sunday at 10:00 p.m. on CBC-TV. This study of some aspects of prison life and the mind of the criminal was prepared, with the co-operation of prison authorities, at three Ontario institutions—Kingston Penitentiary, Collin's Bay Penitentiary, and the Joyceville Institution. A condition of filming interviews with inmates at these jails was that they should be disguised with heavy make-up and false moustaches and hair-pieces. The interviews, conducted by Ed McGibbon (who also researched and narrates the program), are very frank and revealing, touching on such sensitive areas as homosexuality and brutality in prisons. In a group discussion, some prisoners debate their own attitudes towards society and society's towards them.

tinues to work alongside his sons, who out of respect for his age still consult him on all matters of importance affecting their own individual families (the purchase of a mule, the decision to emigrate to Canada for a better life). Without a family to sustain him in his old age, Minguccio would be faced with the prospect of living on charity at a nearby poor-house. As it is he receives only about 70 cents a day pension allowance.

The Swedish system is expensive to operate, and Sweden has been for many years one of the most heavily taxed countries in the world. As an example, the tax, including old-age pension fees, on a net income of \$4,000 per year (married persons), would amount to \$821; on \$10,000 a year the tax is \$3,580. Nevertheless, most Swedes feel that the comprehensive social welfare benefits represent good value for their payments. Only the very young rail against the system.

For a few people old age may not hold any terrors. Some of us may be fortunate enough to continue to function and contribute meaningfully to society in our old age, up to the end of our lives. But to the great majority, whose work is not creative, the ability to produce is generally curtailed in the mid-60s. People in highly developed countries may soon have to adjust to the idea of living a great deal longer than that. Some experts predict that life-expectancy in such countries will rise to between 100 and 120 years.

Metropolitan Opera:

Beethoven's Fidelio

BEETHOVEN'S only opera, *Fidelio*, parts of which he painstakingly re-wrote as many as 18 times before he was satisfied with them, is generally considered to be the first Romantic opera. It is not a perfect one, say the critics, but it contains some of the noblest, most dramatic music ever written, and although it was a while before opera-goers acquired a taste for its new flavor, it established the characteristics of 19th-century opera, and helped pave the way for the modern music drama.

In 1803 Beethoven accepted a commission to write an opera because he thought it might bring in a steady income, which he needed badly. He was then in very poor health. This, and the heavy

social demands constantly being made on him, almost precluded such a heavy undertaking as a first opera. But he dug into the

job with his usual energy. At first he was so proud of his efforts that he wrote in the margin of a sketch-book: "Struggling as you are in the whirlpool of society, you can yet manage, despite all social hindrances, to write opera." But later, frustrated by his own high standards of composition, and the "abominable" orchestra and "bungling" prima donnas involved in the opera's premiere, he wrote to a friend that "the whole business of the opera is the most distressing thing in the world."

The job of supplying him with a libretto was a demanding one, because of the lofty moral and artistic standards he insisted upon, but his imagination was fired immediately by a story of a woman who risked her life to save her husband in a sinister Spanish situation rife with hatred and anguish. Wifely devotion and heroism appealed to him enormously.

the crowd, supplemented by odd jobs. When he can afford it he sleeps at a Rowton House, where beds are available at a nominal sum.

Hoch is a little more than half Van Dyn's age, is a bona fide demagogue with a fixation about vegetarianism, runs a driving school to support his family and never takes up a collection. He lives in a flat in Hornsey, outside London, with his wife and two daughters. In the Park he talks about capital punishment, Royalty, big business, the army, the police, and the tyranny of the state ("Not in horrible Russia, not in wicked Germany, but here in tea soaked, fisheyed, sloppy, half dead, artificial, piddling England").

There are plenty of others in the Park — characters like Mac-

Guinness ("I am NOT paranoid. Everyone IS looking at me. Everyone IS following me"), the Singing Woman, the man with feathers in his hair — who have also found their way into a book entitled *The Speakers*, by Heathcote Williams. The young author is interviewed on this edition of *Telescope*, which takes its sub-title from a popular old song (sung on the sound-track by the Singing Woman).

Around the Marble Arch was directed by Bill Brayne and Ken Black and edited by Peter Mosely (Allan King Associates). Fletcher Markle is the host for *Telescope*, which is produced by Peter Kelly. Thom Benson is the executive producer for the series. Next week *Telescope* presents *The Night People*, an essay by director George Ronald on the many people who start their day when most of us finish ours. Cast: Don Fernando, minister — Baritone; Don Pizarro, governor of the state prison — baritone (Gerald Evans); Florestan, a prisoner — tenor (James King); Leonore, his wife, known as Fidelio—soprano (Birgit Nilsson); Rocco, keeper—bass, (Otto Edelmann); Marzelline, his daughter—soprano (Mary Ellen Fracht); Jaquino, gate keeper—tenor; a captain. Place, a Spanish state prison in the vicinity of Seville. Conducted by Karl Boehm.

Act I. Courtyard of the prison. Jaquino is ready to marry Marzelline but she loves the new assistant, Fidelio. Fidelio is really Leonore disguised as a youth. Her husband Florestan has disappeared and she suspects Pizarro of having imprisoned him. Having gained the confidence of Rocco she is allowed to visit the prison.

Pizarro appears and receives notice of the impending inspection by the minister. He is filled with anxiety as he has imprisoned Florestan from motives of personal vengeance. To prevent discovery of this he determines that Florestan must die before the minister arrives. As Rocco refuses to murder the dying man, he is ordered to uncover an old well in which the prisoner is to be buried. Pizarro himself resolves to kill Florestan. Leonore has been listening. Rocco allows the prisoners to get some fresh air at the request of Leonore. She cannot find Florestan among them. Pizarro returns and orders the prisoners back to their cells.

Act II. The dark dungeon of Florestan. He sinks to the ground from weakness as Rocco and Leonore arrive. Leonore recognizes him but dares not speak and helps to dig the grave. Florestan revives and Leonore gives him bread. Pizarro descends to the dungeon and is about to stab Florestan when Leonore throws herself before her husband and points a pistol at Pizarro. Trumpet calls herald the arrival of the minister and Pizarro hurries away. In the following duet, Florestan and Leonore express their happiness.

Change of scene: Courtyard of the castle. Fernando announces the king's pardon. Leonore takes the chains from her husband. He is free and Pizarro is arrested.

The First Brain-Washing

The tragic story of Juana La Loca, heir to the Spanish throne, is dramatized on radio.

ONE OF the first recorded acts of brain-washing in history, the tragic debasing of a Castillian princess whose strange life began in royal splendor and ended in animal depravity, will be told in a two-part radio drama to be heard on *CBC Stage* on succeeding Sundays, January 23rd and 30th at 1:00 p.m. It has been prepared by Ian Thorne of Toronto, who tells us that "Juana (1479-1555), third child of the remarkable Isobel and Ferdinand, became heir to the Spanish throne and yet was never able to claim it. She lies buried beside her parents in the Royal Chapel at Granada, and beside her husband, Philip of Austria. *Juana La Loca* is their story, but essentially it is a play about living people and their turbulent relationships, rather than a re-enactment of history."

Thorne has based the play on Townsend Miller's biography, *The Castles and the Crown*. Dr. Miller, who has taught at Yale and at the University of Texas, is a leading Hispanicist and the Western Hemisphere's chief authority on the tragic Infanta.

"The play," says Thorne, "begins with the strange, moody, proud, shy girl of 16 being shipped off to Flanders to marry a notorious playboy she has never seen — Philip the Handsome, whose only recorded physical flaw was a knee which sometimes slipped out of joint — the result of an injury in sports. The course of their unfortunate marriage and her own bitter ending form the story line of the drama, which moves between Flanders, England, and the stark castles and monasteries of Castile.

"Juana's psychological instability has been the subject of much study and research. She has been termed heretic and madwoman (La Loca). But Dr. Miller contends that she was no heretic, and though dis-

turbed, was by no means insane until her mind was finally broken for her.

"The second half of the play follows the last long period of her life when she was in the charge of that dark figure, the Marquis of Denia. Imprisoned in the palace of Tordessilas, her life was kept a mystery to the outside world and to succeeding generations until a century ago, when the German scholar, Gustave Bergenroth, obtained permission to examine correspondence between Denia and Juana's son, the Emperor Charles V. With the breaking of the code in which many of the letters were written, a real study of Juana's last years became possible, although the precise reasons behind her incarceration are still veiled in secrecy.

"At the end, the passionate young girl who had ridden in cloth of gold through the streets of Antwerp decked with fresh flowers, was shut into a small, pitch-dark room like a beaten animal. Her clothing rotted, her nails turned into claws, she lay senseless on the floor or backed away into a corner, gibbering and shaking as the "dead souls" crept toward her, brushing her with their grave clothes."

Juana La Loca will be produced in the Toronto studios on both occasions by Esse W. Ljungh.

In the 15 years he has been writing radio and television scripts for the CBC — and they now number in the hundreds — Ian Thorne has also acted in as many radio and stage plays, and has directed dozens of stage productions, thus acquiring a broader dramatic perspective than is available to non-performing writers. His four-part dramatization of Edward McCourt's novel, *Fasting Friar*, was presented on CBC-TV's *The Serial* last June.

When Willis Played Welles

DURING THE Second World War, when Orson Welles was probably at the height of his prestidigitation period, and, at the drop of a hat, would see his wife, then Rita Hayworth, in half, make a soup plate disappear, or produce rabbits out of a surprised dowager's tiny evening bag, he whirled into Toronto to take part in one of the famous Victory Loan broadcasts. Naturally the Victory Loan committee took him out to dinner, beforehand, and naturally Welles couldn't resist giving them a demonstration of his legerdemain prowess afterwards. But he got so interested in hocus-pocus that he forgot about time, and up at the CBC concert studio producer J. Frank Willis was getting worried. His deep voice began to rumble ominously, but at 20 seconds before air time there was still no sign of Welles.

"It was my most traumatic experience," recalls Willis. "I had 15 seconds to make up my mind whether to apologize to our audience and somehow do the show without Welles, or bluff for a while, on the chance he might turn up. Five seconds before broadcast

time I dashed on stage, script in hand, and for seven very nervous minutes pretended to be Orson, until he burst into the studio, grabbed my script, and took over from me *in mid-sentence*. I've listened to the recording of that show several times, and it's extremely difficult to detect where the transition took place." Apparently Welles was adept at more than one kind of sleight-of-hand, and Willis ran him a close second.

Mishaps like that will be featured in an upcoming edition of *As Time Goes By*, a nostalgic series recalling the "three golden decades" of radio, 1925-1955. It is produced and hosted by Willis, a veteran broadcaster whose name has been synonymous with many fine and history-making broadcasts through the years. Each week he dips into the huge CBC archives, and into many public and private collections, to present some of the best and the worst from radio's heyday.

When the series began in the fall, some people thought that blowing the cobwebs off the old discs would be cause for patronizing and laughs. They quickly discovered how wrong they were. Listeners write to say they are amazed at the high quality of performances in early radio shows. "We were turning out stuff that was internationally regarded as the highest quality in the world," points out Willis. "The award certificates on office walls around the CBC attest to that."

One of the most exciting things about rubbing the dust off old discs is the accidental discovery of little gems of nostalgia hidden away on the flip sides of records of great occasions. As an economy measure during the war, the CBC used the reverse sides to record other shows. Some of these "curiosos" are presented in the series from time to time by CBC archives supervisor Robin Woods.

In each show Rod Coneybear presents highlights from old "strip" shows, comedy, horror programs (which make modern late-night chillers on TV seem pretty tame), children's broadcasts, and other samples of the "light spoken word"; Ron Hambleton presents news and actuality highlights, such as royal tours and war reporting; Alan King offers samples of the first class dramatic acting and writing on radio back then; and Ed Manning presents music shows and personalities.

This Monday's program, January 24th, subtitled *Exhortation on the Home Front*, takes a look at Canada in wartime, when the rousing marching songs of the First World War were replaced by such tame ditties as *On a Wing and a Prayer* and the hollow boasting of *We'll Hang Our Washing on the Ziegfried Line*; when, says Willis, public credulity and apathy had to be heard to be believed. This Monday listeners will hear Katherine Hepburn as a guest on a Victory Loan broadcast, sounding incredibly like her imitators, and Helen Hayes, taking part in the series *Nazi Eyes on Canada*.

Variations for Some Talented Twins

WHEN Benjamin Britten visited a Budapest music club for school children in the spring of 1964, he was impressed by the talents of Gabriel and Zoltan Jeney, twin sons of a noted Hungarian flute player. "They each played the piano, one the violin, the other the flute," Britten recalls. "They sang, they sight-read, they answered difficult musical questions. . . . At the end of the meeting they approached me and charmingly, if forcefully, asked me to write them a work. My plea of being very busy was gently pushed aside, but I insisted on one small bargaining point. I would do it if they would write me a long

letter telling me all about themselves, their work and their play — in English. I felt safe. After a week or so, however, the letter arrived, in vivid and idiosyncratic language! I felt I must honor my promise."

The result was the *Gemini Variations*, a sunny, captivating and exceedingly novel work, a set of 12 short variations and a fugue on a theme from Zoltan Kodaly's fourth Epigram (1954). It was given its première by the delighted Jeney twins at Britten's own Aldeburgh Festival. The work uses all the available combinations, solo and duet, of the three instruments which these young artists play — piano, violin and flute — and is so arranged that the performers can change function without any gap in the music. The BBC recorded it, and the transcription will be heard on *CBC Tuesday Night*, January 25th, at 10:35 p.m.

On hand at Aldeburgh for the first performance was 83-year-old Zoltan Kodaly. Few modern composers have done more for the musical life of their country than Kodaly, who, with Bela Bartok, re-created Hungary's whole musical language. He is less radical than Bartok, a romantic impressionist who writes with forthright vigor in a strong national idiom. He has a special affinity for choral music, has devised a complete course of music education for Hungarian schools, and has travelled around Hungary collecting thousands of folk songs. In 1949 he gave his name to the Budapest Kodaly Choir, a group of 200 girls of elementary and secondary school age, chosen from the pupils most interested in music. They are trained by a teacher of singing in Budapest, Ilona Andor, who is also their chorus leader, and get their musical education in one singing lesson and two chorus rehearsals each week.

This outstanding choir also attended the Aldeburgh Festival, and presented a concert tribute to Kodaly, which will be heard in the Tuesday night program.

within the compass of man. He felt that "there is more to admire than to despise in man," and was determined to try to keep him from destroying himself. But he refused to resort to propaganda to do it.

In conversation he spoke sparingly, a welcome novelty in this era of verbal Niagaras, getting even the most complicated ideas across with a bare minimum of words. He was infinitely *sympathique*, could talk to anyone. A few accused him of *hauteur* because of his love of privacy and his great capacity for detachment, but these are necessities for any artist who wants to survive, and particularly for an objective observer of the universe devoted to translating personal experience into something simple and valid which could help his fellow men find meaning in a world full of insecurity and doubt.

But he was no philosopher locked in an ivory tower. He was decidedly a man of action who loved life and the "here and now." "I've had enough of people who died for an idea," he wrote. "What interests me is to live and die because of what one *loves*."

Many claim that Camus' writing changed their lives, including Canadian writer Leonard Cohen, who explains: Camus tries to lead the reader to the peak just before the leap of faith, where one refuses to make the leap of faith, yet refuses to return to melancholy and despair." Camus makes one stand there and think, deeply. He offers no pat answers to problems, few really concrete suggestions, but he makes us all more aware of the *nature* of our difficulties.

The moral dilemma of the revolutionary with his confused motives fascinated Camus, not just from a philosophical viewpoint, but from first hand experience of the shattering psychological struggle of the intelligent, sensitive, intensely alive and aware person involved in subversive activity—in his case, work for the French Resistance during the Second World War. He explores the problem of anarchistic ethics and the irrationality of life with compassionate insight in his play *The Just*, which *Festival* presents in a translation and adaptation by Bernard Frechtman, on Wednesday night, January 26th. Production and direction are by Peter Boretski. Besides containing some fascinating character studies, this play is fine dramatic entertainment, and holds its audience's interest from the start. While our own personal dilemmas may be much less flamboyant than those of the anarchists Camus writes about, his dialogue sheds new and challenging light on human relationships and responsibilities common to everyone.

Set in Moscow in 1905, when the harsh rule of the Tzars is being resisted by several revolutionary movements, *The Just* deals with a plot to kill the Grand Duke Serge, military governor of the city, and with the various attitudes of those involved in the scheme. They react

in individual, but not always predictable, ways. Among them is Yanek, the poetic visionary; Dora, his girl friend, who is prepared to sacrifice femininity to idealism; Stepan, a veteran of earlier plots who distrusts Yanek's sentimentality and places justice higher than human life; and Boris, leader of the party cell, who must unite contrasting people and ideals into a working force.

Barry Justice is starred as Janek; Susan Clark as Dora; Norma Renault as the Grand Duchess; Paul Harding as Skuratov, police chief; John Kastner as Stepan; Henry Hovenkamp as Boris; William Cameron as Alexis, and Ed West as Ivan. Sets are by Nikolai Soloviov; costumes by Margaret Laurent.

This is Barry Justice's first Canadian appearance. A cousin of British actor James Robertson Justice, he has appeared on the London stage, on Broadway with Charles Boyer in *Man and Boy* (1963), and has just finished making a new Rank film, *Doctor in Clover*.

Albert Camus was born in the Algerian village of Mandovi. His artisan father died in the Battle of the Marne. His gentle, uncomplaining mother, who was deaf and could neither read nor write, worked as a charwoman to support Albert and his brother. Fortunately a teacher recognized the quality of young Albert's groping mind, and prepared him for a *lycée* scholarship. A serious bout with TB interrupted his studies at the University of Algiers, but he recovered completely, as he did from a bout with communism.

In France, from 1942 until the end of the war, Camus played a vital role as a Resistance leader, and edited the Underground paper, *Combat*. After the liberation he devoted all his time to writing, stressing the importance of human decency, justice and honor, in public and private life, as a passport to freedom. "All I maintain," he said, "is that on this earth there are pestilences and there are victims, and it's up to us . . . not to join forces with the pestilences." *The Just* illustrates this vividly.—*June Graham*.

One of the critical decisions to be made about local democracy is that of territorial and functional jurisdiction. The present confusion of a myriad of jurisdictions within the same urban region neither allows the governors to make the many inter-municipal decisions required nor does it contribute to any sense of comprehension of what is at stake on the part of the governed. Who is to take responsibility when things go wrong? How can the council of one municipality be held accountable for an action of another municipality which negatively affects the former? More important, who can be held accountable when pressing area needs are not met?

It is trite to say that local government today is a complex matter. The issue is how to know continuously about and plan for this admittedly complex society. So far we have only scratched the surface of the research needs; we know little about the processes of modern urban growth and change, although we are beginning to pay more than

lip service to them.

It will take some time to reorganize our urban regions into rational governmental units, and when we do we cannot only effect a unilateral change; the creation of urban regional government means an altered relation between the region and the province. There is not much point in unifying an urban region if most of the decisions about its future are to be made elsewhere. It is quite conceivable that the province will eventually be a "super metro," particularly with the redistribution of voting power finally favoring the urban constituencies.

New Brunswick is embarking on a revolution in municipal government which will put all former local powers directly in the hands of the provincial legislators outside of villages, towns and cities. The provincial government calls this move, and many others in the field of assessment, taxation and services, an evolutionary process; the Winter Conference will consider the background to this dras-

tic change, but to call the program an evolution is something less than a precise use of the word.

Similarly, drastic changes may occur in Quebec. The recent Ile Jesus amalgamation is indicative of a bold approach (as was the creation of Metropolitan Toronto in Ontario over a decade ago). The implementation of regional development schemes such as is envisaged in the Gaspé area will have profound effects on traditional actions of local government.

In Ontario the inauguration of limited economic planning recently announced by the provincial government will mean, if pursued with effective programs, that local governments must be participators in plan formulation and implementation. This would provide a completely new outlook for municipal responsibility.

Numerous other proposals could be mentioned and many will be discussed at the Winter Conference. From these brief references a picture of change seems to be emerging, but it is too early to tell whether any pattern is discernible. The Ontario experiment of examining several urban regions by appointed independent consultants may lead to a variety of solutions ranging from unitary governments to loose federations having extensive territory. Eventually a limited number of alternatives may emerge, making it possible for general legislation to provide for forms of government now only obtainable by special act of the legislature.

To return to the original pessimism: "Who cares?" It is obvious that many elected representatives care, since most seem to resist any change; the idea of "autonomy" is very much a part of our tradition, but it is one which directly conflicts with the facts of interdependency. It will be a test of our political maturity if we are prepared to overcome the serious cultural lag which now exists between the needs of "local" governments and present practices.
