




Photos on facing page: Stravinsky rehearses the orchestra in Pulcinella; conducts the performance in Massey Hall, Toronto; relaxes at a reception following the performance with John Roberts, Alphonse Ouimet, Jean Martineau, and Franz Kraemar Five years ago when Igor Stravinsky visited Toronto for the North American première of his A Sermon, A Narrative, and a Prayer by the CBC Symphony Orchestra and the Festival Singers of Toronto, Maclean's magazine remarked: "The world's foremost living composer, Igor Stravinsky, is in love with Canada, and it's mutual". Ever since 1935 the great Russian-American musical innovator has been coming to Canada off and on, and it's not surprising. As an exile from the largest country in the world, he was naturally drawn to the second largest, sprawling across the north like his own, with vast, unpeopled areas, rumblings of progress echoing across broad city streets, and a vitality and simplicity to match his own.

His visits have become more frequent of late, as he found a rapidly maturing musical climate, with the high artistic and technical performing quality demanded by his works, and a sensitive appreciation of the lyricism in even the most angular of his modern writing. And of course the tremendous appeal of this brilliant, gnome-like little man made him inordinately welcome in our country, not only because of his ability to draw the best from his performers with a rare, delicate magnetism, but also because of his enormous personal charm and wit, and his refusal to let the weight of his years and his reputation or his physical infirmities quench his great thirst for new and better ideas and higher goals. When Stravinsky is present, everybody reaches further, including his audiences, and everybody, the maestro as well, goes away refreshed.

So it was with mutual respect and affection that he and Canadians got together again last month to videotape a birthday tribute to Stravinsky (who will be 85 on June 17th) to be presented on tv Wednesday night, June 14th, at 9.30 edt/10.30 adt, and on radio Sunday, June 18th, at 3.03 p.m. edt/4.03 adt. Both programs feature him with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra rehearsing the orchestral suite from his ballet *Pulcinella*, and performing the work at a CBC public concert in Toronto's Massey Hall. Production is by Franz Kraemer (tv) and Irving Glick (radio). The program also includes a special ceremony in which Stravinsky became the first non-Canadian to receive the Canada Council Medal, this country's highest honor in the arts. The presentation was made by Jean Martineau, Q.C., chairman of the Canada Council, who noted that Strvinsky's "music has crossed all borders. It is of course for the universality of his genius that we offer the highest honor we have to give to a man who one described himself as 'an inventor of music', and who has indeed 'with a muse of fire ascended the brightest heaven of invention'."

During the second half of the Massey Hall concert a performance of Stravinsky's opera-oratorio, *Oedipus Rex*, conducted by Robert Craft, was recorded to form the sound track for a staged production of the work to be seen on CBC-TV's *Festival* next season. Soloists with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra were Ernst Haefliger, Marilyn Horne, Louis Quilico, Joseph Rouleau, and Garnet Brooks, with a male chorus trained by Elmer Iseler.

JAMES JOYCE

Recollections of the writer by those who knew him: Thursday, at 10.30 p.m., on radio James Joyce, the man who tortured the English language and then complained that "writing in English is the most ingenious torture ever devised", is the subject of this week's program in CBC radio's *Anthology* series.

Joyce died 26 years ago in Zurich, of a perforated duodenal ulcer. For the first half of his life he had struggled against poverty and for the second half against illness. His first collection of short stories, *Dubliners*, was rejected by 40 publishers; his great work of genius, *Ulysses*, was banned and pirated; and his last complete work, *Finnegan's Wake*, was denounced as something written "by a lunatic for lunatics". Joyce himself felt that he was "a joyce crying in the wilderness".

As he developed his art, Joyce took the reader higher and higher into the rarified atmosphere of the English language. When Finnegan's Wake appeared in 1939 it puzzled even his most ardent supporters and provided his critics with yet more ammunition as they stumbled through such passages as: "Scorching my hand and starving my famine to make his private linen public. Wallop it well with your battle and clean it. My wrists are rwusty rubbing the mouldaw stains. And the dneepers of wet and the gangres of sin in it."

Who the hell is this Joyce, as H. G. Wells once demanded? To Cyril Connolly, who knew him, Joyce's life was "... one of the saddest and emptiest, except in so far as it was filled with the joys of artistic creation. But he rejected everything—he ignored the war of 1914 and displaced himself from Trieste to Zurich, he ignored the last war and again displaced himself from Paris to Zurich, he ignored the Irish Republic which he had called for in his youth, he ignored Fascism, anti-Fascism and Communism, he despised psycho-analysis, he hated painting, took no interest in architecture or travel or objects, liked no music of his time except for a brief craze for Antheil, and seems equally immune to modern poetry and literature. His clock had stopped on Bloomsday (June 16, 1904)."

On the Anthology program listeners will hear from some of the other people who knew Joyce, and from Joycean scholars who give their views on Joyce the writer, Joyce the Catholic, and Joyce the pornographer. The interviews were recorded by Gwen Grant in London, Dublin, Rome, Zurich, and Toronto. Among those heard are actress Siobhan McKenna, and writers James Plunkett, Sean McRaimen, and John Garvin (pen-name Andrew Cass) in Dublin; Milton Hebald, the American sculptor of the lifesize portrait of Joyce at Zurich's Fluntern Cemetery, in Rome; the late Mrs. Mae Monaghan, Joyce's sister, in London; Joyce's biographer, Richard Ellman, in Zurich. In Toronto the president of the James Joyce society of Toronto, Harry J. Pollack, is interviewed about the work of the society and its relations with the Joyce estate.

This edition of *Anthology*, broadcast Thursday at 10.30 p.m., is produced by Terence Gibbs. Next week (June 22nd) the program comes from Montreal, where English-born writer John Metcalf is interviewed.

Four historical dramas by George Woodcock, who won the Governor-General's 1967 Non-Fiction Award, will be presented on radio's Summer Stage this season, beginning on Sunday, June 11th. Production and direction will be by Gerald Newman in the Vancouver studios. The first play, Defender of the Past, is concerned with the North-West Rebellion of 1885, in which the Saskatchewan Indians and Métis, urged on by Riel, made a last stand for freedom against the threat of the white settlers. The play examines the tragedy of the rebellion through the eyes of Gabriel Dumont, Riel's associate, who escaped over the border to Montana. The tragedy, of course, is that of a people trying to maintain a transient way of life—between savagery and civilization—when history had already made it obsolete. (Further details of the event are contained in an article on pages 10 and 11 of this issue.)

Of this play and the three others, Woodcock says: "I shall be trying to extract some poetic truths out of historical events and not to make literal presentations of what is known to have taken place. The result I am seeking is the tragic—or sometimes comic—pattern which has some kind of autonomous dramatic existence, and is not a mere distillation of the facts. One has to sustain firmly the thought that history gives materials for literature; literature does not serve history."

The July 16th Woodcock play will be *The Death of Brock*, an account of the hero of the War of 1812, Sir Issac Brock. He was a British general who, on the outbreak of hostilities, joined forces with Tecumseh to capture the post at Detroit and win control of the upper lakes. Later he was mortally wounded at the battle of Queenston Heights.

One of the youngest and bravest heroines in early Canadian history was 14-year-old Madeleine de Verchères, who, in October, 1692, when her parents and most of the garrison were away, successfully defended the fort of Verchères against an Iroquois attack, with only two fear-ridden soldiers, her two younger brothers, a servant, and an old man of 80 to help her. In the August 13th broadcast Woodcock brings that dramatic incident to life in a portrait of life on the edge of danger in early French Canada.

On September 24th he takes listeners to the Cariboo Gold Rush in a script called The Overlanders. In 1858 some U.S. prospectors, who had been to the California gold fields. struck it rich in British Columbia, and soon 30,000 men, tenderfoot and veteran forty-niner, rogue and gentleman, were braving the perils of the gold country. Three years later, an even richer gold strike was made farther up the Fraser River in the Cariboo. Prices sky-rocketed, with flour at \$300 a barrel, and a pair of boots selling for \$50. But in four years, 25 million dollars' worth of gold was hauled out of the district. Many people left their homes in the east to seek their fortune in the Cariboo, trekking in ox-carts from Montreal or Kingston to Edmonton, and then on foot through the mountains to the gold fields. After the gold fever had abated, some of these overlanders stayed on in the west to farm.

SUMMER STAGE

First of four Canadian historical dramas, Sunday, June 11, 2.03 p.m. edt/3.03 adt, radio



CALIXA LAVALLÉE

Neglected Canadian saluted Saturday, June 10, 6.00 p.m. (Maritimes: June 17, 6.30) tv In the little settlement of Verchères, Quebec, five years after Victoria became Queen of England, a blacksmith's wife gave birth to a boy destined to be a wandering, idealistic minstrel applauded in foreign countries and rejected in his own: Calixa Lavallée, composer of our national anthem. On Saturday evening, June 10th, (June 17th in the Maritimes) tv's *Centennial 20/20* pays tribute to this neglected Canadian in a program written by Tom Farley and directed by Cecil Browne.

By the time Calixa was born, in 1842, his family had been established in this country for nearly 200 years. Augustin Lavallée's circulars advertised him as a man who "teaches music and repairs musical instruments and firearms", so he was no ordinary blacksmith, and his family throve on music. Young Calixa learned to play the piano, violin and cornet, and then the organ, for his father was associated with the famous organ-builder, Joseph Casavant. When he was 13 Calixa had the good fortune to be adopted by Léon Derome, a butcher and patron of the arts, and taken to live in Montreal, where he was given every musical advantage.

But after two years he became restless, and ran away with a Negro minstrel show to New Orleans, where he won an international piano competition, and met Spanish violinist Olivera, who engaged him as accompanist on a South American tour, Lavallée might have settled permanently in New Orleans if he hadn't been passionately against slavery. When the Civil War broke out he went up to Providence and enlisted in the Fourth Rhode Island Regiment as a trombonist in the military band. He took part in the Battle of Bull Run and was wounded in the leg at Antietam. Then the 21-year-old returned to Derome in Montreal and set himself up as a music teacher. But his financial returns were poor and when the wanderlust set in again he left with the same minstrel troupe. After travelling to California and New Orleans, he turned up in Lowell, Mass., and married Josephine Gently. He was next heard of in New York as musical director and superintendent of Jim Fiske's Grand Opera House. But later Fiske was killed by a rival and the theatre closed. Back Lavallée went to Derome, who scraped together enough money to send him to study in Paris for two years.

Afterwards he returned to Montreal for five years as teacher and performer, and was choirmaster at St. James's Cathedral, working all the while towards establishing a conservatory of music. Finally, when the government reneged on promises of financial help, Lavallée left Canada debt-ridden and ciscouraged, never to return. In Hartford, Conn., further plans for producing his own operas fell through with the death of his leading lady, and after a period in hospital he became a wanderer again. He played the piano on a ship plying between Boston and New York for a while, toured as accompanist to Hungarian singer Etelka Gerster, then settled in Boston, where he made a decent living as teacher and performer until his death from tuberculosis in 1891, aged 49.

Oscar Peterson is built like a bulldozer but he has fingers like gazelles. He's been called the world's greatest living jazz pianist, who has "reduced the technical problems of playing to absurdity". Almost from the start he's been showered with superlatives. He has performed around the world. He has won leading awards over and over again. But, he says, "It's still a big thing for me to walk to the piano to play." He has never gotten over the thrill of having his own group, of holding the reins, of choosing his own sort of music, of feeling an audience warm towards him and get carried away by his varied piano moods. His talent has brought him wealth, but he says that music is still more important to him than cash. As he puts it: "I'm a man of simple tastes. I never really cared to crowd the Duponts!"

Peterson has a tremendous grasp of his subject, not only the practical side of jazz, but its intellectual aspects, too. Ever since that day in Montreal when he was in his early teens—"This sailor off a West Indies boat was playing. I listened and decided I wanted to play music like that, only better"—he has been trying to make jazz more widely understood and enjoyed. He lends it enormous dignity. He's an intense performer who expects a great deal from himself as well as from his group, and although his career is his life, it's not always fun, and takes a great deal out of him, physically and emotionally.

Peterson likes to play Montreal because it's where music came into his life. His was a classical training. All the children in his family studied the piano, and he played the trumpet as well. "I owe a great deal to my mother," he tells us. "When I wanted to play swing music she backed me up and said she thought there might be a future in it."

He made his first public appearances in Montreal churches and community halls, toured the country with several bands and then organized his own trio. Impresario Norman Granz recalls that he heard Peterson play in Vancouver and was unimpressed. But in 1949, while riding in a Montreal taxi and listening to a broadcast from a club on the car radio, Granz heard a jazz sound that so exhilarated him that he called to the driver: "Take me there!" He spent the evening at the club, absorbed in Peterson's performance, and invited him to New York to be a surprise guest at Carnegie Hall. *Down Beat* gave Oscar rave reviews, and he's been on the inside ever since.

But after his international travels he always comes back to his home in Toronto, to his big Steinway grand, his abstract paintings, his collection of expensive cameras, and the country that means a great deal to him—although he feels free to be highly critical of it.

An intimate visit with this soft-voiced celebrity, on stage, in his home, and outside talking about jazz and his career, will be presented on *Telescope* '67 on Thursday night, June 15th. *Oscar Peterson Inside* was directed by Perry Rosemond, and produced by host Fletcher Markle. It includes comments by such associates as Ella Fitzgerald, Duke Ellington, and Norman Granz.

THIS WEEK'S MUSIC

The first Sputnik opera, a look at "mankind in space-time", entitled Aniara, by the well-known Swedish composer, Karl-Birger Blomdahl, will be presented on recordings in the radio series **Opera Time**, on Saturday, June 10th, at 2.03 p.m. edt/3.03 adt. Hostess for the series is Ruby Mercer.

Commissioned by the Stockholm Opera and first performed there in 1959, Aniara tells of a huge space ship which is evacuating men and women from a devastated, radiation-contaminated Earth to Mars. On one of its trips, with 8,000 people on board, Aniara is thrown off course by a shower of meteorites. The ship, now out of control, can neither return to Earth nor reach Mars, and her fugitives, instead of finding peace and happiness away from their atom bombravaged planet, must travel endlessly into galactic space, until finally, perhaps, with a cargo of corpses. Aniara disintegrates.

One of the characters on board is Mima, an ingenious electronic instrument resembling an enormous hourglass, with a soul, a brain, and a conscience. Mima is truthful, poetic, scientific and cultured, and is idolized by the other passengers. But she is dying of a broken heart because mankind is foolishly exterminating itself with radiation poison and must seek new homes in outer space. Mima's arias are weird electronic harmonies and bits of tape-recorded human conversation.

The libretto, by Erik Lindegren, is based on a set of 103 poems by Swedish poet Harry Martinson.

Blomdahl was born in 1916. While a student of civil engineering at the Stockholm College of Technology he became an ardent concert-goer, and after six months of a pretty solid music diet decided to give up his engineering plans and study composition. He made his name internationally with his third symphony, a work colored by bizarre, often uproarious orchestral effects, with passionate climaxes. Aniara was his first opera. Two years ago Blomdahl and Lindegren collaborated on a second opera, Herr Von Hancken, which humorously tells of a journey to a popular spa by a pretentious, dying old 19th-century Swede, who is given a reprieve and tempted three times by a devil disguised as a violinplaying Frenchman.

Aniara will be one of the operas performed by the Swedish Opera in its season at Expo this summer.

CBMT PRIZE-WINNING TV DRAMAS ON NEW SERIES

"Indians ain't wanted here. Indians go home. It's always like that. I never feel good. Always dirty. Second rate,"

Joe is an Indian and his feelings about life in a big Canadian city stem from his failure to rise above poverty. He hasn't been able to find a decent job since he left the reservation. Worst of all, in his estimation, his wife works as a baby-sitter for a white woman who has become a strong influence in her life.

One day, Joe comes home with a new problem. He's in trouble with the police.

This is the theme of Hit And Run, a drama by Calgary playwright B. J. Lemay which will launch a new half-hour series, Teleplay '67 on CBMT, Monday, June 12th, at 10.30 p.m. The 13-week series will consist of the winning entries in Channel Six's Centennial Playwriting Contest.

"We are beginning the series with the runners-up," said contest co-ordinator Gary Plaxton. "The first prize winner, Eric Nicol's Maple Leaf, will be the last play presented, on Sept. 4th."

Nicol's play was chosen by judges Mavor Moore and Michael Sinelnikoff from among 620 entries. It brought its author a \$1,000 award. Douglas Bowie of Ottawa received \$500 for his second place winner, Who Was The Lone Ranger?, and Bryan Barney of Toronto \$300 for his third place winner, The Trophy Room. The ten runners-up were given \$100 apiece.

Plaxton and three other producers who have been associated with the Shoestring Theatre series will produce the Teleplay '67 dramas. The other producers are Brian O'Leary, Michael Sinelnikoff and Fernand Ippersiel.



On Monday, June 12th, the 15th season of the Stratford Shakespearean Festival opens in Stratford, Ont. Over the next four months the Festival Theatre will be presenting Christopher Plummer and Zoe Caldwell in the title roles of Antony and Cleopatra; Alan Bates in the title role of Richard III; Tony van Bridge as Falstaff in The Merry Wives of Windsor; and William Hutt as Khlestakov in The Government Inspector.

The Festival Theatre will also be the setting for a series of Festival Concerts presented under a grant from the Centennial Commission. Some of the international artists appearing include: soprano Lois Marshall; violinist/conductor Yehudi Menhuin, with the Bath Festival Orchestra; pianist/conductor Jose Iturbi; contralto Maureen Forrester; and lutenist-guitarist Julian Bream.

Later, the Avon Theatre will be presenting the Stratford Festival Opera Company in Mozart's *Cosi fan tutte;* Benjamin Britten's *Albert Herring;* and the première of a new Canadian work, *Colours in the Dark*, by James Reaney. Reaney describes this as more than a play, it is "an attempt to show an imaginative Canadian's life" and will be "an unconventional Centennial show" about "a trip through the life and thoughts of a Canadian poet".

Among other events are an exhibition of Shakespeare books; 100 Years of Theatre in Canada at the Festival Exhibition Hall; and several displays of paintings, including Canadian paintings 1850-1950 sponsored by the National Gallery of Canada.


CBC radio will be on hand for Monday's opening to sketch the background to the Festival this year and to talk to some of the celebrities taking part in the official ceremonies. The program (live at 7.30 p.m. edt/8.30 adt) is produced by Ronald Gordon. Bruce Marsh and Lloyd Robertson are the commentators.

On May 11th, 1857, the affair of the 'greased cartridges' touched off a mutiny among the sepoys at the fort of Meerut in India, leading to a massacre of their British officers and a struggle between the British and Indian rebels that lasted nearly two years. The mutiny was the death-knell of the East India Company, with its out-dated system of government, and resulted in an act of parliament that transferred the governing of India to the crown, acting through a secretary of state. Although the mutiny was not a national movement, it is regarded by some modern Indian historians as the first Indian struggle for independence. Others view it as the last desperate spasms of the feudal system in India.

This week on CBC-FM's Saturday Evening (June 10 at 8.03 p.m.) a dramatic documentary of the Indian Mutiny, written by George Woodcock, examines the underlying causes of the revolt, how it was bitterly fought with atrocities on both sides, and how it changed the political shape of India.

It began with the issuing to sepoys of cartridges waxed with beef and pork fat, which to the highly sensitive Brahmins was an offence against their religion. (The ends of the cartridges had to be bitten off before insertion in the rifle; to the faithful, this constituted enforced 'eating' of the forbidden animal fat.) After the massacre at Meerut, the sepoys raided the great arsenal at Delhi, which was almost unguarded, and proclaimed the Mogul emperor. With campaigns under way in the Crimea, China, and Persia, the British were unprepared for such an uprising. Europeans in the forces numbered 45,000 against 232,000 Indian, though the mutiny was eventually put down with the help of Indian troops—Sikhs and Gurkhas playing a prominent part in the capture of Delhi, and the Bombay army carrying out the campaign in central India.

The Indian Mutiny is produced in Vancouver by Gerald Newman and narrated by Walter Marsh. The readers are: Robert Clothier, Peter Haworth, and Lee Taylor.

THE INDIAN MUTINY

A dramatic documentary of the revolt in British India: on FM's Saturday Evening Centenary Concerts, the Thursday night music series on radio, presents this week the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra conducted by Willem van Otterloo, with Marie Collier, soprano, as soloist. The broadcast will be recorded in Montreal, where the orchestra is appearing as part of Expo's World Festival. The program of Bach, Ravel, and Dvorak works also includes the world première of a new Australian work, Sun Music No. 4, by Peter Sculthorpe.

Peter Sculthorpe was born in Tasmania in 1929 and is now a lecturer at Sydney University. He is a prolific composer who, after leaving Melbourne University, studied under Wellesz at Oxford. His String Quartet No. 6, performed at the Commonwealth Arts Festival by the Austral String Quartet, has been recorded under the auspices of UNESCO. The first of his Sun Music pieces had its world première in London in 1965 when it was performed at the Royal Festival Hall by the Sydney Symphony Orchestra conducted by John Hopkins.

In the Bach work, Suite No. 2 in B Minor, the soloist is Arnost Bourak, flute. The Ravel compositions, in which Marie Collier will be heard, include Asie, La Flute Enchanté, and L'Indifférent, from Schehérézade. The program concludes with a performance of the New World Symphony, by Dvorak.

Marie Collier, who was born in Ballarat, Australia, never seriously considered a career as a singer until she was in her mid-twenties. She won a talent contest in 1950, when she was 22, but it was not until later, when she came under the influence of Katherine Wielaart, that she decided to turn professional. In her own country her first big success was in the role of Santuzza in Cavalleria Rusticana, which she later sang at Covent Garden in the celebrated production by Italy's Franco Zeffirelli. What really encouraged her to go to Europe for further study was her great success in Australia in the role of Magda Sorel in The Consul. Miss Collier made her Covent Garden début in 1956 as the First Lady in the Mozart bi-centenary production of Die Zauberflote. Since then she has appeared with the Sadler's Wells company and the Royal Opera in a wide range of parts-Marie in Wozzek, Musetta in La Bohème, Cressida in William Walton's Troilus and Cressida, and Elisabeth in Don Carlos. She was Covent Garden's choice to replace Maria Callas in the 1965 production of Tosca when Miss Callas was unable to appear. Listeners to CBC radio's Metropolitan Opera broadcasts will recall the world première earlier this year of Mourning Becomes Elektra, in which Miss Collier starred as Christine. Her career has taken her around the world to perform in Athens, Buenos Aires, and San Francisco. In Canada she has sung in Montreal and Vancouver.

This edition of *Centenary Concerts* was recorded at the Salle Wilfrid Pelletier. The next concert in the series is scheduled for June 29th, when Yehudi Menuhin will appear with the Bath Festival Orchestra.

The Melbourne Symphony concert is made available to the CBC by the Australian Broadcasting Commission.

DIVORCE

Divorce reform in Canada: a national Town Meeting on The Public Eye, Sunday night on tv

George Bernard Shaw's views on marriage and divorce were, like most of his other ideas, far ahead of his time. In the '30s, when the climate of opinion was far less 'liberal' than it is today, he wrote: "If we adopt the common romantic assumption that the object of marriage is bliss, then the very strongest reason for dissolving a marriage is that it shall be disagreeable to one or other or both of the parties. If we accept the view that the object of marriage is to provide for the production and rearing of children, then childlessness should be a conclusive reason for dissolution. As neither of these causes entitles married persons to divorce, it is at once clear that our (British) marriage law is not founded on either assumption. What it is really founded on is the morality of the tenth commandment, which Englishwomen will one day succeed in obliterating from the walls of our churches by refusing to enter any building where they are publicly classed with a man's house, his ox, his ass, as his purchased chattels."

Divorce, Shaw felt, meant not the destruction of marriage but "the first condition of its maintenance. A thousand indissoluble marriages mean a thousand marriages and no more. A thousand divorces may mean two thousand marriages; for the couples may marry again. Divorce only re-assorts the couples; a very desirable thing when they are ill-assorted. Also, it makes people much more willing to marry, especially prudent people and proud people with a high sense of self-respect."

Shaw had a number of recommendations on divorce, among them that it should be as easy and cheap and private as marriage; that it should be granted at the request of either party, whether the other consents or not. Such views are, of course, outrageous to many people.

This week on CBC-TV's *The Public Eye* René Levesque and Warner Troyer preside over a 'National Town Meeting' that will debate the pros and cons of changing Canada's divorce laws. There will be panels in Halifax (moderator Kingsley Brown); Montreal (moderator Hilary Brown); Red Deer, Alta. (Larry Zolf); Vancouver (Doug Collins); and Toronto (Levesque and Troyer). In Toronto there will be a studio audience who will participate by questioning the panel. This panel is made up of clergymen, lawyers, political leaders, and other professional people.

This edition of *The Public Eye* (Sunday, June 11th, at 10.00 p.m. edt/11.00 adt) is produced by Robert Patchell and directed by Jim Shaw. The executive producer is Richard Nielsen.

The basis for this week's *Friday Night Movie* on CBC-TV is a historical novel by a Sicilian prince, Giuseppe de Lampedusa, who in his lifetime had published nothing. After his death the manuscript of a book entitled *Il Gattopardo* was found among his effects. Published in English in 1960 as *The Leopard* it was an immediate hit and stayed on the best-seller lists for most of that year. It was hailed as a masterpiece, the finest Italian novel of the century.

Giuseppe Tomasi, Prince of Lampedusa, was one of the last of a long line of Sicilian aristocrats. The family could trace its roots back to the 11th century. Giuseppe's early life was spent between Palermo, where the family had its winter estates, and the huge summer residence at Santa Margherita Belice, which had all the amenities associated with nobility—a hundred guest rooms, stables and coach houses, a private theatre and church, portrait galleries, and sumptuous furnishings. For Giuseppe there was no such thing as work and he spent most of his adulthood learning the world's literature in the original languages. Towards the end of his life he began to write, mostly in an autobiographical vein. After The Leopard another book was published, recollections of his boyhood, a short story, and fragments from a novel which would have carried on the story of The Leopard, bringing it forward to the 20th century.

The Leopard is set in 19th-century Sicily at a time when a kingdom of Italy has been established in the north, with Austria still retaining Venice. Garibaldi is sweeping through Sicily and soon the country will be united under the House of Savoy. It is the beginning of a new era in Italy and aristocrats like the Prince of Salina will have to adjust to a new society in which the nobility must give way to the rising bourgoisie. The theme is expressed in the book by the Prince's nephew, Tancredi Falconeri: "Unless we ourselves take a hand now, they'll foist a republic on us. If we want things to stay as they are, things will have to change." To a proud man like the Prince of Salina, asking him to bow to the bourgoisie in order to save his estates is like asking a leopard (the symbol on his escutcheon) to change its spots.

The film version of *The Leopard*, made in Italy, stars Burt Lancaster as the Prince of Salina. Alain Delon plays Tancredi, his nephew; and Claudia Cardinale the daughter of a *nouveau riche* whom Tancredi eventually marries. It's not the merging of two noble lines the Prince might have wished, but "we live in a changing reality to which we adapt like seaweed bending under the pressure of water".

Directed by Luchino Visconti (himself an aristocrat, the Count of Modrone) this color production took first prize at the Cannes Film Festival in 1963. His best-known other films are *Senso*, *Rocco and his Brothers*, *Ossessione*, *Notti Bianche*, and one of the stories in *Boccaccio* '70.

On *Great Movies* this week (June 10th, at 8.30 p.m. edt/9.30 adt) Frank Sinatra stars in Frank Capra's comedy *A Hole in the Head*. Co-starring are Edward G. Robinson, Eleanor Parker, Thelma Ritter, and Keenan Wynn.
