Beatle Lennon Cuts Montreal "BED" Session

Montreal: John Lennon, currently touring Eastern Canada on a peace kick and "lie-in" posh suites of leading hotels in Toronto, Ottawa, and Montreal, gathered together an impressive flock of observers and a few celebrities to lay down his new venture, on wax.

The "live" session was arranged by Capitol's Pierre Dubord, with the help of an RCA mobile unit and the engineering skill of Andre Perry. Lennon himself produced, with much help from Dubord. Bare essentials only were used for the instrument back-up and included drums and guitar. Additional instrumentation will apparently be added when Lennon returns to England. Top side is entitled "Give Peace A Chance", inspiration for which he apparently received while in bed, and includes

among many of the television, radio and general peanut gallery, Timothy Leary and Tommy Smothers. The latter is reportedly playing guitar on the sessions. The flip is a solo bit by Yoko tabbed "Remember Love".

The session took place in his seventeenth floor suite in the Queen Elizabeth Hotel from 10 PM to 4 AM.

Although security was tight in the hotel, the Montreal scene was much better than both Toronto and Ottawa. There were very few turned away from sharing Lennon and Company's "Lie-in". The whole affair became an excellent promotion for Montreal and attracted some of the world's top entertainment and political figures as well as a touchy situation with the Bell insofar as incoming calls which, at times, threatened to break down the system.

Vancouver's Beach Festival Walloping Success

Vancouver: Aldergrove, a small usually quiet and peaceful town near Vancouver, was the scene over the May 24th holiday weekend of Canada's first Rock Festival, and a fantastic 3 days that drew over 25,000 people to take part in a revolutionary experiment in musical festivals.

It all started Friday night when thousands poured into the 200 acre Aldergrove Beach Park, creating utter chaos on every road leading to the park. By Saturday morning over 1500 tents had been erected and thousands of happy revelers were sleeping in groups around fires or wherever soft ground availed itself.

Non-stop rock blazed from the 2 stages set 500 yards apart, and over 35 rock groups kept pounding the heated music to the masses gathered. The bands kept going all day and when night fell, the fantastic light show began with colours bouncing and reflecting off trees, tents, cars and people with the hundreds of campfires adding to the scene to create a fantasy. Full length movies commenced later to add to the illusion already being experienced.

The groups were too numerous to watch them all. What with two stages

going at once, but some of the groups on hand to make the experience happen were: The Mock Duck, Trials of Jayson Hoover, Black Snake Blues Band; Tomorrow's Eye; Seeds Of Time; Pappa Bear; The Muff; White Heart; and the New Vaudeville Band. Both locally and from abroad, the groups took turns keeping the assembled masses turned on to their sound.

The unbelievable sound system was provided by Deyong. The Festival was sponsored by CKLG radio in co-operation with Neil Godwin Associates.

The people came from all over the province. They brought their kids; their dogs, and even goats. They took part in a total experience never before attempted on such a scale, and looked forward to the Festival being an annual event.

The RCMP were on hand to keep an eye on the happening, but kept their distance and, on the whole, let the people do their thing. From nudity

JOHN NORRIS TO NEW YORK

Toronto: John Norris, publisher of Coda Magazine, Canada's national jazz monthly and producer of several excellent jazz LPs, is currently in New York for talks with record VPs.

Purpose of the Norris trip is to negotiate the release of his two big Sackville sellers, "Jazz Giants" and "Old Tyme Modern". The latter features Herb Hall of the Jazz Giants.

Timing of the trip couldn't be better being that the "Jazz Giants" LP has chalked up over 2000 sales while Hall's set has sold over 1000 units, which is considered excellent, considering the short period of time the product has been on the market. Another plus for Norris is the New York appearance of the Jazz Giants. They'll be appearing for six weeks at the Downbeat Club on Lexington commencing June 13.

POLYDOR APPOINTS NEW REPS

Montreal: Mr. Fred Exon, general manager Polydor Records Canada Ltd., announces the appointment of Mr. Gary Ross as Polydor representative for the Atlantic provinces with headquarters in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, and Don Ullman as sales representative for the Manitoba territory to be located in Winnipeg.

Polydor's promo chief Lori Bruner currently touting the Quebec tour of France's Frank Fernandel, who arrived in Montreal (5) and his kick off appearance at the Viscount Motel in Laval. The label has experienced much action with Fernandel's lid of "C'est Toujours Comme Ca".

Life, the Montreal group, picking up national action on their deck of "Hands Of The Clock" will be appearing with Robert Charlebois and Steppenwolf at Donald K. Donald's presentation of the Bicultural Rock Festival to be held at the Forum (23).

Bruner also experiencing good local action with LP product by the 5 Bells who open at Place Bonaventure June 15 for three weeks.

Polydor's west coast promo man John Turner hitting hard with several single releases for the label. The powerful CKLG now listing "Heather Honey" - Tommy Roe; "Hands Of The Clock" - Life; "Badge" - Cream; and "Truck Stop" - Jerry Smith. Also making a strong showing throughout the west is Elyse Weinberg's lid of "Deed I Do" with her new LP release showing good potential. Turner is currently on a promotion trip to Edmonton, Calgary and Winnipeg.

BUCK PRODUCES NORTH SINGLE

Kitchener, Ont: Latest from the production hand of Gary Buck is the Jerry North lid of "Life's A Lot Like Movies", written by Buck and "Time", a Ron McLeod penning. This Capitol outing, which was recorded at RCA's Toronto studios, has shown early indications of becoming a chart item across the country.

North's hometown is Hamilton, Ont. where he has acquired a sizeable following. He has also become a popular item in the Calgary area where he stood in for Gary Buck at the Stampede and later appeared at the Calgary Inn. North has also had excellent exposure on television. His Toronto appearance at the Edison Hotel created capacity houses throughout the week.

Coming up for North is an important set of appearances in Wheeling, West Virginia and a possible swing through Europe.

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HOSIER-WRITER & CARTOONIST

That boom being heard across the land isn't emanating from Cape Kennedy. Its the sound of Canadian country music, taking off like an Atlas Rocket.

Western groups are being recorded faster than you can string an old guitar. With the upsurge of interest in this field, RPM recently interviewed Canadian country songwriter, Jack Hosier.

Q. How long have you been writing songs, Jack?

A. About 5 years. Cy Anders, a great talent whom you've possibly seen on Carl Smith's TV show helped and encouraged me when I started.

Q. You've had a few songs recorded lately, haven't you?

A. Yes, on Jack Boswell's Paragon

label. "Cadillacs to California" and "Let Nothing Happen To Your Heart" were recorded by Doug Watters and the Blue Diamonds. I think they are one of the top groups in Canada - terrific sound.

Q. I understand you also like to paint?

A. Yes, I like to work with pastel or oil or even sketch a few cartoons.

Q. "I'm Angry" did quite well making No. 25 on the Top 40 Country Chart, didn't it?

A. Yes, Mike McConnell recorded that as well as "That Could Be Me" and "Down Comes The Gavel". On his latest LP - "Travellin' Man - Mike McConnell" for Paragon, Mike and his group "The Don Valley Boys" (Roy Leslie-steel; Tom Weber-bass) have two

more of mine - "Feeling Poorly" and "Cadillacs to California".

Q. We've heard "Cadillacs" - sounds like a winner.

A. Well, Mike does a terrific job on anything he does. He's a good looking guy with a voice as smooth as an old tire. There's a fellow some TV producer should get a hold of. Incidentally, if any recording group are looking for new material, I'll be glad to have them listen to anything I have.

Q. We have some great talent here.

A. More people are realizing that, thanks to publications such as yours.



THE WAY IT'S GOING TO BE

The CBC made history recently when they got what might have been an exclusive one hour show of the John Lennon and wife Yoko "bed-in" in Montreal. They somehow managed to obtained the services of one of



the top money making philosophers of the 60s, and his wife, to record on film a very interesting and unusual demonstration.

The one hour Canadian TV show was worldwide news, but there is a possibility that it will not be seen by many in the United States because Lennon's remarks might well have been directed at that nation.

The million dollar film (which may be priceless) will no doubt be panned by the daily press (adding further to the generation and credibility gap)

and will possibly get some criticism from the government (since it was the national television network that let "shit" go by twice in the show without censure.) This might even set a precedent that will make television production 14 years old instead of 13 (the philosophical mentality level of television production.)

Lennon's philosophy (as way out as it seems) comes from a man who is sincere in his beliefs. His method of making them known is so unorthodox that cartoonist Al Capp insisted to John and Yoko that their motives were profit. His motives were justified since where he comes from "everything is!"

A mild confrontation developed from Capp which was somewhat one-sided. Capp waged war on the young peace-niks who only took offensive measures to answer his insinuations. Even as the battle ended and Beatle's /publicist Derek Taylor asked Capp to get out, Lennon scored another moral victory by acting the pacifist. If the battle was over, Lennon won the war while maintaining his philosophy.

Bits with Lennon and Dick Gregory, Tommy Smothers and Capp were overshadowed by Patrick Watson who admirably got on the bed to conduct the only meaningful interview with the couple. It brought about the fact that the press and media had

taken upon itself the responsibility to report MacCartney's incidents with LSD after being asked not to print the item because of the powerful influence of the Beatles. The press proceeded to print the item disregarding their own theory that the news would influence young people.

Watson continues to show all the polish of a late night talk show interviewer. One might wonder how come Watson has been able to remain in Canada when his outstanding ability should have brought him to the attention of the United States networks long ago. The same could be said about Ross McLean who produced the show.

Should the show be criticized, it might be interesting to find out what Lennon's fee would be for a one hour performance in a TV film, and just how valuable the documentation of this modern day philosopher and his wife might be in years to come.

Lennon and the CBC made the daily press look very foolish when the TV film is compared to the mince-meat that the dailies made of the "bed in".

A great deal of credit must go to Derek Taylor (who was one of the high points of the film) and Capitol's Richard Glenville-Brown who co-operated to keep things rolling and under control, and the CBC, who proved that the camera and careful editing don't lie!

There is some hope for credibility yet!

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SOUND....Only Helps You To Communicate

Three years ago, Canadian studios could only afford you the facilities of three-track recording. I still have in my possession many of the tapes that were done in that time employing this very limited process. They were short of amazing at that time and even today are superior to many 8-track sessions that are being done.

Then Canada acquired a number of 4-track studios and we thought this was an end-all. The sound improved in some cases. Often it wasn't as good as the 3-track sessions that proceeded it. Today studios make production even easier with 8-track sessions. Even 8-track hasn't answered all the problems. Facilities are comforting and they can speed up your session, but they don't (repeat don't) in any way make up for a lack of ingenuity. 8-track doesn't take the place of "communication".

I was once told in a TV studio that television is "90% video and 10% audio". This often becomes obvious when the sound of some TV

shows is done so poorly. Improper mike placement and a lack of acoustic control can be a problem in TV studios. If TV depends 90% on communicating with the picture, then they are obviously satisfied with a 10% sound. If the ratio of importance in television is nine times greater in the case of the picture, then audio need only be there but has very little value in the end product as long as it is "adequate"

In sound recording (for its own sake), the sound must be 100% because of the lack of a picture. You must communicate your entire message with the audio. The interesting aspect is the word "communicate".

When a record is played, a certain amount of clarity will make it possible for the listener to hear it. A certain amount of attention will make it possible for the listener to understand the words and musical passages, but when it comes to communicating the message (both musical and lyrical) to the listener, this is where all the best audio facilities in the world will not substitute for the creative and ingenuity that will convey feeling. Simply, it isn't a case of "I play. You listen." It is, however, a case of "I play. You appreciate."

To further emphasize this theory, you will quite often find that radio stations who are very critical of sound, will play a record done in the mid-fifties by a top artist. They are con-

cerned with his ability to communicate his message rather than the poor comparison of the sound that is possible today.

Often photographs taken with a small fixed focus camera turn out to be better than those taken by the most expensive cameras.

Today we are looking forward to the day when Canada will have its first 16-track recording studio. The sound will improve once again. These 16-track studios will be capable of producing sound that will be worse than the 3-track sessions that I mentioned at the beginning of this article.

A \$10,000 production often bites the dust while a genius \$1000 production climbs the chart. "Talent", you say! No! Not talent, but the ability to communicate. Or the talent to communicate.

After all, I think the whole subject of our business is to someday define the word talent because it really hasn't got a good definition. The easy way out is to call it sound! Even a hydraulic drill "sounds" goodto another hydraulic drill. THAT'S "SOUND"!!!!!!

Toronto: Once upon a time there was a record bar that did a lot of advertising and sold a lot of records. But the profits from the records were almost the same amount that was spent on advertising. But it lived happily ever after and grew prosperous.

Now twenty years and one million advertising dollars later Sam Sniderman is Canada's most prominent and successful record retailer. Further, he intends to become more than just a name across Canada. Through selling "Sam the Record Man" franchises he hopes to become a tangible reality coast to coast.

In his franchise plan Sam hopes to restore the now lost small record dealer. Those small dealers, who only needed a few of the top albums and could not buy in volume, long ago experienced a loss of service from the powers. It was a much more lucrative and easier task to furnish the larger record retailer and forget the smaller dealer. So why bring the small dealer back? With music becoming used in such a widespread fashion and by such a large cross section of the population, the retail business has become somewhat impersonal. What can your local gas bar attendant tell you about the latest jazz or pop record or tape. Therefore, someone who is interested solely in records is needed to supply the customer with personalized service, and Sam feels that an owner in the store would have much more interest in music than someone selling records as a sideline.

All dealers who receive a franchise will be supplied with an entire selection similar to Sam's main store. The dealer will also be supplied with a service that will accommodate a customer's request within a short period of time, via. delivery truck from a central warehouse. These warehouses will be installed in conjunction with expansion across the country, fulfilling the role of rack jobbers as well as separate requests. All this will be done, of course, with the blessing of all the major record companies.



The group attempted recording it during the rehearsals, recording and filming of a TV documentary they are making about their Apple activities and ran well behind schedule. Although Lennon and McCartney said they were writing non-stop to meet a deadline, the final finishing touches will apparently

take longer than expected. Part of the problem was that most of the album was recorded live in the studio, with many ad-lib comments and other sounds, and runs continuously - similar to "Sgt. Pepper". The recordings are as yet unedited and the plan was originally to release the album as is, but some new changes may be made.

Blues great B.B. King returned to the United States this week after playing to capacity crowds during his tour of England and the Continent.

He opened his tour in London's Royal Albert Hall before a standing room audience of 5,000. Such greats as Eric Clapton, John Lennon, Janis Joplin and Peter Green dotted the audience and joined in the standing ovations as well as rushing backstage

to congratulate the master.

After touring England, B.B. went on to more successful shows in Germany, France, Sweden, Switzerland and Denmark.

The Moody Blues, whose LP "On The Threshold Of A Dream" is having phenomenal success, may never make another single again as they feel it's too limiting.....Peter and Gordon, who had a hit five years ago with a song written by the Beatles (World Without Love), will make a comeback when they record "I Can Remember", a single they produced themselves.....The Rhythm & Blues association of Great Britain held their first awards ceremony recently. Present were such R&B stars as J.J. Jackson, Inez and Charlie Foxx, the Flirtations, Geno Washington, and Sharon Tandy. Nina Simone won the award for the best R&B single of the year - "Ain't Got No/I Got Life", while Aretha Franklin and Wilson Pickett were voted the most outstanding in their respective "popular impact" categories.....Ten Years After, Led Zeppelin, Savoy Brown and Chicken Shack will all star at the first Bath Festival of the Blues in England in late June.

Nikki Hopkins, piano player for the Jeff Beck Group, was in San Francisco last week helping the Jefferson Airplane record their new album. After playing on four tracks of the new album, Nikki and the Airplane decided that they'd very much

like to work together permanently.

R&B producer and co-writer of "Piece Of My Heart", Jerry Ragavoy is now producing Paul Butterfield's new album in New York.....Jim Morrison has grown a beard folks..... Robin Gibb announced plans to release a solo single "Saved By The Bell", but as he is still under contract to the Robert Stigwood Organization he may not be able to break away and record on his own..... The new Bonzo Dog Band album is due shortly and will be called "Tadpoles".....Marilyn McCoo and Florence La Rue, the two beautiful young ladies who make up the female side of The Fifth Dimension, are getting married. Marilyn is marrying Bill Davis who is also a member of the 5th Dimension, while Florence is marrying Mark Gordon, the manager of the group.

STOP RELEASE FOR SHEPPARD

Winnipeg: Well known country singer Mickey Sheppard has found much national acceptance in his initial release on Pete Drake's STOP label. Mickey hasn't come up with a plug side as yet, being as he is now enjoying split play, which seems to be working to his advantage. At any rate he's selling a pile of "Tweet Tweet" and "The Everlasting Now" (Stop 268), both sides written by himself and his beautiful partner Bunny.

Stop Records, one of the most powerful of country labels in the U.S. is headed up by well known guitarist Pete Drake, who has played on many Nashville sessions, and who has

given much support to Canadian performers using the facilities in Nashville. Drake produced this session.

Reaction to the Sheppard deck from country stations across Canada has been exceptional. Those stations with an ear for the more progressive sounds in country/pop would appear to lean toward the powerful and heavy building of the "Tweet Tweet" side while those who enjoy the heavy country ballads are going for the flip.

It's not often that one is given the advantage of receiving an in-depth interview with a pop/country star who seems to know where he's going and the where-with-all to present it. The following will give you a much better insight into this Canadian talent with a lot of sound.

"Mickey Sheppard was born on an unsettled, stormy morning on the great plains of Canada. The 'bo's' call it the 'big lonely'.....not unlike his life. He grew up in this land of half a million square miles of endless green grass, crystal waters and clear jewel skies. Its a land where many see only emptiness and loneliness.....a place where most see, feel and hear nothing but silence. But here he sees only reality and beauty....as it was 'in the beginning'.....where man and machine has not yet marked and scarred the land. This is where he hides from the 'big put-on' that we live in today. There on the 'big lonely' he can hear the voice of silence speaking to him. In his mind he sees a tiny stream as it once was... a mighty river rushing forever onwards to its final destiny. He feels a peace and a contentment that he feels nowhere else on earth...and he has seen much of it. It is here that he writes about things as they really are.....and it is here where he draws strength and ideas to 'say something' in his writing.

"Mickey Sheppard graduated from the University of Manitoba with a BSC Phm degree and jokingly refers to himself as a 'genuine drugstore cowboy philosopher'. He comes to Stop Records of Nashville Tenn. with the experience of 12 record albums on V-Records of Canada, an impressive list of TV and radio appearances, a 2 year DJ stint on CKDM, an involvement in several drugstores, the owner of a small recording studio, the talent to write material that 'says something' and an unbelievable rich gift of being able to identify with ordinary everyday people thru recordings and stage. He is 1/2 of the Internationally known Ethnic recording artists known as Mickey and Bunny. They sing in 12 languages. He good naturedly refers to himself as 1/3 of the show and to Bunny as the other 2/3. These two experienced high powered stage personalities have played as many as 262 one-niter concerts in a single season.....getting there by their fully furnished Greyhound Bus or by scheduled airlines. Their Ethnic albums are being distributed in Canada, England, U.S., Australia and parts of Free Europe. The uniqueness

of their albums is that the first release is selling as well as the latest one.

"To watch him do a stage performance is like allowing yourself to be hypnotized. Whether in song, prepared script or in ad-lib patter, he is constantly saying 'something'. He firmly believes that it should be told in the way that it is....even though it is presented in a rapid fire...slapstick manner which takes the edge off the meaning. His unusually strong stage personality enables him to establish contact and identity with the audience immediately and maintains full control till the closing line. He does 'his thing' best in better nite clubs and on the concert stage. With Bunny adding glamour, the show can be considered as one of experience, class and 'the way it really is'.


"I asked how he wrote 'Tweet Tweet' and 'The Everlasting Now'. Following are his exact words....and I don't mind saying that they sort of shook me up a bit. 'Its hard to explain. This may sound crazy....maybe ridiculous....however this is the way that I write. For several days I sleep maybe....2 or 3 hours a day.... until I feel myself getting fuzzy up here and sort of detached from myself and things around me....I can only write after 1 o'clock in the morning... that's the time that I can feel and hear things that I can't feel any other time....I lay down on a couch... and turn on the tape recorder and by this time I'm in a somekind of fantastic euphoric self-induced trance where I can feel a strength come to me from 'somewhere out there'....I really don't know how to explain the power that I get from....well wherever it comes from....by 5 or 6 in the morning I'm so exhausted mentally and physically that I simply collapse. When I wake up about 18 hours later I play back the 3 or 4 hours of tape and sometimes I have something and sometimes I don't. At the moment I have about 200 songs written but most of them are too far out for today's DJ and record buyer to identify with. "Tweet Tweet" and "The Everlasting Now" currently hits on Stop Records are 2 examples of my simpler work.... maybe someday the others may be recorded....who really knows how it is going to be".

POLYDOR's Ontario promo man RUSS LEDGER busily touting the latest from Montreal's SCEPTRES, "Good Morning New Day". The group is currently playing Toronto's COQ D'OR to excellent crowds. Ledger hosted an opening night party which saw some of the cream of radio in attendance including DAVE CHARLES from Hamilton's CKOC. "Hands Of The Clock" by LIFE also shaping up well. It's expected that over 200 releases will be previewed and several top performers will also be in attendance.







He performed at EXPO and later entertained Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip on Dominion Day of that year and tied up the Centennial year by accompanying Judy LaMarsh on a goodwill tour of Labrador and the Northwest Territories.

Graham will be travelling with all the regular members of the Don Messer Jubilee Show in their special chartered bus which is on a farewell tour from Newfoundland to Whitehorse in the Yukon.



Jimmy James Lends Support To Indian Cause

Noranda, Que: RCA recording artist Jimmy James, well known throughout the Canadian Country music scene, has just released an extremely moving message in disc form with his deck of "They Used To Come Home Laughing" (RCA 75-1001). This self penning is backed with the traditional "Billy Venero".

Through his many years of touring and public appearances James has had occasion to perform for the Indian people on both sides of the border and through their reception and whole-hearted acceptance of his performances have led him to a closer contact and interest in these people. He developed a very strong liking for them because of their natural warmth and appreciation and became sympathetic to their cause. He decided to devote some of his time and effort to the North American Indian.

His new single, which he also produced, expresses his feelings of the Indian situation. He is also organizing a tour of Indian reservations through north-western Ontario and the three prairie provinces, and intends to make this a yearly project, taking



in new places each time.

James is also putting together an album of Indian type songs which he hopes to have on the market shortly.

HUGH SCOTT HITS WITH BABY

Montreal: Hugh Scott, part owner of a money making Northern Quebec hotel and a full time pop/country singer for Rodeo International, sets his sights on the charts with the release of "Baby", his own composition. Says one observer, "Scott doesn't get much airplay but he sure sells one helluva pile of records", and from early sales reports, he could be making the right moves on this release.

Producer of this Stereo Sound (Montreal) session was Dougie Trineer, whose expert guitar work adds much to the production.

There has apparently been much interest shown in this release by French Canadian producers and a session by a leading Quebec artist is expected shortly.

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
