Myles & Lenny signed to Columbia Records

Myles & Lenny, a Toronto-based contemporary rock cum folk duo, have been signed to Columbia Canada. The signing was firmed by Jack Robertson, vice-president Columbia Records of Canada.

The duo, no strangers to the record industry having released previously on the GRT label, will have the added instrumentation backing of Sol Keshen, bass; and Brian Leonard, drums. Lenny Solomon plays acoustic guitar, electric fiddle and mandolin while Miles Cohen performs on acoustic and electric guitar.

The group will shortly enter Eastern Sound Studios in Toronto for an album session produced by Mickymar Productions with a release of all original material the latter part of August.

Columbia celebrated the signing with a press party at the El Mocambo (Toronto) where the group is currently appearing.

MYLES & LENNY - IN CONCERT

Columbia Canada's latest signing, Myles and Lenny, entertained an appreciative audience at Toronto's El Mocambo (July 23). The Ontario branch, under branch manager Eddie Colero, arranged a press, radio and dealer party to welcome the talented young duo into the fold.

It was an excellent exercise in demonstrating an ability to handle music, ranging from a straight-ahead country sound to more sophisticated and complex rock arrangements. Their versatility comes as no surprise.

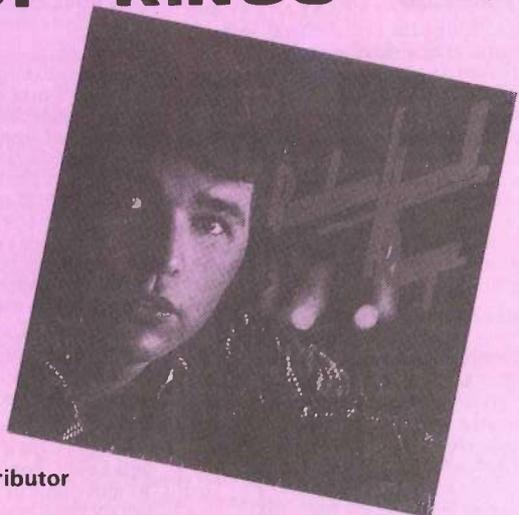

A&M/COLUMBIA/MOTOWN PREPARING C9 PROMOTION

Vancouver's C9 meeting has sparked interest by record companies in putting together presentations to be held in their hospitality suites. Exact details are not yet complete but will be reported on as soon as possible.

Columbia's director of national sales, Bert Dunseith, has arranged for the label's Vancouver meeting to take place September 19 and 20 with a giant concert of Columbia artists the evening of the 20th, the same evening many of C9's delegates will be arriving. The Columbia meeting will be taking place at the Hyatt Regency, within walking distance of the Bayshore Inn, the setting for C9. Eastern retailers, rack jobbers, programmers and other industry people have been invited to the Columbia meet along with top CBS and Epic executives from the U.S., and it's expected these people will remain over for the C9 meeting. Columbia is also expecting a large turnout of programmers, and retailers from the western provinces.

Latest to confirm a hospitality suite is A&M Records, joining Motown and Columbia. There are only twelve hospitality suites available for the C9 weekend, so those wishing to secure a showcase for the two day event should contact Barbara Danuke at the Bayshore, telephone (604) 682-3377 or contact Stan Klees, RPM Special Projects at (416) 425-0257.

LONDON TO DISTRIBUTE UBIC AND LEO LABELS

Two new west coast Canadian labels, UBIC and Leo, will be distributed by London Records. The deal was firmed by Robert Johnston of UBIC International Corporation and Leo Records Inc. and London's Kenneth Verdoni.

Initial release for UBIC is "Candy Baby" by Strongheart and from Leo, "Carrie's Gone" by J.C. Stone.

Both singles were produced at Vancouver's Little Mountain Sounds.

A major promotion campaign is now being readied to take advantage of the strong initial action on the singles — twenty-nine breakout market stations now listing "Carrie's Gone" and seventeen on "Candy Baby".

BELVEDERE HOSTS A "KINGSIZED" JAM

Belvedere's "King Size Jazz Festival" got off to a successful start Friday evening, July 19th, at Toronto's luxurious new Prince Hotel. CKFM's jazz authority, Phil MacKellar, emceed the evening's festivities, which included a four-course dinner for 500 jazz enthusiasts and music provided by Gerry Mulligan and his Sextet along with the Steve Lederer Quartet. Included in the audience during dinner and for the dancing that followed, were several important jazz figures, among them Buddy De Franco and Peter Appleyard.

The festival continued at Varsity Stadium with two days of personal appearances by some of the best known names in the business who, combined, represented the many jazz styles that exist today. The giants of big band jazz were there, notably Count Basie, Woody Herman, Louie Bellson, Maynard Ferguson and their orchestras; and just some of the internationally known artists who also participated were Dizzy Gillespie, Moe Koffman and Carman McRae.

RICHARD BIBBY PROMOTED TO VEEP/GEN. MGR. MCA CANADA

Mike Maitland, president MCA Records, Inc. has scored another first for his Canadian operation. He can now boast the youngest vice-president and general manager of a major record company in Canada. Maitland recently promoted Richard Bibby to the position of vice-president and general manager of MCA Records, Inc. (Canada). Bibby's duties will now encompass all Canadian operations for the label. In making the announcement, Maitland noted: "The Canadian division has made great strides in marketing under Bibby and MCA feels that with centralized management the Canadian operation can develop to its full potential".

Bibby joined MCA in 1965 as a sales rep in Toronto. Five years later (1970) he was appointed Ontario sales manager. He went on to become national sales manager, responsible for the direction of the company's six Canadian branches and two warehouses. He also supervised operations for sales, promotion, marketing, A&R, artist relations, sales programs and policies. He scheduled product releases and served as liaison with licensors. He has been responsible for the opening of four branch offices in Canada as well as the Calgary warehouse. He was appointed vice-president in charge of Marketing for MCA (Canada) September of 1973.

Bibby has become a familiar record executive figure across Canada. Besides working a fourteen to sixteen hour day in his Toronto offices, he has made a point of being "on the scene, nationally". He has caused many changes to come about within the company — a point that Maitland made clear in announcing Bibby's latest appointment.

A&M LEADS WAY IN CANCON RACE

In reply to the question "who has the Cancon?" . . . A&M's A&R manager, Pete Beauchamp can claim "It's alive and well and living at A&M Records". The label currently boasts nine pop, rock and country singles — all gracing the charts. This is the largest number of Canadian content records ever worked by A&M's sales, under national sales manager, Joe Summers, and the label's national promotion manager, Doug Chappell.

New records by Keith Hampshire, Charity Brown, Gino Vanelli, Bolt Upright and Michael Hasek are continuing the A&M success being experienced by Ian Tyson, Nazareth, Linda Brown, Lorence Hud and Bruce Miller.

Fastest breaking single, by a new artist, is "People Gotta Move" by Montreal native Gino Vanelli. Montreal's CKGM aired the Vanelli cut from his album, forcing the single release, now charted and playlisted on many major and breakout stations. Also out of Beauchamp's bag of new tricks comes Bolt Upright and their "sun" month mover, "Love You Back To Georgia". Ontario acceptance was almost immediate but now Chappell has picked up most of the west and the Atlantic provinces.

The old Martha and the Vandellas' hit, "Jimmy Mack" has been revived through Charity Brown, a familiar voice but now revealing one conducive to the nostalgia trip.

Keith Hampshire has moved back into the limelight with a "summer" ballad, "Forever and Ever". Pop programmers were the first to move on this single with several contemporary rock majors now charting and play-listing the single.

COLUMBIA CANADA LAUNCHES CHICAGO SALES CAMPAIGN

The added incentive of an additional 8% discount on album and 10% on tape product plus other goodies will constitute Columbia Canada's Chicago promotion for one week commencing August 5th and running through the 9th. The label's national director of sales, Bert Dunseith and national director of merchandising, Julian Rice, teamed up for this first ever campaign for Chicago who now boast seven active and top selling albums. Their latest release, "Chicago VII" is expected to pass the 100,000 units sold mark within the next few months.

The campaign was sparked by Chicago's "sold out" appearances at Vancouver's Pacific National Exhibition and the excitement being generated by their appearance at this year's Canadian National Exhibition (Toronto).

Other goodies to bring attention to the group's disc and tape product will be an illustrated dealer mailing, radio and television time buys (60 second taggable radio spots), national and trade print support as well as multi-product wall posters.

GERMANDISC & INTN'L SOUND TO DISTRIBUTE AGFA-GEVAERT

The complete line of Agfa-Gevaert tapes and accessories are now available in Canada through two Canadian distributors. Ontario and eastern Canada distribution is handled by Germandisc Import Company, Islington, Ontario with western Canada serviced by International Sound Company, of Vancouver. The above announcement was made by Mr. W.C. Winkie of Photo Importing Agencies Limited, exclusive representatives of Agfa-Gevaert in Canada.

The Agfa line of cassettes, reel-to-reel tapes and accessories are considered bestsellers in Europe in both the consumer and professional markets. Of particular interest to Canadian dealers however, would be Agfa's Super Cassette series. Described as a "high quality low noise tape", they are available in Super C-60, C-90 and C-120. Both the 60s and 90s offer an additional six minutes of playing time at no extra cost to the purchaser.

STEPPENWOLF RETURN TO RECORD BUSINESS

Steppenwolf have returned to the record industry where they will release product on the MUMS (Albert Hammond) label, distributed in Canada by Columbia. An album release is expected to boost their first major tour which will include twenty Canadian dates. The tour is being coordinated by Concept 376 of Toronto who will be working with operators across Canada. Firmed dates for the Ontario market include Massey Hall/Toronto (Sept. 16), Waterloo University/Kitchener (17) and McMaster University/Hamilton (19).

Three original members of Steppenwolf are included in the lineup. They are leader John Kay, Jerry Edmundson and Goldie McJohn. Americans George Biondo and Bobby Cochran complete the group picture.

With up to 1000 U.S. readers, the following column will allow our American friends to become more aware of Canada and Canadian things.

As well as major and independent record labels, RPM goes to all the major radio stations in the U.S., developing an increase in interest by music directors and on-air personalities.

Canada is the world's second largest country - 3,851,809 square miles, compared to Russia's 8,649,821 square miles. It's also interesting to note that China proper has an area of 2,279,134 square miles, with outlying territories bringing it up to 3,760,339 square miles. Brazil covers an area of 3,287,204 square miles, while the continental United States covers 3,022,387 square miles (Alaska tallies up 586,400 square miles, Hawaii, 6,424 square miles with other territories totalling 12,920 square miles.

Canada's most westerly point is Mount St. Elias in the Yukon, while Cape Spear, Newfoundland, is the most easterly point. The most southerly point is Middle Island, Ontario (in Lake Erie) which at 42 degrees North is the same latitude as Madrid, Spain. Canada's most northerly point of land is Cape Columbia on Ellesmere Island, Northwest Territories (83 degrees North) giving us a north-south distance of 2,850 miles and our breadth, 5,780 miles.

MUSHROOM DEBUTS OWN POOP SHEET

Vancouver's Mushroom Records, a division of Can Base Industries Limited, has issued its first edition of "Mushroom Tidbits", a compendium of record activity by the label's artists. The six page book was conceived by Mushroom's Shelly Siegel and is designed to provide information to radio and press people from coast to coast. According to Siegel, "Tidbits" is especially aimed at secondary markets where information is often hard to come by.

The publication will be issued on a quarterly basis. Initial run was one thousand copies.

LITTLE MOUNTAIN SOUND CONTINUES TO EXPAND

Vancouver's newest studio complex, Little Mountain Sound Company, is well into an expansion program which will see a new sixteen track control room with up-to-date equipment feed from two new studios within a couple of months. Little Mountain is currently running a single sixteen track board from two studios. Little Mountain's Geoff Turner expects to go thirty two track in the near future.

Little Mountain, opened last October and owned by Western Broadcasting and Griffiths-Gibson, Vancouver ad agency producers, has played host to a number of producers already. Product recorded at the studio is currently on the market under the Leo and Uvic Records labels. The studio's own Little Mountain Records, with a roster of four artists, is expected to begin marketing product via a national distributor shortly. Staff engineers are Turner, a veteran with wide recording experience in New York and England, and Dan Slagter from Toronto.

I would appreciate hearing the answer to this question, just to satisfy my curiosity. Thank you.

This letter brings up an interesting point that should be explained to the industry.

Many years ago, when RPM had the MAPL logo designed to assist the industry, we were not aware that the misuse of the MAPL would lead to a great deal of trouble for RPM.

In that the CRTC regulations regarding Cancon on AM radio are part of the Broadcast Act, an infraction of the regulations could lead to a fine of \$50,000 per offense if a radio station didn't fulfill their Canadian content quota. Obviously the radio station that might be misled by a MAPL logo that qualified a Cancon record when the parts denoted were not actually Canadian could have recourse to the record company and RPM. Record companies are very careful to only signify Cancon when they are sure there is no error or misrepresentation.

Very recently there has been some controversy about the Canadian citizenship of certain expatriated Canadian artists and composers. Some record companies have decided to look into the documentation of evidence that there is no misrepresentation in these areas. RPM has taken the position that the responsibility lies with the record company to assert on their record labels those parts of the record that qualify as Cancon. Only then will we pass on the record company's information in RPM in a story or on one of our charts.

Record men we spoke to also felt that the MAPL logo on the label of a record might

effect the potential of the record. The feeling seemed to be that Cancon had become a dirty word among programmers and a record stood a better chance if it were judged on quality and not nationality.

In the case of Lightfoot, Larry Green of WEA Music of Canada felt that the MAPL logo on Lightfoot product was unnecessary in that Lightfoot's singles and LPs were Canadian content and programmers understood that.

A number of record men who asked for documented information on the citizenship of certain artists had not received any information and were aware of the repercussions of misrepresenting Canadian content.

That's your answer, and it might be an indication that soon the MAPL logo may be unnecessary as Cancon becomes stronger and more accepted. At one point it was felt that a MAPL logo promoted airplay. Today the opposite seems to be true.

CAN BASE PROSPERS WITH LABEL WORK

Can-Base Studios, Vancouver, has been experiencing boom business recently with both in-house and outside label work. Terry Jacks' Goldfish Records has accounted for much of the boom with sessions by Jacks himself and Chilliwack. House producer, Mike Flicker, has kept the place humming with sessions for Teen Angel, Songbird and Alexis. In addition, Can-Base has been involved in unspecified commercial work and a large number of demo sessions.

Former Can-Base general manager, Steve Douglas, has left the studio. Administration is now being handled by Shelly Siegel, while Mike Flicker looks after the studio.

QUALITY PUSH ON FOLDY PRODUCT

Quality's network of promotion people are laying on a heavy nationwide campaign to bring attention to Kanata's Peter Foldy and to tie-in with his major Canadian tour with United Artists' Abraham's Children. The latter are currently showing breakout action with their current single, "Rockin' In The City" throughout the Atlantic Provinces and in some areas of Western Canada where they have become popular through past tours.

In Toronto, the Quality crew of Joe Owens and Gary Slaughter harnessed the assistance of the Muntz Store in Scarborough's Town Centre. An autograph session was set up which drew a sizeable crowd, after which Foldy visited a group of girl guides at their display in the Centre.

Foldy's "Bondi Junction" included on his first album, is still a popular item with pop programmers. However, his most recent release, "When I Am So In Love", released several months ago, is now beginning to pick up both pop and contemporary rock station play.

Foldy's tour was arranged by Doug Speer of the Agency for the Creative Arts in conjunction with the Halifax-based Agency Radius 3000. He began his tour with Abraham's Children, July 1st, with performances each evening through to their capper August 2nd in Campbellton, New Brunswick.

Speer is now negotiating a Foldy tour for the west, hopefully for the month of September.

BLUES FOR VILLE EMARD AT RECENT BLUES FEST.

July 17/74

This letter of explanation is directed to all our media friends in Toronto, who were unable to see our group play on July 13 at the seven o'clock show time, because of a royal ripping we received at TWO DAYS OF BLUES FESTIVAL.

One month ago, Shel Safran (one of the festival organizers), called our Montreal offices to see if he could book us, at a forthcoming Blues Festival (the largest of its kind according to him) in Toronto. Needless to say it appeared to us as the ideal exposure we needed for entrance into the Toronto market and so we began negotiations. Realizing the costs of travelling with 25 persons,

we agreed to do the show for publicity purposes. Upon completion of all the financial arrangements, they assured us that we would be included in all their media promotions, radio and TV slots, etc. . . . In short, we were not included on any of the radio, nor were we included on any of the posters or other publicity.

Three weeks before the Festival, we checked

100,000 EXPECTED AT WINNIPEG FOLK FEST.

Although the promotion has been next to nil, organizers of Winnipeg's Centennial Folk Festival are confident they'll draw more than 100,000 for the three day event (August 9-10-11). The Festival is free, a first for Canada and perhaps for the world.

The Festival is the brain child of Mitch Podolak. The plans were initiated last year with Podolak being given encouragement by the City of Winnipeg, the Province of Manitoba and the CBC. The latter will be recording the full fifty-six hours of the Festival activity and anticipate more than eight hours of network programming.

Acts already firmed for the 'Peg Festival include: John Allan Cameron, Fraser and Debolt, Rick Neufeld, David Rae, Murray McLauchlan, Stringband, Sylvia Tyson, Humphrey and The Dumptrucks, Shirley Eikhard, Michael Cooney, Peter Gzowski, Bob King, Ray Materick and many more. The music message will be traditional folk, blues, mountain music, spirituals, bluegrass, ethnic, contemporary folk, ragtime and more. There will also be workshops to bring the many messages home.

with Jim Garrett (one of the organizers, in charge of the technical set-up), on the specifications of the sound system, which we heard was to be an inadequate one for us, (we take more inputs than sixteen). When he told us their system is not yet definite, we suggested that they could use our YAMAHA System for free thanks to our sponsor. They accepted and we were glad to do the favor in the hope that our future with these people could grow.

One must realize that the border of Ontario/Quebec is hard to penetrate on both sides and that the last time a bilingual group from Quebec ventured to Toronto, was when Charlebois performed with the Festival express. We had sincerely hoped we could follow suit to his success. So sincere were we, that our organization and those of concert Canada's conceived and executed the entire promotion campaign in Montreal for the Festival. In addition we handled all the ticket outlets and arranged for the lighting as well. All this was done with only two things in mind: promotion and good will.

Since we were omitted from the publicity, the only thing left was exposure which we knew we could achieve if all was to go right.

So the next thing we found out was that "goodwill" was to clash with exposure thus leaving us out of that seven o'clock engagement. So our entourage of twenty-five waited impatiently from noon until midnight behind stage. When we finally got to play, which turned out to be at 12:30, we had heard that there were about 7,000 persons left, half of them sleeping, the other half "stoned to the gills". The majority of the people, according to Norm, the ferry attendant left with the ferry before shut down time. So here we were 12:30 Saturday night — no press people — no 40,000 people — no food or beverage left, and we started to cook, nevertheless. We played for 45 minutes and we were just starting to awake the people when the power was cut and the M.C. told the people that the show was finished.

The show might have been finished for the people but the aggravation was not for us. As we marched off stage we were informed that our entire entourage had 15 minutes to wipe the sweat off their faces, pack the equipment and run like "mothers" to catch the last ferry boat to the mainland or else wait until six in the morning.

So to all our media friends I'm sorry for us blowing the engagement we had and I'm sure it will never ever happen again.

Advertising makes hits

No matter what your product or service, you won't hit with it unless those who want or need it are aware that it exists. I guess that is about as simple a definition of advertising as I can come up with.

We have talked about promotion and PR, publicity and press. Now it's time to look at

the second oldest profession in the world . . . advertising.

Right now I have to admit that I have a vested interest in advertising with MusicAd&Art which I own. Therefore I must believe in advertising since the firm derives all its revenue one way or another from advertising.

Coming up with concepts each week for record companies or the allied arts of the music industry, I find myself comparing concepts and making judgments on ads that sell and ads that just confuse me. I am astonished at how often ads are placed in various music industry publications (because MusicAd&Art does layouts for many publications) and I feel that they are rushed and put together to meet a deadline rather than to promote or sell a product.

Seldom does the advertiser ask, or want to sit down and discuss the concept and the layout of the ad. Seldom is a program planned that will end up in a successful campaign to "get the record off the ground" or "give that extra mileage".

I can understand the rush to get an ad published if a record is breaking fast, but more often, the client is more interested in getting the ad out of the road and getting on to other things . . . more important. What can be more important than that block of space that will tell the story of what, when, where and how. That space whether it be large or small is the opportunity for the record company to say "Look here!" and relate to the industry that a new record is coming, breaking, selling, being played or

might just interest a record store because a customer asked about it yesterday.

Often I look back at some of the ads that we have done for record companies, and some of them have been well thought through and put together with imagination and flair. I have seen ads from top ad agencies that don't communicate as well as ads done by the promo person. I would like to see more ads that have a concept and an angle that sells and promotes.

LEARN WHAT AN AD IS

The reason that advertising is a lost art in Canada may be because few of the people that are in charge of advertising have taken the time to learn what an ad is, what it can do, who reads it and what they should derive from the contents.

I would like to say now, that there are some people with record companies that have such a flair for advertising and promotion that they wouldn't have any problem getting a job with an ad agency tomorrow.

The whole problem seems to revolve around the attitude within the company.

It is a syndrome of the record business to do things at the last minute.

A WINDOW INTO ACTIVITIES

This should not be the approach to advertising. The content of an advertisement should be a very creative thing that represents a window into the current activities of the record company involved.

If you aren't sure what you should have in your ad, ask for assistance from the publication. They are in the business of selling ads and will only be too glad to sit down and discuss the approach you might take. This kind of brainstorming comes up with some interesting ads. You, the client will have the final say, but why not sit down with someone and get expert advice on how your money should be spent.

TELL YOUR STORY IN AN AD

Bring everything you can lay your hands on to the meeting. Every picture and every relevant graphic and the product itself. Just looking at the material might spark that idea that will lead to an interesting concept.

TWO NEW ACTS TO SGM RECORDS

Stan Cayer of the Vancouver-based SGM Records has announced the signing of two new acts to the label. Bobby J. Bertrand, a native of Sydney, Nova Scotia, is currently working on a club act with Cayer. Bertrand, a veteran of local television and Toronto's Riverboat, plays guitar and harmonica and merges his own compositions with material by well established folk-pop artists. He is expected to record his first album for SGM this fall.

Cameron Molloy and Black Elk is a four man group from Cranbrook, B.C., in the country rock idiom. The group is widely booked and is currently winding up a tour of Port Alberni, Abbotsford, Surrey and Duncan before going on to Burns Lake, Prince Rupert and the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. The group is expected to begin recording their own compositions shortly.

Advertising makes hits . . . and there are many ways to advertise your current contender. I have talked in this column about print advertising, but there are many other ways to advertise . . . promote and publicize.

I still think one of the best ways is to . . . tell your story in an ad.

FIGURE OUT HOW AND WHY

I bought both the typewriter and the desk it is sitting on as the result of an advertisement. Next time you look at someone else's ad, think of how often advertising has influenced you. Then figure out how and why. You will soon discover that it pays to advertise.

Note: MusicAd&Art doesn't advertise in RPM anymore. We found that our ads brought such a great response that we couldn't service our clients in the manner which they should be served. If business ever drops off, I'll start running ads again.

of the business will spend a great deal of time just looking at the art throughout the book. The technique is not as artist as it is

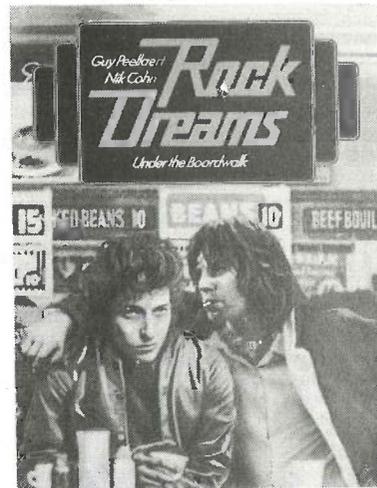
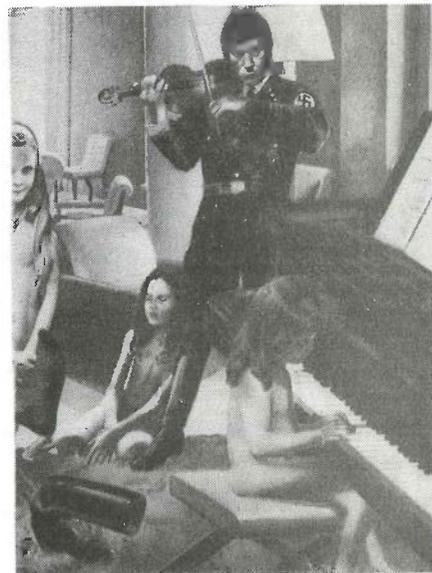


illustration and all the art is remarkably commercial. The subject is the important thing and even more important is the treatment. — S.K.

Zeppelin readies sixth album

LONDON, Eng. The four members of Led Zeppelin are now noses to the grindstone in the English countryside recording their eagerly-anticipated sixth album.

Veils of secrecy surround the sessions, which are taking place with the aid of a mobile recording studio rented to the group by

ex-Faces' member, Ronnie Lane. It is the same studio recently utilized by the Who for their *Quadrophenia* album; and Led Zeppelin also brought it in to record their *Houses of the Holy* fifth LP.

Britain's power shortages are contributing to the hush-hush nature of the sessions — even the country's top musical export, it seems, must contend with the three-day working week, alternate generators and all the paranoia that accumulates in front of mobile studio recording machines when the power supply is not static. As a result, visitors are being firmly discouraged by Zepp's management.

This sixth album has no name nor release date number, the group's only comment being a cryptic "It'll come out when it's right". When you have reached the dizzying levels of a Led Zeppelin (each of their five albums has sold in excess of not one, not two, but three million copies around the globe), you can afford to be choosy. There is no urgency to keep their name before the public, and this allows the band to be true to their music. Everything has to be meticulously right before it gets group approval. To lesser acts, forced by industry pressure into spurring out a succession of albums — far too many of which are hastily-prepared and lack long-term substance, and are thus ultimately detested by their creators — Zeppelin's position in this regard must seem like rock 'n' roll Utopia.

Jimmy Page, I think, is to be wholeheartedly

applauded for continuing to uphold artistic integrity in the recording studio; and for not allowing the usual pressures to inflict upon his production projects. Being a perfectionist, doubtless he has to survive many a trauma in the birth of every album — but it must be admitted that his condition has not been improved by an astounding amount of previous outside mistakes, honest and otherwise, which have accompanied the release of earlier albums.

For its part, Atlantic has long since learned to live with the artistic demands of Jimmy Page and the others (but let's face it, when a band is this big, a record company will go along with virtually anything to keep the group contented). The freedoms allowed to a Led Zeppelin are virtually infinite, and again it is to their collective credit that the members have continued to explore new realms rather than sitting back on their country estates. Once you've reached the top, it's very easy to lose all ambition to keep on nudging away at the confines of the music industry. Zepp have in fact gone the other way, witnessed by their forcing the removal of record company logos from the front of album jackets (a traditional source of dispute between artists and their labels) and eventually, even managing to do away with titles altogether (on the outstanding fourth album).

Nor does the band desire to see singles released from their albums. They've managed to prevent it happening in Britain and Europe, and it's likely that their new contract with Atlantic will curtail singles activity in America. They don't like what the singles scene represents, they don't need the exposure, and they openly despise the attitudes of Top 40-Radio One programmers.

Zepp has just re-signed with Atlantic worldwide, and they're going to be having their own label, on which they eventually plan to release other artists, principally acts produced by Page himself. Their first signing

SUZANNE FAIRLEY TO STUDIO 3 PROMOTION

INTERNATIONAL HONOURS FOR ECM'S COREA/CLARKE

The annual jazz poll from Britain's *Melody Maker* resulted in top honours to ECM/Polydor artists, Chick Corea and Stanley Clarke. Corea topped the poll as No. 1 pianist while Clarke took the No. 1 position for bass player.

Clarke was also awarded *Downbeat's* International Critics Award as No. 1 electric bass player.

Polydor took on the distribution of the ECM label earlier this year and their national press officer, Richard Glanville-Brown, reports an increase in consumer buying over the past few months.

is expected to be Bad Company, a noteworthy group formed from the ex-members of Free.

No-one is quite sure yet if the new Zeppelin album will be on their own label. Actually the entire album is on the most evasive schedule — privately however, Atlantic people were hoping for a June or July release. By then, *Houses of the Holy* will be 15 months old.

Houses of the Holy, of course, received a bit of a lashing from music critics — but the group is no stranger to lack of critical acceptance. I sometimes wonder how long it will take rock critics en masse to realize that Led Zeppelin are very serious about their music, in their own unique manner. And that it's extremely good music.

Last summer, Robert Plant answered the *Houses'* critics with a few well-chosen shots of his own: "So there's some buggers 'as don't like the album. Well God bless 'em, I like it and there's a few thousand other buggers like it too. I know I'm bragging like buggery but we're playing better than we've ever played before."

There has not been a lot of up front rap about the new album from Zepp members or insiders. The only comments have come from Jimmy Page, who said at the end of the last American tour: "The last album was difficult to get into because it was so complex. We used intricate rhythm patterns and hit a lot of ideas in the lyrics. The next one will still have complex songs and it'll have an acoustic guitar piece based on a solo I used to do with the Yardbirds during a song called *White Summer*. But most of the album will get back to something people thing we've been drifting away from — straightforward rock 'n' roll."

According to a management spokesman (in this case, friend and road manager Richard Cole), they have "absolutely no plans to work abroad this year." Nor are any British dates contemplated, although this may change once the album is released.

The material for the sixth album was written before Christmas, some of it while on the road in the States last year, the rest when the lads sat down together in November. There are no song titles yet and there isn't likely to be any until just before the artwork deadline. "And that could be this year . . . or next," adds Richard Cole, ominously.

Zepp enthusiasts, however, will not be forgotten. Director Joe Massot (under the band's employ) is now supervising the editing of a film shot during the East Coast section of the 1973 tour. The film (which Cole says "might" go out on general release but is "probably not for TV") will likely include segments of Zepp's spectacularly successful windup concerts at Madison Square Garden in New York (a triple-header, with more than 60,000 tickets sold out weeks ahead) and road operations. Massot is now working on the *Stairway to Heaven* section of their act, which was a killer on the '73 tour.

This summer will see the publication of a Led Zeppelin biography in paperback, which will surely clear up some of the media confusion about where this band is really at. It should also contribute to a wider appreciation of the Zepp mystique.

When you consider the position Led Zeppelin now occupy — the most popular group anywhere since the Beatles — very little is really known about what they're into. But one thing is indeed obvious — Jimmy Page, Robert Plant, John Bonham and John Paul Jones really do appreciate their privacy and their position. Who's to blame them?

What's wrong with Canadian country????

PART THREE

by WALT GREALIS

We've been asking a lot of questions and pointing up what we believe could be a problem with Canadian country music. It would all appear to boil down to "a lack of promotion - by the record companies and the artists and groups themselves.

A big bugaboo with many record company people and artists is what they call "a lack of cooperation (play) from country programmers", and that alone bears a little ink. The biggest cry babies are those who do the least to promote their image. Most of their productions are done on a shoe-string budget, leaving little for promotion. What they're looking for is a handout. To many, the playing of their record on the radio is all that's necessary for them to have a hit.....and that's the extent of their promotion. Country programmers, unlike their contemporary rock cousins, have been more than generous with the programming of Canadian country product - much of it due the CRTC content ruling. They do receive a lot of play but they don't realize very much in the sales picture. Perhaps it's because of a lack of product in the stores and then again, it could be a question of quality. Many country singles are released only as a vehicle to promote the group's bar circuit (operators are impressed if a group has a record to their credit). Sound's cruel? Perhaps it's about time we faced the facts. If you're convinced you have talent, you should continue this belief in-

to the studios, with the final mixing, packaging.....and promotion.

There are some exceptions, of course, and it's encouraging to see a little professionalism beginning to creep into the business.

Most radio stations are open for promotions and programmers are constantly complaining about the lack of cooperation THEY receive from country artists and record companies. In many cases it's the programmer who has to "find" the talent for whatever station promotion he wants to put together.

Charlie Russell, country hustler at CJCJ/Woodstock, New Brunswick, recently put together a promotion for the station's fifteenth Anniversary and tied it in with the town's Old Home Week. The Mercey Brothers, one of this country's most promotion-oriented groups, included Woodstock on their Maritime itinerary - to take advantage of the station promotion. Needless to say, CJCJ leaned on the Mercey's product and, although it's a small market, good sales were realized at the retail level. Multiply this type of promotion by about five hundred times, a conservative figure, and you're into building a national image.

CHYM-FM in Kitchener, Ontario, used the country theme for their silver anniversary celebrations and, again, the Mercey Brothers were on hand along with the Hummingbirds and Mike Graham.....a nice break for the artists and a strong nation-

on bass.

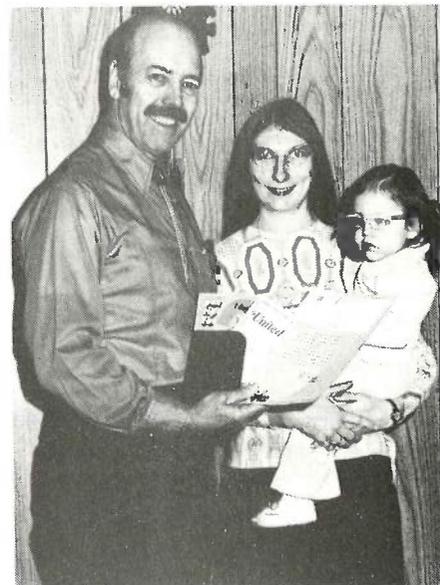
Club patrons needed little coaxing in crowding the tiny dance floor for the up-tempo numbers. However, they were unusually quiet and attentive when the pace slowed and the mood became more reflective. Myles and Lenny wrap up a two-week engagement at the El Mocambo this Saturday (27).

According to Mike Watson, Ontario promo for Columbia, the duo will be taping a session at Eastern Sound (Toronto) to be used as a sample of their sound at Columbia's Convention in Los Angeles next month. John Williams, A&R chief at Columbia will be presenting his new Canadian signings at both the U.S. Convention and the Canadian meet in Vancouver in September. An album by Lenny and Myles is expected in the fall of this year, to be preceded by a single. KE

alistic boost for the station.

Canadian country radio stations have always been looking for a means of promoting their image, their sound and locally and nationally-known country names. Unfortunately, Canada doesn't have a country "Mecca" like Nashville. Therefore, many of their promotions are geared to take advantage of the internationally famous "Music City U.S.A."

CJJC/Langley, B.C., boasting a decade of country programming, gave away a free trip for two to Nashville (to their "top country music listener"). The winner of the Grand Ole Opry contest was Mrs. Jack Whitney of Burnaby, B.C. As it turned out, Mrs. Whitney revealed a hidden talent of being able to report, in writing, her experiences and thoughts on her first trip to

Nashville. She was impressed with how the desk clerk at the Albert Pick Motel fussed over her and the fact that "he was very enthused about his town". She wrote about her experiences down Printer's Alley - her meeting with Canadian Ronnie Prophet....."He was one of the few people we met who spoke English the proper way....." - her visit to Ernest Tubbs Record Bar and many many happenings that would long be remembered by the young Burnaby housewife.

What was most important, of course, was her comparing the Nashville radio sound to that of CJJC....."Nashville has lousy radio stations. It was good to hear CJJC once again.....". As for the station itself, she wrote: "We have lived at the coast for four years and have always listened to CJJC. We keep the radio on all night beside the bed and it used to keep me awake half the night because I was afraid the next record would be better than the last and I would miss something". That's your typical Canadian country radio listener and it reveals what the country listener is looking for.....something uniquely Canadian and entertaining.

But why mention the CJJC contest? How relative is it to "What's Wrong With Canadian Country Music?" What it does point up is that two Canadians journeyed to the

surprise when the talent that each of these musicians has brought to the act is considered. The fact notwithstanding, we are playing the tune". Bruce Matheson, operations manager at CKAP/Kapusking, Ontario found the "production and lyrics outstanding", along with an "excellent" rating from James T. Laing, general manager of Soo Line Broadcasting (CFSL/Weyburn CJSJ/Estevan). The single is also receiving heavy play on several stations in the Atlantic Provinces including the CBC regional stations in the Maritimes.

The PEI session was produced in Seattle at the Kaye-Smith Studios. The vocalist, Gary Kirk, and the band are locals. The records were manufactured by Imperial in Vancouver, with west coast distribution being handled by Emerson Sales. The Cole's are looking for distributors for the rest of Canada. Interested parties should direct their enquiries to Harvey Cole, 18618 S.E. 128th., Benton, Washington, 98055.

HOUKA REORGANIZES UNDER BILL PHILIPS

Vancouver-based Houka Records has undergone a reorganization in the past few months which has resulted in former president, Ross St. John, leaving the company to devote attention to his own Ross Wolf Productions and Bill Philips taking over the helm. Houka will now specialize in leasing product from independent producers.

Among the first independents to go with Houka is Mark Strange, Canadian television personality, through his Orphan's Island Productions. Strange and his wife will record for the company. First product to issue will be Strange's "Candy Dreams", produced by Brian McLeod. The single is expected to be released shortly.

Houka, under contract to A&M Records in the United States and independently distributed in Canada, has adopted a careful policy in regard to product release. According to Philips, Houka will proceed cautiously with carefully screened singles releases and only follow up with album product after careful examination of the market.

It all makes sense

In the CHUM Report dated July 19th, 1974, the following very important comment was made. It should be of great interest to radio stations that compile charts:

The Programmers LISTENING IN walt grealis

Radio Station charts . . . we're often asked how charts are made up . . . by ourselves, others. So now a look at the compilation of charts . . . not detailed guidelines . . . just the criteria employed:

First, if you hear that the relative position in popularity of each record is determined solely by record sales and telephone requests . . .

Forget it . . . at least as far as most charts are concerned. While sales and requests are used to determine the make-up of a chart, a third important consideration is relative programming value. Hence, stations that issue charts consider the following:

Material . . . is the melody unique and easy to remember.

CFGO'S WAYNE STEVENS — CELEBRITY INTERVIEWS

For the past five years Wayne Stevens, CFGO/Chatham has been handling all the celebrity interviews for the station, and this spring has introduced a new format called "My Guest In Conversation" whereby the interviews are edited into short cuts which are run intermittently throughout the length of his 2 to 6PM shows.

Some of these interviews are done by phone, and among those who have appeared are Gordon Lightfoot, Richard Carpenter, Tony Bennett, Soupy Sales, and most recently, Rich Little. Stevens avoids the run-of-the-mill questions, and goes after the more off-beat aspects of his guests. Response to the new format has been tremendous.

CKGM PRESENTS A MOTOWN WEEKEND

CKGM's Greg Stewart and Motown's national promotion manager, Ken McFarland, have arranged for a Motown Weekend to be presented by the giant Montreal rocker. The three days of August 9 through the 11th will see the programming of one hundred and twelve Motown albums and past hits.

Thirty key record stores in the Montreal area have been dressed up with in-store displays, window streamers etc. for the big weekend which will hopefully bring more attention to current Motown releases. Top selling single and album in Montreal is the coupling of Diana Ross and Marvin Gaye on "My Mistake".

Arrangement . . . is it strong and catchy.
Production . . . does the song have complete definition and impact.
Lyric . . . is it interesting, easy to understand.
Artist . . . is he well known or obscure to your audience.
Demographic appeal . . . does the record appeal to all age groups, or just one.
And, finally . . . is the song compatible with your format and mix of music in any given week (e.g. tempo, type, etc.)

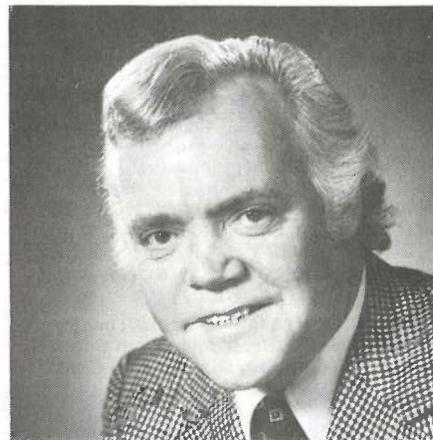
As most radio men will tell you, the programming value of a record is more a factor in determining how long a record stays on the chart than the "number" assigned it in any given week.

The chart position of each record is based on all sorts of information, including:

- Distributor reports (how many records shipped previous week, in total);
- Rack jobbers;
- One stops;
- Record stores (number of sales, number of reporting stores);

CKEY'S GENE KIRBY RETURNS TO AIR

After twelve years in behind-the-desk activities for CKEY, Programming V.P. Gene Kirby is resigning his executive position to return to the microphone as the afternoon drive personality. Kirby spent his first ten

years on the air in the Maritimes, Ontario, Quebec and New York City before joining CKEY. After a year on the air and in production work, he became program manager. His creative efforts during this time have ranged from songwriting and the production of two all-Canadian LP's and a transcription music service, to an award-winning announcement he wrote and produced that was honoured by the Hollywood Ad Club in 1963.

Kirby will start his 4 to 7PM shift on CKEY by Labour Day. The afternoon program came open at the end of July, with the resignation of John Wilson, who had been with the station since 1965.

On the accuracy of charts, the methodology employed by some stations is more scientific than others. But suggest a dose of skepticism on accuracy and validity. IMPOSSIBLE. Radio station charts are not really figured to be accurate . . . too slim is the number of people and funds expended in the research of music, and too difficult is it to get information free of "hype"

The point is, whether a record is number 17 or number 13 doesn't matter much, for the direction is set . . . toward sales. Based on our experience, however, we find one remarkable fact: Radio men generally agree that charts are not so much a reflection of sales as a promotional tool for the station. In other words, few, if any, make the claim about accuracy . . . there is scant evidence to show that charts are represented as being accurate. They're a promotional tool, no doubt about it.

That pretty well sums it up. The most important thing is that the record industry understand that, "THEY'RE A PROMOTIONAL TOOL, NO DOUBT ABOUT IT."

CHYM'S GORD HUME HONOURED BY CPRS.

Mr. Gord Hume, Promotion and Advertising Manager of CHYM/Kitchener, was recently honoured by the Canadian Public Relations Society. He was the recipient of one of the 1974 "Awards of Excellence" in the nationwide competition. CPRS made the announcement in Montreal during their convention.

The award was for a community public relations campaign created and conducted by Hume last year, and he is believed to be the first winner ever from the Kitchener region.

Hume last year became the first private broadcaster in Canada to attain professional accreditation by the CPRS, which is the highest professional standing currently obtainable.

core of the country music sound, where impressed with a Canadian artist and..... they preferred the sound of CJJC to what they heard in "Music City U.S.A.". There's a message there and it would appear to be a growing trend where Canadians are becoming more "tuned in" with that which is Canadian. Perhaps now is the time to take advantage of this situation. Canadian artists and record companies can assist country programmers in keeping their radio stations unique and entertaining. Again, let's stress that they should concentrate on releasing good quality records and backing their releases with strong promotions. They should also make themselves available to radio stations for concerts, birthday celebrations etc. When was the last time a well-known Ontario country artist appeared on the west coast? It's all relative and this series can be regarded as "a lot about nothing", but at least we're writing about the Canadian country music scene. The showcasing is up to you.

Hopefully this year's BIG COUNTRY (to be held in November) will see the beginning of a professional approach to the country recording scene.

Some of you are talking about a Canadian Country Organization. Keep talking..... you could develop a rapport with each other that would be uniquely Canadian..... and not at the expense of the successful Country Music Association.

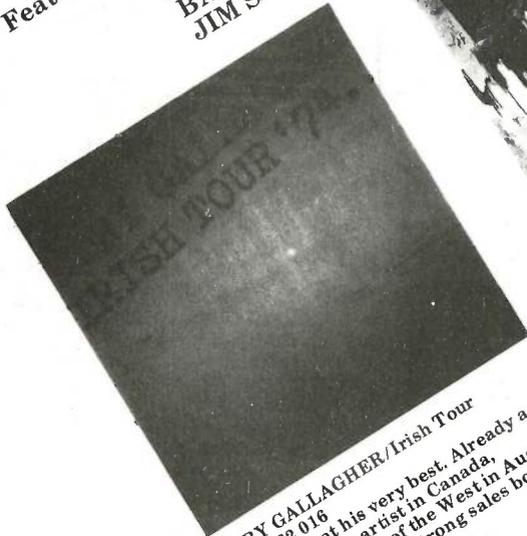

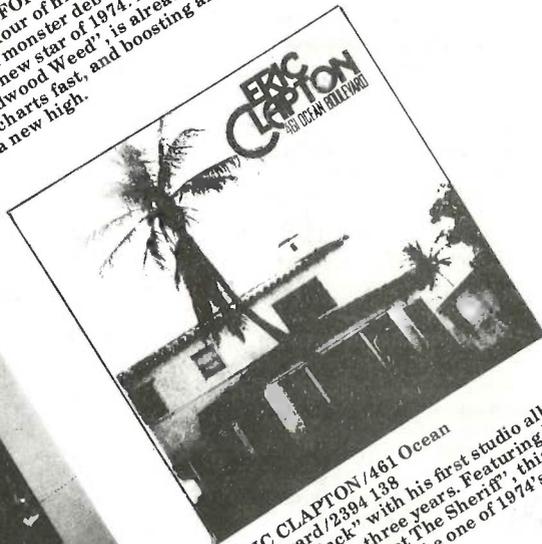
