

Dr. Music back to discbiz

Several industry reps were recently invited to see Dr. Music, the commercial jazz band, back together for the first time in two years. Led by keyboard genius Doug Riley, all the members are well-known Toronto sessionmen: saxmen Steve Kennedy and Keith Jollimore; Barrie Tallman, trombone; Doug Mallory, guitar and vocals, Tom Szczesniak bass; and Bob McLaren, drums.

In two two-hour sets, the band blows through accessible jazz, including pieces by Moe Koffman and others, to more progressive material, where Riley and Kennedy show off their composing talents.

The premiere of the new band was at the Basin Street tavern, where even at mid-week, many were kept waiting at the door for lack of seats. Only the music stands onstage indicated that this was the band's third night of public performance in two years. Most of the current members were

not in the original band. No definite plans have been made yet for further dates, although independent promoter Tomas Fiore reports that the Basin Street management has expressed an interest in seeing the band return because of good crowd reaction. Members of the band have previous commitments for the summer.

Shortly, though, they should be in the Toronto Sound studios, for themselves this time, to tape a session for a possible single. Although they haven't been signed to a label yet, they have a production company to do the actual recording. Assuming their label shopping goes well, we might see a single released in August.

When last together, Dr. Music had three LPs released on GRT, and a single called Sun Goes By. At that time, there were 16 in the band.

Cal's Refinery showcasing Canadian Int'l acts

There's one location in U.S. occupied Calgary where the Canadian flag is proudly displayed and where you can actually see a Canadian act in action. The place is known as The Refinery and its popularity can only

be judged by the capacity houses it experiences six nights a week.

The big push behind the Refinery is Lou Blair, a one time manager of groups, and Don Boas, a former promotion rep for WEA on the west coast. The latter is currently managing Fosterchild, recently signed to Columbia.

Some of the acts being booked into The Refinery include: Shooter, Brutus, Liverpool, Sweet Blindness, Crack Of Dawn, Ronnie Hawkins. The club is also known for its industry receptions and cocktail parties for most international acts that hit town.

Music Shoppe reopens Bigland's PR company

Music Shoppe's Ron Scribner has hired Vince Alexander to reactivate Bigland Public Relations, a firm associated with Music Shoppe, a booking agency which booked more than \$4.5 million worth of performances last year.

Alexander, plans initially to promote the acts booked exclusively by Music Shoppe, and the booking firm itself. He will also publish a quarterly news-flyer; Music Shoppetalk, to publicize activities of Music Shoppe acts.

Alexander doesn't intend to get directly into record promotion except for a TeeVee Records package of hits by Music Shoppe Acts (to be released this fall), though he told RPM he is planning to work very closely with labels.

Alexander has already begun his duties, working toward the big push when the schools open (and book dance acts) in the fall.

Elton John and Kiki Dee enjoy one part Cancon

It doesn't count but MCA were so proud of the fact that Elton John and Kiki Dee cut a session in Toronto, they designed their own Cancon flag which is displayed on the label of the Rocket (MCA) single, Don't Go Breaking My Heart. Unfortunately some programmers took the Cancon flag as meaning the single qualified as a Cancon single. MCA's Scott Richards told RPM that they didn't mean to cause confusion but that they wanted to show that the record was Canadian in some way.

The MCA-adopted Cancon flag is also displayed on the label of the new Trooper single. However, this single qualifies as being 100% Canadian in content.

Ochterlony's Carol Cantata produced by RCA's Feeney

The acoustically-sound Timothy Eaton Memorial Church (Toronto) was the setting for a custom production by RCA's Jack Feeney for an album to be used to raise funds for the church. The work recorded was Dr. David Ochterlony's Carol Cantata, with Ochterlony at the church organ. Both senior and junior choirs were used for the session.

Feeney had first expected to record the session on 4 track but because of the exceptional acoustics of the church he was able to achieve a balance within a short space of time and only had to use a 2 track system.

Dr. Ochterlony is well known to Toronto radio listeners as host of CFRB's Starlight Serenade (Friday evenings). He is also the Principle of the Royal Conservatory of Music.

Attic publishing acquires Robbie Robertson's songs

Al Mair of Attic Publishing Group has announced the signing of a contract which will authorize them to represent Medicine Hat Music in Canada. Medicine Hat Music

handles the composing catalogue of Robbie Robertson, Canadian-born leader of Capitol artists The Band.

Medicine Hat was formed by Robertson several months ago, and covers material from the Band's last LP, Northern Lights and Southern Cross, and future compositions. Material composed before that LP is not covered by Medicine Hat.

Writing time cuts into Fullerton Dam dates

Rumours have been spreading that Condor's Fullerton Dam had split. Not true, says group leader Grant Fullerton. The group apparently lost their drummer to Fludd and decided to use the spare time in finding a replacement, to write new material for their next session.

Fullerton has auditioned several drummers but is finding it difficult to come up with one that would complement the sound of the group.

The Dam experienced good chart action with their single, My Lady, which had a fair run up the RPM 100.

Tokuma launches Bourbon

The major factor in the Japanese being able to retain their musical culture has been the language barrier. Many internationally-known groups have found Japan to be an excellent market for the sale of records and for concerts in the major cities but the local talent has never really been accepted, using English as their method of communication.

Change could be developing toward this end however, with the introduction of the Bourbon label by the highly respected Tokuma Musical Industries. In making the announcement, Tokuma's Chief Director of the International Division, Daniel Nenishkis, told RPM: "The Bourbon label has a team of directors and producers who have set their hearts with the firm belief that a limited, selected number of talent could be brought to that ultimate competitive level on an international basis". He went on to explain that with their many hours of searching they came up with a roster of

seven recording acts. One of these acts, the West Road Blues Band has experienced unusual acceptance in Japan and have been released to the rest of the world on a 2-record set on Island's Antilles label. This marks the first time in the history of the music industry in Japan that such a breakthrough has occurred and Nenishkis is hopeful of "continuing similar type deals with other record companies for major artists on our Bourbon label."

Nenishkis is currently working on a possible tour of Canada and the U.S. for West Road. The album was showcased in the June 19/76 issue of RPM and drew the following comment: "A fine collection of classic blues and boogie tunes, treated as good as any blues band you'd care to name. You've heard the songs before, but there's something unique about this band, especially since they're Japanese. With proper exposure, they could be very big over here."

U.A.'s Matthews to U.K. to boost Ruhnke & Franklyn

Allan Matthews, national promotion manager for United Artists, is currently in the U.K. to talk up the British releases for Vic Franklyn and Craig Ruhnke. The latter is currently represented on the RPM 100 with his single, Summer Love, showing early indications of becoming a summer hit.

Just prior to leaving for his business/holiday trip, Matthews mapped out a hefty promotion for the Marilyn Jones' single, Small Town Talk, which is now showing indications of crossing over to the Contemporary (Top 40) market. With several breakout and block-programmed stations now playlisting the single, Matthews is confident he can influence major market play. CJCH of Halifax was one of the indicators of crossover action. If Matthews is successful in breaking the Jones single in the Contemporary market, it will mark the first time a Canadian Talent Library/United Artist single has been able to break this barrier.

Set for Maritime Tour, Irish Rovers add fiddle

Toronto publicist Gino Empry announced recently that the Irish Rovers have added a fiddler to their lineup. Bob O'Donovan joins Will Millar, Jimmy Ferguson, Joe Millar, Wilcil McDowell, and George Millar, beginning July 28 when they start their Maritime tour. Their appearance July 27 at Montreal's Place Des Arts will mark the last time the group will appear with five members.

O'Donovan was first seen by many of the group's fans as a guest on their TV series.

The Maritime tour begins in Charlottetown July 28 and 29, then moves to Saint John N.B. (30), Moncton (31), Glace Bay N.S. (August 2) Shelburne N.S. (3), Halifax (4), Truro (5), Bathurst (6), Chatham N.B. (7), New Glasgow (8), Amherst (9), Cornerbrook (11), Grand Falls (12), Harbour Grace Nfld. (13), St. John's (14), and Fredrickton (16).

Rovers' records are distributed by Polydor on the Potato label.

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Olympic Song finalists set to dampen Olympic flame

Nine Quebec songs and one song from Ontario have been selected to compete to be the "official closing song" for the Montreal Olympics. The winning song will be official to the extent that it must be played after the Olympic flame is extinguished at

the closing ceremonies in Montreal August 1, while the TV credits are being broadcast to the estimated more than 1 billion Olympic viewers around the world.

All music played between the opening ceremonies and the official closing must, by international Olympic committee sanction, come from music composed by late Montreal composer Andre Matheju.

Music publishers in Canada expressed some reservation about entering songs in the closing-song contest, as rules demanded a studio-produced tape and required that half of the publishing rights of each of the ten finalists would belong to COJO, the Montreal Olympic committee.

Each finalist is awarded \$1,000 and the winner, \$20,000.

Song contest officials claim, according to an associated Canadian press story published in papers and broadcast across Can-

ada, that the contest attracted 20,000 entries, 50-50 from inside and outside of Quebec.

Twenty thousand songs: composed, arranged and taped in studios in two months! By our figuring, 20,000 songs, at three hours of studio time for each, would book all of Canada's studios for at least three months.

At \$50 an hour, Canadian recording studios would have billed \$3 million to Canadian publishers who taped demo tapes for the contest.

Contest rules also stated that three to five musicians had to be used on each recording - that's a lot of session gigs.

COJO was prepared to reimburse the publishers for 50 per cent (up to \$100) of their recording costs; that's almost \$2,000,000 returned to the publishers; very few could have taped the demo for less than \$200.

No one ever expected 20,000 entries. Contest coordinator Stephane Venn (who won the Expo 67 song contest) told RPM

in a phone interview in May (see RPM May 22) that the contest budget was \$125,000, all expected to be recovered through COJO's share of the publishing rights.

The 10 songs chosen as finalists are now being professionally recorded and went on sale July 18. The judges final decision was made July 20.

The nine finalists from Quebec are: Prends Mon Coeur, by Herve Brosseau; Je T'Aime, by Jean Robitaille and Christian St. Roch; Souviens Toi de Montreal, by Marc Bradley and Francois Domperrie; Mon Pays C'est le Monde, by Luc Piamondon and Francois Cousineau; Les Oiseaux d'Athenes, by Jean Pierre Guay and Marc Lepage; L'Or, l'Argent et le Bronze, by Pierre Bourgault and Phillippe Vyvial; Revenez a Montreal, by Robert Gauthier and Francois Domperrie; A Bientot, by Pierre Letourneau and Germain Gauthier; and Friends, by Charles Linton.

The one out of province finalist is for Humanity, by Fred Napoli and Bobby Edwards of Toronto.

The Waterways "luxurious cruiser" can be utilized for anything from a bridge game to a business meeting and can be catered to with audio visual aids and bar service.

Barry Samuels of the Vancouver company Passiton Publicity which has handled press for Sweeney Todd, reports that guitarist Jim McCulloch and singer Nick Gilder, recently departed from that group, are recording in L.A. with Chrysalis Records and 'super' producer George Martin.

Samuels says that it is hoped that a Nick Gilder solo LP will be released before the end of the year, with some new Gilder/McCulloch compositions (Roxy Roller is such a collaboration) and a few songs from other songwriters.

Referring to the acquiring of George Martin's production services, Samuels said that "this is a first for any Cancon act - which Nick Gilder will of course remain."

activities, through the company's CAPAC outlet, Songsmith Music. Allan Duffy will be responsible for artist and music direction and studio productions.

The company's first signing is James Ackroyd, Canadian songwriter, returning to Canada after a stay in California.

With David Bleakney, McConnell used to manage Downchild, Whiskey Howl, Horn, and La Troupe Grotesque, after moving to Toronto from Ottawa where he worked as a booking agent.

Capitol has open door to U.S.

Capitol Canada's A&R department has been given a boost within the structure of the Capitol-EMI corporate complex.

Canadian A&R Paul White will be working directly with Rupert Perry, corporate A&R VP in Hollywood. The significance of the change, White told RPM, is that any Canadian acts which White and Capitol Canada sign here in the future are also on the roster of Capitol U.S., with a commitment from the parent firm for release and

support in the U.S. market.

No other Canadian subsidiary of a major label has the same relationship with its U.S. office.

A number of Canadian acts are signed directly to Capitol U.S. at present (Anne Murray, Ray Griff, Colleen Peterson, The Band). Other acts signed to Capitol Canada, such as Sylvia Tyson, are well known in the U.S. and some, most notably Suzanne Stevens, are on the threshold of U.S. success.

White explained to RPM that the status of acts currently signed to Capitol Canada which may be not now suitable for U.S. marketing will be determined in each case when their current contracts expire.

White has been with Capitol since 1957 and worked his way up from the warehouse, through national promotion manager and national advertising manager, to his current post as A&R chief. He reports that Capitol is on the verge of signing its first Canadian group under the new relationship; an announcement will be made shortly.

Mike Docker, formerly with Capitol's press relations office in Malton, has been moved to the Prince Arthur Street A&R office to bolster the staff there and to assist White in his added responsibilities. White will also select product from other EMI companies for release in Canada.

WEA push for Pringle and Edwards

WEA's Larry Green has announced the release of two new singles by Canadians who have established successful careers in the States.

Peter Pringle's LP was featured in RPM a few months ago, and now the cut Gonna Get A Lady has been pulled for a single. Originally from Halifax and now in the

U.S. Pringle's song is MAL, with production by Brian Ahern in the U.S. The flip Please Don't Sell Nova Scotia, was written originally for Anne Murray and appeared on one of her earlier LPs.

Conversely Jonathan Edwards came originally from the States but now resides in Nova Scotia. Known for a hit in '72 called Sunshine (Go Away Today), Edwards' new release on Reprise is Favorite Song, from an LP entitled Rockin' Chair. Programmers please note that the single was shipped without a MAPL designation; Larry Green reports that the single is four points Cancon. Production is also by Brian Ahern.

Both singles are being released on the Reprise label in the U.S.

WAM single release for Ville Emard's Miller

Carlyle Miller, described as having had "a multi-diversified musical background and career" including the Canadian production of Hair, takes the solo recording plunge with a WAM single, Get Back. A native of Canada's west coast, Miller lived much of his life in Atlanta Georgia and in 1966 was a member of the Dynamic Daqueris, one of the first white bands to use two drummers, which won a regional Battle of the Bands contest in New York State.

Miller came back to Canada to perform in Hair and then went on to play sax for the Ville Emard Blues Band and also with the backup band for Robert Charlebois.

Concentrating on writing, Miller penned both sides of his new single as well as co-writing another Wam group's single, There'll Come A Time, There'll Come A Day, by Basic Black and Pearl. Miller has also been involved in the production of commercials.

The Montreal-based WAM label, headed up by Gary Cape, is distributed in Canada by Polydor.

Smile Music launches songwriters' tip sheet

The Smile Music Group has initiated a songwriter's tip sheet, called Song Pusher.

Originally intended for distribution among the group's own writers, Smile is inviting other songwriters to write in to receive the tip sheet.

Song Pusher covers what major U.S. and Canadian artists are looking for and when they are likely to be recording.

Smile intends the tip sheet to be a service and an incentive to Canadian songwriters, showing them there is a very big market for popular material. Those interested should write to: Smile Music, in Toronto.

RECORD RETAILERS

Summer for retailers is business as usual

Figures released last month by the Record Industry Association of America indicated that, while overall dollar sales are up, unit sales of singles as well as albums were down in that country. Record companies in Canada have generally expressed concern that single sales have slumped considerably, even in what is generally accepted by record manufacturers as a slow season.

A quick survey of Toronto's downtown 'strip' record stores however, reveals that this concern is not shared at the retail level.

Richard Carrol of Music World (downtown) expressed his surprise at the number of releases so far this summer, of big-name acts, pointing out that record companies usually wait until later in the year for best-seller bets. He claimed that they were selling as well as they might any other time of year.


The trend Carrol noted was that sales are more evenly spread over the top-thirty selling titles, and that a really outstanding seller was not apparent in a given week.

Bob Muir of A&A agreed, saying that total sales were up in singles from the same period last year. He and A&A singles' buyer Charles Luedey also found there were no major sellers so far this year, claiming that March was the only slow period this year.

Barry Tisdall, who handles singles for Roblan's, suppliers for Sam The Record Man franchise stores, told RPM that this

BTO rolls with Great Beaver Patrol

Mercury's top grossing rock act, Bach-Turner Overdrive, have launched their Great Beaver Patrol which was billed as "the biggest and best ever national tour in history". Fate dealt them a cruel blow however, with drummer Robbie Bachman dislocating his shoulder in a go-kart accident, causing the cancellation of dates in the Maritimes (Sydney, Halifax and Moncton). The young Bachman did open the tour in Saskatoon however, against doctors orders and played a grueling set of almost two hours. It's the same BTO with a few audio and lighting changes and a longer set. Their lighting system cost them a small fortune. With more than 120 lamps and two miles of electric cable the group's new arc adds an eye-boggling dimension to the stage and to BTO's signature gear wheel. The latter contains more than 1700 bulbs and also costs a small fortune. Ned Powers of the Saskatoon Star-Phoenix checked into the opening show of BTO's tour which was the biggest grossing house for a single concert in the history of the city's Pioneer Days. Powers noticed the change from the usual BTO powerhouse instrumental pounces. He wrote: "For a while, the audience wasn't sure what was happening. There weren't any of those three-minute radio crash courses from BTO but an extension into deeper and more instrumentals, with Randy Bachman, in particular, exercising some jazz techniques. There were even some sorties into ballads". Change however, followed the expected, as Powers continued with: "when the thunder struck, the people knew. Suddenly, everyone in the stands and about 1,200 on the grass were on their feet, frantically clapping and responding happily.

The din wouldn't die for another 30 minutes".

How come the change? After a successful touring and recording life of almost four years and being the largest grossing Canadian group and one of the biggest money making groups in the world, is their now a trend away from what made the cash registers jingle and sold out concerts?

Although it began a few records back, probably with Undone and progressing with Blue Collar, the ballady trend was more noticeable with their most recent single release, Looking Out For No. 1.

Randy Bachman told RPM: "It was Looking Out For No. 1 that geared us for a few notches of respectability with an adult crowd. I'm speaking of those in their 20s and 30s and I'm sure we've lost a few notches of popularity in the teenybopper area". Asked if he thought this type of music would hurt the group's future, he didn't feel it would because their basic mainstream is Top 40 rock and roll.

When it comes to the critical stage of concerts, BTO has worked this new sound in well with a medley of Blue Collar and Looking Out For No. 1. Says Bachman: "There's a time in our concert that we found very tough. It used to be, in the beginning, that when we came out on stage we had the audience on their feet for the entire length of time we were on stage. They'd be screaming, dancing, singing our songs and clapping. This was when we were doing about a 45 minute set. Now, our concert is very close to two hours for the Canadian tour and it's really tough to see people on their feet for that length of time. They

get tired and we get tired. We've almost tripled the amount of music we used to play, because we have a greater volume of catalogue to draw from. So, we've got a piece in the middle of our show that gives everyone a rest. It's a real concert piece and after we do some really fine numbers, where we can do some really fine playing, we put in the medley of Blue Collar and Looking Out For No. 1."

BTO experimented with this type of thunder-and-calm-and-thunder show in Alaska and Las Vegas and found there was good response from the audience, which gave them the go ahead for the Canadian tour. "It reminds me of when I saw the Bee Gees", noted Bachman, "the people sit there in a kind of reverence while they're hearing these great songs".

They return to the studios in September after their tour for a studio album and will be booking Toronto's Phase One. "We like Phase One, explained Randy, "because it's out of town where there aren't any distractions. A lot of people like to go downtown for the distractions - so when they have time off, there's something for everybody to do. We just like to get it done and go home. We record and mix right there on the spot". Bachman is so impressed with the sound of Phase One that he produced the new Trooper album there. "It's the first time I ever mixed in Canada and kept the mix."

BTO are purposely staying out of the U.S. "to give it a rest", says Bachman. "We've played every major market in the States at least three times. We were doing what's called 'wearing out your welcome'. People were getting sick of BTO. It's not that our show has deteriorated or our quality of music, it was just that we were becoming too familiar. In November we're going to Japan and Australia and possibly into South Africa and Europe."

Laying the groundwork for success on concert tours has been a grinding effort over the past couple of years. "I think our tours will get smaller says Bachman, "We're playing bigger places and making more money. In the early days when we were playing two or three thousand seaters we had to go on a two or three month tour so we could break even. Now, in one week we can make \$250,000 to \$300,000".

Randy Bachman doesn't want to be a rock and roll star for ever but he intends to be in the business for a long time. "I've been in it for seventeen years and I still feel like a beginner. There's so many things for me to do."

One project both he and Fred Turner will be involved in are solo albums. There's nothing definite at time or writing but it definitely is one of top priority for Bachman. "It gets to the point where you really want to be heard alone."

The 32 year old elder Bachman, founder and spokesman for the group, has much admiration for the other members of BTO, particularly Fred Turner who is unfortunately very shy and sidesteps confrontations with the press. "Freddy is a great solo artist and he really attracts an audience", boasted Bachman. Obviously, the 32 year old Turner has been a stabilizing factor in the life of BTO.

MURRAY McLAUCHLAN

Boulevard
True North TN 25-H



Following on the heels of *On The Boulevard*, his first single in a year, Murray McLauchlan has released the LP, entitled simply *Boulevard*.

One of the biggest features is the work of the Silver Tractors, McLauchlan's first real working band. On this LP, their work is so tight, it's often hard to believe that the band wasn't born until well into the first sessions. Many of the band members - Jorn Anderson on drums, Dennis Pendrith on bass, Ben Mink on mandolin and fiddle, and Gene Martynec on guitar - have performed together before, and that experience probably helps create overall smoothness.

The band enables McLauchlan to achieve a rare degree of musical versatility within his established style. The opening cut, for example, *Gettin' Harder To Get Along*, turns from simple piano and vocals to electric rock in a pleasant change. The *Train Song* follows with the kind of 'urban country' rhythms often associated with McLauchlan.

McLauchlan's lyrics, full of thoughtful images, are as good as they've ever been, and in combination with McLauchlan's best musicians yet, they make these and other cuts like *Slingback Shoes*, *As Lonely As You*, and *La Guerre C'est Fini Pour Moi* stand out.

The LP was recorded and mixed at Eastern Sound in Toronto engineered by Ken Friesen, and produced by McLauchlan and Bernie Finkelstein, his manager. Ronny Abramson provides some background vocals on *Crying To Me* and *Slingback Shoes*.





OSCAR PETERSON

A Rare Mood






J CHALMERS DOANE

Reissuing of BB material hasn't been as well-organized as that other group, but this collection should do as well as any other.

CBC head wants bigger program budget

CBC president A.W. Johnson, in the network's annual report to Parliament, pointed to the crucial challenge facing Canadian TV programming from the growth of cable TV systems and the imminent debut of pay TV in Canada.

Success, he said depends "a large extent on program budgets which are more in line with those of CBC's U.S. competitors."

Eighty-two per cent of CBC's \$394,992,000 operating costs were budgeted to programming, 65 cents of every CBC dollar spent on the radio and TV programmes themselves.

During the fiscal year ending March 31, 1976, the broadcasting corporation spent \$244,523,000 on their television service which involves 463 stations across Canada, 17 owned by the corporation.

Radio broadcast expenses were \$69,953,000 for a national service which involves 493 stations, 471 of them AM stations.

CBC TV aired 3,558 hours of CBC produced shows on the English language network and 2,889 hours on the French language network. Average network programming costs were \$17,926 per hour in English and \$19,747 in French. CBC produced local programming costs averaged \$4,316 per hour for 10,280 hours of English language broadcast and \$7,058 per hour for 1,576 hours of French language programming.

The total CBC budget for the year was up 16.5 per cent, 6.2 per cent in constant dollars (after inflation).

During the fiscal year, the CBC paid a total of \$37,164,000 in fees to musicians, writers and performers (almost \$29 million in Quebec and Ontario) up from \$30,366,000 during the previous year. In addition CBC paid \$1,452,000 in royalty payments to author's, composers and musicians associations.

CBC looking for acts for Wolfman Jack show

The producers of CBC's co-produced Wolfman Jack show, Pop Goes The Wolfman, are looking for Canadian performers to appear throughout the Vancouver-produced series, which will begin production in late summer.

The show has already been sold for syndication across the U.S., in a number of European countries, and most recently in Australia.

Len Starmer is coordinating the talent search, he's inviting any interested managers or groups to contact him at his CBC office at 100 Carlton St., Toronto. He is looking for tapes and plans to hold auditions.

Jimmy Dale is the show's musical director. Robbie King is putting together a band, mostly of Vancouver musicians, to play regularly on the show. CBC variety has also signed People Players, a group which presents original puppet acts to pop music. CBC is creating a Wolfman Jack puppet for the show. People Players, a group which includes some mentally retarded young people, were well received on CBC's Catch A Rising Star.

CTV plans pay TV firm, Canadian film

CTV shareholders have agreed to form a separate corporation to seek a CRTC licence to operate a national pay TV system in Canada.

CTV president Murray Chervoer said that the separate corporate structure would allow participation, through purchase of shares, of other Canadian private broadcasters in order that "the private sector of the TV industry will be able to compete on a more equal footing with the publicly financed CBC as well as be able to slow more effectively the erosion of audiences the private sector has experienced as a result of the inroads caused by cable's delivery of imported TV signals."

A major part of CTV's licence application will be the formation of a multi-million

dollar programming fund to finance Canadian TV and film production.

CTV executive VP Don Coyle told RPM that details of the fund or the structure of the pay TV system have not yet been worked out. The fund, which would be financed from the profits of the pay TV system, would have to be independent of the TV system and CTV to the extent that they couldn't be able to determine the allocation of the fund's programme financing, he said.

CTV officials met with representatives of other Canadian private broadcasters on July 18, and, Coyle reports, they're all interested, but will reserve all commitments

until the CRTC brings down its final pay TV guidelines.

All recommendations regarding the CRTC guidelines must be submitted to the Commission before September 1, and CTV representatives are studying equipment, delivery systems and programming in the U.S. in order to finalize their proposal for the CTV initiated system here.

"It amazes us how rapidly things are moving," said Coyle, who estimates that if the CRTC finalizes its position by the end of the year, the company could have pay TV in a few test areas of Canada by the end of 1977. Then, he calculates, expansion could be quite rapid.

1.7 million tuned in on CBC's Rising Star

CBC's Catch A Rising Star, a musical variety show which replaced the Tommy Hunter Show for the first five weeks of the summer, "was a winner," CBC Variety chief Jack McAndrew reports.

The final show of the series (June 11) was the most widely-viewed Canadian-produced show that week, with 1.7 million viewers and 13 per cent of the viewing audience in the Friday 9-10 pm slot. The final show had the largest audience of the series, during which Tommy Hunter presented dozens of young Canadian performers, many never seen on TV before.

"It's encouraging," says McAndrew, "that there's enough good young talent to attract so much of the population in such a short time." McAndrew points out that many of the people who tuned into the first shows of the season were used to seeing The Tommy Hunter Show in that spot, but don't seem to have been disappointed with the replacement show.




The Vu-Thru story

This man made tapes stand up to disc sales

A few years ago, Frank McManaman, then a tape salesman, came up with a better idea to package and display 8-track and cassette tapes.

Today he has a successful company, Vu-Thru, to prove there is still room for a better idea.

Vu-Thru has sold almost 8 million "spaghetti boxes" - a cardboard longbox with a base and a cap (the most popular) or a

single unit box with a window viewer which displays the tape or cassette within it on racks the same as records. In open counter retailing it helps, by its added bulk, to discourage tape theft, and as a removable wrapper, can be used for stock control.

McManaman told RPM that he originally wanted to create a reusable package to help narrow the gap between tape and LP prices: "Consumers were often throwing away 35 cents worth of packaging and merchandising aids before they got to the product they wanted."

Some of Vu-Thru's accounts re-use the boxes, "but most rackjobbers aren't geared to that kind of operation," he told RPM.

Vu-Thru's display aids depend on open merchandising of tapes, as opposed to the lock and key system where tapes are locked in cases to beat shoplifting.

"You lose about 35 to 45 per cent of sales when you lock the tapes up," says McManaman, "there's hundreds of thousands of dollars spent on developing anti-pilfering devices, but they don't sell merchandise."

He maintains that as long as retail counters don't employ enough staff to serve each customer under the lock and key system, there will be a market for aids which better display tapes and deter pilfering.

MaManaman, who runs Vu-Thru alone with his wife, got into the music business with Continental Records, a now-defunct budget label. He moved into Allied Records as special projects, and later, Ontario sales manager.

He later moved to Handleman's rack-jobbing firm: "That taught me how much work is involved in merchandising - rack-jobbers do one hell of a lot of work."

The salesmen at Handleman, he remembers, were aware that new tape merchandising devices were needed, but were generally too busy to develop them. McManaman figured that a specialty line of products was needed.

While working on his design, McMana-

man took the position as national sales manager at Stereo Tape Products, at a time when tapes, as he puts it, "were much more of a separate market place than they are today."

"Now they're mass-merchandising tapes," he notes, "where before it was almost a specialty line."



The first device McManaman developed was a clear acetate version of the long box (hence the name Vu-Thru) which was picked up by The Bay and several smaller accounts. The medium proved too unpredictable, and Vu-Thru turned to cardboard.

Now, Vu-Thru's long boxes can be found in most retail chains, (Eatons, and The Bay). Vu-Thru's main customers are Canada's big rackjobbing firms.

"I had no idea when I started this project that it would grow to this size," MaManaman remarked. "The tape industry has grown to the point where this can be a business of its own - the position of the long box in the industry is just now being established."

Vu-Thru has sold 5 million of the cardboard bases, many with headers (see side bar) and about 1.5 million each of the 8-track and cassette long boxes. He sees a bright future ahead.

"I'm starting to get the feel of the market; now I can begin to cut costs by pre-stocking and manufacturing in larger quantities."



The Vu-Thru re-usable long-box (1) loads by inserting the tape through the top. The tape is then displayed at the same visual level as a 12" LP jacket. The musical category cap and base (2) Vu Thru's most popular device, is loaded by inserting the tape into the base and capping it with a cover which lists the musical category which describes the music. The latter box can be used without the cap and poly-wrapped, or the whole unit can be poly-wrapped. Both have beveled bottoms so the tape may lean back slightly.

month has been "busier than ever". He has found that there were some titles, not yet charted by CHUM and CFTR, that he is having difficulty keeping in stock. The only point he raised that differed with that of the others was his feeling that the really big sellers were the exception rather than the rule. Their biggest ten sellers were doing very well, he said.

Sheldon Fry at Yorkdale's Music World suggested that the more than usual amount of bad weather this summer may have kept many would-be vacationers at home and buying records, thus staving off any potential slump. It was his belief that record companies released fewer singles during the summer months.

There was agreement among those surveyed that there seems to be no immediate end to the disco trend, and that it is prospering as well as it has ever been.

A&A's Bob Muir believes there are twice as many disco singles being released

as the pop variety, while Richard Carrol claimed that his downtown Music World consistently saw twice the sales. All agreed that the downtown market was the main concentration of the disco market, although Sheldon Fry in Yorkdale noted a definite but different disco clientele.

At least one observer has suggested that the disco buying trend is more seasonal than others, and that a winter slump, misinterpreted by some as a general trend, was the result of a disco dance place attendance fall-off. He predicted the summer weather would induce disco activity to last summer's level.

From the retailers' point of view, there seems to be no summer sales slump in singles. There may be a trend, in that sales are spread evenly over a larger number of top sellers, perhaps as a result of increasing diversity of buying tastes.

Music World's Fry was the only retailer surveyed who acknowledged that the summer season was generally slower than any other.

Music World Scotland repped in Canada

Scottish record, publishing and management firm Music World Scotland, based in Glasgow, has recently concluded deals for publishing, releases and appearances here in Canada.

Phonodisc Canada has an option on the entire MWS catalogue and plan to release two LPs by Gaberlunzie, a Scottish duo, and Airborne, a group which recently broke big through top British talent show Opportunity Knocks.

As well, MWS managing director Ian Browne, while he was in Canada, made a publishing deal with Tanned Fur Music to handle the Canadian rights to MWS subsidiary publishing company Scharcha Music, which includes original compositions by Airborne and Gaberlunzie.

Gaberlunzie are coming to Canada to play Toronto (through Hogan's Entertainment) and Edmonton (through Guidhall Production).

A breakfast was hosted by RPM's Walt Grealis in the Premier Suite of the hotel to elect the directors necessary for the Academy to become a chartered non-profit organization and, at the same time, the first executive was elected.

In attendance were Harold Moon, retired general manager of BMI Canada; Hank Smith, country artist; Gary Buck, president Broadland Music; Larry Kunkel, program director CFAC Calgary; Dave Johnson, music director CFGM Toronto; Lanny Salazar, president Condor Records; Charlie Russell, CJCJ Woodstock, New Brunswick; Stan Klees, Big Country Awards and

Sammy-Jo and Rob Mearns of RPM.

The meeting was chaired by Grealis, pro tem chairman of the Academy. Also in attendance was Kenneth M. Smookler of the law firm Smookler and Smookler.

The executive of the new Academy are: Hank Smith, president; Charlie Russell, vice-president; Gary Buck, secretary-treasurer; and directors, Larry Kunkel, Lanny Salazar, Sammy-Jo and Stan Klees.

The mandate of the new Academy will be "To promote the preservation, appreciation and development of those forms of entertainment known as country and country-oriented music."

The group unanimously voted to establish a new Academy which will take over the CACMA membership and will be called the Academy of Country Music Entertainment (ACME).

NOW OPEN FOR MEMBERSHIP

The Academy of Country Music Entertainment (ACME) has launched their initial membership drive to recruit new members and to bring into the new fold, members of the founding organization.

Academy president, Hank Smith, announced early in July that the Academy is ready to accept memberships and that they are open to anyone actively engaged in country music as a profession.

Smith stated: "The formation of the Academy of Country Music Entertainment was brought about to unify people associated with the country music industry in Canada to give this field of entertainment a strong backbone and allow the membership to promote Canadian country music and its participants."

The Awards will be part of RPM's annual Big Country meeting and at the same time, the Academy is expected to hold its first national membership meeting.

Country changing direction

A Canadian stirs up Nashville A&R

The local boy who has made most good in Nashville recently is Canadian Frank Jones, head of Capitol Records' Music City A&R.

Jones knows Canada well. He worked radio here at CFRA Ottawa and CFCF Montreal, and hosted a Saturday afternoon country show on Toronto's CKFH, long before the station went all country.

Jones found his way into the record business at Columbia Canada A&R and was promoted to the parent firm's Nashville office 15 years ago. Now with Capitol, he's gearing up for an anticipated healthy future for varied styles of country music.

"We're looking and seeing very strong trends," Jones told RPM from his Nashville office, "We're working with a third generation of country fans right now, and in the youth area new forms of country music could be like the Beatles. They're all looking for a new sound and listening to more country. We have to be prepared when some of these areas start popping."

With Capitol, Jones has signed some of the new progressive country acts: Asleep At The Wheel, Stoney Edwards, James Talley, Side Of The Road Gang, and, recently, Toronto's Colleen Peterson, who has settled into country music after a decade of fronting folk, rock, and rhythm and blues bands here and in the U.S.

Talley, when he was in Toronto, explained that the re-emergence of many of the old country styles (Talley sings and writes country swing, Jimmy Rogers, and Woody Guthrie-style songs with a modern reflection in both lyrics and sound) in the U.S. and to a lesser degree in Canada, come from a genuine new re-evaluation of lifestyle and morality which is motivating many young music fans there.

"This doesn't mean we're giving up on the traditional country artists," Jones explains: "In country you have very loyal older buyers; there'll always be a market."

Last year, Capitol placed 46 singles and 22 LPs on the U.S. country trade charts with such hitmakers as Merle Haggard, Freddie Hart, La Costa, Glen Campbell,



"Country music will be around for a long time," Jones reflects, "but it's like one cereal company putting out four different cereals, we've got to keep a variety of acts."

Jones realizes there is much in common between the music of some of the standard country hitmakers and that of the new breed.

When Capitol's Asleep At The Wheel launched their record career in 1974 with a U.A. label LP, Comin' Straight At You, a deck with a strong selection of Bob Wills country swing and originals on a similar style, Merle Haggard's latest LP was a tribute to Wills, the king of western swing. Both LPs relied heavily on veteran studio man and former Wills band star, Johnny Gimble.

"The musicians in Nashville are flexible enough to play all forms of music," Jones commented. The new breed of country artists, whether they call themselves outlaws, progressives or cosmic cowboys, and whether or not they call Texas, California, or even New York City their homes, do the bulk of their recording in Nashville.

The traditional country stations in the U.S. are slowly picking up the new material, Jones reports: "Let's say it's not a landslide".

"They're programming it," he says, "but they're not waving any flags about being progressive. They're playing the product and it's blending in."

Jones keeps an eye on Canadian country music; he has a good reason with the success he's found with Anne Murray and Ray Griff in Nashville. He signed Colleen Peterson after she was turned away by a number of labels up here (including Capitol Canada). In Nashville, she taped a debut solo LP which, though very country, has cuts that bring out strong folk and rock 'n' roll sounds which have been her bread and butter through the lean years.

The mixing of country styles with other trends of popular music is no bastardization; it's been the mark of the life of country as it's been blended with blues, jazz, swing, Latin, French Canadian and Cajun, and rhythm and blues at various times in its history.

And country music has paid them back. Jones may not be far off when he says it may make something as big as the Beatles; remember what it did for the record business and rock 'n' roll 25 years ago.

BOOK REVIEW

Singing About Us

Bob Davis and Bruce Burron
James Lorimer & Co. Toronto

144 pages, \$5.95 paper, \$11.95 spiral bound
Bob Davis and Bruce Burron have put together a sampler book of songs and interviews with songwriters of a very special kind of English Canadian music - our own, about us.

The book, Singing About Us, features works of some better known Canadian recording artists (Gordon Lightfoot, Stompin' Tom Connors, Bob Ruzicka, Dick Nolan, Stringband, and Roy Payne) and some lesser known songwriters.

In the introduction, Davis explains the character of the music he selected to present: it names a lot of Canadian places; it lives in the most exploited sections of the country; a lot of its songs are about work; there's a simple straightforward quality to its music and lyrics; there's humour in its presentation; it involves ordinary people putting their anger and fight into music.

The book features words and music to 61 Canadian songs by the 17 artists and interviews with David Campbell, Roy Payne, Stevedore Steve and Geoff Ursell.

There's hardly a field of music in which some Canadians aren't creating works as good (or bad) as that setting standards in any other part of the world. It's unfortunate that the editor had to restrict himself to this one strain of Canadian music. But it's true that this mostly-country style, as with most country and folk music, is locally oriented.

Ian Tyson is noticeably absent from the collection as are Valdy and Murray McLauchlan, among whose material there are more than a few songs that fit Davis' criteria.

Davis told RPM that he was not able to secure permission to reproduce much of the music he intended to use and much of the works of major Canadian songwriters in the tradition are already published in print. He didn't want the book's introduction to be a major treatise, and edited the book so that the music did most of the talking.

What is presented is a good first step, with a lot of deserving music finally seeing print. The volume should be in every local library (ask your librarian to order it) if not on your own bookshelf.

The Programmers

All-news network launched

CRTC grants new FM licences

Eleven FM licences were granted recently by the CRTC to the Canadian National News Network Radio (CNRR). Representing the company are David Ruskin, a producer director for the CBC and an executive for early CITY-TV; lawyer Jerry Grafstein; engineer Sruki Switzer; and Ben Torchinsky from Agra Industries, a major sponsor.

If all goes according to plan, Canada should have its first all-news radio network by 1979. The Commission approved licences for 11 of twelve city locations applied for by the network: Vancouver, Winnipeg, Regina, Edmonton, Calgary, London, Ottawa, Toronto, Halifax, Saint John and St. John's. An application was also submitted for a station in Montreal, but the Commission refused it on the grounds that there isn't enough room for another English language station there. The Commission suggested that the company buy or affiliate with an existing Montreal station.

"The concept," explained Grafstein, "is to provide a national news and information service, which will be composed of national news and features and local inserts as well. This is really a unique licence in that it combines not only the news service but also the outlets under one ownership umbrella. It gives us a lot of opportunities without problems with affiliates. National network

news can be atrophied by local programming. National news is usually done as an insert, while we suggested it should work in the reverse. This gives us a national electronic newspaper."

In a market like Toronto, local news would account for about 8 minutes in an hour of programming, although Grafstein points out that a local feature could become a national one.

Grafstein told RPM they intend to see a profit by the fifth year, when the number of FM radio sets in Canada will have increased significantly.

The only opposition faced by the company was CKEY and Shoreacres Broadcasting, which applied for an all-news station for Toronto. They lost out to the network suggestion. Both were vying for the 99.1 FM band.

A licence was also granted independently to CFGM, the country music station in Richmond Hill serving the Toronto area. They will build a contemporary FM station there, offering for the first time significant competition for the established progressive giant, CHUM-FM.

The new Richmond Hill station, to be called CKIN-FM, will be managed by Jack Carnegie, who will also handle sales. Dave Charles, currently PD for CFGM, will be responsible for getting the station

underway, by hiring staff, and will continue to be in charge of programming for the new station. Bruce Carmegoe, Director Of Engineering for CFGM, will do that job for CKIN.

Complete details of the conditions of the licencing hadn't come down at press time, but Charles assured RPM that virtually all the points in the Promise Of Performance would remain unchanged.

Some of these points include the fact that CKIN-FM will be the only FM station in Toronto not broadcasting from the CN tower. Charles and his associates believe that the costs involved were too unrealistic for a new licensee.

Instead, the transmitter will be located on a hill north of Toronto. At a maximum power of 100,000 watts, the station will broadcast in all directions from that point, giving it a northern range far exceeding that of any transmitter at the CN Tower, and Toronto reception of equivalent quality.

Some of the points outlined in terms of programming in the Promise of Performance are: 55% of the programming day will be devoted to enriched mosaic programming. A staff of eleven announcers, unusual for a new station, will hopefully insure proper preparation for on-air material. A total of 18 hours per week is proposed for background and human interest category information programs, which qualifies as foreground programming. Consumer reports, an Ombudsman information program service and daily community access are all included.

CKIN-FM plans to provide live concerts from local halls and studios. A \$40,000 yearly budget will allow more initiative and freedom than has been the case so far with live concerts, where a record company or management picked up the tab.

Charles also advised that emphasis would be placed on Canadian recordings at the station, many of whom he feels aren't able to receive adequate radio coverage.

Four summer music shows on CBC-FM national net

The CBC-FM cross-Canada network is now in full swing with a strong schedule of weekday and Sunday music programming this summer.

Off The Record, 11:30-1pm Monday to Friday, is a presentation by host Bob Kerr of new releases and old classics of classical, opera and semi-classical music, mostly from his own record collection.

Mondays 2-4pm, Tuesday-Friday 1:30-4pm Jim Coward offers a variety of classical music presentations, usually from tapings by European broadcast organizations. Friday concerts will be devoted to Canada's regional orchestras.

Monday-Friday, 6:30-8pm Margaret Pascu hosts Listen To The Music, a light blend of classical and light popular sounds, with requests, interviews and information about Canada's touring music groups.

Sunday-Friday, midnight, Midnight Jazz

presents tightly-programmed features on the jazz greats. The show is hosted on Sundays by Lee Major in Winnipeg, Mondays and Thursdays by Bob Oxley, Tuesdays by Don Warner in Halifax, Wednesdays by Bob Smith in Vancouver and Fridays, from Montreal with host Ted Miller.

Sunday mornings at 10:00 Norma Beecroft and Norman Symonds (both Canadian music composers and writers) host a music-interview show which producer Digby Peers intends to bridge the gap between performers and creators and their audiences. Guests through the summer include Dizzie Gillespie, Robert Charlebois, Cleo Laine and John Dankworth Harry Freedman, Moe Koffman, and Harry Sommers.

The CBC-FM network includes St. John's (106.9), Toronto (94.1), Halifax (102.7), Winnipeg (98.3), Montreal (95.1), Calgary (102.1), Ottawa (103.3) and Vancouver (105.7).

Goldfarb acquisition increases CHUM earnings

CHUM's annual business report indicates a rise in earnings, for the period ending May 31. Earnings stand at \$2.3 million or 71 cents a share, up from 1.6 million and 49 cents a share at the same time last year. The company acquired ten more shares of Goldfarb Consultants Ltd., making CHUM the owner of 92% of the shares in the company and this apparently had an effect on the company's earnings.

CAB publishes booklet on broadcast careers

The Canadian Association of Broadcasters has released a new booklet, titled, *Careers in Broadcasting*. Ideal for students, the book outlines the basic duties and requirements of most jobs in the broadcasting business, both in radio and TV. It includes sections on job hunting, programming, news, music, sales, announcing, promo, copywriting, traffic, technical jobs, and jobs exclusive to TV.

Also from Canada's Bi-Bi town comes news that CKGM was the first station in Canada to have and play the new Bee Gees' single, *You Should Be Dancing*. The single was culled from the group's soon-to-be released album, *Response*. Another first for CKGM is their airing of the new Elton John and Kiki Dee single, *Don't Go Breakin' My Heart*. People in the industry in Montreal are now saying "If you heard it - you heard it first on CKGM".

... and the beat goes on. Yes, there's more. CKGM captured much of Montreal-town with their Beatles Forever promotion. They gave away Beatles T-shirts, the Beatles' new album, *Rock and Roll Music* and a set of 44 Beatles albums - on the hour. Listeners were asked to call in their choice of three favourite Beatles' songs - as a group or as individuals. The station averaged more than 4 000 calls per day and capped - the promotion with a Beatles' Top 50 Countdown on Sunday afternoon.

Wintario doles out bucks

Wintario, the province of Ontario's lottery to raise funds for arts, culture, and recreation, has granted more than \$40 million to more than 1,775 groups since it began granting in September 1975. Below are grants of interest to the music trades announced by the Ontario Ministry of Culture and Recreation on June 30 and July 5.

ALGOMA

The Art Gallery of Algoma is eligible to receive a grant up to \$172,500 to assist in the costs of building and equipping an art gallery and exhibition centre in Sault Ste. Marie.

A grant of \$2,075 is to be made to the Royal Canadian Drum and Trumpet Band of Sault Ste. Marie to assist with transportation costs to attend the Dominion Convention on June 13 1976, in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

LAMBTON COUNTY

The Lambton County Library of Wyoming is to receive a grant of \$2,000 to assist in the production costs of four performances of "Maxmillion Beetle", by the Young Peoples Theatre.

NIPISSING

A grant of \$8,500 is to be made to the North Bay Parks and Recreation Department to assist in the costs of the "North Bay Cultural Summer" programme, which will include sporting competitions, arts and crafts workshops and displays, and theatrical and musical performances through the months of July and August, 1976.

The Challenge Summer Cultural Programme of North Bay is to receive a grant of \$4,000 towards the costs of a programme involving 100 area youths in social and community activities, including a musical theatre production.

The Ontario Choral Federation of Toronto is to receive a grant of \$9,340 towards the costs of a choral performing tour of northern Ontario communities, August 14-28 and September 22-29, 1976.

The Canadian Junior Ballet Society of Toronto will receive a grant of \$5,000 towards the costs of a Toronto dance tour programme representing many nationalities.
