

Canadian delegates score at MUSEXPO '83

Acapulco, Mexico: MUSEXPO '83, although attracting fewer delegates than in previous years, was obviously quite successful to many of the registrants, particularly the Canadian delegation. The hotel setting of the Condesa del Mar was exceptional, and the seminars extremely informative and well presented. The overall consensus would indicate that this, the ninth MUSEXPO was one of the better meetings of record and video people who represented 35 countries. Of particular interest was the delegation from the USSR's Copyright Agency, comprising Sergei Semenov and Grigori Nersesyan.

The Canadian group was actively making contacts and, in some cases, deals on the spot. Joey Cee and Danny Emoff of Nightflite Records, had caught the attention of several European and U.S. delegates with their rough tape of Stars On Steel, an indication of the talent on this unfinished master. Terry McKeown and Walter Grego of McKeown/Grego Management have, since the Acapulco date, pacted a deal with Billy Meshel of Arista/Careers Music in Los Angeles for a co-publishing agreement for their clients Teddy Boys Music (PRO) and Shelsongs (CAPAC). The principals of these companies are musicians Stephen Marian, Paul Asgeirson, Julian Bernas and Scott Shelson of Sparta. Sparta previously released album product in Canada under the names Berlin (on Freedom) and The Teddy Boys (on WEA).

John Erlendson and wife Patricia, of One-Eyed Duck Recording & Publishing, became the hit of MUSEXPO, donning there Sphere Clown Band costumes complete with makeup, for a poolside promotion. The impromptu sessions impressed visiting delegates from several countries and resulted in the signing of deals for

Compact Disc releases beefed up by WEA

Toronto: WEA's November release of Compact Discs covers titles from classical, pop and rock music fields. These titles are available from Warner Bros, Geffen, Sire, Elektra/Asylum, Nonesuch, Elektra/Solar, Atlantic and Atlantic/Modern.

Included in the releases are The Who's *It's Hard*, self-titled albums from Al Jarreau and Christopher Cross, Van Halen's *Diver Down*, Peter Gabriel's *Security*, Alpha from Asia, *Speaking In Tongues* by Talking Heads, Lindsey Buckingham's *Law & Order*, *Desire* by Tom Scott, Linda Ronstadt's *Get Closer*, *Abacab* by Genesis, *Abba's Greatest Hits*, *Bella Donna* and *The Wild Heart* by Stevie Nicks and *Take Another Picture* by Quarterflash.

Nonesuch releases of classical works includes Mozart's *Early Four Quartets* by the Sequoia String Quartet, Schubert's *Octet*, performed by the Boston Symphony Orchestra, *The Art Of The Balalaika* by the Odessa Balalakias and *American Music For Strings* by the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra conducted by Gerard Schwarz.

Pegi Ceconi and Val Azzoli, from the S.R.O. Group of Companies, were also enjoying the meeting with old friends from previous MUSEXPO's and making new contacts. Paul Clinch, who heads up his own Southside label, signed several deals and established an important link with Dan Friedman of the Los Angeles Brave New Music & Modern Art Music firm which could see the Canadian release of record product by Australia's Wickety Wak, a group considered to be that country's next international break-through.

This year's MUSEXPO was given the usual Roddy Shashoua opening night treatment with a well-laid on cocktail reception, courtesy of the Mayor of Acapulco, followed each evening by artist showcases, the first by Portrait's (CBS) Elvis Brothers and the second by various artists from the Soul Train label.

In view of the success of this year's four-day meet, Shashoua is expecting an increase in attendance for MUSEXPO '84 which will again be held in Acapulco.

Supertramp & Payola\$ on First Choice Rocks

Toronto: First Choice, now basking in a financial bail-out through their Bronfman connection, continue with their successful Rocks series with the Nov. 26 air-date for the two-hour Supertramp Special, guesting Vancouver's Payola\$. The series is hosted by Reiner Schwarz.

Produced by Concert Productions International (CPI), the Special was directed by Stan Harris, a veteran of the record industry and contains complete concert footage of the group taped live at Toronto's CNE Stadium in front of what has been reported to be "the largest audience of the group's extensive 1983 world tour."

The Special is also being billed as "a last look at the end of an era". The concert marks the farewell appearance of Roger Hodgson who, as singer/songwriter/co-founder of Supertramp, along with Rick Davies, was the creative force behind this successful British group. Supertramp are the only group to ever have two million-selling albums in Canada.

The stage built for the concert was reportedly the largest ever used in rock concerts, measuring 46 feet in height and 160 feet in width. There was also special film footage, produced by accompany four of the group's classics, *Rudy*, *Fool's Overture*, *Crime Of The Century* and *Asylum*. Notes director Harris, "The impact of the performance really comes through much better on the small screen than in a large 30,000 seat audience. We did a lot of superimposing to grasp the entirety of the show and were able to bring the stars much closer together than they were in reality. We also used huge close-ups which is a marvelous way of seeing the emotion in the performances."

The theme song for the series, *What's Gonna Happen To The Kids*, was written

Cambridge, Mass. Polaroid Corporation has announced that it will begin marketing high performance video cassettes in selected overseas markets. The Polaroid Supercolor video cassettes will be available in both VHS and Beta formats in several lengths and quality grades.

In making the announcement, I.M. Booth, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, noted: "The opportunity to enter the videotape market will expand Polaroid's consumer product base and is consistent with the company's long range commitment to broaden its involvement in electronic imaging and magnetic media."

Polaroid's Supercolor video cassettes are now available in several international markets including the U.K and Australia as well as several markets in Latin America and the Middle and Far East. Expansion on a worldwide basis is expected in the very near future.

Polaroid Canada will shortly be announcing their entry into a new field of visual communications being billed as "Images of Tomorrow".

Toronto: Anne Murray's current Capitol release, *A Little Good News*, has become a very popular item in the U.S. This week (Nov 28), the single tops all three of the major country charts (R&R, Cashbox and Billboard), and in spite of slow response in Canada, is moving ever closer to the top of the RPM Country 50 (No. 2 this week).

The Capitol star, who just completed a highly successful engagement at Harrah's in Lake Tahoe, has also taped two very important television shows, *Solid Gold*, to be aired Dec. 16, and *Thicke Of The Night*, going to air Dec. 5.

Murray has also chalked up phenomenal sales for her Christmas *Wishes* album. Sales to date in North America total over 1.1 million copies.

Also good news for Murray is that her *Kitchener, Centre-In-The-Square* dates (Nov. 28-29), were the quickest sell out in the history of that theatre. Her Nov. 26 *Alumni Hall* date in London was also a quick sell out.

CHFI-FM readies Opera Radiothon

Charlene Roycht, Promo Mgr. for Toronto's CHFI-FM, has been busy distributing and plugging the Super Santa Sale catalogue, in aid of the station's 2nd Annual Canadian Opera Company Radiothon. For sixty hours beginning noon Friday (Dec 2) and running through to midnight Sunday (4), the sale will be offering everything from a \$120 package Centredisc recordings featuring the music of Canada's best concert composers, performed by our best musicians and recorded with the finest digital equipment, to a \$20 deluxe Just-A-Pizza plus thousands of valuable items in-between. Says Roycht, "We'll (CHFI) be doing our regular programming with some interesting twists with the hopes that we raise a lot of money for the Opera."

Z99 shows it can really rock

No one can now dispute the fact that Regina's Z99 doesn't know how to rock. The station recently presented the city's first ever Rocking Chair Marathon. With Rocker Walker's Rocktober Rockoff taking place outside and inside Kelly's Stereo Mart, the contestants had to rock for 72 hours and 48 minutes with rest time of 10 minutes every two hours. Kevin MacKenzie and Brian Beacock were the finalists with the latter picking up the big prize of a \$3,200 waterbed suite. The station's Robin Phillips noted that "after 72 hours and 48 minutes, Beacock can no doubt use the waterbed."

CHOK Sarnia takes to the Soaps

Sarnia's CHOK, along with the Eaton Centre and Business Improvement Association, recently presented Harriet Ipstein's Soaps Alive. The event, which took place at the Eaton Centre Mall, starred Donna Cortland of All My Children and Senator Mark Singleton of Another World, with two shows in all. More than 2,000 soap fans were attracted to the event and besides getting autographs were able to ask questions of the stars. With the help of CHOK's mobile studio, Air Force One, station personalities Rick Burrows and Dave Reynolds were on-air live for the event. A couple of listeners also won the chance to have lunch with the soapers.

C100 airs digital Compact Discs

Halifax FM station C100 recently began airing digital recordings of Compact Discs utilizing the Sony Compact System. The station claims to be the only station in Atlantic Canada to convert to digital compact discs. Technical Director Walter Labucki described the system as a quantum jump from current analog technology. "In terms of quality, we couldn't deliver anything better than digital quality to our listeners," he said. Program Director Barry

Horne stated that while there are a large number of albums already converted to Compact Disc, the ratio of digital to analog selection on the air will increase steadily as more product becomes available, noting, "The system will eventually replace all current playback systems as broadcasters respond to the demand for higher quality."

Born in 1980, Sunday Sunday represents the first time a private radio company has undertaken the production and syndication of a national news and public affairs program.



A very heavy group of rock people, led by Bruce Allen, the latter not known for his shyness, confronted Communications Minister Francis Fox with their complaint about discrimination against Canadian acts using American-owned equipment including vehicles. There was a hefty duty to come back into Canada to play a couple of dates. In fact, Allen had cancelled a Winnipeg date for Loverboy because of the border problems. Lost tapes featured on new Live Doors album

Toronto: Alive She Cried, the new live Doors album released by WEA on the Elektra label and containing previously unreleased material, highlights recordings of live performances that had been lost for several years.

Produced by Paul Rothchild, the material was recorded from 1968 to 1970 in Los Angeles, New York, Detroit, Boston and Copenhagen.

Featured tracks include the Doors' compositions Light My Fire, You Make Me Real, Texas Radio & The Big Beat, Love Me Two Times and Moonlight Drive, as well as the Van Morrison-penned classic Gloria and Little Red Rooster, guesting John Sebastian on harmonica. The latter was written by blues legend Willie Dixon.

The package also contains several Doors and members shots from over various years including at the Filmore East in 1968 and the Hollywood Bowl in 1969.

Benjamin Edmonds, who does the inside liner notes for the album, explains that the

Four Tops reunited with original writers

Toronto: Back Where I Belong, the new Motown album from the Four Tops who recently signed back with their old label, marks the first time in several years that the quartet has been re-united with the legendary songwriting trio of Holland/Dozier/Holland.

Edward Holland Jr., Lamont Dozier and Brian Holland together wrote nearly every hit single for the Four Tops during the '60s as well as almost every classic hit by Diana Ross & The Supremes.

The Four Tops list included such classics as Reach Out And I'll Be There, Baby I Need Your Lovin', I Can't Help Myself, Burnadette, and Standing In The Shadows Of Love.

Capitol tour support for latest Wilcox offering

Toronto: Capitol recording artist David Wilcox is presently on a national tour in support of his latest album, My Eyes Keep Me In Trouble.

Produced by Sadia, also the producer of his successful debut, the album has spawned two singles, Just This Side Of Heaven and Downtown Came Uptown.

Capitol reports that due to the strong support received at FM radio as well as to the two singles, the LP has been enjoying considerable airplay and "terrific" press reviews across the country.

Jane Hodgson of Capitol notes that Wilcox has built an enormous cult following in Canada and his live shows have become infamous for their spontaneity and unpredictability.

Forthcoming dates for the local guitar hero include Calgary November 4, Edmonton (5), Vancouver (11 & 12), Toronto (17) and Hamilton (18).

recording of the band at the Aquarius Theatre in Hollywood was among "a host of live Doors tapes that vanished in the 70's and feared lost forever."

Edmonds says that after videotape of a 1968 Danish TV performance surfaced, "it was a signal that the missing tape situation was not without hope."

The discovering motivated the band members and Rothchild to mount a search for the missing tapes. They spent months investigating every possible lead. Finally they stumbled upon a scrap of paper at an unused desk at a Los Angeles storage facility indicating that an unspecified shipment was received but not logged. This clue led to the tapes.

Oasis single for Ron Nigrini

Toronto: Noted Canadian singer-songwriter Ron Nigrini has re-surfaced with the release of his new Oasis single Baby I'm A Lot Like You.

The session also included the cutting of Secrets, Thin Line and If I Lose You, all of which were written by guitarist Nigrini.

Nigrini, who has toured with several name acts including Kenny Rogers and Hagood Hardy, recently opened for Roberta Flack at Ontario Place. He won national recognition for the academy award-winning song I'm Easy from the motion picture, Nashville. The song, which was also featured on his second album Rich Things, still receives widespread airplay.

CFNY-FM - a maverick enters major-market fray

David Marsden is reflective when asked what he believes the spirit of radio to be: "A lot of people think it's just a slogan, which it isn't. To me it's everything, or at least should be, everything radio was meant to be."

CFNY-FM has embarked on what will probably be a trip into one of the most exciting periods in the history of radio in Toronto. For several years, the station has existed on the fringes of Toronto in the bedroom community of Brampton, purveying a distinctive and frequently exotic sensibility directed at those who find the more mainstream FM stations too predictable and repetitive in format. On November 29, all that is going to change.

Marsden, as Director of Operations and Programming, is obviously proud of what has been accomplished in the three years he has been associated with the station.

"I like to think that we've been able to recapture the true meaning of radio as an impression on your mind as you listen to it. I'd like to think of it in three dimensions: one-dimensional radio is what most radio stations do. It comes out of the speaker, falls on the carpet, and sometimes it gets to your ears. Two-dimensional radio comes out of the speaker and makes you react in some way; you'll pick up the phone in reaction to a contest or to something which the DJ has said. Three-dimensional radio, which is what I like to think of CFNY as, includes the first two, but not only will you react, it will act on one of your senses; anger, compassion, tears, introspection . . . can all result from this third dimension."

With the increase in power afforded by

the move to the CN Tower, CFNY is in a position to secure a percentage of the audience currently adhering to the music and programming emanating from the other FM operations in the competitive Toronto radio market.

CFNY is obviously about people and the ways in which they interact. Selkirk Communications, the owners of the station, are represented in Brampton by Bill Hutton. A man of considerable experience, he sees a very bright future for the operation, and enjoys the rapport with his people, which has obviously developed in a very short span of time.

Eddy Valiquette and Ivor Hamilton touch on the theme of flexibility of the station and give one the impression that CFNY is essentially a family; there is a strong sense of communal effort here.

"David is great . . . he can sense a good record in 30 seconds!" enthuses Valiquette, a thoughtful and articulate man who is very intrinsic to the process of deciding what the listener will hear. Ivor Hamilton deals with the numerous imports which CFNY programs, to the delight of its growing legion of listeners. He explains, "We're really nothing more than a mirror reflection of the music that the artists are making, and as the artists change their styles, we must react to that."

Getting to the people, his listeners has always been priority for Marsden and perhaps the best illustration of his talent in this field was the establishment of the now very popular U-Know Awards. An annual event for several years, his well-produced awards show was attended by an estimated 1200 of CFNY's faithful listeners, who packed to overflow capacity, the Grand Concert Ballroom of Toronto's Royal York Hotel, this past April 4th.

The show had posted "sold out" notices three weeks before the event which led one

record industry observer to comment, "If CFNY can attract this much of an audience at \$42 a head, just think of what can happen when the station goes to the CN Tower."

The time to press the button (Nov. 29) is here and Marsden, along with his technical director Jim Fonger, based in Toronto, Valiquette, Hamilton and a myriad of other souls, are certain that this is only the beginning. The face of radio is changing, and nowhere is it more evident than in the eyes of David Marsden, an innovative, energetic and very compassionate man.

RICK DERRINGER

El Mocambo - Toronto - Nov. 12/83

With the exception of Johnny Winter or, perhaps even Chuck Berry, any search for the quintessential American rock and roll guitarist must at some point narrow down to one name: Derringer. Noted primarily throughout his career as a superb instrumentalist, and innovative producer, his talents as a writer and vocalist are often overlooked. A little more work on his voice and it should begin to approach his guitar playing; as it stands, he needn't worry too much, Saturday's crowd was in a mood for pyrotechnics.

The Good Dirty Fun record is his latest work, and he invests considerable effort in encouraging the crowd to enjoy themselves. This is often construed as a cheap ploy to stir up excitement, but in this case, after a career spanning nearly twenty years, Derringer should be allowed a little hokum here and there. The newer material was showcased with no fuss, and a lot of fun; sidemen James Wilcox and Donnie Kissellbach were more than capable in providing Derringer with a solid base for his solos and poignant vocals.

Derringer is arguably a holdover; perhaps even one might say, an anachronism. Certainly a reminder of a time and place when the guitar, not the synthesizer, was the centre of the music. This is not music fit for an arena; this is club stuff, pure and simple. Rory Gallagher, Paul James, Paul Martin of The Brides, and others too numerous to mention, realize this fact.

CIRPA conference zeros in on future of video

Toronto: Canadian independent record producers and international music video experts met (Oct. 26-27), to discuss issues facing music video producers at CIRPA's Video Visions - In Sync With The Future conference. Are music videos the future of the music industry? The answer emerging from two days of discussion appeared to be a qualified yes.

Denise Donlon, publicist for Doug And The Slugs, in the opening panel, illustrated how a music video could be used creatively. As an alternative to have the band fly across Canada attending many listening parties for promotion purposes, Doug And The Slugs produced and played for the media, a video titled The Listening Party. It consists of several of the band's hits, interspersed with acting skits. Donlon explained: "It not only endeared the band to the press, due to Doug Bennett's B-Movie and fun attitude, but was a more cost effective type of promotion." She said the Too Bad portion of the video was produced for only \$3,000.00 in 1980. This is a far cry from the Michael Jackson videos from the Thriller album, reported to cost approximately \$180,000.00 each in 1983.

Canada's rock city spawns a country band

Vancouver: The majority of Canada's successful rock groups are based in Vancouver and the club scene and radio stations, with the exception of CKWX, are all geared to rock and pop, which doesn't leave too much of a chance for country. However, early indications reveal that Vancouver, indeed, does have a powerful country offering - The Midnite Rodeo Band (MRB).

The struggle for recognition hasn't been easy but MRB's manager Richard Watt has persisted. Their first album, gave them four hit singles. For example: avoiding excessive rock cliches, such as pretty women, cars and guitars; deciding on an abstract or literal interpretation of the lyrics; choosing artistic visuals needed to grab and hold viewer attention. This song particularly posed problems due to its sensitive subject matter. The band described it as a "tongue-in-cheek look at voyeurism and paranoia". Unless handled carefully, the music video could be misinterpreted as advocating violence against and sexism towards women.

Wednesday's luncheon address by Michael Shore, author of the Rolling Stone's Book of Rock Video, due for publication in 1984, outlined the development of rock video. He said "the new frontier of video has become the new assembly line, owing to the lack of experimentation, and advertisement-like character of most of today's videos." He went on to explain the advent of MTV in the U.S. which resulted in a phenomenal growth of music video production. "Record companies were slow to pick up this trend," he said, "until the MTV tail began to wag the A&R dog of record companies. Today's formula for rock success now includes not only touring and press and radio, but emphatically video as well."

Music video is still new, and is misunderstood. Not surprising considering the dynamics of marrying two distinct media: audio and visual. Problems exist, he stated; "It's hard to stand out on MTV. You need the look, which costs money. You need visual hooks like advertising - you should think of MTV as AM radio on TV, with similar playlists."

Contenders for an MTV-like Canadian service are forced to reconsider the viability of their applications

Wednesday afternoon, participants eye-witnessed post production techniques and facilities for video in Toronto. Included were editing and special effects at Magnetic North or Mobile Image, audi post-production at Sounds Interchange and computer animation at Omnibus Video. These visits made it clear that Toronto has world class facilities and personnel for music video production.

Remarks on Thursday (27), were in light of the CRTC's decision to allow cable television to import foreign services, including MTV, and charge their subscribers for it. The commission decided it wouldn't regulate this extra tier of services, but only the basic cable rates. This decision shocked panelists and participants. Contenders for an MTV-like Canadian service are forced to reconsider the viability of their applications. In the face of unregulated importation of MTV signals, it may not be economically viable to participate in a Canadian version of MTV. Applicants for such a licence had expected to spend a healthy percentage of production budgets on Canadian music videos. An MTV type service, that is 24 hours of music videos, is considered so im-

portant, because of the effect that MTV in the U.S. has had on boosting record sales.

Trends concerning the future course of music videos emerged as the conference progressed. Some panelists bemoaned the passing of the "Golden Era" of music video when they were produced for as little as several hundred dollars, and were more experimental. That era is gone. Today, in Canada, music videos cost an average of \$20-40,000.00 to produce. Such budgets are necessary to compete internationally. Production costs will continue to rise.

Video is no longer only a promotional tool but a medium in itself. If this trend

continues, the size of live shows may be reduced. Michael Shore suggested "The consumer may not want to spend \$15-20.00 to see a live concert when they can watch the same thing on video at home."

The medium is still new and growing fast. Jerry Zaludek, from VTR Productions, projected a "25% growth rate annually, at a minimum for the next five years." New markets for music video are being developed. Juke box videos, at 50 cents a play, are being produced in Canada now by Music Video of The '80s Inc. "They'll be capable of interfacing with a large screen and provide music videos in a club" a representative commented.

Music videos may be used as openers in film theatres. As consumer access to home hardware increases, they will be increasingly used in the home. With this in mind, Brian Robertson of the CRIA, warned that music video piracy and home taping would become a problem as it has with home taping of records.

Today's record artists will increasingly become video artists. CITY-TV's John Martin predicted more creative scripting and longer videos for the future. This is necessary to "avoid the burn out the viewer may be subject to, given the high repeat factor in music video playlists," he said.

All panelists emphasized and agreed on the need to be able to compete internationally, in terms of technical ability and quality to survive.

Many implications of music video have yet to be worked out. Lawyer and panelist Ed Glinert said, "It is unclear, even to lawyers, what equitable pay rates and royalties for music videos should be. There is no law in the area."

The conference ended with a showcase of videos. Included were the Tenants' video of Sheriff (CBS) and independently-produced music videos, showing wit and humour, such as Eva Everything's Boob Tube. The showcase proved Canada has the talent to compete in the international music video market.

CIRPA's conference made evident that to be "in sync with the future" is to be in sync with music videos now. Now and in the future, they will continue to be a leading edge in breaking new music markets.

MOTION PICTURE SOUNDTRACK - Pop John Travolta And Olivia Newton-John MCA-6127-J

Produced by Canadian David Foster, who also co-wrote many of the songs, and he gets two-parts Cancon credit for Night Music (MA). This track features him at the keyboards. Twist Of Fate, featuring Olivia Newton-John, has been taken as a single and is already a major chart item. Also taking lead vocal roles are Journey, Boz Scaggs, Chicago, Steve Kipner and Patti Austin, all of which is previously unreleased. The latter's It's Gonna Be Special was produced by Quincy Jones. The key to the success of this album however, is Olivia Newton-John and she makes Travolta sound not too bad on their duet of Take A Chance which was co-written by Olivia, Foster and Steve Lukather.

WILLIE NELSON - Country/pop Without A Song - Columbia FC-33110-H

Produced and arranged by Booker T. Jones, who also performs on the organ, Willie Nelson's latest will obviously follow the success pattern this incredible talent has



set. One of the key tracks is Nelson's duet with Julio Iglesias on As Time Goes By. Although Nelson retains his traditional country roots, he has done more than any artist in the country field, with perhaps the exception of Kenny Rogers, to spread the word of country music. He hasn't designed his material or productions for the pop market. Nelson is as pure country today as he was as a solo picker in the beginning. His latest RPM Country 50 charter, Take It To The Limit, is not included here.

ADAM ANT - Rock Strip - Epic FE-39108-H

This is Adam Ant's first new album since Friend Or Foe and the direction is much



more pronounced and his image should turn on the bedwetters. Ant co-wrote all the material here with guitarist Marco Pirroni. The title track and Puss 'N Boots have been released as videos and should hit MTV shortly, which will secure good box office for his intended sixty city tour of North America. Both of these tracks were produced by Phil Collins. The remainder of the album was a co-production by Ant, Pirroni and Richard James Burgess. Also key are Navel To Neck and Baby, Let Me Scream At You. Lyrics included.

THE MISTLETONES - Christmas Hello Christmas - Duke Street DSR-31001-P Produced by Peter Mann, who did the same
