



P.R.O. Canada panels unique to North America

Toronto: P.R.O. Canada Song Evaluation Panels, organized in Edmonton (April 7) and Calgary (8) in cooperation with the Alberta Recording Industry Association, gave area songwriters a unique experience of having the Canadian music industry meet them on their own turf to hear and evaluate their song material. One songwriter travelled by bus overnight more than 1200 kilometers to attend.

Pindoff doubles ante raised in charity bid

Toronto: Kris Pindoff, President Pindoff Record Sales has announced that he will issue a cheque in the amount of \$3600.00 to the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada. The cheque is double that of the proceeds from the recent industry tribute to Mr. Pindoff, recognizing his 25th year in the business.

Mr. Pindoff and his wife Eva, who acts as his secretary in his humanitarian projects, has been supporting destitute and troubled children from many parts of the world for more than a decade. Through the Foster Parent Program, they are now supporting 44 children as well as assisting in the fund-

ing of schools. The Pindoffs are currently involved in a project in Swaziland and will be visiting Bangladesh shortly where they will offer their financial services to needy children in this area.

Besides keeping up an ongoing communication with their children through letters to their individual charges, the Pindoffs have made a point of visiting the youngsters and supplying them with Christmas gifts each year. Their most recent addition is a young Nepalese boy, for whom they are currently setting up a project that will involve a visit as well.

One of the priorities for the Pindoffs has been their support of The Sevres Children's Home, near Paris, France, where they have come to know the children through many visits, particularly over the Christmas period.

The P.R.O. Canada panels are unique in North America. Songwriters are invited to submit a demo of a song in advance of the workshops. The demos are performed to the audience and to the panel of experts. About 40 songs were heard in each location, with each receiving detailed evaluation from the panelists, who then fielded questions from the audience. The quality of the demo and the song was thoroughly analyzed, the hit potential and format of the songs were discussed and constructive suggestions made.

P.R.O. Canada's Nancy Gyokeres noted that "The first hour of each session proved somewhat of a shock to the audience," explaining that "Panel members treated each song as if they were hearing them in their own offices. Once the songwriters realized that each panelist looks at a song quite differently, they realized the importance of the points of view of the panelists. A songwriter may be concerned with the lyrics, working up to the chorus or hook, and the melody. A producer will listen from the production point of view, while an A&R director is interested for two reasons: the possible signing of an act from what he hears on demo, or placing the song itself with an act already signed to his label. The music publisher, on the other hand, is interested in the markets in which he may be able to place a particular song."

The panels for the Alberta sessions included Toronto producer Jack Richardson, Vancouver songwriter Jim Vallance, A&R Director Michael Godin of A&M Records, and music publisher Bill Kearns, of Toronto's Jobina Communications.

"With all the negative noise one hears from time to time in our industry," continues Gyokeres, "it is gratifying indeed to work with the industry professionals who have helped us out with our panels over the years. These people have never hesitated to give back to the industry from which they earn their living. It is certainly a pleasure working with them."

To date similar panels have been sponsored by P.R.O. Canada in Vancouver and Regina and one will be held in Moncton (Sept 7) as part of the annual activities of the Academy of Country Music Entertainment (ACME) and Country Week.

RCA issues 3-track EP from Eurythmics

Toronto RCA has shipped a special 12" three-track EP by the Eurythmics just as their latest album, Touch, nears the double platinum (200,000) mark in Canada.

The EP contains the new single, Who's That Girl, a follow-up to their hit single, Here Comes The Rain Again, which surpassed gold status in Canada, Aqua, the flip of the 7", and Jennifer - all produced by Dave Stewart. Both Stewart and Annie Lennox co-wrote all the tracks.

The duo are currently touring North America, which included a Toronto date where RCA presented them with platinum for Touch. The Toronto date marked the band's Canadian debut. They are being backed by an eight-piece group on the tour.

Solid Gold appointments to Keizer and O'Brien

Toronto: A realigning of Solid Gold's Promotion and Publicity departments has resulted in two appointments announced by the label's Steve Propas and Neill Dixon.

Tracy Keizer moves to the post of National Publicity and Tour Director while Gail O'Brien takes over the Promotion Department as National Promotion Director. Both Keizer and O'Brien joined Solid Gold in 1982 and have worked extensively in radio, retail, press and on band tours. They will report directly to Propas and the label's Vice President Bill McGathy.

Solid Gold recently finalized a long-term distribution agreement with CBS Records Canada. Top priority for the label is the Pukka Orchestra, whose single release, Listen To The Radio, has made impressive gains up the RPM 50 singles chart, with their self-titled album making similar gains up the RPM 100.

Saturn expands with Quebec office opening

Toronto: Saturn Distributing has opened an office in Lachine, P.Q., and simultaneously announced the appointment of Jean Baril to the position of Manager and Buyer for the new office.

In making the announcement, Saturn's Leonard Kennedy noted, "This is a move we've planned for a year. We've been shipping out of this location without having anyone in the Quebec market to keep an eye on things."

There will be no inventory stocked in the Quebec operation. All orders will be shipped from the Toronto operation. However, all orders for Quebec will be generated from the Lachine office.

Jean Baril has gained a wide and varied experience in the Quebec market, having been a buyer with various distributors for the past eight years, an association that gained him much respect in the Quebec music industry.



Julie Andrews scores release on Attic

Toronto: June 1st is the expected release date for Love Me Tender, Julie Andrews' initial album release for the Attic label. The album was produced in Nashville by Larry Butler.

Although tagged a "contemporary adult project," the title track, the old Elvis Presley classic, is a duet of Andrews with country music legend Johnny Cash. This track will be taken as the first single from the album.

A radio-only single will also be released as part of Attic's campaign to bring the album into prominence.

Attic President Al Mair was quick to stress that the Julie Andrews release is not

a move away from rock, but can be regarded as a continuation of the label's expansion.

"If you look right back to day one, we always had some easy listening artists as well as rock," he explains. "We're always looking for what there's a market for. We're just continuing to diversify. Julie Andrews has never been properly promoted as a recording artist, only on her soundtracks."

One of Attic's recent success projects was the release of a 10-record British Marching Band series. The label plans to release another ten beginning in August. This music area was a completely new field for the label and one they found was not being serviced.

CFNY adds extra date for Minds & Crisis

Toronto: New music station CFNY-FM, along with Labatt's Breweries, will present a special concert presentation of Simple Minds and China Crisis (June 4) at Massey Hall.

Marg Fardella, Promotion Assistant for the station, explains that the extra show is being billed as a Birthday Party Thank You Presentation, a free concert to thank their listeners. "It's the first time that someone has bought out a whole concert to give tickets away," she said.

The station has already given away several hundred tickets to listeners who celebrate their birthdays on June 4. Also planned are phone-in and drive-up giveaways.

Loverboy's Mike Reno featured in Ahd release

Toronto: Loverboy's Mike Reno is featured with Moxy in Thinking About You, an album re-issued on the Collectors Series by the Ahd label. The album showcases Reno as lead singer as well as his early writing talents where he joins Moxy's guitarist Buddy Caine to write High School Queen, Sailor's Delight, Under The Lights, and Thinking About You. Reno also teamed with lead guitarist Earl Johnson for Maybe I'm A Dreamer, Sing' To Me, and Livin' & Learnin'.

Also re-issued is Moxy's self-titled album with material written by Johnson and Buzz Shearman, the group's late lead vocalist.

The two re-issues follow the release of Moxy, A Tribute To Buzz Shearman. The latter died in a motorcycle accident a couple of years ago and the proceeds from the album, which features previously unreleased material, goes to a trust fund set up to ensure an education for Sherman's son Jesse.

Meanwhile there is a new Moxy band now warming up for several dates including a tour of Texas. The band is hoping to hook up to a major tour during August. They will debut their new sound at Toronto's Gasworks late in June or early July.

The group comprises former Moxy members, guitarist Earl Johnson and bassist Howard Warden, along with new members, Coke on drums and vocalist Tom Griffin. Plans are apparently underway for a new Moxy album to be produced by Johnson.

The concert dates for the Virgin acts (June 5, 6, and 7) sold out by April 30, after going on sale on the weekend, which left fans hoping for an additional date.

"I thought it would take a week for the tickets to sell," said Virgin Canada President Bob Muir. "But when they sold out just over a weekend, that really threw me off. I couldn't believe it. It's going to be one of the hottest events of the year."

The two bands are also scheduled for dates in Kitchener (May 31), Ottawa (June 1), Montreal (2), and Vancouver (11). Major retail and display contests are planned for the dates by Virgin.

Muir reports that Simple Minds' latest album, Sparkle In The Rain, has already crashed the 40,000 mark in only three months on release. The band's previous album, New Gold Dream is expected to reach gold during the Canadian dates. New Gold Dream was CFNY's top LP of 1982.

Muir credited CFNY as establishing Simple Minds in Toronto and surrounding area. The station has also been cited for breaking China Crisis whose first album for Virgin is Working With Fire & Steel. The title track was taken as the first single.

Unreleased Jackson songs being readied by Motown

Toronto: A Michael Jackson album, Farewell My Summer Love, 1984, containing previously unreleased material, is expected this month from Motown.

The tracks have apparently been re-mixed by Motown A&R Director Steve Barry and Michael Lovesmith, an artist/producer for Motown.

Also scheduled this month is a Michael Jackson picture disc containing The Jackson 5's 14 greatest hits. The cassette will carry two bonus tracks and will be marketed in a blister package complete with a Jackson cut-out.

Both the picture disc and cassette will carry a bonus gift of a glove. The picture disc will also house a two-way fold-out poster listing available Michael Jackson and Jackson 5 catalogue items, as well as yesterday singles, available on Motown.

Motown is distributed in Canada by Quality Records.

Female acts score big in first quarter - CBS

Toronto: Rock may still be male-dominated but the female acts signed to CBS have been chalking up impressive points for the label's first quarter of the year. Ironically, some of the names are newcomers on the scene.

The signs of female power began to show last year with the smash success of the Bonnie Tyler double platinum single, Total Eclipse Of The Heart. Tyler has made her comeback with her LP, Faster Than The Speed Of Night, now well over double platinum in Canada. She continues to dominate the charts with her follow-up single, Holding Out For A Hero, taken from the Footloose Soundtrack.

The German bombshell of 99 Red Balloons established Nena, right out of the box. The single has become a double-sided hit with some programmers preferring to air the German version, 99 Luftballons, on the flip. The single is now well over the platinum mark. The follow-up, Just A Dream, is showing early indications of following the success of her initial release.

Yet another unfamiliar name enjoying hit status is Cyndi Lauper with her hit single, Girls Just Want To Have Fun, already over the platinum mark and still selling briskly.

Lauper's album, She's So Unusual, quickly surpassed gold and is now pushing platinum. Time After Time has been taken as the follow-up single and has already scored impressive gains up the RPM 50 Singles chart.

It's expected that Lauper will be playing several Canadian dates this year.

CRIA appoints new investigative operative

Toronto: Patrick J. Fox has been appointed Director, Investigative Services for the CRIA. The announcement was made by Brian Robertson, President of the organization.

Prior to this appointment Mr. Fox was a member of the Metropolitan Toronto Police Force - an association of 15 years where he attained the rank of sergeant in the Fraud and Forgery Squad.

The Nylons — stretching their musical directions

The Nylons have brought the musical description, a cappella, out of the boring realm of the barbershop quartets and choral groups into the exciting music of the '80s. It's obvious why the Attic recording group

don't require instruments on their recordings - they don't need them. In fact, the vibrant young quartet could put many vocal/instrumental groups to shame.

Timing couldn't be better for the release of their Seamless album, produced and arranged by Peter Mann. There would appear to be more acceptance by general radio listeners for this type of music, no doubt due previous releases by The Nylons. Their current single, Stepping Stone, has made strong gains up the RPM Contemporary Adult chart, an indication of coast-to-coast

Laid Back's flip surfaces as hit

Toronto: The Quebec market alone has scored gold for Laid Back's release of Sunshine Reggae, a single that only received moderate response in the rest of the country. Much of the Quebec action was the result of its popularity at the dance club level. The flip, White Horse, has surfaced as the national preference however. Sunshine Reggae was released in both a 7" and 12" single in January and was followed by the group's self-titled album in March. A little competition was given Sunshine Reggae with the release of a cover by Allen Harris and Nancy Martinez on the Quebec-based Matra label. The latter is distributed by CBS.

Laid Back is a Danish duo, described by Warner Bros' Production Manager Bill Johnston as "Euro-pop", which puts them in the category of ABBA and Boney M.

"The Quebec market discovered the Sunshine Reggae side themselves," explained Johnston. "They're so much more club-oriented. There was already interest in the single as an import before the domestic release."

Johnson explained that Sunshine Reggae had been the hit side in Europe resulting in the Quebec interest. The Sire label picked up the group for North America.

"We did our own coupling here," continues Johnson, "and because of the Montreal reaction we went with Sunshine Reggae. In the U.S., White Horse has been the cut all along, but they originally thought Sunshine Reggae was going to be the hit because of the European action."

Johnson pointed out that even with the battle with the cover, the single has gone gold and predicts the recent discovery of White Horse will push the single to the platinum level.

"It's been a long haul to get Canada interested in either song," he admitted. "It took a long time to break it in Europe as well. It all began at the club level. It's very danceable and when the clubs caught onto it, the flow increased."

programmer acceptance. Retail reports on the sales action of the album has resulted in major gains on the RPM 100.

The Nylons are: Claude Morrison, Arnold Robinson, Marc Connors and Paul Cooper. Seamless is their third album project and was released after their successful five-week tour of Australia. They are now off on a three-week tour of Europe which will be followed by a Canadian tour for June and July.

Percussion is the only instrumental work that can be heard on Seamless, but for the Nylons, their vocals are the instruments.

"I think our sound has evolved," noted Connors. "We wanted this album punchier, clearer and more vivid. The biggest thing I noticed about the album was the clarity of the vocals and drums. It's really an evolution for us. Just a desire to grow."

The album was almost four months in the making and includes Take Me To Your Heart, co-written by the Eurythmics' Annie Lennox and Dave Stewart; the old Shangri-Las' classic Remember (Walking In The Sand); the Lennon/McCartney ballad, This Boy; and Lamont Dozier's Stepping Stone.

Side Two of the album holds the group's originals which include Combat Zone, Perpetual Emotion and The Stars Are Ours.

"We've been doing a cappella for five years," said Connors, "and we've seen some

Culture Club's Colours sells 1 million units

Toronto: Culture Club's Colour By Numbers has set a record time for a band LP to reach the one million units sold mark. The diamond status was reached in just over six months. Grease still holds the record.

Notes CRIA President Brian Robertson, "Culture Club's Colour By Numbers is the fastest selling non-soundtrack album." The album set a precedent, a few weeks ago by becoming the first album in Canada to be certified for 800,000 units sold.

The album was boosted by the hit singles, Church Of The Poison Mind, Karma Chameleon, and the current single, Miss Me Blind. It's A Miracle, is expected to be taken as the next single, and released in late May.

Karma Chameleon is well over the double platinum mark while Miss Me Blind has surpassed gold. Meanwhile, the previous album, Kissing To Be Clever, is about to achieve triple platinum. The latter contains the hits Time and Do You Really Want To Hurt Me.

"Their latest album broke everywhere in Canada," said Virgin Canada President Bob Muir. "In Toronto it did well, real quickly, followed by Montreal. There was a big spurt in Montreal because of the concert. The album is selling pretty evenly across Canada now, but I want to thank all of Canada. The support was there from day one."

As to the secret of Culture Club's success, "Great music and a great image," continued Muir. "It's also the fact that people are accepting Boy George for his music. He's very intelligent, and well spoken."

dramatic increases. There may soon be a community of groups doing it.

"All vocal groups have contributed to a cappella's popularity. I've always loved to hear people singing - right back to the groups we imitated like The Supremes, Temptations and the Shirelles - they all put vocals up front. Even the Beatles used harmonies and driving vocals."

As to why the songs from the '60s have been particular favourites with the quartet, Connors explained, "It's what we prefer. We created a tradition out of it. We grew up with it as kids and it's the music we love. It's the sort of music that lends itself to a cappella - voice and rhythm. A lot of those old songs, like Gene Chandler's Duke Of Earl, used a lot of vocals. These types of songs also lend themselves to live performances, a sense of theatrics."

It's obvious that Canada is where the Nylons are most popular but the international market has shown more than a passing interest.

"It's unique that we've been able to start a following without a U.S. deal," continues Connors. "Plans are now underway for an American release of Seamless and indications are that this will be the LP to break us in the U.S. That's a good feeling. If this isn't the one, we'll make it the next."

Elsewhere the foursome has been garnering international attention in Germany, Holland, Belgium, Sweden, Australia and the U.K. Germany's music critics named them Vocal Group of the Year for 1983, and in Holland they were awarded the International Chartbreaker of the Year Award, the Dutch equivalent of a Grammy.

Seamless would appear to be well on its way to matching, or bettering the metal achievements of their initial 1979 self-titled Attic release and their second, One Size Fits All, both of which went platinum.

RCA introduces new palm-sized VCR camera

Toronto: RCA has introduced a palm-size video colour camera carrying a suggested retail price of \$1199.95. This product launch continues the company's emphasis on the portable video market.

Burt Prosser, Vice President of Canadian Sales Operations for RCA Sales Corp., indicated that the company plans to market its new simplified video camera to new VCR purchasers as well as current VCR owners who do not yet own a video camera. In commenting on consumers' concerns with respect to size and complexity in the purchase of any camera, Prosser said, "The unbelievable interest of the public in video products this past holiday season is further evidence to us a video camera that is not complicated or intimidating will have considerable appeal to the growing number of consumers who are eager and ready to enter the video market."

Prosser also indicated that the new CKCO20 camera, though small in size and weight, offers performance comparable to that of RCA's popular deluxe solid state camera.

A busy spring for CHML

Stan Genno, Promotion Manager for Hamilton's CHML and CKDS-FM, reports a busy spring with two major promotions underway. Radio Day 1984 proved to be a highly successful promotion with the five Hamilton/Burlington area radio stations working together along with the Hamilton Ad & Sales Club. Several hundred local retailers and national advertisers gathered for an afternoon and evening of seminars and workshops at the Royal Connaught Hotel. The Radio Bureau of Canada were the featured guests throughout the afternoon discussing topics including co-op advertising. Prizes of Panasonic radios, plus a trip for two to Hawaii were awarded to clients during the day. Hamilton Mayor Bob Morrow was on hand to proclaim the week of April 2nd, "Radio Week" in Hamilton. Doug Tigert, Dean of Faculty of Management Studies at the University of Toronto was the featured guest speaker, discussing the economic forecasts of the next few years.

On a lighter note, CHML & Mother's Pizza cooperated on a hefty pizza promotion for the Big Brothers Association of Hamilton. During the month of April, \$1.00 was donated to the Big Brothers new building fund from every Mother's Deep Dish Pizza sold. Mother's customers will be given a thank you card from Mother's and CHML with every dollar donated. The total monies raised was presented to the Big Brothers at the opening ceremonies of the new Big Brother's House (May 4).

Pandemonium through CFRW contest

All hell broke loose (April 15) when CFRW presented the Michael Jackson Moonwalk Contest at Assiniboine Park. The Manitoba capital hasn't seen a crush of bodies this large in years with a crowd estimated to be close to 20,000 shoving and pushing to cheer on their favourite. The contest, sponsored by CFRW, Garden City Shopping Centre and Twentieth Century Concepts, was organized earlier in April, to be staged in the Shopping Centre. Upwards of 10,000 spectators turned up to witness the contest, forcing organizers to postpone the event for a larger location, which was Assiniboine Park, two weeks later. The winner was 24-year old Jerry Borden, who lip-synched and moonwalked to Jackson's platinum single, Billie Jean. Borden won a trip for 2 to see Jackson "live" in concert and a Michael Jackson Thriller jacket. Runner-up was 10-year old Richard Langhorne and 2nd runner-up was 12-year old Venice Taberero, both of whom received Thriller jackets, compliments of The Tannery North in the Shops Of Winnipeg Square. Gerard Morcilla received a prize for the Best Costume and Borden also won the Michael Jackson look-alike prize.

Ron White returns with new single

Ron White, who first entered the record business in 1964 with his Tamarac single, Please Believe Me, marks his return to the recording business after a seven year absence. His vehicle, a Nashville-produced single, Not Guilty (Of Not Loving You) released on his own Lone Star label. The plug side, and the flip, Dreams Die Hard, were written by Cyril Rawson and published by ATV/Southward Music (P.R.O. Canada). The White single, now shipped across the country, was produced by Tony Migliore, who also provides keyboards on the session. White is now living in Omemee, Ontario.

MRB continues on the road

The Midnite Rodeo Band resumes touring in support of their RCA album, MRB 2, which spawned their current RPM Country 50 mover, Slow Lovin'. Manager Richard Watt reports good sales on both the album, their second for RCA and for the single, with country programmer action on the latter, stronger on their previous releases. May dates include Sundays in Regina from April 30 through May 5, followed by Esmeraldas in Lethbridge (7-12) and Calgary's Crossroads (21-26). The Vancouver-based band will return to the road at the end of June.

Stoneridge cutting new album

Stoneridge has been busy cutting their own album session at Thunder Bay's Stage 3 studios as well as supplying instrumental backing for several other acts. The band's Johnny Myers produced this session as well as those for new act Lois Garrity and Wendy Jenkins. He also produced The Great Gretzky (#99) by The Fanz, which in reality is Stoneridge's Wayne Faulconer

singing the Donny Sponcia lyrics. One of the surprises from the Ridge Records mailing is the response from Poland where the single is a priority with the state-owned radio. One of the cuts on the new Stoneridge album, One Of These Days, written by Sponcia, will be released as a single over the next few months for which a video shoot is being readied. In the meantime, Country Tune, taken from the group's self-titled album, will be released, probably within the next couple of weeks. Stage 3, a 16-track studio, is jointly owned by brothers Gilles and Mike Diagle, Ray Laponen and Doug Johnston. The latter looks after much of the engineering chores. Coming up for Myers is an album session with the Senior Music Makers, a group of 16 local senior citizens whose ages run from 64 through to 84. These talented oldsters perform on a variety of instruments including fiddles, guitars and piano.

U.S. moves quickly on Murray single

Anne Murray's latest Capitol single, Just Another Woman In Love, taken from her Little Good News album, has scored immediate chart and playlist adds with U.S. country programmers and is making impressive gains up the major trade charts. The single does not qualify as Cancon, which is probably the reason for the slow reaction by programmers on this side of the border. Many of the majors were late with her last hit, as well.

Opry North at the Forum

CFGM will present Opry North at the Ontario Place Forum (May 20) for two shows 4 and 7 pm. Acts firmed for the date are Albert Hall, The Good Brothers, Terry Sumsion, Kelita Haverland, Jerry Palmer, and Ron Nigrini, all of whom will be backed by the Opry North Band. CFGM has been producing Opry North since May of 1976 and is now established as the longest running country concert series in Canada as well as the premiere showcase for Cancon country music entertainers. Opry North is now syndicated at 30 stations across the country on a weekly basis.

Royalty singles released

New from the Edmonton-based Royalty label are singles from Laura Vinson and R. Harlan Smith. Laura's single, Adios Mexico is the title track from her new album, while R. Harlan's release is titled Just A Matter Of Time.



Siberry wrote most of the material with the exception of Extra Executives, which she co-wrote with bassist Switzer. The Waitress has been taken as the first single. A kaleidoscopic vision predominant in shades of orange and yellow, Cyndi Lauper certainly had a good time at this show: strutting and dancing her way across the stage, while singing in a beautifully modulated and magnificently pure voice. There is certainly creative depth here - from the melodic variations in her first single, *Girls Just Want To Have Fun*, to the unrestrained and joyous raunch of *Money Changes Everything*. Time After Time, her second single from the *She's So Beautiful* album, on CBS, displayed yet another facet of her ability to evoke passion and sentiment, without becoming too maudlin or sentimental. A larger and better-ventilated location would certainly be in order for her next appearance, something which can't occur too soon.

Some of their earlier material did however, retain their kick: *I Fought The Law* and *Safe European Home* were delivered with nothing short of ferocious commitment, while *Police On My Back* had portions of the crowd singing along on the refrain. Overall, this is a band in search of creative renewal. Perhaps the album expected in the fall will provide a base for a better run at maintaining the distinctive Clash pedigree.
