Cogeco and Shaw get pay radio green light

The Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission has come under harsh criticism from the Canadian music industry for granting licences to the country's first two pay audio programming services on June 25.

DMX Canada Ltd., a subsidiary of Shaw Cablesystems Ltd., and Cogeco Radio-Television Inc. will soon use digital technology to offer compact disc-quality sound to subscribers who purchase the 24-hour-a-day, commercial-free services through their cable

MuchMusic and Pepsi gather video votes

Voting for the MuchMusic Canadian Music Video Awards will have a new twist this year.

Beginning July 19 and running through Sept. 5, MuchMusic and the Pepsi Taste Patrol will join forces in offering Canadians a place to register their votes for this year's nominees.

Every time someone visits a local Pepsi Taste Patrol booth he or she will be asked to register a vote. While participants wait for their turn to register they can watch the nominees on a nearby video wall or read about them through on-site posters. They will also receive a flyer with instructions as to where they can phone for update information and details regarding the awards. The phone number will also be used as a voting vehicle.

Nominees for the five eligible awards -- best female, best male, best group, best video, and a special Pepsi Foundation Award -- will be announced mid-July.

Waltons impress Stein to land deal with Sire

A recent hot performance by The Waltons at Toronto's Ultrasound Showbar has landed the band a deal with Sire Records.

The band, whose Warner Music Canada's *Lik My Trakter* album is at #82 after 19 weeks on the RPM 100 Albums chart, impressed Sire boss Seymour Stein so much with their set that he phoned to sign them to a worldwide deal the next morning after flying back to New York City. Sire is distributed in Canada by Warner Music Canada.

But the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA), Canadian Independent Record Production Association (CIRPA), Canadian Music Publishers Association (CMPA) and Association québécoise de l'industrie du disque, du spectacle et de la vidéo (ADISQ) jointly plan to appeal to Cabinet to request that the decision be overturned and that the CRTC be directed to hold a public hearing to discuss and evaluate the eventual introduction of various types of pay and subscription radio services to Canada and the impact these will have on Canadian cultural industries.

Among the major concerns with the licensing of the two services are: a lack of sufficient Canadian content; inadequate compensation for copyright holders; no compensation for performers, producers or record companies; direct competition with retail recorded music outlets; and the potential for increased home taping.

CRIA, CIRPA, CMPA and ADISQ have also requested a meeting with Prime Minister Kim Campbell and Heritage Minister Monique Landry to discuss their concerns and get feedback from the government on the CRTC

CMPA raises concerns over split jurisdiction

In reducing the size of her cabinet, Prime Minister Kim Campbell has divided the jurisdiction of the Department of Communications so that telecommunications goes to the new Department of Industry and Science, and broadcasting policy goes to the new Department of Canadian Heritage, which will oversee the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission.

David Basskin, legal advisor to the Canadian Music Publishers Association, has written the prime minister to express the organization's concerns with the split.

"The CRTC's role in licensing cable and telecom, and its treatment of cultural policy issues is itself an indivisible amalgam of 'hardware' and 'software' questions," he writes. "In our view it is crucial that the regulator be under the jurisdiction of a single Department with formal jurisdiction over all the areas touched upon by the Commission.

"The division of these subjects into the jurisdiction of two different Ministers will result in more than a division of responsibility; it will result in the development of separate agendas for the development of these industries -- while their interests and activities continue what looks to be an inexorable process of merger and convergence.

"We urge you to reconsider this decision and to restore the treatment of telecommunications and cultural policy issues to a single Department. This is not time to unplug the Government's consideration and handling of cultural issues from the most important technological developments in the last fifty years."

Montreal's Isba label signs Too Bad To Be True

Toronto-based Too Bad To Be True has signed to Montreal's Isba Records, which is distributed in Canada by Sony Music.

The four boys in the multi-racial group are Jeremy Robinson, Al Cox, Frankie Scarcelli and Ishaka Dodd. All from Toronto's inner city ghetto, the boys range in age from 11 to 14. They have been singing, dancing and rapping together for the last two years.

A self-titled album is expected to be ready by late summer. The album was recorded at several studios and with various producers: five tracks by KSG; four by Peter and Anthony Davis; two by Peter Willis; and one each by Kevin Ungar and Al Kussin, Lascelle Stephens and Clive Lashley, and Lionel Job. Geoff Kulawick of Warner/Chappell Music was executive producer. Warner/Chappell Music holds the publishing on the band's material.

Outside of Canada, the band has signed with Cold Chillin' Records/Warner Music.

The four youngsters are co-managed by Steve Propas and Greg Van Riel.





grape, believe me. (*Red wine and sex by voice mail . . . GREAT!!!*)

A lot of great on-air and production talent is walking and, in more than a few cases, getting back into radio is very very tough. Terry Kelly riding wave of success from the Maritimes

Canada's east coast has long been known for its traditional Celtic and Gaelic-influenced music. And within the last year the region has witnessed a feeding frenzy by record labels trying to gobble up guitar-driven alternative rock bands. But at this year's East Coast Music Awards it was an unassuming contemporary country artist from Newfoundland who grabbed the spotlight.

Terry Kelly won in each of the five categories he was nominated in and took home the awards for top male vocalist, top country artist, top live act, song of the year for *In My Father's House*, and best album for *Divided Highway*. "One would have been nice," Kelly says about his unprecedented feat. "I was pleasantly surprised."

But anyone who knows Kelly shouldn't be surprised by his accomplishments. In addition to his musical talents, Kelly was the third blind person to run the mile in under five minutes, was a member of the Canadian Disabled Olympic Team in 1980, and is an avid skier.

This isn't *Sports Illustrated*, however, so it's Kelly's musical background which we'll focus on.

Lenny Solomon Quintet plays at Toronto club

The Lenny Solomon Quintet takes over Toronto's Top O' The Senator from July 6-11.

The dates mark the quintet's first club appearances in a year-and-a-half following more than 40 concert stops in Canada and the United States.

The quintet comprises Shelly Berger on bass, Brian Dickinson on keyboards, Ted Quinlan on guitar, Jerry Fuller on drums and Solomon on violin.

CFMX to air HMV's classical hits chart

Beginning July 3, CFMX-FM will air the HMV Classical Chart of Classical Hits, which will then become a standard on-air feature every Saturday at 1 p.m.

The weekly one-hour feature will be hosted by John Devenish. The chart's listings are compiled from the previous week's 33 top selling classical music recordings at HMV's Toronto superstore.

"CFMX, Canada's only 24-hour dedicated classical music radio station, and the HMV Toronto superstore have joined forces to serve the ever-growing classical listening public," says John van Driel, the Cobourg, Ont.-based station's program manager. "Finally the oldest musical form has a Canadian chart. We now have a list that reflects Toronto's classical music preferences."

The chart and charted recordings will be on display and available at HMV's superstore. The chart will also be available at CFMX's Toronto studios as well as many HMV stores throughout southern Ontario.

As a youngster at the Halifax School For The Blind, Kelly helped form The Stringbusters, a band which played traditional and country music. Kelly played accordion and the group built up such a local following that it went to Toronto to record. After a week-long session for the aptly named Marathon Records, The Stringbusters completed five albums. "I'm not ashamed of two of them," Kelly admits during a recent visit to RPM's offices. "The rest I hide."

Kelly also played with a rock group called Janus. But he still wanted to sing, and the only way that was going to happen was to become a solo act. Performing in clubs and bars proved lucrative enough to help him work his way through Saint Mary's University where he was studying for a degree in psychology.

Although Kelly's psychology background is evident when you speak to him, his love of music is even more apparent. That love led him to release his first solo album, *On The Move*, in 1984. *Face To Face* followed four years later. Songs from both albums enjoyed radio play in the Maritimes, but it wasn't until the release of *Divided Highway* last October that Kelly, for whatever reason, became a noticeable factor on the national country scene.

Kelly was quite focused when recording *Divided Highway*, and he says it's the most honest album he's ever made, but he insists it's not that radically different from his past efforts. "I've been doing this music for eight years, and people called it too eclectic and all over the place and that it was hard for radio stations to put it in a slot. Now, with the new country, I seem to fit in a little better."

National radio exposure, coupled with his ECMA success, is also making the major

record labels start to take notice. *Divided Highway* was released independently by Gun Records and has sold almost 10,000 copies, but Kelly has been frustrated with the difficulties of national distribution. "We've had lots of calls from people across the country who can't find the album. It's a slow process when you're an independent."

Kelly is currently on the RPM 100 Country chart with Kelita doing a duet called *We Can Do Anything*. The song has special meaning for him, as it's also the name of a show he performs at schools to promote students' self-esteem. It has struck such a chord that many high schools have used the song as their graduation theme.

"Although it's a positive love song," Kelly explains, "it's also a song that talks about the importance of having a good relationship with yourself. It's also a song of hope and belief, that if you want to do something in life, you can do it."

While shopping for a major label deal on both sides of the border, Kelly has learned some valuable lessons which he believes fellow Maritime musicians are also catching on to. "People in the east coast music industry have discovered, in the last five years, that there's more to the industry than just singing and playing.

"You have to get the business end of things together and you have to network with people across the country and around the world. The music has always been in the east, but it never really got out based on the lack of management."

Kelly is managed by his brother Tony out of his T.K. Productions office in Halifax. But he's not ashamed to admit that they've asked for some advice along the way from such managerial heavy-hitters as Brookes Diamond (Rankin Family) and Leonard Rambeau (Anne Murray, George Fox, Rita MacNeil). "If you go after information and you're positive and people see that you're trying to make things happen, and if they feel you have credibility and integrity, people in the industry are exceptionally receptive to helping."

Kelly will be in Nashville to work with some songwriters for a couple of weeks this summer and he'll also play a handful of dates before embarking on a national tour in the early fall. He plans to start recording his next album in January.

Chance to forge important East European link - by Randal Eastman

Russian CD industry an untapped opportunity

Gone are the days when selling to the former Soviet Union meant taking your money out as bottles of vodka or tins of caviar. This possibility may still exist, but much more attractive for the Westerner now is the opportunity to capitalize on demand within the new Russian business elite for hard currency products that appeal to their egos and tastes.

Given the demographics of this vast country and the near absence of high quality recordings available on any medium, it comes as a surprise that Western firms have not yet moved in to take advantage of such a tremendous opportunity.

Westerners continue to be shown newscasts depicting the poorer majority of Russians -- those in long queues for bread, their clothes threadbare -- struggling to survive the turbulent changes that have overtaken their country. Yet there is another side to the story -- the side that prefers fine European suits and silk ties from Italy -- the wealthy nouveau riche that, through energy and entrepreneurial spirit, have amassed fat bank accounts by satisfying the needs of their fellow citizens. This is the clientele that the Western music industry can profitably cultivate.

Calculations by consultants at Four One Company in London, Ont. estimate that from a total population of about 290 million people in the former Soviet Union, roughly three million can afford to and would be willing to purchase high quality recorded music. Demand for greater selection and supply of both audiotape and compact discs is strong; so much so, in fact, that recent indicators show CD player sales outstripping those of discs themselves. Purchasers remain predominantly young and male and represent the overwhelming majority of this new wealthy class of independent business people.

Meanwhile, the domestic market has been slow to react. Where once it was dominated by the state-run monopolist Melodiya, it has now been overrun by small entrepreneurs operating out of street kiosks and private shops. These young people predominantly sell mediocre cassettes of re-recorded pirated music.

Sometimes they include a limited selection of new or used CDs or pre-recorded audio tapes, rarely with inventories greater than 20-30 titles and usually with no rhyme or reason for their selection.

Prices remain high, ranging between \$12 and \$15 U.S. (almost the equivalent of a worker's monthly salary). Despite the attractiveness of entering such a market, the giant Melodiya still chooses to primarily produce vinyl, with only a handful of unpopular CD titles and even fewer audio tapes. Supplies are short. Piracy is now the name of the game and the biggest losers seem to be consumers who have nowhere to turn for quality pre-recorded music.

This is quite striking when one looks at the growth of the local music scene. Western music is still very popular. However, following the breakdown of the old regime, the forbidden novelty has worn off somewhat. At home, perhaps due to the rise in popularity of music videos and their prominent role in spotlighting new artists, there has been a dramatic increase in the number of nationally famous Russian pop stars. These are pursued even more avidly than their Western counterparts because their music echoes the frustrations and heartache of their struggling listeners much better than that of the West. Fans flock to their concerts, are glued to their videos, and gobble up their music when they can chance upon it in the streets, even though its production quality is even lower on the scale.

Looking at the manufacturing arena, it appears wide open. Where hard currency goods (or their equivalent) are concerned, opportunities abound to make deals and ensure the supply of raw materials. Finding shelf space in retail outlets isn't a problem. All across the former Soviet Union are thousands of retail outlets that will bend over backwards,

given the chance, to dedicate a portion of their store facilities for the sale of hard currency goods -- especially those that will likely yield repeat sales.

Profit potential looks great and a variety of methods exist for the Western firm wishing to capitalize on the situation. Through the use of equity joint ventures and other forms of investment, Western companies can move in to satisfy demand both for domestic and imported products. And by entering the market now, they can establish a strong manufacturing and distribution network and bring economic and political muscle to bear on the piracy problem.

Overall, careful market analysis and thorough groundwork remain the keys to success in the uncharted waters of the ex-Soviet republics.

Gogh Van Go will be released in Europe in September.

The officers on the 1993-94 board are: president Jason Sniderman (vice-president of Roblan Distributing Ltd.); vice-president Roy Hennessy (vice-president and general manager of CFRB Radio); treasurer Tom Berry (president of Alert Records and Management); and secretary Doug Ackhurst (group vice-president of Telemedia).

The directors are: Duff Roman (FACTOR past president and vice-president of industry affairs for CHUM Limited); Brian Chater (CIRPA president); Pegi Ceconi (vice-president of Anthem Entertainment); John Redmond (professional manager of PolyGram Music Publishing, Inc.); Terry McBride (president of Nettwerk Productions); Sandy Sanderson (executive vice-president of the eastern division of Rogers Broadcasting Limited); and Vince DiMaggio (general

manager of CFNY Radio).

Ceconi has replaced Terry Flood as one of CIRPA's appointees to the board and Redmond takes over the CMPA seat recently held by Wayne Patton.

FACTOR has also formed a national advisory board which has a mandate to assist, advise and support the organization in its endeavours to continue building the infrastructure of the Canadian independent music industry, both nationally and internationally. The board will make recommendations regarding program changes, promote increased communication within Canada about FACTOR and its francophone counterpart Musicaction, assist with lobby efforts, work with local music industry associations to educate the music industry about FACTOR and its programs, and promote interactive communication and awareness of all music industry initiatives. The board will consist of representatives of provincial music industry associations.





Australian band here for cross-country tour

Weddings Parties Anything has loyal Canadian ties

The members of Weddings Parties Anything don't totally remember their last trip to Canada, but they're looking forward to playing here again this summer to support their new album, *Difficult Loves*.

The Australian band, which has drawn favourable comparisons to the Pogues and The Men They Couldn't Hang, has built up a solid Canadian following over the course of the three albums released by Warner Music Canada since the mid '80s. Canadians haven't seen an album from the group, however, since 1989's *The Big Don't Argue*. But even though we haven't heard much of the band in that time, the boys have been far from idle.

After *The Big Don't Argue*, Warner in Australia dropped the band. It subsequently recorded an EP of covers for Virgin, but then went through a bit of a bleak period. Eventually, Weddings decided to record another original album which it financed on its own. After peddling the album around, it was picked up by Australia's rooArt label last year.

Difficult Loves has now almost reached gold status *Down Under* and a single from the album, *Father's Day*, was recently given the ARIA (equivalent to our Juno) song of the year award. "It's a heavyweight title," explains

Alpert and Moss depart the label they founded

Chairperson Jerry Moss and vice-chairperson Herb Alpert have stepped down from their executive roles at A&M Records to pursue other interests.

Alpert and Moss (A&M) formed the label in 1962 with the release of *Lonely Bull* by Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass. They have since become involved with a number of other projects, including their worldwide music publishing enterprise, Rondor Music International.

Moss will no longer serve as a member of PolyGram NV's board of management after he and Alpert reached an amicable agreement with PolyGram's president and chief executive officer, Alain Levy. PolyGram bought A&M in January 1990 and Al Cafaro, who was appointed president later that year, will continue to direct the company.

The Band's new album scheduled for the fall

The Band has just finished its first album since *The Last Waltz* and will be showcasing some new material on July 16 at Ontario Place in Toronto.

The new album, which was recorded at Levon Helm's studio in Woodstock, N.Y., will be released by Warner this fall. Helm, Garth Hudson, Rick Danko and Richard Bell took part in the recording and will also be the major part of the live band. The Hooters and fiddler Vassar Clements guest on the album.

A box set of The Band's older material is also scheduled for a fall release from EMI.

The song was written by singer/guitarist Mick Thomas -- a man whose songwriting skills U2's Bono is said to be envious of -- about a single father who only gets to see his son on Saturdays. "It's a common experience that's either happening to you or someone you know about," Lawler says. "It's quite universal and I think that's one of the reasons why it became popular."

Vancouver AM radio goes through two more changes

Vancouver's COAST 1040 has been sold and will leave its modern rock format behind come Oct. 1.

Western World Communications -- which also owns radio stations in Saskatoon, Edmonton, Regina and Winnipeg -- had looked for a partner to assist COAST in filing a second application to move to FM but was unable to come up with one. The station's initial FM application was denied by the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission in February, which was a major reason for it going on the market.

The company was approached by a still unnamed buyer and a deal was closed last week. Paul Forster, the station's interim general manager, could not disclose what new format the station will take in the fall.

Twenty people were let go from the station, leaving just three full-time office staff behind. Forster says COAST will continue its current format until the change by using a still undetermined number of part-time operators to keep music on the air. He says a couple of the station's recently departed announcers have also expressed some interest in maintaining on-air roles until the end of the summer.

David Marsden and Jamie Ufton launched modern rock at COAST several years ago and, in the last two years, it had been increasing its listener base.

"If what we started at COAST dies it will be a sad day for Vancouver musicians and listeners," Ufton says. "If this music is lost on radio completely then it is also a gloomy day for radio. COAST has given a very bright spotlight to the local music as well as the international music that other radio ignores. It is very important for the newer artists to get heard, otherwise we will be listening to Sgt. Pepper for the next hundred years."

Marsden and Ufton anticipate returning to Vancouver broadcasting with "something distinctive in the very near future."

Music on AM was struck another blow when CKLG, owned by Edmonton's Shaw Radio, changed its format from CHR to become "Vancouver's New Talk Radio" last week. The station will blend AC material between community-focused talk shows, phone-ins and light news.

The single and its accompanying video were out in early June and the album was released by Warner on June 15. "They've been pretty loyal," Lawler says in praise of the label. "Warner in Canada is the only company that's put out all of our albums. Not even in Australia has a company done that."

Over the years the band has also made a lot of friends in Canada with its mixture of rock, pop, folk and Celtic musical styles. "It's always been a place that we're very fond of," Lawler says, citing the band's song *Saturday Night In Halifax* and a reference to Toronto in a new track, *The Four Corners Of The Earth*.

"It was great getting off the plane and driving into Toronto because I knew that there were people I could ring up and go and see. We went out and had a bit of a party with the Bourbon Tabernacle Choir and I also met up with Dave Bidini of the Rheostatics."

Lawler mentions the Rheostatics, 13 Engines and The Lowest of the Low (a band they'll be sharing a bill with for two nights at Lee's Palace in Toronto on July 7 and 8) as examples of how domestic music has improved

since he last toured here in 1990.

"The music scene here, to my mind, is far healthier than it was the last time I was here. A lot of the indie bands are really coming on. And to see that opening up can only be good for a band like us. People are a little broader in their tastes these days, it would appear."

As well as the Toronto dates, Weddings will play in Ottawa (July 9), Montreal (10), Sudbury (14), Winnipeg (16-17), Edmonton (20), Calgary (21) and Vancouver (23). What can people expect of the live shows from this boisterous quintet?

"They're like a three-ring circus," Lawler laughs. "We still manage to make people happy and make them jump up and down and dance."

But, he confesses with just the slightest hint of guilt, there could be one small difference on this trip. "I guess we might be a little bit more sober this time. I've seen some photographic and videotaped evidence of the last time we were here and it seems like there was a bit of misbehaving going on.

"But we're back and we're better than ever. I just can't wait to start playing over here."

Depeche Mode tour will be launched in Montreal

Depeche Mode will kick off the North American leg of their *Devotional* world tour at the Forum in Montreal on Sept. 8.

The British band will also play the SkyDome in Toronto on Sept. 15 in support of its current *Songs Of Faith and Devotion* album. The group has expanded its traditional synthesizer set-up to feature an actual drum kit and more guitars in the two-hour-plus show that travels through much of the band's catalogue. The multi-levelled stage used in the show was designed by photographer/video director Anton Corbijn and comes complete with multiple projection screens displaying his film and video images.

XL Radio's Community Club Awards has just completed a successful 13-week campaign during which more than \$29,000 in cash prizes were awarded to participating non-profit ad service organizations. The two big winners were the Calgary Interfaith Food Bank and the Calgary Roundup Band, who won \$2,000 each from the Canada Safeway Awards. More than 100 club members joined together for the pay-off party on May 29. Club winners received cheques ranging from \$10 to \$2,000. Golden West Broadcasting owner Elmer Hildebrand was on hand to congratulate the winners. The Community Club Awards is a fundraising project open to non-profit clubs and service organizations in Calgary interested in earning money. CHUM-FM airs Rick Dees' weekly Top 40 Countdown. The weekly feature made its debut on July 4 and will run each Sunday at 6 and 10 p.m. Dees, a Los Angeles morning radio personality, hosts the four-hour weekly program that features the week's biggest hits from the Radio and Records chart. The program is heard around the world by an estimated five million listeners each week.

Ronald Cohen, a prominent Montreal lawyer and film and television producer, has been named the new chair of the Canadian Broadcast Standards Council. He replaces Mimi Fullerton, who held the post since private broadcasters set up the council in 1990. The CBSC, the first organization of its kind in the world, promotes high standards of programming and community service, deals with public complaints, administers industry codes and helps broadcasters cope with social issues. Cohen is president of CinéCiné Productions, a Montreal-based production company.

Toronto's Light 97.3 is now playing 100 per cent pop vocal music in accordance with a recent CRTC decision. The news of the relaxing of the regulations was timely, coming on the heels of the spring BBM book which revealed the station increased its overall weekly hours tuned from 2.78 million to 3.37 million. Jay R. Jackson, executive vice-president of Redmond Broadcasting, points out that this growth

represents "an increase of almost a full share-point" by the station in all Toronto tuning. In the highly competitive 25-54 age demographic, the station increased its hours tuned by "a significant 34 per cent. This represents increased tuning levels by both men 25-54 (a 62 per cent increase) and women 25-54 (a 17 per cent increase)." Jackson expects further ratings increases "now that we can play 100 per cent vocal music on the station."

Y95 crowned Nu Hippies as Future Classics '93 champions. The band was selected following a four-night live showcase tour of Ontario nightclubs by six Future Classic contest finalists: the Tom Barlow Band, T.O. Joker, The Twisters, Tribal Son, and The Redeemers. The winning band was awarded \$10,000, a \$20,000 video production, \$5,000 in music equipment and a recording session at Hamilton's Grant Avenue Studio. There were more than 300 entries, from which 50 were selected for airplay and 12 semi-finalists were included on Y95's Future Classics compact disc. The entire project was documented on Y95's Future Classics, a one-hour radio/television simulcast which aired on Y95 and CHCH-TV. The CD is now on sale for \$9.50 at area Subway Sandwich locations and at the

The X Men won cash, a trophy and the opportunity to perform at Caribana's Olympic Island Caribbean Music Festival (Aug. 2), the Warm-Up Party in Nathan Phillips Square (July 23), and on CityTV's Electric Circus.

May is positive again for shipments and sales

Shipments and the net sales value of prerecorded music were down in May from the month before, but were still up from May 1992 according to figures released by the Canadian Recording Industry Association.

Shipments of music videos, cassette singles, other singles, cassettes, compact discs, digital compact cassettes and Mini-Discs amounted to 3.55 million units, as compared to 3.78 million for April. May shipments were up seven per cent over last May.

The net value of May sales was \$31.28 million, as compared to \$36.1 million for April. The net value was eight per cent above last May's total.

For the year, shipments are up five per cent over 1992 while the net sales value is up 10 per cent. "We're still happy with the forward progress," says CRIA president Brian Robertson. "There's a lot more positive attitude at the retail level."

Shipments of music videos dropped noticeably in May but are still substantially ahead of last year. Cassette and other singles continued their steep decline, while cassettes again showed renewed growth. Only about 1,000 DCCs and Mini-Discs have been shipped so far.

The station opened its studios for the above artists and hundreds of others to perform their music live on-air.




HOLLY COLE TRIO - Jazz
Don't Smoke In Bed
 Alert - 72 81020-F
 Vocalist Holly Cole, pianist Aaron Davis and string bassist David Piltch have taken another step towards bringing jazz into the pop mainstream with their third album. While Cole's voice may not rank among the greats in the classical sense, the woman knows how to play with words and emotions in a way that allows her to penetrate where others can only pull off glancing blows. The first single is a cover of Johnny Nash's I Can See Clearly Now, which hit #1 in 1972. The Trio's stirring arrangement is at #44 in just its second week on the RPM 100 Hit Tracks chart. A 17-piece string ensemble rounds out the sound on the song as well as on Blame It On My Youth. David Lindley contributes some lap steel guitar on the mellow Don't Let The Teardrops Rust Your Shining Heart. A guest harmonica solo by Howard Levy lifts The Tennessee Waltz. Art Avalos adds some Latin percussion to Rodgers & Hart's Ev'rything I've Got. Another Canadian, Mary Margaret O'Hara, wrote So And So, a bouncy number with an a cappella bridge. Cole's smoky, playful version of Doris Day's Que Sera Sera and Cry (If You Want To) also stand out. The album was recorded at Toronto's Reaction Studios and was produced by David Was of Was (Not Was). - SM



PAUL WESTERBERG - Rock/Pop
14 Songs
 Sire/Reprise - CDW 45255
 Westerberg was always considered to be the creative genius behind the Replacements and their great albums of the '80s but, with the recent eye-opening release from ex-Mats drummer Chris Mars and bassist Tommy Stinson's Bash & Pop project, that role may have to be re-examined. I'm certainly not saying that this is a bad album, just that my expectations were perhaps too high. 14 Songs follows along the same lines as the last couple of Replacements albums, with a mix of well-written mid-tempo songs and rockers, though these are less out-and-out raucous than his earlier Mats efforts. And don't go looking for anything as overly poppy as Dyslexic Heart from last year's Singles soundtrack. The first video is for World Class Fad, a song aimed at alternative radio. Silver Naked Ladies, a bar room bluesy rock tune with some ivory tinkling by Ian McLagen, is headed for AOR, while Runaway Wind will hit CHR. The lead track, Knockin On Mine, has a Rolling Stones R&B sound. Joan Jett adds backing vocals to Someone I Once Knew. A Few Minutes Of Silence, Mannequin Shop and Down Love are other recommended cuts from this Westerberg/Matt Wallace (Faith No More) production. In Black Eyed Susan, a demo recorded in Westerberg's kitchen, he's

singing about Susan dancin', not leggy blonde actress/singer Susan Anton. - SM



BILLY RAY CYRUS - Country
Won't Be The Last
 Mercury-314 514 758-Q
 Achy Breaky Heart may have caused a bit of a rift in Nashville circles, but Billy Ray Cyrus kick-started a music genre that was entering a new phase. He popularized country in his own way and he continues here with a bit more of a rock edge. Cyrus is as much new country as he is traditional and contemporary, and don't be too surprised at crossover action into the adult/pop world. Cyrus is obviously still on a roll and to prove he's no one-trick pony, In The Heart Of A Woman, the first single, is now bouncing up the charts like his first ground-breaker. With more than nine million of his Some Gave All albums sold worldwide, 850,000 in Canada alone, Cyrus could surprise his critics with this release. He harnessed the harmony support of the Jordanaires on a key track called When I'm Gone. Also key is the ballad Somebody New. The title track has single potential as well. Don't hide this one in the country section. It deserves front-racking. - WG



CRIMSON JIMSON - Heavy Rock
Blunt Trauma
 Crimson Records - CJ 002-CD
 This band from Hamilton, Ont. formed in 1988 by playing R.E.M. covers but has since gone in a decidedly heavier direction to perform what it calls "power grunge." The group's punk influences were evident in last year's Freak album, but the tempo of the songs has decreased as their volume has been cranked up. There's not a whole lot to differentiate between these six plodding heavy rock songs. Blunt Trauma was produced by the band and Strait Jacket's Julius Butty at Highland Studios in Stoney Creek, Ont. - SM



HARMONY CATS - Country
Original Motion Picture Soundtrack
 A&M - 314540117-Q
 What could be the best hook for success with this album is missing. There's no indication of what tracks are Cancon, although it has to be assumed that with the

players, and some of the writers, most tracks qualify as two-part anyway. Lisa Brokop is the big winner here, performing, mostly with One Horse Blue, on six of the 11 tracks. The movie, aside from its future video potential, is secondary to the music tracks. Vancouver producer Bill Buckingham obviously has a handle on country music and how best to present it. Gilles Godard teamed with Robert Ellis Orrall in writing a key track called We've Got What It Takes, performed by Brokop and One Horse Blue. Billy "Bud" Cowsill and Jeffrey Hatcher of The Blue Shadows co-wrote Embers, another number with single potential, which is performed by Jim Byrnes and One Horse Blue. Hagood Hardy is also represented with Time To Come Back Home, with Marty Gillan supplying the lyrics for this Brokop/One Horse Blue performance, which should be another focus track. This one shouldn't fall through the cracks. A heavy promotional campaign could bring this album into prominence. - WG




ELEVENTH DREAM DAY - Rock/Pop

 Atlantic - 7 82480-2-P
 This Chicago band has been around for a decade and has released two independent efforts and two previous albums for Atlantic. The band is comprised of the husband and wife team of Rick Rizzo (guitar/vocals) and Janet Beveridge Bean (drums/percussion/vocals), as well as Douglas McCombs (bass/vocals) and Matthew O'Bannon (guitar/vocals). El Moodio was produced by Jim Rondinelli (Matthew Sweet, Odds) and he has mixed the band's Velvet Underground influences with offbeat pop signatures to make an intriguing album. The first single, Makin Like A Rug, features some hard-edged guitars in somewhat discordant arrangements. Bean's flat, stern vocal approach makes the song stand out, and more use of her voice through the album would have given it more variety and added further to its distinctiveness. After This Time Is Gone is probably the most pop-oriented song on the album. Rizzo and O'Bannon impress with their guitar interplay on That's The Point. Figure It Out is a ballad which is broken up in parts by some more inspiring guitar noise. The Raft should get rid of that sinking feeling. - SM



DIANA KRALL - Jazz
Stepping Out
 Justin Time - JUST 50-2
 This 28-year-old Nanaimo, B.C. native has studied piano and played with some of the bigger names in jazz, and this debut album shows her to be an artist who should also have some marquee value in the not too distant future. Krall recorded Stepping Out in Los Angeles with drummer Jeff Hamilton and bassist John Clayton. The two complement and enhance her confident and technically proficient keyboarding to make for a solid trio. The material ranges from Rodgers and Hart's This Can't Be

'Love and the Ellington/David composition, I'm Just A Lucky So And So, to lesser-known songs such as Klaus Suonsaari's Big Foot. Krall was responsible for the arrangements and also wrote Jimmie, a tribute to both her father and mentor Jimmie Rowles. Krall's mature vocal approach belies her relative youth and her distinct phrasing is keenly evident from start to finish. Frank Sinatra is one of her vocal influences and nowhere is this more evident than in her soothingly funky version of Nat 'King' Cole's Straighten Up And Fly Right. Legendary jazz bassist Ray Brown supplied the liner notes. - SM



BARBRA STREISAND - Adult/Pop
Back To Broadway
 Columbia-44189-H
 When it comes to interpreting the essence of Broadway in song, Streisand is a natural. The music from Broadway masters literally bounce off these tracks with a new vitality from South Pacific's Some Enchanted Evening, Guys And Dolls' I've Never Been In Love Before and Luck Be A Lady, Lady Be Good's The Man I Love, Our Touch Of Venus' Speak Low, and an incredibly intense and magic duet with Michael Crawford on The Music Of The Night from The Phantom Of The Opera. Eight years have passed since Streisand released The Broadway Album, one of her biggest sellers. The release of this album is timely. Most of the album was produced by Streisand and David Foster, but she did call on the production expertise of Andrew Lloyd Webber for With One Look and As If We Never Said Goodbye, two songs from his upcoming musical, Sunset Boulevard. Streisand attracts an all-important demographic and she could have the big seller of the year. - WG



THE TEA PARTY - Rock
Splendor Solis
 EMI - E2 0777 7 89419 27-F
 This power trio from Windsor, Ont. plays a mix of progressive rock and heavy blues fused with music from the Middle East and other cultures. Singer/guitarist Jeff Martin has a voice that's often reminiscent of Jim Morrison and his lyrics often follow those of the Lizard King's into spiritual and mystical realms. Martin also produced the album. The River is the first emphasis track but, for me, the highlight of this 11-song package is the soaring Save Me, which has also received some airplay. Raven Skies and the flourishing coda to Sun Going Down also stand out among the rather lengthy tracks. Martin aptly displays his skill on acoustic guitar on Winter Solstice, a traditional sounding instrumental. While Splendor Solis acts as a good introduction to the band, it's in a live setting where The Tea Party becomes transcendent. And, in a clever marketing ploy, EMI has included a coupon with the album which can be sent in exchange for admission to an upcoming concert. - SM

Two-way race. Janet Jackson's *That's The Way Love Goes* maintains the No. 1 spot on the Hit Tracks chart for the sixth week. Rod Stewart's *Have I Told You Lately* is right behind and appears ready to take over the top spot next week.

Teamwork pays off. *Love Is* by Vanessa Williams and Brian McKnight drops off the chart after an impressive 20 weeks, including three weeks at No. 3. There are still four songs on the Hit Tracks chart on which two or more artists collaborated. Name them.

Back with a bang! The Billy Ray Cyrus bashers will have to take a back seat again as Cyrus keeps proving to be as popular as any artist. His second album, *It Won't Be The Last*, has the highest debut at No. 15.

One of the originals. The second-highest entry on the Albums chart comes from the Dave Clark Five. *Glad All Over Again* enters at No. 27. DC5 has the distinction of having two songs on the very first RPM chart back in June of 1964. *Do You Love Me* was No. 13 and *Can't You See That She's Mine* was No. 26. The Four Seasons was the only other act to have two songs on the premier chart.

Jon Secada re-discovered. For the second week in a row, the biggest jump on the Albums chart comes from Jon Secada. 





Vancouver's Rick Tippe was honoured at the recent British Columbia Country Music Awards with the Ray McAuley Memorial Horizon Award. The award is presented annually to the province's most promising new artist. Tippe, who saw national chart action earlier this year with his debut single After All These Years, has completed a studio album in Nashville which is scheduled for a fall release.

Donna Kay's debut album, Out Of The Blue, has been released on her own Donna Kay Music label, which is based in Pierceland, Saskatchewan in the summer and Okotoks, Alberta in the winter. Just Enough Rope, written by Karen Staley and Steve Dean, is the two-part Cancon (AP) focus track. Kay produced six tracks at Calgary's Soundwerkes Studio, while Keith Zink produced the remaining four tracks at Crossfire Studio in Edmonton. Kay's first single, Little By Little, is another two-part Cancon track (AP) which was written by Rick Bowles and James House and was featured as part of the Nashville North Project. The positive response to this release resulted in Kay setting up a schedule to write and gather new material for this album. The album includes three tracks that are four-part Cancon: Dreams, a Kay original; Love Crazy, written by Graham Sweetapple and Nick Partridge; and Hunger, from the writing team of Cyril Rawson and Scott Phelps.
