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

New vinyl pressing plant targets 12" dance market

Acme Vinyl Corporation, an independent 12" vinyl pressing plant, has been set up in Toronto to assist Cancon dance acts in getting their product to the streets quicker than at the import level.

Vinyl is the most important tool used by club DJs to play music, even though it has essentially been phased out at the major label level and at radio stations.

A number of indie businessmen,

including the Stickmen and John Acquaviva of +8 Records, have set up the plant located in Markham, Ontario.

For the most part, the managers indicate that the major labels will still rely on outside sources for the majority of promotional product. However, the owners also note that the plant will be useful for Cancon dance product and special four-to-six track double-sided vinyl used to promote compilation CDs.

Vancouver's Moist signs to EMI Music Canada

The group Moist has signed a multi-album, worldwide deal with EMI Music Canada.

Moist, currently riding a major industry buzz that saw a number of bidders in contention for its signing, has seen the video for Push in heavy rotation at MuchMusic. In addition, the group has pushed sales of its debut independent cassette, Silver, over the 4,000 mark, has toured across Canada, and recently played a highly regarded showcase at SxSW in Austin.

"The five people in the group are very focused, insightful and intelligent in terms of all sides of the business," notes Tim Trombley, vice-president of A&R at EMI. He also points out that EMI has been following the group for more than a year, after it hooked itself up with Michael McCarty and EMI Music Publishing.

"We think they're incredible," he adds, and feels that four singles deep is a possibility for the album which EMI will run in its identical condition

EMI Canada has secured a strong commitment from its sister company, ERG, based in New York, for a US release.

"The development curve for Moist happened quickly," says Trombley, "and that's a result of the intensity of the group. There's a real synergy with these five guys. They've grown greatly in the past year." As well, the plant expects the majority of indie houses which specialize in smaller 12" runs of club music to utilize its services.

The plant is now operational. Daryl Wynecka at Acme Vinyl can be contacted for pressing information.

Quality releases Urban Cookie Collective set

Wrapped up in a 'cookie' box, replete with a small package of cookies, came the new Urban Cookie Collective full-length release entitled High On A Happy Vibe.

The dance group has had enormous success in the UK, where it scored a number one single for The Key, The Secret, which also reached #3 on RPM's Dance Chart.

Quality is currently working the third single, Feels Like Heaven. Laura Ferguson reports that the single is a feature at both Z95 in Vancouver and AM640 in Toronto, and has been added to the playlist of Energy108.

Panagaea and CessPool set to go on-line for industry

Panagaea Music House, under the guidance of president Tony Tobias, and Ron Proulx, president of CessPool of Lust Music, have announced the introduction of Canada's first CompuServe based computer entertainment news report called The Canada E-Report.

The service is directed at users of electronic mail and media, and will expose all

aspects of the entertainment business in Canada. The founders of the service are encouraging members from all aspects of the entertainment industry, from vice-presidents to managers to artists, to join the on-line service.

The Canada E-Report will be served up on CompuServe, the world's largest privately owned on-line facility in the world. CompuServe serves nearly 1.8 million subscribers worldwide, and accesses entertainment reports from major hubs around the world including Tokyo, Johannesburg, London, and New York City.

Tobais and Proulx issued a joint statement, saying that "we believe The Canada E-Report will inform CompuServe members around the world about the Canadian entertainment scene. There are over 1-million ex-patriot Canadians working in LA alone, and we believe many of them will welcome the opportunity to get closer to home."

The service is set to appear in Entertainment Drive, an on-line forum devoted to the international entertainment industry.

Warner acquires rights to triple tenor reunion

The Warner Music Group has announced the acquisition of the rights to the concert reunion of Jose Carreras, Placido Domingo, and Luciano Pavarotti. The concert will take place the day before the World Cup Final (July 16) at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles.

The Warner group has also acquired worldwide TV and radio broadcast rights to the Encore! The Three Tenors concert in addition to album and home video rights. An agreement with Collins Publishers San Francisco for a seven-language multi-edition concert program was also announced.

The televised audience for the show is

expected to be in the one billion range, one of the largest in the history of music, TV and radio. The three tenors are reuniting for the first time since their historic performance in 1990 at the Baths of Caracella in Rome.

The stadium will be set up in such a way acoustically that every member of the audience will experience the show as if in a small, intimate setting. Fourteen cameras and the highest quality digital equipment will be used.

The album will be released through Atlantic in the US, and through German-based Teldec internationally, one of Warner Music's international classic labels.

Has the record business kept up with the times?

It has been well over a dozen years since the record industry waved goodbye to vinyl, with the promise that compact discs would revolutionize the industry.

CDs were said to offer superior sound, a longer life span and improved manageability. The other big factor was the capability to hold a great deal more music than records. Most albums contained 8-10 tracks, while today's CDs often contain 12-15 songs, which could contain more than 60 minutes of music.

Record companies indicate that business has never been better. Virtually every major reported that 1993 was their best year ever. PolyGram International, as an example, reported a net sales increase of 12% from '92 to '93, with CDs representing 82% of the company's recorded music sales for last year, a 19% increase.

Indeed, according to CRIA stats, total

PEI's AIM becomes affiliate with FACTOR

The Association of Island Music (AIM), based in Prince Edward Island, has become the seventh association to become a FACTOR regional affiliate.

AIM was founded two years ago by the Music Industry Study group. Its aim is to assist in the evaluation of sound recording applications to and provide information about FACTOR as well as application forms to the PEI music industry.

PEI is part of the fledgling Maritime music scene, which is garnering national prominence for its combination of traditional style of music and contemporary and alternative sounds.

AIM is headed up by president Campbell Webster, who also manages Lennie Gallant and Nancy White. It boasts close to 125 members, including Bob Jensen, who organized the initial conference when the idea of a PEI music industry association was initiated.

units shipped in 1993 reached 7.1 million, up from 5.3 million units shipped in '92.

But what the stats don't reveal is the stubborness with which the consumer has accepted the compact disc format. CDs, they say, don't have that same crystalline crispness and diamond-cutting sparkle that vinyl did. Audiophiles are offended by the digitalized sterility of CDs, and bemoan the extinction of the static-filled warmth and coziness of the LP.

There is a belief that CDs were rushed to consumers in the early '80s in an attempt to boost a then-sagging industry. Now, a dozen years later, CRIA has launched a new generic ad campaign, utilizing the slogan "Music - For All It's Worth". The question is, with every record company enjoying their best years yet,

why does CRIA feel the need to promote music sales?

"We started planning this sales campaign in the late '80s, when we were seeing a sales decline," says Brian Robertson, president of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA).

"In the last couple of years, we've seen a little bit of a resurgence, but it's still only on the growth of the CD, and in the face of huge home taping problems. So I don't think you can be complacent about a two-year recovery."

In regards to the year-end stats from PolyGram, Robertson notes "don't forget, they're a multi-layered, multi-media company. They're into motion pictures, publishing - sound recordings is just a part of it. So I don't think you can say the companies are consistently making huge profits."

HMV Canada president Paul Alofs scoffs at the notion that vinyl was dropped too quickly with the arrival of CDs. He believes the level of

Stentor announces home video signals plan

The Stentor consortium has announced an \$8-billion plan that would bring all broadband capabilities within 10 years and a national network within six years, enabling video signals to be routed directly into the home over telephone wires.

This plan is part of a larger multimedia trend that currently sees audio signals being brought into the home over phone lines, a system called audio-on-demand.

"With digital switching embedded in 80-90 percent of the phone industry networks, we can deliver audio-on-demand over the phones," says Stentor's president and CEO Jocelyne Côté O'Hara.

Video signals over phone wires, which would include musical video product, is being seen as a multimedia trial, to see what the receivership level for consumers will be.

"Broadcasting is built on the principal of

point-to-point multipoint and the question of reception for the public, whether it's radio or TV. With this demand ability and the interactive part, it's a question of whether or not it will be received by the public."

This type of system, a two-way fibreoptic phone line, is part of an accelerated change in the informational age whereby combining different formats is leading to new and daring possibilities for the exchange of media.

"The informational age is causing a lot of discomfort," continues O'Hara. "You wonder how much displacement will occur. Will there still be record stores, for example?

"When cassettes came out, they thought vinyl would die. But these types of things are giving the artist his fair due that he deserves. These setups may empower the artist more, by allowing him to create, for example, virtual studios and promotion." CD penetration is inevitably going to rise, as more and more aspects of the entertainment field turn to digital technology.

"The CD as a format probably has another decade of very strong growth ahead. And 35% of household penetration is not bad. "I think most of the interest in vinyl has faded. Four years ago, people were talking about this conspiracy to hoist new technology and lose vinyl, but you don't hear much about it anymore."

The flipside of CRIA's generic ad campaign is a co-venture with PolyGram to promote CD singles. Alofs, for one, believes this latest venture is a good one.

"I think the CD single initiative from PolyGram is a very good one. If you offer a low-priced alternative to home taping, and CD singles are in that \$3.99 range, I think it's very attractive."

Home taping continues to rob the industry of hundreds of millions every year. While CRIA continues to lobby for a licensing levy on every blank tape sold (in the range of 15-60 cents a tape), they know they are essentially fighting a losing battle.

According to Robertson, "we're trying to get this home taping royalty through, in the copyright revision process, which will add a royalty to the cost of a blank tape. So at least there'll be some sort of revenue flow from all this exploitation. It won't solve the problem, because we reckon we're losing \$300 million a year to home taping."

One other area the industry has been looking at is attracting an older record-buying demographic. The over-35 crowd may be well aware of CD technology and its value, but retail outlets can be intimidating to those unitiated in grunge or dance music.

"The retailer has traditionally ignored, until recently, the older demographic," says Robertson. "They've not only ignored them, they've intimidated them, with rock music blaring and younger staff that are undertrained. They're aiming at a teen market only, and there's a huge market over 35 who want a more pleasing retail environment."

According to HMV's Alofs, "we definitely target a younger shopper. But more than a third of our customers are over 30. In our store design we've been pretty aware that there's an older market out there that's very important to us. We try to carry as broad a range of selections as we possibly can."

The overwhelming viewpoint from many in the industry seems to be that the acceptance of the CD format is merely a matter of time, and that the use of the digital format in every area of entertainment will sweep music along for the ride.

But there are others who believe that the 30% penetration figure is a firm reality, and that by eliminating all other formats, the industry may be shooting itself in the foot.

Digital formats may be becoming the rule in the entertainment industry, but home taping and high prices are slowing its acceptance in musical form by the masses.





Oyster breakthrough continues on Only One Moon

Six people in a band might spell endless fights and constant friction for some, but for the six people in Prairie Oyster, the music truly comes first, and all egos are definitely checked at the door.

"I don't think there are any virtuosos in the band, but the thing about our group is that there are six individuals, and the combination makes for great chemistry," says lead vocalist Russell deCarle. "That and a desire to make the music we want to play."

The Toronto-based band has been recording for 10 years, which might surprise some. After making its own records and sending them to radio through a mailing service, the band hooked up with Stony Plain, who produced the group's first album.

record, and it's doing well, so it'll be good to get out and play those songs again."

The new country wave has definitely helped Prairie Oyster, something they themselves will readily admit. But the group's Keith Glass is somewhat dubious about the trend, and how new country fans are dealing with the roots of country music.

"I get nervous about the new country moniker, because it seems like they're apologizing for what came before. We grew

A #1 Raitting! Bonnie Raitt jumps all the way to the top from the #6 spot with Love Sneakin' Up On You. It's her first #1 song in Canada. Her previous best was Something To Talk About, which peaked at #3 in 1991.

In the Pink. Easily holding on as the topselling album in the country is Pink Floyd's The Division Bell. Pink Floyd is just the third act in the '90s with a colour in its name to have a #1 album. Name the other two. Hint: one colour is obvious, while the other is a bit obscure.

Riding high. One factor that helped Bonnie Raitt make such a big jump to #1 is the length of time the other songs were on the chart. The Sign, Streets Of Philadelphia and Mr. Jones had a stranglehold on the top three spots. Those three songs juggled positions, but were in the top three for seven straight weeks. That will give all three very high positions on the year-end chart.

Up, up and away! For the second straight week, Nirvana's In Utero's makes the biggest jump on the Albums chart. It climbs from #42 all the way to #12.

More boom than crash. Roxette has the top album add as Crash! Boom! Bang! debuts at #35. One spot behind is Prairie Oyster's Only One Moon. Another country artist, Tim McGraw, is right behind as he enters at #41.

Plenty of action. There are lots of big movers on the Hit Tracks chart. Heart's The Woman In Me leads the way with a 48-position jump to #38. Five other songs, Dreams, Leaving Las Vegas, Borders And Time, I'll Take You There and Dream On Dreamer, all had gains of more than 30 spots.

The retail spotlight. Here are the bestselling albums at the Records On Wheels store on Bank St. in Ottawa as reported by Ian MacFarlane. 1. Pink Floyd 2. Loreena McKennitt 3. Philadelphia Soundtrack 4. Soundgarden 5. Counting Crows 6. Celine Dion 7. Ace Of Base 8. Alice In Chains 9. Canto Gregoriano 10. Enigma.

Colour coordinated. The only two acts with a colour in the name to have a #1 album in the '90s are Pearl Jam (Nov. '93) and Red Hot Chili Peppers (July '92). Honourable mentions go to Natalie Coal and New Kids On The Black.



Eventually, Oyster wound up with RCA/BMG.

The latest album is once again a work by a band that maintains musical integrity to the last. According to deCarle, the group doesn't worrying about letting everyone write a song for the album - they put music on the album that was made for Prairie Oyster.

"One of the advantages with having six people in the band is that there's a lot of checks and balances. We've never been a group that says just because it's an original, we have to record it. It's always been the song first, no matter where it comes from."

The band is also getting a co-producer credit for the first time, along with Steve Fishell, who, according to deCarle, worked well in the band environment.

"Steve is a band guy, he comes from bands himself. He played with Emmylou Harris, Commander Codys and Billy Vera & The Beaters, so he understands the dynamics and politics of working in a band."

In the time between the last record, Everybody Knows, and this one, the group found the time to record its first television special, a one-hour show to be aired by CTV affiliates on July 3.

"We did it with Insight Productions, who are old friends of ours." says deCarle. "We have Carlene Carter as a guest, and she's always been a kindred spirit musically for us. There's some live concert footage from the Bathurst Street Theatre, as well as footage of us in the studio."

The band is set to embark on a huge cross-Canada tour, beginning May 11 in Yellowknife, and deCarle says the group can hardly wait.

"We did some radio shows a couple of weeks ago, and I think everybody was itching to get back on the road. We've got a new up with the country music of the '60s, but that made us go back and check out the stuff from the '40s and '50s, which was a great revelation.

"I'd hate to think that today's country audience wouldn't embrace that stuff because they've been told that it sucked, for lack of a better word."

The pair also expressed concerns regarding the amount of records that domestic country artists actually sell. According to Glass, radio play can be a very deceptive indicator as to how popular an artist really is.

"I think if there's anything weird about the country scene it's that there still isn't the record buying support for Canadian country artists that I think there should be.

"I think a lot of Canadians would be shocked at how much airplay Canadian records get and how little they sell." says deCarle. "I think we Canadians sit back and see how the states accepts it before they accept it. The bottom line is, people have to get up and support the industry, in order to make it work."



Canadians lead March CRIA certifications

Canada's two biggest international music exports, Celine Dion and Bryan Adams, led the list of Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) certifications for the month of March 1994.

Dion's The Colour Of My Love album surpassed six times platinum, after just five months in the stores. Bryan Adams' greatest hits package, So Far So Good, has surpassed sales of 500,000 units in Canada. Adams is the only domestic artist to have two diamond certified (1 million units) albums in Canada, with Reckless and Waking Up The Neighbours.

NVN Records serves up fresh talent on sampler

The newly-created Nile Valley Nation Records is off and rolling with its first CD sampler of acts from the label.

NVN Records was created in order to give an outlet for talent that is "overlooked by the majors." The name comes from the cradle of the first Nubian civilization born out of north-east Africa. The label heads' previous company, First Impressions Entertainment, had worked with a number of top dance and hip-hop acts from Canada.

The label's first priority, according to president Eugene Dinnall, will be George Chambers. With two ballads, Heaven and Old Souls, and one mid-tempo track, Here We Are, on the compilation, Chambers is being offered to both A/C and CHR. In addition, a video is currently in post-production.

The label's first sampler also includes tracks from Child Prodigy, rapper Royalty with some help from George St. Kitts and Kenny Moran of Oval Emotion, club favourite Nina K, and Gifted And Black, alongside six other artists.

East coast group Sunfish wins CJCB talent search

Sydney-based group Sunfish has won the 1994 CJCB/AM Stereo Music Spirit East Talent Search context.

The final was staged at Club Capri in Sydney (March 29), and Ian Thomas from Toronto, Bruce Hudson of the Hudson Entertainment Agency, and Wendy Salsman of Warner Canada were the judges.

Sunfish consists of Tom Fidgen, Mike Morrison, Scott Brown and Stuart Cameron. Stuart is the son of Canadian country music legend and former Juno host John Allan Cameron.

Sunfish took home \$6,000 in prize money. The group is currently in a studio in Glace Bay producing a single release that will be included on a Warner compilation disc.

st. Catherines' CKTB was recently found in violation of the Canadian Broadcast Standard Council's (CBSC) Code of Ethics. The decision relates to a June 1, 1993 edition of the John Michael open line show, in which the host was accused of making numerous derogatory comments concerning French-Canadians. Among other things, Michael was quoted as saying "in order to keep them (Quebec) happy, we pander to them...all our government buildings are in Quebec, our civil

service is in Quebec, this country's headquarters is in Quebec; it's in Hull and it's across the river from Ottawa, but it's in Hull. Symbolically, the country is in Ottawa, but in fact, it is in Quebec." Michael was also quoted as saying that he feels 90% of Cabinet Ministers are French-Canadian, and that Canadian ambassadors are always French-Canadian. The Ontario Regional Council of the CBSC found Michael's comments "abusive and discriminatory toward French-speaking Canadians." As a result, CKTB is required to announce a statement explaining the council's decision, during peak listening hours within 30 days of the publication of the decision.

Vancouver's CFOX is bringing to a close its most successful listener contest yet. The Show Us Your Larry And Willy contest has invited listeners to come up with a unique, creative and hopefully legal way of displaying the words Larry & Willy On 99.3 The Fox. Some of the more inventive entries vying for the \$10,000 prize include one fan who leaped onto the ice during a Canucks/Penquins game carry a banner, one who baked and distributed Larry & Willy cookies, one who spelled it out in 20-foot high letters on Grouse Mountain and still one more who spelled it out on the back page of the local Hungarian-language newspaper. The winner will be announced on April 26 during the Larry & Willy morning

North Bay's CHUR has been cleared by the Ontario Regional Council of the Canadian Broadcast Standards Council (CBSC) in a decision regarding a news item the station had

aired in August of '93. The news item cited the results of a poll on abortion. The reporter indicated that while about one-third of Canadians supported total legalization of abortion, approximately 56% believed abortion should be legal in certain circumstances, while 10% felt it should be outlawed entirely. A listener lodged a complaint, feeling the report was misleading and led people to believe that two-thirds of Canadians fully supported abortion. The Council, after listening to a tape of the broadcast, decided the station had not highlighted the minority opinion supporting abortion, but had highlighted the fact that some Canadians were against legalization. Therefore, it was ruled CHUR had not breached the CBSC Code of Ethics regarding fair and unbiased reporting.

Susan Hammond takes kiddie music to a new level

As a teacher and a parent, Classical Kids creator Susan Hammond is well aware of how children respond to music. To put it simply, most children's entertainers fail to understand that kids are intelligent and thoughtful, with thriving imaginations.

"Children are little adults, they have tremendous sophistication, feelings and empathy. They have a better ability than we do to fully enter another world." says Hammond, who recently picked up her fourth Juno for the most recent Classical Kids production, Tchaikovsky Discovers America.

"Sometimes when you see kids listening to music, their eyes seem to gloss over like they're bored. But they're not, they just don't have the social sense to sparkle their eyes at you. I don't think we always need to sing songs to them about peanut butter sandwiches and potty training, because they already know about their world, they want to learn about others."

Hammond, who recently became a Member of the Order of Canada, just returned from the National Educators Convention in the US, where she was discussing her proposed Classical Collection. The box set, featuring all the Classical Kids works along with written teacher's guides relating to the albums, should be ready for a fall release.

"From what I saw, being down on the

floor at the convention, I think it will go really well."

Hammond says it was her parents who helped form her ideas about music and the arts. By forcing her to expand her horizons at university, taking liberal arts courses along with music, they enabled Hammond to gain a better understanding of the world in which classical music was created.

After that, her years of teaching and teaching piano have given her keen insight into how young minds work, and that children appreciate being dealt with intelligently, and not as immature infants.

"I learned two things teaching piano. The power of image and the power of emotions. I taught at an alternative high school (for troubled teens) and I told them to check their problems at the door, come in, and we're going to enter Venice 400 years ago and build a social world around a composer.

"As my kids went into the schools, I also went in with them and encouraged kids to write and sing and interpret hands-on classical music."

As a result, Hammond came up with the idea of mixing classical music with intriguing stories, all aimed at younger audiences.

"I had a friend who made new age recordings, and knew the technical side of things, and with his help we made Mr. Bach Comes To Call. The lucky thing was getting on CBC's Morningside with Peter Gzowski, because after that it just happened overnight. In that first week we sold 4,000 records, and another 8,000 that year."

After Bach, Hammond followed with works featuring Vivaldi, Mozart, Beethoven and most recently, Tchaikovsky, all interwoven with unique stories about the composers and the worlds they lived in.

While Hammond is overjoyed with the accolades she has received, including four Junos and the Order of Canada, she is less than thrilled with the way the Canadian music industry treats children's music.

"We are so good at it, and that's probably why I'm so excited about the Order of Canada, which isn't so much for me, but to help recognize children's music.

"I think it's outrageous that the children's section isn't televised on the Junos. We're excellent at it, and it should have its place in the sun. Wouldn't it be interesting to do a demographic study and see what percentage of viewers are children and what percentage are other minority groups, because you can be sure kids are listening to music."

After returning from Ottawa, Hammond will be going full steam ahead with the box set for schools, as well as working with Devine Videoworks on the video presentation of Tchaikovsky Comes To America. She is also working on future albums featuring the works of Handel and Schubert.

The Swedish duo of Marie Frederickson and Per Gessle do something that few acts do consistently these days. They make hits. Hit-making CHRoriented bands are often dismissed as just cashgrabbing crowd pleasers, without integrity or a sense of purpose. It makes you wonder how many of those throwing the stones ever had a hit record. Roxette arrived out of the blue in the summer of '89 with the massive hit The Look, which peaked at #2 in RPM's Hit Tracks chart (June 10/89), and was followed by two more hits that reached the top 10 (Dressed For Success, Listen To Your Heart). They followed that debut success with another highly successful sophomore release, Joyride, which yielded several more top 10 hits. In other words, they make it look easy to be a consistent chart topper, which obviously isn't the case, otherwise more bands would do it. Afterall, who doesn't want to sell records and make money? This album should follow the path of the first two studio works (the third release was a live album, Tourism), with more ear-catching pop songs that deliver exactly what one might expect. The band has focused more on production values on this record, and consequently the songs have greater depth and coerce longer attention spans. But they are hits. Highlights include the title track, the lead single Sleeping In My Car, and a pair of acoustic ballads, First Girl On The Moon and Place Your Love. -RR

TIM THORNEY Some Other Time Them/Epic-80176-H


Thorney is a master writer/producer who has finally surfaced as a performer in his own right. Thorney's key is his ability to transform the lyrics he co-wrote with Erica Ehm, and some with Ehm and Guido Luciani, into life-sized stories that reflect personal situations that many can relate to. This, in effect, makes him a master storyteller with Chains, which was released as a single, and All Come Together, as the best examples. But don't stop there, Thorney has a few other pleasant vocal surprises, including When The Beauty's Gone and Faraway Glory. Some of the best pickers in the business add that extra professional touch, including Rob Piltch (acoustic and electric guitar, bass), Michael Pickett (mouth harp), Tom Szczesniak (accordion), Jerry Douglas (dobro), Brian Leonard (lap steel), Don Reed (fiddle), Anne Bourne (cello), and, of course, Thorney on mandolin and keys. Luciani also takes a major instrumental role, doubling on acoustic and electric guitars. Background vocals are also very important here as well and Thorney has the cream of the crop, which include

Cassandra Vasik, Don Neilsen, David Blamires, and Al Van Wart. An exceptional look at Thorney's other side. A few club and concert dates and a high-powered promotion campaign should bring this album home.

Don't make the mistake of lumping Moist in with the excessive and fading grunge scene, because the group, the most-heralded to come out of Vancouver since Spirit Of The West, offers much more. Combine a charismatic and lyrically potent vocalist with a tight rhythm section, a tasteful keyboardist, and a superlative, flange-happy quitarist, and Moist is the powerful result. Looking



beyond the current single Push, there are other gems in this package. The mid-tempo groove of Believe Me could chart. Break Her Down, riff and AOR-ready, is another possible hit. The chunky and keyboard-heavy Low Low Low could also hit at CHR radio. Machine Punch Through and This Shrieking Love take the Moist sound in a new and interesting direction. These songs indicate that this ultra-cool Cancon release promises greater and more dynamic things for the future. Moist will be a domestic radio force to be reckoned with.

DEBBIE FLEMING - Country/Pop Nothin' In The World (That This Old Girl Can't Do) RDR-747

The production touch from the late Ronn Dann has added an important ingredient of professionalism to five of these 10 tracks. Rick Whitelaw, whose production ability goes without question, did the board work on the other five tracks. Fleming, no slouch when it comes to projection, struts her writing talent here as well. She wrote all the tracks with the exception of Rare Thing, where she shares writing credits with Rena Gaile. Fleming turns in a remarkably smooth and high-energy performance on all tracks, particularly Someone Else, La-Lullaby, After The Afterglow, the title track and, of course, Rare Thing. The crossover potential is



obvious on several of these tracks. The album is actually a compilation of some of Fleming's best tracks, recorded over the last five years in various studios, including Manta Sound, Inception Sound, Reaction Sound and Kensington Sound. AC programmers should give a listen to Space. An excellent package of entertainment that could be the door-opener for a great talent that just might fall through the cracks if not given the benefit of a high-energy promotion. This four-member group has its origins at the University of Maryland, where quitarist/vocalists Matt Huseman and Ira Katz first got together. Eventually, Matt's brother Brandt and drummer Miles Rosen joined the pair, and The Greenberry Woods was born. The Huseman brothers are the principle songwriters, along with Katz, and the three also share the vocalizing. This is guitaroriented pop, with a definite '60s retro sound that confirms the group's admiration for The Beatles and '60s cousins The Byrds and Big Star. The music is rock and roll, with emphasis placed on the rolling part. Like much of the Beatles early music, the focus is more on melody and harmony than lyrical content. But the result is a vibrant sounding record that should cause a stir at AOR and modern rock stations. Highlight tracks include Trampoline, Sentimental Role, Waiting For Dawn and The Sympathy Song. The Beatles comparisons can be a kiss of death, so we won't say any more about that. Just take it for what it's worth, a nice rock record with a guitar sound that doesn't rip your ears off, like so many alternative bands do these days.

We will skip the references to suicide, heroin addiction, babies, and fame. And guess what? Beyond all that, the music on this album is great. Track two, Miss World, is about as radio-friendly as Hole gets. This song is carried by an



unmistakable verse, and under the guidance of slack-crooner Courtney Love, it takes on a certain beauty when she sings 'I am the girl you know! can't look you in the eyell am the girl you knowl so sick I cannot try/I am the girl you know/can't look you in the eyell am the girl you knowlyou know I lie and lie and lie.' Catchy, or what? It is a killer song. Plump covers Love's somewhat controversial view towards motherhood ('I don't do dishes/I throw them in the crib.') Jennifer's Body is loose and loud, and Love's scream is unparalleled in rock today, and the less she uses it, the more powerful it becomes. This should sell decent at retail. A healthy interest in body shapes and parts (Plump, Jennifer's Body, Doll Parts, Gutless) never hurt sales figures.

Here's some real Northern Ontario roots music that doesn't pretend to be anything else. These Buckeye Boys can get down and hurt or let loose with their own brand of entertainment that covers


the full spectrum of country with a pop and a rock edge. Exceptional creativity displayed in the writing of bandmember Larry Hayes (lead guitar), who also does the up-front vocal chores. He wrote all the material with the exception of Roses For A Lady, which was written by bandmember Claude Lecuyer (lead vocals, acoustic guitar). The other members of the quartet are Moe Lecuyer (bass, vocals), and Jean Guy Dugay (drums). The band gets an additional assist from Ed Degagner (pedal steel), Don Reed (fiddle), and Mike Peters (acoustic guitar), who also produced. The album was recorded at Mission Studios in Sudbury, Ontario. An example of Hayes'



writing is A Country Song Backwards: "What do you get when you play a country song backwards? You get back your house, your job and family." Cadillac Man, included here, was first introduced to country programmers as a track on NORA, a Pineland Music compilation of Northern Ontario recording artists. In view of the success of this track at radio and on live dates, producer Peters put together another nine tracks for this album. Santa Claus Likes Country Music was released in time for the Christmas season, adding to the band's popularity. The Only Thing That Matters has been taken as the follow-up single, an excellent choice, which is now at radio. • WG

DARON NORWOOD
Daron Norwood

Norwood's debut album is packaged as squeaky clean as he looks. But the farm boy look is as far as it goes. Norwood appears to have a passion for the traditional with just a hint of the contemporary. There may be some criticism for this, but he gets an "A" for effort. He's obviously not just some flash-in-the-pan country bumpkin. He has already experienced chart action with the release of If it Wasn't For Her I Wouldn't Have You, and is back on the charts with the followup, Cowboys Don't Cry, which was written by Jim Allison, Jeff Raymond, Bob Simon and Doug Gilmore. Whether he makes it with this one remains to be seen. Norwood has a fresh, devilmay-care vocal confidence that should appeal to country programmers. With women (18-49) being the predominant buyer of country product, Norwood fits in beautifully. Song material, for the most part, gives Norwood the freedom his



wall tracks should attract, including Phantom Of The Opera, written by Billy Lawson, John Schweers and Roger Murray and with Travis Trittin as guest vocalist; and That's Life, penned by Billy Lawson, Bud McGuire and Mike McGuire. But don't overlook the Curtis Wright and Billy Spencer penning of If I Ever Love Again. With a little help from radio and some promotion or concert/club dates, Norwood could turn the tables on his critics.

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On Tour

The Eagles have landed. Well sort of. Henley, Frey et al will bring that familiar California sound to Exhibition Stadium July 11. Even though top tickets are going for \$85.50 (there are also \$61 and \$35.50 seats), look for this one to sell out within hours, and for a second show to be announced shortly thereafter. Warner is set to release a two-CD greatest hits package to coincide with this reunion tour, which should include some previously unreleased material.

Speaking of The Eagles, that \$85.50 price tag seems to be the trend these days for major artists. Barbra Streisand is asking \$350 for the best seats at her US dates, while the Elton John/Billy Joel shows are featuring top seats at \$70. Thank goodness for artists like Garth Brooks or Pearl Jam, who refuse to have top tickets priced more than \$18 US.

Metal monster Metallica has been firmed for June 4 at Molson Park in Barrie, with guests Danzig and Suicidal Tendencies. The band isn't promoting a new record, but simply felt the desire to do a brief tour this summer before heading back into the studio in the fall. Tickets are being offered at a special Early Bird price of \$29.95 for the first 107 hours only, after which they are available for \$35.

Kingswood Theatre, at Canada's Wonderland just outside of Toronto, has announced its summer concert lineup. The lead off show features Elvis Costello and Crash Test Dummies (June 3), followed by: Depeche Mode/Primal Scream (20); The Scorpions (25); Color Me Badd (July 2); Steve Miller (3); B-52's (4); Sharon, Lois & Bram (two shows on July 10); Richard Marx (14); Santana (22); Crosby, Stills & Nash (23); Traffic (August 2); Spin Doctors/Gin Blossoms/Cracker (3); Roger Daltrey (7); Lynyrd Skynyrd/Ted Nugent (9); Beach Boys (two shows on Aug. 14); Barenaked Ladies (Sept. 2) and Taylor Dayne (TBA).

Crowded House drummer Paul Hester has quitthe band abruptly, making the decision just before the band hit the stage in Atlanta on April 14. The group has been utilizing drummer Wally Ingram from Sheryl Crow's band (Crow is the opening act on the tour), and is auditioning for a permanent replacement. Hester is about to become a father, and obviously felt the inevitable pull of domestic life.

Baby Boomers will have their fill this summer with a ton of shows aimed right at the 25-40 demographic. And we can expect to see even more, in addition to the already announced Eagles, Pink Floyd, Traffic, Crosby, Stills & Nash and Santana. The Rolling Stones rumours continue, with a late summer tour likely to follow the release of a new album. Elton John/Billy Joel will be here this summer, its simply a matter of working out the dates and venues. Steely Dan is rumoured for an August tour. Foreigner and The Doobie

Brothers are embarking together on a 45-city tour of the US, with potential Canadian stops to be confirmed. Sony is busy repackaging Loverboy's Greatest Hits in time for the band's North American tour this summer. And the Woodstock II revival plans are hot again, with some of the names being tossed around including Pearl Jam, REM, Guns N' Roses, Soundgarden, Peter Gabriel, Van Halen, Neil Young, Public Enemy and Red Hot Chili Peppers. The promoters are aiming at the Aug. 12-14 weekend, the original's 25th anniversary, with tickets likely to be offered through a lottery system, at a cost of approx. \$125 US.

George Thorogood & The Destroyers has been firmed as the opening act for ZZ Top on the band's Canadian tour, which will hit Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens (May 29), The

Forum in Montreal (June 1) and the Civic Centre in Ottawa (June 4).

Bruce Cockburn plays Kitchener's Centre In The Square May 9, followed by Toronto's Massey Hall (11). Cockburn has also been firmed for The Tonight Show on April 25.

Crash Test Dummies, whose God Shuffled His Feet album has surpassed platinum in the US, is firmed for three Canadian dates, May 3 at Vancouver's Orpheum, June 3 at Toronto's Kingswood Theatre and June 6 at Montreal's Forum. The Dummies recently travelled to London, where they played a command performance at the Canadian embassy at the request of the Canadian ambassador, who hosted a luncheon in the band's honour. The Dummies are opening for Elvis Costello on a North American tour.

INTHE CLUBS

First off, thanks to Sony's Ron Camilleri I was able to witness an extraordinary set from Terence Blanchard and his three side players at Top O' The Senator (April 12). I overheard one HMV jazz department employee noting how Blanchard was definitely on this night. His trumpet screamed, sighed, slid and shuffled through material from his Columbia set The Billie Holiday Songbook. An excellent change of pace.

An unbelievable show was put on at The Horseshoe by MCA act The Mavericks (April 20). Showcasing material from its new record It's A Crying Shame, these Miamibased boys know how to entertain. This is an art lost on many oftoday's artists. Sometimes sounding straight out of mid-'50s Memphis or Nashville, the group knew its roots, hustling through 3/4 shuffles, ballads, and bring-thehouse-down country stomps. The first part of the set was most effective, and the sweaty, packed club patrons ate it up. Lead singer Raul Malo has the moves and scowl to impress the ladies and shame the men. Nick Kane, lead guitarist, can match licks with the best of the country pickers. The rhythm section of Paul Deakin on drums and Robert Reynolds on bass held the bottom end with solid grooves. Pretend, There Goes My heart, and Just A Memory were a few among numerous highlights. One of the best country groups going, not to be missed if you get the chance to see them next time.

Another MCA act, Merlin, opened for NoMeansNo at The Palladium (April 16). Unfamiliarity worked against Merlin, but after a while Merlin won over at least some in the audience. However, the night belonged to NoMeansNo, the high-charged prog-core Vancouver band that, alongside its alter-ego band The Hanson Brothers, is the hardest working and most powerful band going in Canada. This group must be seen to be heard, because if you ever thought rock music was dying, NoMeansNo will grind it into your skull that it is definitely alive and kicking. Check out the band at MusicWest and as it doubles back across Canada as The Hanson

Brothers, and I guarantee you no disappointments.

A phone call from Steve Keating, manager for east coast out fit Dead Reckoning, informs us that the group is currently shipping songs to radio, both campus and CAR, from its Time's Time album. With help from both Linda Dawe and Jane Harbury, the band's cross-format sound could make a splash at radio. The showcase at CMW drew 700 people, and the one at ECMA sold out, with A&R reps from five companies in attendance. 10 campus stations have added songs, stretching from CIUT 89.5 in Toronto all the way to St. John's. Keep an eye on Dead Reckoning, as a tour is expected come summer.

Kinetic Records' Steve Jordan came by with some unofficial news that bears printing. The company hopes to press a compilation album from the El Mocambo's Elvis Mondays, which have been around for years stretching back to its days at The Cameron House. Licensing procedures are underway, as a number of top Canadian alternative acts have played EM, including hHead, Venus Cures All (formerly Chicken Milk), Tristan Psionic, and an endless list of others.

Tracy Lawrence holds at #1 with his Atlantic release If The Good Die Young. Lawrence is in a bit of hot water over a fracas after one of his recent concerts. Apparently, he and his brother chased a group of young people in a car after they were reportedly shot at. When they caught up with them, Lawrence is alleged to have fired a couple of shots in the air from a handgun. Lawrence and his brother were picked up a few miles down the road where police found an unlicensed .357 Magnum as well as a police badge and ID card for a non-existent Captain Tracy Lawrence. Several charges have apparently been laid against Lawrence. Alibis, Lawrence's current album, has been picking up good retail notice in view of his #1 singles rating.

Tim McGraw could be in for a cooling-out period over the controversy raised about his Indian Outlaw release. The lyrics, written by Gene Simmons, Tommy Barnes and John D. Loudermilk, haven't gone over too well with some Indian groups, not to mention fellow country recording acts. When that hit the fan, the single stopped dead. The release didn't get too much action in Canada where it sits at #24 after nine weeks of charting. EMI didn't release the single in Canada. However, many programmers playlisted and charted the track off the album. Curb is hoping to take some of the heat off Indian Outlaw with a quick release of Don't Take The Girl as the follow-up. The new release was written by Craig Martin and Larry Johnson.

Reba McEntire bounces back with the biggest gainer this week. Why Haven't I Heard From You, taken from her MCA album Read My Mind, jumps to #59 from #82. McEntire is descending the chart with If I Had Only Known, which had a brief run of only eight weeks. This track was taken from the 8 Seconds Soundtrack.

Brooks & Dunn register the most adds with That Ain't No Way To Go entering the chart at #71. This is another penning from Ronnie Dunn, Kix Brooks and Don Cook, taken from the duo's Arista album, Hard Workin' Man. A new album should be in the works. This one was released more than 14 months ago.

The Buckeye Boys, a band from Northern Ontario, is getting the red carpet promotion treatment from Pineland Music. The band first came to the attention of programmers with Cadillac Man, a track that was included on NORA, a Pineland CD compilation. The song was also a big hit at club and concert dates. Producer Mike Peters took the band back into the studio and recorded nine additional tracks, resulting in the release of a full self-titled CD. Santa Claus Likes Country Music was taken as the first single which created even more recognition for the band. The Only Thing That Matters, which features the lead vocals of Claude Lecuyer and the acoustic guitar work of Larry Hayes, has been taken as the follow-up single. All the material on the album was written by Larry Haves, with the exception of Roses For A Lady, which was written by Claude Lecuyer. The other two members of the band are drummer Jean Guy Dugay and bassist Moe Lecuyer.

Travis Tritt hits the charts again, this time with Foolish Pride, a Tritt original,

Mercey's band will remain together, adding one more player and changing its name to Have No Mercey.

Warner Music dominates country albums chart

Five years ago, Warner Music's country roster consisted of Randy Travis, Dwight Yoakam and not a whole lot else. Today, Warner dominates the country charts like no other label.

Warner currently distributes eight of the

these artists is that they are genuinely nice people, who are willing to do whatever is necessary to help their records sell.

"Bill brought in the Clay Walker video just when the CD was released, and we said 'who the hell's Clay Walker?". So we got on

the phone to Alberta and said make this yours. In the case of Faith Hill, she was here and we got her on the phone with the Calgary branch manager."

Of course, the worry is that these artists are merely catching the trend, and that they won't last past one or two albums. But Johnston feels the good ones survive any fads or trends.

"You look at someone like

Dwight Yoakam or Randy Travis, who came up at the same time, and have been around for a number of years. Quite some time has passed, and they're still important, relevant artists. It stands to reason that not every new artist will last, but the better ones will."

New artists today also have the benefit of video, something Johnston feels has taken on as much importance as making the music.

"Video is such a strong factor, so much more so than five years ago. A lot of the labels are now making videos before they go to radio. They're using video to set up the project, and when it's in heavy video rotation, they can go to radio and say it's happening on CMT or TNN.

"Plus the quality of country videos has improved a great deal over the last few years. It used to be always the old cliche of sitting on a bail of hay with a guitar, which was painful to watch. Now the standards are much higher."

One factor that helps a label like Warner in a huge way is the fact that so many Nashville-based artists have their first big success in Canada, where fans can seemingly spot a great new talent when they hear one.

"There are certain artists who connect better in Canada than they do anywhere else in the world." says Johnston. "Carlene Carter went gold on her first two albums in Canada, before anywhere else in the world."

According to Newman, "Clay Walker will be platinum before the end of the month. We'll be the only country in the world that's going to give him a platinum award."

And the beat just goes on and on for Warner. Newman indicated that Little Texas is at 40,000 in Canada, and that "it's a race between them and Faith Hill to see who gets to gold first."

The label has just released Randy Travis' first studio album in two years, This Is Me, the first single of which, Before You Kill Us All, is already up to #17 on the RPM Country Tracks chart.

The next wave will include Travis Tritt, who is set for a new release on May 10. Another exciting new project from Warner's country section is the soundtrack from the movie Maverick, a remake of the classic television series starring Mel Gibson, James



top thirteen albums on the RPM Country Albums chart, and has four of the top nine country hits. The list not only includes old favourites like Ian Tyson and Dwight Yoakam, but also new country stars like Neal McCoy, John Michael Montgomery, Tracy Lawrence and Faith Hill.

Warner has caught the new country wave at its crest. By accident or design no one knows, but it is clearly the most dominant label on the country charts today.

The latest monster seller for the major is the compilation New Country: Today's Hottest Country Hits, which leaps to #2 this week on the Country Albums chart. Warner's Senior VP Garry Newman says the album is thriving in western Canada.

"We've sold 110,000 on the New Country comp in less than two months. The TV on that is over, but we may do something again in May. I think TV has some say in it, but if you look at the percentage breakdown, the west is really strong. Alberta represents 36% of the sales on this package."

Warner Brothers marketing manager Bill Johnston says the great country product coming through the door has been like the proverbial Energizer rabbit that just keeps going and going.

"I think our product flow has been especially good, whereas in the past it's generally been more cyclical. And the product is coming from Warner Records, Giant and Atlantic Nashville, so it's from a number of sources."

The big names like Randy Travis and Dwight Yoakam continue to sell, but it's the newer names, like Montgomery, Faith Hill, Clay Walker or Little Texas, that are really bringing home Warner's bacon.

"What's exciting to me is that we're breaking new artists." says Johnston. "Clay Walker will be platinum shortly, Faith Hill will be gold. So these are new artists who are really setting up careers."

Newman feels that part of the appeal for

Mike Degazio's solo career gains video audience

The making of a video is neither one of the easiest nor inexpensive ventures in this age of overcharge, and "take-it-but-pay-for-it" attitude.

Producing a compact disc costs more than six times that of vinyl, which doesn't leave too much for promotion and advertising, let alone a video.

Mike Degazio and songwriting partner/ manager Christina Taylor cut through a lot of the fat and got down to the bare essentials for the video shoot of Why Don't You Meet Me Down In Mexico. The song, which is also on his current single, was taken from his album You Just Never Know.

Written by Degazio and Taylor, the video was filmed at the Texas Border (Boot Bar and Grill) in Hamilton "on a frigid night in January," Taylor recalls.

Taylor points out that the production of the video was orchestrated by Sheridan College, specifically David Tucker and his media arts department.

"Being an independent artist with a limited budget, we had researched ways of making a competitive video product without the normal costs (\$25,000).

"We submitted a rough storyboard idea and the students took it from there and began pre-production."

Rose Craig, a Sheridan student, took on

the chores of executive producer and students Tim Dashwood and Mark Constantineau looked after directing and production respectively.

For the actual filming, professionals Adam Swica, of Street Legal fame, and Brian Bleasedale were asked to take part.

"Everyone involved in the project gave a great deal of time and help freely. The students were all fantastic and extremely professional."

The post-production work was completed through the college and distributed to television. MuchMusic began airing the video almost immediately and CBC's Country Beat scheduled an airing for mid-April. Degazio and Taylor are hoping for a positive response from CMT and TNN over the next few weeks.

"Without the help of Sheridan College," concludes Taylor, "it would have been impossible to tackle such a project." Degazio expects to work with the college in the fall for his next video.

The single, which went to radio in February, is now charting on the RPM Country 100 (#88). The new single is the follow-up to Lucky Charm which also had a good run up the RPM chart, peaking at #49 (Feb. 14/94) and scored a #16 chart listing in Spain.

You Just Never Know was produced by Degazio and David Briggs and recorded at the House Of David Studio in Nashville.
