

Japanese State Visit to Britain

For the first time in history, an Emperor and Empress of Japan pay a State Visit to Britain on Oct 5th to 8th. This will not, in fact, be Emperor Hirohito's first visit to London—he was welcomed as Crown Prince in the 1920's. The arrival in London on the 5th will be described at 1145, and there will be coverage in Outlook, 1345. Recorded extracts from speeches at the State Banquet at Buckingham Palace can be heard on the following day, 6th 1045. The visit will be reflected in other programmes during the month, including the feature Set in a Silver Sea, 4th

ROYAL VISITS

The Duke of Edinburgh and Princess Anne will visit Iran from 12th to 17th for the celebrations to mark the 2,500th anniversary of the Persian Empire. They will join The Queen in Istanbul for the State Visit to Turkey, 18th to 25th. Both visits will be reflected in news and current affairs programmes.

PARTY CONFERENCES

It is not only in the House of Commons this month that big debates will go on about Britain entering the Common Market. It's the big topic, too, at the Conferences of Britain's two main parties, and it will be reflected in news and current affairs programmes. 




