JIMMY DEAN CUTS FIVE MINUTE DISC

WITH "Dear Ivan," the follow-up to "Big Bad John" currently in the U.S. Top Thirty and rising fast, American singer star Jimmy Dean, due over here next month, has recorded another single. It is called "To A Sleeping Beauty," and it is available on Stateside.

This single, which runs for five minutes, comes from his "Big Bad John LP," which is in the form of another narration, this time a father talking to his daughter.

Four in a row for Petula Clark?

WITH three hits to her credit a lot of people are wondering whether Petula Clark will make it a fourth with "I'm Counting On You." British music critic Don Nicholl tips it heavily and Pye's Alan Freeman feels it will be the biggest thing she's had since "Sailor."

"Naturally I hope it will be," says Clark, who was born just before the first back to her Paris home at the weekend. It's a wonderful place and was it not a hit in Australia before it came here."

As far as Pet is concerned, life is indeed a series of adventures and as far as her career here is concerned it has worked out well. "I've been trying to get away from time to time because then people don't have me long enough to tire of me," she said.

EVERLYS BEAT FAITH

THE Everly Brothers have beaten Adam Faith by seven places in this week's chart. Both have risen in new discs, but the Everlys have really taken a flying leap forward with "Crying In The Rain," which has come in at number 10.

In the absence of this contest for any length of time, Warner Brothers may not have been too worried before the disc was demolished from the Marines in May!

Adam Faith, despite his sonorous voice, has crept into the Twentieth at number 17 with "Son, This Is She." This is a particularly slow number, even for Adam, but it's spinning on "Juke Box

Jury" the other week, when it was voted a hit, has ensured a good start.

Eden Kane can drop his fears about the third disc, as "Forget Me Not" has risen to number 11, indicating that this will too rise much higher before it reaches its peak success.

In top three

As predicted last week, Neil Sedaka's "Happy Birthday" has gone into the top three.

Others on the upgrade in the sound include "Comancheros," which is still doing well, and Bobby

Vee's "Run To Him." The appearance of Bobby Vee on the British scene next week will ensure that the current disc the extra peak to get it into the top five.

By the Tokens, for they have shot up a further five places, and "I'll Never Find Another You" is now above "Forget Me Not."

Lionel Richie is moving very steadily up the chart with "I'm Coming Home," and "Comancheros." However, his starring TV role in "The Partridge Family" last Sunday should help him considerably.

It's far too easy just to ignore the charts

Twenty success is a challenge

FRANKIE VAUGHAN was talking about his latest disc, "Don't Stop, Twist" . . . a record which DISC reviewer Don Nitke said was "one this week's Disc Date, but calls 'blatantly commercial'."

"Mind?" said Frank when I asked him if he had any objection in the slightest. "I know Don for years and have a great respect for his music. To call it 'commercial' is to insult it. That is exactly what it's meant to be. I only hope he's right."

Repeal

"In future I'm going to make all my singles just as commercial as I can. Numbers which are considered hits will be given value only will be kept to LPs."

Frank is the only artist I can recall who has been able to keep the country's biggest box office draws for years, has suddenly decided to go into the "commercial" field. His first attempt was "Tower Of Strength" . . . now he's joined the rest.

Whoever writes lyrics assumes that himself turns her back on the Twenty . . . but she does them there at it in front of Frank doing the complete opposite?

The whole boat, as Don Nichols also says.

"Now," said Frank, "I haven't got the tax man after me. I've been lucky and I don't have any

financial worries fortunately. It's an easy-to-ignore problem, though I have to admit that for someone in my position to do so. You can get very lazy and just sit there."

But I find that deliberately

setting myself a drive into

the charts keeps me on my toes,

and presents me with a real challenge.

I also think it very important

to keep records, not by simply reading about them, but by actually cutting discs to prove it.

"It's not good enough to re-

main aloof from the current trends. You have to be right in there, think of it, if possible lead it.

I'm an entertainer; it's my job to entertain the people that they want to hear."

Hats off to the fans of the "commercial" work?

"Yes, I'm sure," said Frank.

"I'm more or less a kid again, but I'm surprised. It was the fans who made me do it. They keep writing and asking why I wasn't doing anything."

The other nice thing is that I don't appear to have upset anyone, young and old, who bought

"Tower" . . . they all seemed to like it. I recorded "Don't Stop, Twist" after many fans had written to me about the new dance. I was asked to teach it, so I did. It was all about time. I went down to a club, where they were doing the Twist, and got the kids to teach me . . . it was great fun."

"The rhythm really got me. So much so that I decided to go on to make a Twist record. It's such an infectious and happy sound."

Wrote it

Frank actually wrote the number himself. The first time he'd been credited with doing so.

"I'm a hand, one of our other artists, who has written. I've just never owned up to it before."

Actually, I wrote this number between two songs, and it just seemed to come easily.

"My A and R man, Johnny Franklin, had just taken a number of me to record and I took 'Don't Stop, Twist' to him in this opinion. What I didn't do was tell him that I'd written it."

"But he really liked it. It

. . . even when I admitted that it was written by me."

However keen Frank is to prove that he can write certain things which he doesn't do.

"I don't think anyone need be concerned about giving commercial artists a chance, provided they do the very best they are capable of." That's the really important thing.

"Providing you do your best in a certain field you have nothing to fear. It's when it's when it is all done very much tongue in cheek that it has a nasty, nasty flavor."

"And then, there, are limits. I love music that is happy music. I would never do anything that would make you or what you could call a dirge."

"Not as long as I'm happy. I'm all for fun. The main thing I am is that I'm an entertainer and without reason it's my job to give pleasure. I'm not a philosopher. I'm sincere about it and I do my very best."

"Well, I hope I never do have to sit on the sidelines and treat the whole thing as a big piggle."

SYLVIA SANDS HAS GIVEN UP THOSE PRETTY PRETTY SONGS

I WOULDN'T put my shirt on it, record fans are far too unpredictable to risk that, but I'd lay even that Sylvia Sands has finally cut a hit disc. The titles, on the Columbia label, are "You Don't Have A Heart" backed with "Be My Baby" and "Walkin' Your Way".

For three years since she hit it big in the BBC's "Drumbeat", Sylvia has been cutting discs, but none of them has achieved success, the experts predict.

Now if record buyers forget the pretty-pretty numbers she has cut, they'll be in for a surprise with this latest disc on me, alone, then she's got a winner.

She's a former commercial model. "I've ever made," said Sylvia when we discussed her career change of style. "I do that in the past. I've tended to sing too pretty."

The side was specially written for Sylvia by one of our top writers, Johnny Worth Williams, and it's a corker.

"Johnny gauged my capability better than I did," explained Sylvia. "The answer is, I wanted to keep to instruments and writing arrangements and songs. He hopes later to concentrate more on singing, but I don't envy him."

John Leyton returns from Europe at the end of October. Then in November, he heads for Australia, New Zealand, China and Japan. He is expected to be away for about two months.
