BIG Pete Deuchar certainly fits his name. Six feet tall and almost as broad, and with the ability to empty a pint tankard in one gulp.

Pete rose to fame as a guitarist-banjoist-vocalist in trad jazz bands, but is now concentrating on two of his main musical interests—country and western and gospel.

His disc debut on Fontana features a John D. Loudermilk country composition "Google Eye," and a gospel item written by Sister Rosetta Tharpe called "There's A Hand Leading Me."

**Festival**

Pete and his group, the Country Blues, have been invited to star in the Antibes Jazz Festival between July 21 and 27.

And Nashville is interested in him for recording sessions. Pete's been to the States once already, and his "Google Eye" waxing has encouraged the country folk in Nashville to ask him back.

"Nothing definite has been fixed yet," said Pete, "but I'm hoping it comes off before the end of the year."

**SO LOW**

QUITE frankly, I am amazed by the very low standard of many of the records in the charts. For instance, those by Gerry and The Pacemakers, The Beatles, Freddie and The Dreamers, The Chiffons, etc. I honestly think that there is neither melody nor even a lyric with any of these songs.

# BILLY FURY ALL SET FOR HIS BIGGEST-EVER TOUR

## Joe Brown single tops new releases

JOE BROWN heads the releases for June 14 with a new single on Piccadilly "Nature's Time For Love." Trevor Peacock wrote the number, which one of the Bravos describes as having an up-beat tempo on the same lines as "That's What Love Will Do."

Flipside is a C and W piece, "Walkin' Tall."

BILL HALEY and the Comets are expected in Britain later this year by which time their latest single "Tender Man" b/w "Up Goes My Love" on State-side will have had a chance of making the charts here.

Two numbers from the SAMMY DAVIS JR. LP "Salute to the Palladium" are to be released by Republic next week. They are "Smile" and "This Was My Love."

BOBBY VEE has a new single on Liberty "Bobby Tomorrow" b/w "Charms." FATS DOMINO'S latest is the older "You Always Hurt The One You Love" on London and JOHNNY MATHIS has "Every Step Of The Way" on CBS.

**Show business wedding**

VIRGINIA, daughter of Sydney Grace, a director of the Leslie Grade Organisation, married Haleez Awan, a student from Uganda, at Kingston Register Office on June 14.

ALL the dates for one of the biggest package shows ever to hit Britain—the 60-day Billy Fury autumn tour—have now been fixed. The show, which stars Billy, Joe Brown, The Tornados, the Karl Denver Trio and Dickie Pride, will open at the ABC, Croydon, on Friday, October 4, and will finish at the Granada, Woolwich, on December 15 and the Granada, Edmonton, on a date still to be set. There will be three breaks, of five, four and six days in the three-month marathon.

Also signed for the shows are Daryl Quist, the vocal newcomer to the Parnes talent stable who has just made his debut on Pye Records, and The Ramblers, a new beat group from Ilford who will back the artists throughout the show.

At present, it was likely that two other big vocal names will be added to the tour.

**OCTOBER DATES**

A new all-British single featuring "something quite different" for Billy will be recorded by Billy Fury at Decca's studio today (Thursday).

Billy's next LP, recorded before an invited audience, may be issued in six or eight weeks according to his manager Larry Parnes. A new album will be cut towards the end of July—and most likely include some jazz-style performances.

**Pacemakers 'Side'**

THE Light Programme series "Side By Side" is to continue until September, with the Lorne Gibson Trio replacing the Karl Denver Trio as resident group.

Four top pop combinations will guest in the series in rotation week by week. Gerry and The Pacemakers start on July 1 and will be followed on successive weeks by Brian Poole and The Tremeloes, The Beatles and Ray Slanty and The Na-Notes.

# Acker Bilk guests in Vaughan film

ACKER BILK and his Paramount Jazzband will guest in two London sequences in the new Frankie Vaughan film musical "It's All Over Town," now going into production at MGM's Boreham Wood Studios.

Acker will be seen in a Covent Garden pub setting, and on a Thameside Embankment location. The film will probably be released at the end of August or the beginning of September.

Frankie Vaughan arrived back from a 16-day visit to Copenhagen's Tivoli Garden on Sunday, and on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week was recording songs for the film at the Olympic Studios. Also in the film are Lance Percival, William Rushon, The Springfields, Cloda Rogers, and Jan and Kelly.

Ivor Raymonde is recording the title song, written by Dave Carey and Basil Tait, plus his showpiece, "Give Me The Moonlight," and "Everybody Loves

My Baby." The last is with the Happy Wanderers, the street buskers whom he introduced into his show at the London Palladium three years ago.

Frank will have to complete his shooting for the film by June 22 when he opens his 12-week season at the Futurist Theatre, Scarborough.

His manager, Paul Cave, told DISC: "I am still hoping to work out a trip for Frank in the autumn that will take in Boy's Club, a visit to Israel, Australia and possibly America."

# CLIFF'S 'CARNIVAL' IS GREAT

LAST Friday (May 31) at Blackpool's magnificent new £350,000 ABC Theatre, Cliff and The Shadows opened their summer season show "Holiday Carnival"—and the show never really got off the ground! A VIP audience, hand-picked from the resort's notabilities of local government, hotel and catering trades and big business generally just wasn't with it.

Cliff's initial entrance MUST have been the quietest he has ever known since he hit the pop jackpot. I shudder to think how

many in the audience actually failed to recognise him. And the show never quite recovered from this opening anti-climax.

But it must be a winner once the fans and holiday-makers (who have already bought £40,000

worth of seats in advance bookings) take over! In fact, latest reports are that it's a smash hit.

Cliff and The Shadows arrive on-stage by car to start what becomes a world-wide tour of holiday and show spots, and go right into a most exciting, wild, road-journey which combines stage and screen techniques in thrilling fashion.

After travelling musically across half the world to New York's Copacabana, Cliff—with The Shadows—has his main singing spot: "Young Ones."

But those VIPs weren't 'with it'

"Bachelor Boy," "Spanish Harlequin," a slow ballad "I'm On My Way" which he sang beautifully, "Lucky Lips," and finally even the stuffed shirts had to respond to his invitation to them to join him in "Yeah, Yeah."



The show has been just fab, and we've all made a lot of new friends on tour.



Good light music for background, but there version of *Espana* is an uninspired ditty.

**DAVID SEVILLE**—*Around The World With The Chipmunks* (Liberty LBV 1014) \*\*\*—David Seville takes his three speeded-up "Chipmunk" voices on a world tour with some amazing, well-conceived song ideas which will delight youngsters who are Chipmunk fans. The gimmick is well-worked by now, but it can still raise a smile for me.

**—TWO FOR THE SEESAW**—*Original Sound-track* (United Artists ULP 1027) \*\*\*—Pianist MD Andre Previn penned the score for this Bob Mitchum-Shirley MacLaine screen star, and his music Dory Langdon looked after the lyrics. This LP features the sound-track orchestra conducted by Andre working through the music, with Jackie Cain singing the words.

**LAMBERT, HENDRICKS AND BAVAN**—*At Basin Street East* (RCA Victor RD 7346)—Clyde's thrush dish Yolande Bavan succeeded Annie Ross in this way-out vocal threesome, but she's done nothing to raise my opinion of the group. They try to emulate jazz instrumental virtuosity and emphasis which they deliver their lyrics, but it's no substitute for feeling, and the words of some of the members related on the sleeve don't help me to appreciate them any more, either.

**SAM COOKE**—*Mr. Soul* (RCA Victor RD 7339) \*\*\*—Sam's been very disappointing on disc just lately, and this set hasn't improved the situation—unfortunately, he beats his way through a collection of hits old and new, but neither the

the main theme "A Second Chance."

**HARRY SECOMBE**—*Comme Il Se Souvra Ce Diable* (BSC 7867) \*\*\*—Noddy Seacombe, too, has a good voice, though I'd prefer him with Wally Stott and A. and R. men Johnnie French to cut this lot of well-known French songs, using French musicians and choirs.

You can probably guess the sides tickled—La Mer, *Mademoiselle De Park* and *Bon Bon* among them, of course. Pleasant listening, but not the best Gaullic tribute recorded by a Briton by any means.

**THE COINTOURE**—*Do I Love You Now That I Can Dance?* (Oriole PS 4004) \*\*\*\*—

**T.H.E. ROUTERS**—*Let's Get Married* (Warner Bros. WM 1126) \*\*\*—I've grouped these two together because although vastly different in treatment, they both lean on a big, big beat for their basic appeal.

The Contours are a first-rate coloured group of six singers who belt out a collection of rhythm and blues-style material with infectious excitement and enthusiasm. They show themselves into their work without any inhibitions, and

even if you don't much dig their sector of pop music, you can't deny the red-hot potency of the result.

**HENRY JEROME**—*Strings In Dixieland* (Brunswick LAT 8333) \*\*\*—Henry "Brassie Brass" Jerome dips his feet into Dixieland for this album, matching his guitar with off-key conventional instrumentation playing all the old Mason-Dixon favourites. The strings don't drag as you might expect, and the whole affair is very easy on the ear.

**VIC DAMONE**—*My Baby Loves To Swing* (Capitol T 1811, stereo ST 1811) \*\*\*—Actually it doesn't swing quite as much as the title might suggest, but otherwise I have no complaints. Vic is a splendid quality singer, and a worthy successor to Frank Sinatra on Capitol.

Here he works through well-known standards, most of which appropriately have "baby" somewhere in their titles, and sings clearly with melodic tone and impeccable phrasing.

**THE MILLS BROTHERS**—*Bear Barred Polka* (London HA-D 8058) \*\*\*—The veteran Mills boys turn their attention to other musical styles, and here they've instead of revising their own. The Andrews, Sisters, The Maguire Sisters, The De Castro Sisters and other harmonious birds are all represented and get polished tributes.

**PAULA WATSON**—*The Fabulous Paula* (Oriole PS 4006) \*\*\*—Paula is almost a female reincarnation of the late Thomas "Fats" Waller. She has the same bright, breezy personality and vocal style and the same rollicking piano keyboard technique.

Well backed by Frank Barber's orchestra, she bounces through a mixed set of oldies and newer items, singing out with plenty of infectious spirit, and flavouring her plaintives with some swinging jazz.

**LOS VALDEMOSES**—*Song In The Sun* (Philips BL 7360) \*\*\*—The Majorcan group devote Side 1 to South American songs, and the flip to items from Spain and their native island. They are pleasant on the ear without being as accomplished and pointed as people like Los Paraguayos.

"I used to back a lot of pop stars—I was in Billy Fury's 'Blue Flames' and Johnny Kidd's 'Pirates,' Brian told me. "But this is different. You really give all you've got when you're in a group like this."

Brian's first job with The Tornados was a Billy Fury tour in April. They have just recorded a series for Radio Luxembourg and on June 14 the boys open in summer season at Great Yarmouth with Billy Fury.

"My car blew up on me this morning," he remarked. "Soddenly went up in smoke. That's the trouble with cars. They're necessary nuisance. Now, while it's being repaired, I suppose I'll

"I had hundreds of groups down here from Liverpool before The Beatles made it big but none of them had anything very different."

"Some of them, in fact, were just rubbish."
