BEATLES COME CRASHING IN

SENSATIONAL Merseyside group, The Beatles, have created another smash hit with "I Want To Hold Your Hand," their second disc, and one which they had volume sales recording:

—Singer Phil, "I Want To Hold You In My Arms," is the top on the heels of "Love Me Do," the Beatles first hit, and its placing this week is the group's highest ever chart position.

More surprises in this week's top chart come from The Crickets, on the heels of Franklin Vaughan and the British Invasion with "Loo Loo." The British and American titles of this song differ

slightly but originally it was an English number written in 1945, and now it is an American title.

The rooftop singers made their disc debut over here with "Walk On By," and split the chart position from The Kinks, who captured first chart honours at the expense of the Beatles' number one in the U.S. charts.

It's not surprising to see Jel Lee, the 19-year-old singer, drop her one with "Diamonds, or Diamonds" on the heels of up-and-coming Alice Cooper, who has had two ballads, which stands at number 10 this week.



BILLY FURY on stage is a wild rave, and if the audience responds a performance could end in a riot. Yet there is just one thing that is virtually certain to make him give an "ordinary" show!

Illness apart, the only thing that puts Billy off is the presence of his theatrical friends, relatives—or even worse—his parents! And it was one of the many jobs of his former road manager Hal Carter to see that Billy never knew who was sitting out front.

"Billy acted very strangely

about this," Hal said. "I suspect it was because, basically, Billy is a child."

"Wherever his parents came to see him when we were in Liverpool, he'd make me promise not to let them sit in the front row. I'd arranged for them to see . . . then pass me to find out which seat. I'd say, 'Well, that's the seat your performance would suffer. If he just couldn't give his best.'

"It's the times when Billy doesn't want his parents to sit far between," Hal pointed out.

"And I'm not another dad really insisting he is fantastic. If they're really appreciative . . . something spurs him on. It's a thin red line."

The audience inspires Billy, the band picks it up from him. "It's a two-way thing," he says. "You can actually feel this happening. It's fantastic. Sometimes it could end in a real riot!"

But Billy has a marvelous control over the audience and he

usually knows when to let them cool down again.

It's the things that one would least expect that can throw Billy.

"For instance," said Hal, "he hates having to rush to the dressing room for a show and get ready in a hurry. I always tried to get him to the dressing room at least an hour before he was due on stage."



"He's got a will of his own and he knows exactly what he wants and means what he says. He's a way of getting things done the way he wants without being overbearing."

That's why he's a great star."

MORE American stars for Britain and more British stars for America is the likely outcome of a major agency deal announced yesterday.

Johnny Madsen heads the list of American top liners who will come here by the dozen, and Matt Monro is the first British star to be signed by the American artists to be booked for an important U.S. engagement in April.

The arrangement springs from a partnership between British importers Vic and Eddie Shapiro and Alan Blackburn, who has headed an important German agency.

Vic and Eddie are managing directors of the new organization, the Blackburn-Lews. A newly formed company, it is organized to represent artists in Britain, Europe, South Africa and the Middle East of the giant American Artists Corporation of America.

GAC stars include, along with Mattioli, Paul Anka, Nat "King" Cole, Sam Cooke, Chubby Checker, Connie, Eartha Kitt, the Everly Brothers, Bobby Darin, Diana Ross and Eddie Fisher.

It seems almost certain now that Mattioli will sign a contract to represent the British organization, EMI, and that his signing in July will mark the first of his recordings for the new outfit.

The Britons for America part of the agreement is believed to involve a minimum of 50 acts a year, including the likes of the Beatles, the Ed Sullivan Show and Radio City Music Hall—a network system.

THE Jet-Harris-Tony Meehan tour is on. The ex-Shadows will make their first stage appearance together since the group in October, 1962, on the first leg of the Helen Shapiro tour. As reported in last week's DISC, it opens at Birmingham Town Hall on March 16 and continues until March 23.
