Reprise, thanks to Frank, is swinging

REPRISE, the label that many thought was a flash in the pan when it was formed nearly two years ago, is now really swinging and coming in the States to be one of the most lively outfits in America.

And it's largely thanks to the driving energy of the man who started it all. When he wanted it to happen, Frank Ifield has signed top-class artists from both sides of the Atlantic and is reviewed on page 10.

Hardly a month goes by without news coming in of another big signing of another star name of the pop, music or jazz, and now the list includes important names like Sinatra's old Capitol colleague, the Mr. and Mrs. Les Baxter, former Capitol stars Sammons, Count Basie and Duke Ellington, Ethel Merman, Rosemary Clooney, etc.

As well as recording with star groups, Ifield has directed his talents to the screen. Don Costa and Neal Hefti, Sinatra's old musical comedy partners, have the opportunity of singing with his new label colleagues like

NO SURPRISE ABOUT THE NEW BILLY FURY HIT

BILLY FURY'S A man at Decca, Dick Town, is pleased about the chart success of Billy's "Like I've Never Been Gone"—but not surprised.

"I first heard that song last August," he said. "Decca had DISC on the market, and I felt it was ideal for Billy right away. He agreed as soon as he heard it."

But before they could cut the disc, Billy's illness overtook him, and it wasn't until after his recovery that "Like I've Never Been Gone" went into the can.

"I wasn't happy about the long delay because we had to give the record to another music publisher,

who obviously want to place their songs with disc artists as soon as possible.

"But in this case I was lucky, because I knew that the fisher that Billy would definitely do it, he told off the number completely as far as other versions of the composition go."

A Fury recording session is always a big production involving at least 400 people.

"We use strings, people, rhythm sections, guitars, to give

every time," said Rose, "Despite the numbers involved, Billy's sessions are usually smooth and easy."

THE "Australians" are certainly the most popular group in our charts these days. Latest entry is Dan Spencer with his vocal version of "The Fireman." The TV connection can claim some credit for this

triumph, but a lot definitely rests on Dan's shoulders too.

Del Shannon, in New York, tells DISC

NO.4! GEE, THAT'S INCREDIBLE

DEL SHANNON had just finished a breakfast of hot buttered toast and milk when I called him at his New York hotel a few days ago. "Number 4, gee, that's incredible. It's a good number, but I didn't expect it to do THAT well!"

I had just told him the latest news of "Little Town Flirt" which shot up to 4 last week and has given him his seventh consecutive chart hit in Britain.

"I was asked to come to England all the more," he went on. "But apart from working I want to see some more of my countrymen, eat plenty of sardines on toast and play golf."

Doesn't taking things easy before a recording session that night at which he was due to wax up for an album with a "Flirt" theme?

"We're including 'Runaround Sue,' 'Go Away Little Girl,' 'Last Girl in Line' and Chubby's big hit 'Hey Baby,'" volunteered Del.

Del, incidentally, had dinner with Diana here in New York the other night — he was quite amazed to know I was doing "Runaround Sue" on the album!

My call had interrupted one of his frequent after-breakfast

record sessions at which he was playing country and western.

But at home in Detroit, Del told me, much of his time is spent in the basement of his house, where he has his first studio. "I've just built a little office and recording studio down there — nothing elaborate, just a couple of mikes and a tape machine." Oh yes, and there are my electric trains!

I guess I've got the bug for

electric trains — I've built up a pretty big collection and I spend a lot of time on them. When I get to London in April I want to buy a lot of British sets for my collection."

"At the moment I'm building the structure — you know, things like fields, stations, towns, etc."

"I've just finished a show with Johnny Tillotson just a short while ago — he's a great buddy of mine. He's going to do a solo tour of your country with me.

"I go home tomorrow morning and then I'll catch a plane and fly up to Canada to begin a tour in Ottawa. I'll be working with Cliff Richard."

Del also told me that he is hoping to meet Cliff Richard on his forthcoming tour. "I've got his first single and I've heard it twice but I've heard so much about him and I'm looking forward to

telling you stories with him," he added.

The weather in New York, I learned, was "beautiful but cold — it keeps a guy pretty much inside, but I like the city, still, I can do with the rest."

"Actually we don't start recording until 11 PM, so I have four hours to go around town ahead I feel pretty dead beat by the time we're through."

He was greening from Britain Hyndland and Little Eva — currently Britain, of course — I left Del Shannon to his records, thoughts and a plan for that railway structure,

AFTER four years in show business, during which time he has grossed over \$100,000 in sales for Liberty Records, Bobby Vee has turned producer.

He recently took his first session as an A and B man with a vocal group called The Shadows. The group has formed while still at high school, waiting for his break. "I'm in 'Swingin' Along' with Twentieth Century-Fox in 'Swingin' Along,' brought me a considerable deal with the company, and I don't want to let them down."

The Spotnicks—wary but glad to be here

FOUR weary Spotnicks sagged limply in their chairs in the Oriole office of A and R chief George Goldner on a dreary morning. They looked like rocket men who had just done a record number of push-ups and sit-ups. But they revived considerably when news came in that their hit single "I'm a Heartbreakin' Man" had sold 3,000 in the first hour of business.

The reason for their exhaustion was a chapter of accidents which had dogged the four British vid so far. Their coach broke down on the way here, and even now can only be deluged with thanks for giving the boys very little time for rest and refreshment before engagements.

SURPRISE SUCCESS

"We're very happy about 'Hava Nagila,'" though, said spokesman Bob Landry. "We'd never expected to have hits in February last year when we recorded it here in London, and the idea it could be so successful, we felt in their native Sweden, how-

ever, despite the fact that strings were added for the benefit of that market. We were worried about the reaction regarding pop music," explained Bob. "We have quite a few big American hits on our charts, but the rest of the hit parade is usually Swedish material, and there's nothing anything outside our country."

SWEDISH SHADOWS
Inevitably the boys have been tagged as the Swedish Shadows. "They're a bit different, of course, when I mentioned that topic," he said.

"We are. The Shadows very rarely, but we are not a bit like them in sound or policy," declared Bob. "We think the Shadows would agree about that, too."

That point cleared up, the boys talked about Britain. In spite of their travel problems, they seem to be enjoying the trip, and the implication is they're still glad to be back.

'WAYWARD WIND' HITS THE TOP AND

Three in a row Frank Ifield has made disc history!

FRANK IFIELD has made disc history.

He has become the only British singer ever to get his first three hits into the number one slot! Beating even the sensational starts of Cliff Richard and Adam Faith.

"Wayward Wind" moves to the top this week, and not surprisingly it was a very thrilled Frank to whom I broke the news earlier this week. So thrilled, in fact, that all he could say was, "Yeah? Great! Fabulous!"

When he had recovered sufficiently from his number three last week wasn't it?

I must admit I honestly didn't expect it to happen so quickly.

"I'm really knocked out by it," But in his usual never-counting

dream about the possibility of three number ones in a row. "It was only," said Frank, "when somebody mentioned the chance of it happening, that I began to think about it."

"And I rather wish they had not. To tell you that is just asking for disappointment."

"But getting back to this idea about not worrying, could you ask me what my future plans are. Well, maybe most people in my position do like to plan everything worked out, but not me!"

"I don't want to plan things so far ahead that they'll come off, but if I disappointed, I expect that some time in the future, if the right opportunity arises, I might just not be going to pin my hopes on anything."

"This is a bit of an exaggeration, but I suppose most people even want to think about tomorrow. Today is what really matters, the work we do, the art at this very moment. So don't ask me about my next record!"

HIT! HIT! HIT!

Cliff comes home to a fantastic run of success

HE'S done it again, and again, and again! Cliff Richard—due back today (Thursday) from his triumphant tour of South Africa—returns to a fantastic new trio of successes.

At theatres all over the country, fans have been queuing for hours to get into the shows which are now open for his tour which begins on February 23 at Cardiff. At Stockton Globe, where the box office opened at 10 a.m. on Monday, fans queued from 5 a.m. and by 1 p.m. there were 1,000 people and night to buy out both houses of the show there on March 17.

His new single—the little song from "Summer Holiday"—is expected to be one of the biggest sellers of the year. The record shops themselves. There has been a fantastic advance order on the disc of nearly 250,000 copies.

"Summer Holiday" itself is smashing even the box office records set up by "The Young Ones" in more than seven cinemas where it has been pre-released. Here again queues have become a familiar sight.

Meanwhile, Cliff, who the Shadows have collected more awards at the result of a poll in "Music Week" than any other artist in 50% of the votes, Cliff was voted the world's favourite singer, Elvis Presley the second with 20%, and Chuck Berry third with 3%.

The Shadows took 69% of the votes to win the world's favourite band title, while Cliff's Radio Luxembourg programme was voted the third favourite radio show by his DUTCH fans!

BIRMINGHAM AND MANCHESTER SPOTS FOR RAY

THREE more dates in London, three more in Birmingham, and two more in Manchester have been fixed for Ray Charles' visit. With his band and a guest star, Cleo Laine, he will play at the London New Victoria Cinema (1), Birmingham Odeon (16) and Manchester Free Trade Hall (18). Details of his tour of Britain will be given on Monday.

On Monday that follows the news of Charles' first two dates, the first two tickets will have been practically sold out even before they have gone to press!

'LUCKY STARS' CHALKS UP NUMBER 75

NIGEL HUNTER REVIEWS CLIFF'S NEW FILM LP

'Holiday' is a landmark in recording and film history!



'Summer Holiday'

THERE'S no doubt about it—this is the first album of the songs and tunes from a five-star film, with bright, sparkling performances from Cliff Richard, The Shadows giving all the tempo and fun in the film. In spite of the fact that the Shadows, the record shows them up better than the picture!

This set, produced by Norrie Paramor, follows the sequence of the film's sound-track, opening

with Cliff exhorting his London Transport garage mates to rally round and fit out the bus in time for the holiday, and reaching a climax with Cliff's "Round And Round," which has finally triumphed over Lauri Peters' scheming man.

Picking the best numbers is a hard task. Peter Myers and Rosalie have some nice ones, and Richard, Graziella, and Brenda Welch, Hank Marvin and Brian Bennett of The Shadows and Cliff himself contributed more good ones.

It's difficult to get away from "Let Girls" the most of The Shadows' numbers, and "Bachelor Boy" as the best solo performing effort of theirs.

Cliff's best, and the best of the whole set, is "A Swingin' Affair" which he does with Graziella Frame. It literally is a swing affair on a simple, swinging, jazzy instrumental rail call provided by Stanley Black and the ABS orchestra. This calibre of material and interpretation puts this one up there with the others, Graziella and Damones of the pop singing world.

All in all, "Summer Holiday" is another landmark in both film making and recording history, with the LP sales certain to reflect the enormous success of the picture.
