Yes, it sure is great to meet my Aussie friends again

LAST I'm back in Australia! I left on Feb. 10th, 1962, weeks ago and flew to Melbourne, and it sure was great to see so many old friends waiting to greet me at the airport.

I'm staying in an apartment near the ABC television studio, and I arrived at my flat at three o'clock this afternoon to prepare for my "welcome back" reception at the television station.

At seven I got up and dressed and at 7:45 pm a car arrived to take me to the studios. Being a "new" reception was "ring-a-ding-ding"! It was held in the basement of the ABC-TV studios and there must have been at least 250 people there.

At the reception I met a lot of interesting people, most of whom I had seen at my previous visits to Australia, including Rod Kingstone, my old friend from "The G.I. Show". I was also introduced to top Aussie popper Col Joye, who is a real character and a record, TV and stage draw.

Everybody wants to know about my tour. I'm doing "Silver Threads And Golden Needles" spread like a forest fire a few months ago and is scored very heavily in the hit parade.

The Tornados are doing very well with "Telstar," and I was asked more than once if it was true that "Telstar" was produced by the director of *One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest*, Peter Fonda. Last Sunday I went with some friends to the beach at Brighton, which are the hills behind Melbourne. We had a typical bush picnic and I meant stoned over an open spit.

The meat is prepared...ahem...in the same way as the game fire thrown out to the fire, thus flavouring the meat.

Yesterday I went swimming in the Olympic Pool

which is a swinging piece of architecture, built for the Olympic Games a year or so ago.

This pool is to die that they often drain the water and hold stage shows inside!

SWEET AND SWINGING

ELLA FITZGERALD, widely accepted and respected as the first lady of jazz song, opens her fifth British tour on Saturday at the Finsbury Park Astoria. She is a rare artist, who can safely come back now after a long absence, and still receive a warm and appreciative (and profitable) welcome on each occasion. But Ella is certainly one of them. Her individuality and her unique combination of vocal and dancing skills where tempo, tone, phrasing and lyrics interpretation are concerned. Yet she originally intended to be a dancer! So when the rave complex about her looks, Rather than back out altogether she decided to sing and did well, that she won first prize and a contract with Clark Webb.

She started with Webb until his death in 1946, and led the band for him. She has since recorded with many artists and has now recorded her first big hit - "A-Tisket, A-Tasket."

Ella will sing on Feb. 16th, 1963, at the Finsbury Park Astoria, the day of the big movement in jazz.

She is also due to appear in the remaining two of the very few artistry performances in Britain.

Ella is marking her current tour by the release of TWO new records this week on Verve. One is taken from *The Music Goes Round And Round* and "Signed Off"; the other - a rare vinyl release hot from the States - "Home Town" and "Old Man Moon" recorded at the Crescendo in Hollywood with the Paul Smith trio.

"Home Town" and "Old Man Moon" are recorded at the Crescendo in Hollywood (February 24); Glasgow (25); Newcastle (March 1); Manchester (27); Liverpool (29); Birmingham (March 1); Portsmouth (14); Kilburn (15); Sutton (16); Hammersmith (17); Victoria (18), and Sauchiehead (19).

BIG STAGE SHOW

Talking of stage shows, I am sure you'll be at the Melbourne Festival Hall on February 28—their really big show.

I received my copy of *DISC* today and I must say it's a pleasant surprise to see the artists at the top of our charts.

The success of Jet and Tony and the fact that they are British artists is something to be proud of.

One thing I seem to be missing out on are all the fabulously good British bands.

What with Brian Hyland, Little Eva and plenty more to come, we've never had it so good.

I JUST CAN'T SETTLE DOWN MATE!

JOE BROWN sank back into an easy chair and ran his fingers through that famous bristle top. In another corner of the dressing room Roll Harris pushed him over with the words: "And the atmosphere was expectant of the announcement. Dynamo Joe was about to make."

"Truth of the matter is I've got no 'one mate.' It's the thing what I'm hardest—I'm constantly travelling, living away from the surroundings I grew up in."

He shifted his position and spread his fingers across his face before continuing: "Every time I get back into London I naturally go back to our house in Chelmsford—but I can't settle down even there any more."

"I can't stay in with a bag of sweets and a good thriller. I'm sort of restless all the time; want to keep on getting up and down and around."

He crossed the long legs and took a look at the ceiling. "I'm so frustrated. Don't get me wrong—I love the business and I haven't gone all big time to find that the old place I was brought up in isn't good enough."

"It's just that I really don't

have anywhere to call home any more."

It was a bad night for Joe Brown. The first time he has stepped onto the stage of the Southend Odeon—the very place he signed his first professional contract with Barnes just five years before.

Giggle

"I remember that show," chuckled Joe. "I was playing guitar with the Big Beat group and Terry Dene and the rest of the band. I had a bill all set and a bit of a giggle when Vince Eager fell in the pit. You know there was a play before."

The pathos of five minutes ago was gone. "Well, I was counting again. What I wanted to count was—

It was only playing the guitar wasn't it? I was the other poor bloke who had to sit there and face an empty audience."

Then somebody came to knock on the door. "I went to answer it and tell Joe Brown that it was his turn—to face an empty audience."

And then he would have to stand yet another packed house with a smile for the audience and a smile for Joe Brown, but hopefully Joe Brown.

'I'm just an ordinary sort of girl,' says Billie Davis

"I DIG boys, clothes, music and all the things other girls like," said Billie Davis. "I'm just an ordinary type of girl. I mean, in being show business doesn't change all that, you know, since determined to enjoy the normal pleasures of life."

Eighteen-year-old Billie was talking to me during rehearsals for her "Thank Your Luck" star appearance this weekend at the Empire, and she did even further up her skirts.

"Mind you, nowadays I don't have too much time for relaxing," she said. "I'm working hard on my act, especially recently, because I'm doing the usual round of dressmakers, so I can be fitted out for personal appearances and publishers so I can get good material, and of course, a follow-up."

"I'm learning my modelling texts now to put me in long, silky dresses for my stage appearances. But both Bob and I feel that I still a little too young for all that," she said.

"I'm going to go out on stage in a really pretty sticks outfit. You know, frilly tops and

black silk pants, or a gold lame jacket with a gold belt. I feel I must be a good dancer, sitting on a high stool, not only for kicks, but because I can hear so much more listening to experienced musicians on stage."

"Actually, that's kind of what I'm doing at the moment, taking a modelling course. I should be very conscious of the stage yet still feel more at home in a stick outfit," she said.

"Now, this dress I'm wearing," Billie said on a white cocktail dress, "is a great dress. I can't afford any good show if you look hard enough. "Well, it had a high neck, and I'm wearing it with a great big diamond brooch."

"Well, we scored it out in both places, and how it looks different. I'm always doing things like that. I'm not a size 10, but I'm a standard size 10 and can buy anything without having it altered."

I changed the subject to boy friends. "Well, I haven't got a steady," admitted Billie, "because I'm not a girl, I'm a mate, it wouldn't be fair to him."

"Two of my closest friends are Ian Gregory and his brother, Kieren. We're all record collectors, and we often drop into each other's pads to chat. Kieren, who is a DJ, is a good friend. He's something of an artist in his spare time, and he calls on me to comment on his work."

"One day when I'm home alone, I like listening to records. Believe it or not, I particularly like the blues."

BACK in Britain again to record his latest film soundtrack score from Samuel French, the composer is Dimitri Tiomkin, uncrowned King of film scores.

He's been writing the music in Spanish, Chinese and English. Chinese set has been built for the film shooting. As always in Tiomkin's job, there are at least three strong themes which look set for commercial success in the States.

Paul Francis Webster, who collaborated with Tiomkin to produce "The Great Legend Of Genghis Khan" from "The Alamo," is again writing the lyrics. A major star will shortly be announced to cover the music on disc.

Accent

Despite a long career in the States, Russian-born Tiomkin still has a desire to see what you could cut with a scissor. And he's still describing a lot of film that hasn't been made yet. "But I went to get lucky with a few of them, and I wouldn't want to do anything else."

He has written 140 film scores and the musical score are the last remaining source of gainless income, though not necessarily of quality. But he does feel that pop composers are having a tough time if they're too commercial now. No matter how good their work.

Interest

"Films are great for persuading people to buy records. That's your work," he grinned. "If they know the tune or song is going into a big film with a star that entails, they want to know very quickly."

He has been invited to give general invitations to write pop songs by themselves without any film angle, but I'm sticking to my guns," he said.

He's now done approximately 140 film scores and there's a million and a half of others to record that total he believes will be on the right line.

BALLAD, BEAT?—BBC KEEP CONTEST SECRET

THE exact nature of the songs we will hear over BBC TV on Saturday evening in the British heat of this year's Eurovision Song Contest is a secret.

Songwriters' competition is a considerable departure from former years. The main difference is the BBC decision to commission the entries from leading songwriters instead of leaving the choice to the public.


This was the idea of Tom Sloane, head of BBC TV Light Entertainment. He felt that many music publishers failed to deliver their best material in view of the chance of it being beaten by the national vote," he told me. "The record industry tended to concentrate on songs primarily suited to the teenage market, while publishers aimed at the people who are on the national juries in the 16 competing countries at the final."

The BBC's concern to steer the heat of the contest away from the public has been reflected in the choice of the 16 juries which will judge Satoru's songs all over the country. There will be 12 jurors on each judging panel, and their ages will range from 16 to 60.

At long, long last it looks as though Elvis Presley IS coming to Britain! This the most shattering news in the history of British pop music, was revealed exclusively to DISC this week.

The Presley management was approached by a British impresario whose name is being kept secret only days ago and is giving the "strongest ever" consideration to Elvis playing five British dates—probably in the summer—this year.

DISC was told: "The incentive is NOT money. It is for something Elvis himself very much wants to do. Not only that but a project dear to him depends entirely on his visiting Britain this year."

Tentative plans for the invasion of this country by the biggest phenomenon show business has ever known have already been outlined and it is virtually certain that his visit would include a date at Wembley Stadium.

More definite news is expected soon — possibly within a fortnight — and developments will be reported fully in DISC.

Several offers for Presley have been made since he was demobbed from the U.S. Army, but DISC understands that none has been as strong, as tempting or as likely to succeed as this one.

Elvis is at present filming "Fun In Acapulco" in Hollywood. No immediate commitments are confirmed for him when filming ends in April.

ONE of Duane Eddy's most prized possessions is a tiny bag of gold. In one night he could earn enough to buy the same quantity but that little bag is precious beyond value to Duane — for he found it himself.

From his home in Phoenix, Arizona, he headed his four-wheeled jeep into the wide-open spaces and spent days on end prospecting for that gold. Lone days, far removed from the bustle and bustle that normally surrounds him.

Travelling alone, or with just a trusted friend, at the way end, he relaxes from the excitement and glitter of show business. Frequently he wanders aimlessly across the desert, of Arizona.

And in the same case as he does his bag of gold, Duane stores a collection of old guns, rusted and corroded from years beneath the desert sand, along with them the aid of a pointer counter!
