NEW CHUBBY CHECKER TOUR DEPENDS ON LIMBO HIT

IF Chubby Checker's new single "Let's Limbo Some More" is a hit, then the king of the dance will probably tour the world this summer. He is appearing in Ireland from July 19 through the end of that month and then comes to Hamburg for dates at the Star Club and for TV. The British dates are dependent on whether the Limbo catches on.

A new Liverpool group breaks into the chart

ANOTHER Liverpool group breaks into the charts this week... Gerry and the Pacemakers, who follow The Beatles in "How Do You Do It" in number 24. Again it's a debut disc, again it was recorded under the supervision of George Martin, and again they have the same manager as the Beatles, Liverpool record shop director, Brian Epstein. But the most important similarity between the groups is that they both have that distinctive Liverpool sound.

"Hearty and uninhibited," is how the groups' recording manager George Martin describes it. Gerry is 20-year-old Gerry Marsden and The Pacemakers are his elder brother Freddy, who also plays drums; Les Maguire, 21, from Wallasey, piano and guitar; and Les Chadwick, 19, bass guitar.

Gerry's music career began while he was a joiner in Liverpool employed making tea chests. Johnny didn't last long though and Gerry worked for some time with British Railways on their delivery vans and set duty ran a group called the Mars Bars. After this was disbanded The Pacemakers were formed and they turned professional in 1960 when they went to Germany to play in Hamburg's Top Ten Club.

HUDDLED warmly in a brown overcoat buttoned up to the collar, Cliff Richard, Britain's most valuable singing sensation, walked down a corridor towards me: "Sorry about this but The Shadows are using my dressing room to tune up so they won't let us talk in there," he apologised.

We were backstage in one of the provincial theatres Cliff is currently taking by storm on his nationwide tour. Of all the places I have seen him, this dimly-lit, red-bricked corridor was without doubt the best.

But it made little difference, for Cliff's warm-hearted personality always makes for a friendly chat and with a score of hits always within chanting distance, the atmosphere is never in danger of subsiding.

Meaning every word, he told me how happy he was to be back on tour.

"You know, I'm delighted—the fans are listening even more to the ballads than ever instead of screaming them down."

"That pleases me, because if a ballad is a good one then it's worth listening to and I feel I can do it so much better if I can hear myself and sing softly."

"Before I just used to say 'hello' when I came on, and 'goodbye' before I went. Now I can talk to the audiences."

"Mind you, I'm not having a go at the screaming—that kind of noise is the greatest for rock 'n' roll excitement and rock go together."

We heard bootleggers from an adjoining corridor and around a corner appeared Cliff's Mum, Mrs. Dorothy Webb.

Mother and son hugged and then I was introduced. You'll have to stand on the side of the stage mum, there are no seats left." Cliff told her. But it's my guess Mrs. Webb came prepared for that common sense.

Alone again, we talked about recording. "You know, even though Frank Field has beaten me to being the first British artist to do it, it is still my ambition to have three Number Ones in a row," Cliff declared.

"Not I mustn't complain," he continued, passing a hand through his carefully combed hair. "Life has been so good for me now, I think I would be overful if much more came my way."

Sometimes somebody opened an exit door and we pulled our overcoats in tight, or Cliff tried to catch a cold would be a catastrophe. On tour more than 2,000 fans a night would be disappointed if he had to stay in bed.

"Say, you don't happen to have a copy of DISC on you by any chance?" he asked. I produced one and he made straight for the chart page.

Hurting towards Ipswich, he says

...me, that's what I'm always short of

"MY big problem," said Joe Brown, "is time. Man, it's all gone these days... I don't seem to have a minute free." And with that we piled into his luxurious Rover and headed for Ipswich.

"I've got a show there tonight," he explained. "How long does it take to get there from London? Three hours? 'Course, I'll give you a lift and we can talk on the way."

I'd arranged to meet Joe at the studios immediately after he'd finished a session recording a single for a TV commercial. We thought, at the time, we'd have half an hour free for a bit of lunch.

He didn't.

STAYING OVERNIGHT

He was staying overnight at Ipswich so he had to have some clean shirts. A quick dash over to his Mum's flat in Chiswick to collect them. Twenty-one I washed yesterday, she told me. "I don't know what he does with them," she added, and laughed about it. She's a very homely sort of person.

"I'm really sorry about this," said Joe when we were back in the car and zig-zagging through London's traffic.

With the responsibility of stopping the show Joe is a little more leaped up than he used to be, when he was just one of the lads.

"You know, we're not even going to have time for a meal. And I haven't eaten a thing today. Loads of coffee and packets of cigarettes. If we stop now we're never going to get there in time for the first show. That'll be a terrible thing to happen."

GOING TO BE LATE AGAIN

"I've already missed two shows because I've tried cramming too much in. That just mustn't happen again. I can't do much more than that. But, honestly, we're never going to make it tonight."

His right foot went down even harder, a taxi scuttled for cover.

"I'm not working any harder now than I was four or five years ago," said Joe. "I couldn't but it does seem to be getting on top of me a bit these days."

"You know, wherever I think I've got a couple of hours off, there's always something that crops up which has to be done.

I'd like nothing better than to come down and have a nice leisurely drink with you one lunch-time. But when?"

"This star business is a funny thing. You know, I don't feel any different, but when I'm working on stage I'm accepted more easily... although they don't seem to go for me singing my latest hit.

"What they really want to hear is 'Henry The Eighth' and to be honest I'm getting pretty sick to the back teeth with that number."

"I've been singing it every night for four or five years! Still, if that's what they want then

that's what they can have. But on this present tour I had to change the entire set program after the first couple of nights. The old stuff, that's what they wanted."

"Mind you, I do find the audiences are a bit different now. When I was just a supporting act the lads used to root for me and when they came out of the

theatre they'd probably say 'Louie show now! It's that bloke Joe Brown wasn't too bad, was he?'"

"Now, if it's a lousy show I'm the one to blame."

"Of course, the money these days is nice."

As we speed smoothly through the traffic with just the occasional hostile competition which dodged up with Joe winding down the window and grinning apologies to the drivers he wasn't honking—*as I asked him why he didn't employ a chauffeur.*

"Had one once," he said. "I've lasted one day... I couldn't stomach it. I kept calling for it."

But anyway I enjoy driving. And this is a nice car (it cost around £2,000) though next year I'm hoping to buy a Bentley. In the long run I reckon it will be cheaper."

"You don't have to spend a penny on it. 150,000 miles before it needs a de-coke. Mind you, if the brakes wear out that'll set you back a hundred quid."

A BENTLEY NEXT YEAR

"Why not a Rolls? Blimey, I'm not paying £200 just for a catalyst!"

As we began to clear the traffic in London, Joe for the first time seemed to notice it was a nice sunny day.

"Marvelous," he said, that big grin spreading from ear to ear. "Tomorrow afternoon we've got to do a London, Ipswich and Norwich run. I can play a round in the afternoon. That's always providing that we try to finish on time."

Bad throat didn't stop Shirley

SHIRLEY BASSEY fought a back-stage battle with a chronic sore throat before opening her tour with Matt Monro to packed houses at Bristol's Colston Hall last Friday. Only frequent excursions aloft stage to gargle away the rough edges crushed her to complete her 30-minute star spot.



I ALWAYS think it's a shame that quality singers like Kenny have to wait for that elusive hit single to come along before getting the chance to produce an album of their own. Anyway, Kenny's time has come, and he justifies all the praise and approval he has been winning all these months with this set.

Side 1 has three songs from the forthcoming "Just For Fun" film musical. Two of them, "Vote" and "Crazy," were penned by Kenny with Sid Wickham, and the third, "Moments," is a "Wendell" effort. All three are lovely, and bode well for the film itself if they're representative of its musical standards.

Kenny has a stylish way of his own with songs which move through rock and swing territory. He gets good support from Harry Robinson's orchestra, and further demonstrates his ability as a songwriter with "Happy That Me" and "This Is The Night For Love."

And the Cramer touch is especially delightful, as ever, in "You're Still In The Night For Love," which is light, deft and commercially delightful.

I HOPE Ketty has you to fade out altogether from the pop scene now that her Love Letters has been and gone. I'm afraid it was that rolling waltz piano as much as her vocal virtuosity which got that one of the ground into the charts, but there's definitely

room for a classy song stylist like this.

The rolling piano bit crops up in the second and last track, too, which I feel is a mistake. Listening alone strikes better, and a singer of Ketty's caliber doesn't have to rely on one solitary accompaniment to set off her vocal virtuosity.

Johnny Tillotson

Steps His Four Biggest Hits; I'm In It For You; I'm In It For You; I'm In It For You; I'm In It For You. (London RE-A-1000)

NICHOLSON does best illustrating the country-folk sound which has no introduction to his fans. The country/folk is evident always, and Johnny demonstrates decisively that you don't have to scream, assemble, belch or hiccup to put over your songs effectively.

Johnny Mathis

Repeaters; Love Me As Though I Were A Fool; My Love; My Love; My Love; My Love. (Mercury, CMA 6211)

FOUR gorgeous songs excellently arranged and handsomely conducted by Don Coville and the voice of Johnny Mathis. My view of his ability to hit a note accurately and his other faults are well enough known now not to need repetition.

KETTY LESTER—She is too good to rely on a gimmick.

At last I'm no longer a lone critical voice, although I took Johnny's vitriol. Jack Boxer may persuade my fellow singers to listen attentively to his own singing on disc.

FRANK McEVY—Traditional Country (STEP 3448) — I'm In It For You

McEvoy is a leading accordionist in the Irish trad dance world and offers set dances and jigs beautifully played to good exactly as you would expect from a trad singer. I hope that Peter Sellers will use him through it, though.

CHUCK MITCHELL—Shade And Swing (ILK—Ditty With Ditty) (Dunlop STEP 3018) — A twined country dance set supported by third set and inspire us to wail. I suppose Sandy Denny does the first set, and Chuck Mitchell takes the first set, accompanied by Peter Sellers and the Thunderbolts. The music is old, dreary and utterly devoid of any life or vitality.

CRACIE FIELDS—Four Country Tracks (DITCO 5310) — I'm In It For You

CRACIE is in good voice for the season last November, get necessary standing. Backed by The Bobcats, she sings a set of four songs, including *Love Me As Though I Were A Fool* and *Somebody With Your Feet*.

GEORGE CHANIER—Capitol (ILK—Ditty With Ditty) (Dunlop STEP 3018) — I'm In It For You

Wendell Side Story set practically includes a couple of the most wonderful songs in this century. He sings *Marla* with an even better feeling, and sings *Tomb Raider* with a more authentic, more authentic background.

He gets good support from the Milton Bakula orchestra.

MOIRA BRIDY—Star To Me (Mercury, CMA 6211) — I'm In It For You

BRIDY (Previously NIP 1481) — I'm In It For You

NEW—An Irish lass singing Scottish songs and an Irish lass singing Scottish songs with an accent you could cut with a scalpel, offered here by Paddy in *Heavenly*. Her other faults are well enough known now not to need repetition.

Amidst the boxes of chocolates and flowers thrown on stage during JOE BROWN'S performance at Brighton Dome last night, arrived an unusual perk—a frozen food container containing roast beef, Yorkshire pudding, peas and potatoes. With it was a note saying "I hope you enjoy it," and signed by a fan.

Joe told me afterwards: "It came just at the right time—I've starved!"

Beside me, wearing an overcoat over his shoulders cape-style, stood the greying but upright figure of Sullivan himself—a man who has introduced every one of America's top musical artists and many of our own.

The show he was making included—as well as Cliff and The Shadows—Frank Field, Peter O'Toole, several variety acts and his husband's own Miss Show Business, Judy Garland.

A galaxy of talent, but Ed Sullivan is used to stars.

After a rather shaky appearance on NBC I gave Elvis Presley his first important television contract—it cost 50,000 dollars for three shows, but if it paid off, it really had the whole-ten-thousand's" drawled Ed.

• 'loaded' •

"Although he was new to star status, television didn't make him nervous—he has always had a lot of professionalising," I remember at a Press conference after we signed the contract I had warned him that if he was first among 'loaded' questions I would step in and help out.

"But he didn't need any help. A woman reporter asked him if he was embarrassed about his white Cadillac outside being covered with lipstick kisses. He replied: "No ma'am—the kids who put those kisses there put me here. Smart boy."

"This lad has the same sort of polish as Elvis," Ed said, pointing to Cliff. "He's careful not to make mistakes too. I've watched Cliff and I notice how

much respect he holds his audiences in, living and working for them.

"That makes for stardom and if this boy certainly has made it."

Ed watched approvingly as one of his American producers stepped forward out of camera range and signalled Cliff to poke his thumbs into his trouser belt U.S.-style.

Then the number came to an end and somebody called Sullivan away. Minutes later he appeared, made-up and ready for the cameras.

The lights went on and Ed's introduction of Cliff was filmed another few seconds of show for American viewers which will make history.
