BBC LIFT BAN ON DON CHARLES RECORD


THE BBC have lifted their ban on Don Charles' single "Angel Of Love" after an estimated 20 million viewers heard the disc on last Saturday's "That Was The Week That Was". The sumpus over "Angel Of Love" blew up in the middle of last week when the BBC refused airplay on the disc on religious grounds, stating that some people might take offence. In case the ban affected sales, Charles' rush recorded a new single on Friday for possible

release at the beginning of April, but if the change of heart at the BBC helps the disc to move, then this date will be put back. This weekend, the singer plays ballroom dates in Birmingham, followed by a tour of United States Air Force Bases in April. He has been offered two summer seasons and will probably accept one and follow it with return tours of Scotland and Germany. On April 22 he opens for a week in cabaret at London's Astor Club, and in May he has been booked into the Stork Club, Streatham, for another week.

IT WAS 10.30 a.m. New York time when I called Bobby Vee on Monday. "Hey," said a sleepy voice, "you've woken me up." I apologized. "No need to do that," said Bobby. "It's a great day here and I wouldn't want to miss a moment of it. My A and R man Stuffy Garrett and I are in New York to open a new office for Liberty."

"No, I don't intend to do anything in Los Angeles. I've been producing sessions with my old backing group, The Strangers. They cut a British number, 'The Mind Reader,' backed with a number Stuffy and I wrote called 'Card Sharp.' The disc has just been released, so naturally we're hoping for a hit."

"Actually, I saw the boys on Friday. We got into a card game and there was such a mix-up that Bobby Vee didn't come off the greatest. Jerry Allison's out of the way all have a ball here. Each time I see The Crickets we talk over the good times we had in Britain."

"Stuffy helped me with that session. I'd have been in the greatest of messes if he hadn't." "And you know what else I've been hoping for? I've been writing songs. I composed three on my new album, 'Night Has A Thousand Eyes,' and another three for a new Ventures album which they're cutting next month. "This songwriting is really out of a saddle, but it's pretty profitable."

Talking of 'Night Has A Thousand Eyes,' I informed Bobby of its success here. "Isn't it just the greatest," he enthused. "I'm really thrilled, and I hope my next disc, 'Charm's,' is as successful. It was written by Howie Greenfield and I think it's a winner. Certainly it's beginning to break here in the States."

"Tell me, has 'Just For Fun' opened in England yet? Boy, did

A SCOTCH-BORN singer who lived in Canada has smashed the American charts wide open and looks set to make a favourable dent here. He's Johnny Cymbal, whose "Mr. Bass Man" could be one of the hit novellas of the year.

Tommy Roe's future depends on success of 'Folk Singer'

TOMMY ROE is keeping his fingers crossed that his latest hit here, "The Folk Singer," will make it in the States. If it does, then his act—Tommy, the big heat for him is strictly out of his act—forever?

"I pray that 'The Folk Singer' will take off back home," he told me between sittings for a new, groovy suit backstage at the Crofton ABC. "If the disc makes it, I will work off my burning ambition I have to become a real entertainer."

"Maybe I'm being a little optimistic, but I figure that if 'The Folk Singer' can get off the ground in England, where this kind of music isn't so popular, then I must stand better chance with it in the States because anything that has been the big swing for a long time.

"There are other reasons too," continued the six-footer, slipping into a hanging jacket and Norfolk jacket (he really takes his clothes seriously). "The Folk Singer is a hard sell. I've gotten away from the Hardy-mystical kind of music I did with this. I can lose the tag I picked up through 'Sheila.' I'm grateful for 'Sheila' success, but with it came the accusation that I was just another singer trying to cash in on Buddy's bandwagon.

In fact, I didn't want my record

company to release my follow-up disc, 'Suzie Darling,' because immediately after my first hit I was ready to swing into action in the folk field.

"Folk is my kind of music," he shows like 'Grand Ole Opry' you know, there's a great story line attached to 'The Folk Singer.' It's actually about Johnny Cash, who played a date one night and lost a voice. I fell for the story more than the tune.

"What I intend to do if 'The Folk Singer' makes it, is develop a night club act. Rock business for a long time. Don't think I'm not happy with the way I made it originally, but now I'm there I want to sing the kind of music which will keep me here."

"The night club field is the greatest field in American show business. It could be counting my chickens before they're hatched. After all, 'The Folk Singer' was only released in the States last week, and so far I've had no indication as to whether it will sell."

THERE'S SOMETHING GOING TO BE A NEW ME

"I'll take a little time," said Helen Shapiro, as we chatted during a BBC rehearsal, "but I've decided there's going to be a new me."

"Not someone you won't recognise," continued this remarkable 16-year-old, between shots at her locks with hair lacquer, "but there are to be some definite changes made because I'm becoming more aware of myself."

"Well, I mean, I left school just over a year ago, and was living in at the drop end. This is great, but I had very little time to get a hold of myself and realise what was going on.

"Now I'm beginning to appreciate that by stage, develop from a teenager into a young lady."

"I can't go on singing the same kind of music I sang a year ago. It gets stale and, anyway, you have to move with the times."

"I have an ambition to sing jazz, and some really wild rhythm and blues numbers. I'd love to do. What'd I say, but so many people use it already that it would be a bit stupid.

While I was in Israel I started playing my banjo on stage. My banjo numbers were a smidgen of songs on the banjo and I worked out quite well, so this is a new addition to the act. I'm going to wear more lace, and will take a few lessons in acting, not because I think I'm a

Sarah Bernhardt, but because this sort of thing will help my presentation.

"You know, I have a ten week season coming up in Great Yarmouth. It's a great big production show, but what an opportunity it will give me to work out a new and more exciting act."

"And I'll tell you one thing, I recorded some knock-out stuff in Nashville. Rock rockers. I learnt a thing or two there. I can tell you. You wait till I start belting some of them out, there's one number which is really wild."

She breathed a sigh of relief, ran her fingers through her now quite messy hair and commented, "I should have washed this mop last night, but didn't have time. It's grown a little—but not too much. Mum wants me to have long hair, and I've told her I will, but not for a little while yet. I think you've got to be sophisticated for that, and I'm hardly a fashion plate.

"Soil. I'm sure I show signs of growing up when I tell you that it wasn't so long ago that I got out of those schoolboards and a short crop cut, which is a start, anyway, isn't it?"

In an off-beat talk to DISC Bruce Welch reveals why

The Shadows couldn't be more excited

SECRETS of The Shadows' next single, how they plan to spend the summer at Blackpool and revelations about Licorice Locking's absent-mindedness... it all came out when I spoke last week to an excited Bruce Welch.

Excited?—about the success of The Shadow's latest single of course. I had just told him that the record had moved from the Number Two slot to Number One, taking over from Cliff's "Summer Holiday." "That's fabulous, You know, I hoped we'd knock him off the top again," quipped Bruce.

Despite the enormous success of "Foot Tapper," The Shadows are already preparing for the release of their next single. They have actually recorded the number—another tune from Jerry Lordan in the same edition as "Wonderful Land"—although it has not yet been finally decided whether an orchestra should be added to the untitled 'A' side.

Foot-slogging

"On the slip we'll almost certainly be having another number by Hank," called it "Foot Tapper Rides Again" and Bruce.

"Talking of Hank," he went on, "did you know that he's bought a new Rover like mine? Not that we'll be using them all that much up in Blackpool this summer, it'll be a case of foot-slogging."

We are going to get out of bed and go down in the beach by eight o'clock every morning—well, almost every morning—for exercise and a good long run.

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
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
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
