

"THOSE Springfields! They knock us out. Have you heard them in person? I bet they're even better than they are on their records. That's the first thing we wanted to know when we got here. Where are The Springfields?"

John Stewart of The Kingston Trio was lavish in his praise of our pop-folk trio. His opinions were supported by Nick Reynolds and Bob Shane, who complete America's most famous folk threesome.

The Kingstons, who were here for TV and concert dates, are billed as "the group which started it all," and it's a fair

enough description. John Stewart is the "baby" of the group, and it were having taken the place of founder-member Dave Guard when he left to branch out on his own. He has very definite views on folk music today.

"A hundred years from now people like Elvis Presley, Neil Sedaka and Paul Anka will be regarded as representing the folk music of the 1950s and 60s. That may sound a little strange, calling rock folk music. But I'm sure it's right. Folk music reflects the mood, temperament and atmosphere of the age, and that's what rock does these days."

James Darren is in the midst of making his third "Gidget" film. This time it's "Gidget Goes To Rome" and the lady in being played by newcomer Cindy Carol. Jimmy will sing two songs which he will record in both English and Italian. They will be released the same time as the movie—in July.

CLEM CATTINI of The Tornados was surrounded by eager autograph hunters. The other members of the group were scattered around the bar, which this particular evening was selling more soft drinks than anything else. They too were surrounded by fans.

At times when the twisting music in the dance hall of the North London restaurant stopped a large group of fans surged into the bar and looked longingly at the door through which everyone knew Billy Fury would soon enter.

For this was Friday, April 19, the night Billy was coming to the party which his fan club had thrown in honour of his twenty-second birthday.

They lined the stairs up which they knew he must come. Some even waited out in the road to have the honour of being the first to see him arrive.

"By the time he gets up here he won't have a thread on his back if he has to run that gauntlet," said one of the restaurant staff to me. Four burly London policemen had the same idea, but they kept well in the background.

But Clem Cattini just looked up from the sea of faces which surrounded him and said: "Billy's fans won't touch a hair of his head . . . you wait and see." And went back to signing autographs.

The Tornados were having an evening off. They were there to enjoy themselves, although they were later to back Billy when he sang to the hundreds of fans who were packed into the hall.

Said Clem: "You know we're just finished our dates at the Olympia in Paris. We had a wonderful time, and now all we've got to do is this short tour with Billy and then we have a holiday. Man, are we really looking forward to it!"

"I think some of the boys are going abroad. I'm not sure, but I know I'm not. I'm going to spend a fortnight in bed!"

"We've been working pretty hard lately and that's all I want to do. Lie in bed all day and think and do absolutely nothing."

The fans didn't give him much chance to continue. As soon as they saw he was free a new group of faces surrounded him.

"When you have a night off like this don't you get just a bit tired of signing all these autographs?" I asked him.

"When they stop asking, that's when I shall get fed up," replied Clem. "And anyway, when it's just Billy's fans they never come any trouble."

Then suddenly the dance floor erupted. Billy and his manager Larry Barnes, both tanned after their holiday in America, had arrived.

Straight into the bar they went to sit down at a long table piled high with birthday cards and presents. Billy was almost hidden from view but nobody tried to pinch a souvenir . . .

New chart star Julie Grant is just nuts about Elvis!

"ASK me anything—anything at all about Elvis, and I'll be able to give you the right answer," sighed Julie Grant. "I think he's the absolute living end."

And to prove that she's no mean fan, the young pop star confessed that she has 2,400 pictures of the Pelvis, all neatly

cut up and pasted into scrap books, is an honorary member of three of his fan clubs, and would willingly fork out £100 to see her idol in person.

Julie dropped into the DISC office to talk about her latest chart entry "Count On Me," and finished up by spending most of the time going into raptures over Presley, Billy Fury and The Beatles.

She even has a small box attached to a key ring with a toy bottle inside just to prove she's a fan of theirs!

Julie's own rising career stood firmly in second place as her eyes glazed with adoration for other stars!

"You know, on my fifteenth birthday I was taken to see 'Flaming Star,' and because Elvis died in the film, I had to be carried out of the cinema crying," confessed Julie. "He really is my one weakness."

"Of course, I'm terribly excited about my latest record," she admitted, almost as an afterthought! "As soon as I heard the number I knew it stood a very good chance."

I asked how the session went. "It was O.K., except that my voice was a bit dodgy," Julie recalled.

Actually, I had a frog in my throat. Tony Hatch told me to drink port and lemon, and that seemed to make it better. The finished master was all right and we didn't do any more takes than usual.

"We started the session at about eight o'clock in the evening at Lansdowne. I always record there, as the studio is small and you can get loads of atmosphere out to the finished disc.

"I always dress casually for these dates. I like to feel relaxed. Not so relaxed that I'll wear jeans and an old shirt, just a skirt and sweater."

Every time she steps outside her flat in Woodside Park, London, young Miss Julie Grant feels as if she's making a personal appearance. "I don't hold with

the view that you can go out sloppily dressed and get away with it," she said.

"My mother is marvellous as far as all that's concerned. She watches me like a hawk, and I follow her advice carefully. She's very much with it—she doesn't even object to my wearing leather, as long as it isn't black!"

Mum travels with me on the road, too. I have to have a chaperone and she says that if she didn't do it, she'd be at home all day just worrying about me. Mum's the one who encourages me to mix with other teenagers

Pacemakers are still on Cloud Nine

AT some time—he was in such a daze he can't remember exactly when—between the hours of 5 and 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Gerry Marsden was presented with this paper's Silver Disc award for his number one hit selling single, "How Do You Do It?"

The occasion was a guest appearance on "Tuesday Rendezvous," Gerry, the twenty year old Scot, whom Northern girls reckon is their answer to Joe Brown, knew he would be getting a Silver Disc, but didn't have a clue when the presentation would be made until his manager, Brian Epstein, stood before him, in camera, with the award in his hand.

That Gerry was momentarily stunned is an understatement. But he can be forgiven, as he can each time someone tells him another milestone in his short career has been reached.

Like the time he hit the number one slot, his face registered complete and natural surprise, and all he could say was, "Cor!"

But this is typical of Gerry Marsden, leader of The Pacemakers, and good friend of The Beatles. He's not the kind of person to let success go to his head. Unassuming and with a quick warm sense of humour, Gerry Marsden has led The Pacemakers and the Liverpool scene to a success which looks like a long-lasting one.

FOR THE RECORD...

Gerry Marsden

GERRY MARDEN'S own, G sheet life story is varied to say the least. Born on September 24, 1942, and educated at Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Liverpool, he quit school at fifteen, and landed his first job as a tea chest maker with a coffee company! When he decided to form a skiffle group, which he called The Mars Bars ("I could never understand why I chose that name"), Gerry found his tea chests came in pretty handy! Six months with the coffee company, and Gerry Marsden

had moved on to work on the British Railways' Delivery Vans where he stayed for a year and a half—hence his concern for his old mates on Central Station.

At 17, Gerry formed the original Pacemakers, and he was forever grateful when the group got a spot at the famous Top Ten Club in Hamburg.

On their return, their pianist quit, and Gerry and the Pacemakers worked the Liverpool scene as a trio—often on dates with The Beatles—until they found a replacement. Finally, A and R man George Martin up in Liverpool on Beatles' business, was persuaded to watch them on a ballroom date, and they were signed on the spot.

Freddy Marsden

TWO years older than Gerry, Freddy Marsden was born on October 23, 1940, and he is extremely happy that his kid brother has been so successful.

He has worked with Gerry for the past six years, and was one of the original Pacemakers when the group was formed in 1959. Plays drums and sings.

Les Maguire

NEWEST member of The Pacemakers, Les Maguire joined the group in May, 1961, and has written several numbers with Gerry Marsden, including the title of their disc, "Away From You."

Was born on December 27, 1941, plays piano and guitar and sings.

Les Chadwick

A LONGTIME friend of Gerry and Freddy Marsden, Les Chadwick plays bass guitar and sings.

The youngest member of the Pacemakers, Les was born on May 11, 1943, and at sixteen joined the original group.

JIMMY'S ALL SET TO GO

NEXT week will see another important stage in the career of Jimmy Justice. For after something of a lull in his recording life, Jimmy is all set for a marathon week in the disc studios which could send him speeding back into the charts.

A few days ago he revealed to me: "I shall be waxing a new single which is the cover of a very big American success. We're naturally keeping the identity of the song secret but I'm very excited about it."

However, that's only one section of his recording plans for the week. Jimmy will also make an album of songs which have been hits over the past six months. Included in the titles he has chosen with recording manager Tony Hatch are "The Folk Singer," "Up On The Roof," "The Night Has A Thousand Eyes," "Swiss Maid" and a male version of the Billie Davis hit—"Tell Her."

Also on the album will be the number he has included so successfully in his stage act. "Save

The Last Dance For Me." But there's still more—the big new Jimmy Justice record onslaught will also cater for the Continent. In French and German he will wax "When My Little Girl Is Smiling," "Ain't That Funny," "Parade Of Broken Hearts" and "World Of Lonely People."

To back up the Continental releases he will spend most of June undertaking personal appearances and television dates in Denmark, Sweden and Norway.

"That takes me near to Sweden where my singing career really got on its feet," said ex-magazine representative Jimmy, for it was only just over a year ago that he burst back into native Britain with "My Little Girl."

"I was very lucky to follow through with 'Ain't That Funny' and 'Spanish Harlem' but for some reason 'Lonely People' and 'Broken Heart' just didn't take off. However, it's the new one we're counting on."

During American hit parader Johnny Thunder's visit—due to start at the end of September—he will play venues in Birmingham, Southsea, Liverpool, Doncaster, Preston, Hull and Darlington.

Irish tour for Kenny

KENNY LYNCH will tour both Ireland and Scotland in June. He will visit Ireland for five days from June 12 and Scotland for nine days from June 21.

For his Isle of Wight concert on June 9 Ronnie Carroll will play both the Sandown Pier Pavilion and the Aladdin Theatre.

Gene Vincent records film song for Meek

GENE VINCENT was recorded by Joe Meek last Saturday in a move which is expected to half the American singer's release from Capitol. Both are marathon disc men in their own fields—the sales of Vincent's "Be Bop A Lula" and Meek's "Tribute" both ran into millions.

They waxed "Temptation Baby" which Vincent will sing in the forthcoming film, "Live It Up."

It is not yet known on which label the disc will be released. Vincent, who has been with Capitol throughout his recording career, remains a major record seller in many parts of the world—he currently has six discs in the French Top Fifty.

Gene was backed on the Meek session by a group newly named as The Blue Caps—formerly Dru Harvey and the Jokers.



KENNY BALL FOR PALLADIUM AGAIN

KENNY BALL and his Jazzmen have been booked for their fourth appearance on ATV's "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" on Sunday week (May 5). They join Susan Maughan headlining in her debut on the show.

Ball and the Jazzmen are the latest signing for the forthcoming screen musical "Live It Up" which also stars Gene Vincent, The Outlaws, Heinz Burt, Jennifer Moss, Andy Cavill and Sounds Inc.

Billy Fury has now been set for May 25, along with Jet Harris and Tony Mehan and The Brook Brothers. The Vixens Girls have been confirmed for the all-Liverpool bill on June 29.

Heinz cuts film song

HEINZ BURT recorded the title song of the film "Live It Up" on Tuesday for subsequent release on Decca. He films his part of the picture on May 6 before flying to Birmingham where he will make his solo theatre debut in the Jerry Lee Lewis package at the Town Hall that evening.



WELL, the rhythm 'n' blues followers who have had much to complain about in recent months should be smiling! And beating a path to Pye's door. Because this label's newly launched R and B releases are supplying first-class material from artists like Bo Diddley and Cyril Davies.

They also bring out Howlin' Wolf among this week's batch . . . and if that doesn't arouse cheers in many quarters, I think the label's entitled to be surprised and hurt.

DONNY BURNETTE and his brother Dorsey come together on disc for the Reprise label and should bring both their fan following back to the air in a hurry.

"It Don't Take Much" is a slow, pulsing rock effort which they penned for themselves. Excellent dueling, of course, in the vein they've milked separately before now. Guitars and punchy electronic organ for accompaniment.

Guitars twang as the brothers go country and western for the quicker juggling "Hey Sue" which Dorsey and Johnny harmonize for the turnover.

Frank Sinatra

Call Me Irresponsible; This Time (Reprise R 20151)***—
THE teaming together again of Nelson Riddle and Frank Sinatra deserves better both in the matter of material and performance than the *Irresponsible* Van Heusen band *Call Me Irresponsible*.

Frank drags through the romancer as if he's about to fall asleep over the microphone and, for me anyway, fails to capture the

lovely heart-fluttering quality that should be present. The Riddlings seem to be afflicted with the same yawning sickness. Good but by no means great.

Time—from the same composers—is another slow drawl and without a new idea in it. I'm afraid, Vocal is better, but still not Sinatra at his best.

THE ROUTERS—*Sling Ray; Snap Happy*
(Warner Bros. WB 9745)***—
With The Routers comes *Sling Ray*, the purring Latin hand-clapping beat. A very infectious approach. They should be selling high here.

Snap Happy is also lifted from the album. Drums, guitar and sitar weave with a wildness that almost dispenses the very careful tailoring of the arrangement.

DEREK NEW—*Whistle Stop; Blue Train* (Environs ENV 001)***—Derek New is a British composer and musician far better known to the men in the business than to the public at large. Here his crisp, steady beat and purring performances on the harpsichord with bass and drums accompany. A good dancing disc. *New's* at the harpsichord again for *Blue Train*, a solid slow rocker.

THE DOWLANDS—*Breakup; A Love Like Ours* (Odeon CB 1815)***—An RGM Sound recording for the Odeon label as The Dowlands beat their way into one of their own compositions. *Breakup*. Strong guitar noise accompanies the two-toms as they chant this one commercially.

The boys also peaned *A Love Like Ours* which changes the pace to a soft lilt for the other side.

THE HURRICANE STRINGS—*Vent; In The Carrick* (Columbia DB 7027)***—Someone here trying very hard, it seems, to emulate the Joe Meek—Tornados noise. Vents come along quickly with incidental space effects. On the other side is *The*

mentalist. Playing a pleasant sidewalk Serenade with piano and guitars blending well . . . rather after the style of old European hits. Nothing but male voice tra-la-laing while someone else whistles nostalgically behind him.

Toni Carroll—Five

I Foot Two, Eyes Of

Bee; I'm Just Wild About Harry

(MGM 11581)***—Two tracks from Miss Carroll's *Roaring Twenties* long-player make up this single which comes out ahead of the singer's visit to Britain. Happy ricky-tick bounces from *Toot* as she wags her hips and *Five* as she walks her dog. The other half stays in period, neatly with banjo plucking for opening.

Big Ben Banton

Grand Old Ivy (Columbia

CS 3121)***—
Success in Business . . . musical show comic *Been A Long Day*, Male and female choruses, a bit of music while you work kind of bucking *Grand Old Ivy* from the same show. It's a male chorus college number. Not my kind of education.

Alyn Ainsworth—Five

Medley From "How To

Succeed In Business Without Really Trying" (Parlophone R 5071)***—Alyn Ainsworth directs big orchestra in a good selection of numbers from the hit show. Good background material without quite the zest I'd anticipated.

Joan Sims—Oh No!

Again Ken; Hurry Up

Jim and revue comedienne Joan Sims pops up on record with a couple of novelty numbers. Neither side as funny as one would have thought Miss Sims could have made, but there's a commercial chance for the upper half if we're not yet weary of this style.

Howlie Wolf—Go Go Gondolesse

Me (Pye International N 15192)***—Howlin' Wolf is a 52-year-old blues singer who has struggled up the rocky path of rhythm 'n' blues the hard way. Highly respected in the States, though virtually unknown over here. Chester Burnett (to give him his real name) is well worth your time if you're an R & B customer.

The Challengers—Torquay

(Stateside SS 177)***—Instrumental group working up a good Latin beat for *Torquay* with some gimmicky work on the bass string.

Catchy and fairly distinctive in sound. Bulldog beats steadily but boringly.

Billy J. Kramer—I'd Be On

My Way (Parlophone R 5023)***—Billy J. Kramer and The Dakotas with a pleasant light beat *You Want To Know A Secret*. Kramer sings it attractively and distinctively to the

guitars, achieving a soothing effect that ought to sell.

THE *Do It; Oh My Way* quickens things up slightly and there's a touch of Latin in the tempo as Kramer sings in a relaxed fashion that could bring him plenty of fans.

Tommy Bruce—Let's Do It

Two Left Feet (Mercury DB 2025)***—
Tommy Bruce's standard *Let's Do It* makes a grating novelty for Tommy Bruce, and by the plugging of one line about mouth may find gizmo sales. Green's film title song, *Two Left Feet*, is a rapid shuffle song.

MISS MAUGHAN extra-tracking as she sings "She's New To You." A good ballad from the girl, and one which—though it may take time to register—should see her through to the parade again. Latin touch to it is handled attractively by the Wally Stott orchestral accompaniment.

Strong, well-constructed performances that prove once more that Miss Maughan is a girl with a fine-line future.

Don't Get Carried Away "written by the singer herself" is a brash swinger which she charts happily despite the wryness of the lyrics.

The Wanderers

Rum-Rum Smooches; After He Breaks Your Heart
(United Artists UP 1020)

ICOULD be way off beam tipping this tonal group to reach the charts with "Rum-Rum Smooches," but I don't think so. Not if they get the plays for this exciting noise. A side with a beat that gets into your bones, an easy-to-hold top line, catchy title phrase and strong lead vocal, it OUGHT to climb.

It's a powerful charter all right, with wild strings and rhythm, plus one or two brash humorous touches.

"After He Breaks Your Heart" is rated on a sturdy Latin beat and the vocal arrangement is really first-class. The men work splendidly together—for an impression of great strength.

THIS IS a sad record in many ways. Ida Cox was one of jazz's greatest blues singers. She last recorded in 1929, then all but disappeared, then John Hammond rediscovered her and this LP, recorded in April 1961, is the result.

The sound is terrific, but Ida Cox is not her old self. There are faults of lyrics; in one place she loses the beat; the pitch is too low for my comfort; the intonation often poor. It is not in any way a "comeback". Rather it is, as the notes so aptly say, a "final statement" from a great artist.

Coleman Hawkins, Roy Eldridge lead Sammy Price on piano, Jo Jones on drums and Milt Hinton on bass. They are superb and it's hard to say who comes off best between the Hawk and Roy Eldridge.

But I've my doubts about the vocal, interesting though they may be.

The truth is it was never a good band; the arrangements were pretty poor and Jack's personality is not that of a flashy leader.

Decided to spotlight the leader's talents, this band may have achieved success had it not been for the plain fact that Tex is a musician, a musician. Maybe the ordinary fan didn't go for his simple but deceptive technique in the same way as they went for Benny G's or Tommy D's.

This LP is by the original cast, which includes two well known groups, Marian Williams and the Sons of Faith and Professor Alex Bradford and the Bradford Singers.

CHRISTIE GALBRAITH is one of the old men of British jazz. He sat in many times with the George Webb Dixielanders, then the Original Dixielanders, the band led by Reg Ridings and myself, to be replaced in due course

by no less a personage than Chris Barber.

Then Charlie joined Mike Daniels and followed that with spells with Freddy Randall, Joe Daniels and Bobby Mickleburgh. All bands please note, with a Dixieland approach and not a revivalist New Orleans one.

This disc is good and interesting in many ways, but suffers from an overall dullness, though I can't exactly pin down why. Everybody plays well, especially Pat Mason, my personal choice for a pianist at any time.

Thelonious Monk — A Triumph

Thelonious Monk Quartet

MONK'S DREAM (12in, CBS BP 6113) ****—These November 1962 recordings are Monk's first in at least three years—and this is his first album for CBS. It's a triumph for all concerned including producer Ted Macero. Monk has seldom sounded so constantly confident on record.

There are five of his own tunes; four are new recordings of earlier originals like Bolivar Blues (originally cut with Rollins) and the title tune plus one new score, Bright Mississippi—plus Body And Soul,

Just A Gigolo and Sweet And Lovely.

Charlie Rouse plays very inventive, personal, slightly non-swinging tenor, John Ore on bass and drummer Frankie Dunlop (who breaks up the beat beautifully) give solid support.

Vince Guaraldi Trio

JAZZ IMPRESSIONS OF BLACK ORPHEUS (12in, Vicsound LAB 547) *****—When I saw the film "Black Orpheus" three years ago I was so carried away by the colour and the setting, that I didn't really remember the music.

But hearing it now, there's no doubt that it is quite exceptional. Especially Sandra De Orfeo (which Kenny Dorham was the first to record in jazz-time), Maaka De Carnaval and O Nosso Amor.

Former Wynton Hermon and Cal Tjader pianist Guaraldi turns in a magnificent LP. I find it extremely satisfying emotionally and artistically—and thoroughly enjoyable.

Gerry Mulligan Quartet

JERU (12in, CBS RPP 42134) *****—For the first time in absolute ages here's Mulligan with a PEANIST! And the result is a delightful change of pace for him and a completely enjoyable, satisfying LP.

The pianist, Tommy Flanagan, who has seldom sounded so effective, is superbly tasteful. Then there's the sure-fingered basso Ben Tucker, the discreet Dave Bailey on drums and the inebriate Alec Dorsey on conga. Mulligan himself blows beautifully with confident authority, complete relaxation and wonderfully lyrical approach.

All the tunes except Get Out Of Town are new to us and all provide interesting vehicles for Gerry to stretch out peacefully at steady medium tempos.

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

wet and all flattened down—we all thought it looked great so The Beatles' style was born."


Now barbers up and down the country are offering The Beatles Special and thousands of teenagers are wearing hair styles that were created almost by accident!

DEL SHANNON stormed his way back into Britain at the start of his package tour with Johnny Tillotson at Bournemouth on Saturday. But despite the strong U.S. competition on this bill, our Springfields more than held their own with 20 minutes of great entertainment.

Shannon well received by a capacity second house—had a great opener in "Hey Little Girl," which he followed with "Hats Off To Larry" and

"Two Kinds Of Teardrops."

Heard in succession, it's amazing how similar most of his hits are. Between "Runaway" and "Swiss Maid" he slipped in Roy Orbison's "Rosalin Scared" to ring the changes.

The Springfields closed the first half to a fantastic reception. They presented "Land Of Dreams" with "Lonesome Traveller" to make for a swinging opening. I loved their version of "Lilac Boudoir" and the audience showed their

appreciation of Dusty's solo—"End Of The World"—with a deafening foot stamp.
