THE BEATLES' "I Want To Hold Your Hand" is heading straight for the Number One spot in the American 100! Last Friday the record soared past the million mark and it now seems likely that the boys will be presented with a Gold Disc when they appear on the Ed Sullivan TV show on February 9!

That is the fantastic news that reached us on Tuesday from New York correspondent Jonathan Clarke. And all this has happened in just three weeks! The record was released on December 26 and this week entered the Billboard 100 at 45. And all the indications are that it is going to hit Number One.

Capitol, who have issued the disc there, claim it is their fastest selling single ever! On Monday it was selling in New York at the incredible rate of 10,000 an hour! Other disc companies are getting the fever. Swan have re-issued "She Loves You," originally released last August, and Vee-Jay have put out "Please Please Me" (originally issued last February) and "From Me To You" (April). They have also put out the "Please Please Me" album, and Capitol last week released the new LP "With The Beatles" which has been re-titled "Meet The Beatles."

The Music Corporation of America, in addition to playing "I Want To Hold Your Hand" every half hour on their own radio station, have sponsored a Beatles contest. A thousand winners will receive copies of "I Want To Hold Your Hand" and two will receive a cash prize of \$57 each! All this follows the slighting remarks in the "Journal American" and "New York Daily News" after their Jack Paar TV spot two weeks ago. In spite of this the American public are waking up to the boys! From Merseyside and they have already been able to read articles on The Beatles in "Time," "Life," "Look" and "Newsweek," the four top selling magazines in the U.S.A.

In addition, The Beatles have been featured on "Walter Cronkite News" (CBS-TV) and "The Huntley-Brinkley News" (NBC-TV).

1964—Cliff's best year yet?

I PREDICT 1964 will be Cliff Richards' best year yet. It may seem strange to say this, seeing how the Beatles have outstripped him in Britain's disc charts during 1963. But I truly believe it. And my main reason is what I saw of the "Wonderful Life" location scenes.

And Top Ten success should come with it. Thanks largely to Bruce Welch, there are a half-dozen or so chart-type numbers in the film.

The great thing about "Wonderful Life" as a film and its "escape" value. The story is as carefree as its costume—plus laughs galore.

There are other reasons for optimism. One is that Cliff, Melvyn Hayes, Richard O'Sullivan and the rest of the cast are going to quite a bit "game" hit it off famously more than his disc sales and

with director Sidney Furber—who was with them on "The Young Ones." Another is that Cliff has worked with dance director Gillian Lynne.

When I add that the writers are Peter Myers and Ronnie Case (of "Young Ones" and "Summer Holiday" fame) and the sets are by Stanley Dorfman (who designed those of the "Black and White Mystery" TV shows) I hope I have made out my case!

Now my prediction about "Wonderful Life," helping to make 1964 Cliff's biggest year applies to quite a bit "game" hit it off famously more than his disc sales and

his British box-office successes. It has been suggested in recent months that the tide has turned against Cliff because of the Mercury beat boom. But the fact is that Cliff has long since achieved two things which put him way out in front—he is capable of carrying the lead role in a film, and he is an international star.

As for Las Palmas, where he is at the moment, the interest is far more than the display of his discs in record store windows.

I was staying at the same hotel as Cliff. It was in a luxury setting some 100 yards back from the main road. But every evening—when Cliff returned from location—I would see the little crowd of local youngsters waiting under the palm trees for his autograph.

Cliff has ALREADY achieved all this international interest. I am sure he will boost it still further in 1964. And he is going to take a LOT of catching!

The scene is red—but it's all lights at GO!

THE office of agent Peter Walsh buzzed with an Early Warning System state of excitement. To heighten the effect of high drama, the decor motif was red-carpet, red inkstand, red leather blotting pad, and red telephones. Two in fact.

One phone shrilled. Would Brian Poole sit in the behind screen "hot-seat" of "Juke Box Jury" this Saturday while the panel judged his latest single? Brian greeted the idea with the enthusiasm of a patient signing a dentist's bill. Peter Walsh bravely answered for him. Yes.

The red phone rang again. Would Brian record a "Saturday Club" again this week? A ready "yes" to this one. No "Jury" to worry about here. Only the public. And if their previous verdicts are anything to go by, then Brian Poole and The Tremoloes stand a good chance of crashing up those charts with their all-out bid to follow up with that No. 1 smash, "Do You Love Me."

And, maybe, bring off another Silver Disc.

The new single? Something quite new from The Tremoloes—rhythmic—a swinging, bouncy, stable and bliss number that is likely to raise some anxious eyebrows in that Mayestreet arena.

Title is "Candy Man," and actually it has been around some time—as B-side to Roy Orbison's "Cryin'." But not in the setting that Brian and the boys give it. Release date is January 24.

• chance

The boys "Candy Man" was recorded almost by chance. The band had been at the recording studio from 10 in the morning to never at night. And they were still stuck for a good number.

Suddenly, drummer Dave Mendel snapped his fingers. "How about 'Candy Man'—that old Orbison number?" he said.

"Actually," says Brian, "Dave had been playing this one on an overnight stay in the hotel. I had intended doing it some time. We remembered it was a good number—but never got around to it."

• 13 takes

"We decided on a new approach," says Brian, working on that number. Altogether, we did 13 takes before we were satisfied. We kept going to the playback—and maybe something better not quite right. We were aiming for a special guitar sound. Ricky West, our lead guitarist, almost made his fingers bleed before he was satisfied with the effect he was aiming for.

Although "Candy Man" is in B and B-flat, there's no mouth strain. "We did have one in the studio," says Brian, "but we didn't try it this time."

They have used one before—on

"That Ain't Right." B side of "Blue"—their second record. "What with Dave, The Rolling Stones and Gene Elliott, say? The Femmes—does this mean that that beat pendulum is swinging south?"

Early to say—especially with those Beatles, Freddie and The Drifters, Gerry and The Pacemakers and The Swinging Blue Jeans still going like a bomb.

But Brian—displaying more bravery than he did over that "Jury" invite—says: "We do try to take a different approach to the Northerners. They seem to use the same type of drum beat—generally like The Beatles."

Said Brian fervently: "Candy Man" is so important to us. Good—happily, he added: "I think I'll have to lay anyone out that 'Jury' who votes it a 'no'."

"IT'S a fantastic thrill for me to get your Silver Disc award in England. I'm so pleased that I've just arranged to come to England again on a special promotion trip when they release my next record there.

"I cut both sides of this new disc during my last visit to London and that should help me. In fact one of the tunes was written by The Rolling Stones. Anyway, I'll be coming to London on February 4 and I expect to spend at least five days there just promoting the record. The sides, by the way, are "That Girl Belongs To Yesterday" and "Who Needs It."

"I shan't be doing any concert or singing appearances during my promotional trip. That will have to wait until my tour—back in April. Before that, I return to America for several night club dates.

Long time

"That month in April will actually be a long time for me to be away, believe it or not. That may sound funny coming from somebody like me, who's expected to be on the road just about all the time. But the truth is that I have a lot of different new interests.

"You see, I'd like to be able to stay in one place for just a little while at a time. I've been kind of diversifying my interests. I've put some of my money into some new finance companies in my home state of Connecticut.

HEINZ MAKES A HIT OF SWEDISH TOUR—HAS NEW IDEAS FOR U.K.

HEINZ, looking fit and relaxed after his Swedish tour, strolled into DISC's Fleet Street office dressed in a multi-coloured woollen jacket, with leather edgings, a pale blue check shirt and a slim leather tie. "I bought them in Stockholm," he said. "I wore them today to see if anyone would notice them."

With Brian Poole and The Tremeloes, Heinz and his backing group The Sixties, covered 100 miles along Sweden's fast motorways in his 10-day trip.

"It was a lot of travelling but the promoters met us at the airport and put a large American saloon at our disposal, and the roads are so good that the distances were soon covered," went on the blond ex-Ferretado.

• 100 miles

THE SEARCHERS can relax. Their New Year resolutions to give the disc buyers more public, a bit of rhythm and blues, Searchers style, has paid off.

"Pines and Pins," their first step at putting R and B in on a single, has made the charts with an impact that looks like sending it high and mighty in the top 30 of "rotters," Chris Carter, when I told him that it had made

18, "when we cut this disc, which was our first go at putting our real stage sound on record, we were proud of it to that anything 'we did do."

"We thought we might come in for a lot of criticism when it was issued. After all, people argued that the market still was not ready for rhythm and blues—we stuck to our guns and hoped for the best."

"When you've made a few records, you begin to criticise your own work. This year we received over a make a bad one, and after we'd cut 'Needles And Pins' we decided that this was our best yet, and no future discs would drop below this standard."

"Now it's made the charts, it makes us very happy to think that the charts we took to playing off."

TV, radio

Despite nationwide TV and radio promotion on "Needles And Pins" which has obviously helped its early success, The Searchers themselves felt that they had not done as well as they played the number in a Liverpool dance hall last week.

"We hadn't played a ballroom date in Liverpool for over six months, and we were a bit out of touch with it," says Chris Carter, who has long known that if "Needles And Pins" went down well there, then they stood a good chance of having another hit on our hands.

"Making our way in Liverpool, if you're a home grown group, and in the face of so much competition up there, gives an added push to record sales."

"The number had been going down a bomb at their official appearance, but we still felt Liverpool was a big star."

In fact, regardless of new record releases, the band found that any dance hall date

Liverpool is a line nerve-racking! "It's a funny thing," said Chris, "but a foot wrong up there and you're out of favour for good. For two days before we played the Locarno last Thursday we were living on our nerves."

"As local fans we know just to what extent the Liverpool crowd has been fed on grunge, especially those playing rhythm and blues. Dance hall customers are very critical, but if they like your music, they will be assured of an audience."

"I think our style of playing has changed an awful lot since we last appeared at home. We cooled down a bit when we started making discs and mixing rhythm and blues with a more conventional beat, and to a great extent were still playing in this style."

"However, now that 'Needles And Pins' has made it, we can start getting back to our original form of playing. This is what we enjoy doing most."

Not keen

But Chris admits that even though the charts are on the rise, the rhythm and blues will not be as popular as it once was. "There are still several radio and television programmes which are a little better than what we're doing, but not on a limb and play nothing but R and B."

"New firms settled in their London but, The Searchers had no remarks to make about their new home.

"It's great so far," laughed Chris, "but last week I heard that the Brazilian Ambassador, who had had his order moved out. Don't know whether it's because he had to go, or because he couldn't stand the sound of our rehearsing!"

Swinging Blue Jeans members focused on the SWINGING BLUE JEANS on Saturday when they filmed a spot in a Clichonoma picture, "Clichonoma Clichonoma," at the Empire Ballroom, Leicester Square. They played "Hippy" and "I'm Blue" and are to appear at the special Clichonoma theatre in London next month.

EVERY so often in the disc world, a record is released which, straight from the start, races up the charts. That was certainly the case with "Hippy Hippy Shake," the latest meteoric-rising single from The Swinging Blue Jeans.

Chatting to the boys in their dressing-room at a London television studio, I realised that just three weeks before, I had interviewed Ray, Ralph, Norman and Les in the very same room.

But this time there was a big difference. Then, "Hippy Hippy Shake" wasn't even in the charts. Now it's at No. 2.

And it's all happened in three weeks! From nowhere, the disc leaps into DISC's charts at No. 25. From this launching pad, it scurried in one jump to No. 10—and then rocketed on to third place behind only Davy Clark and The Beatles.

Blue Jeans leader Ray Evans took a quick zip of his top—seven pop stars like their afternoon refreshment—and told me: "When we recorded 'Hippy' I had a feeling that this one would be a hit. But some of us thought it would take off so fast. It's moved so quickly it's almost left us behind."

"Of course, it's the biggest thing that's happened to us and it's great. But it certainly made some changes. We've noticed a few things even over the past three weeks.

For instance, a lot more people recognise us and we get tremendous reactions. Now we can find that people come and speak to us instead of the other way round.

"It's all a bit worrying, really. When we finished a show some times, the four of us go back to our hotel and sit and talk about things for hours.

"We realise it's much harder in this business once you've had tremendous reactions. Now we can't only answer him, it's not too bad. You can say: 'Well, we'd better next time.' With a hit though, you've really got to work hard to stay out in front—one slip and down you come."

The Blue Jeans are giving some serious thought to their future recording plans—when they get the time to do it.

"We've got to arrange waiting for us to listen to at this moment," said guitarist Ralph Ellis. "But so far, we haven't had a chance to play them. That really is our next job."

There's one thing that the boys are determined not to change based in Liverpool as they may be—*that's their address.*

"We're not moving from Liverpool," said Ray. "We like it too much and we've got too many friends there. I don't think it's necessary either. We're moving around the country all the time and doing TV shows all over the place, so we can just as easily base ourselves in Liverpool as London. Anyway, we can get to London by road in five hours, so there's really no problem."

The boys have added another impressive "first" to their list—they are the first British group to appear on the revolutionary new Russian invention at present featured in London's West End.

This process really gets the viewer in the midst of the action—*that's it in the centre of a circular cinema and the screen is all around him.* The Blue Jeans recorded their spot before an audience of fans last Saturday.

"We've been in a wonderful situation," said drummer Norman. "Just imagine, taking the Mercedes sound behind the Iron Curtain," said bass guitarist Les Liverpool to Liverpool in one jump!"

PARAMOUNTS LIKE THEIR 'POISON' PROGRESS

THE four Paramounts were travelling along London's Tottenham Court Road last week in their van. They were a little choked at the time because their disc of "Poison" didn't seem to be showing much sign of climbing towards the Top Thirty.

Then manager Ron King picked up the current copy of DISC which he'd just bought. He glanced at the chart, did a double-take, and then let out a roar.

"It's No. 30 this week," he yelled.

A combined shout of glee deafened everyone in the van, and DISC passed hurriedly from hand to hand. "That's how we first found out about it," recalled lead guitarist Rob Turner last Thursday, still looking a bit dazed.

"The boys did 'Poison' by" as a demo disc in October. It was accepted by EMI's Parlophone label, and recorded again for December 5 issue.

"The whole business took about three months," said pianist and lead singer Gary Brooker. "We're delighted that our first record should do so well."

The rest of The Paramounts are bass guitarist Diz Derrick and drummer Barrie Wilson. All the boys are 18 except Barrie who is the baby at 17.

They are a Southern group and Gary and Rob have been founder members for those years.

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Support

"We turned professional last August," said Gary. "Up until then my folks weren't too keen on the group, but when we decided to change it full-time they gave me every support."

Rob thinks part of the success of "Poison" lay in the strongly featured piano of Gary.

"We tried to give the disc a big Yank sound," he explained, "and we brought the piano right through instead of concentrating on guitars."

The Paramounts are determined exponents of rhythm and blues, and play nothing else on their dates around the country.

The record is a little less earthy than most of our numbers," said Rob. "But the rhythm and blues feel is definitely there."

There have been swift developments since "Poison" hit the 30 line in the DISC chart. The Paramounts have been set for Jerry Lewis' next trip to Britain dates at Birmingham Town Hall (March 20), Croydon Fairfield Hall (24), and York Rialto 125. They'll also join the Chuck Berry tour which is anticipated to take place later in the spring.

"We're going to have to move up to London soon," remarked Gary. "We'll miss Southern, and some cooking, but we must live up to the success of our first record."

PETE SEEGER is such a gentle, kind man, his announcements little to me, they sound back to me. deeply about politics and justice and lets you know just how deeply by his music. He doesn't like any song with a political bias, this isn't for you. But he's folk deeply about the bad things in the world that people had to make to speak of. Folk music—old jazz and more come to us that—made up of people singing about their lives, made up in no pretense that the lives of the ordinary people are not full of troubles of one sort or the other.

What Pete Seeger does is to bring some of these general troubles right to us.

But despite "Money" being something of a major hit for Elliott and the Femmes, Wally Allen, Eric Walsner and Bern Povey—three still say that if they had had the option, it wouldn't have been issued!

"First of all, there's too much screaming on it and not enough instrumental sound. Here, I think the best drags a bit—"Money" doesn't really have an exciting tempo.

"Our version is very different from the original by Barrat strong, and the song has always been a popular one with the group, particularly on personal appearances, but I don't think it's come off well on the disc."
