IT'S A BEATLE MANIA LP!

PYE are releasing a Beatle Mania LP on the Pye label on February 11. It contains 12 tracks by anonymous artists of songs already recorded by The Beatles. The LP is the first of its kind and Paul McCartney has contributed several tracks.

Also on February 11 Cameo Parkway are issuing "The Beatles' Greatest Hits," a 12-track album by the same artists. The Swings and Cops are recording "I Want To Hold You In My Arms" by Sonny Currin.

Worried about that American trip? Not us, say John and George

In Washington reports the same frenzied rush for seats.

BY Monday of this week, The Bachelors' version of the oldie "Diane" had topped the 200,000 mark and became their fastest-selling disc ever! "Last Friday alone, the record sold 83,000 copies," reported an excited Dee Cluskey over the phone. "It's twice bigger than 'Charmaine,' and that did 237,000 copies. It's ridiculous!"

"Naturally we'd like it to be a really big hit," went on Gerry, "but we're not worried. We're number one. Having a top of the charts disc always presents something of a problem, like what to do for a follow-up."

"Yet The Bachelors recorded 'Diane' four times in an effort to get out of the position."

"By the time we got to cutting that one, we'd lost all our enthusiasm."

"We first recorded about six months ago, giving it a different flavor, but we decided that it wasn't commercial enough, so we had another shot, and then another."

"Eventually, when we'd practically given up all hope of getting the song right, we recorded the present version."

"But the funny thing is that all three of us still prefer the first version."

Problem was the mixer. "I can't get the guitars," he said. At a short conference as Mike Smith plonks and waggles middle F repeatedly, Dave Verdict:


