Now Proby's pal is chart-chasing

E used to arrange P. J. PROBY'S flowing tresses at the \$\Pi\$ problem pop star's Chelsea pad. In fact, he was as much a fixture of the Proby backcloth as the dogs, the dollies, the flint-locks and cannon—and the Bongo Wolf.

But that Proby scene has now split up. Jim is in America, the dollies are in their own homes—doubtless pining—the armaments are gathering dust in a Wembley Park mock-Tudor house, and the hairdresser is out on his own.

But not in the cold, For 22-year-old Barry Benson is making a bid to chase his former master up the chart—as a solo singer on his own account. With a little ditty titled "Stay A Little While". How come Barry forsook the scissors for singing: "I've always been interested in music", he says.

"But it was during my 18 months with Proby that I really got keen on singing. We used to sing around the house together. Jim

"You can say that my wanting to make a record is 75 per cent due to being interested in making a go as a singer. The other 25 per cent is to take up Jim's challenge."

Somewhat strangely, Barry's involvement with differing personalities has somehow developed a weird characteristic of being

able to assume the appearance of other stars.

"I have often been taken for Proby's brother", he admits, "I've also been told I look like Jimmy Tarbuck, Dave Berry, Paul McCarnney and the Ryan Brothers."

This statement all came about because Mr Fantoni, in blue denim suit and black polo-neck sweater, was talking about his not wanting to be a star. Not wanting to be switched on, gear fab and earning £50 a week.

"The reason I don't think of the Beatles as stars is because I can imagine them doing things. I can see Paul McCartney sitting down, lighting up a fag, and writing songs. But the others—well you never see them doing anything. I can't imagine Cilla in a recording studio."

Nevertheless, and despite all that, Fantoni has made this record and is—gasps!—going to be a pop star in Great Yarmouth. Actually walking on stage and singing. He is planning to sing some Ray Davies numbers and a couple of George Formby's thrown in for good measure.

"That does NOT mean," he said sternly, "that I am trying to appeal to the mums and dads. Far from it."

Things are changing for Barry "the budgie." He is still with "Whole Scene Going." despite the anguish of early days. In fact, all those early nasty anti-letters have stopped, and he is raking in about 60 fan letters a week.

BYRDS disc banned HOLLYWOOD, Tuesday on drugs rap

THE Byrds' latest U.S. hit single "Eight Miles High"—now on release in England on the CBS label - has been banned in Washington, the U.S. capital, and in the cities of Baltimore and Houston,

The record was already in the United States Top Ten when it was labelled a "drug song" by the Gavin Report, a subscription sheet circulated weekly— and widely—to radio sta-tions and other entities in

tions and other entities in the recording industry. Compiled by record-expert Bill Gavin in San Francisco, the report sub-stantially influences a thou-sand or more radio stations which, in the U.S., make or break diese. break discs

Of the Byrds' song—and of Bob Dylan's "Rainy Day Women"—Gavin says: "We

have dropped 'Rainy Day Women' and 'Eight Miles High' from our 'Recom-High' from our 'Recom-mended Playlist'. In our opinion, these records imply

opinion, these records imply encouragement and / or approval of the use of marijuana or LSD."

The irony of it is that the Byrds and Dylan are, in their lyrical innocence, again linked in a drugs controversy. The first time this happened was in the middle of last year when pundits hazarded guesses that "Mr. Tambourine Man" referred to a drug pedlar.

"Eight Miles High" was written largely by Byrd-

written largely by Byrd-member Gene Clark with help from fellow Byrd-members Jim McGuinn and David Crosby, and it refers specifically to London and



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

The track opens with Paul, John and George singing "Paperback Writer" in chorus — "sort of Beach Boys style, if anything, I suppose," explained George. It fades out at the end. "Rain" is more plaintive and pretty, and a typically attractive slow Beatles melody. John takes lead vocal, and the lyrics are based on the fact that

whatever the weather, some-body will always complain. It will probably prove as popular with Beatles fans as "Yes It Is". That, too, was a B side, of course.

Better records

ARE THE BEATLES WORRIED THAT THIS TIME THEY WON'T HIT THE TOP SPOT FIRST TIME?

"Well, this keeps coming up and it's virtually impossible to answer," George replied. "We just know we are making better records, but we get less satis-fied than ever. The fact that feed than ever. don't go down so well as the OLD sound, well, I don't know

OLD sound, well, I don't know what to say . . . "We've all got the attitude of: well, if it doesn't go to the top in the first week, that's that. There's nothing more we can do. We've made the record. Now it's up to the people who

George went on to say that the Stones would probably be at the top by the time their new single came out. "Let's hope we can do it—that's all," Beatle added.

I wonder how it's going to be received—I've been told that years ago, when Ornette Coleman came along with his new sounds in jazz, everybody thought he was a bit weird. Perhaps we can do that as well—change the scene a bit and start some new sounds."

George thinks "Paperback

George thinks "Paperback Writer" and "Rain" is their best single so far. "Better than the last one, definitely. The sound's better and the songs are, too."

completely finished, but with the other I'm not very happy with the lyrics." He uses the sitar again, and photographer Bob Freeman is working on the possibility of a revolutionary sleeve jacket for the album—"he's talking about having it done in silvery colour, or put out just like a photo negative," said George.

One of George's songs on the new album is "I'm Only Sleeping"—"and we try to get the vocal to sound like somebody's asleep, which is very difficult!"

George added that there were several songs, now set for the LP, which could have been considered for the new single. "But we decided 'Paperback' had the best single sound about

Did the Beatles think there had been too long a gap between 'Day Tripper' and 'Paperback Writer'? Their last single was in the chart in January and February.

"I'm inclined to think it has been a bit too long, but there's nothing we can do about that," George answered. "It was a bit of a long gap, but we'd rather wait and be sure. And that's what we did."

The wait has been worth-while. "Paperback Writer" and "Rain" are excellent Beatles songs which will give the sum-mer a hot start.

This autumn, the Beatles, the Rolling Stones and the Walker Brothers will be out in the provinces, ostensibly to sing to audiences but, in fact, barred in by a line of bouncers apparently only too willing to let the fans have it with their fists.

MICK JAGGER admits he needs bouncers beside him, but says: "They just don't know how to treat these 13-year-olds. Once we were playing a ball-





Stone Brian hits at latest smear on stars

OH, WHO CARES! -says Brian Jones

AST WEEK a prominent national newspaper columnist made a blistering attack on pop singers by

criticising them for the way they live their lives.

The "Daily Telegraph's" Peter Simple, who was having a go at Minister of Defence, Mr Denis Healey, wound up by referring to "SUCH UNDESIRABLE RIFF-RAFF AS POP SINGERS. . . . They are admired for living as ostentatiously as they please."

Hardly a fair comment from a journalist who must be as out of touch with pop as a monk in a monastery.

It's a hard grind earning a living as a pop star. Life's not all a bowl of cherries. And if some artists manage to make enough bread out of it to live in luxury, buy flashy cars and take exotic holidays good luck

take exotic holidays good luck to them!

Asked for his opinion on this criticism of high living and general behaviour, Brian Jones—one who has had, a fair share of knocks as a member of the controversial

Rolling Stones—said:
"I don't know that the public "I don't know that the pools, admires pop stars for living ostentatiously. The national Press do. They're all for photographing our homes, or the Beatles at premieres or first

mights.

"As for myself, the Stones have been described as 'riff-raff' and much worse for three

or four years now.

"It just doesn't bother me.
It rolls off my back. Anyway,
if some of the public do think

"I suppose I'm scruffy and



'Flamingo'?—A big relief MANFRED: we just had to bridge that gap

WHAT comes next for Manfred Mann, the group who came out of a five-

non-recording coma to brush aside all the bright young groups who'd stepped into the limelight in their

stepped into the limelight in their absence and sweep back to the top of the chart with "Pretty Flamingo"?

Manfreds have made their point. Although they disappeared from the scene for some time, although they've long since left the adolescent pop stage, they are still capable of being No 1 in the reation.

No withdrawal

So do they now drift into gradual and graceful withdrawal from the chart rat race? Or does the group now delve into music of more depth and leave pop to the teenagers?

The answer is "no" to each question. The comment comes from 25-year-old Manfred himself, who has known leanings to jazz. "Admittedly many of my records are modern jazz, but I never think of pop as bad music. Making pop records is still a very creative job to me.

"I don't get the same satisfaction appearing on stage, but as far as recording goes, the group certainly carries on. And you can't really talk about a group getting too old. It's always the record that counts.

"For example, I don't regard the success of 'Pretty Flamingo' as proof of our popularity so much as proof that we made a good record."

Manfred frowned. "But I did have my Manfred Trowned. But I did have my doubts about the gap between this and If You Gotta Go, Go Now. The gap wasn't intentional—it was just that we were waiting for the right record rather than put out something inferior merely to satisfy the need for a new single.

to satisfy the need for a new single.

"But the longer one leaves the gap, the better the next record has to be."

"Flamingo's" flight to No 1 does, however, mean that the Manfreds can pick and choose even more among the dates they do. With so much more spare time on their hands what are they doing?

"Well, we still have overseas to conquer," admits Manfred. "We're tops here at home, but abroad we've never really taken off to any great extent. I think it's a combination of the wrong choice of records for overseas tastes and also not enough promotion.

"But, of course, we do have a lot of

"But, of course, we do have a lot of spare time these days and I, for one, have bought a Steinway grand piano. I earnestly want to play the piano well."

Manfred admits also that the group want to become financially independent. "I have a business interest in the air at present. I don't want to end up playing to every decreasing crowds with nothing outside the business on which to fall back."
