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
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Sall about CHRIS FARLOWE



Now cut the trousers and the lining up the centre crease.

 Machine the upsidedown-V which is to be cut out and the bottom hems.

 Now cut your trousers and liming to within 1 in. of the machine stitches. Be careful this is the point of no return?
 Undo knee tacking stitches and turn lining

to inside of trouser legs and press seams. 8. Catch knee edge of lining to inside of trousers.


