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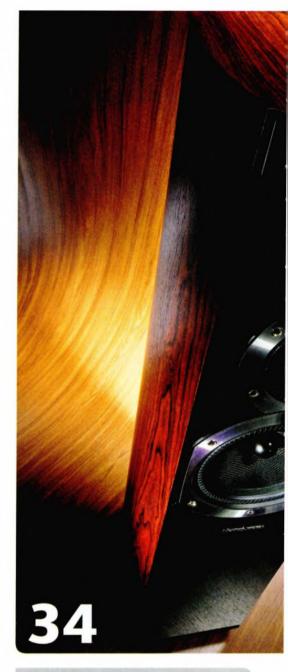

MICROMEGA RANGE .::

A decade on and a new range of Gallic amps, CD players and more

After an absence of almost a decade, innovative audio manufacturer Micromega is set to return to the UK with a line-up of 11 new components, including CD players and amplifiers, brought in via famous high-end UK distributor Absolute Sounds.

The French company is back in Britain thanks to the passion for music and quality audio equipment of its new owner, Didier Hamdi. The move from former motorcycle world championship winner to owner and CEO of Micromega in 2007 may seem a strange one, but according to Didier: "I gain great satisfaction from combining my passion for music with the engineering skills required to perform at championship level. At Micromega, we've assembled a group of people dedicated to producing excellent hi-fi components that are designed to stir the emotions of all who hear them."

Micromega's founder, Daniel Schar, now leads the R&D department at the head of a team of other core personnel considered fundamental to Micromega's audio design philosophy. The fruits of its labours are three CD players, three integrated stereo amps, a stereo preamp, two digital power amps, an FM tuner and a surround sound preamp/processor, all designed and built at the company's factory in France.

Thanks to the use of class-D technology in the power amps, the entire range shares the same slimline chassis, available in either silver or black. The PW-250 boasts 250 watts per channel, while the PW-400 stereo power amplifier has an output of 400 watts per channel. Partnering these is the PA-20 stereo preamplifier, which has five inputs for line-level

sources, one for MM cartridge and another for the company's AVP-180 home cinema preamp/processor. Outputs include one for a sub and a headphone socket.

In order to optimise power supply noise and stability, Micromega has opted for separate transformers in its range of three integrated amps. The IA-60 (pictured below)), IA-100 and IA-180 all feature a toroidal transformer for power stages and an R-core for preamplification circuitry. Inputs are as for the PA-20 preamp, but power ratings are 60 watts per channel for the IA-60 and 100 watts for both the IA-180 and IA-100, the latter using two pairs of the DIY builder's favourite chip amp, National Semi's LM3886T.

While DAB-only transmissions may not be that far off in the UK, Micromega is still committed to FM tuners. It's FM-10 has 50 presets and is an RDS design which again uses an R-core power transformer.

The final trio in the range is the CD-10, CD-20 and CD-30 CD players. The CD-10 is the entry-level model and is fitted with an Analog Devices AD1853 DAC and R-core power transformer said to be chosen for its excellent rejection of mains-borne interference. The CD-20 and CD-30 both benefit from dual mains transformers and Micromega's ACTS power supply, which is designed to keep noise to a minimum.

EMM LABS XDS1 ---

Canadian high-end audio specialist EMM Labs has just announced its latest CD/SACD player, the XDS1. Designed by the company's founder, Ed Meitner, at its Calgary headquarters, the XDS1 is a fresh design from the ground up. And in line with EMM Labs previous professional and domestic audio equipment, the mechanical and electronic design of the player is aimed at keeping jitter and power supply noise to an absolute minimum.

Inside the 17kg aluminium chassis is TEAC/Esoteric's latest all-metal mechanism. Keeping jitter levels right down in the MDAT DSP and new fourth-generation dual DSD DACs is the low-noise X-Power power supply, whose switching is totally synchronous with the masterclock, which reduces power supply-induced jitter. A first for EMM Labs are the PCM inputs (AES/SPDIF and TOSLink), which allow the player to be used as a standalone converter. While these inputs currently accept signals up to 24-bit/96kHz, a forthcoming software update will make the machine 24-bit/192kHz compatible.

In the analogue domain, all circuitry from DACs to outputs is constructed from discrete components in a dual-balanced, low-feedback, class A arrangement. Again, minimising supply noise was one of the main design goals. This has been implemented in triple-filtered, modular power supplies, including those for the custom line-drivers, which are able to handle tough loads like long runs of capacitive cabling (either XLR balanced or RCA unbalanced) and passive line stages. Supplied with a matching, machined remote control, the XSD1 will be made available in limited numbers in either silver or black finishes. See our next issue for an exclusive review.

ARCUS MEDIA SERVERS ···

From autumn 2009, a range of three media servers will be coming to the UK from German manufacturer Arcus. The company, which started out 30 years ago as a two-channel audio company, has now added to its line-up the MusicStation (£1,295), AudioServer (£2,749) and MediaServer (£4,495).

For those looking for a one-box set-up, the MusicStation (pictured) is available with hard drives in a range of capacities, onto which CDs can be automatically ripped through the slot-loading mechanism. Compression ratios for MP3s vary from 128kbps through to 320kbps, while wav is the lossless format supported by the hardware. The internal 60-watt stereo amps can also accept signals from a single external analogue input and there are both analogue and digital outputs.

Like the MusicStation, the AudioServer offers MP3 and .wav storage of CDs, but it swaps inbuilt amplification for ethernet connectivity to enable Internet media access. Most capable of the three is the audio/video MediaServer. This device possesses Blu-ray and DVD video support in addition to audio, in both 1080p HD and QXGA formats.

BOWERS & WILKINS ZEPPELIN MINI &

For iPod users looking for a smaller alternative to Bowers and Wilkins' head-turning Zeppelin, there is now the Zeppelin Mini. One of the key updates in the Mini is its USB connectivity, which allows it to bypass the analogue output of any iPod, providing the best possible sound quality from a digital data stream, converted using the Mini's upgraded DSP and converter chips. The provision of a USB socket also means the dock is able to stream music direct from a PC or Mac.

Under the sleek exterior are additional changes in driver technology and docking arm, which can now be rotated through 90 degrees to accommodate wide-screen video viewing.

MARANTZ SA-15S2/PM-15S2 ···

Marantz has upgraded the £1,700 SA-15S2 SACD player and its matching integrated amplifier to new Series 2 status.

Although the casework of the former is virtually unchanged, the modifications under the lid are said to be based on engineering lessons learned from the construction of the company's flagship SA-751 player.

The SACDM-10 mechanism features an extruded aluminium chassis for precise disc-tracking by the laser head, whose signal is processed and then fed to a 24-bit/192kHz Cirrus Logic CS4398 DAC. The main alteration to the power supply has been a move from an EI mains transformer to a toroidal.

The heart of the PM-15S2 amplifier has also been uprated; the original toroidal replaced by a larger unit, which has lower-impedance windings providing 90 watts per channel. In addition, the small-signal stages benefit from the new SA3 Hyper Dynamic Amplifier Modules, with slew rates and signal-to-noise ratios said to be higher than those usually found in audio op-amps.

MERIDIAN SOOLOOS 2.0 ···

After three years of closely scrutinising customer feedback, Meridian has released its updated Sooloos 2.0 media-management system, with changes ranging from simple interface enhancements to major improvements in system capabilities, zone playback and hardware options.

One of the more fundamental alterations is to the system architecture is its ability to handle hundreds of thousands of files with amazing speed and flexibility.

System simplification means a Sooloos system can now be built with just two components, a TwinStore (with its dual 1TB hard drives) and a Control Ten, the latter's SpeakerLink connectable directly to Meridian DSP loudspeakers. On the other hand, thanks to the addition of local streaming, the web browser (Firefox, Internet Explorer or Safari) on any Mac, Windows or Linux PC can access and control the system and the computer speakers used to play music.

UNISON RESEARCH S9..:

Professor Sacchetti of Italian firm Unison Research has been hard at work developing the company's latest single-ended triode amplifier, the S9 integrated. Eschewing stalwart transmitter valves such as the 845 and 811, the S9 instead features the directly heated Russian SV572 valve, produced by Svetlana.

Despite the glass envelope's relatively small size, the parallel single-ended output stage produces 35 watts per channel. With only 9dB of negative feedback, the S9 still has a power bandwidth of 30Hz to 50kHz. Optimising the bias of the output stage as the valves age is under manual control, with a precision analogue meter displaying bias current, although the titanium coating of the graphite anode also promises longevity thanks to its inherent gettering.

The power supply has come in for particular scrutiny in the S9, with the heaters having their own dedicated supplies, including Schottky diodes. On top of this, the anode voltage of over 1kV has no less than 8,000uF of filtering, which contributes to the amp's 47kg weight.

Goldring, manufacturer of classic cartridges such as the 1042MM, has just released what it considers its statement cartridge. The Legacy is a moving-coil design, whose output signal is produced by hand-wound coils of highpurity copper, sitting within a field generated by rare earth, neodymium-iron-boron magnets. The assembly is housed within a magnesium body to ensure rigid coupling to the tonearm and minimal unwanted resonance, with mounting simplified thanks to threaded inserts. Attached to the end of the hard alloy cantilever is a Vital fine-line stylus, chosen for its low mass and low distortion.

YOUT BE MUSIC IS BACK

After a six-month You Tube absence, music videos are making a return to YouTube in the UK following the resolution of a controversial copyright dispute. In March, YouTube blocked UK access to premium music clips posted by major



record companies after failing to reach a new deal with the Performing Rights Society (PRS) on what royalties should be paid to songwriters and artists

whenever their videos were viewed. YouTube had claimed that the PRS wanted to set a much higher figure for royalties payable than had previously been in place, while the PRS stated that the opposite was true. The solution took the form of a single, undisclosed lump sum to be paid by YouTube to the PRS to cover the licensing of music video replay from now until 2012

The importance of damping

recent discussion on the Hi-Fi
Choice forum (forum.hifichoice.co.
uk) brought up the issue of
damping material for filling
speaker stands. Various contributors weighed
in with suggestions for lead shot, proprietary
fillers (Atacama's 'Atabytes' and so on), kilndried sand and, yes, cat litter – preferably
unused, I gather. There's no doubt that all of
these work in reducing the resonance to
which metal stands are generally prone. But
what is damping, why is it necessary and is
there a downside?

Resonance is a wonderful thing, responsible for the functioning of all musical instruments, including the human voice. Important as it may be in making music, it can be a right bind in reproducing it. Resonance is the phenomenon where an object vibrates preferentially at one or more specific frequencies, excited by some outside source of vibrational energy and carrying on after the source has stopped. An obvious example would be plucking a guitar string. Damping is what stops resonance: any means of taking energy out of the resonating object and converting it to heat, in general.

Most musical instruments don't really benefit in obvious ways from damping, except when they are consciously stopped by the player at the end of the note. As a pianist, I spend half my life trying to get round the unavoidable fact that piano notes are to some extent damped and, therefore, decay. One of the most important factors that encourages piano buyers to spend tens of thousands on a high-grade instrument is that notes resonate for longer, giving much greater beauty of tone. But introduce resonance into a sound reproduction system and it will play merry hell with the sound,

prolonging the duration of notes that were deliberately damped by the performers.

Steel loudspeaker stands can resonate very efficiently, as you'll have noticed if you've ever handled one before it's filled. Just tap it and a note will sound and ring on for as much as several seconds. When the stand is filled with damping material, though, the note will die so quickly that you can hardly hear it. This happens because the damping filler contacts the metal of the stand at lots of points in a rather random sort of way, each particle conducting some vibrational energy away from the metal. Some of that energy is transferred to other particles, but it's all done in a very lossy way due to the irregular contact and friction between the particles, so very quickly the energy is converted to heat.

Similar things happen in the case of acoustic damping, for instance inside a loudspeaker cabinet, where long, irregular fibres fill the space. The sound waves in the air inside the cabinet make the fibres move, but the way they contact each other quickly dissipates their movement in heat, damping the sound waves rapidly.

Is there such a thing as 'too much damping'? Only if so much damping material is added that it defeats its own purpose. Jamming too much material in, especially under pressure, can make it behave more like a solid lump rather than lots of little bits and process of conversion becomes less efficient. Of course, some listeners like a bit of added resonance, hence the popularity in some circles of removing damping from speakers. In general, however, system damping is a thoroughly good thing. **HFC**

Trainspotters unite

Are we audiophiles a privileged elitist group of sophisticates, or just a bunch of hi-fi anoraks?

'mon, cards on the table time... just between us, does your other half understand your obsession with hi-fi?

And, assuming you've sired a few, how about your sprogs? What's the expression that crosses their face(s) when you announce that you're going to have 'a listening session'? Resigned boredom mixed with a slight but visible dash of horror, or beaming countenances, gilded with eager anticipation. Far be it from me to prejudge, but based on my personal experience (and having spent a lifetime in the company of other audiophiles) I'm betting it's more likely to be the former rather than the latter...

The truth is, our passion is generally a hobby traditionally indulged alone, circumstances in which one can better connect with it on a deeper, personal level. If one's taste in music is, shall we say, somewhat eclectic then solo participation is often an enforced pre-requisite as domestic harmony tends to suffer otherwise. But you already know this, don't you?

There comes a time, however, when we all need to ask an uncomfortable question of ourselves. Have we become pre-occupied with hardware for its own sake rather than for the richer musical experience that hi-fi reproduction allows us to access? Has our interest become too exclusive?

This is a bad thing. Music is woven into the fabric of our daily lives, whether one is consciously aware of it or not. But it's the music that enriches our existence, not the kit. Audiophile-grade hi-fi is an enabling tool that allows you to heighten the pleasure you gain from music, but ultimately it is just that... a tool. It's the music that ought, nay, needs, to matter. If you've forgotten that then it's time to make amends to yourself, your kith and, most important of all, your kin.

How? Well, first, choose a sunny day. Ignore all your audiophile sensibilities and position your

speakers near the windows. Next, ask your friends/family/neighbours what music they would like to hear...

If they've got the appropriate silver frisbees great. If not go online, assemble a few hours worth of music on a (free) Spotify playlist and hook up your PC/Mac to your painstakingly assembled replay system. OK, if you're going down the PC/Mac route you'll be insulting your amplifier with a low-flying 160 kbit/Ogg Vorbis q5 codec. But wait... you haven't heard stage two of the plan.

Now wheel out that dusty old barbie mouldering in the shed. Wheel the guests in and slide ice-cold beverages into their hands before the immolation process begins and then, and only then, press play.

Yup, there'll be artefacts (Spotify has an excellent paid-for, ad-free 320kbps option too), occasional drop-outs, a compressed dynamic range and you might want to mute things quick when the ads appear. But that's pretty much it for downsides. The sheer variety of music on offer will enervate you.

But the biggest upside is that you'll spend a few hours engaged in conversation with people who will suddenly appreciate your presence in their lives. You will all eat well, drink merrily and, partly thanks to your audiophile system, genuinely enjoy the soundtrack that accompanied one unforgettably glorious, sundrenched moment in time.

That, dear reader, is what your hi-fi system could and rightfully should be doing for you. Wield it well and hi-fi can be truly life-affirming. And not just for you. Your kids might still think you're a bit of a saddo, but I bet they'll recall their 'choons sounded pretty spesh that day and maybe they'll listen to Dad's 'rig' again when they get a second. From small acorns... HFC

Burning in...

Setting up your hi-fi kit can be a daunting task with so many variables to affect the outcome

"It's difficult to separate what we actually hear, from what we think we hear and expect to hear." t's the moment of truth – that all-important first time you listen to a new component or system. You've spent shed loads of money; the stakes are high. But, what if that anticipated 'upgrade' turns out to be a terrible disappointment?

Every hi-fi dealer dreads installing hi-fi. Of course, it's fascinating to hear how stuff performs in people's homes. But it can be puzzling, not to say downright embarrassing, when things sound less-good than anticipated.

Often, there's no clear reason why the sound disappoints – it just does. What wasn't appreciated until comparatively recently is how much time kit needs to 'burn-in' – it might not sound right for tens (or even hundreds) of hours.

When I first got into hi-fi, no one – retailers or reviewers realised this. We naively expected equipment to sound great from the off.

All this was thrown into sharp relief when I reviewed the PrimaLuna ProLogue Eight CD player, Krell S300i integrated amplifier and Sonus faber Luito Tower loudspeakers for last issue's Beautiful Systems feature (HFC 325).

I initially sampled the CD player and loudspeakers using my regular amplifier and found they 'settled' quite quickly However, when I installed the Krell amp, the sound went from smooth and natural, to bright and steely sharp.

But then, over a period of four or five days, the sound gradually relaxed and lost its brightness as the amp burnt-in. After ten days, things became well-balanced, natural and nicely integrated – a sound I could happily live with.

However, in reality, what changed? Did the amplifier really burn-in? Or was it down to the various components getting used to each other? Alternatively, was it me that changed? Did I simply acclimatise to the sound of the new system?

There's a definite learning process here. We grow accustomed to the sound of our hi-fi systems – sometimes to the point of no longer perceiving fairly serious flaws.

Often, it's only when we eliminate a problem, that we realise something was wrong.

Prior to that, things had seemed fine. The brain does such a lot of 'processing', pure objective evaluation is almost impossible. It's like being in a room with a bad smell – after a while, you no longer notice. This creates a subjective minefield.

Truth is, we rarely hear things as they really are. Everything we 'hear' is filtered and interpreted via our brains. Reality is clouded by expectation, anticipation, and (sadly), reputation. We're all hugely prejudiced.

It's difficult to separate what we actually hear, from what we think we hear and expect to hear. That's why *Hi-Fi Choice's* 'blind' listening tests are so interesting – and potentially embarrassing. Unable to engage our prejudices, we're forced to focus on what's there.

This doesn't just apply to equipment. It covers music and the people playing it. Our response to music and its performance is also tainted by prejudice. Our enjoyment and acceptance is heavily influenced by whether or not we rate the composer and/or musician(s). With recordings, our response is even conditioned by the record label.

Alas, a Big Name doesn't automatically guarantee every performance (or every composition) is genuinely worthy of that particular individual's reputation or genius. But are you objective enough to tell the genuine from the counterfeit?

I like this story about Picasso. One day, the great man was looking through a bunch of pictures attributed to him. 'Fake; Fake; Fake; Genuine: Fake; Fake...' Suddenly, someone standing nearby stopped him.

'Hang on, the drawing you just dismissed as a fake, I actually saw you do that one myself'. To which the great artist replied 'I too can fake a Picasso!' HFC

Doing the arithmetic

Naim's DAC has a language all of its own...

"At that point my brain shouted 'What on earth is this guy talking about? Arithmetic noise: what the heck is that?"

was feeling rather jaded and world-weary before I went to Naim for the launch of its first ever standalone DAC. There were not going to be review samples ready to take away at the event so as I drove down to Salisbury my thoughts started to become increasingly negative: why was I bothering to make this trip when the most I could expect was a pleasant lunch and a bit of amusing chat? Forgive me if that sounds cynical, but my morose disposition made me think that I should really begin regarding my time as a more precious commodity.

Nonetheless, and true to form, Naim delivered the goods: not in any physical format but in terms of mental stimulation. The assembled press were addressed by Principal Engineer, Hjalmar Nilsson, a ferociously intelligent, tall, young Swede who has come to work at Naim. This man is clever with a capital F. One of his party tricks was paring down the already minimalist code that drives the DAC's SHARC processor, which Naim uses as the digital filter to do all manner of mind-boggling stuff with the data passing through the typically prosaic-looking black box.

At one point he said "...of course, we could do no more because we started to run into problems with arithmetic noise..." Whoa! At that point my brain did a tyre-smoking handbrake turn and shouted: "What on earth is this guy talking about? Arithmetic noise: what the heck is that?" I have spoken to a great many manufacturers about DAC technology and none have ever mentioned 'arithmetic noise', so I had to find out what this phenomenon was. Nilsson then went on to talk of being able to measure the mechanical noise that one could introduce into DAC circuits merely by breathing upon the components... which prompted me to ask, tongue firmly in cheek, of course, if the Naim DAC had undergone wind-tunnel testing Now, I can just about get my head around the concept of atomic changes in a resistor affecting the signal passing through it, but errors in

arithmetic introducing noise? This makes me even more certain that there are whole crateloads of unknown considerations that still surround digital, no matter how much some 'experts' think they have the entire subject sorted and profess otherwise. Identical datastreams must sound the same because Bits is Bits? I don't think so.

In Janet and John language, it boils down to this: the Naim DAC's digital filtering has to output a very high-resolution data-stream to the actual DAC chips. As these are 24-bit, the signal coming from the SHARC DSP, that Naim uses to implement the digital filter, has to be able to resolve signal levels of -144dB, which is the value of a 24-bit system's Least Significant Bit. Any rounding errors in the filter's arithmetic need to be small enough to fall below this so as not to affect the eventual sound quality. With the recursive filtering that the system employs any errors can be fed back to the input and so introduce even more mistakes into subsequent computations, increasing the arithmetic inaccuracy or noise. So it is vital that one gets it right (The Naim processor can, in fact, resolve signals down to -156dB, and this additional headroom probably explains why it sounds so open and transparent).

That is, to me, a fascinating bit of science/mathematics even if it is about as easy for me to comprehend as anti-matter. So now, rather than feeling jaded I am feeling rejuvenated... intellectually, at least. It is refreshing to know that one can still learn something even as one approaches one's autumnal years. Mind you, the friend who was – 25 years ago – the Best Man at my wedding, and who is just approaching his sixty-fifth birthday, sports a magnificent Mohican haircut and drives a lightweight Mitsubishi Evo, which proves that there can be plenty of life left in us supposedly old dogs. Ennui be gone! HFC

A British loudspeaker meets Canadian electronics

hat links Stevie Wonder, Robbie Williams, Coldplay, Tony Bennet, Bryan Ferry, Robert Fripp, Peter Gabriel, Francis Rossi, Tori Amos, Brian May and John Rutter?

Avid readers of *Hi-Fi Choice*, perhaps, or maybe it's because they're all enthusiastic users of PMC loudspeakers? An appreciation shared by the likes of the BBC, Deutsche Grammophon, Decca, EMI, Warner Music, Harmonia Mundi, Teldex studios, etc, etc.

It's an impressive roll-call of musos and recording industry movers and shakers, covering just about everything – from rock to classical, not to mention Hollywood film studios. Clearly, PMC loudspeakers are something rather special then?

The system reviewed here is no exception including, as it does, PMC's PB1i – a tall three-way floorstander featuring four drive units. It's an interesting design, with transmission line loading for the twin bass drivers and fourth-order Linkwitz Riley filters for the crossover.

PMC is also the UK distributor for Canada's Bryston electronics and the

For vinyl replay, there's the BP26P or BP26MC (both £4,945 each) featuring a phono stage for magnetic or moving coil cartridges. If you have extra digital sources, there's the BP26DA (£4,945) which handles two digital components via a built-in DAC.

The DAC has sampling rates between 16kHz to 108kHz, with word lengths of 16, 18, 20, or 24 bit. Data format is SPDIF. Incidentally, the preamp's DAC is for other digital sources – it's not meant to be used in place of the BCD-1's internal DAC.

LAST THINGS FIRST

Although this is very much a system review, we always like to sample one or two components individually before putting them all together. We initially tried the PMC loudspeakers in our own system and first impressions were good.

The PB1i produces a very clean, neutral sort of tonal balance. The music sounds detailed and extremely clear, while at the same time absolutely homogenous.

The top-end is crisp and sharp, but completely integrated with the midrange. The fast attack of percussion

firms enjoy a close relationship. In fact, PMC uses Bryston electronics in its active studio loudspeaker range.

Given this link between the brands, partnering the PB1 i's with Bryston's BCD1 CD player and BP26 preamp/300-watt 4B SST2 power amp, was a no-Brainer. But it's more than just a marriage of convenience – it's a combination that works.

The 4B SST2 power amp produces 300 watts into eight ohms and can be bridged to give a massive 900 watts into eight ohms. The BP26 preamp is available in three variants, with the basic BP26 offering just line level analogue inputs.

is hugely impressive. Transients seem to come from nowhere with amazing clarity and attack.

While listening to a piece of music, for example, with smooth vocals and strings, a sudden sharp cymbal crash surprises with its crisp immediacy – its focus and precision.

The quality of the individual speaker drivers is a factor here, but also the 31 element crossover, which uses fourth-order filters with a steep 24dB/octave roll-off. It means each driver covers a narrower portion of the frequency range with less overlan

The 'downside' is that the crossover has to be more carefully designed to



create the impression of a seamless flow from deep bass to high treble. But PMC seems to have managed that and claim that its complex crossover is not a difficult load to drive.

The PB1 i sound is surprisingly good when played at low volume levels, but get even better when played loud. These speakers offer excellent control; things don't fall apart or get ragged as dynamic levels increase.

The bass is outstandingly full and deep for what is a relatively small cabinet. The bottom end is superbly tight and controlled – and remarkably clean, too. You only notice bass when it's there – and then the power and depth can be surprising.

Sensitivity is 87dB for one watt, which is reasonably efficient. With 300 watts output, the Bryston 4B SST2 has enough muscle to drive the speakers to quite high levels sufficient for most tastes.

The 4B SST2 can be bridged and two power amps used in a dual-mono arrangement – one for each channel. It's an option that offers greatly increased power (from 300 watts to 900 watts) and much better sound quality.

The CD player and pre/power amps can be connected via normal unbalanced cables using RCA-type phono plugs. However, provision is also made for balanced working using XLR connectors.

Balanced gives superior sound quality, with greater dynamics and a noticeably bigger fuller sound. If you go down this route, cable costs will probably be higher, but the difference in sound quality should be worthwhile.

Using balanced cables between pre and power amp will enable you to situate the power amps close to the speakers (keeping speaker cables short), with no chance of noise or interference being picked up due to long cable runs.

The PB1i has three pairs of linked-connection terminals, thereby making provision for bi- or tri-wiring – and bi-/tri amping. However, while bi- or tri-amping is an option, owners of two 4B SST2s will get better results using their amps bridged.

SAUCE FROM YOUR SOURCE

The source component of this system is Bryston's BCD-1 – a Red Book CD player featuring a Crystal CS4398 Delta-Sigma 24bit/192kHz DAC with 128 times oversampling. It also has discrete Class A, fully balanced analogue output circuits.

There are independent power supplies for analogue and digital, to ensure each is kept clean and noise-free and the makers claim great care has been taken to reduce levels of digital jitter to extremely low levels.

Certainly, the BCD-1 delivers a strong clear sound that is extremely detailed and clean. Even used unbalanced, it impresses with a combination of presence and scale. Used balanced, you get an even bigger soundstage with added depth and space.

As a system, the combination gives excellent clarity and detail, while at the same time sounding tonally neutral and well-balanced. Recordings that can sound thick and dull are rendered with surprising transparency.

Musically, the Bryston/PMC combination produces a very engaging result that sounds lively and informative. The music has presence and good forward momentum, yet there is no sense of exaggeration or emphasis.

THE SECRET OF GOOD TIMING

The timing of the system is superb. Playing the Labeque sisters' two-piano arrangement of Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue*, we were impressed by the way the system handled the tricky cross-rhythms.

Vocals sound full-bodied and smooth, while massed violins are silky and mellow. Yet, percussion has surprising impact and bite. It's this broad range of

contrasts that impressed us the most, enabling the system to do justice to a wide range of music.

PMC claim the PB1i bottom-end goes down to about 24Hz – far deeper than most ported or sealed designs of similar size. Of greater importance is the quality of the bass – solid, firm and controlled, without seeming dry or over-damped.

The speakers are designed to give a wide dispersion – which eliminates the 'sweet spot' directionality you get with certain models. Imaging is nonetheless precise and detailed – not as laser-sharp as some, but very natural.

Because the bass is so clean and controlled and the dispersion so even and wide, the PB1 i should be less sensitive to positioning – less affected by the constraints of 'difficult' rooms with awkward acoustics – compared to many other loudspeakers.

Although having professional studios use and endorse your loudspeaker is an impressive accolade, it's as well to appreciate that what an engineer looks

for in a speaker is not necessarily what a home listener wants.

Some 'monitor'-type speakers are used by studios because they reveal tiny flaws and blemishes. They hold a magnifying glass to the recording, exposing faults that might otherwise go unnoticed.

REVEALING

The PMC PB1i is certainly revealing, but not in a destructive, negative sense. It's sharp and lucid – qualities that allow you to hear faults, if faults exist

At the same time it doesn't exaggerate limitations and short-comings. It's also good at reproducing what's right with a recording – showing the positive rewarding aspects – rather than simply highlighting faults.

Here is a system that sounds natural and 'right' more or less from the off. It invites you to forget about hi-fi in order to concentrate on the music. And isn't that what most of us want from a hi-fi system?

The system is very good as supplied, yet can be upgraded and improved by going from unbalanced to balanced operation. You could also add a second power amp for bridged operation and/or a PMC subwoofer for extra-deep low frequencies.

20 YEARS HARD LABOUR

Bryston is so confident about the quality and reliability of its electronics, it offers an amazing 20-year warranty against failure. Beat that!

This Bryston/PMC combination is, without doubt, a winner, delivering crisp clean sound with no coloration and complete naturalness.

But maybe the last word should be left to one Francis Rossi of Status Quo, who described PMC loudspeakers as 'F***ing brilliant'.

We had similar thoughts about this amazing system. So, thank you Francis – we certainly couldn't have put it better ourselves... HFC

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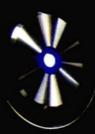
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Studio sound

The new and improved version of the Pioneer's D9 will offend few ears

ioneer's relationship with high-quality hi-fi separates has been a little on-and-off over recent years. In the wake of the famous A-400 amp there have been plenty of models that many fondly remember and enthusiastically use including several CD player and recorder models. The company filled something of a hi-fi vacuum a couple of years ago with the 'C-clef' range of amps and SACD players, which were designed with considerable UK input, including fine-tuning at Air Studios in North London, the facility run by 'fifth Beatle' George Martin.

Those models have recently been revised and re-released in 'Mk 2' form, including the A-A9 Mk2 amplifier which features in next month's *Ultimate Group Test*. But here we're considering its obvious partner, the more upmarket of two SACD players (the other is the PD-D6 – watch this space for a review soon).

The PD-D9 is instantly recognisable to anyone who ever saw the original D9, not least from the unusual front-panel design, but also from the display (which has actually changed slightly, being a different colour and rather easier to read off-axis) and the unusually small number of front-panel controls.

Yes, you'll find just two buttons here. One opens and closes the tray, while the other

alternates between Play and Stop. We complained about this last time and we'll say it again. No means of selecting tracks from the front panel is horribly, damnably irritating. Having no search facility is annoying enough, but it's so common we've got used to it. But needing a remote to find a track is beyond the pale. As you have to walk up to the player to insert a disc, you are likely to use front-panel buttons to start play. But quite often, you'll want to start by playing a track other than Track 1, so you might as well do that from the front panel, too. Minimalism is all very well, but not when it impedes handling.

All right, enough whining. The player's build and specification is otherwise very good. It's a heavy unit, thanks in part to a reinforced base that should help reduce unwanted mechanical

The audio functions are achieved by an impressive array of recent integrated circuits, starting with a sample-rate converter chip, which upsamples CD audio to 176.4kHz Conversion to analogue is carried out using a pair of Wolfson's latest and highestperformance parts, operating in parallel mode to give a small improvement in distortion and signal-to-noise ratio. Analogue filtering and output buffering is done by high-grade op-amps, for which Pioneer has selected through-hole parts. All the others are only available as surface-mounted. Passive component quality is good, too with through-hole resistors in key positions and the power supply has been fitted with lownoise Schottky rectifiers and unusually large reservoir capacitors. Pioneer's own slow rolloff digital filtering scheme, 'Legato Link Pro',

vibration. The sides and top are also strong and non-resonant. The transport is brisk and responsive for an SACD-type and reads discs in about eight seconds. Internally, there is a well-specified power supply with two R-core transformers, one for analogue and one for digital circuits, plus a much smaller standby transformer. There's also plenty of screening around to keep digital signals and mains hum out of harm's way. The digital outputs are placed alone on copper-plated screen between them and the audio parts. If that's not enough, you can switch them and the display off entirely with the 'Pure Audio' function engaged.

is included, but switchable. The alternative is a conventional near-brickwall filter.

SOUND QUALITY

We had quite a long review period with this player, which gave us a chance to try it with tracks familiar and unfamiliar on both CD and SACD. By and large, we had a thoroughly enjoyable time with all of them. This is a player that enjoys its music and isn't unduly fussy about what kind it is asked to deal with. It's not entirely devoid of opinions, though...

It's at its best with recordings that could be described as 'civilised'. Classical, of course, is



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■ the obvious example, but plenty of jazz, pop, country and even rock recordings have been made with an emphasis on clarity and cleanliness. With recordings that are more inclined towards blatant overload and sheer noise (think punk and anything in that direction), we found the D9 to be a shade timid, as if embarrassed to replay such an

Since a replay device is meant to be neutral, this counts as a limitation, but given all the other things this player does so well, it's not a huge drawback. For a start, there's an excellent sense of involvement in the music, a feeling that the musicians are getting stuck in and, moreover, are right there in front of you. Not, we hasten to add, any closer than they should be. Imaging is natural in both width and depth and extends to a considerable distance

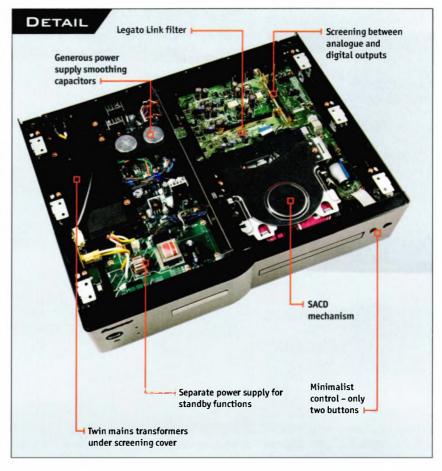
Tonally, the player is very close to neutral, though we felt the bass may be just a touch more present than the ideal. It's not so much that its level is lifted - rather that it isn't amazingly well controlled and can, thus, sometimes seem slightly overdone. Then again, most listeners will probably prefer that to lean and thin - we certainly would. Pitch definition is excellent at low frequencies and the upper bass has plenty of kick, so it's never less than enjoyable

Midrange is lovely, with a beautifully evenhanded approach to the tonal qualities of different instruments and voices. That said, the 'Legato Link' filter (see Legato Link Pro box below) seems to have some effect on this, slightly favouring the higher midrange so that bright instruments and female voices are a little more present. At the same time,

LEGATO LINK PRO

Pioneer's 'Legato Link' concept goes back some years, to a time when myriad voices in the audio world were questioning the standard wisdom that the ideal digital filter has a brickwall response at around half the sampling frequency. Various firms developed filters that had a much more gradual transition and, as a result, a much shorter impulse response - the 'ringing' that accompanies any transient. The typical duration of this ringing is one or two milliseconds and its frequency is over 20kHz. Since the audio on a CD has been filtered by a similar filter when it was recorded, there's actually no signal on a normal disc that will set it off.

As a result, its audibility is questionable to say the least, but Legato Link was heard to make a difference and many people liked it. Problematically, it causes aliasing, which can in turn result in audible distortion further down the line. Still, when it's a switchable option, one can hardly complain!



Legato Link brings with it a slight veiling of detail and also a subtle reduction in the scale of images. Overall, it may make the sound more immediate, but we were unconvinced and preferred the sound with the normal filter-in service

As for treble, it is open and nicely balanced between sparkle and control. Funnily enough, given that the most obvious differences in technical performance between digital filters are found in the treble, we found it much the same with either normal or Legato Link selected. Perhaps the latter is ever so slightly more delicate, but it's a very close call.

We've mentioned detail briefly, but that's perhaps the most appealing aspect of this player. With good recordings, it is unusually adept (within its price range) at finding detail and presenting it coherently as part of a bigger picture. As a result, there's more than a hint of that classic high-end trait, the ability to hear just as much or as little detail as one wants, without any effort on the part of the listener

Detail can be something of a double-edged sword for some listeners, as in some cases it seems to come at the expense of overall integration. We didn't at all feel that to be the case here, though. On the contrary, the D9 always keeps detail in proportion to the musical whole

We listened to a few opera tracks and were struck by the way this most complex of musical forms was always homogenous and dramatic, but still clearly composed of individual voices and instruments. It's a bit like the ornate front of a cathedral - you can admire its outline from a distance or walk up close and appreciate the details of the stone-carvers' art

We wouldn't suggest that the D9 is without peers in this regard, but for the sheer technical brilliance of its performance, it is one of the best we've encountered short of the expensive high-end. As such, it clearly makes a strong case for itself and we welcome it warmly. HFC

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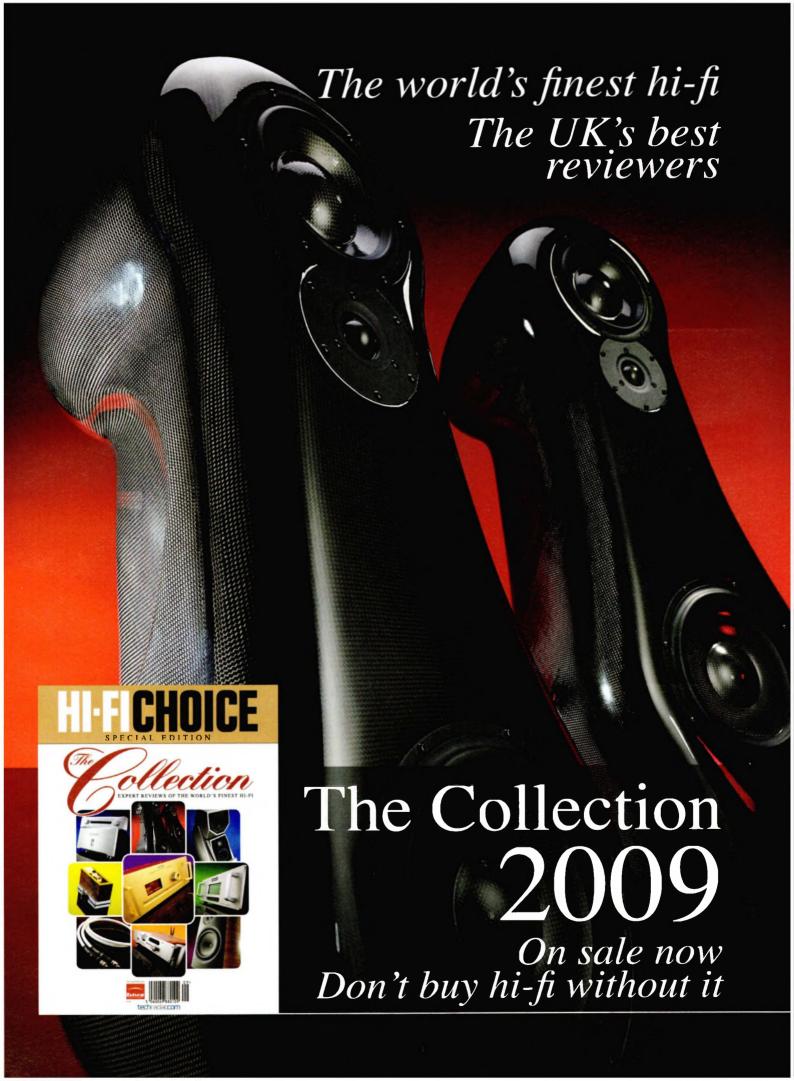


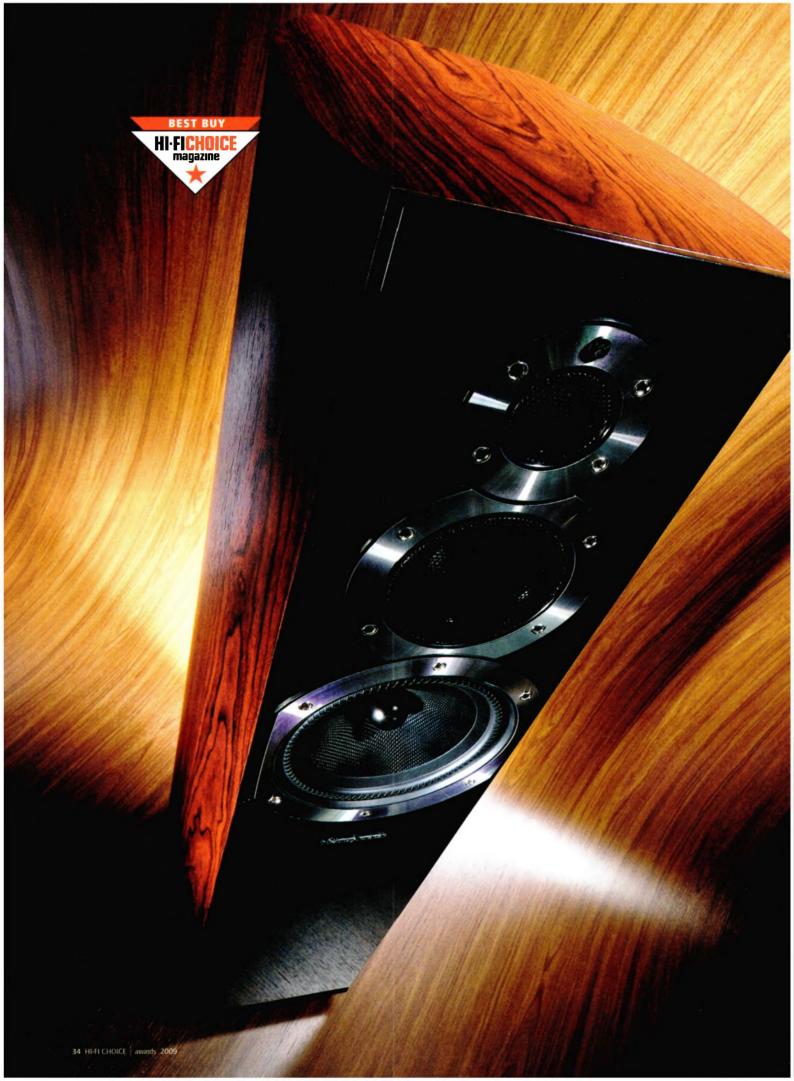

harfedale was well known as the loudspeaker brand name most often recognised by the apocryphal 'man on the Clapham omnibus'. Today, of course, he's more likely to be found in Tesco's car park, piling up the week's shopping and the odd item of consumer electronics into the back of a people carrier made somewhere in the Far East. and it's much less certain that he'll remember that 'Wharfedale' means 'hi-fi loudspeakers'.

Founded way back in the 1930s, Wharfedale has one of the longest histories in hi-fi, though 75 years has seen several changes in ownership and downs as well as ups. The company that ruled the UK market for the best part of half a century might no longer enjoy its earlier dominance, but IAG (the International Audio Group), its owner since 1997, is in for the long haul and has every intention of re-establishing its previous pre-eminence.

Three months ago, Peter Comeau took over as Director of Acoustic Design at IAG's Hi-Fi Division. Peter has taken his 30 years' experience in British hi-fi speaker design over to the IAG factory in Shenzhen, in southern China, where he and a team of 15 engineers have responsibility for no fewer than four well known British speaker brands that IAG has collected over the past 12 years. Alongside Wharfedale, IAG owns Quad, Mission and Castle Acoustics (plus Audiolab and Leak)

IAG itself is owned by two Taiwanese Chinese hi-fi enthusiast brothers, Bernard and Michael Chang. Their operation is based on a huge factory complex with around 2,000 workers. This operates a policy of 'vertical integration', which means that virtually everything needed to build a loudspeaker - drivers, cables, enclosures, crossovers etc. - is made in-house.

The first fruit of Comeau's involvement is a brand new Wharfedale Diamond 10 range, which includes no fewer than eight stereo pairs, plus numerous home cinema extras. Eight models does seem a trifle excessive –

most manufacturers make do with four or five, but we were told it was needed to cope with the wide variety of tastes across a global marketplace. Chinese consumers, for example, like speakers with a lot of drive units. There might be some Chinese influence in the styling

The bass and treble drivers are a little more conventional. The former is a 165mm device with a 130mm woven Kevlar cone and a 'diamond patterned' surround, while the tweeter has a 25mm soft dome diaphragm and short horn loading. Both mid and treble 🔼

too: plenty of bling is visible when the grille is removed, with a glossy black front and supershiny finish on the plastic driver frames. A much more demure black grille is available, which neatly fixes onto the hex sockets of the driver woodscrews

The Diamonds have been Wharfedale's entrylevel hi-fi models since the early 1980s, so high perceived value is an essential part of the agenda. Whatever one's reaction to the bling, this three-way floorstander is a lot of loudspeaker for £480. Probably inevitably, finish is vinyl woodprint, but the catalogue lists no fewer than seven options. Our samples came in 'Roswood Quilted' whatever that means: they certainly looks pretty good, even though touch betrays the synthetic origins.

Despite the low price, the Diamond 10.5 ticks many of the boxes. Curved sides should help stiffen the enclosure and distribute internal reflections and standing waves. A composite front panel provides a secure driver mounting platform. A separate plinth is fitted for secure spike accommodation, though regrettably this doesn't extend the stability footprint one iota and the spike lock-nut arrangements are very difficult to tighten properly. The rear panel has twin terminal pairs, linked by brass strips and fitted to a fairly tough-looking moulding and there's also room for a port.

The driver line-up is certainly distinctive. Dome-type midrange drivers are usually only found in much more upmarket speakers, so the 50mm dome used here is rather unusual. There are pluses and minuses: the main advantage is that its relatively small-diameter diaphragm helps maintain consistent dispersion as frequency rises. The disadvantage is relatively modest sensitivity, due again to the small diaphragm and large (hence heavy) voice coil.



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drivers are separately protected under metal mesh covers

Auditioning was carried out in a heavily furnished and somewhat irregular 4.4x2.6x5.5m (WxHxD) room. In-room measurements make it quite clear that the Diamond 10.5, with its port tuned to 50Hz, is best kept well clear of walls - if anything there's some mid-bass excess on this occasion. though that will help balance out the lack of deep bass output. The speakers were, therefore, positioned 2.2m apart with their backs 0.8m from the nearest wall.

Most of the listening was done on a system with a Naim CD player; a hybrid Rega/Linn vinyl player and a Magnum Dynalab MD 106T tuner, all of which were amplified by a Naim NAC552/NAP500 combo.

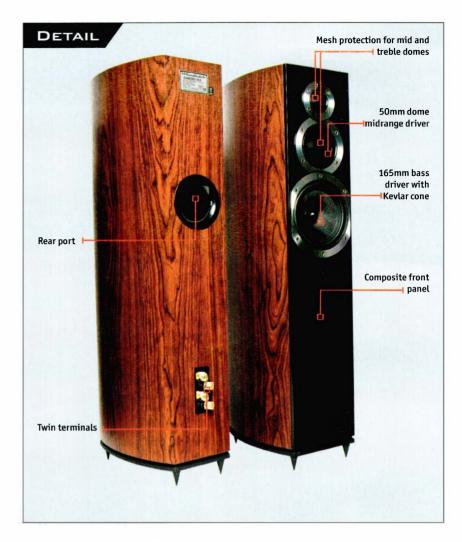
The overall tonal balance here is progressively down-tilted from the bass to the treble, so that the overall character might well be a little too warm, rich, and laid back for some tastes and systems. Male voices consequently do have a touch of chestiness, and the high-level 20Hz sinewave signal used for response testing also showed audible harmonic distortion.

One consequence is that although the presence band is nicely open, it's also a little laid back. This might sound a bit of a contradiction in terms, but it's actually rather effective. Voices are very convincing, yet consonants and sibilants rarely, if ever, sound aggressive, even when played loud, though the volume may have to be turned up a little to maintain good intelligibility.

The restrained top end does somewhat restrict the impression of air and transparency, but it might also be regarded as a positive

MEASUREMENTS

Three-way designs usually have above average sensitivities, but that's not the case when dome midrange drivers are used: we can confirm Wharfedale's claims for just 86dB, close to the 87dB we measured in the midband. However, sensitivity (and hence tonal balance) tends to vary with frequency, and under in-room conditions, the 10.5 averages more like 89dB between 35Hz and 220Hz and we noted a dip (probably room-related) centred on 330Hz. Furthermore, although we can't verify the claim that the upper bandwidth reaches 44kHz at -10dB (our upper measurement limit is 20kHz), the in-room far-field output level does seem to drop quite significantly above 9kHz. The claim for a nominal impedance of 6 ohms looks accurate, though the fact that the impedance is down around 4 ohms between 100Hz and 200Hz means that an amplifier with decent current delivery is indicated. The pair-match of our samples was pretty good, with just minor variations at low frequencies.



benefit when viewed in the context of an inexpensive system.

Over and beyond these tonal balance factors, and in fact much more important in the overall scheme of things, the voice band in particular is notably well projected and reveals a very good coherence. That in turn leads to believable and informative music making. albeit within certain limitations.

Although enclosure colorations as such seem very well controlled, there's also a lack of midrange transparency and some associated 'pinched' coloration that becomes progressively more intrusive as the volume level is increased. Lateral stereo images are well positioned and focused, but show little in the way of depth and while the midband is certainly impressively communicative, subtlety, delicacy and dynamic expression are a little weak.

Turning up the wick also tends to make that mild bass excess rather more obvious, both in terms of rather too much warmth and a slight tendency to thump, presumably when the music, the port tuning and a prominent room mode all coincide.

The Diamond 10.5 is a much less expensive loudspeaker than the overwhelming majority of models that come into HFC for review. Some performance compromises and consequent criticisms are therefore inevitable, but

shouldn't detract from the fine value for money and interesting engineering solutions.

In particular, the use of a 50mm midrange dome to cover the vital presence zone with one driver (roughly 800Hz-3.8kHz) is surely responsible for a voice-band integration that is clearly superior to the norm. And from a musical and communication point of view, that coherence is clearly more important than the minor balance anomalies. HFC

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High flying

The new Monitor Audio AirStream 10's performance reaches the stratosphere

uestion: if you manufacture loudspeakers, what do you need to do to keep abreast of the latest technology? Well, given that speakers themselves are not exactly the fastest-moving examples of high-tech on the planet, an obvious answer seems to be to build something new and innovative that incorporates them, thereby 'leveraging' your loudspeaker expertise to gain a march on high-tech specialists who have to buy in (probably inferior) loudspeaker solutions.

And lo and behold, that's what Monitor Audio has done with the AirStream 10. This smart and compact piece of kit, at once futuristic and classic in appearance, is actually one of the most all-round capable audio devices we've come across in quite some time. It receives DAB and FM radio and thanks to the wonders of wi-fi (or, if you prefer, a wired Ethernet connection), it receives Internet radio and accesses music on your home network, via any suitable router – we used a BT Home Hub for review purposes. If that's all a bit too new-fangled for you, you can always plug in a portable music player or other source via the auxiliary input.

Some of this is easier to set up than other bits, but if your computer has at some point in its life been set up to belong to a network, then it should be pretty straightforward to get the AirStream to connect and recognise music files.

Connecting to Internet radio is effortless, though the delay in 'tuning' in to a station can be a bit trying – this isn't a function of the AirStream though, it's caused by the need for buffering data which takes some time.

The AirStream 10 can sit on the long thin face opposite the control buttons, or on the largest face so that the speaker faces downwards, about 2cm from the supporting surface. In the case of the latter, treble is bound to suffer a bit, but the buttons are more

SOUND QUALITY

Under such conditions the sound is fairly clear, though not quite as neutral or punchy as the best Tivoli and Vita Audio radios can offer. On the other hand, there's a decent amount of power on hand and the lack of rattles within the unit makes it a good choice for playing loud. The mono loudspeaker is not such a huge drawback as the stereo of most one-box units is nothing to get excited about and headphone and auxiliary outputs are stereo.

With the speaker facing downwards, the

accessible – certainly if you are using the unit as a bedside alarm or radio.

Operation is simple and, in fact, the automatic sorting of Internet radio stations by genre, location, and name, is just about the best way we've found yet of trawling through them. Some of them have a distinctly ropey quality and 24kbps MP3 is obviously nothing remotely to do with hi-fi, but we did find some perfectly sonically acceptable examples from Azerbaijan and The Philippines, to name but two. The fun is, pretty much literally, endless! Given the point already made about treble with the speaker facing downwards, we did most of our listening with it facing out, on or reasonably close to its axis.

most obvious drawback is in the reduced comprehensibility of the spoken voice. Music is a little dulled, but one still gets the gist.

It's tempting to compare FM, DAB and Internet versions of the same station. FM performance is a bit so-so, tending to sound rather grainy, however meticulously one fiddles with the antenna, but Internet radio is catching up fast with DAB – in some cases sounding noticeably better. Interestingly, the AirStream's display tells you what bitrate and codec is in use for each station.

Internet radio is still in its infancy, but has taken off like a rocket. Dedicated hardware like this lags a little, but we look forward to more appearing. The attraction of Internet listening without needing a computer to be switched on is obvious and this product fills the need well. **HFC**

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I ime was when portable audio was the sole preserve of large companies - Sony, Sharp. Aiwa and the few others who had made the investment in miniature cassette and, later, MiniDisc mechanisms. But now, almost everyone has some kind of music player about their person and many more manufacturers have recognised a growth market when they see one. The good news for audiophiles is that some of these manufacturers are small specialists making things like high-quality headphone amplifiers, of which iBasso is one.

This is more than just a headphone amp, though, it's also a three-input DAC. Miniaturisation is a wonderful thing and despite this unit's diminutive dimensions of 55mm wide by 21mm high by 104mm deep, it includes both optical and electrical S/PDIF inputs and a USB socket for connection to most flavours of portable or desktop computer. Oh, and because it's portable there's a battery in there, plus enough circuitry to charge it from the USB connection (for those without a handy computer, iBasso provides a plug-in charger and USB-type lead). Too bad so few iThings have any kind of digital output.

That's already a decent feature list, but iBasso has really gone all the way for the tweaker and made it possible to change the op-amps in the output circuit so as to personalise the sound to some extent. The fitted op-amp is a perfectly respectable type, but a couple of higher performance ones are provided - surface-mount devices, mounted on adaptors to allow them to be easily plugged in. A pair of blank adaptors are provided, too, and you could, in principle, use almost any through-hole mounting op-amp with an industry-standard pin-out.

Operation is simple, though it can seem a little confusing that the 'Aux' socket on the front is both an input (when using the D10

advantages are twofold: first, it gives significantly more output than most portable music players, which tend to be limited for health and safety reasons. That's not such a daft idea, either, but the audiophile may choose to use less sensitive headphones, which simply won't be driven to satisfying levels by most portables. This one proved satisfactory with full-size Sennheiser and Grado models, with both requiring more volts than most in-ear types.

Second, levels apart, iBasso claims that the D10 offers higher quality sound than portable players can unaided. We'd tend to agree with

as an amplifier) and an output (when using it as a DAC). The volume control includes the on/off switch and it seems pretty hard to turn on by accident. Battery life in DAC mode is about 20 hours or 30 in amp mode.

SOUND QUALITY

We were not much taken with the sound using the originally fitted op-amps, and measurements confirmed that they were struggling with high levels. Swapping to the AD8656 option, however, picked things up no end and we soon started to see the point of this model. Working as an amp, its

that, finding that with in-ear and full-size 'phones alike the sound took on greater confidence, more detail, better imaging and generally a more lifelike character with the D10 in circuit.

As a DAC, however, it really shines. We tested it with a borrowed iRiver portable player with a Toslink output and also with desktop computer and hi-fi CD player sources. We found its quality admirably close to that of the Cambridge Audio DacMagic - no mean praise considering how capable that unit is. The D10 gave a very significant improvement in quality to the iRiver device and while it wasn't necessarily better than a decent modern £300-ish CD player, it wasn't any worse either. Connected to a computer, it improves things in every area too, with a much better all round sense of musical insight. HFC

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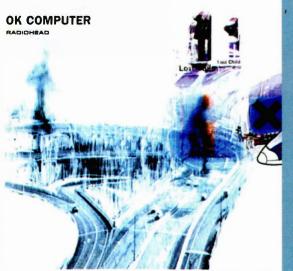

OK COMPUTER Radiohead EMI

Classic Album

Apple sheds and tudor mansions don't often make great recording studios; then again, it usually helps to rehearse, too

K Computer was the album that put Radiohead on the global music map. Had they been so inclined, it might have turned them into the next U2. The band had achieved already considerable success with 1995's The Bends but it wasn't until OK Computer was released, along with the singles it spawned, that its fanbase began to extend beyond the hardcore to a far wider audience.

Ostensibly a concept album, OK Computer was composed as one entity rather than a random collection of musical parts. This was emphasised by an early promotional stunt in which a cassette version of the album was welded inside a Walkman so that journalists would be forced to hear it all the way through. In retrospect, it's surprising that EMI produced a cassette let alone sent it out in a Walkman, but the past 12 years have brought many changes.

Whatever they did, it seemed to work. Rolling Stone magazine awarded it four stars and wrote a glowing review. It compared the band with REM, which was an early influence, and even suggested that Freddie Mercury had inspired Thom Yorke's vocals on Paranoid Android (which makes you wonder what the reviewer was on).

One of the most impressive things about *OK Computer* is that its influences are hard to trace. The material may not be completely original, but its sources of inspiration are so diverse that the end result sounds new, and to this day, remains fresh and inventive. It has been called a prog album and with its inventiveness and success in forging a new sound, that has proved to be an apt and accurate description.

In one interview, Yorke responds to the interviewer's query about the album not containing any three-minute pop songs by saying that the same thing happened in the seventies and that it wasn't a good thing then either. But he went on to say that he liked Peter Gabriel in the era when the Genesis frontman performed with a flower on his head. Genesis was one of the key bands on the progressive scene and precisely the

sort of group that would avoid making a three-minute pop song.

The material for the album's 11 tracks, or 12 if you include the computerised monologue *Fitter Happier*, were recorded by engineer Nigel Godrich, who had worked with the band on *The Bends* and produced the 1996 B-side *Tolk Show Host*. The first four tracks were put down in Canned Applause, a tin apple shed near Didcot that the band had converted into a studio. For the remaining material, Radiohead used St Catherine's Court near Bath, a Tudor manor house where they made use of the characteristics of a variety of large and small rooms to create the sounds they wanted, recording some of the tracks completely live in the process. Radiohead worked and lived in the place for the duration of the recording, which according to Yorke "got out of hand," but it was clearly time worth spending.

OK Computer went to number one in the UK charts when it was released in June 1997, reaching number 21 in the US where it remained for 55 weeks, a period no doubt sustained by the success of the singles Karma Police and Let Down. On this side of the Atlantic, Paranoid Android, Karma Police and No Surprises were all top ten hits.

What differentiates *OK Computer* from *The Bends* and virtually all other mainstream rock albums that preceded it is the heavy use of electronics and noise. By adding these sounds to the grunge guitar style that they had honed on their previous albums, Radiohead carved out a new and intense sound that was in equal parts accessible and challenging.

Yorke's sums up the popular reaction: "I'm amazed it got the reaction it did. None of us fing knew any more whether it was good or bad. What really blew my head off was the fact that people got all the things, all the textures and the sounds and the atmospheres we were trying to create." HFC

Music: The legendary late '60's Brazilian psych band reunited for a series of gigs a few years back. Now comes an equally unexpected, and welcome, excursion into the studio. Only Sergio Dias Baptista survives from the original trio, but he's done splendidly in updating their unique combo of samba/bossa nova grooves with acid-rock and fuzz guitar. The trademark weirdness is still intact, but it's so playful and exuberant that you'll be smiling broadly while scratching your head and trying to work out what's going on. **Sound:** Chaotic and subversive – but in a good way. Then there's O Mensageiro, a near-perfect piece of jangling guitar pop, floating sublimely amid the mayhem. NW

For me, and presumably many others, the standalone CD player has no future. I get the best of both worlds using one less box, using my HDD most of the time and playing CDs when the computer is off.
I don't think the CD format is doomed yet, but the players do have a problem.

HFC From our own strictly audiophile perspective, we'd still be more than happy to opt for another integrated CD player with digital inputs, or a DAC and transport

combo. This way, we could attach a streamer if we wanted and still play a CD without increasing the box count. That said, a

decent DVD player is a perfectly viable option as a transport, even if few scale the heights of a purpose-built CD transport.

While some audiophiles see their PCs as central to their hi-fi experience (with Exact Audio Copy, for example, providing a very useful service in its pre-ripping error-correction), others view transferring

CDs to a hard drive as more of an interim solution. Not only does it involve the hassle of a fair amount of ripping if your collection is large, but also you must consider that not all PCs and soundcards are created equal. Of course, with a suitable low-jitter digital output you can play with outboard DACs to your heart's content.

The ultimate answer is likely to be the one envisioned by Ivor Jebson in these pages.

Perpendicular power

Perusing some of the Internet-based hi-fi fora, I came across some information on 'vertical' bi-amping as opposed to what seems to be the more conventional 'horizontal' bi-amping. I had my amps (Roksan Caspian M series-1) set up so that one was driving both woofers on my PMC GB1 is, the other both tweeters.

After a bit of time spent re-arranging my cabling, I ended up with one amp driving the left woofer and left tweeter, the other the right woofer and tweeter. I don't know the science behind it, but 'vertical' sounds better to me. Obviously, you can't go for this arrangement if your two power amps are

different, but if they're the same make and model, give it a go!

HFC On the one hand, 'horizontal' keeps the amps driving woofers and tweeters separate, which should give the purest treble, as the demands imposed on the treble amp's power supply are very light. That said, the mid/bass amp has to handle the considerably greater power and can suffer inter-channel crosstalk as a result. Switching to 'vertical' would eliminate any possibility of this happening, but then some might argue that this would simply shift said problems.

Your most important component

I'm always surprised that so many audiophiles and concert-goers seem to forget that their single most important component is their ears. I'm sure most of your readers would consider that they have pretty good hearing, but as we all know, our hearing becomes less acute as the years roll by. I am just wondering if there are any sensible precautions people can take to keep their hearing in decent shape whether



HFC People probably put their hearing more at risk each day by cranking up the volume of MP3 players in noisy environments like underground trains than they do at the concert hall, or with their home hi-fi system.

In the heyday of the Walkman, it was quite possible to damage hearing with excessive volume levels, but because the batteries ran flat fairly quickly it put some sort of brake on the process. MP3 players, on the other hand, can run for many hours on a single charge and prolonged exposure of this sort can and frequently does cause long-term, irreversible hearing loss.

You don't have to lug around a chunky SPL meter to check how safe your ears are. Instead, you could try something like the SoundCheck Noise Level Indicator (pictured above). Available for about £10 from sites such as enhancedlistening.co.uk and canford.co.uk, this key ring can indicate sound pressure levels from about 55dBA through 80dBA and on to 105dB and above. While it's only accurate to +/-3dB, it's cheap, light and unobtrusive and will let you know when things are starting to get too loud for comfort or healthy hearing. Another option for iPhone users is a handy little apps called Decibel, which uses the phone's mic to give an idea of sound pressure levels.

If you want to avoid hearing damage at concerts, you can opt for earplugs. The more you pay for these, the more likely you are to get attenuation that is constant with frequency. Cheaper earplugs can work well, but tend to provide attenuation that increases with frequency. Some people are still surprised by how much clearer music can become when it's not overloading their ears.

Another alternative would be to hang on to my Debut, swap the 5E for a 2M Red, then save up for, say, a Rega P3 to buy at a much later date

HFC The Xpression III is certainly better than its predecessor, but the upgrade it would offer over your Debut Phono SB isn't huge. On the other hand, the improvement offered by the 2M Red over the 5E is large, so we'd be tempted to take that route first. Then, consider upgrading your phono stage, and go for perhaps a used P3 or, if you're happy to save for longer, a Funk Firm Funk.





Music Compression - friend or foe?

A remarkable thing has happened within a few short years. The music industry has become what must be one of the very few, alongside perhaps the food industry, to be driven downwards in relation to quality by consumer demand - and the majority of consumers are not even aware of it!

It is normal for an industry to try and improve on what has gone before. High definition TV's are an obvious upgrade from the previous standard. The computer industry constantly strives to provide faster processing speeds and larger memory capacity. However, it is the crossover of the computer industry with the music industry, the linking of the two, where things have started to go wrong. This is not to fault the computer industry, for speed and user convenience are the selling tools of its trade. Nor is the music industry inherently culpable, although it has largely acquiesced while complaining of lost revenues through illegal downloads. It is consumers that have driven quality down through a deepening, but blind, love affair with the MP3 and AAC formats and the ubiquitous iPod.

Falling Music Sales

I do not believe it is any coincidence that world-wide music sales tumbled in 2007 to their lowest level since 1985 and this is despite an overall far more affluent population than all those years ago. So why put the finger on MP3 & AAC (iTunes default format) and the iPod? It is not that they exist, nor resentment at their undoubted success. It is more the lack of knowledge on the part of consumers in what they are embracing and the hi-fi industry must shoulder its share of the blame. Both of these formats are compressed mediums. with different levels of compression. There is information irretrievably lost and they lack the full dynamic range. In short, they are inferior mediums in comparison to the standard CD format, let alone even higher resolution formats now available (such as studio quality 24 bit, 96kHz FLAC files). The sad part is that convenience and 'music on the move' has helped to create a demand for these inferior substitutes and, what is even sadder, is that most users are not even aware of what they are missing.

There are still discerning people around who know how exciting and involving music can be, how it can deliver an emotional experience. Twenty years ago there were many hi-fi enthusiasts who enjoyed pursuing quality. It mattered which speaker leads were used, or the quality of the interconnects, or the rigidity provided by speaker stands. These still make a very significant difference but relatively few realise it now. The performing artists, musicians and sound engineers who strive to make the recording quality as high as possible must despair at the current trend.

Quality or Quantity?

When a friend's teenage son bought his first iPod, he was thrilled that it could store 2000 tracks. That this was at a low quality setting with a high degree of compression was not a relevant or indeed a cognitive factor. The maximum download quality for AAC is 320kbps. Most tracks are available at no better than 192kbps but many iPod users legally download at 128kbps, the most popular, or even 64kbps because either that's all that is available, or because they can store a greater number of tracks or, very often, because they're unaware of the difference. The cost is usually the same regardless. If you are jogging and using a cheap pair of in-ear headphones, you probably wouldn't greatly appreciate a high quality recording. But play back through a decent quality hi-fi and all you are doing is amplifying a very poor quality signal and the difference from, for example a full resolution CD (1,411khps), is huge. The old maxim holds true - rubbish in. rubbish out.

The 80 Gigabyte iPod Classic is advertised as holding 20,000 songs (4MB per song). In comparison, a high quality music server will use approximately 500MB to store an average CD (with say 10 tracks) at full resolution, a ratio of 10

or 12:1. It's no wonder that the music server, also a flexible computer based product, can reproduce music far more faithfully and far more enjoyably and is, therefore, more suitable as a prime listening source. The reality is that a generation is now growing up without recognising the loss and appears to be indifferent to quality, almost as if it's an irrelevance. This may be because so many have not heard the difference. Earlier generations enjoyed listening to 78rpm records until LP's came along. A cheap hi-fi stack system could be enjoyed until CD's came along (although a high quality record deck could, and still does. compete). The point is, once you've heard better, it's difficult to downgrade again.

So where do we go from here when many hi-fi systems feature an iPod docking station as standard? The future of quality music in the home is certainly not MP3 & AAC recordings because they are not suitable as a prime listening source. That is not what the formats were designed for. Download speeds are now far faster and computer hard drive memories far larger than a few years ago when these formats came into mass usage. Discerning music lovers using downloads will be listening to studio quality FLAC files, or their equivalent, in the near future. The quality is so far removed from MP3 that the additional cost is easily outweighed. Even CD quality recordings are left behind.

Vinyl has staged a strong comeback recently because it's still immensely enjoyable to listen to. However, technology doesn't stand still and it's therefore more important than ever that you seek out a specialist hi-fi dealer to set you on the right path.

For anyone who has a good collection of vinyl or CD's, there are some wonderful hi-fi products available today that will extract a level of performance that is totally involving and tremendously enjoyable. Specialist hi-fi manufacturers continue to try to make their products perform to the highest standards in any given price range. However, it also needs the consumer to get listening again and to demand quality, to seek expert guidance on how to achieve the best performance at home and to have it expertly installed and set up.

Lovin' it Luddite

After years of wondering why some audiophiles still listen to that incredibly aged and obsolete format vinyl, I finally decided to take the plunge and find out. I ended up buying an old Technics SL-1500 turntable on an internet auction site and suddenly it all became clear! The clarity, fluidity and sheer musicality have got me hooked, but I could do without the hiss, crackle and pop that comes with pretty much every LP in my parents' collection.

I have only just started buying my own vinyl, mainly from charity shops and on the internet and was wondering if I can simply wash my LPs in warm water with a bit of washing-up liquid before giving them a good rinse and dry?

HFC The problem with tap water and washing-up liquid is that you can't remove every last trace of them, even after repeated rinsing and extended drying. The minerals in tap water tend to get left behind on the vinyl as the water evaporates, as do some of the ingredients in the washing-up liquid.

One of the best investments you can make is a record-cleaning machine like the Moth RCM/2, although this isn't cheap at around £400 (a kit is available for £250). This vacuums the cleaning solution off the vinyl, removing both it and any gunk. If all you need to remove is dust and light dirt, a record brush with carbon-fibre bristles will fit the bill, and there are plenty of these to be had for £10-£15.

Studious selection

I'm writing to ask your advice on a shortlist of CD players and amps I've compiled. They would need to be compatible with my speakers (Monitor Audio Studio 20SE floorstanders), which I bought back in the 1990s for £2,500 and sound so good that I don't want to change them.

I'm thinking of opting for one-make systems, and I'm considering the Cyrus CD Xt SE transport (£975) and DAC X (£1,275) matched with the Pre vs2 (£700), 8 Power amplifier (£850), and PSX-R power supply (£500)

On the other hand, might Naim gear work better for me? I'm thinking about the CD5 XS CD player, NAC 152 XS pre (£895), NAP 155 XS power (£1.025) and Flatcap XS power supply (£675)? And what about the CDX2, NAC 122x and NAP 150x?

Histen to dance, jazz, and chill-out music, and enjoy deep, tight bass married to a balanced mid-range and treble, with as much detail as possible.

the bass and the CD Xt SE is a corker of a transport, too.

While the DAC X is a current product, Cyrus has discontinued the Pre vs2, although it can still be found for around £700 if you shop around. If your budget is flexible, you could try the current pre XP d though that would raise the cost of preamplification to £1,300, and the XP d's inbuilt DAC would be redundant thanks to the DAC X.

Another option, if you have only a couple of sources, would be the DAC XP at £2,000. Not only is it a superb synergetic match to the transport (see HFC 316), it marries an excellent DAC to an impressive preamp. The 8 Power and a PSX-R would both be fine choices as well, especially as the PSX-R offers an upgrade path for power amps as well as preamps.

Naim's new NAC 152 XS and NAP 155 XS represent a real improvement over their predecessors, especially in terms of an expansive soundstage. We've not yet had a chance to audition the CD5 XS, but given the



HFC The Studio 20SEs still have a loyal following amongst audiophiles despite their age thanks to their clarity, precision and speed. Yours is certainly a sensible shortlist given the sorts of music you're after, though the CDX2 would probably be a little sourceheavy and the NAC122x and NAP150x have been superseded by the 152XS and 155XS.

In the past, while a lot of Cyrus amplification has demonstrated real strength with detail and transparency, it has not always offered a particularly meaty sound at the bottom end (although the PSX-R external power supply helped in this respect). The company's newer components, however, have real grip, pace and punch in

quality of the pre and power models, we suggest it should be right there at the top of your audition list. As with the PSX-R, which component you connect the Flatcap XS to is in your hands, but it certainly justifies inclusion in your budget.

As ever, the system that offers you the best bang for your buck depends on taste. We'd lean in the direction of the Cyrus setup for detail and transparency, but towards Naim for sheer, propulsive musicality.

Whither wire?

I recently upgraded my CD player to a Cyrus 8SE and my speakers to Spendor S5es, which required a repositioning of my system. To cut a

Ramp up the amp

I want to upgrade my CD player but I'm not to sure what products I should be looking at. My system currently consists of a Musical Fidelity A3 CD player, TAG McLaren PA10 preamp, two Rotel RB-971 power amps working in bridged mono-mode, and Monitor Audio Silver RS6 speakers bi-wired with QED Silver Amiversary and Clearer Audio cabling.

I was looking at a DAC because I notice

in previous issues of Hi-Fi Choice you used a Pioneer PDR-609 recorder which I also have. Would it be a good idea to sell the MF player and, perhaps, get a Bryston converter, or the new Naim DAC?

I listen to most types of music but lean towards vocals and acoustics.

Great mag, and I will be a subscriber for many more years.

HFC One fairly obvious imbalance in your system as it stands is the power amps.

Good though they are for the money, they are holding your system back. Rather than splashing too much on a DAC at the moment, we suspect replacing the Rotels would do more to boost your equipment's performance than a DAC at around £2,000. If you want to stick with a pair of stereo power amps (though we would recommend bi-amping over bridging and bi-wiring), consider a pair of Cyrus 6 Powers (£500 each).



The Musical Fidelity A3 CD is a sound machine with low levels of jitter, so would make a decent transport for a suitable DAC like the Lavry Engineering DA-10 at £763 or, if you like the sound of the Cyrus amps, the Cyrus DAC X at £1,200 (both reviewed in *HFC* 316).

long story short, the only way one run of my QED Silver Anniversary XT speaker cables can reach one of the Spendors, is by laying it across the carpet, which generates a Spouse Approval Factor (SPA) of zero!

I was thinking of Nordost Flatline Mk2, but at £15 per metre this is pushing my budget and seems to be quite system-dependent. The Chord Company's Odyssey would probably match my other gear well, but unfortunately, at £20 per metre, it's too expensive.

Should I use equal lengths? One of my speakers is placed within a metre of the amp, while the other would require a six-metre length.

HFC If the Odyssey 2 is a little too expensive, you could still consider The Chord Company's Rumour 2, which is marginally slimmer than the Odyssey 2 and more affordable at £12 per metre. The Atlas Hyper 1.5 at £12.50 is also slim, but might sound bass-light in your system.

It's a shame one of your speakers is so far from your amp, but yes, you should certainly use equal lengths, otherwise imaging and soundstaging can suffer. In an ideal world, all amplifiers would be monoblocks situated close to the loudspeakers and connected to them with short runs of cable, as the cables' resistance and propensity to pick up RF interference can have an audible affect on sound quality. Kenwood and DPA are a couple of companies which attempted to produce an improved interface to deal with the problem of cable resistance by providing extra current-sensing cables (called Sigma Drive by Kenwood) from the amp's output terminals to the speakers' binding posts.



Upgrade or renew?

My system was very good in its heyday 15 years ago, but I have a sneaking feeling my Marantz CD63MkII, Audiolab 8000S integrated and Mission 752 speakers with decent connects and cables may now be past their consumption date. I want a sparkling and livelier sound. Is there a weak link or should I start anew?

HFC Given the age of your components, we think upgrading your system is going to involve a complete rebuild. You don't mention a budget or the size of your room, but for modern components, which offer an excellent upgrade, we're assuming you have, say, £1,700 plus the proceeds from selling off your old gear, which should net you another £500 or so.

If your budget's slightly 'elastic', we'd suggest you audition the Monitor Audio Silver RS8 (£850) or Dali Ikon 6 (£900) floorstanders, along with Roksan's Kandy K2 integrated and matching Kandy K2 CD player (£750 each). All of these items offer terrific value for money. Given the current economic climate, you might be able to persuade your friendly local dealer to throw in some cables, too. If not, funds permitting, cabling and possibly a new equipment stand could follow at a later date.



Axis of good

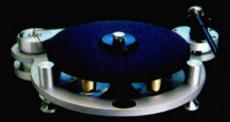
I've just managed to pick up a Linn Axis in mint condition for £125 on a popular auction site. I fitted it with an old Ortofon VMS-20E moving-magnet cartridge to give it a quick



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test and am now confirmed as a very happy turntable owner – the Linn sounds excellent! Now I know the deck works fine, I need a proper cartridge to do it justice and have drawn up a shortlist of Denon DL160 (£160), Ortofon 2M Blue (£150) or Goldring G1042 (£224).

The rest of my set-up consists of a Naim Nait 5i and Bowers and Wilkins' CM2s. Lam currently using the preamp and phono stage section of an old NAD AV receiver and the power amp section of the Naim. It goes without saying that Lalso need a decent phono stage and am considering the MF V-LPS, as Lalready have a V-DAC, which Llike a lot.

Given that your system is on the brighter side of neutral, you could indeed line up the £90 V-LPS alongside the £100 Cambridge Audio Azur 640P. A marginally cheaper alternative is the Pro-Ject Phono Box II at £80, although the extra cost of the other two yields smoother, more transparent LP replay.

Denon's high-output MCs like the DL-110 and DL-160 are moderately low-compliance cartridges, which can often work in relatively low-mass arms, but they tend to polarise opinion. The presentation tends to be less than neutral and not particularly crisp in timing. Grado's Prestige Gold at £110 may also be worth an audition, though you might find it a little too rich and warm. You'll get a sound with more speed and drive from the 2M Blue and G1042, although the Ortofon offers greater longevity through stylus upgrades.



Flexible friend

My system is a bit of a mish-mash, consisting of a wonderfully stylish but slightly uninvolving Sony CDP-XE3000 CD player, a Dual CS505-3 turntable and Pro-Ject Tube Box phono stage, a Musical Fidelity A5 amplifier and Castle Harlech loudspeakers. The two areas which need addressing are, I feel, the cartridge (an old Shure M75) and the CD player. Would an Ortofon Salsa MC be a suitable replacement for the Shure and which CD/SACD player would you suggest given my £750 budget?

HFC Unfortunately, we'd have to say that the Ortofon would be a bad idea for a number of reasons. First, it's a low-compliance cartridge, out towards the opposite end of the compliance spectrum from the Shure. Combine this with the low-mass arm on the Dual and you have a recipe for some serious arm/cartridge resonance

problems. Second, the 505-3 might have been a decent, affordable deck in its day, but it is very much a budget machine and a £200 MC deserves something considerably better. If you want to stick with your Dual, have a look at some of Grado's impressive MMs, all of which are high-compliance. If you'd like to retire your turntable, have a look at Pro-Ject's range.

For both CD and SACD replay, Marantz's SA8003 is hard to beat, particularly in the bass, where its speed, control and extension can be very addictive.



Canned heat

Having lived for a couple of years now in a fairly small flat with thin walls, I've finally reached the point where I simply can't see myself being able to assemble a decent system based around loudspeakers. Even with the volume at low levels, I suspect my current speakers (Bowers and Wilkins DM302s) aren't winning fans amongst my neighbours during my evening listening sessions.

I had a chance to listen to Sennheiser's Orpheus electrostatics at a hi-fi show, where they were the best piece of equipment by far to my ears. There's unlikely to be any way I could ever stretch to their five-figure price tag, but your reviews of the Sennheiser HD 800 (HFC 324) and Grado GS1000i (HFC 325) have tempted me to the point where I've decided to let my wallet do the talking.

I have a Sony TA-F500ES integrated and a Kenwood DP-5090 CD player. Which headphone amp should I go for as a partner to either of these headphones?

HFC German manufacturer Lehmann makes some very impressive headphone amps. If your wallet will still be feeling the strain after the purchase of the Grados or Sennheisers, you might want to try the Rhinelander at £400. For £350 more, there's the excellent Black Cube Linear. It may not be the absolute last word in amps for cans, but it is very good indeed and should stave off the need for another upgrade for years to come.



Retro requisites

As many a thrifty audiophile knows, buying second-hand equipment can get you superb performance for your budget. Not all oldies are golden, however, and there's more to weeding out the lemons than carrying out the audio equivalent of a spot of tyre-kicking. Some simple guidelines should ensure you're unlikely to get burned financially or literally.

The best way to buy is in person. If you have no option but to have the item posted to you after you've bought it, quiz the seller about the performance of the equipment. Clearly, more recent components are likely to work properly and still have spares and service support. That said, laser diodes in CD and DVD mechanisms don't last forever; lifespans tend to vary between six and ten years. The more esoteric the laser block, the harder it is to replace. Try to find out if the player reads heavily scratched discs, or high-resolution, re-recordable audio and video discs that might have been recorded at high speed. Also, ensure it plays all the formats it's been designed to handle.

Do a bit of research on the innards of the item. Do they use specialist logic or drive circuits (as is often the case in direct-drive turntables), which are now 'unobtainium'. Just as important for turntables is bearing wear – is there any play in the arm or platter bearings? Has the platter bearing been serviced? Has the belt been replaced, and does the arm lift work correctly?

Classic speaker problems are perished foam surrounds, voice coils which rub due to sagging surrounds; blown tweeters; and shifted crossover points due to leaking or dried-out electrolytic capacitors. In fact, electrolytics are probably the Achilles heel of most hi-fi gear. Duff electrolytics, coupling caps and carbon resistors whose values have drifted wildly are common in valve amps, especially as they typically run hot. If the mains transformer has been overstressed – it may have leaked the wax with which many were impregnated.

There are some superb FM tuners out there, but their RF sections drift with age. Unless you can get hold of a service manual, re-alignment by a qualified technician will be impossible. At least amps are generally simpler to repair, as many will have crackly volume controls and relays (which can be sorted with switch cleaner). Watch for rare output devices though, especially V-FETs, which can be eye-wateringly difficult to obtain.

Made in Japan – Honeycomb sweetspot

Jon Marks salutes the innovative technology that went into the SB-RX70 loudspeaker from Technics

round 30 years ago, some sections of the British audio industry, the press and their followers espoused a 'flat-earth' approach to audio. Simpler was better, it went and complex technology for technology's sake was simply an expensive blind alley. On the other side of the globe, a rather different quest for flatness, combined with pockets deep enough to fund research and development into cutting-edge technology, led to some truly mould-breaking loudspeaker designs. One of the finest exemplars was the Technics SB-RX70.

Back in the 1970s, firms like Matsushita (owner of Panasonic and Technics), Sony and Pioneer, were all seeking ways of improving on the traditional cone diaphragms used in so many loudspeakers, to reduce distortion and increase bandwidth. While ultimately following different paths, each began by taking a leaf from that classic British manufacturer Leak, and its Sandwich driver.

In 1958, while working at the Banbury Aluminium Development Laboratory, the metallurgist Donald A Barlow found that a 'foil-stressed' diaphragm could improve the performance of a typical cone driver. Having read of Barlow's idea in *Wireless World*, Harold Leak contracted him to lead the development of a 'piston-action' speaker and in 1962 unveiled the 'Sandwich cone' loudspeaker, with

its core of expanded polystyrene foam sandwiched between thin skins of aluminium.

HIP TO BE SQUARE

Fast-forward 25 years and the steady march of technology had produced advanced honeycomb materials for use in the aerospace industry, where low-mass and high-rigidity are

diaphragms, as they suffered complex break-up modes when driven from a single, cylindrical voice coil. Sony went on to wrangle with this problem in its imposing APM series, leaving Pioneer to choose its investigations to include the composition of the honeycomb itself. Rather than forming the 'filling' of the sandwich from hexagonal cells of the same size,

two critical requirements, just as they are in the construction of loudspeaker diaphragms. At this point, the paths taken by Sony and Pioneer diverge from that chosen by Technics, as the first two companies opted for square honeycomb designs. Naraji Sakamoto, the head of Matsushita's Acoustic Research Laboratory since its inception in 1967 (and the creator of the Technics brand) decided instead to concentrate on the circular form as a result of research conducted with colleagues Katsuaki Satoh, Kazue Satoh and Nobuhisa Atoji and presented at the 64th Convention of the Audio Engineering Society in New York in 1979.

The team's investigations into pistonic motion had led them to dismiss square honeycomb

Sakamoto and team found that using cells which expanded the closer they were to the periphery had several advantages. The light and rigid diaphragm benefited from an unusually flat, wide response, and the simple and controllable break-up modes reduced distortion.

In 1979 and 1980, all three companies announced flat-driver loudspeakers. Sony's flagship APM-8 set a heavyweight tone at 102kg per speaker, while Pioneer countered with its amazing S-F1, a four-way quadradial design with square diaphragms that preceded Technics' SB-RX70 by eight years. At 108kg and with a price tag to match, the S-F1 sold in minuscule numbers; according to Axel Dahl of

www.thevintageknob.org, an ex-Pioneer Italy employee who revealed that only four pairs were ever made. Technics produced the SB-M1, again with a heavyweight price tag and hernia-inducing 85kg mass and the more affordable SB-10 with its 'leaf' planar tweeter.

It's all very well producing proof-of-concept loudspeakers which cost as much as a small house, but taking that technology and trying to distil it into an affordable, yet technically effective form is a much tougher task. It was one to which Technics rose, first with its low-profile SB-R100 in 1984 and then with the SB-RX70 in 1988.

The aim of Technics in producing the SB-RX70 was to create a loudspeaker that addressed a range of issues. By using its flat, honeycomb technology for the mid/bass unit, it could produce a standmount, which yielded wide bandwidth from just two drivers, an even response and low distortion. In fact, the mid/

bass unit, with its inner and outer-circumference surrounds, is reminiscent of the ring-radiator in Sennheiser's HD 800 headphone (see review in *HFC* 324). By fitting a highly pistonic, diamond-coated mica tweeter to the centre of this driver and linking the two with a suitable crossover, Technics was able to realise a loudspeaker that was not just phase-linear without the need for a stepped baffle, but also effectively a point-source.

Quality of construction extended to other areas of the RX70. The cabinet walls may have been made of 20mm chipboard, but they were fitted with a figure-of-eight brace, after Finite Element Analysis revealed the bending modes of cabinet panels in use. The removable rear panel screws to this brace, as well as the cabinet walls and the end result is a very solidly built 20kg speaker.

The crossover components are all glued to a wooden panel and then hard-wired, rather than

being soldered to a circuit board. Unusually for a speaker of this vintage, the crossover is bi-wirable, though bi-amping may be more what Technics had in mind for them.

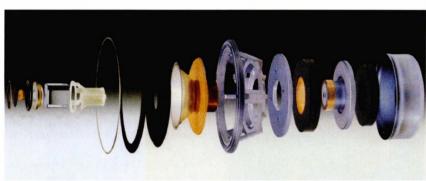

LARGER THAN LIFE

Although the SB-RX range ended with the RX70 (apart from a high-gloss cabinet 're-issue' in the form of the SB looking to synthesise planar and dynamic loudspeakers, it manufactured the absolutely mammoth SB-AFP1000. Rated with power handling of 600 watts RMS, this speaker stood 2.2m tall, 2.2m wide, and was almost a metre deep. Filling the bulk of the baffle were eight mica and chitin bass panels, each driven from behind by four voice coils. The four lower mid-range drivers were smaller panels, each topped by a flat mica midrange and the diamondcoated mica tweeter. Given their size and that each weighed 320kg, it's no surprise that they didn't sell like hot cakes. Even their smaller siblings, the SB-AFP100 and SB-AFP10, sold in very limited numbers. As a range, apparently their sound wasn't quite as grand as their appearance.

Like the driver in Sennheiser's HD800 headphones, the Technics' mid-bass is a ring radiator

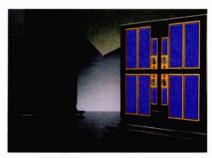

SQUARE DANCE

Sony's foray into the world of honeycomb drivers resulted in its Accurate Pistonic Motion series. Sony had pressed ahead in attempting to control the complex breakup modes of square diaphragms, using four voice coils per driver for the flagship lower-frequency units. With its honeycomb sandwich of constant-size cells, this is hardly a simple device. In the high-end APMs, flat honeycombs were used in all the drivers, including the tweeters. In the original APM-8, the drivers were fitted to a rectangular cabinet with unchamfered edges. In later incarnations, such as the beautiful APM-6s, oval cabinets were used to reduce diffraction.

Although the SB-RX can suffer blown tweeters (as do many older loudspeakers), the chief problem with the APMs is that those with foam surrounds suffer rot over time, the surrounds being virtually irreplaceable without a cunning bit of DIY (http://homepage2.nifty.com/k-ooki/apm/edge1a.htm).

of The Funk Firm. "The Technics tweeter is truly intriguing," he told us. "It's perfect, except it's wrong. You listen to it and you can't fault it. It sounds very accurate without sounding sterile, but at the same time it has a slightly muted quality, a sort of lack of sparkle. One of my favourite dynamic speakers is the LS3/6, and I keep going back to it for its musicality. The SB-RX70 does sound very good, but it doesn't have that ethereal quality, that midband fluidity that the LS3/6 has and yet the Technics is definitely less coloured. The concept of a speaker like the SB-RX70 is a fascinating idea I would love to see developed further and produced in a real-world loudspeaker."

There's no doubt that the RX70 is impressive, both in terms of engineering and sound quality. Imaging is well-defined and soundstaging stable, although it has to be said that it's probably no better than very good loudspeakers of more standard configuration. Despite the relatively small mid/bass unit, the bottom end has good extension, resolution and control, while the midband is clean and sweet. One puzzling aspect of the driver's design is that Mr Sakamoto and his team didn't decide to fit a 'leaf' planar tweeter. After all, they presented a paper in 1977 describing, 'A dynamic tweeter reproducing a frequency range from 4kHz -150kHz. This leaf tweeter has a planar voice coil printed on a very thin diaphragm, making possible a frequency response far past the range of human hearing.' Tantalisingly, the SB-RX70 packs into one diminutive package many intelligent solutions to a myriad loudspeaker problems, but perhaps demonstrates more the promise of Technics' research than its full fruition. HFC

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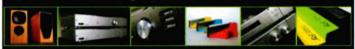
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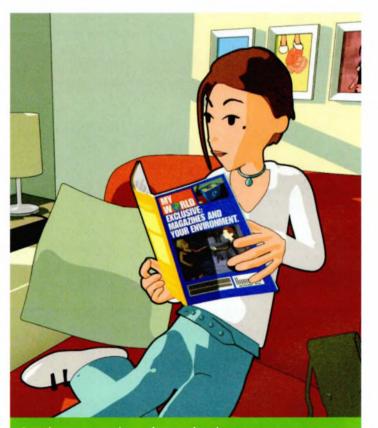
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Second-hand guide

Time to spin some vinyl on one of four £500 second-hand turntables

ack in the 1980s, if you wanted a first-rate turntable to match your Guards Red Porsche 911 and Barbour trench coat then you'd probably turn to the likes of the Linn LP12, Pink Triangle PT, Roksan Xerxes or the Townshend Rock.

The latter began as the development of an academic rather than purely commercial exercise. Developed by Jack Dinsdale and John Bugge of The Cranfield Technological Institute and commercially realised by Max Townshend, the first Rock was known as the Cranfield Rock. By 1983 we had the Elite Rock MkII and it's still a confident, punchy-sounding turntable and one that's fully serviceable. We contacted Max Townsend, who still produces the Rock 7 and were told older units could be serviced, even if it meant fabricating new parts. It's also a very reliable deck with few problems reported.

The choice tonearm would be an Excalibur, although most of the Elite Rocks come with a modified Rega RB300 – still a decent arm to this day. Although a Townshend Rock Reference would always be the Rock of choice, our budget is ample for a decent Elite Rock.

Three years after the Elite Rock, Roksan launched their Xerxes turntable. It was an instant hit with a precise, well-defined sound quality that left many contemporary rivals struggling. Like all the decks here, the Xerxes can still be an excellent-sounding turntable, although care is required when buying second-hand. Mention its Xerxes to any seasoned expert and they'll warn you of plinth sag. The grooved plinth can sag and, in extreme cases, fowl the platter. Finding a fix is not impossible and the Internet is awash with effective solutions. Our advice is to seek one with little or no sag in the first place and then

remove the platter when not in use. That way most of the weight is removed from the tender plinth most of the time. The bearing is hardwearing but does need regular lubricating. The ideal matching tonarm would be the Artemiz, although both the Roksan Tabriz and Rega RB300 are worthy partners. Look for a well-cared for example and you'll have a still 'modern' sounding turntable.

Trying to summarise the Linn LP12 in a couple of hundred words is not easy. Whereas £500 would have once only bought a Valhallapowered deck, we've now seen Lingo-equipped models around our price point. These models use an outboard PSU for a cleaner, tighter sound. We'd also recommend trying to find a model with a serial number above 70,000. This indicates a model made after 1987 and featuring some important suspension upgrades - many would say in response to the recently launched Xerxes, which caught Linn on the back foot. Try and buy as late a model as possible or, at least, a model that's been substantially updated, even if it means starting with a very basic arm and cartridge. In addition to the Lingo power supply, it's worth seeking out a model with Cirkus updates. This was

simply enjoy it. Problems range from over heating power supplies to blown motors and cracked lids. We've gone for the DC-motored PT, rather than the later AC-motored version, as it tends to be more reliable

introduced around 1993 and consists of a new subchassis, bearing housing, bearing, inner platter and suspension. Finding these additions on £500 is very rare, however.

Finally we have the Pink Triangle PT.

Launched in 1979, the PT featured an acrylic

platter and lightweight aerolam sub-

platter and lightweight aerolam subchassis. Although often overshadowed by the LP12 and Xerxes, it's a delicate and detailed-sounding deck featuring technology that, in the case of the platter, became mainstream decades later. Sadly, the PT has a very poor reputation for reliability. There are two approaches you can take to this. The first is simply to avoid it; the second is to remember there are really only a few components that make up a turntable and to search out a well cared for bargain and Although Pink Triangle no longer exists, the man behind it has gone on to form The Funk Firm. Whilst it won't repair PT turntables it does offer a range of upgrades from a V1 power supply and motor at £290 to a full K-Drive overhaul at £1,600. These prices rather miss the point of a bargain priced, high-end old-timer, so far better to buy as cheap as possible and seek out a well-loved model. Open the power supply and check for signs of over-heating and listen carefully for any motor noise or excessive transformer hum.

For complete peace of mind a brand new £500 Pro-Ject would probably make a better bet than any of these. But all four of these decks represent excellent buys. Each can be tweaked and each will reward with sound quality that's still impressive today. **HFC**

BUYING TIPS

- Buying second-hand can be a great way to pick up a bargain. A formerly expensive second-hand component might well prove a better long-term bet than a brand-new product if the price is right.
- Do some research on which brands have a good service back-up, so if something does go wrong, you can get it fixed. Unless you purchase from a dealer, you're unlikely to get any warranty, so it's up to you to ensure the fitness of any gear that you buy.
- Usually, speakers should be less prone to breakdown than amps, and amps should be more reliable than CD players. But any abused component could be trouble have a proper demo and judge the seller as well as the goods!
