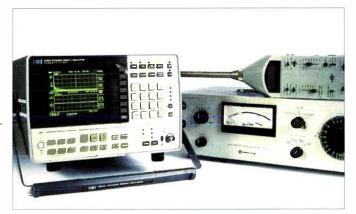

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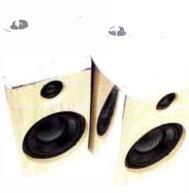

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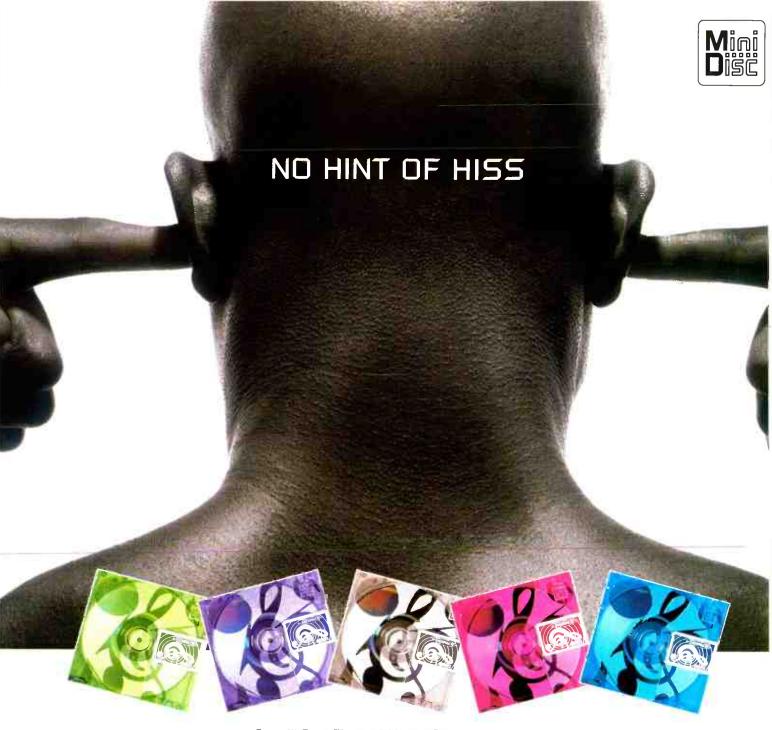

Headed with the banner "Let's Get Personal", this is not only a new way of marketing for Jamo, it's a whole new way of marketing, selling and buying loudspeakers that hasn't been seen in such comprehensive detail before

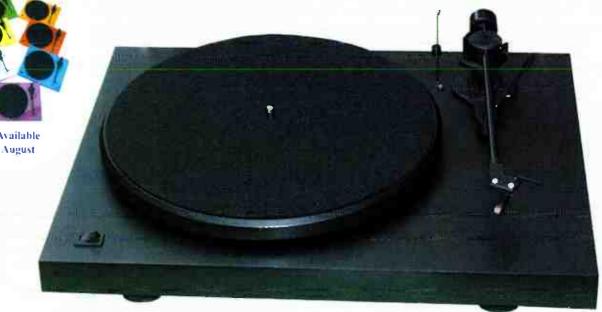

# MINI MARVELS FROM SONY

Sony are the latest in the qucik-fire world of portable MiniDisc to release the world's smallest recorder and player. The MZ R91

recorder is intended "to appeal to the style conscious". It comes finished in blue aluminium and weighs 1 l0g without batteries. From the supplied rechargeable battery it claims 29 hours life. The remote control features a back-lit LCD and edit functions and the recorder itself features a Name Bank function as well as Join Text, where CD text data information will be carried over





during recording to MD. It comes with a 40 second shock memory, mains adaptor, optical cable and carry case.

The MZ-E90 -player, which weighs only 70g without batteries, features the same shock control function and remote control. It comes finished a magnesium, Champagne gold casing. Both are available now.

### QUAD LAUNCH VALVE AMP SOON

Quad have finally confirmed the price of their new valve pre/power amplifier, the QC-Twenty Four and II-Forty, as "close to £4000". A company spokesman said it offered an astonishing sound, superior to solid-state amplifiers, and partnered their new electrostatics well. Configured like the famous 22/II, it comprises valve preamplifier with twin 40W monobloc power amplifiers equipped with KT88 output valves.

Production of Quad's new electrostatic loudspeakers - the 988 priced at £2999 and the 989 priced at £3999 - started two months ago in Bradford. There was rumour that design and development of Quad products would move to China, but IAG confirmed that this was not going to happen. The electrostatics are all new, with special attention paid to the isolation/driver transformers, a weak component in earlier electrostatics.

Regarding the revival of the Leak brand, IAG said it is currently on hold as they reconsider, as sales of the new Quad valve amplifier would likely affect this decision.

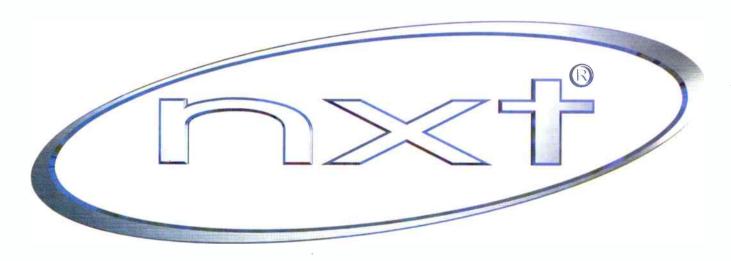

### NEW HOME FOR NXT

As Tories in Huntingdon struggled to nominate a new candidate for their constituency, outgoing MP John Major was treating guests at NXT's new technology centre to a few interesting peeks into a politician's world.

Thanking Farad Azima for bringing world beating NXT technology to his Huntingdon constituency he told one hundred assembled guests that technology was leaving politics behind, bringing about changes that governments struggled to understand and control. It wasn't the sort of admission a serving MP could easily make

The growth of rapid global communica-

tion was likely on John Major's mind, after seeing an impressive working mock-up of an NXT mobile phone, demonstrated by hi-fi engineer Graham Bank. Transmitting sound from a small, transparent screen the phone offered an impressive demonstration of what we might all be using tomorrow. The idea is to transmit and receive sound from a display panel. Speech recognition technology will be used to interpret spoken instructions, eliminating the need for a keypad. This opens up the possibility of mobiles becoming videophones.

A team of 50 top scientists and engineers, experts in the fields of audio, sound transmission, panel vibration and other related technologies, work in NXT's

new facilities. Many are life long hi-fi experts, brought in for their unrivalled knowledge of loudspeakers and audio theory. The company was formed by Mission founder, Farad Azima, to exploit new insights into panel behaviour by DERA, Britain's Defence Evaluation Research Agency.

NXT panel loudspeaker technology is being licensed out for further development into specific applications. To date the company has nearly 200 licensees around the world, including Wharfedale, Mission and Cyrus. Cyrus are due to launch their NXT hi-fi loudspeakers shortly.

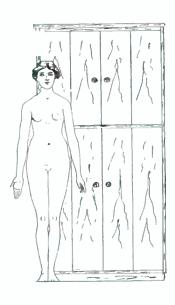

They're here at last, and we have both of them! The two new eagerly awaited Quad electrostatics pass through Hi-Fi World's portals next issue.



hen we first touched on DAB, or Digital Audio Broadcasting, the technology was very much in its infancy, with minimal geographical coverage, but high hopes. Few receivers were available to the public (or magazines, for that matter) but despite this, all had a meaty price tag! Next came the major breakthrough by Arcam with their Alpha 10, the world's first domestic DAB tuner, although incar models were available prior to

Once Arcam had stuck out their necks and launched the Alpha 10, those who had waited to see what would happen subsequently launched their assault (of sorts). Cymbol, a close rival in the race for the first tuner, came out with their model and Technics became the first 'big' name to release a product. Meridian are apparently still working on their long-awaited

DAB tuner, whilst Tag McLaren are also in the market. Add to this the fact that Roberts are set to introduce the first DAB portable in the near future and we suddenly have enough products around to tempt some higher end consumers - the cheapest model available is the Technics at £500. We take a look at this receiver, along with the Cymbol C-DABI and Arcam's new digital tuner from their high-end FMJ series. Now listen carefully . . .

### DAB compression in a nutshell!

DAB uses a compression system known as MUSICAM, which 'discards' the low level sounds masked by sounds at a higher level and "packages together" the remaining information. The other major contributor is Coded Orthogonal Frequency Division Multiplex (COFDM), this uses a mathematical relationship to carry the MUSICAM across 1,536 frequency carriers and across time. So, if interference results in some information being lost in transit, the receiver can still transmit the original sound.

# TECHNICS ST-GT1000 £500



s well as having the longest title, this is the cheapest specialist digital receiver currently on the market. For your money, you get quite a lot more than you do with the other models tested here - namely FM and AM. In other words it's a "hybrid"; an analogue and digital beast in one handy package. Actually, the idea isn't as potty as it first appears. If anything, it's the most versatile unit available and being both FM and DAB, it could coax a purchase from some consumers still not yet DAB-ready (it still only gets to 66% of us in the UK), but who are eager to try it as soon as development allows. Although we doubt this was a major design factor, it also gives an opportunity to compare the two mediums without too much hassle!

Without doubt this is the most busy-looking fascia of the three. Whereas with the others you could actually get them out of their boxes and listen to music with merely a glimpse of the instructions, the Technics requires some ground-work, rather than aimless button-pressing.

It also differs from the others in that it uses an analogue-standard 75Ω DAB aerial as opposed to the 50Ω of other models. The supplied indoor aerial (which must be placed in a vertical 'T' shape) is of the bootlace variety, and not as chunky as those supplied with the other two, but it seemed to work equally well. The

listening was done in an area of excellent reception in South London, so the indoor aerial was all that was needed. Interference isn't a problem with digital radio - you either get a perfect signal or nothing at all.

Once your 'band' is selected from DAB, FM or AM, turning the tuning knob selects the frequency or "ensemble" (multiplex). In DAB mode, the outer band of the knob will select the other services in the multiplex. The small display button under the plastic flip-up protector selects 'TEXT' for radio text display, 'PTY' for program type (ie, news, classical, sport, etc.) and "Ensemble" which shows the multiplex label and frequency block.

In addition to usual features such as the signal strength meter and search by program type, there are features on the Technics that are absent from other models. For example, in DAB mode you can set the tuner to automatically play announcements, rather like the 'Traffic News' service on in-car sets. Various subjects can be selected, as well as the language. In DAB mode there are a total of 49 presets (29 in FM) of which only 'primary' audio stations can be stored.

Overall the sound was very impressive. With the local commercial stations such as Kiss, Capital or Classic FM (all found on the same multiplex) there was none of the

overt compression of the sound that occurred in FM broadcasts. That's not to say that these stations sound as unprocessed as Radio 4 with a digital broadcast - they don't, and there's still studio compression and 'gating' present at climaxes but the improvement is good and welcome to all of us who value their tooth fillings!

Where digital radio and the Technics really came into their own was with live broadcasts on Radio 3 or speech on Radio 4. Here there was a well-balanced and neutral sound. Instruments and voices were very realistic and, of course, hiss or crackle free. Maybe a top quality tuner with a top quality outside aerial will sound a little warmer, but overall the Technics in DAB mode took some beating, the FM sounding brighter and more coloured than DAB broadcasts.

This is as good an introduction to DAB as you're going to get at present, and the price makes it a very attractive option. I must admit, it's helped to sway my opinion. It's possibly the most appealing option for the majority of people at the moment.

### dacs & dabs

All of the DAB tuners we tested have digital outputs, so you have the option of connecting them to an external DAC for ontimum performance. We used Creek's OBH-14 'mini' DAC to test out the capability of such usage and were duly impressed by the results. We encountered a deaner and more enhanced sound. Live BBC Radio 3 broadcasts were more realistic, with an improved depth of sound stage and slightly better dynamics.

# CYMBOL C-DAB1 £1000

tuner/radios/receivers will take a little while to settle down I guess. Whilst the BBC seem to have abandoned 'DAB' in favour of the descriptive mouthful 'Digital Radio', there is as yet no consensus at to what the gadgets themselves are to be called. There are shades of the old gramophone/turntable/motor-unit about this. Like Arcam, Cymbol unashamedly calls the C-DAB I a

On the back panel, simplicity is again paramount. One aerial input ocupies the available space together with two plain phono sockets for analogue output and one for digital.

Digital Radio Tuner. It provides DAB

reception only and not vhf/fm. There is

no tuning dial but instead an array of

twelve neat buttons enables all func-

tions except mains ON/OFF.

Push button tuning is no mystery to anyone who has bought a car radio in the last few years. It's a system that needs learning but is in essence no more complex than the dial spinning which it has not supplanted for domestic use (see Arcam!). Cymbol provide for eight pre-set stations; these are set up in much the same way as on a modern analogue tuner: a series of menu prompts enables as many of the eight to be set as required with minimal difficulty. At present there's a limited number of channels on digital so the process of scrolling through them all to choose the one you want is not too

arduous. What will happen if/when everything is digital, and the wavebands are as crowded as FM, remains to be seen.

Like the Arcam, the Cymbol provides for a check to be kept on signal quality. The instructions cite a 0.000000% error rate as ideal(!) so the closer to this fabulous figure the better. Cymbol say that constant errors in the .005% to .01% rate are usually acceptable although this may indicate that an outside aerial is desirable. With Digital Radio there are no half measures; once the error rate increases to the point where the information can no longer be processed, the signal disappears altogether, rather like Stereo FM in a bad reception area. In the shadow of Crystal Palace we had no difficult in attaining minimal error, with the fabled 0% on display much of the

One of the difficulties with Digital Radio as a concept is the much-vaunted 'CD quality' tag but it is true that much of the sound quality of a digital tuner is dependent on the choices made concerning DAC processing afterwards. In this respect, Cymbol have obviously striven for a sound which mirrors the very best analogue tuners and the perceived quality is consequently high.

Radio 3's excellent Music Restored programme offered a convenient measure of the smoothness of this tuner. With the jingle-jangle harpsichord and

pre-Romanic string tones, 'digital sound' is the last thing you need! The usual crop of Baroque obscurities, with their near-jarring tonalities became a genuine pleasure to listen to; the nasty digital sheen, which is the 'raw' broadcast had been given the most sympathetic treatment.

The tuner's smoothness did not smear over detail; pop channels were not by any means over-polished - the Cymbol tuner is more subtle than that. With some very back-bedroom mixes the sound was still whole and complete, but without any added tizzle and jaggedness; the Cymbol at no time sounded like a cheap CD player!

Spoken word broadcasts, such as stereo Radio 4 or mono 5 Live were presented exceptionally well, without the chestiness many associate with radio generally. Much like a first-class FM tuner, the Cymbol allowed one to hear both natural voices - and the all too prevalent faulty microphone technique of certain presenters!

The Cymbol tuner is the least distinguishable from top-class FM we've heard to date - that's a very high recommendation.

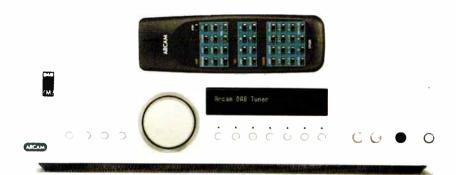

# **ARCAM FMJ DT23 £1000**

rcam were amongst the first to wet their feet in the pool of digital radio with the the pioneering Arcam Alpha 10. The latest FMJ DT26, which offers DAB reception only, is similar, but with a heavier build and less mundane look.

Aerial input is by locking BNC plug. Two pairs of analogue outputs are provided along with both coaxial and optical digital sockets. A handy extra is the input for another tuner, which can be switched in by the bypass switch on the front. This enables either an FM set or MW/LW outfit to be used in tandem, without the nuisance needing two tuner inputs on the pre-amplifier. A controlled headphone socket is provided; this is connected to the unit's output - it is not possible to monitor the extra tuner whilst playing the Arcam unit.

Eschewing the push-button arrangements found on the Cymbol, the Arcam has a very easy to use dial. When this is turned, the available stations are scrolled through; on reaching the desired channel, the select button is pressed and there you are!

According to the instructions, it is recommended that a station search (which takes a maximum of about three minutes) be carried out, this allows the tuner to adjust to its new surroundings and avoids it trying to tune to a beacon possibly hundreds of miles away from where it now

stands! This procedure is common to all digital tuners and reflects the more specific nature of digital tuning.

Setting the preset buttons is a simple matter, although you need to be quick: once the required channel is found, you have only two seconds to make up your mind. To my mind a better system would leave the display on the last-found station for at least ten seconds; it's surprising how long it takes to choose which button you want for which service.

Digital broadcasting is still in its infancy, yet I was pleasantly surprised to find that already there is a 'talking book' service in addition to the usual BBC and national independent stations.

I remained mindful of the fact that my current FM tuner with its modern One Thing decoder is definitely not to be sneezed at as regards sound quality. What I was not able to assume is that it would make an appropriate reference for comparing with digital tuners.

On setting the Arcam on the go, it was swiftly apparent that the tuner had little reticence about presenting its case: music flowed outward with a full-bloodedness at odds with many people's conceptions of digital sound. As with all of these things, the answer lies with the digital-analogue interface. Rather than risk the tin-pot shine of unadulterated digital, Arcam

have apparently opted for a monumental approach.

The week's composer, Grieg, is not the first to come to mind when the word grandeur is spoken, but the Arcam presented his delicate works with a full rather four-square sound with plenty of prominence given to the lower strings. Force there was in spades, but I couldn't help feeling that the exquisite filigree of the upper strings, although present and correct, was sounding a little dry.

With the more muddled mixes common on rock radio, the Arcam did very well, sorting out enigmas which had no doubt sounded alright at the mixing desk but were pretty muddled by the time they are dragged through the broadcasting process. A very generous width of sound stage lent an unexpected dignity to some surprising tracks - rock recording demands very little ambience, so the Arcam's slight dryness was of no consequence here. Overall, the Arcam is a very easy to use and competent tuner, but hardly the sweetest sound ever.

### multiplexes how they work

The UK Government has allocated seven Multiplexes across the DAB bandwidth of 217.5 -230 MHz. Each Multiplex of 2.3million-bits carries a mix of stereo, mono and data information. dependant on sound quality - the higher the quality, the less info on each Multiplex., At present multiplexes are divided into BBC national stations and local BBC and commercial broadcasts. The number of broadcasts is improving constantly as more and more stations go digital.

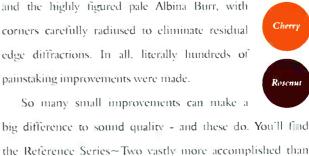

# is it the end for fm?

Does radio still appeal to the general public? And if not, is DAB its saviour? Simon Pope ponders anew whether FM's days are literally numbered!

tatistics show that sales of FM tuners in Europe are down by approximately 17% over the last three years, but sales of portable units are steady. This shows that specialist one-box tuners are decreasing in popularity as the popularity of one-box systems continues to rise. Salesfigure wise, for DAB to work, manufacturers realise the need to adapt and market products and media used by the majority of the populace, such as midi and micro systems, portable audio systems, TVs and even PCs.

As yet there is only one manufacturer that we know of working on production of a portable DAB receiver - that reactionary bastion of the airwaves, Roberts! This Roberts product - mixing classic retro looks with up-to-date technology - is being used by the BBC for "research purposes" and a launch date has still yet to be revealed. Technics, being the first big name maker to release a DAB product, are also toying with prototypes in the guise of integrated micro systems. Indeed these were first viewed by Hi-Fi World at a press conference back in May '99, but again there is no set UK release date.

The future of FM it would seem, is definitely doomed, but just how long it will take to roll over and die is another matter. For stations to pull the plug on FM broadcasts before everybody is ready is plain madness, so how will they go about convincing Joe Public to go digital?

Maybe the appeal of TV is one of the crucial ways in which DAB can make itself heard. The way that most current users are becoming aware of digital radio is through digital TV.

Although the BBC were, as recent as last year, vague about digital radio applications in digital TV, it's now available with Sky Digital packages! For the average mono radio listener this is a vast improvement on what they have at the moment, and could scupper most manufacturers intentions on making a DAB receiver. One quick connection to your hi-fi from your stereo telly and Bob's your uncle, or rather, Beeb's your auntie! This way we could eventually have the listening figures that the BBC predicted back in 1995 - 40% of households by 2006

Otherwise, especially for those interested in audio only, maybe the Technics route is the best, Like SACD and DVD-A audio, DAB will eventually be a replacement format and consequently, both DVD-A and SACD are known as migratory. In order to get the public actually buying product, both the hardware and software have to be compatible with existing technology. An SACD player will play a CD, and a CD will play a double layer SACD, for example. Digital Radio has to be treated likewise; tuners will need to receive FM broadcasts as well as DAB ones. It is this path that will be taken by Meridian, in the shape of their high-end DAB/FM tuner, hopefully available later this

year or early next year. It's also the route that needs to be taken by any other possible manufacturer.

The other inevitable way into DAB is through your home PC. Like all other things audio, radio broadcasting isn't exempt from the global takeover of the computer. A simple Roke Manor (the company that developed the DAB microchip) application in the works, with aerial connection would be enough to deliver crystal clear, uninterrupted DAB broadcasts to your home courtesy of your PC!

Further future advancement of DAB could lie in its use as an advanced information carrier. A new system of traffic information known as TPEG (Transport Protocol Experts Group) is waiting in the wings. This will give highly detailed traffic information that is relevant to the individual listener, a "personal travel service" as Glyn Johns, Managing Editor of BBC Digital Radio puts it. DAB is a viable format, make no mistake. And the rest of the world, apart from America and Japan seems to think so too. The sound quality of products is improving greatly and receivers are getting cheaper as more are being produced.

But when push really comes to shove, there's one thing people will really like about it. Digital radio solves the one problem that most people have with radio - interference, of it, and this could ultimately be its saving grace.

New boys O' Heocha Designs aim to add a little spice to the mundane life of the loudspeaker.

Simon Pope takes a look at the D1S.

ngus O' Heocha undoubtedly has impeccable timing. Not so long ago he was a designer in the automobile industry working for a certain British car manufacturer in the Midlands (I think you can guess just who) and now he isn't, but at least it was his own choice! So, after sweating over his design desk ploughing through ideas for front grills of the '75', he now ponders over loudspeakers for a living, rather than as a hobby (he used to build sound transmitters for buddies!)

O' Heocha have entered the loudspeaker market with clearly set out intentions. They see the growing desire for 'lifestyle' products and feel that they can combine quality sound with quality style. Consequently we have a style-conscious futuristic look to all of the models culminating in the ultra-wacky styling of the D2 series with their 'Cyclops on a tripod' look

What can often happen with this kind of product though is style eventually takes over and the product sounds like a Dansette that's been draped with a wet towel. However, with O' Heocha it appears Angus kept one eye on the hi-fi market whilst his hands were on the wheel, as there's some very good stuff going on beneath the shiny exterior. The cabinets are constructed from 6mm thick ribbed aluminium which is partnered with a solid wood front fascia available in three types of wood, or metal should you wish.

The drive units are a high sensitivity soft dome tweeter, protected by two curved metal strips, and a Hexatech 142mm mid/bass unit which employs a 3" voice coil. The D1S is a

bass reflex design and uses an unusual upwards firing port built in to the top of the cabinet. You get the feeling that many hours work and research has gone into the design, but once the initial appeal of the aesthetics has worn off, will they be able to match sound for looks?

Placing them on their matching stands, I started the ball rolling with some low down blues courtesy of Mr. John Lee Hooker. His 'Boom Boom' album starts off with a blisteringly quick version of the title track that can rock the rafters when played through a decent sound carrier. It was here that the advantages of metal cabinets were shown. The DIS models responded in a tight and fast manner, the Morel Hexatech unit delivering real punch and timing. Although there was little very low bass, it was nonetheless tight and tuneful and as meaty as you could expect from such cabinet dimensions. In the upper band, the treble could sound a tad nasal with vocals - taking into account that the ol' fella sings (or rather grunts) through his nose anyway. I noticed a pleasantly open midband, however, that carried the guitars with detail and finesse and refrained from the hardness that the upper treble could bring through the metal surround.

With the orchestral music of Hoedown from Copland's Rodeo, speed and attack were once again emphasised. These cabinets carry very little resonance, and consequently a good recording such as this version on Decca with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra will sound neutral, fast and

exciting. The tight double basses and exposed 'whumps' of the bass drum drove the music very rhythmically. The one downside to this excitement was, again, the upper treble. Violins, always the acid test, sounded slightly scratchy and thin, lacking the cohesion of a complete string section. However, woodwind was light and airy and a good depth of orchestral field was portrayed, so there's few problems with sound staging.

The DIS 'speakers are undeniably impressive in their looks, making a refreshing change from your average MDF box, and the build is very solid indeed for the price. In the sound stakes the metal cabinet has a little coloration and a controlled, if slightly light, bass response.

One small gripe I have about them is the edgy treble which could be a little trying after prolonged listening, and they lack that one last ounce of sophistication that integrates the sound as a whole. Overall, though, these are quality 'speakers with much to recommend them, especially if you like your hi-fi with Star Wars style!

ne of the pivotal parts of a hi-fi system is the amplifier; apart from fourth-form gags about not hearing much without one, the choice of amplifier dictates the parameters of the loudspeaker to be used and the possibilities for input devices. Although there is a strong groundswell of opinion at present in favour of separate pre-amplifiers, this month we have selected two integrated amplifiers which we believe typify the building block of the average enthusiast, both of which boast what would be termed as 'medium' power rating.

Mission's cast heat-sink casing must rate as one of the audio world's most versatile designs. It is a matter of mild astonishment as to what the company can secrete within the slim confines of this very functional box. In this instance the back panel of necessity is pretty well swamped with input sockets but this hasn't prevented the accommodation of two pairs of loudspeaker outputs for easy bi-wiring. These sockets are of the 'safety banana' type (non-slip skins?)

but Mission's own adaptor plug enables either ordinary plugs or bare wire connections to be made with ease. Given that there are two pairs of sockets, the provision of just one pair of plugs seems a little ungenerous. As if to compensate for this, both continental and GB 13A mains leads are provided as standard.

What the package lacks in 'speaker adaptor plugs, it more than makes up with inputs and outputs for tape and recording facilities: this requires a little care in setting up if full advantage is to be taken. Two sets of input and output sockets plus a useful 'third head' monitor input could lead to confusion, particularly as dubbing facilities are dependent on the correct set-up. Aside from this, lacing up the Mission proved to be reasonably common-sense.

Primare's A10 is a much more conventional box and in truth does not seek to offer quite so many facilities. One pair of rugged banana-cum-screw terminals suffices for output, and the recording monitor is by way of the tape deck's own output amplifier, controlled on the amplifier by a simple on-off

toggle. Where the Mission has the ability to record one thing while listening to another, the Primare is both more limited and less prone to mistakes.

More contrasts between the two are found in the volume and balance arrangements. Very much to its credit, the Cyrus has the facility to pre-set the input levels, taking the CD input as the reference point. This is a godsend if your tuner habitually blows your head off on switching over, for example. Even more refined is the pre-set balance control; this function is coupled with the volume knob and permits level outputs to be adjusted for room compensation, or for more specific one-off arrangements. Neither of these refinements is to be found on the Primare, indeed this amplifier inescapably sets its volume to 10/80 on starting, whereas the Cyrus permits pre-setting to any

Sometimes the A10's simplicity seems entirely sensible; the six inputs are controlled by just three switches (not counting the tape monitor) in sharp contrast with the Mission's row of black teeth.

I chose to try each of these amplifiers with the same selection of CDs plus a pot-luck earful of the radio and a trial was made of each amplifier's recording output/monitor provision. To avoid referring to this again, I say here that both amplifiers gave a clean and correct signal to their recording outputs, with sufficient power to load a standard modern recorder perfectly well.

The late Benny Waters was recorded in Stockholm's Pawnshop jazz venue in a series of tracks which remain an object lesson in recording technique. Like many Opus 3 CDs, the beauty of the sound engineering is somewhat ahead of the playing, but never mind! The Cyrus 5 determined to offer a startling clarity on this recording: Waters' very breathy saxophone sound sounded very close at hand - almost over the shoulder and enabled me to re-live this exceedingly live recording once again. The background sound of glasses clinking and matches striking were given appropriate but not excessive prominence; stereo placing was good too, with the Cyrus' clarity contributing largely to this success. But for all the immediacy, there was an edginess which did not quite suit the relaxed musical occasion.

The Primare played a contrasting hand, with partials and breathiness again to the fore but with the added benefit of a sweetness which the Mission seemed not to coax from the recording. Whereas the Cyrus took your breath away with its sharp focus, the Primare put a glass in your hand and made you welcome. Again, stereo placing was excellent, with a very realistic sound picture of soloist, backing band and punters all in their proper places, but the A10 was content to let you hear these for yourself.

Staying with the Primare, I turned to a well-established World Favourite, Eiji Oue's marvellous HDCD of Stravinsky's Firebird Suite.What we require here is power, not so much in watts as in fullness of sound. Many super-detail amplifiers fall down here, giving a too spiky sound to any glint of

treble which pushes to the front of the music. The A10 avoided this trap well; although the sudden stings of bass drum

and the extended double bass passages issued from the 'speakers like the musical 'bricks' that they are, the exquisite middle texture of the woodwind had a fair hearing too.

On this recording, the Mission showed a good deal of apparent power and, like the Primare, avoided over-emphasising the treble. For this sort of record, the forwardness of the amp's sound proved no substantial drawback, indeed for excitement the Mission had the slightest edge on the A10. Unfortunately, once the dust had settled, the question of sweetness once again weighed on the Primare side; the Mission is fractionally unforgiving here. If you have sluggish loudspeakers this would be beneficial horses for courses again.

Commercial rock radio's output proved to be so severely compressed as to prove nothing either way about the amplifiers. Both had power and speed to spare. Radio Three, with its better balanced output gave both amps a chance to shine. There was little to choose between them here: most differences in sound were traceable to the very wide quality variation of the source CDs.

As a matter of personal preference, I enjoyed the Primare more than the Cyrus. It has a sweeter, almost triode sound which suits my musical tastes more nearly, despite the limitations of its specification. Cyrus Electronics have put together a very versatile and well-equipped instrument in the Cyrus 5; with 'heavier' loudspeakers the sharp approach would be appropriate for many people's ears.

# AUDIO ILLUSION

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# t looks like a two-way floorstander - neat and unobtu usive but, well, not exactly radical. Mission's new 782 has some hidden tricks in its bag though. For a start, it isn't a two-way at

Mission's new 782 floorstander employs some innovative technology.

Noel keywood and Simon Pope check out its credentials.

### SOUND QUALITY

The most noticeable trait of the 782s is their speed. This is where Mission's new Keraform cone comes into its own - it delivers a tight, fast sound that's coupled with a detailed and sophisticated sheen you'd expect for the price range. A budget sound it is not.

These aspects were best shown by the current, high-level CD sound of Supergrasses latest, self-titled album. The excellent opening single, Moving, showed the detail present in the 782s with the opening acoustic guitar strums, which were crystal clear and well-positioned between the 'speakers. When the rest of the mix joined in bass guitar, drumkit and the kitchen sink - there was an addictive drive to the sound, and every instrument was positioned exactly as intended by the engineer within the sound stage. Although there's quite a lot going on here, music-wise, the Missions managed to keep a cohesion to the mix you could hear everything that was going on. High frequencies were pleasantly lacking in edginess, and although the 782's overall sound is generally quite bright, it's smooth and sweet, making prolonged listening pain-free.

When it comes to the bass, you can sense that the side firing drive unit is definitely doing its job. With the right material these 'speakers can go deceptively low. When in optimum listening position (above mid/bass unit height) I got a well-balanced and tuneful bass, with attack and depth.

I found the best bass results came with the side drivers firing inwards, outward placement resulted in some unwanted boom as the corners of the



were found. Classical and acoustic music, though, sometimes benefited from the wider spread of sound that 'outside' placement brought.

The 782s are well-engineered 'speakers that take well to all types of music, even though you may have to play around with positioning to gain optimum results from different recordings if your'e fussy. This is probably the only thing that slightly raises an eyebrow. Otherwise they're controlled and sophisticated sounding, with punch, verve and excellent sound staging and imaging. **SP**

asymmetrically to distribute resonant modes. A knuckle-rap test brought forth an interesting variety of sounds from the side panels, I found, but nothing rich or thrummy. Cabinets such as

this are expensive.

Then there's the new Keraform ceramic matrix midrange cone from supplier Audax. They've been working on this for some time and as first taker Mission pay a premium. It lowers cone coloration and improves detailing, Mission claim.

The viscous-laminated dome tweeter is isolated from the front panel to minimise disturbance from front panel vibration, a trick that should sharpen imagery and make transients more solid and impactful.

So there's a lot in the 782, but will it fit your home? The footprint is 165mm wide and 295mm deep. A cabinet height of 795mm won't challenge the domestic skyline either. Bi-wiring is possible and there are three finishes: Beech, Rosewood or Teak.

An unusually civilised impedance curve means the 782s will stress amplifiers much less than any other loudspeaker we have measured and again this should improve not only bass quality but consistency of amplifier matching.

So although the new 782 may look like many other loudspeakers, it is in fact an innovative piece of engineering. NK

### SPLENDID BEASTS

The 710s are truly splendid beasts as far as the eye is concerned. There's a deliberate look of 'retro' about them but it's understated so that although the whole package appears to harken back to days of yore, it will fit easily into a modern living environment. This is rare in the world of hi-fi, as a look at any drinks-cabinet Tannoy from the Turnberry upwards will testify!

The 710s have an unusual, asymmetrical cabinet designed to cut down standing waves. It tapers in to the rear - a strange yet attractive shape.

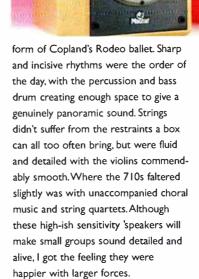
On the front baffle are two highquality Magnat drive units. The tweeter is a Vintage 7 ceramic dome and the mid/bass unit a striking Vintage reference 6" die-cast aluminium cone, featuring a die cast aluminium basket with aluminium phase plug. For a touch of luxury, the cabinets are available in a choice of five real wood finishes

On the sound side of things, the Vintage 710s are no slouches either. Forward and beefy, yet with that certain sophistication which should be inherent in high-end equipment. This was confirmed when I ploughed straight in with My Hero by top rockers, the Foo Fighters. The track has some supremely fast, complicated drumming, complemented by wall-ofsound guitar work - a real 'neighbours favourite'! The 710s responded with eminently suitable drive. As the drums charged like a wounded buffalo the 'speakers had no trouble in keeping up with them; tight and fast, with amazingly low bass for a stand mounter.

### RODS OF STEEL

Bass guitar lines powered through the mix like rods of steel without any flabbiness or one-note effects! Dave Grohl's full-throated vocal lines were delivered clearly and smoothly, with a correct emphasis on phrasing, adding dramatically to the 'musiciality' of the speakers.

Similarly impressive results were obtained with classical music in the



The Vintage 710s have a lot to recommend them; they are controlled, powerful and they go very low for a standmount design. Our measurements showed that there is a slight lift at both ends of the frequency spectrum, which helps to explain their forward and involving sound with orchestral music, for example. If neutrality is your prime consideration, they may not be for you. For all this, a listen would be well worth the effort.

# BASS-IC

David Price found

y initiation into the weird and wonderful world of hifi began in the late seventies, when Linn and Naim dominated. Virtually every specialist dealer in the UK stocked them, and you couldn't open a hi-fi magazine without seeing a Sondek paired up to a NAC32/ NAP250 pre-power amplifier combination. Since then the hi-fi market has changed dramatically, but it's good to know Naim is still going strong. Reviewing this system was quite a poignant moment for me then, mixing as it does illustrious products of my formative years with the company's latest digital knowhow.

Naim's £2335 CDX CD player couldn't be from any other stable, such are its quirky styling and ergonomics. Featuring a front loading glass reinforced drawer mechanism, the transport is Philips' latest CD7/VAM 1205. This is a special version of the ubiquitous CDM12 with a Hall motor disc drive and Philips SAA 7376 servo controller. The digits then go to a Pacific Microsonics' PMD-100 HDCD decoder/ digital filter and end up in twin Burr Brown PCM1702-K 20-bit

converters. A discrete, high precision master clock takes care of time-keeping, and a seven-pole analogue filter follows the DAC to remove spurious noise.

As per usual with Naim gear, meticulous attention is paid to mains electricity, with twenty low-noise, regulated power supplies on the main circuit board, plus a separate supply on the servo control board and another on the display board. And if that wasn't enough, you can always add an additional £1980 XPS outboard supply at a later date. Naim say that paths between critical components are kept to a minimum, and that correct earthing is used throughout. Controversially, there's no digital output. Facilities are sparse but you do get 'display off' and 'program cancel', the latter an inspired feature where tracks you don't want to hear can be ignored.

One look at the £2360 NAC82 and you realise the days of Naim preamps coming with a couple of line ins and a tape monitor are gone forever. It sports no less than six line level inputs, one of which is configurable for phono cartridges using plug-in modules. All have separate

listen and record facilities, letting you monitor one source while recording another, and you get switchable mono and mute to boot. True to tradition, this preamp also offers a variety of power supply options. You can feed it from one of Naim's smaller power amps (NAP90 or NAP140), hook it up to a £760 HI-CAP (which is what I did) or turbo charge it with a £2250 SUPER-CAP. The latter uses chunky toroidal transformers connected to generous smoothing capacitors and a series of hand selected and tested regulators.

The £1805 NAP250 is now in its twenty fifth year without major modification. It's one heavy power amplifier despite its slimline dimensions - it doesn't feel like there's any empty space under the hood. Housed in a non-magnetic extruded aluminium case, it features a beefy toroidal transformer with separate windings providing dedicated left and right rectified power supplies, each sporting two smoothing caps per channel. As expected, it's DIN sockets all round on the rear panel, while conventional binding posts are eschewed for Naim NAC05-friendly banana sockets.

### NAIM OF THE GAME

aim separates are solidly built - and damned annoying to connect up. Wrestling with a welter of different DIN cables and power leads is best left to your friendly Naim dealer. When I'd finally got everything going, the slow process of burn-in began. Finally, with my Yamaha NS1000M speakers ready, it was time to use the volume control in anger.

Stereolab's 'Turn On' sounded quite different. Through my reference valve amp and LFD passive pre, I often luxuriate in this analogue recording's warmth, but rarely get the feeling of musicians pushing their instruments to the limit. But the Naims transformed it, separating out the different strands with forensic precision, yet sounding startlingly urgent and engaging.

### BASS

Bass in particular was a revelation - fantastically powerful and well articulated, it pushed the song far faster than I've heard before.

The drum kit assumed a new importance too, with rim shots scything through the mix to hit me in the chest. Best of all though was the way the spaces between the notes were carried, the NAP250 stopping and starting at breathtaking speed. Suddenly I could home in on tiny rhythmic nuances - like the interplay between the hi-hats and snare drums - and delight in the drummer's technical dexterity.

The Naim system gave a rousing rendition of Carole King's 'It's Too Late', with foot-tapping rhythms and oodles of drive and determination. Again the bass

playing shone through - driving everything along so resolutely, it was a delight to behold. Also impressive was the way the system forged such an expansive soundstage, with the instruments stretching well outside the speakers.

But this track also showed the Naim's downsides in a starker light. King's volce came over as anaemic and lacking in body, and her acoustic plano was just a touch too thin and weedy to be faithful to what was originally a sweet analogue recording. Guitars too were raw but over-forward - strummed acoustics sounding steely when they should have been smoother.

The Naim proved a fascinating combination. It's disarmingly good at diving into anything you care to feed it and ferreting out the rhythms, the basslines, the hard hit snare and bass drums. You sometimes wonder if you're listening to the same piece of music you've been playing all these years. At doing what it does best, it's totally unmatched.

### CHINKS

And yet the wider the diversity of music you play, the more you find little chinks in its armour. Its lack of tonal colour isn't immediately apparent, but you do eventually realise every recording from every studio sounds tonally pretty similar. It also has a tendency to over-play things - it almost enhances music whether it's appropriate or not in the circumstances.

So sure, it has its faults, but what hi-fi system hasn't? As for its telephone number price tag, I've heard systems at twenty times the price (a mixture of US and Swiss esoterica - no names,

no pack drill) with less than a twentieth of the Naim's ability to engage on an emotional level.

After a month of intensive listening. I must confess that I adore this system and don't want to give it back. Even accounting for its megabuck price ticket, I genuinely think there's nothing else that comes close if you like the sound - and you should!

# David Price looks at the British company that's enjoyed making music for over a quarter of a century, Naim Audio.

**≪ⅡÞ** 

he Naim story is remarkable. Julian Vereker founded Naim Audio Visual in 1969, with a sound-to-light unit which he hired out to film production companies. He became disappointed with the sound of professional recording equipment after recording live performances of friends. This lead him to design his own power amplifier. Thus was born Naim Audio of today.

The first Naim power amp was sold in 1971. Julian built a number for friends and acquaintances, creating quite a buzz in the process. In 1973 however, he was asked to quote for supplying loudspeakers to one of Britain's first commercial radio stations, Capital Radio. Combining a slimmed-down version of his power amp with his speakers, and built to IBA specifications, the new monitor won the contract for him and Naim Audio Ltd. was incorporated in July 1973.

In 1974 the company moved from the basement of a Salisbury house to a shop in the middle of the city. That same year Julian met Ivor Tiefenbrun of Linn, with whom he discovered he had much in common. Both had grown up in a world that privileged loudspeakers over the sources that fed them. The accepted wisdom of the time was that all turntables did was revolve at a precise speed with no rumble, while amplifiers were, in the words of Quad's Peter Walker, simply 'a piece of wire with gain', Ivor and Julian duly spent the mid seventies attempting to debunk these myths. Their new system hierarchy model argued that the source was allimportant. They turned the way hi-fi enthusiasts looked at system building upside down.

In 1980 the company moved to Southampton Rd., Salisbury and launched a raft of new products,

including the new entry-level NAC42 preamp, NAP110 power amp, HI-CAP and SNAPS power supplies, plus a revised NAC32.5 preamp, NAP250 and NAXO active crossovers soon filled the order books. Exports started kicking off, with over twenty six countries including the USA, Canada and Japan hungry for Naim kit. The upshot was the Queen's Award for Export Achievement in 1985, and the factory being extended to 20,000 square feet.

Naim had always been a sharply focussed brand with the emphasis on rhythm and dynamics, but the trouble was that sections of the UK hi-fi press tried to pigeonhole the brand. Flat earthers, as they were called, were into Linn turntables and Naim electronics, and to hell with anything else. It came as a great surprise to many then that Naim announced the ARO tonearm and FLI electrostatic loudspeaker, thus treading on Linn's toes. Suddenly the old Linn-Naim symbiosis dissolved and the two went their separate ways.

In 1989 the company stunned the hi-fi world by announcing plans for a CD player - the CDS was a heroic sounding silver disc spinner with the power and involvement of the best analogue. The new NAC52 proved a worthy flagship preamplifier, and the subsequent DBL loudspeakers were particularly able in all-Naim systems. Meanwhile Naim revamped the delightful but totally impractical NAIT integrated amp as the NAIT 2, offering a tantalising taste of the high end at a budget price.

Throughout the nineties Naim continued to hone their product range, moving away from their seventies hair-shirt approach to blend system-friendly features with the company's traditional no-compromise attitude to sound. Tragically though, earlier this year news came that Naim's founder Julian Vereker MBE had died. It has saddened many, from ardent Naim devotees to casual observers of Britain's hi-fi industry. Under Julian's able stewardship Naim Audio went from being a hobby horse to a great British manufacturing company making charismatic products. Today Naim employs over ninety staff and sells to eighty specialist hi-fi shops in the UK alone testament to Julian's genius, and the enduring talents of his company's employees. ■ ▶▶

t is 1988 and the best tonearm in the world is the Linn Ekos, if you believe one half of Britain's hi-fi press, that is. If you don't, it's the SME Series V. Either way, both arms are ostensibly very eighties - the SME is a technological tour de force with a super-analytical sound, while the Linn has the big, bouncy, powerful character of its Ittok precursor, only more so.

Either way, back in the days of Maggie Thatcher there seemed little room in the world for a pickup arm with the far more nineteen seventies qualities of gentle, beguiling musicality and woolly frequency extremes. With this in mind, it is to Naim Audio's eternal credit that they launched the ARO when they did. Even more so if you remember how at the time every major UK manufacturer was falling over itself to launch its first silver disc spinner.

### STYLISH

Everything about the ARO was so damned stylish. From its deliciously defiant name (Analogue Rules Okay!), which raised two fingers to the format everyone feared would soon kill vinyl, to its stark engineering minimalism. Here was a pickup designed to work with only a handful of cartridges. Even better was the three point fixing, drilled expressly for Linn's Troika MC, from the very company who made the ARO's closest rival!

Best of all was the fact that Naim's new baby was a unipivot. At the time, this arrangement was about as fashionable as an orange Austin Allegro with furry dice. The term conjured up memories of old blokes tinkering with ancient Thorens 150s, trying to get their V15s to track Perry Como records. In the thrusting world of Bros and Curiosity Killed the Cat, this was hardly street cred!

Indeed Naim had previously argued that unipivots could never work, but on launching the ARO said they'd finally found a way to make one properly. It certainly raised some eyebrows.

Making unipivots 'properly' meant very high construction quality, with a beautifully finished arm tube and light alloy headshell, top class jewelled unipivot bearing and high precision counterweight. To the delight of manual cuers there wasn't an oil damped lift/lower device to be seen, with bias applied by an old style thread and weight.

### TRA CLARACIONISTA

Then of course there was the absence of lateral tracking alignment slots in the headshell - with just three Troika shaped holes taking their place - and zilch in the way of calibrated tracking force adjustment.

All this doubtless
caused SME Serles V
fans to argue how crude
the ARO was, but anyone
who's ever experimented
with tonearms will
know how dramatically cueing devices, wobbly headshell mountings and bias and

tracking force springs can degrade the sound!

Whereas the SME has cosmic frequency extremes and the Linn Ekos fantastic bravado. the ARO shines in its wonderfully fluid rhythmic abilities. Put simply, it's supremely good at conveying 'micro dynamics' - the tiny nuances of inflection and rhythmic accents of a musical performance. This makes for an almost hypnotically engaging listen that just draws you into the music on an extremely emotional level. Funnily enough, this talent seems to work equally well on whatever music you care to play - from The Cranberries to Kraftwerk, it's always a compelling listen.

Although designed expressly for the Sondek, the ARO actually works in a number of modern decks. including Michells for which mounting plates can be made to order. It also aligns with a number of modern cartridges (including, for example, various Ortofons and Regas) - check with your cartridge supplier for mounting geometry data. Properly set up in a decent deck the ARO is still something special, and second only to very few in the foot tapping department. Thanks to its excellent build it's a durable piece of kit and a fine second-hand buy for around £500 - if you can find one. Unsurprisingly, most Naim ARO owners simply never feel the need to upgrade!



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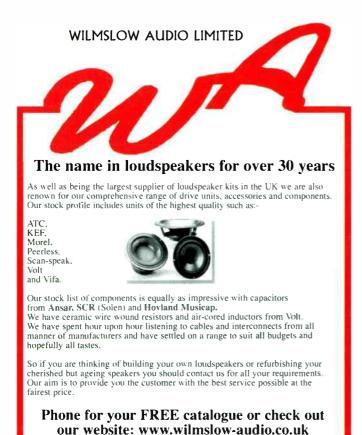

learaudio's £800 Victory bears an uncanny visual resemblance to Audio Technica's late eighties OC-series of moving coils, albeit with the output terminal pins relocated to either side of the cartridge body. For fans of the MC breed, these sure look the part but are awkward to use. Several arms I attempted to fit the Clearaudio into simply didn't have long enough headshell wiring to stretch on to the tags. In the end though, my trusty Origin Live rewired Rega RB250 came to the rescue and worked just fine.

Setting up was a pain. It never gave the impression of being a happy tracker, and certainly didn't have the nonchalant disdain for heavily modulated end-of-sides that Ortofon's MC30 Super, for example, displays. It also sounded far more at ease having played several LP sides, whereas the MC30S warms up after just a couple of tracks.

This pickup's fussiness extended to phono stages. Even though Michell's Delphini gives super-flexible cartridge loading and gain options, it always sounded edgy. With LFD's Phono Stage things just about got into the groove. After ages spent coaxing the best from this cartridge, I finally cued up my Michell Orbe and got down to serious listening.

Again reminiscent of Audio
Technica's late eighties OC series of
moving coils, this cartridge had a
forward, toppy, sometimes hard and
mechanical character. The Clearaudio
seemed constantly unhappy about
the state of record surfaces, the
cleanliness of its stylus and the
dubious recording processes used to
cut the discs it played. Terse and tothe-point, it never really got into the
swing of things.

Even warmer recordings like Randy Crawford's 'One Day I'll Fly Away' weren't quite right. The Victory certainly seemed happier, German synthesiser pioneers than laidback, weedsmoking LA session men The sublime modern rock of Mercury Rev's 'Goddess on a Highway' saw the Victory's strengths beginning to glimmer through. It proved extremely good at setting up an accurately proportioned recorded acoustic. While not especially detailed (compared to the likes of Ortofon's MC30 Super), it really excelled at separating out layers in the mix and positioning them accurately in relation to one another. This made for fine stage

Rhythmically the Victory's a bit of an oddball. Its rigid, mechanical swing is sometimes useful, taking chaotic recordings like, Crosby, Still Nash and Young's 'Wooden Ships' and ordering them into tight, punchy packages. Yet the obverse is that everything gets the treatment and duly looses its uniqueness - the Victory can't really communicate rhythmic nuances and inflections anywhere near as well as the Dynavector 17D2II. Dynamically it's another story though, because the Clearaudio really knows how and when to go loud, and where not to.

depth and stereo images located

with riflebolt precision.

Overall then, it's a bright, forward and dynamic sounding device that really knows a thing or two about soundstaging and imaging. But it's

also a bit cold and mechanical and imposes this character on everything it plays.

If you're into dry, cerebral transducers then you may like its analytical rigour, but lovers of what analogue does best - sweet music - will be unimpressed. £800 is a lot of money to pay for a cartridge and I'm afraid the Victory doesn't approach the class of the field.

Rather than pursue a path already trod, Ringmat have typically blazed their own trail. Instead of the usual conical arrangement of some rigid material, Ringmat Feet comprise three tiers of sandwich-type material interspersed with two different 'fillings', one of which resembles the well-known Ringmat 'cork'. A double ring of high tech foam

completes the arrangement.

The intention with all this is to decouple the hi-fi component from whatever it is standing on while retaining a firm underpinning. Additionally, the sandwich construction with its low (and self-cancelling) resonances is intended to damp extraneous vibrations in the equipment itself. Ringmat say that significant improvements in coherence and phase integrity are attainable under optimum conditions, and that, since the effects are cumulative, the more parts of your system treated, the better the result.

Ringmat Feet are currently offered in two 'strengths', dependant on whether your equipment weighs either less or more than about 13kg/28lb. The feet are sold in sets of four at £75 per set.

SPIRIT AND THE BLUES
Opus 3 records £25 for 45rpm double album

Iife on the club scene but are something of a rarity in private life. Opus 3, the well-regarded Swedish label with an esoteric catalogue of beautifully recorded albums, have given American blues artist Eric Bibb the black champagne treatment. Unwilling to squash eight tracks per side onto one LP, they have issued Bibb's Spirit And The Blues as a double album at 45rpm. In addition to the benefits of increased groove speed, Opus 3 have pulled out all the stops to make a real audiophile treat.

Recordings are acoustic throughout; no PA boosts the vocals for example. Recording, mastering and cutting are by non-digital means, so these records are a surprising throwback to vinyl 'as it was', before DAC, digital-delay and all that paraphernalia made the last offerings of full-scale commercial vinyl into 'CD with scratches'.

Eric Bibb is by way of being Sweden's favourite American. His early Taj Mahal influenced style has matured into a confident and distinctive one of his own. While his Euro-blues and modern spirituals are perhaps just a little too easy on the ear, they never fall into the pit of insincerity.

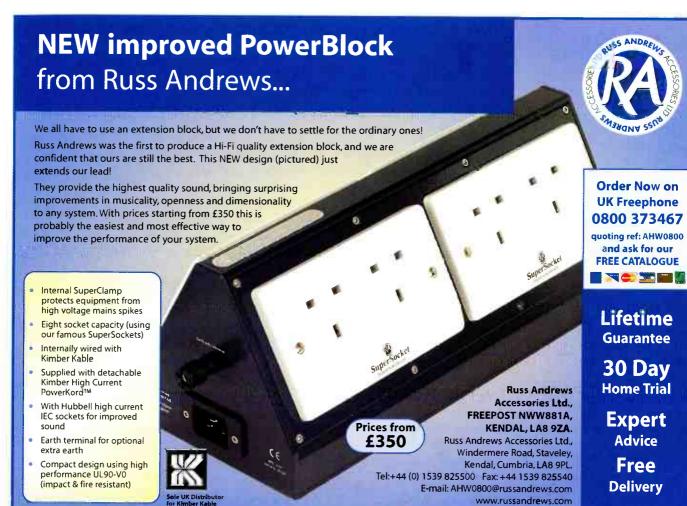
Bibb's band, Needed Time is a collection of mostly Scandinavian instrumentalists. All have a fine ear for style and fine instrumental techniques. Double-bass, National guitars, mandolin, mouth organ and drums are all played with sparkle and drive. Such



is the acoustic nature of the recordings that if the backing at times slightly overcomes the vocal line, so be it this is what happens in real life, after all.

For a mixture of 'natural' blues, spirituals and string band work, plus the peerless production of both recording and record, this 45rpm double set more than earns it's little bit of shelf space.

# Scurvy knave Richard White storms the battlements of Castie's 2009 Pentibroke floorstanders

Ithough appearing to be just another floorstanding reflex, there is more to the Pembrokes than meets the eye. Instead of the conventional portloaded bass driver. Castle have chosen what amounts to a 'distributed port'; sound from a large vent in the bottom of the cabinet leaves by way of the space between the main cabinet and its integral plinth. The improved efficiency and bass response of a reflex is retained; the port is not sharply tuned and thus provides a more natural spread of bass accentuation than is possible with the usual boom-box layout.

As regards construction, the Pembrokes are a solid job, There are no surprises in the choice of drivers: a I" soft dome tweeter supplies treble while a woven Carbon Fibre cone 5" unit deals with all lower frequencies. It boasts a bullet phase plug mounted on the magnet core with an unavoidable gap between coil and core. It's a good idea to keep dust away from this type of arrangement by using the grille.

Bi-wiring is provided for by the two pairs of sturdy sockets mounted on the back. The Castles are supplied with plinths unattached, but a few minutes with a screwdriver and the spacing washers supplied are all that's needed to set things up. Brass inserts are fitted to take the spikes supplied.

The Castles sounded at the beginning much as they did when I'd finished reviewing them.

Because of the less resonant porting arrangement the Pembrokes, although moderately efficient at 88dB/W/m, don't sound that blistering. For a start there are none of the 'oomph' sounds which a conventional reflex port is inclined to utter. Similarly the soft-dome treble con-

tributed to a very relaxed sound 'fresh out the box'. Perhaps a little wary of a 'speaker which so swiftly made itself at home, I turned to a drop of Rock radio to check that they weren't taking things just a bit too easy.

Steve Wright was offering nonstop Golden Oldies, in particular the label-stretching This Town Ain't Big Enough For The Both Of Us. The old fashioned ping-pong stereo mix gave a good clue to the Pembroke's approach: despite my worries about drive and speed, the 'speakers coped with it all but courteously! If you drive a white Escort with the 'bass' blowing the windows out, you might not be so impressed, though.

#### -FELSISCIGOUD

Current top tune Feels So Good by Sonique has better detailed mixing work than the old Sparks track. The Pembrokes put over this modern mix convincingly. The important upper partials of the vocal made for a very clear sound. At no point did the mix cause the 'speakers to sound muddled. The tamed bass had something to do with this.

Throughout listening the Pembrokes gave strong hints as to the sort of repertoire with which they'd excel. A digitally mastered LP of one of Handel's solo Sonatas for recorder bore this out in spades. These records are prone to glassy treble with a harsh loudspeaker, but the Pembroke's soft dome stood them in good stead. Harpsichord tinklings sounded musical rather than irritating and the sonorous notes of the bass viol sawed through in correct measure. Any 'hoots' present were from the instrument itself, not the 'speakers.



Even hardened Rockers could learn a thing or two about their favourite tracks from these Castles, although the two aren't an ideal match.

It's difficult to rave about such an able and polite 'speaker but in the mid-price range, the Pembrokes offer exceptional musicality, especially with classical repertoire.

ecordable CD is taking off. With the emergence of CD-R/RW, we've seen a flooding of the market from all-comers. A one-box solution attracts buyers; why buy a player when you can buy a player that also records?

Few CD recorders match the audiophile standards of their hi-fi playback-only brethren, but the sound's good enough for the majority. Budget models are getting better all the time, but flaws still exist, we found (see measured performance).

The recorders from LG and Philips reviewed here are twin-decks. They have a

replay section and a record /replay section.

Twin decks

can make a high speed
(typically x4) digital copy of
a CD, good for a car or
portable. The Teac cannot
do this, although it can
digital copy in real time (x1) from
another player, if you have one.

Today's CD recorders all handle low reflectivity erasable CD-RW discs, recording and replaying reliably. We used quality TDK CD-RW XG discs in all tests.

If you are thinking of buying a recordable CD to replace a cassette deck, bear in mind that they laboriously 'finalise' a disc after recording, making casual recording tedious in comparison. Also, cassette decks are sensitive enough to match sources like tuners, whereas CD-R/RWs commonly are not.

#### CHANGING TEAC

TEAC aren't recent converts to CD recorders, as they've been knocking out CD recording drives for quite some time. In fact, they were

apparently early pioneers in CD-R drive technology and continue to involve themselves in the computer CD-ROM business. The RW-800 is, however, their first full-sized domestic recorder. First: it looks like a traditional bit of hi-fi - not all products that come under that vague title do these days! £350 buys you a solidly-built and attractive machine (at 12lb, it's not far off my reference NAD S500 £1000 CD player). It has a busy fascia, swathed in buttons, knobs

the looks competition, resembling a bit of hi-fi rather than just another CD recorder. As mentioned, it is easy to use, but lacks that last ounce of sound sophistication to give it top marks.

#### DOUBLE TOP

LG Electronics are another megaelectronics manufacturer from the Far East - Korea to be precise. Once known as Goldstar, LG are involved in most aspects of consumer electron-

ics, from Flatron TVs to

an MP3 player with built-in cassette and FM radio. Keen to turn their hand to current market

trends and to utilise their R&D dept. to the best of its ability, they've entered the CD recording market

> with the twin-deck ADR-620. This smart but functional looking model boasts plenty of

special features, including 4x dub speed when recording from the playing deck to the recording drive. This is a handy feature, and one that I'd use a lot. It makes recording a whole CD a doddle and, with a bit of deft finger work, you can even use it for compiling tracks. Remember to turn your amp's volume down if monitoring during dubbing - you will either wreck your beloved tweeters for good, or else believe that you're recording the Best of Pinky and Perky!

As far as digital connections go, there are both coaxial and optical inputs and outputs round the back, plus a handy coaxial digital input on the front panel for connecting up a portable device; a nice user-friendly touch. Being twin-deck it naturally has dual-playback facility - just right for



and sockets and a clear and informative display window. Round the back are the necessary coaxial and digital ins and outs. The supplied remote control ensures that you can do everything from your armchair that you can on bended (and creaking) knees!

Performance wise, the RW-800 is very good. The copies I made, both digital and analogue, were clean and well-balanced. An esoteric mixture of different tracks gave me the opportunity to test out the digital recording level control to give as uniform a level as one could wish for. Playback, though, isn't perhaps the best around, with full-sounding recordings lacking a bit of weight but the overall sound is rhythmic and punchy. Of the three tested here, the TEAC easily wins in

## sensation

those house parties where changing the CD every hour becomes a chore!

A quick glance through the instruction manual ensures that the control of the two drives isn't as complicated as it first appears. lumping in at the deep end to try out the speed dubbing facility, I found that it worked perfectly at the first attempt (a CD-RW was employed, just in case!) with a track from the Foo Fighters second album. The copy was spot-on for attack and sounded as rhythmic and beefy as the original. Unfortunately the sound could be a little thin in tonality compared to a similarly-priced player, so playback, again, isn't brilliant. To be fair, that's not really what you would primarily buy this machine for - audiophiles especially. The ADR-620 is a strong contender for good recording quality - especially with the dubbing facility and that's what I'd recommend it for. The looks don't particularly inspire and the sound doesn't grab you by the jacket, but LG's recorder is very good value and does its specified job very well.

#### LATEST GENERATION

Pioneer claim they were the first manufacturer to invent a CD recorder, but it's undoubtedly Philips that springs to mind as the true pioneers (excuse the pun) of domestic CD recording. After a string of recorders that each sold surprisingly well, Philips now regularly revamp their CD recorders, improving both performance and technology. The CDR-775 is the latest generation replacement for the twin-deck 765. Cosmetically, there's little change from its predecessor. It retains a good and clear display window with the greyish surround and the same array of buttons and chunky remote.

Where it does improve is in performance and facilities. Like the LG

Electronics machine, twin deck capability for playback operates in either changer or 'DJ' mode. Selecting 'DJ Mode' will result in both decks playing at the same time, whilst 'changer' will switch between the two - as one ends the others begins. Other features include 99 track programming for either recording or playback, high speed dubbing, text editing and digital recording and balance levels.

Whilst the 775 isn't always the easiest of recorders to use, recordings from both high-speed dubbing and external digital sources were excellent, and playback was equally impressive. Whilst the TEAC has the looks and feel of a good audiophile player, it doesn't quite match up to its promise in the sound stakes. The Philips has a more mundane, although not unattractive, appearance but the new generation technology manages to sound like a very good mid-priced CD player. Once again Philips have brought out a recorder that continues to justify their lion's share of the CD recording market, keeping the price low and the performance high.

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A more-thandecent first system could consist of the following: As little as £100 buys you a pair of musical KEF Cresta Is or Tannoy mX1s. Sony's CDP-XE530 CD player at £130 takes some beating, as does Technics' SL-PG490A at the price of £100.To whittle down a couple of amps, Denon's perennially popular PMA-250SE at £140 and Marantz's PM4000

at £150 are perhaps the best at the price. Chuck in QED's QNECT 1 at £20 a metre pair and Cable Talk's 3.1 'speaker cable at £2.50 per metre and you have the leg-up you need to get onto the audiophile ladder for under £500!

As for the MiniDisc, Sony's MZ-R55 portable at around £250 (shop around) should do everything you need it to - including, with a few connections, play through your new hi-fi! **SP**

The image of the dealer as a Not The Nine O'Clock News-sketch-style, patronising money grabber is largely a myth!

If you listen to mainly dance music or rock, this is a strong option. Alternatively, for something a little more 'user friendly' you'll find the NAD S500 (my reference, at present) at £1000 will play anything you chuck at it with finesse and control. Other options are the Roksan Caspian at £900 (a firm HFW favourite) or perhaps Musical Fidelity's £850 X-Ray - much the same as the NAD, a good all rounder Also, another close contender is the Rotel RCD991, at £750, which gives you the option of HDCD as well. 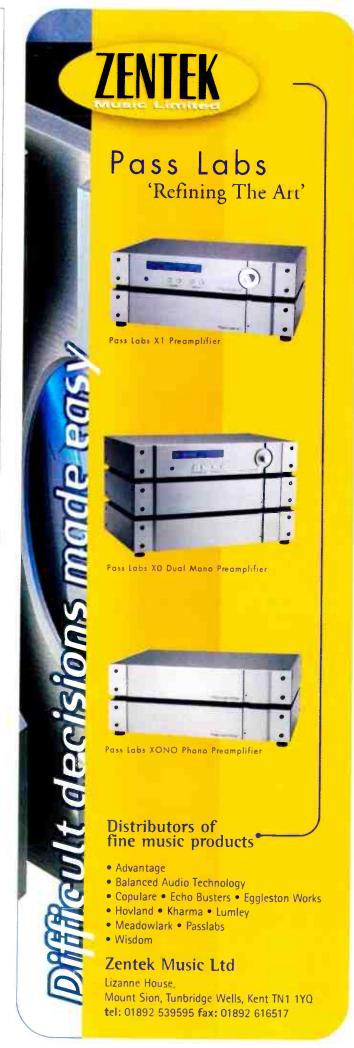

Of the players which have impressed us over the last year or two, there are plenty which fall into your price range.

Probably first choice would be the £300 Rotel RCD-951 which we looked at in August 1999. One of our principle reasons for favouring this player is that it will also decode HDCDs which, if you can find them, give a definitely superior sound to CD ordinaire.

Although perhaps not the audiophile's first stop, Goodman's Delta CMD at under £200 offers amazing value, being both CD player and MD player/recorder in one handy package.

For all-round musical ability, you may find that your £500 is a bit between categories - the markedly more able players tend to be at least a couple of hundreds dearer. RMW

I had my eyes on the Tannoy Revolution 2s as I think these are pretty much the best for the money, i.e. 300-500 quid region, but would appreciate your thoughts. Maybe smaller 'speakers would be more appropriate, especially considering my tastes in music, i.e. Paul Weller, Dr John, Beastie Boys and lots in between.

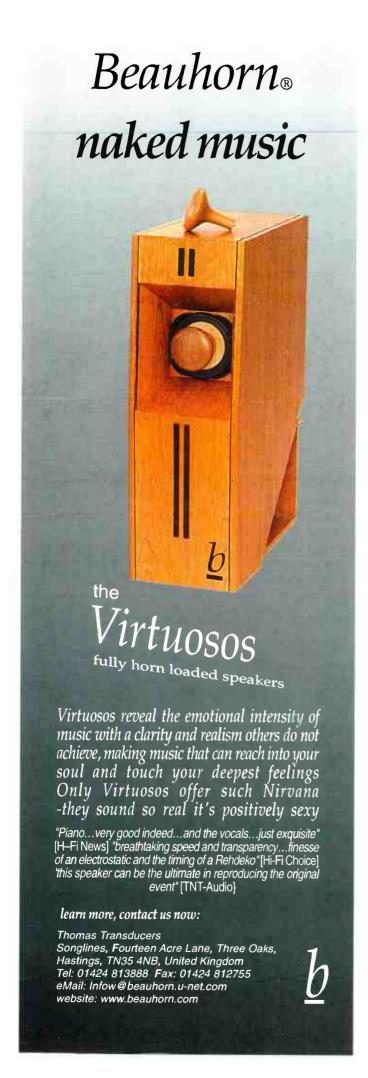
Rather then citing either front end players or 'speakers as the most important link in the audiophile chain, I think it's more important to get a good balance right between all components. OK, so a high quality pair of 'speakers may make a ropey CD player sound marginally

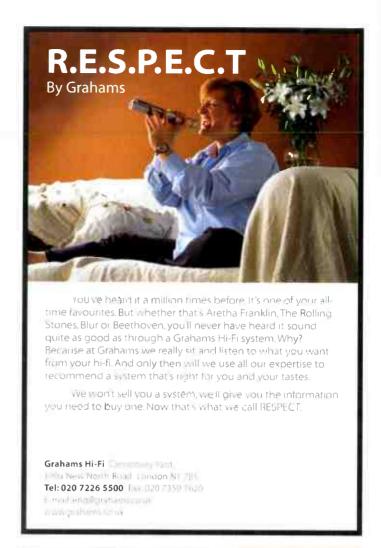
better, but your not getting the best from them. Likewise, an excellent CD player is somewhat wasted on potting-shed 'speakers.

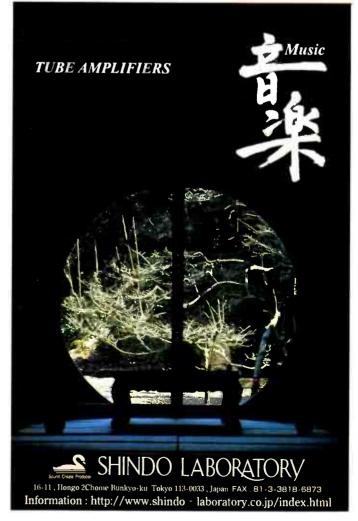
The Sony and NAD CD and amp that you own is a good match for sound and price, and your choice of 'speaker price range seems a sensible one. Your room size screams out for good quality, well-

built bookshelf models, of which there are plenty at your chosen price. Right bang in the middle of your budget at £400 are the excellent Royal Menuets from Dali, which will match the sound from the C320 (Dali and NAD are stablemates from Denmark). They have an excellent, heavy, hardwood cabinet and a sophisticated sound, one step up from the Tannoys you currently own. There's clean and powerful bass from the small cabinets, due to solid construction and high quality drive units, and have a smooth and especially sweet treble. Similarly, a pair of £400 solid hardwood Opera Duettos will give a sophisticated sound but they could prove a little too laid back for your listening tastes. SP

#### SHOEBOX SOLUTIONS

Dear Hi-Fi World,

I have a very confined listening room (10' x 11'6") which with its lowish ceiling probably rules out large speakers.

Can you suggest which budget models would be suitable, or should I go for bigger ones and make the space?

#### Er., no.

Unless you are intending to move soon - or else knock through your walls - there is not much point in being extravagant with big loudspeakers. It is for space-pressed people like yourself that the book-shelf 'speaker really comes into its own and there is a very wide choice to suit all budgets and tastes.

For a variety of uses, a personal favourite of mine is the Eltax Liberty I+ at £100, which we reviewed in our May 2000 issue. Granted that my musical taste is not very rock orientated, but the Eltaxes performed exceptionally naturally on acoustic music, which should be a good touchstone for all-round ability. In addition, the Eltaxes measured as well as they sounded - very many small/budget units display anomalies in frequency balance in order to increase perceived bass extension, for example. Although no slouch in the lower regions, the Liberty I+ appeared to be substantially free of this sort of excess.

For a slightly more subtle, some would say musical sound, we'd recommend the KEF Cresta Is at the same price as the Liberty I+s, which play anything you throw at them with

All those records I have had for years and purchased both new and used all need regular cleaning. All that static attracts the household dust made up of a large proportion of human skin flakes which must have minute particles of acid within them. So not only does the dust form a barrier between the stylus and the record grove it must corrode the record surface as well. I have no scientific proof of the latter but believe that regular cleaning is essential to get and maintain the best vinyl.

As I haven't got the room or inclination to have a record cleaning turntable I opted for a Disco Antistat record cleaner. This works by manually turning the disc though a bath of cleaning solution and two brushes sweep the grooves. Providing that the solution is filtered and changed regularly it does an excellent job; and that is where I have a problem. I have run low on the fluld and am finding it difficult to replace. The mail order company that I purchased it from seem to have gone out of business and the maker, Knosti, have not responded to email enquiries. Do you know where I can buy this fluid or suggest an alternative? Would isopropyl alcohol do the job and if so should it be diluted? I would be very grateful for your help with this.

Since vinegar is commonly sold by the gallon in plastic containers, I am not convinced that we need worry too much about corrosion due to skin acid traces in the dust on our records. I do however agree about the benefit of regular cleaning.

Your Knosti gadget sounds as if it is

intended to de-staticise the records as well as clean them. It is difficult to do both with fluids: antistatic fluid works by holding moisture which leaks away the static; it is also quite good at holding dust and dirt in solution as well!

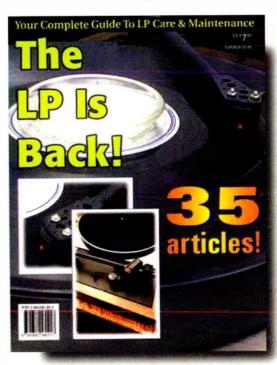
A dilute solution of ethyl glycol, as used in anti-freeze mixtures, can act as an antistatic agent but because the stuff is very resistant to drying, you tend to find records stick to their sleeves etc. Not really recommended.

Isopropyl alcohol diluted 1:1 with purified (not just distilled) water is ideal for record cleaning, so long as care is taken to avoid simply chasing the muck round the grooves. This is the principle benefit of vacuum-type record cleaners.

If you are looking for alternative methods, our World Library book The LP Is Back has some extraordinary techniques described. Some of them are so unlikely that I feel sure that, even if it is back, the LP won't be staying long! RMW

#### **EMI GOES ONLINE!**

EMI Recorded Music has announced its plans to sell over 100 downloadable albums and 40 associated singles, from artists including the Spice Girls, Tina Turner, D'Angelo and Frank Sinatra, in the US from July 1st. Unlike Sony Music and Warner Music's plans to sell songs online in Sony's ATRAC3 format, EMI intends to use Microsoft's Windows Media format, one many believe to be sonically inferior.

In a move likely to cause howls of derision from music buyers, EMI has said it will price its downloadable music similarly to conventional CDs and singles. This means a full album download will cost around £12, and a single around £2. This pricing structure is similar to Sony's. which began selling a limited catalogue of around 25 songs from its website for £1.50 each, with plans to increase the price to £2. This compares poorly to specialist Internet music portals like iCrunch or Mudhut, which charge 99p per download. Even this is optimistic considering the distribution costs are slashed by around 80%, according to Factory Records' Tony Wilson.

#### SONY'S QUIET REVOLUTION

After quietly beginning to sell music through its own online music store in the States last month, Sony Music Entertainment has now begun distributing downloadable songs through outside retailers too. For just £2.49 tracks by the likes of Mariah Carey and Pearl Jam are available through a digital interface called 'Store24'. developed by a division of Alliance.

The company's strategy appears to be to start with 'bricks-and-mortar' retailers and then move to online music sellers like CDnow and Amazon. Tower Records and Hastings Entertainment are also said to be gearing up to sell Sony tracks online. The music uses the company's ATRAC3 CODEC, found inside MiniDisc decks like 1997's MDS-JA3ES. This also happens to be the core format of Sony's new Memory Stick Walkman and VAIO Music Clip. PC users can also hear the songs by using a Windows Media player plug-in.

#### **SONY PLAY AWAY**

It's official - Sony's new PlayStation 2 gets its European and North American launch on October 26th. Sony's staying mum about its European pricing plans, but the US price will be \$299. At the customary dollar-for-pound exchange rates, expect to pay a shade under £300 here. Sony are boasting that week one sales in the US could generate \$500 million, or \$1.5 billion by the end of the calendar year! Audio is one of the new PlayStation's major applications. Coming as it does with a built-in DVD player and optional 30 gigabyte hard disk, it's no big secret that Sony sees the PS2 as a conduit to Internet music, using both MP3 and

Sony's ATRAC3-based format. Expect also to see compatibility with Sony's Memory Stick Walkman - indeed it's said that the Japanese giant only

t's a sobering fact that today's entry level PCs are more powerful than those found in state-of-the-art digital recording studios just five years ago. Go back another five to the start of the nineties and a hard disk recording set-up would have set you back £10,000! With this in mind, your bog standard Pentium II over there in the corner is actually a powerful audio resource. All you need to get it doing something useful is some serious software

This is where Syntrillium's Cool Edit Pro comes in. Whereas a decade ago you'd have willingly spent £300 on a middling cassette deck, if you fork out the same amount today for

your (already bought and paid for) PC, you'll get yourself a hard disk recording set-up that Trevor Horn would have given his right arm for just a few years back.

Cool Edit Pro is such a package, and lets you store music from an analogue or digital source (depending on your computer soundcard) on your PC and manipulate it in the digital domain. To use it, you just need a PC with a soundcard (the higher quality the better) and a CD writer for storing the results of your handiwork on digital audio disc. As far as specs are concerned, CEP will work with virtually anything on the evolutionary scale above a 486, but to give of its best needs a PIII 500 with

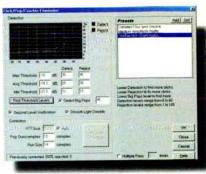
128MB and a decent sized (10+GB) hard drive

So what does it do, and how do its features differ to a hi-fi CD recorder like Pioneer's PDR-509? Simply put, it lets you record digital audio onto your hard drive and then modify it with complex built-in digital signal processing (DSP) effects. And make no mistake, they're not toys. Rather, they're amazingly powerful professional audio processing algorithms which require vast amounts of number crunching to work.

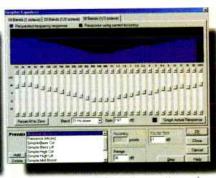
They include noise reduction, click and pop elimination, clip restoration, compression, convolution, delay, sustain, echo, chorus, expanding, FFT,

distortion, normalisation, phasing, vocoding, sample rate conversion, time stretching, tempo compression, parametric equalisation and DC bias adjustment. Cool Edit also generates tones (sine waves, square, saw), noise (white, brown, pink) and even DTMF tones for phone systems. It also works like an oscilloscope or FFT, analysing musical data giving a spectral view, real time frequency analysis and even statistics (i.e. minimum and maximum RMS power, etc.) Rather more than Windows' Sound Recorder, then.

#### HOLDING BACK THE YEARS

Rather than run through Cool Edit's vast shopping list of features one by one, to demonstrate this amazing package's power I decided to make a compilation of my old punk and new wave singles with it. This meant I'd first have to record them onto my hard drive, cut out the lead in and lead out noise, then de-scratch and de-hiss everything and re-equalise it for burning to CD. It sounds a formidable task, but it's testament to CEP's design and ergonomics that it proved so easy.

After installing and loading Cool Edit, the first thing I had to do was to set it up for my PC. This involved going into the OPTIONS/SETTINGS menu to select the record and playback devices from a menu of the ones CEP detects as present on your system. I simply selected my Yamaha WF- 192XG soundcard as my Recording and Playback device and was ready to go. Had I chose, I could also have had some fun with its DATA settings. For example, you can

tell it to record at 32bit internal resolution and truncate to 16bit, applying dither if desired (said to give better sound from 16bit, akin to Sony's Super Bit Mapping).

It was now time to start my 'session', which is simply a case of selecting sampling frequency and word depth for the particular recording you're about to make. For the purposes of CD it's best to work at CD's native 16/44 resolution, so you don't need to do any sample rate conversion or truncation later. Session started, I simply clicked on the RECORD button and we were off, the large central time display (reading down to thousandths of a second) buzzing along before my eyes. I then cued up the first of some fifteen bits of dirty, scratched seven inch vinyl and didn't touch the STOP button until I'd recorded the last.

While recording CEP displays the amplitude graphically, along with two long bargraph level meters. Right clicking on these lets you select range (they'll read down to -120dB if you like), peak hold options and clip indication. It's important to remember these meters are for postediting only - you set the levels via the Windows Mixer before you start recording. When I'd finished, Cool Edit displayed the entire recording graphically as a wave (x=time, y=amplitude), giving visual confirmation that everything had been recorded properly. Then it was time to save it by going into the FILE menu, selecting SAVE and specifying a filename and format (in this case .WAV, which is Windows' word for PCM audio). Cool Edit duly started writing the file to my hard drive,

which took around 6 minutes for my 700MB file.

#### **EDITING**

Next it was time to tidy the recording up by using its extensive editing functions. This was a simply a case of locating the start and stop points of the bits I wanted to remove (i.e. lead in and run out groove noise), highlighting them on the display and clicking on the CUT button on the toolbar (represented graphically by a pair of scissors) to chop the unwanted bits out. By using the ZOOM IN and ZOOM OUT buttons, you can see the start and stop points of your edit down to thousands of a second, which makes for complete accuracy - far tighter and more reliable than with an old open reel splicing block and coloured

#### SIGNAL PROCESSING

After chopping out the bits I didn't want, it was time to start playing with the DSP facilities to restore the sound to its original late seventies freshness. Cool Edit's TRANSFORM/ NOISE **REDUCTION / CLICK+POP** ELIMINATOR option was duly summoned, and the program suggested -16.9dB suggested filtering level, to which I agreed. (If this level is too high, processing will take too long a time, too low and it's fast but Ineffective). The results were amazing. Obviously the more filtering you choose, the more the sound is going to be altered, but even with quite powerful scratch and hiss removal the sound quality was remarkably good, with very little corruption of the original music and virtually all the rubbish removed.

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Next it was time for some of reequalisation, for which Cool Edit offers 10, 20 or 30-band graphic or parametric equalisation. The danger here is that its DSP is so powerful and so precisely defined, you can find yourself making unwelcome tonal changes. Luckily you can preview your chosen EQ settings, which is where having a very good set of multimedia loudspeakers (or connection to your main hi-fi system) comes in handy. Select +6dB of bass boost at 90Hz and you find things get very boomy and leaden indeed through proper full-range monitors.

My problem was that the sound was pretty anaemic with a mid forward bias, and little treble or low bass, thanks to me playing my singles on a Garrard SP25 with worn out Shure M75/6 cartridge as a kid! Cool Edit came to the rescue with a gentle cushion of bass lift and a touch of extra zing at the top, administered across no less than 30 different audio frequencies! Remember that tweaking the bass will raise the overall level of the sound - too much lift will overshoot your 0dB limit and digital distortion will occur, which doesn't exactly make for easy listening.

#### **NORMALISING**

Another of Cool Edit's powerful features is NORMALISE, which up moves the signal level up to the volume you desire. This is useful for when the level of either your entire recording, or just one section, is noticeably low. In the case of my recording, a couple of the singles I recorded were cut at significantly lower levels than the others, which means they'll sound unnaturally quiet when played back. To compensate for this, I used the STATISTICS option to run through the entire file and report the level of the loudest point, which was -0.92dB on both channels. I then highlighted the quietest song and found it peaked at -4.8dB.

Equalising the level of this was simply a case of going into the TRANSFORM menu and selecting AMPLITUDE/ NORMALISE and specifying the level I wanted the song boosted to. I specified -IdB, to make it roughly equivalent to the loudest point and CEP set to work. The result was almost no difference of playback volume between tracks after normalisation, which further improved the

listenability of my compilation.

#### **RESULTS**

It was time to re-save my completed .WAV file, now down some 80MB after my travails on the cutting room floor (so to speak), which took another ten minutes. I then quit Cool Edit Pro, went into Easy CD Creator and burned the whole thing onto CD. The results were superb, sounding warmer, smoother and more engaging than my dog- eared old singles, and more importantly, playable in my car or out and about in a Discman.

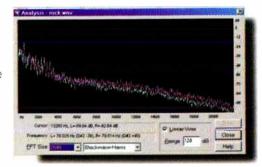
Any gripes? Yes - it currently doesn't support DAE or MP3. Although CD-ROM controls are provided, letting you start and stop your PC CD drive for recording purposes from within this program, it would be useful if you could just press a button and watch it make direct digital copies of the tracks you want automatically, a la the latest Music Match Jukebox. Nor does Cool Edit offer onboard MP3 conversion either, which is ironic considering its very high quality integral sample rate converter which will, for example, down convert 48kHz DAT recordings to CD's 44.1 kHz with virtually no detectable loss of fidelity. Finally quibble is the lack of CD authoring facilities built in - it does so much complex stuff, so why omit this relatively simple facility?

#### CONCLUSION

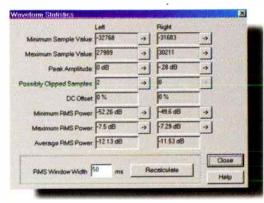
We've tested both Sonic Foundry's Sound Forge XP and Steinberg's Clean/WaveLab, and found them both to be excellent entry level products. But the difference between these and Cool Edit Pro is chalk and cheese. At £299 it's expensive, but I continue to be gobsmacked by its facilities, reliability and the sound quality of its myriad DSP routines. Quite simply, Cool Edit Pro will do practically anything with audio you can think of, without so much as a glitch or a hiccup. As far as computer audio goes, it's an awesome bit of code.

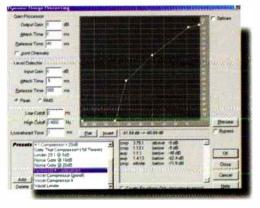

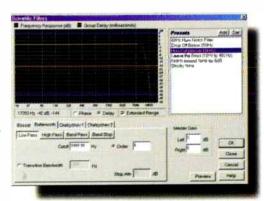

# Just play. Chusic

Nick Tate gets into the groove with Pine's D'music SM320V MP3 portable.

he D'music is one of those first generation MP3 portables I thought they'd have replaced by now. Instead, like Schneider's F20, Pine are selling it at a bargain basement price of under £100, which suddenly makes it look particularly good value and therefore worth reviewing.

I don't really go a bundle on its looks, but at just 63x85x17.5mm and 62g it's actually remarkably small and light. Better still, the D'music has a slightly rubberised case, which gives it an air of quality compared to some of the plastic-fantastic stuff around at the lower end of the market. Lovers of colour will be happy to hear that as well as boring old black, the Pine comes in silver, pink, iMac Blue, and Green too.

Despite its miserly 32MB onboard flashcard memory (with an additional 32MB optional), facilities are actually pretty comprehensive. The player's front is dominated by a large silver central button offering play/pause, forward and back track search and stop controls. Below are four smaller buttons for Menu (display memory status and serial number), Mode (toggling between MP3 playback and Voice recording), Select (giving repeat options) and EQ (giving pop, classic, jazz, 'ex-bass' and flat presets). The side carries the 30-step volume control and the recording button for the voice recorder function. Hitting this starts the display counting in seconds and lights up a little red LED.

The package comprises the D'music player itself, an installation CD, parallel port cable, set of in-ear headphones, batteries (2xAAA), a thick and comprehensive six-language

manual and a pouch. Software installation was easy enough, and the D'music manager found its way onto my system with out a glitch. If you want to make use of the player's voice recording function on your computer, you also have to load the voice driver - the D'music records voice stuff perfectly by itself, but won't upload to your PC for storing the recordings on hard drive if you don't. In use, the D'music manager is extremely straightforward and fussfree, permitting drag and drop style file transfer. Downloading is fairly swift, but don't expect state-of-theart speeds from any parallel port based system.

Bundled software is from the Xing stable, in the shape of the XingMP3 player and AudioCatalyst ripper. Although well presented, the ripper is a 'lite' version that only rips at 128kbps, using Xing's far from stateof-the-art sounding engine. True, it certainly codes MP3s quickly, but regular Computer Audio World readers will know how much more we prefer the Fraunhofer CODEC found it the likes of MusicMatch lukebox 5.0. If you do buy the Pine, best buy MMJ or download the Fraunhofer CODEC direct from their website (www.iis.fhg.de/) and then install it from Windows Control Panel/Multimedia/Audio Compression Codecs section. This done, you'll find the Pine sounds far better - it's like the difference between using a cheap Ferric tape and a good Metal!

On audition the D'music seems a good performer, especially considering the cheapo price, but hardly likely to change the face of MP3 music. Feeding a high quality valve pre-



power driving Yamaha NS1000M speakers, it sounded clean and articulate replaying 256kbps MP3s, with a detailed mid-band, good soundstaging and fine treble. The bass was a tad light, but thanks to the fairly smooth highs it didn't really unbalance the sound. Best of all was the cohesive rhythmic feel the D'music had playing everything from Lee Morgan's 'The Rajah' to David Bowie's 'Loving the Alien', the D'music proved engaging in an unpretentious sort of way.

You can pick up Frontier Labs' sweet sounding NEX for similar money, and although its build is quite a way behind, you do get 64MB thrown in. It's a tough call, but at the price the D'music still makes a good case for itself.

've heard all about WinAmp, Sonique, Xing and MusicMatch Jukebox, but have to confess I'd never heard of Greenwich Mean Time before a copy of their | Box landed on my doormat. They're actually a British company founded in 1996 that makes desktop management software, including products to splat the much vaunted millennium bug. It came about as a sideline for the company's music loving president Karl Feilder, who decided to do it, "because we could, we're a young company, we love music, we love PCs, and we love the Internet, It was fun and, with the talent we have in the company, it was easy". Can't say fairer than that.

The princely sum of £29.95 buys you this MP3 encoder, organiser and player complete with its unique selling point, the fact that it's styled like a classic, late fifties jukebox. Being a child of the seventies, I can't say this did much for me at all, aside from reminding me of how I used to watch the Fonz on Happy Days. Now if GMT did one styled like a Space Hopper or Raleigh Chopper, that would be a different story. Anyway, not to worry, once you've used the | Box's clever features, you can always minimise it, so it sits discretely in the corner of the screen!

The J Box brings together a number of once disparate MP3 applications in one package. As well as letting you record MP3s from your computer CD-ROM drive, then play them at the click of a mouse, it's also a clever filing system for your music - offering very

extensive - what used to be called in old money playlisting options.

First, you can filter your MP3 collection based on

genres, so if you've got 500 MP3 songs on your hard drive and fancy listening to pop, rock and folk only, you can easily access them to the exclusion of anything else if so desired. You can also select Random Play and let The J Box automatically pick tracks for you, either from chosen genres or right across your whole collection. You can immediately locate specific tracks even if you can only remember part of the album title, artist or track name, using a powerful search facility. There's even a 'Guess The Track' game in which you have 15 seconds to name that tune from a random selection of your MP3s!

The J Box automatically retrieves track, artist and album information from GMT's website - just tell it which CDs you're ripping and it goes onto the Net and downloads all the artist and track information automatically. Its import feature scans your hard drive for existing MP3 files and adds them to your music playlists. You can also save playlists as virtual albums, giving immense scope for making compilations.

When you remember that just IGb of hard disk space holds around twenty full length CDs or around 300 songs, MP3 playlisting becomes a really powerful feature, and the I Box

its best exponent so far. You can even designate up to four different locations to store music, meaning you can store MP3s on network drives, secondary hard drives or even ZIPs, in addition to your default drive.

Downsides? Well it doesn't have the flexibility its rival MusicMatch Jukebox offers for 'power users'. For example, if you're ripping MP3s with it, you get a choice of just three recording bitrates (96, 128 and 192kbps), with no advanced error correction and digital audio extraction fine tuning. Most people won't really need this anyway, but avid MP3 nuts will object to its absence.

Overall, the J Box is a powerful package that sets out to turn computers into user-friendly music centres and succeeds. Considering you can store an entire music collection in high (better than MD) quality on a single notebook PC, ambitious MP3 organisers suddenly seem to make a lot of sense, especially to mobile music fans who can't take their prized record or CD collections with them. For non-specialist users it's a bargain at under thirty pounds.

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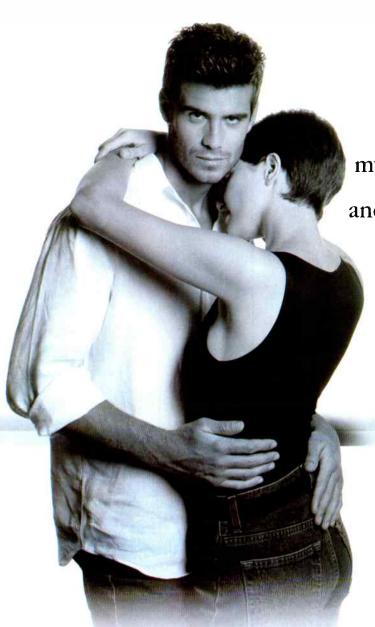

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Home Taping is Killing Music" it says on many now-yellowing sleeves in my LP collection. Home taping is now OK; digital copying is the new menace about which arguments are breaking out all over. I couldn't help but wonder, whilst testing the TEAC, LG and Philips CD recorders reviewed in this issue, whether they might be outlawed in their lifetime. New legislation before the European Parliament, sponsored by the music business of course, seeks to ban all digital copying throughout Europe. We will enter a new dark age, say Philips.

Home Taping didn't kill music. Quite the reverse. When LP sales peaked in 1975 91.6million units were sold, plus 20.2million pre-recorded tapes, totalling 112million units. By 1999 pre-recorded music sales had

exceeded 210million units in the UK. So in 25years sales almost doubled. This is not to say home taping had no effect of course. Perhaps they would have tripled if it had been banned. Who

business home taping has receded as a threat. Digital copying is the new menace.

The counter-argument is that poor quality copies are an effective marketing tool, if an unintended one. Music is distributed more widely by home taping, as I'll call it for the time being, introducing people to music they might otherwise never have heard. The highly competitive U.S. computer industry distributes its software free, in one month trial or limited functionality versions, so people can sample the goods as an inducement to buy, so the technique is used elsewhere to good effect.

I have some sympathy for the core argument held by the music business. I see no good reason why artists should be denied an income from the sale of their music. I know too many musicians who have dedicated their lives to their art to want them to be denied reasonable remuneration for it.

However, to the music business Home Taping has receded as a threat. Digital Copying is the new menace. In the EU at least, the European Parliament is being effectively lobbied and seems sympathetic to the idea that it should be banned. High speed copiers like the LG ADR-620 and Philips CDR775 reviewed in this issue would cease to exist. Digital inputs would be removed from CD and MiniDisc recorders. Digital outputs would be likely remain for connection of external convertors.

Analogue recording would be allowed, so all is not lost. The idea is that repeated copying of an analogue signal degrades it, discouraging the production of multiple copies. The music business is trying to distinguish between home taping and commercial piracy here. People would be inconvenienced by this, but not denied the right to record music, nor copy from one disc to another for private use.

The large electronic companies, Philips

being foremost amongst them, oppose this legislation. They say it will plunge Europe into a new dark age technologically, since digital copying will remain legal in the rest of the world. This is over-playing it a bit. They will have to produce special models, but I see no real technological threat.

Whilst the music business pursues its campaign against digital copying in Europe it is fighting what it deems to be illegal distribution of music on the internet by Napster and MP3.com. Napster offers software (www.napster.com) that allows people to search for and swop MP3 music files, distributing music in violation of copyright. The Recording Industries Association of America (RIAA) is suing Napster for "contributory and vicarious" copyright infringement. MP3.com streams music from an archive of at least 40,000 CDs, notionally to people who already own CDs of the music they wish to hear. In this case the music industry claims it is their right to sell music in this fashion, no one else's.

Finally, there's a storm brewing over a new watermarking technology from Verance Corporation of California (www.verance.com). They claim to be able to place inaudible watermarks into digital and even analogue(?) music. Their system has been adopted for use as a worldwide industry standard in DVD Audio and for the Secure Digital Music Initiative (SDMI) by the major worldwide record companies, as well as music sites as license music.com, musicmaker.com and Mjuice.com. Verance claim their system is inaudible; artists and

recording engineers doubt this and are working up a froth over it.

In a report that has just landed on my desk, the IFPI count Napster and MP3.com as internet pirates. Both companies offer a defence and have supporters. That's not the case with illegal CD manufacture. No fewer than 60million CDs were seized last year, showing another, more sinister, side to this issue. Underground plants have

been closed in Holland, Philippines and Paraguay.

Home Taping seems an innocent pastime against what is happening today. The birth of digital turned out to be a two edged sword for the music

#### The Importance Of Mains Quality

Mains quality is absolutely fundamental to the the quality of sound you get from your system. The problem is radio frequency interference (RFI). It causes loss of information, leading to less detail, reduced bass, and increased distortion. TV and radio, domestic appliances and factories all emit RFI.

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a 'look what DAB can do for you' launch eighteen months or so ago, I was not exactly bowled over. Having in any case a healthy scepticism regarding technological improvements fostered by a near-monopoly - in this case the BBC - I had a deal of difficulty in discerning what the real benefits for mankind at large would be.

Years ago, when 625-line television came in, the improvement over the 405-line standard was there for all to see, quite literally. Persuasion was inherent in the product itself, with very few questions to be asked. Perhaps the only negative comment concerned visual effects: Quatermass author Nigel Kneale attributed the terrifying success of some very simple effects to the poor definition of the old 405 system. With

viewers unable to be categorically sure of what they were seeing, imagination took over; the fearsome creature in Westminster Abbey was achieved by Kneale's own hands

inside suitably decorated rubber gloves, poked through holes in a photograph of the Abbey's interior!

So much for television - radio demands suspension of disbelief as a first principle. Take your average episode of The Archers:

Jennifer: Eoh! Brian! Look at that mushroom clide on Lakey Hill . . .

Brian: This time those Grundies have gone too far . . .

Bert: Aaarn, faarn nee-oah, urgle moi oi oo-aaaargh . . .

Brian: Well, never mind, Bert; it'll scrape off when it's dry . . .

You see - it's radio and automatically we believe every word. This is more than I can say for the BBC's rather bludgeoning marketing for DAB. With no comparison offered, various members of 'the public' have obligingly supplied quotes for the advertising leaflets which, I'm afraid, seem irrelevant to the superiority of Digital Radio as a coming must-have - at least as far as hi-fi is concerned. For a start, any mention of in-car radio puts the ball into an entirely different court; unless, of course, you habitually listen with about a quarter of your attention, with

a petrol engine banging away two feet in front of your nose.

Despite the advertisers' "well ..it's digital isn't it? .." sound-bites, I managed to remain unconvinced. Listening to my share of the contestants in our group test this month, I was more than a little re-assured. With a careful design, the DAC processing which is necessary to turn all those yeses and nos into sound can do wonders for the sound quality - of digital. I cannot say that the sound of a good FM analogue tuner is categorically bettered, but why should it be? Both machines are dealing with the same broadcast material - or are they?

During my researches for the group test, I put the digital tuners in a spare input and left my trusty Leak fired up for comparison. Imagine my surprise on discovering that

digital and analogue broadcasts are not simultaneous. Something like about half a second separates them. This is handy if you missed the last couple of words which were said ... which were said, but it makes a mockery of the time signal which is broadcast in different versions too. Nice of them to offer a choice of exact times, depending on which broadcasting medium you're listening through. Since the digital signal is the one which lags, I suppose it could be fairly said that paying out for digital radio gives you

a second's worth.

Since there is not a separate radio license any longer, and I don't have television, grumbling about BBC or commercial radio is like looking a expensive gift horse rather painstakingly in the mouth.

Force me to shell out my hard-earned for a new tuner because mine won't have anything to receive in a few years' time and my quiescence might evaporate, however.

Betamax lost a straightforward commercial battle with an alternative system which had, for all its shortcomings, the advantage of cheapness. Shellac records were superseded by vinyl; vinyl has been superseded by CD which will in turn be shunted by higher resolution formats; cassette is dying a natural and peaceful death: what's the difference between these and digital radio?

When a 'fixed' medium is superseded, it does not disappear. As I've remarked before, archive and cherished performances remain available though a variety of outlets. If you don't want the fuss of setting up to play 78s or famous LP recordings, you can buy the remastered CD. If you can't bear to lose the side-splitting 'comic' cassettes you recorded in your childhood, you can transfer them to MiniDisc before you throw your cassette machine into the dustbin.

When FM radio goes off the air, every one of the millions of FM tuners and radio sets will be fit only for the same dustbin, because digital is 'convenient'. "Convenient for whom . .?" is a question we don't ask.

So it's easy then to forget that audiophiles have another reason to thank Naim - the contribution its founder Julian Vereker made to the philosophical debate that dominated hi-fi some twenty five years ago. As the twenty first century starts in earnest, how many people remember what the hi-fi world was like back then?

Lest we forget, the seventies was a tremendous boom time for audio. Hi-fi was finally making the transition from the province of soldering iron wielding hobbyists to the status of mainstream consumer durable. Falling prices,

thanks to the massive cost savings from using transistors and integrated circuits, made audio electronics accessible to 'ordinary' consumers for the first time.

This meant that large numbers of virgin hi-fi buyers - people who wanted to play their Beatles albums and disco singles on something better than a Dansette portable - suddenly found themselves in High Street hi-fi retailers. Those with long memories will recall how these emporia were organised, with vast rows of speakers from the likes of Wharfedale, Celestion and KEF dominating shop floors. This embodied the assumption that, as the sound came out of loudspeakers then loudspeakers were what determined the sound. Early seventies hi-fi magazines did little to challenge this seemingly commonsense idea. Indeed, journalists of the day would counsel their readers to spend high proportions of a system's overall cost on great big boxes packing vast quantities of drive units.

By contrast, turntables were almost an afterthought. Indeed, with the advent of decks like Technics' SL1200 there seemed

little reason to ever buy anything else. After all, it rotated at an extremely accurate 33.333 RPM and made no rumble at all, so what more could you want? As for amplifiers, they simply had to be 'a piece of wire with gain' as Quad's founder once famously said. Given the advent of transistor amps with their supremely low distortion figures, the only choice that faced buyers was watts-per-channel and the feature count.

It was in this context that Naim's Julian Vereker (together with Linn's Ivor Tiefenbrun) asserted that the entire industry had got it wrong. Rather than speakers being the critical determinants of a system's sound quality, they argued that there was a hierarchy at work, starting with the turntable, then the amplification,

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and finally the speakers. Using the computer industry's 'garbage in, garbage out' adage they preached the importance of turntables and amplification above loudspeakers, attempting to turn conventional wisdom completely on its head.

To say they were greeted with disdain is an understatement. Cynics remarked upon what a surprise it was to find manufacturers of expensive turntables and amps arguing that people should spend their money on expensive turntables and amps, as opposed to expensive loudspeakers. Linn and Naim were duly dismissed as opportunists by certain quarters of the industry, not least much of the established hi-fi press. Of course, it was absolutely right and true to point out the two companies' vested interests, but this didn't make their argument wrong. Indeed, they were both absolutely, demonstrably right.

What followed was the spectacle of two charismatic young industry upstarts giving buyers, salesmen and journalists severe 'GBH on the ear hole'. They started a debate about system hierarchy that totally dominated the hi-fi press for nearly a decade. In true Cold War fashion, dealers, punters and hacks divided up into two opposing factions - one arguing the source was everything, the other that it was all one giant con and a 'sensibly balanced' system was the way to it.

Huge amounts of industry politicking ensued and things got absurdly reductive you were either Linn/Naim 'disciples' or thought they were con tricksters, and never the twain did meet. In hindsight Naim probably suffered from this, the upshot being that they were branded by some as 'flat earther' extremists.

In the 'post flat earth', valve friendly, multi format nineties. I fear many British audiophiles unfairly overlooked the brand, associating it with all the media wrangling of the seventies and eighties. Having just parted with Hi-Fi World's CDX/ NAC82/ NAP250/ HI-CAP review system, this a shame because in some respects it's the best I've ever heard - and further proof that Julian Vereker was

absolutely right to say what

he once said.

t's been nearly a year now, and friends still think I'm quite mad. A year, that is, since I voluntarily ditched my television set, deciding instead to rely upon music, radio, books, magazines and the internet for my in-house entertainment. You may or may not be surprised that, apart from the odd Grand Prix and drama, I've not missed it once. It also means that when I do occasionally come across TV, as I did the other week on holiday, then certain programs catch my attention far more than they ever did before. One such program was a typical Sunday evening money/financial offering that caught my eye as it featured "the revolution in the recording industry"

The revolution, of course, being the effect of being able to download MP3

music files from the Internet, free of charge. As readers of this magazine, I'm sure most of you are fully aware of the process and the possible consequences to the record industry, so I won't go into detail here. However, one

interview that I did find astounding was with a group of American college students. They openly admitted to the interviewer that they hardly ever bought CDs any more as they simply downloaded everything they needed, in MP3 format, from Internet sites. One even boasted of a collection of over 3000 music files. When asked if they would pay, even just 50c a track, for the music, the interviewer was met with derision.

The idea of paying record companies for music downloads seemed absurd to these folks. Furthermore, when asked if they had any concerns about the longterm effect to musicians and record producers, the interviewer was met with blank faces and apathy. As a music lover, the attitude struck by these students I found abominable for two reasons. The first, and most obvious, is that if no one pays musicians then there's little incentive for them to produce music in the first place. The second, and less obvious, is the lack of discernment shown in respect to music format. College is usually the

time when most students will acquire their first decent hi-fi system.

Again, as someone who appreciates music and what it's played on, I find the idea of a party featuring MP3 files played through a computer based audio system abhorrent. Perhaps I'm being condescending in my attitude, but I couldn't help but think that if this is the world's single remaining superpowers youth's idea of music, then the future of hi-fi reproduction looks pretty grim. Rather than progressing, hi-fi formats appear to regress by the day. MP3, MiniDisc, Digital Audio Broadcasting, and even CD, for that matter, all work by compressing music signals. Ambience, detail and the very breath of music all seem to be compromised for the sake of

> convenience and supposed perfection from hiss, crackles and pops.

Let's just hope that this is one fashion that we don't adopt from our stateside cousins. But before this particular young fogey lapses into a malaise of pessimism, please allow me to indulge in some optimism! On returning to work at the hi-fi store I manage, I was struck by just how many students, some even still at school, are still as excited about hi-fi separates as ever. It's not just particular technologies, such as portable MiniDisc and MP3 players that they are interested in, either. Many are still buying full hi-fi separate systems (thank heavens for student loans). One such guy started student life with a classic system from ten or so

years ago; A NAD 5120 record deck, Cambridge P25 amp and Mission 760 'speakers. Over the years I've seen him become well and truly smitten by the hi-fi "bug", upgrading to a Pioneer Precision amp and CD player, KEF floorstanders, and a Project 2 turntable. Alas he is no longer a customer, but then that's because I've nothing in the store that would improve upon his present system: Nottingham Analogue turntable, twin Musical Fidelity power amps and Mission 754 Freedom 'speakers. Quite an upgrade path from such a basic start! While he may be in the minority, I know he's not alone and there are plenty of others out there rediscovering their record and CD collections every time they upgrade. As a self confessed vinyl freak it also pleases me that the mixing/DJ-ing phenomenon that began five or six years ago, has yet to relent. Vinyl is still 'cool', and sales of mixing decks are as strong as they've ever been over the past decade.

So, as I sit back in front of the radio at night, pipe in hand, slippers on feet, I can rest assured that we've some way to go before the enthusiasm for

# amplifiers

## PRIMARE A 10 vs CYRUS 5

Both the Cyrus and the Primare amplifier produce a healthy 50W per channel into  $8\Omega$ . Lack of space has likely affected transformer regulation of the Cyrus a bit, power rising to 72W into  $4\Omega$  - not a large increase. By way of contrast the Primare amplifier managed an exemplary performance in this area, producing 100W into  $4\Omega$ . Of the two I would expect the Primare to exhibit more grip and slam, possibly a bit more apparent dynamism.

Both amplifiers produced little distortion, even when asked to deliver high power at 10kHz - an arduous but revealing test. Although figures for the Primare were a little higher, this means little in itself. A reasonably linear circuit arrangement with low feedback will yield better sonic results even if distortion figures are not ground-breaking.

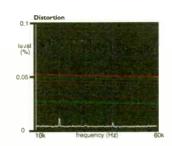
Sensitivities were similar too, the Cyrus being a bit more useful in requiring just 230mV for full output.

Both amplifiers will reproduce subsonics effectively, frequency response reaching down to 4Hz. The high frequency limit measured around 50kHz with both.

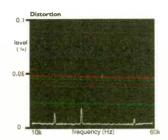
There's little between these two ampli-

fiers in measured performance. The Primare has a very good power supply and looks pretty good all-round, giving it a slight advantage. **NK**

# loudspeakers

#### **CASTLE PEMBROKE**

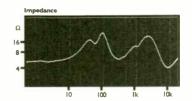
Castle use a novel bass loading system where a port fires downward through the base of the cabinet, held just above the floor by spacers on a plinth. This damps and detunes the port somewhat, which in my experience seems to be a good thing. It often results in tighter, smoother bass that sounds less "bouncy" than that from a conventional reflex loudspeaker. The Pembroke's port works from 40Hz to 200Hz, overlapping output from the small, carbon-fibre bass/midrange unit that works down to 125Hz. This means the port delivers all bass output; it doesn't act as a fill-in at lower frequencies, its centre frequency being a high 60Hz. It's an unusual arrangement and in past Castle models, a successful one.

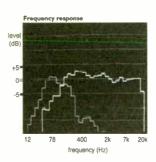
The bass/midrange unit has a phase plug

to smooth higher frequencies before crossing over to the tweeter, which itself is smooth and should be coloration free. The Pembroke should sound accurate, smooth, low in coloration and it is likely to sound quite full-blooded in the bass, but tuneful and even.

Sensitivity was a healthy 88dB sound pressure level from one watt, impedance measuring  $8\Omega$ . The impedance curve wanders around a bit; there's reactance around 4kHz, the crossover frequency. Impedance does not sink too low though, so current draw is not excessive and the 'speaker is a reasonable load overall.

The Pembroke measures very well and looks interesting technically. **NK** 





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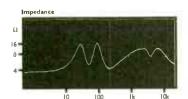
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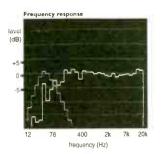
#### **MAGNAT 710**

The Magnat 710s have an almost academically flat frequency response, with a very shallow trough around 3kHz and a lift up toward high frequencies. I would expect them to sound detailed and a little glassybright. The port is tuned to 40Hz and has a reasonably broad response, suggesting it is well damped. It integrates with forward output well, covering most of the deep bass range - not uncommon nowadays. The Magnats are well engineered in terms of frequency response, being flat and wide, with just a little lift at spectrum extremes to add life.

Sensitivity was a high 88dB from a nominal watt of input, but since impedance measured  $6.6\Omega$  overall the 'speakers' were drawing a little more than a watt. All the same, for their size they will go loud. A smooth impedance curve means there's little reactance in the load, ignoring the usual phase reversals around bass resonance of course.

The Magnats are well engineered in every area and should provide fine results.





#### MISSION 782

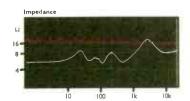
A ceramic cone like that used in Mission's 782 tested here is coloration-free and will give a smooth frequency response over its useful operating range, Our analysis shows this reasonably well, although there are some disturbances from room reflections (non anechoic) to take into account, because this is not a near-field response.

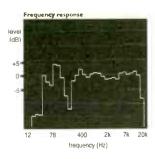
On-axis the mid-range rolls off slowly before the tweeter starts to come into play, producing a shallow midrange suckout followed by a high frequency lift, analysis showed. Listened to on-axis the 782s are likely to sound bright and the tweeter a little divorced. The speakers are designed to be pointed straight down the room (i.e. not toed in) and, when measured a little offaxis, on the bass unit side (they're asymmetric in response) we recorded the flat response shown here. Obviously placement will be important, although good phasing makes the speakers sound reasonably con-

sistent from a wide range of angles.

The bass unit integrates in the far field reasonably well, the suckout shown narrowing to one-third octave or less, the effect being room/distance dependent. Bass output was strong and extends down to 40Hz, below which cutoff is sharp. I'd expect solid bass and plenty of it.

The impedance curve is unusually flat around bass resonance and free from heavy reactance further up too. Energy storage will be very low and amplifier matching consistent. An overall impedance of  $7\Omega$  suggests low current draw which, together with low reactance, means the 782s are very amplifier-friendly. Sensitivity was a little low at 85dB however, so around 60W or more will be useful. **NK** 





#### O'HEOCHA

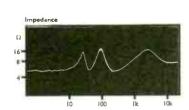
A phase suckout between bass/mid and treble unit on one of the first pair of these loudspeakers caused us to request a second pair. This time both 'speakers were phased correctly, but overall the response is lumpy and correlation between the two loudspeakers was none too good. I'd expect them to be a little bright, due to some treble lift, but bass is likely to be dry and probably light. The port seems none too well integrated with forward response, which may make bass sound less than cohesive

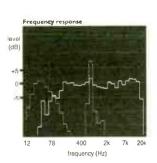
The O'Heochas quite obviously had a vent whistle and this can be seen as a massive spike at 800Hz in the port output trace. The forward response also has a peak at this point, as good an illustration as any

of how resonances show up as blips in frequency response.

Sensitivity was low at 83dB; the O'Heochas will need quite a lot of power to go loud but, as always, small loudspeakers cannot take too much. Around 60W should be about right. Impedance measured  $7.7\Omega$  overall and the impedance curve is smooth enough, meaning the 'speakers are not a reactive load. They should be easy enough for amplifiers to drive.

The O'Heochas need further development before they start to challenge loudspeakers their own size from experienced manufacturers like Mission, KEF and Tannoy. NK





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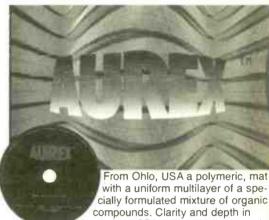

## NAIM NAC82, NAP250 &CDX

Naim's NAP250 power amplifier produces 72W into an  $8\Omega$  load , rising to 121W into a  $4\Omega$  load. Naim use good power supplies in order to give bass some slam, and the NAP250 benefits in this fashion. It has enough power to make modern loudspeakers go loud and it will handle low impedance loads, distortion rising only a modest amount with rising current draw, but it is no power-house

Other Naim characteristics which the NAP250 followed were high input sensitivity of 80mV and reasonably low distortion at all powers and frequencies. Our distortion analysis shows 0.02% at 10kHz, IW output with equal amounts of second and third harmonic, a fairly innocuous characteristic.

Naim curtail the upper frequency response limit of their amplifiers, this NAC82/NAP250 combination reaching out to 22kHz, like others I have tested in the past.

The CDX player has obvious filter ripple above 4kHz and frequency response rolls down above 10kHz. It looks like an early Philips player and uses conventional 16-bit technology (i.e. pre- Bitstream), since Naim prefer the sound. The distortion residual at -30dB also looks much like that from earlier players, the distortion spectrum varying on each channel. Levels were a little higher than that of later players, but not too bad all the same, measuring 0.04% at -30dB and a good

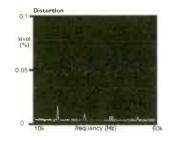
0.43% at -60dB, hence the excellent dynamic range figure of 108dB.

Both the amplifier and the CDX player measure reasonably, if a little differently from most rivals. Naim are proud of their distinctive sound, at which measured performance only hints. **NK**

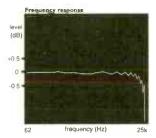

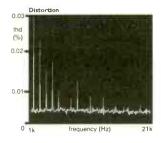

# cd recorders

#### LG ADR-620

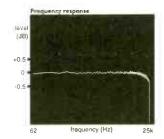
From the analogue record inputs through to the analogue record outputs our frequency response analysis shows the ADR-620 measures well, response ranging from 4Hz-20.8kHz within IdB. A slight roll down at the top end, visible at right in the trace, will aid subjective smoothness.

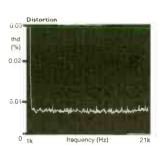
There was little distortion, from full signal level down to a low level of -60dB. Even at -90dB, distortion was lower than usual, reaching 6.5%. Our distortion analysis at -90dB, taken through both the a/d and d/a convertors in record/pause clearly shows an absence of either distortion harmonics or quantisation noise. This machine has quality digital convertors.

With good channel separation of -80dB, a normal output level of 2.1V and a high sensitivity of 230mV, the ADR-620 looks

well designed all round. NK

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## **PHILIPS CDR775**

I wasn't surprised that Philips' new CDR775 turned in a tidy measured performance. However, this is not an expensive flagship product and there were a few weaknesses.

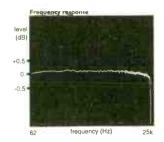
At around -4dB on the record gain control setting, bursts of digital noise appeared at the output. They were not great, sitting on the limits of audibility, but this sort of thing is indicative of less than optimum digital circuitry. At lower gain levels the problem cleared but, since sensitivity was low at 600mV, high gain settings will be needed when recording.

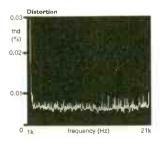
Distortion levels were respectably low; frequency response flat and wide through the A/D and D/A convertors. Through the D/A, with the machine acting as a playback device, results were very good, approaching the best possible.

As an analogue (input) recorder using CD-R/RW to replace cassette (for example) the CDR775 was good, if not perfect. As a

digital copier and/or a CD playback device the machine measured very well. **NK**

## TEAC RW-800

A few peculiarities reared their heads with this recorder. There's an unusual peak at 21kHz in the frequency response. The spectrum analyzer could not resolve this effect in a stable fashion, using long term averaging of phase stable pseudo-random noise. It may have been due to ringing or a phase-incoherent spurious signal. With frequency response flat up to 20kHz or so the peak in itself will be of little subjective consequence, but it suggests there are other problems.

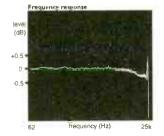
The recorder also produced digital noise at high settings (above 7) of the record level control. The noise floor rose quite significantly as a result, the figure of -82dB being pretty mediocre for a 16-bit digital coding system. Sensitivity was a useful 300mV at full gain, delivering a standard 2V out at 0dB.

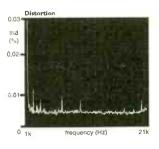
Distortion levels were low, the spectrum analyzer measuring true distortion rather than uncorrelated digital noise.

Nevertheless at full record gain the noise spikes looked bad when measuring distor-

#### **CLEARAUDIO VICTORY**

Our analysis clearly shows the Victory has a strong treble peak, centred at 10kHz and rising to +6dB - a very large increase. Expensive cartridges these days offer almost ruler flat responses; there's little justification for the Victory's characteristic, which will give a bright and harsh sound.

Distortion from lateral stylus movement measured 1%, a normal enough figure. Tracking angle error was high, leading to 7% second harmonic distortion from this source. Subjectively it isn't as bad as it sounds.

Tracking was good at low frequencies and in the midband at the excessive 3gms quoted, but the cartridge bottomed out. It should track at 2gms, which gives degraded but still

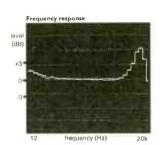
satisfactory tracking.

Channel separation was satisfactory at 24dB. Output was quite high as moving coils go, measuring 0.7mV at 3.54cms/sec, or 1mV at 5cms/sec (rms).

By current standards measured performance of the Victory was poor and the quoted VTF excessive. NK

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# CAN YOU LIVE WITHOUT IT

I spend a lot of time evaluating all items of hi-fi (and home cinema), from turntables to cartridges, amps,

home cinema), from turntables to cartridges, amps, speakers, interconnects, speaker cables, stands, and equipment racks, Sometimes things can be extremely close, and I could happily live with any of those items that I stock, otherwise I wouldn't stock them.

It doesn't strangely work quite so well on the ATC 50 actives although basically a better speaker. I wouldn't want to live without that sound. But one of the things I miss most when I have loaned it out, is the Townsend Seismic Sink stand or the Arcici stand, both using air

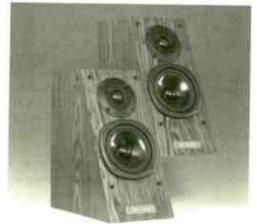
miss most when I have loaned it out, is the Townsend Seismic Sink stand or the Arcici stand, both using air suspension. You get so used to the sound you get when sitting your components on these units and you forget how much contribution they are making, until you take them away. I referred to this 2 months ago, but as there isn't much new around at the moment, I thought I'd remind you. They aren't cheap, but can be far more worthwhile an upgrade than changing amp or speakers. So do come and hear how dramatically they can change a fairly modest system.

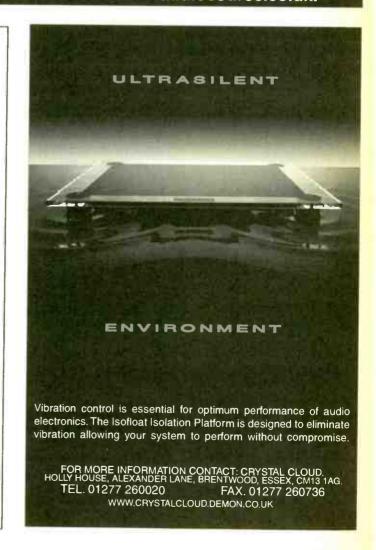

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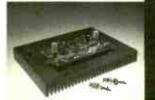
