

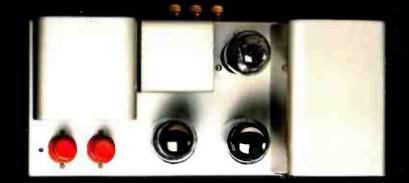

QUAD II Jour



y recent experiences with DVD-A have urged me to put fingers to keyboard. It's no surprise the major lapanese hardware

manufacturers (like Matsushita and Pioneer) see DVD-A as the future primary music carrier to replace CD. Another voice of confidence comes from the music industry in the shape of none other than Warner Bros. Ltd. A flurry of titles are now available in the UK. However, they only use 24/ 96 multichannel information (as well as a two channel down-mix), as opposed to the sonically superior 24/192 two channel option available in Japan.

Music formats are sold as being 'as close to the live experience as possible', but you get something at home with multichannel DVD-A that you won't get in any concert hall I've been to - violins coming at you from the back right!

This may not concern the music buying public as a whole, but audiophiles or classical music fanatics may think differently. Those with listening experience and attuned ears would benefit from the superlative quality and natural ease that 24/192 audio information has over the theatrics of multichannel

Truth is, multichannel is easier to sell to the artists and producers, as it's unlikely that they'll sign up to another (more expensive) stereo format, especially for remasters. Few people will buy yet another two channel recording of the same piece. Remember that most sensible rock and pop artists enter the business for fame and money, which comes from vast unit sales, not from low volume audiophile releases.

Then we have the old chestnut of getting all those components and loudspeakers into a 'real world' home. Every manufacturer's brochure I've seen, without fail, presumes their customers are prepared to live in a computer generated, minimalist, spacious apartment-style dwelling with laminated floors, no clutter or books and no 'speaker cable! Fine if we're all young, free, single and rich, but we aren't!

These people are fully aware that interior design and home improvement is the new religion. Do they think a multiplex sized telly and plethora of boxes look appealing, or even practical, in a 13x13' nineteenth century front room? Of course, the likes of Mission among others realise that smaller is possible and more discrete - but whether you can paint over them or not - cables are cables and some people really don't like them.

Personally I can't see the multichannel DVD-A format catching on as much as the industry, man and dog (no offence meant!), would have us believe. For a start, CD 'switchers' in hi-fi retailing will have to stock up on countless boxes of multichannel amps and 'speakers. Plus, I'm sure that at some stage the surround-sound novelty will wear thin with both artists and record companies alike, as sales fail to take off. And as for targeting existing DVD player users, it's well known that over half of all DVD players in the UK are plugged straight into a TV, so they're not really for audio purposes anyway.

No, the future of the DVD-A format lies in the two channel variety, which could become an awesome audiophile format, Lut only if prices permit and software and hardware become more prevalent. Then it will become a music carrier for the majority, rather than a minority. 📒

RING RECYCLE!

An event for both classical music lovers and audiophiles is taking place in London on Sunday June 24th June. In August 1973 Wagner's complete Ring Cycle was performed at the London Colosseum conducted by Reginald Goodall. These performances were actually recorded and released in the 1970s to great critical acclaim and they are now available again on Chandos records. On June 24th the Colosseum will once again hear these performances of the complete Ring cycle in one day, in the Goodall Ring Experience, thanks to a specially built and installed sound system from ATC Loudspeaker Technology comprising of four SCM 300A speakers per channel.

The recordings will be presented in a special version introduced by David Ritch who worked on the original recordings. The Wagner marathon lasts from 10am to 7pm with a lunch break and tickets are priced at £8 available from the following box office number: 020 7632 8300. Partners of Wagner lovers forced to attend may well wish to take along their sleeping bags!

PHILIPS LAUNCH MINI-EXPANIUM

An intriguing press release from Philips has winged its way to us through e-mail. Philips intends to launch a mini-CD player this autumn. It's an Expanium product, meaning it will play mp3s as well as CDs.

The release is as interesting for what it doesn't say as what it does. Another Expanium player might not seem like much, but this one will not play ordinary CDs at all! It will only play the currently rare mini-CD which is just 8cm (nominally 3in) in diameter. The mini-CD plays for 20 minutes. The EXP401 will also play mp3 files recorded to CD, ranging from 32kbps-320kbps. That means from poor speech quality right up to top quality.

The usual rate for mp3 is 128kbps and at this rate the new Expanium will give 3 hours playing time from a mini-CD. At the max rate of 320kbps (kilobits per second), an mp3 file gives sound quality almost indistinguishable from CD yet the Expanium will still give 1 hour 20minutes playing time. At this data rate music is compressed 4:1, slightly less than MiniDisc. A mini-CD is exactly the same width as MiniDisc too, so it looks as if Philips is pitching a rival to MD in this new player.

Philips describe the new player as "pocket sized" but we got only a sketch and no quoted dimensions. Since Philips Expanium website (www.expanium.philips.com) fails to mention the EXP401, this looks like a hasty press release to let people know what Philips have as an alternative to Dataplay and memory cards, like SD Card.

The player has what Philips claim is a fast track navigation system with LCD display showing album and track number. It can be programmed to play up to 50 tracks and has shuffle play and intro scan. There is a Hold mode, a headphone output and an AC/DC adapter. The unit runs from a single AA battery, but duration wasn't quoted. Weight is 220gms. The EXP401 will

read 8cm audio CDs, CD-Rs and CD-RWs. Philips say later this year they will announce "a whole range of portable audio products and home audio systems featuring MP3-CD playback".

What Philips doesn't say in this press release is where mini-CDs are to

be found! They are rare in shops and recordable blank discs don't yet exist in the U.K. Obviously there's much more to come. Mini-CD could be about to get a big boost to make it a much more visible medium.

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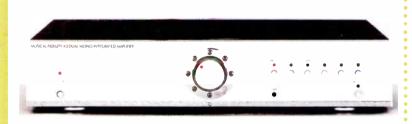

Warner Music's launch of DVD-A titles came last month with a gathering of the press from both the music and technology fields, as well as specialist audio publications. The high publicity affair was hosted by Classic FM DJ Paul Gambaccini at the Mayfair Club in London. Andy Murray of Warner Music UK described the music giant's commitment to the format and their belief in it as the primary music carrier of the future. This was followed by a brief description of the technology and its possibilities by Bob Stuart of Meridian who commented on the number of forces needed to join together to ensure the success of the format.

Meridian then hosted a series of impressive listening demos using a top of the range system consisting of a five channel DSP8000 'speaker array and 861 processor, plus sub, along with the first ever airing of the system using the company's DVD-A player which is due out later in the year. Using a selection of Warner discs including excerpts from Dvorak's 'New World Symphony', Fleetwood Mac's 'Rumours, Joni Mitchell's "Both Sides Now' and The Door's 'LA Woman', sound quality was impressive.

WAIT FOR 'A' SECOND



More news from the fellows at Musical Fidelity. As if it isn't enough that the company are making new hi-fi products like they're going out of fashion, yet another amplifier joins the company ranks. The classic A3 integrated has had a make over and the latest incarnation apparently improves speed and attack, and has better tonal refinement with improved imaging. All the changes are purely internal and the original striking build quality and casework remain. It uses the Nu-Vista M3 power supply design in a dual mono configuration but doesn't demand a higher price than its highly regarded predecessor. It's available from the start of June priced at £900.

NEW BABY BOXES FROM CYRUS

The latest 'speaker of three new designs from Cyrus is their 'entry level' CLS50 baby bookshelf model. Hot on the heels of the NXT panel Icon and the standmount CLS70, the CLS50 was conceived "for customers who require high performance but are limited by space". The 50s are a twoway bass reflex design featuring a 130mm bass/mid driver and a 25mm silk dome tweeter. The port is borrowed from the larger CLS70s to ensure a deep and solid bass



response. Available in a range of real wood veneers, the CLS50s are priced at £425 along with tuned 'high speed' matching plate glass and solid wood stands priced at £200.

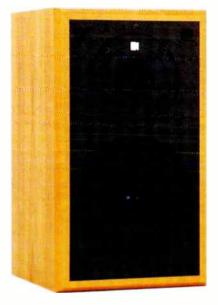

KEF'S 'ACE' IN THE HOLE

Always at the forefront of loudspeaker technology, KEF have announced what they describe as "an exciting and important technological breakthrough" in the form of their new Acoustic Compliance Enhancement, otherwise known as ACE. The new technology is an attempt to create a larger sound from smaller cabinets, the constant bane of every loudspeaker designer. The company say it achieves its goal by creating a "virtual cabinet" from using the unique surface action of activated carbon which is often used to 'mop up' certain types of molecules. A loose-weave bag of activated carbon granules in put into the cabinet during construction - it's as simple as that!

This is how KEF say it works: as the diaphragm compresses the air inside the cabinet, so the carbon absorbs more air molecules. Less resistance is experienced by the diaphragm, as it would if the cabinet was larger. As the diaphragm moves in the opposite direction, reducing air pressure within the cabinet, the activated carbon releases air molecules (desorption) so that again it appears to the drive unit as if it is operating within a larger enclosure. Although the 'increase' of cabinet size is basically a trick, KEF say the benefits arc the same as an actual volume increase would be. It all begs one question: if it's that simple, why didn't anyone else think of it? The technology has a patent and the first product to use it will be released later in the year.

Pioneer have just launched their first UK DVD-A 'universal' player. Simon Pope raids his software library to check out the DV-939A.



ioneer have been at the forefront of DVD-Audio development since its inception, their R&D and product marketing department forever bombarding the media with information and format championing. Now we have a UK product on which to judge their commitment and hardware manufacturing ability.

The company have had what can be described as a truly "universal" player out in the Land of the Rising Sun for quite a while now, which has the ability to read not only the DVD-A, DVD-V and CD discs that this spinner can handle, but also SACDs (not the multichannel type, however). The 939A reviewed here cannot, alas, claim the same impressive data format compatibility as its prestigious Japanese cousin. Despite this the 939A is still very impressive and as 'universal' as one can expect at the present in the UK.

The Pioneer comes with a ghostly backlit loading drawer, dimmable, incidently for those who find it a little too spooky. Everything that ought to be onboard is duly there. Both Dolby Digital and DTS decoders are included, random and block video noise reduction, compatibility with CD-R/RW discs, a 10-bit/54MHz video digital-toanalogue convertor, as well as multiple audio DACs in the shape of the company's AD1852 24-bit/192kHz employed for the main left and right channels and 24/96 AD1854s utilised by the surround channels.

Build quality is very good, although not Sherman tank-like - the unit weighing around 12kg. Inside the chassis, though, there's some definite attention to detail such as comprehensive damping. The power supply is sophisticated and the audio circuits are all separately screened.

Connections are fairly extensive, consisting of two S-Video outputs, two Scart outputs and a component video with progressive scan capability. The usual analogue and digital audio outputs are located on the rear, too. The finish is satin gold, which matches the company's multichannel amplifiers, and the DVD recognition LEDs are the now ubiquitous piercing blue.

MINOR OPERATION

Unlike some of the other DVD-A players I've encountered, the Pioneer is user friendly and informative when it comes to operation and set up. The on-screen menus are clear and easy to use and the plethora of features found on the machine are easily used. The remote is by far one of the most comprehensive of the range of DVD-A players available and features a handy jog wheel and a bright backlight function for those who want the full cinematic experience of a darkened theatre.

PIONEERING SOUND

Since our last meeting with a DVD-A player, a little gift from the good fellows at Technics meant that I could now try out the Pioneer with a two channel 24bit/192 kHz resolution DVD-A disc from Japan - veritable gold dust in the UK at present. This is where DVD-A can really come into its own, with the ability to produce sound quality exceeding anything that we have hitherto experienced from a digital medium. The 939A didn't disappoint with this jazz disc from the Japanese audiophile Ewe label. The singer's voice had a striking naturalness to it (apart from a remarkably unnatural vibrato, that is) in the opening track 'A New York State Of Mind'. The accompanying piano was also free from the mechanical edge often found in digital audio and remained naturally balanced and full sounding throughout, never too plummy or harsh.

Vocals had a spookily real presence smack in the middle of my Quad 988s and as well as natural timbre (smooth but not overtly "rolled-off"), sibilance was kept to a minimum but was also convincingly real.

This is a great recording and shows, along with the Pioneer player, just what can be had from DVD-A as a purist two-channel audiophile medium. Further down the track



listing a drum kit is added to the mix and this gave an insight into the speed and attack of the Pioneer player. The drums were intricately detailed, with a sweet cymbal tone, and they were also as quick as Schumacher off the grid. Other accompanying instruments, such electric organ, were warm and again natural.

Whilst, like most audiophile recordings, this wouldn't be my personal choice for musical edification, such a recording in conjunction with the Pioneer machine can demonstrate what high resolution audio formats offer. They have a natural and effortless sound, together with jaw-dropping detail - equal to SACD at it's very best.

RHYTHM AND BLUES

The next discs in the Pioneer's drawer were a selection of the latest DVD-A releases from the Warner stable. First was the Barenboim recording of Beethoven's Symphony No.9 from the Teldec cycle. These recordings suffer a little from very odd mixing, in which the first violins come from back right as well as having correct front-left 'echoes' - a disconcerting effect to say the least and unlike any venue I've ever sat in, except the back pew of St. Paul's Cathedral.

Apart from this, and a little stretching of tempi here and there, the playing and singing is very good and the recording clean and detailed. Through the Pioneer in 24/96 multichannel the woodwind floated ethereally and the music certainly encompassed me in a very involving way. Although it wasn't the smoothest sound I'd heard from DVD-A discs, with a slight edge to the upper registers, it was very exciting and rhythmic. The same rhythmic grip was found in The Door's 'LA Woman' (one of the best sounding multichannel discs available as yet). The gentle Blues sway of 'The Cars Hiss By My Window' has steady control and a toe tapping infectiousness. Morrison's vocals were suitably gruff and warm in turns and the accompanying mix clean and detailed

It was now time to move on to more formats in the shape of DVDvideo discs and good old CD. A favourite DVD disc of mine is one in stereo PCM of two New Order gigs, one from 1981 and the other from 1998's Reading festival. The picture quality was excellent and the sound equally impressive; good thumping bass lines on the dance tracks and a sense of a real live experience.

A pleasant surprise came with the 939's CD playback quality. It has the speed and control of a good £600 CD player. A selection of both classical, in the shape of Mahler's seventh symphony (DG) and Beethoven's middle guartets (Philips Classics) and rock/dance (Screaming Trees and Underworld) showed that the player has control and speed. The 939 managed to keep the demanding Mahler piece together with a firm grip over the orchestral forces. Each layer of the orchestration was easily discernable and precise; climaxes were powerful and controlled. The DV-939A emphasised the colours in the instrumentation, with woodwind light and floaty and bass sharp and rounded.

The Beethoven quartets lacked the smoothness that can be found in other players but the lines were well balanced and the playing detailed. With rock and dance CDs, the



Pioneer had rhythmic clout and attack. Drums in the screaming Trees 'Dust' album charged like a wounded buffalo and the bass guitar had sharp and exact reproduction - this player certainly has groove. Again, bass and rhythm played the lead role in Underworld's thumping 'Push, Upstairs'. The rumbling bass line powered through the Quads and the higher frequency electronic percussion added to the rhythmic drive with its sharp and focussed detail.

The Pioneer is a great all rounder, playing DVD-A discs (especially two channel 24/192) with detail and insight and ordinary CDs with a controlled and fast sound that rivals the best £500-£700 players around. The DV-939 doesn't have the smoothest or most sophisticated sound in the traditional easy going high end mould but it's very detailed and fast. An enjoyable player with any format.

Boston Glee Party

The new VR range from Boston Acoustics sees the company launch a new entry level range. Simon Pope checks out the baby VR-M50.

he new VR range of 'speakers' feature Boston's usual fine build quality and detailed finish. Although measuring a comparatively minute 251 x 181 x 230mm (h,w,d) they weigh 5.5kg a piece, which is fairly substantial for a 'speaker of this size. It is mainly due to their superb cabinet quality. A good rap on the side of an enclosure results in a dead and knuckle swelling 'thok' which usually signifies a neutral sound free from cabinet coloration. Heavy internal bracing is used.

Apart from the slightly intrusive plastic moulding of the grill and AMD tweeter (more of which later) the VR-M50s are undeniably attractive customers. A classy polished cherry veneer is matched by an equally polished grey gloss top panel which blends well to create a pseudo-Art Deco look that fits well into any environment.

Boston Acoustics pride themselves on the care and attention to detail (both sonically and cosmetically) that a £700 bookshelf 'speaker demands. All aspects of the development and manufacturing process are 'in house', including drive unit design. The 135mm co-polymer bass/mid unit uses a die-cast aluminium basket to keep the moving parts in alignment. This part also conducts heat away from the voice coil, which Boston claim increases power and maximizes output.

High frequencies are dealt with via Boston's 25mm aluminium tweeter which features the company's Amplitude Modification Device (AMD). This is an acoustic tuning assembly positioned in front of the metal dome. It comprises five ducts of slightly varying lengths which are 'tuned' to result in a smooth, flat response. The tuning of these ducts, say the company, is so influential that the AMD is an important and innovative part of the loudspeaker that significantly improves sound quality. Tuning the AMD is a critical process that demands watchmaker standards.

To the rear of the Bostons there is a quality gold-plated set of biwirable terminals and a port of reasonable size, flared at both ends to reduce turbulence.

The first noticeable trait of these 'speakers is good integration between drive units. There is a seamlessness to their sound that makes it both fluid and natural, never trying too hard to impress. It's also a bigger sound than you'd imagine from the cabinet size, with an out-of-the-box quality often found with standmount designs at this price.

Playing contemporary pop and rock recordings such as Supergrass's self titled album and Everything But The Girl's Walking Wounded, the 50s showed a good strong bass response that was fast and taut, and deep enough for any smaller sized listening room (placed about two/three feet from a rear wall).

A good grip on rhythms was present and the sound reached a high overall quality, with very little coloration.

A slight concern came with high frequencies. Whilst well extended and integrated with the bass/mid unit, the treble isn't to my ears the smoothest or sweetest around, sometimes cymbals could be a little too forward and splashy and guitars and higher vocals a tad grating. This quality is inherent in most metal dome units I've come across however, and remains popular with some manufacturers and buyers who like a bright

sound. Although I don't find it the easiest listen, it certainly isn't dull.

With warmer recordings such as Miles Davis's Kind Of Blue or Beethoven's middle string quartets played by the Quartet Italiano on a Philips mid seventies analogue recording the 50s gave a full and smooth performance, trumpets and violins not suffering from the over brightness found with rock and pop music.

Due to the small size of the 50s a lack of fullness and scope is inevitable but what they lack in size they make up for in midrange detail which is very good indeed, with imaging to match.

These baby bookshelfs aren't cheap but they're very well put together. They aren't perhaps for my taste the best around at the price but they are undeniably good quality if you like a forward and exciting sound. The treble can be a little unbalanced with modern bright recordings but bass is tight and fast and the midrange full in presence and very clear.

Competition is strong in the shape of similarly pried and sized 'speakers from Dali (slightly better balanced) and Opera (smoother but less exciting), for example. All the same the Bostons should definitely be on the listening list.

LAST MAN Standing?

David Price spends some time with Sony's new MDS-JA333ES MiniDisc player.



iniDisc, as everyone will tell you, is on the way out. Sales are plummeting, and the spurt the format enjoyed between 1998 and 1999 now looks like ancient history. It was precisely at this stage that record players made great strides in sound quality (Lingo LP12, Michell Orbe). CD is also finally sounding great (albeit at a price thanks to the likes of Linn's CD12 and Marantz's SA-1), just when it, too, looks ripe for the chop...

This must be catching, because in MD's dying days, Sony's new MDS-JA333ES shows the fabulous sound that the little format is capable of. It all started last year, with the launch of its bigger MDS-JA555ES. For around £600 (discounted), you could buy an awesomely well built piece of kit that quite literally sounded like no other MD recorder around. Better still, discs you recorded on it sounded better on existing MD machines too - you could hear the difference through humble ± 100 portables. The good news is that the '333 offers most of the charms of the '555 for a couple of hundred quid less.

This new machine isn't as well built as the range topping model, but still makes the perfectly adequately screwed together £250 MDS-QB940 look like it's made of paper. Measuring 430x124x376 mm and weighing in at 10.4kg, it's pretty large and imposing. As with all Sony's ES players, this one sports a chunky aluminium front panel, plus a vibration reducing slanted printed circuit board, the latest ATRAC DSP TYPE-R data reduction system and 24bit analogue-to-digital and digitalto-analogue converters.

It also has MDLP (which gives up to 320 minutes on one MD, with commensurate loss of sound quality), the usual mind-boggling edit functions (name, input, combine, divide, move, erase), a digital recording level control and 'Jog Dial' track selection. There's also Sony's 'Variable Coefficient Digital Filter' (best left in the 'normal' position, in my opinion) and - importantly - an R-CORE transformer for clean power.

This player sounds superb. Using bog standard TDK discs, it makes very clean and detailed recordings that really get you to the heart of the music. Another boon is that if you pull out the MiniDisc and press 'REC', the MDS-JA333ES acts as a DAC for whatever digital source you've got connected (via one of two optical or one coaxial) digital input. Used in this way, it doesn't go through the ATRAC processing loop, so you can use it as a serious standalone hi-fi DAC - and it sounds great to boot.

Most interesting for me was how bad it made its budget 940QS little brother sound. It's nearly twice the price, but far more than twice as good. Kicking off with Jamiroquai's 'Space Cowboy', the difference was KEF Q series home theatre. Clearly outstanding.

Perfect 3D clarity is what brings home theatre to life - you want to hear where the pin drops, as well as when.

The less that speaker tone varies, the crisper the soundscape becomes. No wonder the award winning Q Series sounds so real: with identical Uni-Q drivers for each speaker, the system's tonal match is perfect. And by mounting an advanced tweeter at the acoustic centre of each midrange cone, KEF's Uni-Q technology creates what all speaker manufacturers aspire to: a sonic point source. Compared to the row of drivers you get in conventional centre speakers, this makes on-screen voices sound incredibly natural.

That's why nothing else at the price even comes close for delivering the full richness of today's digital soundtracks for everyone in the room. Loud and clear.

audible from the opening bars of the electric piano. The instrument had a vibrant, shimmering and 'alive' quality through the '333, whereas the 940 made it sound bluff and flat, as if to say, 'that's the electric piano - what more do you want?' As bass and vocals kicked in, there was far more atmosphere to the midband - you got a sense of the studio and the instruments' place within it. Bass was dramatically better - richer and fatter - but still not quite up to the heroic standards of the '555. Cymbals were brilliant. On the 940 they sounded leaden, with no discernible texture or feel. By contrast the '333 made them sparkle. Hi-hats sounded amazingly natural, with no breathing or compression artefacts. Although the '555 is better still, it's prone to brightness or 'over-sharpness' which the '333 seems to side-step. Janet Kay's voice on 'Silly Games' was very sweet with no harshness (which for some reason the '555 is prone to - in the upper midband at least). Detail levels were extremely impressive the acoustic was very convincingly recreated, with just a small sensation of it fading off prematurely at the back of the soundstage. Bass also proved very impressive - very natural

and organic sounding compared to the 940's rather artificial. synthetic nature.

Finally, the MDS-JA333ES has superior dynamics to budget MDs. It makes music leap out at you, giving a far more enjoyable rendition of whatever you choose to play.

Thumbs firmly aloft then for Sony's latest MiniDisc spinner. As the format reaches its tenth birthday and the autumn of its lifetime, it has been developed

so well that you can now get near-CD sound quality with all that MD convenience thrown in as well. If you're looking for that final MD recorder, the MDS-JA333ES offers the best sound per pound around.

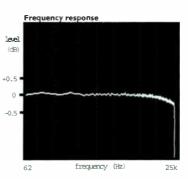
Distortion was low at high signal levels, being comparable to ordinary CD. A little lower down, at -60dB it rose to a high-ish 0.6%, which might intriduce a little coarseness. However, MiniDisc is always linear lower down as noise serves to dither the digital signal. Distortion was a relatively low 21% or so at -90dB as a result.

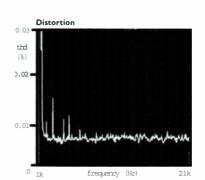
The noise floor at full recording gain measured -92dB, due to record amplifier input noise. This level is inaudible. The sensitivity of the recorder is fairly low though, low gain contributing to low noise. Ouput measured a normal 2.3V, +1.5dB up

on Philips standard of 2V. As expected the MDS-JA333ES measured well enough in all areas.

MiniDisc delivers a good 16-bit recording performance. NK

Manufacturers around the world will be launching new mini audio discs and memories over the next two years. We take a look at the most important.

hilips hasty release of details of a new Expanium player due to be launched later this year was likely made to dampen interest in a small army of rivals all after the same market - and your pocket. Whilst SACD and DVD-A slug it out at the expensive super-fi end of the audio market, an even bigger battle is shaping up down in the more affordable portable market. Manufacturers are falling over themselves to provide CD sound quality in a miniature and affordable package that they hope will sweep the world as the cassette once did.

Expanium was an unexpected success for Philips, even though hi-fi journalists were for the most part sniffy about it. A CD portable that could not only read normal music discs but also mp3 files, Expanium players were big and none too attractive, seeming to defeat the benefit of mp3 portability. People bought Expanium all the same, prompting Philips to produce mini-Expanium, a truly portable version based on the 8cm CD single, as it was once known.

patible players. And since CD recorders record from inside outward they can record mini-CDs. In fact, CD was designed to read from the centre of the disc outward to make smaller sizes possible.

Taking advantage of this, America has forged ahead with the mini-CD. Internet sites like www.americal.com list mini CD-Rs and CD-RWs, as well as CD business cards! Prices are low. around 70p for a mini CD-R and £1.50 for a mini CD-RW. Perhaps it was America that bought Expanium, since the whole mp3 phenomenon seems to have been driven by U.S. sites like mp3.com and Napster, set up by American entrepreneurs Michael Robertson and Shaun Fanning respectively. A mini-CD stores 180MB of data, which provides 20 mins of uncompressed music or 1hr 20 mins of top quality mp3 (320kbps).

Backfooted by this, European Philips have reacted slowly. Their new mini-Expanium is the first acknowledgement that mini-CD could be the future - and it isn't due until the end of 2001.

Sony's own MiniDisc failed to do become a universally adopted portable music medium, with recording ability.

But not if other powerful players have their way. According to U.S. company Dataplay (www.dataplay.com) the CD and DVD are old technology. Their optical disc has a faster data rate than CD and is a fraction of its size. It comes in a protective case, like

> MiniDisc, which measures just 40mm across. This tiny disc will store 250MB on one side or 500MB on two. Aimed at the music and computer markets alike, it will be available in blank and prerecorded form in 2002, Dataplay told us. Prices of £3.50 and £7

are quoted for the 250/500MB blank discs whilst prerecorded price will be set by the music companies - expect MiniDisc prices of £16 or so. Dataplay claim their disc is the ultimate storage solution.

The 8cm mini-CD has been around for a long time, but has never caught on. Most CD players and computer drives have a depression in the loading tray that accepts this smaller size so there's no shortage of com-

Big Blue would likely argue this. IBM long ago pointed out that disc storage was not only cheaper than solid-state but development would keep it that way. Their tiny Microdrive computer disc drive has been taken from 340MB up to IGB and now lomega (www.iomega.com) are offering it as a portable storage solution to possibly rival Dataplay's. With similar dimensions and twice the capacity they may be onto something.

Dataplay claim the music business is prepared to release albums on their disc, putting it in direct confrontation with CD and MiniDisc. The Microdrive is unlikely to be used this way, since it is expensive and has no copyright protection scheme. lomega are currently asking £180 for a 340MB Microdrive, which is no bargain. They have a cheaper form of storage in the PocketZip (aka Clik), which now stores 100MB. At £7 or so apiece, however, the tiny PocketZip disc - available late 2001 - isn't cheap either. Neither IBM nor lomega are really pitching for the music market, but both Microdrive and PocketZip will be seen on new generation mp3 players.

Computer memory is the biggest threat to these 'boxes of gears and wheels', but cost is holding it back. All the same, the world's electronics companies are all manoeuvring to offer an audio medium that is small, robust and represents the ultimate solution.

PocketZip

SD Card was set to offer a massive IGB storage capacity by 2003, Panasonic told us back in 1999 – enough to rival any disc system. Now the SD Card organisation, which has 280 member companies, quotes "32 MB and 64 MB in 2000, with the promise of up to 128 MB and 256MB in the not-too-distant future".

Sandisk say, "Initial storage capacities offered will be 8, 16, 32 and 64 Mbytes. Improvements in flash memory densities coupled with reductions in die size area will enable capacities of 128 Mbytes and 256 Mbytes within the year 2001."

Memory card systems are on their way, but both price and intercompatibility are issues that may well dampen enthusiasm.

Sandisk developed the MultiMediaCard (MMC) back in 1997, in conjunction with Siemens. SD Card is based upon it, but offers higher capacity and Secure Digital Music Initiative (SDMI) anti-copying protection. SD Card is slightly thicker than MMC so an SD card player will accept a MMC, but not the other way around. Any computer equipment that uses MMC will interface with an audio SD Card player. SD Card prices are not yet quoted, but the similar Sandisk MMC costs \$99 (£69) for 64MB. In the UK expect \$99=£99.

Memory stick

Sony have their own memory card system that is incompatible with MMC or SD Card. The Memory Stick is available in capacities up to 64 MB and Sony plans to offer up to 256 MB capacity Memory Stick media in 2001, like SD Card. At £30 for 8MB and £100 for 64MB Memory Stick is expensive, if no different to MMC and SD Card. The company is developing a Memory Stick with up to I GB capacity, they say. Memory Stick is SDMI compliant, like SD Card, so the two are head-to-head, battling for the future of music storage.

Philips announced mini-CD early because they had a lot on their mind. The world is awash with rival storage technologies. In the short term mini-CD looks very strong, because there's a massive base of installed players and, now, burners that can handle it. And it is cheap. What the world lacks is small, convenient portables, car players and compact home players. It also lacks pre-recordeds.

But as Dataplay point out, CD is now an old technology. We could be using storage devices one-half or even one-quarter the size of a mini-CD. Whether we will is anyone's guess – and down to what Sony, Philips, Panasonic and Dataplay will offering over the coming few years.

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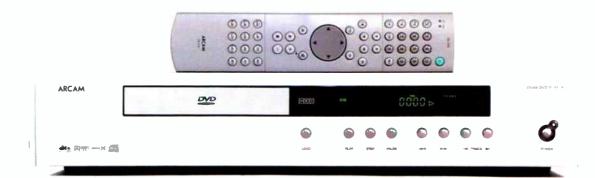

Dino

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The DV88 DVD player in the new DiVA range is Arcam's first foray into the AV player market. Will the company's rich hi-fi history carry over, asks Simon Pope?

rcam's new DV88 incorporates many innovative features not found in other DVD player on the market. It uses dual power supplies with a switch mode for the digital electronics and a linear supply for the more delicate analogue circuitry. The power transformer is a toroidal type for a low magnetic field. These are details that help forge a quality audio playback that other, some more price sensitive, players fail to include.

And there's more. At the heart of the DV88 lie two WM8716 24bit/192 kHz digital-to-analogue convertors from Scottish company Wolfson, each of which has a mono differential output and its own separate power supply. These 24/192 DACs leave the door wide open for potential upgrade for the DV88 into a DVD-Audio player, part of the company's strategy that continuing the commendable previous upgrade paths of the Alpha series.

Many players on the market derive the audio clock from the video oscillator at 27MHz which often results in very high jitter. The DV88 employs two asynchronous audio and video clocks which are derived from a separate oscillator to reduce jitter.

All the major video connector standards are catered for, including S-

video and composite and digital and analogue stereo outputs. In true highend DVD mode, the DV88 has no onboard decoding, so an external processor is needed for surround sound but the player will host a variety of discs such as DVD-Video, CD Video, CD and CDR/RW with PCM, HDCD and MP-3 encoding.

As far as DVD players as music carriers go, they don't get much better than the DV88. It has a way of playing CDs that is rare - you tend to forget it's also a video player.

Playing the HDCD discs of Stravinsky's Rite Of Spring on Reference Recordings the DV88 showed a good command of the scale of the piece, taking everything in its stride with the feeling of plenty of headroom, even in the gigantic climaxes. Detail was very good, with brass and woodwind well accounted for.

Bass was neat and tight and the treble, whilst not the smoothest around was nevertheless sweet and open. With Pearl Jam's guitar driven rock the DV88 showed a firm grip on rhythm, with the bass guitar and drum kit pulling together to form a deep and tight groove that powered everything along. Vocals were well catered for, too, with Eddy Vedder's rock n' roll wailing full and clear. DVD discs showed that when it came to visuals as well as sound, the DV88 delivers with equal aplomb. Music discs of both New Order concerts and a live performance of Bruckner's 8th symphony were very clear and well focussed, resulting in an involving musical experience when married to the sound quality.

The DV88 is not the smoothest sounding music player and it's expensive for a DVD (especially without internal decoding) but few rivals have its way with audio information and it's a 'proper' Arcam design, which with DVD players doesn't come cheap.

It's a fine video player and as a CD player it comes close in quality to, say, a Roksan Caspian and equalling a Creek CD43 MkII- no mean feat, as it's roughly the same price as the DV88 but just lacks a bit of the fluidity found in equivalent priced dedicated CD players. Definitely one to consider.

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NEW EPOS EPOCH

Domic Todd encounters the first release from the new improved Epos Acoustics, the M12.

before. Since 1999, Epos has been under the ownership of Creek. who decided the existing product range was pretty good.

They weren't alone. In October 1996 we declared the ES12s to be "on a par with the best at the price". Hence the M12 is a reworked version of the very same 'speaker. The rear panel was plastic, tensioned to the front via bolts, which caused problems in the longer term as the bolts lost tension. To alleviate this, the rear panel is now 25mm MDF, glued into place.

Internally, DNM solid core cable has been fitted and shields placed around the driver magnets to allow for A/V use.

The drive units remain broadly as before, with minor alterations ton the tweeter and the crossover is as simple as ever in that the bass unit is driven directly. As with many other 'speaker manufacturers, the bass unit components are now sourced in the Far East to keep cost down.

Speaking of which, a price of £430 appears very reasonable against the ES12's original £500.

I paired up the M12's with a NAD C370 amp and my usual sources.With the first disc, 'Sometime' by The Cosmic Rough Riders I was pretty disappointed. The balance was bright and too analytical for my tastes. The M12's bass was tight and cohesive, yet lacking in ultimate weight. Both detailing and timing were hard to fault, but whilst sitting through the track I couldn't stop my mind from filling with the adjectives, sharp, clean, incisive yet ultimately rather sterile.

I put the disappointment down to a poor quality recording, or mismatch with this type of musical genre.

The contrast with The Corrs' 'Somebody For Someone' proved this. Here was a true taste of high-end hifi. A holographic sound stage that simultaneously drew the bass back beyond the rear wall whilst projecting the vocals with startling alacrity; it was deeply impressive. This time, considering the volume of cabinet, the ultimate bass weight proved good too.

Furthermore, the quality of vocal and instrument timbre was first rate at the price, with excellent separation of instruments a further bonus. There was a dynamic ease reminiscent of larger rivals, without boxiness or wallow that can afflict floorstanders. Transparency, strong dynamics, excellent accuracy, timbre and timing all fused to create an experience which 'speakers twice this price can often struggle to match.

I'd imagine few will buy the Epos's for Dance music. At £500ish there are harder hitting monitors and vast coffin-sized floorstanders. When it came to the high energy 'Operator' by Defektor, the M12s showed they could handle a pumping bassline al the same, with beats so fast and incisive it almost hurt.

Reducing the octane level considerably with Finzi's 'Eclogue for Piano and Strings', brought back some of the initial disappointment. The





piece benefited from both the Epos's seamless nature and fine timbral reproduction. Yet, whilst the piano and strings generally flowed smoothly, there was a slight hardening at times that seemed at odds with the refinement shown elsewhere.

In terms of staging, timbre, timing and even dynamics the M12s are impressive. Yet, they are a frustrating 'speaker too. It should not be necessary to go through a record collection rejecting poor quality recordings, yet the M12s encourage this.

Care needs to taken when matching amp' and front end. Get it right and the 'speakers will shine. Get it wrong and a shrill, harsh balance will have you wondering what all the fuss is about.

If this conclusion doesn't sound like a contradiction, they're highly recommended - with a certain amount of caution.

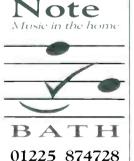

2's Company

The new Dino Phono Amplifier is Michell-Trichord's new baby. David Price takes it for a spin.

ecently Michell and Trichord merged. The first thing they did upon forming 'Michell Trichord' was to revamp the Michell range of electronics, and specifically the Delphini phono stage. This is a fine product but a stripped-down, entry-level version would be a stronger seller. The Dino reviewed here is the result. However, it's more than a low rent Delphini - there are a number of changes which give it a character all of its own.

Most obvious is the case. Gone is the swanky half-metal housing; a new silver all-Perspex design takes its place. Aside from reduced shielding from electrical noise (so place with care), this should have little adverse affect on the sound. Inside we find audio grade bipolar and JFET op amps, metal oxide resistors and ultra low impedance capacitors throughout. Cleverly, the Delphini's internal jumpers have been replaced by four DIP switches mounted underneath. This is a great idea, meaning you can set the Dino up for

1.1nF, 33 ohms, 100 ohms and 1.1k ohms cartridge loading in seconds, together with 48, 52, 63, 70 and 74dB gain - which means moving magnet cartridges can be used. This is a great feature, meaning the Dino can last from your Rega P3/Elys right up to that LP12/Ekos/Archiv you always promised yourself.

With the same clean, open, upfront presentation, there are plenty of similarities between the Dino and its big brother's sonics. You certainly get the sense that you're listening to transistor phono preamp rather than a tube one, but by the same token you don't get the sterile, cerebral, analytical rigour of something like Densen's DP-01/DP Drive, Essentially, like the Delphini, the Dino walks down the middle of the road with tremendous alacrity.

I kicked off with Elvis Costello's 'Accidents Can Happen' and was amazed by the maturity of the Dino sound. There's absolutely no sense of listening to a budget product. Rather, it strings the whole acoustic together

> beautifully, with no particular emphasis on any frequency band. Smooth and even from top to bottom, you could almost say it's a little more generous in the bass than the Delphini. Or you could point out that there's less midband energy, giving it a marginally more laid back sound which better suits the budget decks it has been designed for.

Bass is extremely tight and fast (almost more so than the cooking Delphini), with an ISOesque zip to it that really sped Chic's 'My Forbidden Lover' along. Indeed it sounds more engaging

than any other price rival, save

LFD's Mistral which has a more organic (dare I say 'valvey') feel, but less ultimate grip. The midband is also superb, with a tidy but powerfully articulated soundstage that brilliantly communicates the scale and power of any mix. Female vocals shone through with great smoothness - I almost think the Dino is superior to its bigger brother in this respect!

Treble isn't sweet, but nevertheless impressively crisp and clean with no nasties, sibilance or spit. Given my eighties Karajan recording of Beethoven's 'Eroica' on DG, the Dino was again musical yet mature, never failing to catch the rhythmic and dynamic swings that permeate this piece. Essentially it attempts less than the Delphini, throwing out noticeably less low level detail, atmosphere and textural information, but still knits the whole lot together superbly. The result is a kind of 'Delphini Lite', which is no bad thing at all¹

Overall then, Trichord's new Dino is a cracking phono stage. It's sheer across-the-board strength impresses. Fast and fun - yet polished, it's also intelligently designed and tremendously versatile. 📕 📤

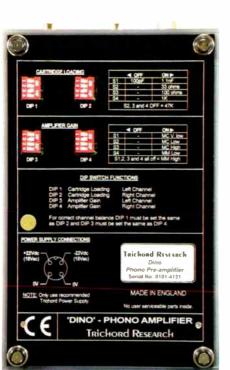

You've got three grand to spend and you're looking for your first serious hi-fi system. David Price hits the dealer showroom floors for some serious listening...

hree thousand pounds is a lot of money to spend on audio, but if wisely invested it will bring you a true taste of the high end, for little than budget money. The problem is that, even at this point it's so easy to come up with a mismatched set of separates that sound as bad as - if not worse than - a decently assembled bargain basement system.

It's all very well to read the reviews and make your mind up based on the number of stars, globes or swing tags a product gets, but this simply isn't the whole story. What's more important is how the electronics and loudspeakers interact with each other sonically - and the only way to check this out is by hiking down to your friendly neighbourhood dem room.

We visited Peter Tyson's in Carlisle with a notional three thousand pounds to spend. To make things simpler, we'd already decided on our speakers - Linn's Ninka fitted the bill in terms of sonics, looks and value for money. At £895 per pair (£945 for cherry finish) plus £165 for polymer plinths (although we'd elected to use paving slabs broken in half until spare cash was available for finishing touches), they're a fine midprice loudspeaker - and well able to signpost differences between amps and front ends.

The next question was 'which electronics?' Given that system buying choices are inevitably framed around real world constraints - as Arthur Daley would have put it, 'her indoors' - we opted to go for CD players and amps from the same manufacturers. This way, the system would look neat and share the same remote control. The good news is that there are some excellent combos out there - the question was 'which worked best together?' To this end, we auditioned various matched pairs around our price point from Arcam, Linn, TAG McLaren and Marantz, and came up with some fascinating findings. In some cases, they contradicted the verdicts we'd arrived at in separate, standalone equipment reviews, in others they further confirmed them.

ARCAM CD72 (£399.90), A75 (£449.90)

This was the cheapest system we listened to, running just above Arcam's entry-level Alpha 7 series products. The combo was well built and smartly finished considering the price, and certainly didn't look 'budget'. The sound was no less impressive for the money, offering a good basic 'hi-fi' sound with none of the nasties you get with cheaper budget fare. Air's 'All I Need' showed the Arcam electronics to have a reasonably warm and inviting nature. True, cymbals were a little splashy and the upper midband sounded just a touch too glassy for my liking, but I was able to relax into the soundstage and enjoy the music. The A75 made a fair stab at driving the Ninkas and filling the room, and the overall impression was that this was a perfectly good hi-fi, if not the best matched. Given a sub-£2000 budget, we'd have spent less on the speakers and more on the front end.

LINN CLASSIK £995



For just £145 more, you can have a Linn Classik complete with built-in tuner (and it's a pretty good one too) and - famously - a power socket round the back for your coffee

maker! From the moment the Classik was powered up, it transformed the sound of the Ninkas. Where the Arcam combo's bass had been loose and woolly, suddenly it was tight and dynamic. The midband became far more accurately defined, with snares on 4Hero's 'Escape That' punching out of the mix with real zeal. Treble cleaned up too - gone was the splash and in its place a spry, crisp hi-hat sound. Best of all were the strings, which both lost some of the Arcam's brightness and edge, and gained an impressively natural timbre. Whatever we played on the Classik, it sounded faster, tighter and far more rhythmically engaging, as well as more detailed and sophisticated too. Soundstaging was also appreciably better. What more can we say? Just like we said in our review it's a cracking product. And listening to more expensive systems only served to confirm this!

ARCAM CD92 (£849.90), A85 (£749.90)

Arcam got a chance to get its own back with these two firmly mid-priced Diva separates. As soon as Nirvana's 'Come As You Are' kicked off, we noticed a difference between this and the first Arcam system. Any giveaway indications of budget hi-fi (treble splash, loose bass) had been banished, and in its place was a pleasantly big hearted, warm, rich and well-rounded sound. Imaging, dynamics and detail were all a big improvement over the CD72/A75 and (to a lesser extent, the Linn Classik). However, I was surprised to find that despite a far more sophisticated listening experience, this combo still failed to match the latter in the enjoyment stakes. In car terms, the Arcam duo would be a big, luxury Peugeot estate to the Classik's zippy Ford Puma. There was obviously more detail than



the two previous systems - for the first time we could hear tom-toms playing along in the background of 'Escape That', and the harp arpeggios at the beginning of the same track were far better defined too. However, the foot-tapping factor of the baby Linn was still missing. Adding an additional P85 power amp (£499.90) improved things, but not as I'd expected. I'd hoped for a tighter bass and faster mid-band - to compete with the Classik - but instead we got yet more detail and a greater sense of ease and fluidity and a tad more bass weight. I'd be happy with this system, but it wouldn't 'light my fire'.

TAG CD20R (£1249.95), 601 (£499.95)



An extra £150 or so over the Arcam buys you this TAG McLaren combo, and it certainly looks the part with its swish black and silver casework (if Jordan bought Linn, would this mean yellow Classiks?) Unfortunately this pair was very much a retrograde step. Essentially it gave a superficially pleasing 'hi-fi' sound - there was obviously plenty of power and with a big, bold soundstage (albeit rather one-dimensional in terms of depth perspective), but it simply wasn't musically coherent. Despite being richer tonally than the Linn, it was still rather 'wooden'. The TAG's singular lack of musical involvement made for an unengaging whole despite no glaringly obvious weak points. Lou Donaldson's 'Alligator Boogaloo' was a real foot tapper through the Classik but not with the TAG.

LINN GENKI (£995), LK140 (£749)

An interesting one this. By far the most detailed, clean and musically engaging system here, the combination of Linn's base model CD player feeding the company's entry level power amp via its variable output phono jacks proved a hoot. Think of it as a Classik on steroids - everything the former did, this did better. Bass was fabulously taut and supple compared to all the other systems so far, and really pushed Nirvana's 'Come As You Are' along at full tilt - almost as if the track itself was speeded up. Dynamics were excellent - but surprisingly little better than the Classik's already superb standards. Best was the midband. This combo exhibited a vice-like grip on everything that was going on in the background - those tom-toms could now be heard playing away clear as day in 'Escape That'. Although less tonally bright than all systems heard so far, there was far more timbre to strings, giving for the first time a sense of (almost) complete connectedness with the recording. This is a cracking combo alright, but perversely it's actually tonally drier and less inviting than the Classik, let alone the sweet Arcam combo. For me at least, this was the only flaw on an otherwise musically compelling system. For £2739 including Ninkas, you get one helluva system.

MARANTZ CD17 KIS (£1200), PM17 KIS (£1299.90)



Frankly, I hadn't expected the Marantz combo to be anywhere near as good as it turned out. Call me prejudiced, but it was just too pretty looking and fussily detailed (including that famously useless amplifier temperature gauge) for me to take seriously at first. But then we powered it up and hey presto - it sounded great. Fascinatingly, it wasn't a million miles behind the Linn Genki/LK140 in terms of musicality but offered far more warmth and atmosphere. Air's 'All I Need' showed it wasn't as tight or dynamic as the Linns, but still proved rhythmically compelling thanks to its very fluid and organic demeanour. It was - dare I say it - rather valve-like in some respects.

With looser image definition and less accurate soundstaging, the mid band was less composed than the Linn, but its expansive, big

CONCLUSION

There you have it - the big surprises were the Linn Classik and the Marantz KIS system - I'd expected neither to perform anywherenear as well as they did in the end. Ultimately, for me at least, the Linn Genki/LK140 was the most capable though - it really does bring you a taste of full-on high end esoterica for a sum of money that could quite easily buy you hi-fi's equivalent of a pig in a poke. The Arcams were great, middle of the road performers that do a lot for the money and are easily upgradeable, but just can't touch the less conventionally styled Linn rivals. If I wanted a general purpose, easily expandable audio set-up it would be the Arcams. but the wild card was the Marantz system which had much of their flexibility with extra grip and fluidity to boot. All in all, this was a fascinating dem - and only serves to underline that despite specialist hi-fi dealers' higher ticket prices, you save money in the long run by spending an afternoon in your friendly local dealer's dem room!

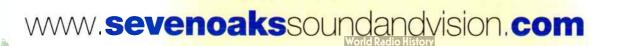

The new Cyrus Icons are the long awaited NXT panel loudspeaker from the electronics masters. Noel Keywood and Simon Pope reveal all. . .

hat lies behind the smooth, slim grill of the new Cyrus Icon is an NXT flat panel drive unit. It was inevitable that with the huge sums and technical effort being expended on NXT - by hi-fi people, because NXT is really a spin-off from Mission - a hi-fi version would eventually appear.

The Icon uses an NXT flat panel driver to cover the most critical part of the audio band embracing speech, vocals and all instruments, except those with a strong bass content. You can think of this loudspeaker almost as a single-driver design, using a driver that NXT claim gives fundamentally better results than anything we know. Bass is handled by a normal forwardfiring cone unit in a chamber at the bottom of the cabinet.

Cyrus have skillfully produced a loudspeaker with clean, modern lines. The Icon is large but not overwhelming, at 1250mm high and 340mm wide. Weighing 24kgs apiece (53lbs) each Icon sits firmly on three large spikes, or four for extra stability if you have children. Although the technology in this 'speaker is new and radical, the Icon is not a wild card. Unlike most other unconventional loudspeakers it is easy for an amplifier to drive and it matches into rooms well. What the Icon offers, quite simply, is a significant step away from the problems of today's loudspeakers, without intrinsic drawbacks.

Marrying a panel to a cone bass unit isn't usually too successful. Panels tend to sound light and open, whilst a cone bass driver in a box is virtually the opposite. Cyrus observe that at the crossover point the panel is radiating from front and rear, whilst the bass unit is radiating front only, producing a subjective mismatch. So the Icon has a heavily damped chamber behind the NXT panel, to absorb its rear output. There is a vent to avoid rear pressure.

The Icons can be bi-wired. Their bass unit works up to 400Hz and the NXT panel from 400Hz up to 22kHz. By crossing over at 400Hz the Icon avoids the phase and dispersion problems conventional loudspeakers suffer at 3kHz. This happens to be the ear's most critical region; both vocals and string instruments like violin should sound smoother, less phasey and more natural as a result.

The NXT panel uses damped carbon fibre skins on an aluminium honeycomb core to yield what Cyrus describe as a "laminate sandwich". The properties of this panel have to be precisely defined for it to provide the sort of results needed for high fidelity. It is held by an aluminium frame and driven by two moving coil exciters. **NK**

SOUND QUALITY

I was immediately struck by the lcon's easy going, smooth sound, combined with a sharp sense of detail and intricacy. They are subjectively well matched - surprise, surprise - with Cyrus' similar sounding amplifiers, such as the Cyrus 7 or SmartPower.

A great sense of open space is conveyed. This was best demonstrated by a spacious and airy DG recording of Mahler's Symphony No.5 with Bernstein conducting the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra. In the middle movement Scherzo the orchestra had breadth and excellent depth, displaying the dispersion characteristics of the NXT panels at their best. Few 'speakers, with the exception of obvious classics, such as the Quad electrostatics and the higher range Tannoy's or large horn

ach small area of an NXT panel ibrates, in effect, independently of ts neighbours. Think of it as an array of very small drive units, each radiating a different, uncorrelated signal summing to produce the desired output. The resulting vibration is so complex that it approximates random motion - it is impossible, for example, to identify the point(s) of excitation on a snapshot of the panel motion, depicted here by a computer model.

There are numerous benefits. Conventional tweeters must be small. With an NXT panel you can make the panel large without directivity or treble response suffering. In fact, performance improves as size is increased.

The panel's acoustic output from both sides sums up constructively. There is no need to contain rear radiation through baffling or the use of an enclosure.

The unique ability of NXT panels to fill a room with a sound field which alters very little as the listener changes position is further enhanced by the reduced fall-off in sound pressure level with distance compared with a conventional loudspeaker. NXT releases us from the compromises loudspeaker designers have faced for more than 70 years. Smooth, dense modal behaviour confers on NXT predictable, deterministic, scaleable behaviour that, until now, has been the loudspeaker designer's unfulfilled dream. **Henry Azima, NXT**

MEASURED PERFORMANCE

Small NXT panels like Mission's early X-Space measured very flat – and they sounded commensurately smooth. The Icon's big NXT panel was a little less flat, looking quite lumpy in the forward direction. It smooths out a few degrees off the forward axis, suggesting the Icon is best pointed straight down a room, not toed in to face listeners directly. The speaker leans back a little, beaming upward. It is smoothest tilted forward so the panel beams directly at listeners. These are minor points.

I could hear an almost silky smoothness in the pink noise test signal. All the same, there are some niggles in the frequency response characteristic (ours is a position averaged forward response). One is a response peak around 2kHz which exists no matter where the mic is placed. This suggest a little mid-band colouration.

There's a treble peak too. The grill made no difference, which is good, showing it is transparent. However, listening slightly off-axis will soften treble.

Worst of all is the bass peak. I was surprised at this since today's design methods make it easy to avoid such a thing. In fact the bass unit output rises smoothly to a +5dB peak at 60Hz before falling off rapidly as the port takes over. Such a peak results in soft, boomy bass. Port output was fairly broad, so it exerts a useful influence, but still not enough to control matters. The port continues down to a very low 20Hz.

The Icon measured out as having a 60hm overall impedance. The bass unit's DCR was 50hms and this usually sets the lowest impedance value, but the NXT panel draws current, sinking to 3ohms at 2kHz. Since this tallies with the panel response peak, the panel is drawing too much current here, a situation that could usefully be remedied. It could be a reflection of acoustic conditions or just a mechanical driver problem. Even a simple notch filter in the crossover would usefully increase Z, reduce V/I phase angle (energy storage) and smooth response. The 2K dip and Ik Z peak tell a story of

mechanical/acoustic conditions that could probably be improved. As a load the lcon isn't difficult, but low sensitivity of 85dB means a powerful amplifier is needed – around 100W.

Measured performance reveals some significant blemishes. A little more work on the NXT panel would usefully bring its measured performance into line with the best drive units available. Bass performance needs improving too.

SOUND QUALITY

The lcon was fascinating to listen ¹ to. I tilted them forward heavily, for best clarity.

Firstly, the treble peak adds a spit to strong sibilance and metallic percussion instruments with extended harmonics. The tambourine in Steve Earl's Esmerelda's Hollywood fairly hissed at me and Angelique Kidjo's vocals had a hard edge. You only hear this sort of thing with recordings possessing extended treble though, which I have as reviewing tools.

Then there's the bass, which was just too 'large' in my 16ft long room. The reason was

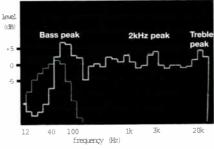
the room has a mode around 60Hz that further raises the Icon's bass peak. Quality was soft and there was a bit of box colouration.

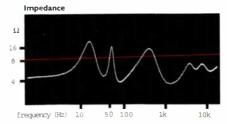
The 2kHz measured peak served to push forward strings, bringing incredible insight, but there was some loss of smoothness and a little coarseness.

Finally, as I eagerly wicked up my Cyrus 7 amplifier whilst listening to Esmerelda's Hollywood there was a sudden silence – the amp cut out! This shows the Icons need real power.

The Icon's were almost frighteningly good with the Philharmonia in the Kingsway Hall (1960 analogue recording). They gave a spectacularly large, smooth and natural picture that was lovely to listen to – and incredibly impressive. Here, I thought, NXT shows what it can do: it leaves conventional drivers for dead. All the same, the Icon could be better. **NK**

designs, can relay the scale of this size of orchestra the way the lcons did, especially from such slim cabinets this was very, very impressive.

Imaging isn't as pin point precise as the best point source 'speaker but due to the dispersion properties, the same level of imaging can be achieved virtually anywhere in front of the lcons, virtually eliminating the usual 'hot spot'!

Violins had none of the grating or scratchy quality so often found in modern speakers and both cymbals and triangle glimmered with lifelike sparkle.

Across the 'speakers midrange woodwind and brass sounded open and detailed, trombones snapping and cracking away, with oboes and Cor Anglais wonderfully precise and realistic - woody and rich.

With lower strings, the Cyrus' hinted at something that became more obvious with other recordings; their bass goes low. It's not the fastest or most 'tuneful' around but, again it's smooth and full-sounding, if perhaps a little too plummy for my personal taste.

Moving on to jazz in the form of Miles Davis's classic, 'Kind Of Blue' the loons showed more of the same smoothness and refinement. This kind of fare suited them down to the ground. Here was cool sophistication at its best - Davis's trumpet sounded excellent, with no high-note nasties that the instrument can often deliver through lesser 'speakers. Immaculate detail was found in brushed snare drum of 'flamenco Sketches'; it sounded like a tyre was being slowly deflated somewhere to the right of the room. Overall, apart from the upright bass being a little fruity and the piano sounding a tad too distant (but very natural in tone), everything was beautifully positioned and ethereal - literally music to the ears.

Again, with vocals the loons came into their own. With Paul Weller's 'Stanley Road' album the Icons imaged very well and showed good depth of sound staging, drums being placed direct centre, to the rear of the mix, with Weller's voice pin-point in front of them.

The sound stage is lifted up from the usual height to create a lighter and more natural sound, another rarity in hi-fi. Vocals were clean and warm, but bass seemed at little out of balance, which took away some of the openness to the mid and upper frequencies.

Female vocals, an acid test for 'speakers, were deftly handled. In Carly Simon's 'You're So Vain' her voice was sweet and clear with a natural timbre that was immediately striking, consonants free from overt sibilance.

In line with this realism, the acoustic guitars sounded equally natural and detailed, giving a true 'live' feel to the performance.

The lcons are without doubt a special 'speaker. They are the first high-end product to include NXT technology and they show the great advantages that this technology brings to purist audio. Unlike other 'hybrid' designs, however, the Icons blend seamlessly all the way through the audio spectrum, albeit with a touch too much bass bloom with certain recordings.

These 'speakers are easily driven by most amps, although a little oomph is called for to get the best control and response from them.

The lcons will give you hour upon hour of tireless, enjoyable listening, albeit with a slight warm presentation. SP

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POWER SUPPLIED

Musical Fidelity's new X-A200R is the company's beefiest sounding integrated amplifier to date. David Price has a bite.

ith its distinctive cast alloy casework and chunky machined metal front panel, Musical Fidelity's new £699 X-A200R is the natural partner for the famously shaped X-RAY CD player and X-PLORA FM tuner. The package comprises the amp itself, a neat remote control and a hefty separate power supply unit which should be kept as far away as possible from the amplifier. Being a boxy, black plastic cased affair with visible screw heads, it's best consigned to underneath the equipment rack. As MF recommends the amp be left on all the time, it's perfectly okay to hide it away in this way.

With no integral mains transformer, the X-A200R is surprisingly light - you get the feeling that there's a lot of air inside its 230x 110x 345mm case. Despite sharing the same box, the pre and power amplifier sections are discrete, and there's a useful preamp output around the back. You'll also see seven further pairs of RCA phono sockets on the rear panel (five line ins plus a tape monitor and tape output), as well as the usual pair of loudspeaker binding posts.

For listening tests I hooked up the X-A200R to my unforgiving Yamaha NS-1000M loudspeakers, and ran Linn Sondek CD12 and Rega Planet 2000 CD players, plus my Michell turntable and Delphini phono stage in through the line inputs.

By the standards of any integrated amplifier the X-A200R goes loud, and for yours truly at least, there's a distinct feeling for deja-vu about the sound. It's probably because I have a pair of Musical Fidelity X-A200 monoblocks, with which the R shares much sonic ground. Essentially it's an open and crisp performer, with a muscular, barrel-chested approach to making music.

One of the most impressive traits of this amplifier is its command of low frequencies - if there's a bass line going then the X-A200R will find it and carry it with aplomb.

It isn't as obvious about this as, say, Naim's NAIT 5 integrated.

Where the latter is positively showy about the way it 'goes the extra mile' to convey the music's low frequency power, the MF sounds just a touch more organic and a little less forced. Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young's 'Wooden Ships' showed the Musical Fidelity turning out a powerful acoustic, from which a beautifully fat valve bass sound boomed out, in a tremendously powerful but relaxed fashion.

Further up the frequency range, we encounter the next 'X-A' trait - an extremely crisp and light midband, with a brightly lit presence region. But this isn't yer average transistor mush, but (with vinyl especially) it soon becomes obvious that the little MF gets its incisive sound from the wealth of harmonic information it carries. In this respect, it's noticeably better than the fine Cyrus 7, which sounds veiled by comparison. True, those electric guitars did have just a touch of sharpness, but they were also remarkably natural and alive sounding.

No doubt about it - this amp's ability to convey the shimmering timbres of acoustic instruments (best appreciated via vinyl, of course) is superb at the price. Treble isn't quite so distinguished - very clean and tidy and maybe a little forward even, but it doesn't quite have the 'reach out and grab it' realism of the midband. Ride cymbals from an old vinyl pressing of Be Bop Deluxe's 'Modern Music' sounded fine, if a little over dry and lacking in atmosphere.

Dynamically the MF surpasses Cyrus's 7 but trails the NAIT 5. There's plenty of oomph when the occasion demands and a fleet rendition of the leading edges of notes (that incisive midband makes steel string guitars, for example, sound very sharp and fast), but the X-A200R just doesn't quite have the low down grip to hang on in complex passages. Although the tricky syncopations in REM's 'West of the Fields' hardly tied it up in knots, the MF did begin to sound slightly nervous on the loudest and most complex passage. Try the same with Naim's NAIT 5 and it will sail through and come back for more!

The key to the X-A200R is its great all round ability. Here's an amp that will drive awkward speaker loads to very high levels without a word of complaint. It will dive into difficult music and almost always come out sounding assured. It will saunter along with jazz music, conveying its wealth

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of harmonic and timbral detail, and provide an almost glassclear window into classical recordings thanks to that forensic

midband. Although not the world's sweetest or punchiest performer, it's still a jack of all trades and master of some. An excellent all rounder then, and superb value at £699. By contrast, its rivals seem overpriced. \blacksquare

Great X-pectations

The DV10X4 Mk II is the latest in a long line of hugely successful budget moving coil cartridges from Dynavector. David Price thinks it's been worth the wait.

ay back in the mists of time when hi-fi was as popular as mobile phones are now, serious audiophiles used turntables as their primary music source. The magazines of the day vociferously recommended that upgraders should buy the best possible design available, which invariably meant a certain single speed Scottish deck. This created a need for good but cheap partnering tonearms and cartridges, for use while bank balances recovered from the shock.

Lest we forget, moving magnet cartridges still ruled the roost back then, but by 1978 audiophiles had an interesting alternative in the Ultimo 10X, the direct descendent of Dynavector's £199 DV10X4 Mk II. Here was a moving coil for the price of a middling moving magnet, featuring high(ish) output for use through a normal moving magnet phono stage. This was possible thanks to its designer, Professor Noburu Tominara, being a leading expert in miniature coil winding technology. His custom-designed winding machine used ultra fine wire, giving classleading output-to-mass ratios and making the 10X a practical production proposition. It went on to win the Design and Engineering Award at CES Chicago in both 1978 and 1981.

Despite the small company's modest marketing budget, the 10 has garnered a strong following amongst impoverished audiophiles. This latest model uses a smaller, elliptical nude diamond stylus and features a higher output of 2.5mV (at 1kHz, 5cm/sec.). Compliance is quoted at 12x10-6cm/dyn and cartridge weight is a lowish 4.6g. All this makes the baby Dynavector a user-friendly proposition which works well with arms like Rega's ubiquitous RB300.

Funnily enough, it sounds surprisingly similar to how I remember that old Ultimo. Whatever type of music you play, it has tremendous getup-and-go. Interestingly, the 10X4's power doesn't come from an Audio Technicastyle brightness - In fact this device is actually quite rich and fruity sounding. No, it has a tremendous grip on the fundamentals of any recording, meaning you never stop tapping your feet from beginning to end.

Cue up CSN's 'Wooden Ships' and the whole track sounds incredibly engaging. Rather than bothering with the minutiae of production

details, it just dives in head-first and has a blast. Cue up Ortofon's very capable, similarly priced MC25E and you'll hear more detail, subtlety and finesse, but won't be tapping your feet half as much. You'll also hear a starker and colder tonality which is possibly more accurate but far less enjoyable.

Spin modern discs like Thomas Dolby/ Ryuichi Sakamoto's 'Fieldwork' and the DV10X4 is even more impressive. There's tremendous power and energy in the midband and bass for a cartridge of this price - you wouldn't think it costs just £80 more than Goldring's fine 1042 moving magnet. The soundstage is wide and all-enveloping, although there's little real detail at the back of the recorded acoustic. Dynamics are great at the price - although ultimately restricted like its Ortofon rival. The only real disappointment is the treble, which is perfectly listenable but rather bland cymbals sound reasonably sweet and natural but a little too 'generic'.

Try some rock and the Dynavector loves to boogie - it's tremendously unselfconscious and just 'gets down on it' without a moment of self doubt. Feisty,



gregarious and fun, any music that's a slave to the rhythm is where this MC is most at home. Ask it to pick out subtle textural differences between instruments in acoustic recordings of orchestral works though, and it suddenly goes all shy. Basically, the DV10X4 isn't really up to deep, inner groove excavation duties, but then again what cartridge is at this price?

The joy of this little transducer is its big hearted, musical nature which oh-so-adroitly conceals its failings. No, it's not a Linn Archiv, but you wouldn't expect it to be. Rather, it's a hoot to play any music with, meaning you simply don't mourn its lack of low level ambient information, spatial accuracy or textural detail. Anyone upgrading from moving magnets who wants a taste of the high end should try to hear it.

Small mystical creatures that do magic? That's probably how Shahinian would describe its Super Elf loudspeakers. David Price hears for himself.

the

ell, they didn't exactly put a spell on me. Having spent much time trying to coax magic from these speakers, I'm afraid to report that I ended up a tad disappointed. Having come from the rarefied climes of my reference Yamaha NS1000Ms, complete with their glass-clear sounding drive units and incredibly well damped, sealed enclosures, the Shahinians literally screamed (or squawked) out at me.

Starting from the top, their one inch titanium dome tweeters were a blast from the past - when everyone fitted bright metal domes to their speakers because, well, it was the thing to do. The result was - and still is - a tizzy treble. Hi-hat cymbals, such as those of Lou Donaldson's 'Alligator Boogaloo' sounded metallic alright, but I got the feeling this was coming from the tweeter dome's own thoughts on the subject, rather than any signal fed into it. The upshot is that every cymbal assumes a single generic tone. Whether it's a sweet recording (such as the aforementioned Blue Note cut) or the thrashy, trashy percussive histrionics on Elvis Costello's 'Accidents Can Happen', they all sound the same.

Another side-effect of the Super Elves' heavy metal domes is that you find all that surface noise on your worn-out old punk records suddenly comes back to haunt you. Switch back to the ultra stiff, unresonant, featherweight Beryllium domes on the Yams and the music shines through again.

Next problem is the midband, which sounds quite clean and punchy but is also tonally homogenous and 'cuppy'. Those brass stabs on Chic's 'My Forbidden Lover' jab out at you as if the cone is introducing some extra resonance of its own

And what of those delicious female vocals - nature's finest instrument? They sounded veiled as if there was a fine curtain between them and me, yet they veered towards shrillness too.

To best understand these Shahinians' timbral abilities (or lack thereof), think of a slap bass guitar played high up on the fretboard, and hear one sampled through a mid eighties synthesiser (like a Roland D50), as on any Trevor Horn produced pop record of that period. The Super Elves simply remove an instrument's natural lustre, and give you a plastic join-up-the dots version in its place.

In other respects, the Super Elves are better. They're quite zippy, zesty little boxes that boogie along reasonably well. There isn't much bass to speak of, but what little lows there are emanating from the 5 1/2 inch polypropylene woofer are lithe and supple. Indeed they remind me of the old 1970s AR18s - quite listenable despite the tragic transparency.

Unfortunately though, the ARs were budget speakers and the Super Elves are not. Respectable rhythmic abilities aside, their soundstaging, depth perspective and image projection are all well below par at the price.

So no, I didn't like them, but as loudspeakers are such a personal taste this is not to say that you won't. They're without doubt an extreme loudspeaker. If you're more into the (dare I say it) the Linn/Naim 'follow the tune' school of speakers, you may appreciate them more - but then again, compare them to Linn's own Ninkas and they're found sadly wanting in this respect too.

To my ears at least, even Wharfedale's £130 Diamond 8.1s are more musical - go up to the likes of Musical Technology's metal coned PM 15s (at £500) and the Shahinians are out of their depth. As far as Super Elves go, less isn't more.

IN GOOD

Norway's high end hi-fi gurus, Electrocompaniet, have launched a new range of products. Simon Pope gets to grips with the EC1-4 integrated amplifier.



Ithough the name may be new to some readers, the four musician/producer founders of Electrocompaniet (none 'educated' in electronics) produced their first 25W integrated amplifier some twenty five years ago, based upon a new approach to transistor amp design by Dr. Matti Otala. This is a company that wanted to do things differently. High open loop frequency response, low open loop distortion and low feedback was the guideline, difficult at the time as there were almost apparently no transistors on the market that could handle the demand.

Since these early days limitations have decreased and the company now have a classy looking range of dual mono Class A balanced design amps, consisting of preamps, power amps and monoblocs. These mostly use one input block called a transconductance amplifier and a output block called a transresistance amplifier. The input block, the company say, has no overall feedback, so "leaving the positive and negative inputs of the differential input stage equal for both AC and DC impedance." The output block has parallel feedback making the input resistance low (<1000hm is

quoted) preventing "kick-back" from the speaker entering the amplifier through the feedback loop.

The new EC1-4 with its dark, marble effect frontage has an air of the high-end about it that convinces you that parting with a fair stack of notes will be worth it. Major use of blue LEDs (the industry's new darling) is found and the look is modern, although the case is very large.

When it comes to sound, Electrocompaniet have always favoured the high end style of solid state, a full and powerful characteristic with headroom and detail. The ECI-4 is a high powered (120W/channel into 80hms) integrated amplifier which is a DC coupled design with a total of six line inputs, two of which are balanced (in true Scandinavian high-end style) and also has the addition of a balanced output for adding a power amp as an upgrade bi-amping option.

One characteristic which links all Electrocompaniet amplifiers is the use of the company's unique Floating Transformer Technology (FTT). This results in a more linear supply with higher current capability and lower impedance. Capacitors are selected for their impedance behaviour versus frequency and not just for size. The EC1-4 also has protection circuitry against shorting the output terminals which protects the speaker against DC voltage. There's no rotary volume control on the amplifier; controls are limited to gold push buttons on the fascia and the simple remote control.

NORWEGIAN BLUES

Using a Meridian 506.24 CD player, plus Quad ESL988s and Mission's 782 'speakers I ran in the ECI-4 for a good few days until the sound mellowed slightly from the initial out of the box sound. Kicking off with John Lee Hooker's guitar driven blues the EC showed the transparent trait of its smaller brother (the £,1000 EC-1-3). It gave good insight into the mix, with a detail rendition of the classic number 'Boom Boom'. Vocals were gruff and rough, as intended, with the accompanying groove very tight and focussed. Bass was tight and deep, with the bass drum thumping away for all it was worth. The high frequencies such as cymbals were detailed but a tad bright and hard. Midrange, however was fairly open and spacious.

This spaciousness was demonstrated better by a Reference

Recordings version of Mahler's Das Lied Von Der Erde played by the Minnesota Orchestra. Michelle de Young's rich contralto voice in the last movement had the right amount of depth to make it a very natural presentation. The same went for the instruments. You'll get far more natural timbre from a similarly priced valve amp but the ECI-4 did a good job of creating a natural space in which the large orchestra could space itself out. Flutes and clarinets sounded realistic and on the few occasions when the orchestra really lets rip, it had all the more effect thanks to the EC's good dynamic range. My only gripe was that an essential element of lyrical smoothness was missing. I was listening to the orchestration as opposed to the piece as a communicative whole, which is essential in this deep, spiritual music.

Changing the mode completely, it was time to find out what the EC could do with electronic dance music in the shape of the stomping track 'Uphold' from Talvin Singh's new album 'Ha'. Not surprisingly, the power of the amp meant it stuck to the beats like a wasp to an iced bun, showing a nimble and powerful bass and a total grip on the pounding breakbeats. This kind of music is well suited to this sort of amp, a powerful yet highly controlled sound that will have fans of this type of music begging for more. Not exactly subtle and sophisticated, though.

This is an amplifier very much in the transparent and detailed mould that can also rock out with the best of them with a big reserve of power. The down side of this is that listening can take on an analytical edge which can ultimately turn out to be hard



work. It also sometimes has quite a bright sound that can be a tad too much with trumpets and violins, for example. On the upside though, it's very revealing and gives great insight into good recordings, especially when matched to a revealing pair of speakers. Classical music sparkles with air and vitality and rock recordings are detailed and exciting, if none to subtle.

There is air and space around instruments and with the healthy power output, a great sense of control and headroom. As far as competition goes, there's unfortunately plenty from the like of Musical Fidelity, who manage to do it at a cheaper price in the form of the A3 integrated which has the same amount of dynamic range and transparency, along with more fluidity and smoothness than the ECI-4.

For those after healthy one-box amplification in the true transparent hi-fi mould, they may well find their grail here, as long as they don't mind paying for it. \blacksquare

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LETTER OF THE MONTH

A BIT OF WHAT YOU FANCY Having recently

purchased Sony's superb SCD555ES player to partner my Musical Fidelity A3 pre power amps and Ruark Crusader speakers I looked forward to reading David Price's review on the above player [May 2000 Hi-fi World]. There are one or two comments I would like to make, if I may.

All the good things that are said about this player are the exact reason why I bought it - the full-bodied and rich tone, smoothness, decently extended treble and evenness of tone and textural accuracy. There's also a sheer lack of grain, soundstaging, attack speed and dynamics - all of which David said it didn't have. He also said that he started to dislike the SCD555ES against the sound of an older Sony (CDP-557ES) player, even though the latter sounds slightly more grainy, steelier and timbrally in a league below the 555ES. To question the 555ES as lacking in progress when so many other reviewers have praised it leaves me to doubt the value of your review. J Carter.

I too am always fascinated to read other reviews of the same stuff I write about in these pages, and I have to say that when opinions diverge, it doesn't make me doubt my ears as much as the efficacy of other reviewers' reference systems.

As my system is the most transparent I've heard (and I've experienced a lot, believe me.) I can only puzzle how these other reviewers reached their respective conclusions. I stand by what I said, in that the SCD-555ES is a fine machine but is rhythmically slower than

the vintage multibit Sony machine I had to hand.

I'd also respectfully suggest that this is a known drawback of Bitstream players, and one reason why the redoubtable Mr Ken Ishiwata went back to 16bit, 4 times oversampling when crafting his flagship Marantz CD7 last year. Lest we forget, it was this very same multibit chipset that got Naim into silver disc players some ten years ago with the CDI. To me at least, that counts for something. I predict that the same folk who were busy buying up mouldy old Garrard 301s in the nineties will soon be running round frantically trying to get their paws on late eighties Philips CD840s!

I'm happy that you like the 555ES but I'm sure that hearing a well designed multibit CD player will see your Sony in the classified ads before the month is out ('one careful owner, little use', etc.) Similarly priced Brit machines like the Meridian 506.24 (also smooth, also Bitstream, but more musical) or Cyrus CD7/PSX-R have its measure. DP

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III A QUICK TURN

Dear Sirs

I hope this is a quick query. I am looking to buy a replacement turntable as my Czech-built NAD 5120 is starting to go wrong. I have seen in your ads an 'asnew, unused' Systemdek 1/920 for £129.95. Is this a good buy and is it a better deck than the Project Debut II?? The turntable will be my main source - I have over 1000 LPs and 7" singles. My system is as follows: Amp -

Harman/Kardon HK6150 Speakers -Mission 760i CD - Marantz CD52 Mk II Should I consider either of the above or look for something higher spec. like a Rega 3 or Systemdek IIX/900? In either case, what type of cartridge do you recommend?

Hi Jeff. Whilst the Systemdek is by no means a bad performer, it doesn't quite have the fluid and controlled traits of the IIX/900 at its best and there is strong competition when it comes to choosing a new turntable. A Project Debut II at a mere £110 is an absolute bargain. Complete with a Project arm fitted with an Ortofon OMB5E MM cartridge, it's simply a case of taking it out of the box, plugging it in and ploughing your way through your 1000 or so LPs. It takes absolutely no setting up or fiddling to create a sound that will, in my view, easily match the secondhand Systemdek, which only has a slightly better sense of musical 'inertia' to it (providing it's in good nick, that is).

Alternatively, for a few dollars more the Rega-based NAD 533, complete with RB250 and a Goldring Elektra cartridge for £220 is another exceptional budget bargain and will replace your existing NAD spinner nicely. Or there's always the ubiquitous Rega Planar 3 package for just under £300 if your budget stretches this far. It gives a performance that equals products twice its price, delivering a high end like simplicity of sound for a fraction of the price.

If £300 is a price you can afford, you can always scour the pages at the rear of this magazine to pick up a reference bargain in the shape of a mid-eighties LP12. This will offer virtually limitless upgrading potential, as opposed to the limited potential of the previously mentioned models. As far as suitable MM cartridges are concerned, you could try Ortofon's 510 or 520P (£38 and £65 respectively) which are both good and lively sounding options, or perhaps the fast but slightly coloured sounding 1012GX at £79. SP

IPSPLASH THE CASH

I bought Hi-Fi World for the first time and I like it very much. I spent the whole Sunday reading it. To be honest I bought it for a friend because he wants to buy a Linn Ekos for his LP12. The article about the SA-1 intrigued me because you claim that most CD players below £1200 make a mess of Donald Fagen's 'Tomorrow's Girls'. Because I had replaced my Marantz CD 67 (talk about mess) which provided me with uncontrollable low and unwanted vibrations, I got curious what that track would do in my £500 Musical Fidelity E624. As I expected I couldn't establish a 'splashy mess' at all. On the contrary, I think the MF handled the song very well with much detail, cleanness and transbarency

My other system components are MF E20/E30 pre/power, MF X10D, Canton Carat CM2 standmount speakers with Plus-C passive sub, Dual CS750-1/DN750, MF inter-connects, Monitor Silver Line speaker cable. As I haven't upgraded my factory cartridge yet I want know what you would advise me? My dealer recommends a Denon DL103 or DL110, others say a Grado Prestige should do the trick or upgrade the deck. I can't afford Linn or Michell right now. Dirk van der Sloot

I honestly wouldn't recommend the Denons. I once bought a new DL103 in Japan because I loved

the idea of broadcast-standard quality from NHK that hadn't changed since the fifties. But then I heard it playing! In truth, these are lovely old throwbacks which don't hold a candle to either the Goldring G1042 MM (£120) or the Dynavector DV10x4 (£195). I'd go for the latter. Both are rich and fruity but the DV has that beautiful shimmering, 'alive' quality you get from MCs, while retaining the phono-stage friendly high output of an MM. DP

IPROK ME

I am the proud owner of the best system I have ever had - a Roksan ROK-DPI transport, ROK-DAI converter with DS4 power supply, Linsley-Hood kit amp and Magneplanar SMGa 'speakers with active subwoofer designed by Shaun Williams (new owner of Hart Electronics and ex-Wilmslow Audio). The query lies with the CD player; it is getting on for nine or ten years old now and while it can still sound sublime in all areas with a good recording, I am curious as to how it would compare with new equipment?

When it was new it cost in the region of £2,000, and because I have not heard many later CD players, I don't know how it would compare to say, the new Caspian (this being just an example). If the performance has dramatically improved over the last few years (although I can't see how it can improve much) then I feel that I have to keep spending large amounts of cash just to keep still, or is this set-up one that can last a lifetime? Your thoughts are eagerly awaited. Alan Parkinson

Amazing, but true. All acoustic recordings – voices, strings and, yes, even triangles – sound better if the system can produce really deep bass. Why does it matter?



You will take a major step towards greater **REALISM** if your system can produce really deep, clean bass – for all types of music. Even madrigals.

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Funny you should ask this because you join us at a time when I've been reflecting on the lack of progress Sony has made on its latest mid-price ES machine. I'm afraid the brutal truth is that in the past ten years, it's probably turntables and loudspeakers that have progressed the most - both analogue components! Yes, cheap CD players are far better than before, but when you get into the high end it's less a case of 'better' and more of 'different'. Your Roksan is off the pace in terms of low level detail resolution and refinement, but is certainly not worth upgrading unless [a] your ancillaries have changed and it's no longer a sonic match, or [b] you have cash falling out of your pockets. At your stage, I'd recommend a Marantz SA-1 which will really push ahead of the Roksan, but it really isn't worth the £4,000 (including PX) it would cost you to change - especially as you sound so happy with the system as it is. I'd just have a holiday somewhere warm! DP

II> SPEAK MY LINN, GO

I have a system comprising Linn LP12/ Ittok/K9, Wakonda, LK280, old Saras (Cannon connectors/ new tweeters). I want to upgrade the speakers first then the cartridge. I have a budget of £1,000 only. I've listened to Nautilus 805s (they had great reviews) but didn't like the sound. I've also tried Kabers but didn't think they offered much more than the Saras. This leads me towards second-hand Isobariks. What do you think in the context of my system and did the sound change much as the specification improved? How do they compare to the Sara sound given they are based on the same bass driver principles?

Any thoughts on a cartridge? I'm thinking of Dynavector 20X and would not want to spend any more than this. Would it be much of an improvement - and if so, in what ways?

Finally, for the cash-limited like me could you do a review of speakers today vs. speakers of the same price (second-hand) from yesteryear? We readers want the best sound for our money and I'm sure older speakers second-hand could offer a better sound than new for the same outlay. This won't be popular with manufacturers but we want to make a properly informed choice! Do other readers agree? Thanks for a great mag. Like others I'm a recent convert from more expensive rivals. With Cannon connectors round the back, those are one geriatric pair of Saras! You're right then to identify them as ready for upgrading, but personally I wouldn't go for 'Bariks. Speakers are an intensely personal choice, but in my humble opinion at least, they weren't the best transducers that ever came out of Glasgow. Linn owning friends tell me how great a well sorted pair can sound, but unfortunately they've never actually been able to demonstrate this 'fact'. When I have actually heard them, they always proved a major let down. The trouble is that Linn speakers are both very much an acquired taste and also very patchy within the breed - for every gem like the Kan I, there was a duffer in the shape of the Nexus.

If you like the sound of the Saras and wish to stay with Linn, I'd actually recommend that you get a newer pair of Sara Nines. These came out in the late eighties and were the Sara's swansong, with better cabinets, drive units and biwirable crossovers. They have the same basic footprints of your speakers, but are tighter, cleaner and more detailed with even better dynamics. You can pick up a pair for under £300 now and, together with a new cartridge, they will really lift your system. By contrast, Isobariks of any vintage will sound ponderous and coloured, lacking in phasecoherence and with poor imaging properties.

And now a message to all K9 owners - ditch it! You can no longer buy a stylus (the K5 is the only tip available from Linn as I write) and by modern standards it's poor anyway. Forget what all those mid-eighties reviews told you - it isn't a shortcut to audio nirvana. As you mention, the Dynavector DV20X-H (£299) is the one to have. Richer, smoother and yet more organically musical, it makes K9s and K18s sound like cheap CD players. Of course, it isn't the best in the world - the likes of Lyra's Lydian Beta are far better still at twice the price.

As for the rest of your system, I'd go for a Cirkus turntable mod (£300) as soon as humanly possible and then look to picking up a mint secondhand Lingo power supply. As for classic speaker reviews, keep your

eyes trained on Olde Worlde over the next few months. DP =



Put this pooch to sleep

The tone of Computer Audio World has concerned me for a while, for you review exclusively PC solutions, without necessarily being aware that this is what you're doing. I would like to see you looking more at the Apple alternative. Consider the following:

I hope the above shows that Apple has considerable market influence and is also rather a good platform for audio, and I hope you will consider reviewing Mac based products with your traditional wit and open mindedness in future.

support Mac at all - just look at the scant number of MP3 portables with Mac drivers.

[3] Many soundcards are cross platform and therefore the PC version will perform similarly to the Mac version, so the review is applicable to Macs too.

I use both Macs and PCs at work and agree that PCs have been in The Stone Age compared to Macs as far as computer audio (and indeed most things) is/ are concerned, until recently. We will of course endeavour to do more Mac stuff but I don't really want to go into a (tiresome) debate about platform politics. Music is far more interesting than Operating Systems. DP

II> UNNECESSARY ROUGHNESS

Dear Hi-Fi World,

My current system consists of a Musical Fidelity A3 CD player, an Ion Obelisk 200 amplifier and Mission 782 loudspeakers. The problem is this: most of the music I play is exciting and involving across a great deal of different styles, i.e. funk, jazz, classical, and other laid back types. Its when I get to Rock and Indie music that the problems are. I find it quite fatiguing for any great length of time and I feel my amplifier is the source of the problem. Could you suggest a shortlist of amplifiers for me to audition as mine seems to get longer and longer? What I'm looking for is an amp that will offer greater control, taking the edge off the top end and tightening up the bass. Any suggestions will be gratefully accepted and acted upon. My budget is £750 and upwards depending on the improvement in sound, lets say up to £1000. Regards Neil.

Hi Neil. I'm not familiar with the lon amplifier that you feel is the root of your sonic problems but there are plenty of potential replacements in your price bracket that fit the criteria.

One option is the virtually unbeatable Cyrus 7 integrated at £700. It's actually below your price bracket and will deliver a controlled and smooth, easy sound whilst having grip, power and speed to match. There is no harshness at all to the 7's sound and it could well take off the treble edge that's making your life difficult at present! It's also great looking and very user friendly.

For an equally smooth but slightly less exciting option you could go for the Audio Analogue Puccini SE Remote at £795. This is an involving listen with lots of little audiophile traits such as a highly detailed midrange and a deep, effective sound stage, and it will suit your 782s as much as the Cyrus 7, creating excellent imaging. It also has a rarity at this price point: an excellent sounding MM/MC switchable phono stage.

Moving up the price ladder brings equally effective results. Musical Fidelity's £850 A3 integrated isn't perhaps as smooth and refined as the Cyrus 7 but it is wonderfully transparent and has oodles of power and control. This is a true high-end product at a sensible price and like the Puccini it also has an MM/MC phono stage.

It's worth auditioning all of these items to see which suits your tastes best and one is bound to come up trumps, hopefully. SP

II> BEGGING TO DIFFER

Dear Hi-Fi World,

Regarding your review of the Sony SCD-555ES SACD player (May issue) I was rather surprised to read your backhand swipe at the Sony SCD-XB940 SACD player, which was called "low rent", "middling" and "compromised" by David Price. Yet, in the review of this player in September 2000 by Simon Pope, a rather different picture was painted - it was described in such terms as "plays CD's with refinement and control, and SACD's with a clarity and openness", and it was eventually given a four globe rating, which, if I'm not mistaken is rather positive! Either Mr Price or Mr Pope must be on different wavelengths, or the hi-fi world must be a very different place now from what it was in September 2000.

If the latter is true, I am only too happy to live in the past! It was on the strength of Mr Pope's review of the 940 that I auditioned this player, and I was so impressed with the sound quality on standard CD replay (let alone SACD) that I sold my Meridian 506 (which until then I swore I would never be parted with) and replaced it with a shiny new (well a sort of dark shine, as I chose the black finish) SCD-XB940 for a mere £425 from my local Richer Sounds shop.

The CD reproduction easily betters my 'old' Meridian 506, and in my opinion is a match for the new Meridian 506 or Linn Genki players I compared it with before taking the plunge. After extensive listening for a period of six months now, I would judge the reproduction to be very accurate, and the sound has a wonderful crystalline quality which makes it very easy for one to focus solely on the music, and to forget one is actually listening to a piece of electronic equipment.

As for SACD reproduction, I now have all of six SACD discs; a mixture of

pure DSD recordings (e.g. Dave Brubeck's 40th Anniversary concert on Telarc), and re-masters (e.g. Beethoven's 6th Symphony cond. Bruno Walter on Sony). The difference between CD and SACD is not immediately startling, but on extended listening its qualities become evident, and the extra timbral detail and illusion created of the musicians being in the same room is very addictive – I don't think I could go back to listing to the 'standard' CD versions of these recordings.

Incidentally, the rest of my system consists of an NVA AP70 amplifier connected to Neat Mystiques with Nordost Blue Heaven cables, using Kimber cable mains leads (from Russ Andrews) and I am pretty confident this system is quite discriminating of the CD source quality.

I simply can't relate to the descriptions of the 940 player being 'middling' because my own experience is so very different, and I can't help asking myself whether its the same piece of equipment we are talking about!

If the 940 player is compromised and "low rent", it is with respect to the build quality. The chassis is fairly lightweight and the CD drawer is flimsy. Another reservation I have is that the player gets rather warm in use, and discs come out heated up to more than hand temperature, which may not be the best thing for their longevity (the CDs, not the hands).

Hi Paul. Let's clear this one up. The comments that DP made about the 940 weren't slagging it off, so much as being brutally observational. He mentioned, as you say, that it is "low rent" and "compromised". It is, of course, both - it's affordable and has some kind of compromise in relation to its far more expensive stable mates. Put simply, if it weren't compromised Sony wouldn't sell any SCD-1, 777 or 555 SACD players!

Both DP and myself are in agreement that the 940 is one of the better hi-fi products on the market at present and it offers excellent value for money. As a pure CD player it can perhaps be bettered by a few at the price.

I perhaps took to the machine a little better than DP did but this is the way that we run the magazine, thank the Lord. Being an informed journal for the enthusiast, rather than merely a consumer guide, it give us scope to air our sometimes differing opinions in a constructive and hopefully enjoyable way to give the reader another expert point of view. This we feel is healthy for both us, the writers, and you, the readers, and frees us up from having a constricting 'house voice'.

Incidentally, DP and myself actually work precisely on the same wavelength (frightening, eh?) but it doesn't mean we can't have the odd occasional difference of opinion (even though mine is always right!). SP

Cyrus's new CD7/PSX-R is the Huntingdon company's latest reference silver disc spinner. David Price gives the diminutive duo the once over.

yrus have released a number of interesting CD players over the years, which have always been - in my opinion - underestimated and overlooked. The reason for this is the company's systemcentric philosophy. In some audiophiles' minds at least, there's a sense that these beautiful babes look and feel a little too good to be take-noprisoners audiophile tackle.

> I learnt otherwise five years ago when I bought a DAD3. It was the company's entry-level silver disc spinner and at just under £600 made some nice noises, thank you very much. I watched in puzzlement when other mags showered its ergonomics with praise but gave it 'B+' for sound.

As with all Cyrus products, an optional £350 PSX-R power supply further raises sound quality, making the £1150 CD7/PSX-R combo the Huntingdon company's statement source component right now.

The CD7 shares relatively little with the DAD3 that preceded it, save the famous inverted die-cast aluminium alloy chassis which now comes in 'noughties silver' as well as 'nineties black' (and very nice it looks too in this new hue). You get a new Philips transport capable of reading CD-RW discs (very useful to computer audiophiles like moi) and Cyrus's latest 24bit DAC. With echoes of the Q module, there's a mysterious interface for an as yet unknown decoder to further upgrade the machine as DAC technology progresses.

Vital statistics of the cute casework are 215x75x365mm, and the whole CD player weighs a rather waif-like 3.1kg - no Sony ES machine, this!

Facilities are modest, but by no means minimal. The player itself is reduced to carrying the basic transport controls, leaving all the goodies for the swanky silver remote control. There's a Display Off button which is well worth using if sound is paramount, plus the usual (for Cyrus) Phase Control, which inverts the absolute phase at the touch of the button. I really can't see the point of this - I never needed it during the entire review period.

Round the back are two sets of fixed, line-level analogue outputs, plus a coaxial digital out. I for one would have liked an optical output as well, being an avid MiniDisc portable fan. As well as the usual IEC mains input, there's a DIN socket for the PSX-R power supply, plus System Bus socketry which of course applies only if you're a Cyrus system owner.

Overall fit and finish is excellent and the green backlit dot-matrix liquid crystal display is a cut above that fitted to the previous DAD3 series.

Coming in the same nonmagnetic alloy case as the CD7, the PSX-R 'Intelligent Power Supply' pumps out a clean feed of between 18 and 35.5V DC, depending on which other Cyrus component it's powering (it cleverly senses what's attached and supplies the correct voltage automatically).

Unlike some other manufacturers' outboard power supplies, this one doesn't replace the internal PSU of the CD player it's used with, but complements it. Annoyingly, this results in twice as many mains leads per component. Cyrus recommend the PSX-R is placed beside, rather than underneath (or on top of) its partnering component, but I couldn't discern any audible difference.

At 6kg the PSX-R is twice as



heavy as the CD7, which confirms the presence of its beefy 300VA toroidal transformer. Cyrus also claims the use of rigidly regulated output rails and trick slit-foil capacitors.

SOUND QUALITY

Back in 'ye olde days of digital audio', the bright players traditionally came from Japan and the smoothies from Blighty. To wit, you'd have the choice of, say, a wallpaper stripping Technics or Sony and a mellow Arcam or Meridian. The Cyrus CD7/PSX-R proves that those days are gone forever - here's a silver disc spinner that's far more in your face than the similarly priced Sony SCD-555ES I reviewed in May. It's also, interestingly enough, quite unlike the company's own old aforementioned DAD3 series designs.

If the Meridian 506.24 is a bespoke pair of brogues, then this new Cyrus combo is a pair of Adidas Kobe trainers. Lightweight, lithe, cheetah-like off the mark, it makes its Meridian, Arcam (FMJ CD23) and Sony rivals look positively lardy. Indeed, I'd even go so far as to call it quite 'Naim-esque', which is frankly not what I'd expected, having lived with one of its predecessors. This

player is more Ali G than Alastair Cooke - if you've any notions of relaxing in front of your new CD7 with your toes toasting inside your slippers as your puff away on your pipe, then forget it.

My first encounter was with Donald Fagen's 'Tomorrow's Girls', the very torture track I tried with the Meridian 506.24 last autumn. Being a British player, I was expecting a beguiling and relaxed rendition of this classic track, but 'twas not to be. yet it showed great grip and composure. Never once sounding flustered, the Cyrus followed all those complex keyboard runs with zeal, starting and stopping like its life depended on it.

Better still was its 'hear-through' recorded acoustic. Image location was rock solid and soundstaging bold, expressive and out-of-the-speakers, with no sense of the compression I'd heard with the Sony SCD-555ES.

Again, bass was leaner than its



Rather, the Cyrus combo sounded brilliantly focused, with the accent fairly and squarely on rhythms. Highly incisive, it threw out massive amounts of low level detail with forensic zeal, giving the impression of a 'glass-clear' window on the recording. Tonally neutral, the tight but light bass lacked the sumptuous bloom of the Meridian 506-24. Treble wasn't harsh or forward by any means, but certainly 'brightly lit'.

Switching to Scritti Politti's 'Absolute', the CD7 further revealed its hand. The album from which this track comes, the superb 'Cupid & Psyche 85' is hardly a forward affair, but now the spotlight was on the midband. The CD7 made a heroic job of this song. An inordinately complex exercise in synthesiser programming, 'Absolute' is a rhythmic assault course for any front-end source component, Arcam, Meridian and Sony rivals, but still capable of summoning up ample grunt when called upon - and then some. Indeed, when pressed, the CD7 can belt out lows better than the next man, and is particularly adept at conveying a bass line's 'light and shade' - it doesn't just 'boom' along regardless.

Moving to Miles Davis' epic 'Kind of Blue' (Super Bit Mapped) remaster, the CD7 proved slightly less convincing. Don't get me wrong, it did everything right and imparted the recording's famously open and airy soundstage, but proved just a touch too analytical to let the listener really relax into the music. I found myself listening critically to the foibles and failings of the recording, rather than tapping my feet regardless, as I'd done with the Arcam and Meridian. The fact that it was tonally on the dry side of neutral didn't help either. Cymbals were meticulously well described warts and all - but lacked the euphonic warmth of the 506.24.

As well as proving a star with the electronics of Scritti Politti, the Cyrus made a big impression with classical music. My home-made CD-R copy of a much played Karajan recording of Beethoven's Pastoral Symphony (DG, 1986) went down a storm, with the CD7 setting up a tremendously deep and expansive soundstage, into which everything slotted with riflebolt precision. Rhythmically engaging, with a real sense of the music going places, the Cyrus combo's firecracker dynamics and tremendous grip were just what the occasion demanded. Interestingly though, as well as its talents with transients, it's great with textures too. Violins had a breathy, shimmering quality that few players achieve at this price - by comparison the Sony, for example, sounds flat and bland. The result is that the instruments feel alive and almost tangible - this is a trick that vinyl's famous for, but with CD you usually have to spend more than the CD7/PSX-R's £1,150 for so much as a taste of it.

With a rhythmic, taut and detailed sound this new Cyrus combo makes almost any disc you feed it come alive. There's real transparency and surprising ability with textures. Being on the tonally lean side of neutral, it's a perfect match for the warm, forgiving Cyrus 7 amplifier, but don't expect it to soften a Naim system. Overall, one of the very best players at its price point, if it's transparency, punch and grip you want.

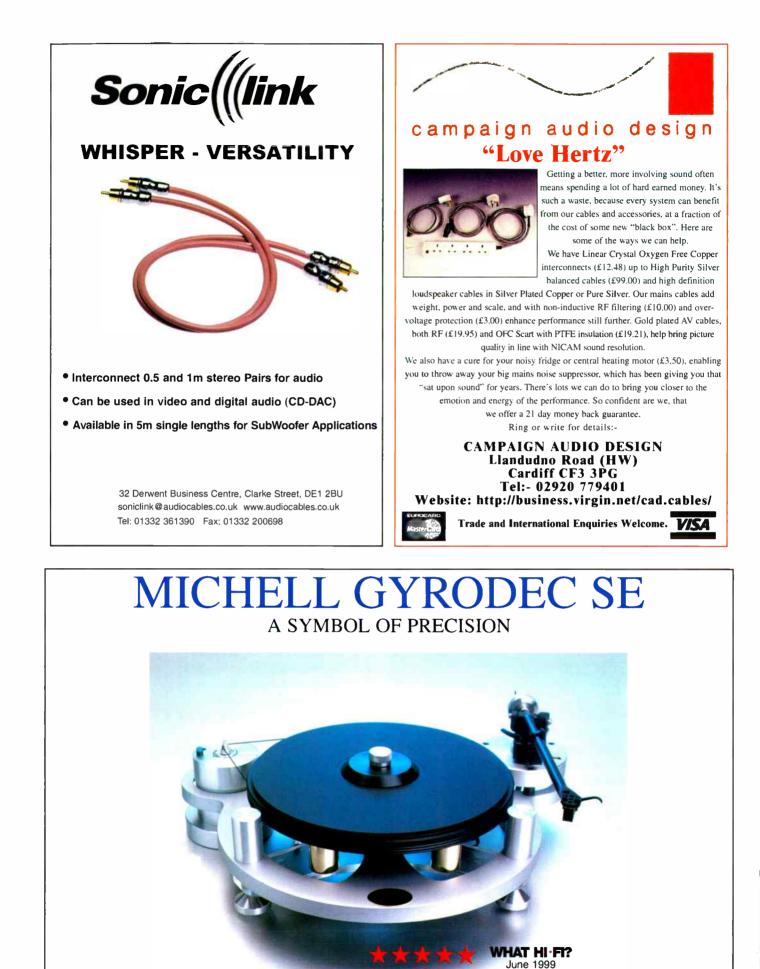

In the first of an in-depth twopart feature, David Price tells you all you need to know about designing your own purposebuilt audio computer.

GETTING CLEANER

Steinberg's new Clean Plus 2.0 contains all you need to record LPs onto CD-R discs using any PC equipped with a CD writer, including a phono pre-amp which Steinberg claims offers excellent sound quality! The new Clean can digitally remove layers of 'snap, crackle and pop' (and rumble, clicks and hiss, too) before your very ears. It lets you slow down or speed up recordings (which owners of 78s will appreciate) and even offers full MP3 compatibility using the Fraunhofer codec. Just plug your turntable into the supplied preamp, connect this to your PC soundcard and digitally record your vinyl onto your computer using the latest version of the bundled Steinberg WaveLab Lite. You then process it using Clean Plus, and burn it onto computer CD-Rs for playing on any hi-fi, in-car or portable CD player. You choose exactly how much noise reduction you want - too much and you'll remove the sparkle, too little and the scratches will come back. Get it right though and you'll get brilliant sounding CDs that cost pennies. The only downside is the steep £90 retail price and the fact that Clean 2.0 demands serious processing power, so you'll need a fast PC for best results. www.steinberg.net

NEW MICROSOFT MEDIA PLAYER

In a controversial move, Microsoft's new Windows Media Player 8.0 will not be available as a free download (as was WMP7). Rather, it will only come bundled with the forthcoming Windows XP, the upgrade to the Windows 95, 98, ME and 2000 operating systems. The older version of Media Player, version 7.0, will continue to be available as a free, separate download.

Many people have decried the move, saying it is reminiscent of Microsoft's previous attempt to 'tie' Internet Explorer to Windows 95 several years ago. This helped shut rival Netscape out of the browser market. Microsoft is awaiting an Appeals Court ruling on the matter that could result in a break-up of the company. Repeating the company's argument for this, Microsoft argues that Media Player 8 includes new features that require close integration with Windows XP

YAMAHA BURNS BRIGHTER

Yamaha's new CD-RW21000E-VK PC CD-RW cleverly adjusts the laser system to the type of disc being burned for optimum reliability. The downside is that it doesn't, as yet, feature the allimportant BURN-Proof system. At 16x write, 10x re-write and 40x read it's one of the fastest around right now, although you'll have to run it under 12x for good sounding audio discs. Standard E-IDE makes it easy to install on any PC. Good bundled software makes it a fine buy at £165 if speed is at a premium. www.yamaha.de

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also put further pressure on competitive products, including RealNetworks' RealPlayer 8 and Apple Computer's QuickTime 5.01, analysts said. Other companies that stand to lose from the action are Roxio, maker of Easy CD Creator 5, and InterVideo, with its WinDVD. By integrating Windows Media Player 8 with Windows XP, Microsoft could make it more difficult for competitors to distribute their players. And if fewer people are using competing media players, more Web sites could start offering content only viewable with Microsoft's product. www.microsoft.com

REAL, REAL, REAL

The digital music format war rages hard, with RealAudio making a strong stand. A study by Nielsen/ NetRatings reveals that home consumption of Internet audio and video content in the Real format reached an all time high in February 2001. With more than 29.6 million home users accessing content in Real formats, it's more than twice as popular as its nearest competitor. A second report containing recently revised data from Jupiter Media Metrix, shows use of RealPlayer far outstripping the usage of all other media players, and accounts for previously unreported RealPlayer usage through AOL. The studies suggest that growth for Windows Media Player and QuickTime is significantly lower. www.real.com

Sony's new Digital Relay series of multimedia peripherals proves that the Japanese giant has well and truly got the computer audio bit between its teeth. The £410 CRX10U looks like a Discman and works like a CD writer, but is in fact both. It hooks up via USB (meaning it works with both Windows and Macs), and lets you do a host of music-related things. It comes with software for editing and recording digital images, copying music CDs and burning your own CD and MP3 CD compilations. There's a wired remote complete with LCD track display, a rechargeable battery giving 2 hours of CD recording, AC adapter, power and USB cables, stereo headphones, blank CD-R, quick start manual and multilingual CD Tools software. For notebook users its portability is priceless. Weighing just 435g (with battery) and measuring a modest 132x 25x 189.5mm it's as handy as a Discman but bags more versatile. Look out for a full review next month.

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AUDIO ALCHEMY

Fancy building your very own digital audio server? In the first part of a two-part feature, David Price shows exactly what you need to design a bespoke audio PC.

omputers and music have been a part of one another for over twenty years now but only recently, in the last few years, have home computers become fast enough to process audio without difficulty. Despite the popularity of DIY audio, few screwdriver wielding audiophiles have ventured into the alien waters of piecing together an audio computer - which is probably a lot easier than you think.

> As Linn's new Kivor proves, it's perfectly possible for 'audio servers' to replace conventional front end music sources, although most computer audiophiles use them to complement their existing hi-fis at present.

A modern PC (a few years old) can be kitted out with a few choice peripherals to tune it up for audio, or a new one built from the ground up.

Here's what a modern PC can do:-

1. Transcribe vinyl, tapes or CDs (your own, of course!) onto CD-Rs for playing on any CD player - be it the Linn CD12 in your hi-fi system, the Kenwood in your car or your Sony Discman on the bus. Assuming you've already got a PC, you'll find it cheaper than buying a standalone hi-fi CD recorder, and you can use blank discs costing one quarter of the price, too.

2. Clean up the music from vinyl or tapes using powerful digital signal processing routines built into the latest audio editing programs. You can even recover unplayable audio CDs onto your computer's hard drive, and burn them onto fresh blank CD-Rs that will play on anything.

3. Make elaborate compilation CDs

using audio editing software to clean up the recording, cross fade from track to track or even re-equalise it to restore some of the music's sheen. You can spin any number of copies straight from your hard drive, at up to sixteen times the speed of conventional hi-fi CD recorders. 4. Download virtually any song ever recorded, for free, from the internet and then burn it onto CD to play in any normal CD player. There are literally millions of MP3s around, many with decent sound quality, for the taking. They can be converted to normal audio before going onto CD.

This is a great way of discovering new music, or 'trying before buying'. If you like it enough you can always buy the CD online at a greatly discounted price! 5. Run an mp3 player, downloading music from the internet or converting to mp3 from your music collection.

So what about the sound quality?

The answer is that it's as good as you want it to be. Even with budget PC audio peripherals and a cooking computer, you can get surprisingly good hi-fi results - spend more and you can approach studio quality.

Audio servers are easier than you'd think to build, providing you take care to choose matching components. Motherboards are built to accept specific commercial processor ranges (e.g. Socket A AMD Athlon, Intel Pentium Socket 370).

The big question is whether you need to buy a PC from scratch or adapt your existing computer. If your machine is less than a few years old, then you're more than halfway there already. If not, you'll need to decide what you want your audio server to do and buy the bits accordingly. You can of course, buy a fully assembled computer from your local Dixons, but by putting the bits together yourself you'll get exactly what you want for far less money.

CASE

These come in various sizes, and complete with power supplies providing the standard voltages required (+/-12, 5V and 3.3V) by the board, fan, leds, etc. It's best to get a full sized ATX, since this is easiest to work on. It will come with drive bays, hard disc bays, an internal loudspeaker, the power supply with

flying leads fitted with necessary plugs and a large cut out motherboard support area.

CPU

The heart of your computer is its Central Processing Unit, which sits on the motherboard. Choosing the right processor can be a minefield, with CPUs coming in all shapes and sizes, but for realistic audio work you'll need at least a 400MHz chip. Obviously, the faster the better, but there's no need for overkill here even a 233MHz will perform hard disk recording at a push.

A good value starter is an AMD Socket A Athlon or Duron, which will do the job without breaking the bank, leaving you more money to spend on your soundcard.

The type of processor you can use depends on the motherboard your PC has. If you have, or buy, a new PC this is likely to be either a Socket A AMD compatible board or a Pentium II or Celeron board in one of its many types.

If you're either buying a CPU and/or a motherboard from scratch, or looking to upgrade your existing kit for better performance, it's best to check with your supplier whether your CPU or board will work with each other.

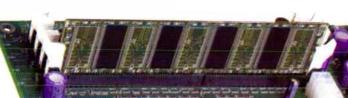
MOTHERBOARD

These come in many shapes and sizes; the most common are 'AT', or more recently 'ATX' full size types.

Full size motherboards have a number of slots on them, into which you can plug memory chips and expansion cards (such as soundcards). Older motherboards often have 3 ISA slots and 3 PCI slots, whereas more recent designs have 1 ISA and 5 PCI slots. Generally, the more you want your PC to do, the more PCI slots you need.

> Motherboards play an important role in getting data in and out of the computer, possessing a number of 'ports' through which digital audio (or any other type of data) can pass. Always go for motherboards with a USB (Universal Serial Bus) socket (which is a handy way of connecting up external CD writers and MP3 players, among other things). Most motherboards

made since 1997 should come with this facility, and all ATX boards have built in serial, parallel and USB sockets as standard.



New Double Density Memory (DDR) is fast but expensive

FireWire, which does the same job as USB but much faster, is useful but not essential for domestic PC audio use, and many motherboards still don't offer it. If this is important to you, however, you can always buy a separate FireWire (IEEE 1394) PCI card for about carefully. Basically, the more memory you have, the faster your audio computer will run. Serious audio work needs at least 128MB for reasonably swift operation. More RAM means fewer references

to your computer's hard drive and therefore faster

editing and processing.

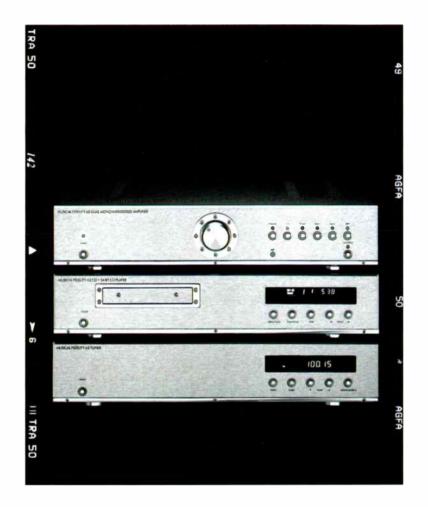
MEMORY

Motherboards also hold your computer's memory chips - make sure the one you buy has DIMM (Dual In-line Memory Module) sockets. This will make it compatible with modern, cheap and easily available SDRAM chips which cost around £25 for 64MB, £45 for 128MB or £75 for 256MB. However, some boards and

processors require newer types of RAM, such as expensive DDR (Double Data Rate) on the latest Socket A Athlon boards, so check

MUSICAL FIDELITY

HARD DISK DRIVE

Along with CPU speed and memory size, the hard drive is a key factor in overall computer speed. As is always the case with computers, it's a case of 'the bigger, the better'. Not only will a large hard drive let you store many CD's worth of music, but will make editing and digital signal processing operations faster.

As a guide, a stereo 16bit, 44.1 kHz recording sends data at around 200k a second and an average audio CD has around 650MB of space. This means that any decent audio PC will need a hard drive with a high rotation speed, short average seek time and a high capacity. A good basic minimum capacity is 10GB, which will store around ten CD's worth of digital music and leave some breathing space for audio editing software to do its job. Any serious PC audiophile may soon find this restrictive though, and an 0 ideal would be closer to 30MB.

There are several ways of connecting hard drives to motherboards. Until recently, serious audio computers needed a SCSI card which plugged between the was temporarily interrupted, which caused glitches that played havoc with hard disk recordings and CD burners.

Now, the latest E-IDE motherboards can control drives up to 137GB, making them perfectly suitable for audio without the need for SCSI. They're far faster too - the later UDMA33, UDMA66 and more recently UDMA100 standards offering 33, 66 and 100MBps burst data transfer rates respectively, which are great for audio work.

CD DRIVES

Although all computers since the mid nineties have had CD-ROM drives as standard, your audio PC needs one capable of Digital Audio Extraction (DAE). Many early (pre-1999) designs don't have this facility, so if you're upgrading your old PC for audio use, you might have to buy a new CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive (all new DVD-ROMs also perform DAE) for this purpose.

As with hard drives, serious audio computers traditionally came with SCSI CD-ROMs or CD burners for

> fast, reliable, glitch-free operation. Now though, EIDE is perfectly adequate. If you have a notebook or want an external CD-RW to transport from computer to computer, go for a USB or FireWire drive. The latter is faster still than USB, but is probably overkill for audio use.

As with everything in computer land, speeds increase monthly. Most modern CD-ROMs are now 40x or more, but anything over 12x is perfectly adequate. CD-RWs are also getting faster by the day, but we've found that for superior audio quality, it's best to stick to relatively slow (2x, 4x or 8x) burns. Thanks to Red Book CD's middling error correction specification (which is far less rigorous than the error correction CD burners use when writing data CDs), discs burned at 16x on the latest drives can sound a little 'phasey'. With this in mind, you don't need to buy a CD-RW faster than an 8x for audio use, so save your money for the soundcard!

Most hi-fi CD recorders, car CD tuners and CD portables made over the last couple of years will happily read audio CD-Rs burned on computer CD writers, but some older players can't cope with the lower reflectivity of the CD-R blanks. There's no general rule - it's a case of suck it and see - but whatever you do, make sure you use good quality 650MB (74 minute) CD-R blanks (such as those from Philips, TDK and Sony).

Avoid the newer 700MB (80 minute) blanks at all costs - even the latest CD players can struggle to read them and the sound is often audibly worse.

motherboard and a SCSI drive, giving fast data transfer speeds and very reliable operation.

This was because until around 1998, the standard IDE interfaces built into motherboards couldn't handle data quickly enough for audio work. Part of PC history, the system dated back to 1986, offering 4Mbps maximum transfer rate and a capacity of 528MB. When Aha were Number One, this seemed fantastic, but by the mid-nineties it was looking prehistoric.

As a result IDE was 'enhanced' in 1993 (making it E-IDE) with a maximum transfer speed up to 16Mbps and capacity of 8.4GB.

The old IDE drives also carried out 'thermal calibration' (t-cal) to allow for temperature changes within the drive. This meant the data flow As an aside, in the late nineties there were special E-IDE drives free from tcal available (known as 'A/V' drives) these are suitable for use with the latest motherboards, but are no longer necessary.

If you possibly can, it's best to fit two hard drives to your audio computer. The smaller one can carry your operating system and all your applications software, including your audio editor and CD authoring program. The larger one can then be kept exclusively for audio storage. If you can't do this, then you should at least partition your hard drive into smaller logical drives of around 6GB each. This will give the best performance and is more convenient for defragmenting the disk, which is an essential regular practice for heavy audio use!

When connecting the CD-ROM and CD-RW drives, set the jumpers at the back and attach the ribbon cables so that they're connected to the motherboard's 'secondary' IDE interface. Combining hard disks and CD drives tends to slow down the hard disk noticeably.

Also, set the jumpers to make the CD burner the 'master' and the CD-ROM the 'slave'.

Unless having a DVD-ROM is really important to you then stick to the CD variety, because the DVD drive needs another PCI slot on your motherboard, meaning it will use more resources and potentially slow down the audio side of things. Some people also believe that because the lasers on DVD drives are optimised for DVD discs, their CD reading abilities are potentially compromised.

One of the most useful inventions of late has been the 'BURN-PROOF' CD-R drive. Past generations of CD-Rs have had problems with 'buffer underrun', where the computer momentarily pauses to do something else (like start a screensaver) in the middle of recording a CD, causing the burner to run out of data and subsequently 'hang up'.

DACKARD

CD writers are an important accessory for an audio computer.

puts the CD burner on 'pause' if the computer needs to stop for a moment, meaning the recording isn't wrecked.

There are now several rival systems which all work in a similar way, and are all worth having. Make a point of looking for this when buying a new CD-RW.

SOUNDCARD

The soundcard bundled with standard PCs is NOT suitable for hi-fi use. You should either disable your existing one if it is built in to the motherboard, or rip it out and throw it away, and invest in a decent hi-fi quality device.

Soundcards plug directly into a PCI slot on your computer's motherboard. When fitted they must go into a slot that does not share resources - finding one may involve a little experiment. Move the various cards around into different slots until everything works smoothly and seamlessly.

Modern soundcards aren't just about making beeping noises for games sound effects. They contain audio-accelerators designed to handle the number crunching involved when playing digital audio,

> relieving the CPU of that burden. They all have onboard digitalto-analogue

converters, which determine the quality of the sound your computer gives when playing CDs, hard disk recordings and MP3s. They also have built-in analogue-to digitalconverters, which are of key importance when recording music onto your computer's hard drive from external analogue sources like vinyl.

CD-Win

Because the onboard converters on most budget soundcards are of questionable quality, it's a good idea to side-step them by buying one with direct digital inputs and outputs. There are several sub-£100 cards with this facility, such as Guillemot's MAXISound Fortissimo (£95) and VideoLogic's SonicFury (£80). You could then invest in a high quality, dedicated analogue-to-digital (and/or digital-to-analogue) converter for the very best results, such as Midiman's Flying Cow 24 (£150).

Another approach is to buy a soundcard with decent digital converters built in. There are several £200-plus models that let you record directly from your preamp's Line Out to the (analogue) Line In on a soundcard with excellent fidelity. A great all-rounder is Guillemot's MAXISound Isis (£200), whereas DigiDesign's ToolBox PC (£400) is superb.

For those on a tight budget, a good tip is to go for a basic soundcard with digital in and out, and use a MiniDisc or DAT recorder's onboard converters for digital conversion duties. Early Sony MD recorders are dirt cheap secondhand (from around £50), and function perfectly well as analogue-to-digital converters if you select Rec/Pause mode and take the digital output

The good news is that there are plenty of excellent designs around. Spending just £60 on Creative Labs' give a remarkably engaging and musical performance. As always, placement is paramount - keep the sub on the floor but slightly forward of the rear wall and Blu-tack the satellites to the desktop either side of your PC.

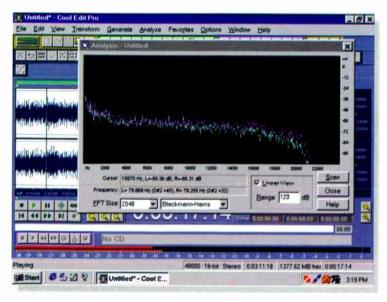


Multimedia loudspeakers from TDK that use NXT panels.

MULTIMEDIA SPEAKERS

Many people connect their audio servers directly into their main hi-fi systems, either digitally (taking a digital out from their soundcard into their hi-fi DAC, MD or DAT recorder), or by the conventional analogue route (from the soundcard's Line Out to the amplifier's Aux In). For this reason, multimedia speakers aren't an essential purchase. If however, your audio server is a standalone affair, possibly in a Cambridge SoundWorks Digital will give you a big powerful sound that's no poor relation to a budget hi-fi system. These 'speakers even have a built-in DAC so you can run them directly from your soundcard's digital output.

If space is at a premium, Mission's FS-mmI give an extremely detailed sound thanks to their NXT panels, and if cost is no object, VideoLogic's Sirocco is still the one to beat for around £200. Its Audax drive units

SOFTWARE

When you've designed and built your audio PC, you'll need some decent software to untap its power. The good news is that there are several sound editing packages around which offer superb value for money.

Sonic Foundry's SoundForge XP (£50) is still the one to beat at the price and comes with a host of powerful DSP routines.

Steinberg's Clean Plus (£60) includes the WaveLab audio editor and is well worth having, especially if you're intending to do a lot of vinyl archiving.

However, quality costs money and Cool Edit Pro (£300) is the ultimate, with the best DSP routines, the most stable operation and widest range of facilities - that's why it's a favourite with recording professionals.

or today's living, the 8in CD is just too large. Yes, the 12cm (5in) CD is a relic. Talking of which, I was there when they introduced it, back in 1983. I remember well that it specifically was not designed for certain roles, simply because in those days the CD was as good as technology got, and it was pretty damn good, in retrospect. Back then I was using 5in computer 'floppies' that held 0.72MB, against which the CD offered a massive 650MB. It seemed like a miracle at the time.

The CD needed this much capacity

to accommodate 74 minutes of 16bit/44.1 digitally coded music, said to have been set by Akio Morita of Sony who wanted to listen to Beethoven's Ninth uninter-

rupted. It was perhaps a little much. The LP ran for just 20 minutes per side and no one complained about this at the time. Had Mr Morita been into The Sex Pistols we probably would have had a crucially smaller CD that could fit better into cars and portables. As it was we got a sort of rotating tablet of stone that could store a mountain of music or the history of the world, but it was not portable.

Having convinced Philips that the CD needed to be so large it couldn't easily be moved, Sony sneaked away and furtively invented a portable version - the MiniDisc. People do not have the sort of cash needed for MiniDisc. I believe it is the 'entry price' of the format that is the main problem. Discs and players are competitively priced, but you have to replace every CD player in your life with an MD player - and this is where the roadblock lies.

We still need a durable, portable medium, which can be used for recording to replace the cassette. The mini-CD could easily replace the full sized CD as a music carrier if all CD players could handle mp3 like Expanium. Mp3 at full data rate of 320kbps gives fine sound quality. I wouldn't like to predict whether this could ever come about.

I can't help but feel all this will affect most music listeners rather more

than DVD-A and SACD, for reasons of cost and accessibility. Bands and the music business want exposure and sales. They're best served by a small, portable and recordable medium that will interface with computers and the Internet. The new media we look at on p26 offer some fascinating possibilities. I suspect, though, from trawling around U.S. sites that the world's greatest music market has already decided this for us. It seems to have unilaterally declared mini-CD the place to be, leaving both Philips and Sony in the dust.

All this will affect our lives rather more than the argument between **DVD-A and SACD**

I only note wryly that if dual-sided mini-CD-Rs became available we could go back to 20 minutes of (uncompressed) music a side on CD, just like LP. Which is how it would have been if Akio Morita was a punk rocker.

I could have taken them apart on the spot! The Cyrus Icon's are wonderful in many ways but improvements can be made, I feel. Classical music can stress loudspeakers in ways Rock does not, and vice versa. It was with strings the Icons showed what they could do, yet at the same time I could hear the problems. They have two high frequency peaks, both of which could be tamed quite easily. They add a little brightness - and some hardness - to the sound at times. It is not major, but nor is it necessary.

Having wrestled with ESL63s and subwoofers in the past I well know that it isn't wise to compromise a panel to match a box (monopole). The NXT panel needs to be 'flattened' in its response then mounted in the open, possibly with light rear damping. The bass system should then be configured to match the panel, not the other way around. This is the engineering challenge.

Peter Walker could have put a box behind the original Quad Electrostatic but he wisely

understood this would have compromised the electrostatic's strongest properties. I could hear the NXT panel in the loons trying to get out! It's fine, but the Icon limits what these panels can do, rather than exploiting it.

Driver integration could possibly be better tackled by making the bass unit a dipole by having an additional rear firing bass unit. A small 6in unit might do the job. Or the NXT panel should be made longer to go lower, to a point where directionality ceases to be an issue.

Whatever, the lcons issue a warning that NXT panels can and likely will take over from pistons. They possess all the strengths NXT claim, which is hardly surprising because NXT comes from a true hi-fi background. In spite of the little blemishes and my urge to spanner them, the Icons are still a great listening experience at times and very different to the norm.

I was microseconds into ownership before I started ripping my Quad ESL63s apart. With them it was also obvious there was a great piece of clingfilm trying to get out. So wanting to dismantle the loons on the spot is a compliment. There's nothing like a good panel loudspeaker.

oing the listening for this issue's system buying feature proved absolutely fascinating for me. You'd think that auditioning same-make CD player/ amplifier combos from just a handful of manufacturers would hardly constitute a gripping way to pass the day, but from the moment the listening started, I was enthralled.

There were several real earopeners. Hi-fi rookies would have been blown away by the basic Arcam CD72/A75 combination. Compared to the wretched mini systems you see

in certain electrical chain stores (names withheld to protect the guilty), it was like opening the window and letting the daylight shine in. Here was 'real hl-fi' with more than a passing connection to the music itself.

These days I'm used to more esoteric stuff, but my hi-fi experience started far more humbly than this - a hand-medown BSR BDS80 turntable, Shure M75/6S cartridge and a £12 kit amplifier bought in Edgware Road, to be precise. By comparison, these entry level Arcams sounded like a CD12 feeding an Ongaku. I'd be extremely happy with this as a starter system, especially considering how close it costs to some very mediocre kit indeed.

Although we kept with the same loudspeakers (for the purposes of consistency), it was fairly obvious to me that the baby Arcam amp was swimming a little out of its depth with the Linn Ninka loudspeakers. Using boxes costing twice the price of the amp is fine for the purposes of critical enquiry, but shouldn't be seriously considered as an ongoing listening proposition. All the more surprising then that Linn's Classik drove them so confidently! This baby is rapidly becoming my favourite Linn product. When I reviewed it last summer, it was at least partly in the context of an 'integrated audio system'. This time though, any thoughts of size and convenience went out of the door in the pursuit of the best sound at the lowest price. Switching to the Classik

was a revelation - the sound firmed up tremendously and it all seemed so much more fun.

In this product we have a latterday Nytech receiver (hopefully this statement will mean something to someone!) and I for one shall not stop raving about it. Even more surprising was that as the reviewing continued, we always came back to the baby Linn as the most fun. In one way it was almost a better listen than the Genki/ LK140 - the pricier separates were far more accomplished all rounders, but just

didn't have the fizzy, bubbly, zestful character of the one-boxer.

The pricier Arcam CD92/ A85 combo is another beautifully judged piece of hi-fi design from the Cambridge company. Although it didn't really 'light my fire' like the Classik, I've got to hand it to Arcam for doing an amazingly thorough job, so consistently, for so many years. If the Classik is a latter day Nytech, this Arcam combo reminds me very much of the brand values of the original A&R Cambridge A60. It does everything as well as many people will ever need, and then just a little bit more. Equivalently priced mass-market separates from Sony, Technics et al just don't get a look in - what's the point?

Two big surprises for me were the TAG McLaren CD20R/ 60i and the Marantz CD17 KIS/ PM17 KIS combos - for very different reasons. In Britain at least, TAG has an image of upmarket, bespoke British hi-fi (the sort of thing David Coulthard would have In his swanky Monaco bachelor pad?) and Marantz is seen as an all conquering mass market budget brand (CD63SE, anyone?).In this instance at least, DC should jump into his A Class and hot foot it down to his local Marantz retailer, for Ken Ishiwata's golden boxes are amazingly good at the price. Big hearted, sweet, smooth and beguilingly musical, they're an essential audition if you don't like the tonally dry 'Linn sound'.

Overall though, Linn's Genki/ LK140 CD player/power amp combo won the day for me. If it was my money, this is the system I'd most like at home for the serious business of listening to music. Although the perceived build quality isn't as 'impressive' as the others here and the feature count far less high, you get a lot of electronics for your £1740. To my ears at least, the sound outclassed the others by a country mile. logether with the Ninkas, this sub-£3000 system just worked out of the box and played music, brushing aside all considerations of hi-fi completely. For me at least, that's what a decent system should do.

still remember the day clearly. was only eight, and walked excitedly into Laskys' in York. The apple of my eye was a Toshiba turntable that had been reduced to £20. Twenty guid was a lot of money for me then, and had taken about six months worth of paper rounds to save up for (cue the Hovis ad music). Imagine how my heart sank when I asked what 'speakers the Tosh' came with only to be told it didn't come with any.

The lecturing tone of the salesman indicated that the turntable was a hi-fi separate and that I'd need a sepa-

rate amp and 'speakers to make it work.

It was an experience that almost put me off hi-fi separates for life. such a big deal. After all, it's the life's work of an eight-year-old to constantly discover and often be thwarted. What made my blood boil, even to this day, was the patronising, snooty attitude taken by the salesman.

Eight or nine year's later things had changed, or so I thought. I now really knew my stuff - after all I'd been reading What Hi-Fi for at least a year or two! At this stage I already had an Arcam Alpha 2 amp and some cracking Sony AMS-10ES (at least I think that's what they were called!) 'speakers. This time I was seeking a decent budget tuner. Something from NAD, Rotel or Denon would have done nicely. The service from a Harrogate store, that appropriately had the name "elite" somewhere in its title, couldn't have proved more disappointing. I watched the salesman's face visibly wince as I told him of my £150 budget. He pointed me to their cheapest Rotel 850 tuner, then immediately sauntered off to rejoin his colleagues. Needless to say, I left and bought a Denon TU-550 from a mail order company the next day.

Neither of the two stores is around these days. No doubt Laskys struggled with high rents and a diminishing separates market, yet the other place probably ran out of potential customers that hadn't been intimidated.

Of course, not all hi-fi stores are like this. I have much to thank The Sound Organisation of York, and others, for rekindling my interest in hifi. The shocking aspect of this is that no matter how excellent the product engineering of a particular separate or how fine the subsequent review, the whole process was going pear shaped at the front line. If my experiences taught me one thing then it was ! never wanted to become a hi-fi snob. After ten years of being involved with both hi-fi retailing and journalism I'm pleased to be able to say that hi-fi

> snobbery isn't rife within the industry. It's a pleasure to see someone involved in manufacturing, selling or reviewing equipment worth thousands of pounds, become animated when describing a budget wonder. Many will admit to real affection towards products such as the NAD 3020, Pioneer A400 or original Wharfedale Diamonds.

> Not all are so enlightened, however, and there are still those who are quick to mock anything with a deflated price, the wrong badge or even an entire format. Not surprisingly it's these stick-in-the-muds that often become unstuck soonest. Whether we like it or not, technology moves on and it's down to the individual involved in the manufacture, review or retail of the product as to whether or not they move with the times. If survival and success are on the cards, then move on they must. Hence most companies that only produced analogue sources have either gone under or moved on to digital ones as well, including DVD.

Digital Versatile Disc is a perfect example. The format was derided by some. It was yet another audio visual crossover product with limited appeal as it didn't even record. Fate would see it wither and die like DCC or

become a niche product such as Laser Disc

Now it's those who saw the potential that are reaping the rewards. Take a look at the format from a retailer's point of view. Not only can they be selling one of the fastest growing new formats around, they can also unlock a market share that was previously inaccessible. I know that from working within hi-fi retail that the stores 'footfall' includes customers that would never have stepped within a separate hi-fi retailer before. This also opens the door for goggle-eyed couch potatoes to appreciate high quality audio, with high resolution audio discs.

Those promoting DVD-A are targeting existing owners of DVD-V players, the discs being playable on such machines, albeit at a lower bit rate. All of a sudden hi-fi stores can draw from a vast customer base that would once have gone no further than the nearest Currys or Dixons. It need hardly be said that the increased visibility this has for other hi-fi separates, and in particular 'speakers, is immense. 'Speakers did you say? Now exactly which ones come with that Toshiba DVD player over there? 🔴

From the sublime to the ridiculously sublime, Simon Pope guides you through some of the finest earwarmers money can buy, including the McLaren F1 of headphones.

SENNHEISER ORPHEUS £10,000

wouldn't imagine that these are for the person who has problems with neighbours, as anyone who can afford them probably owns his/her own small island in the Caribbean. Needless to say the Orpheus is one very, very desirable bit of kit. Not only do you get the finest sounding earphones you're likely to encounter, they also throw in a 13kg valve headphone amplifier complete with ignition key, and a very flash flight case of ridiculously heavy proportions to protect your investment. Needless to say these are for the serious (... ly rich) audiophile, as opposed to budding bedroom DIs. Limited to just 300 production pairs (and before you ask, yes, they actually have sold some!) the Orpheus package has firmly established itself in the audio hall of fame. Needless to say, wearing them is like sitting in the seat of a Rolls, the word comfort doesn't even enter the picture.

The HE 90 headphones themselves are an electrostatic design, i.e. the transducer isn't driven by a wire coil at the edge (like traditional designs) but is sandwiched between two driving electrodes that drives the diaphragm equally over the surface area. The elliptical diaphragm is made of a 1 micrometre gold-coated polymer foil and the electrodes are made from special high strength glass and have honeycomb gold-plated perforations. Quoted frequency response comes in at a startling 7Hz-100,000Hz at -10dB. The structure of the 'phones

frame is made from laminated beechwood (used in airplane propellers) which is particularly resistant to torsion and is acoustically neutral. They come resplendently placed in a real wood box, that is recommended for permanent storage.

The gorgeous HEV 90 Art Deco style matching valve amp is constructed of solid aluminium and stainless steel. The valves are located in the "arena" flanked by two striking wings, and the ventilated middle area has two digital inputs (one optical and one coaxial) as well as stereo analogue coaxial inputs. Connection from earphones to amp is via a five pin socket with locking ability, of which there are two, should your partner wish to share your musical experience with another pair of HE 90s.

You won't be surprised to learn that the sound that this hand-built combination emits is one of the best sonic experiences around - "and so it damn well should be" I hear you cry! The level of transparency and detail is exceptional and the valve amp adds a touch of depth and smoothness to the sound which makes for a unique listening experience. The effect is like strapping a pair of Quads to your head, complete with the matching £4,000 valve amps - except more revealing! Rock and pop recordings are pin-point precise, with a warm and deep bass that's also frighteningly fast and accurate. The treble is sweetness personified and the midrange remarkable in its airy spaciousness.

For those who've never experienced hi-fi like imaging from earphones, the Orpheus's has a depth to the sound that stretches back into the head, with the kick drum somewhere to the rear of the skull. If this sounds weird or uncomfortable believe me, it isn't.

Classical music has wonderful transparency; rarely has Yo-Yo Ma's cello sounded so realistic in the Bach Suites and they even manage to pull off the large orchestral experience, as a Bruckner symphony demonstrated.

How does one conclude about this most extreme of hi-fi products?

Sennheiser HD600 Avantgarde

Well, they create a sound that's quite unique in neutrality, transparency and detail; there's nothing that can touch them in this respect. These headphones take you closer to the recording than anything I've heard. So, it's up to you; a new VW Polo or a pair of headphones with complimentary valve amp? Remember you can't do the school run or put your shopping in earphones, though!

SENNHEISER HD600 AVANTGARDE £250

part from the outlandishly expensive example featured above, the HD600s are the German headphone giant's top of the range cans. Described as "intended for high-end hi-fi use" the 600s aim for neutrality and clarity as well as long term listening comfort. An 'open back' design to create a more 'out of the head' experience the 600 uses Duofoil transducers and two Mylar films to make one rigid diaphragm. A high comfort factor is ensured by replaceable velvet earpads and a good sized oval enclosure. The look is modern and classic with a marblelook solid frame that fits well over the head. Quoted response is 6Hz-30kHz at -1dB

The 600s are certainly a very smooth customer indeed, very different from the immediate sounding Beyers. With Miles Davis, their sound was silky smooth and very easy to listen to. Although seeming a little 'rolled off' at first, the ear soon gets used to the sound. This is a sound for those who listen through earphones a lot. Along with smoothness there is a good sense of

detail and healthy bass extension. Davis' trumpet failed to 'shriek' as much as it did with the Beyers at the very top register and Bill Evans' piano had more body to it. This is what the extra hundred quid buys you.

With rock music such as Paul Weller the 600s didn't display as much intricate pin-point detail as their more expensive stablemate, or the cheaper Beyers, but this meant the listening was far easier on the ear. I also found this trait with classical music, which was more lyrical than you often experience through headphones, but also extended and airy. It's like the difference between solid-state and valves - the 600s are without doubt a valve-like headphone and all the better for it; they're sophisticated, making many others sound brittle. Definitely not for hard house DJs but more for the marathon session audiophile.

BEYERDYNAMIC DT931 £150

f all the nations, perhaps the Germans are the kings of the headphone and along with the ubiquitous Sennheiser brand, Beyer have helped them gain this crown. The DT931s are the top model in the UK and have a fairly chunky yet comfortable feel to them.

The ear cups have been developed through computer aided design for the best possible frequency response and the 'breathable' ear pads are very comfortable, with a soft velvety viscose surround - ideal for long listening periods. The cable is a coiled type, with a long extension, stereo minijack and quarter-inch adaptor.

The sound of the 931s is immediate and exciting. There is good bass extension and general balance of frequencies. Above the £100 mark there's generally more detail from headphones and the Beyers have more than their fair share. With Paul Weller's Stanley Road album the sound was full and fast, if a tad treble heavy, and very detailed. The breathy voice and guitar lines (fingers on fret boards) showed that the Beyer's had an open midrange; panned tom toms of the intricate drumming zipped to and for with control and power.

Classical music in the shape of Bach's Cello Suites and Bruckner's 9th symphony had presence. There was plenty of recording detail such as breath and finger movement in a CD of Miles Davis's 'Kind Of Blue'.

The DT931s deliver a detailed and clean sound for the money. They sometimes suffer from a treble that can be a tad harsh, but this apart they're fine - and comfortable to boot.

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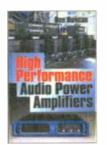
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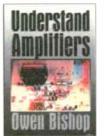
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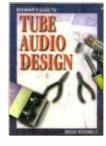
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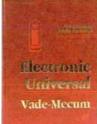


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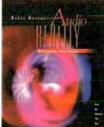
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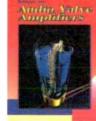
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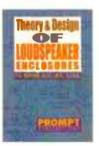


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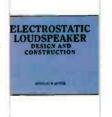


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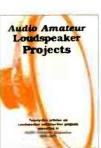
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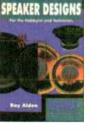
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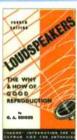


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n many respects REL Acoustics can be described a true Great British hi-fi success story. Founded by Richard Lord in 1991 (the same year as this very audiophile journal), pre-surround sound, when sub woofers were as rare as hen's teeth. This year sees the company's tenth anniversary and the company is still developing rapidly. Richard was serving in the Merchant Navy at the time REL started, so like many smaller hi-fi businesses, it started as a hobby, Richard building them alone in a garden shed. Unlike other company's formed this way, however, REL continued to swim whilst many of the others were destined for Davy Jones's Locker. The company now has around 50 employees and a £2million annual turnover and are based in Bridgend, Wales

> The very first REL product was the Stygian, which like every other REL product since included the secret of their success, the use of high grade audiophile components and exemplary build quality. Also present in this first product was the founder's own Active Bass Control circuit which is found in all of today's REL products. It provides fine adjustment of crossover frequency to blend with the lower response of the main 'speaker system. The sub. then runs at 'speaker level' from the full range system control.

REL believe this is the only way in which system integration can be achieved, a fact that was recognised by this very magazine at the time.

Something else that separates a REL product from the majority of subs is the ability to connect at both high and low levels. Neutrik connectors contribute to a deep and focussed sound.

1992 saw the launch of the original Stadium in its first



incarnation, followed by the first Stentor and Strata in 1994. Since these first generation models the company has continually updated and improved the designs. It's company policy that each aspect of design is carefully considered at the conception stage.

Each new model is tried out by staff, including Richard himself, at home, an essential process often resulting in last minute changes, he says. And the proof of the pudding is in the eating: REL are universally recognised as one the leading manufacturers of subwoofers.

With the development of AV and surround-sound toward the end of the nineties came the launch of the Q series of products in 1996, intended primarily for home entertainment use.

Despite this market boom the company continue to produce an array of 'audiophile' subwoofers in

their 'St' range, one of the latest of which is the awesome Stadium III - up for grabs here!

The Stadium III has all the traits of a classic REL product such as an ability to plump bass depths like no other, with a bone shaking response that's also taut and tuneful.

It's not only the bass that benefits either, as the sound stage improves and the midrange extends to really open up a performance, especially with large scale classical pieces. The Stadium III is a must-have for both dance music bass heads and atuned classical listeners alike.

Simon Pope listens to three interconnects useful as a painless and affordable upgrade.



SonicLink First Base £25/metre

uite a witty name, as its the entry level interconnect from the cable specialists from Derby. When you consider that £25 is just slightly more expensive than the sluggish examples of the cheapest interconnect on the market then the First Base represents excellent value for money. This is the latest model in the company's new range. It is finished in a tasteful darkish blue PVC outer cover and is terminated with SonicLink's new ergonomically shaped chunky plugs.

This is a very fast and open sound for the money, with none of the sluggishness that's often found in similar priced cable. With Skunk Anansie's 'Stoosh' album, the bass was firm and full and vocals clean and well defined, if a tiny bit sibilant, but this is maybe a quibble too much at the price. With classical music in the form of Bach's Cello Suites played by Yo-Yo Ma there was a good feel for detail as the bow dug into the strings, with a full and rich sound. For such a modest price the First Base offers a great little upgrade for the 'first time' cable buyer or second system upgrade. It's miles ahead of any standard supplied bootlace interconnect and most of the competition at the price.

txos Gamma Encore £70/metre

he Encore is part of the mid price Silver series from Ixos and features their new Gamma geometry. This consists of three cores which are woven, rather than the more common twisted positive and negative conductor configuration. This weaving process places the positive conductor beside the negative conductor in a differential wave so that they cross without twisting- lxos believe that twisting results in noise cancelling. The negative and positive conductors are held together by the central non-conductive Inductance Controlled Core which uses a lower inductance than a comparative twisted pair using the same materials.

The sound is very good, with a nice fat bass response that's also fast and tuneful as demonstrated in the Skunk Anansie album. The Encore brought a lot of presence to the sound with a full, if not exactly neutral sound but one that I liked. With Yo-Yo Ma's cello the fullness took way from the natural woodiness of the instrument but still resulted in a musically involving sound that brought me into the music. There was no harshness in the sound of the Encore, it's full and forward but with a sweet treble and very good, deep bass.

Origin Live Laminar Flow Ultra £85/metre

his is the middle version of the company's three interconnects building on the traits of the entry level Advanced model. The Ultra is a two core cable which uses an advanced design using stranded conductors. The plugs are very high quality, which OG claim have twice the conductivity of gold plated brass. The first thing that strikes you about these cables is the transparency with which they covey music. The Skunk Anansie album scored high in the detail stakes with complex guitar tracks clean and drums tight and powerful. There was good separation between the instruments and the sound never became muddled or fizzy in complex mix sections.

An advanced level of detail came with the Bach Suites played by Yo-Yo Ma. The 'cello sounded rich and woody, with finger and bow work easily discernable adding a live dimension and frisson to the sound. Also, the Ultra has a fine lyrical quality, so sounds fluid and musical as well as analytical. For the money this is a very good buy for those who wish to glean a tad more detail and finery from their music collection. A high end sound with a sensible look and price tag.

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David Price looks at one of the Huntingdon brand's more obscure products, the 775 turntable.

veryone knows about Mission loudspeakers.It's quite surprising therefore, that Mission turntables have practically vanished off the map. From the late seventies until the mid-eighties, the company made a range of 775 decks designed and crafted by Mission's talented Henry Azima (the man, lest we forget, who did all of the company's classic loudspeakers and the Cyrus amps). They featured a range of arms,

including the 774 which was itself something of a design classic and often found on Linn Sondeks as a budget Ittok alternative in those empty days before the Rega RB300.

The 775S, which is the variant we're looking at here, was the company's 'budget' integrated deck costing a trifling £300 back in 1981. Considering that Linn Sondeks of the day admittedly minus a tonearm - cost little more than this, the entry-level Mission vinyl spinner was

hardly from the same origins as your average Japanese semi-automatic direct drive!

Its main distinguishing feature from its Thorens and Ariston rivals was the fact that it did not use a suspended subchassis - for a high quality late seventies belt drive, this was almost akin to marketing a car without wheels! Of course, Rega had been cleaning up with the Planar 3, but it was still regarded as more of a budget design 'on steroids', rather than a proper high end product in its own right. Rather, the 'direct coupled' 775 was said to provide a 'totally rigid' link between stylus and record via the arm/plinth/platter loop.

Without a conventional suspension system, the only way it was able to escape the pitfalls of room-borne vibration and resonance (which cloud and colour the sound) was by a combination of mass, and isolation feet made from Sorbothane, that lossy rubber compound so beloved by turntable tweakers. To wit, the 775S sported a small was an unusual looking device, complete with vestigial 'cartridge carrier' and simple (but less resonance prone) thread and lever bias compensator. Without any tracking weight calibration, set-up required a decent stylus pressure gauge. At least there was a trough for silicone damping fluid to play with! Effective mass was on the lowish side at 5.5g.



(430x390x150mm) but dense MDF plinth together with its crowning glory, a 6kg aluminium platter with a degree concavity machined into it. In conjunction with the supplied Michell record clamp and a thin Mission felt mat it made a valiant stab at supporting the record.

Any bearing asked to support a 6kg platter has to be a sturdy affair, so Henry Azima opted for a 70mm steel shaft running in a PFTE sleeve, tipped by a tungsten carbide ball running against a similarly finished thrust plate. The supplied 774LC arm Even today, a well fettled Mission 775 is an impressive sounding device. Always take time to set the arm up properly, clean out and refill the bearing housing with fresh oil (I use Mobil One fully synthetic, as seen in all the latest Michell decks) and clean the belt and all its contact points with isopropyl alcohol. This done, you'll get a very smooth, full-bodied sound with solid bottom end (thanks no doubt to that massive platter) and sweet, mellifluous highs. Soundstaging is wide and bold and there's a

goodly amount of detail. In absolute terms, this deck is a little too euphonic and laid back sounding, but in a digital world this may come as a welcome relief to many.

Prices are wildly variable - the 'distressed' example you see here cost £30 but needs a good service and clean. Elsewhere, the more upmarket 775SM goes for upwards of £250 in mint condition, assuming it's complete with box and accessories. Whether you're after a quick bargain or an audiophile rarity, these mostly forgotten, out-of-vogue vinyl spinners are well worth a look and listen...

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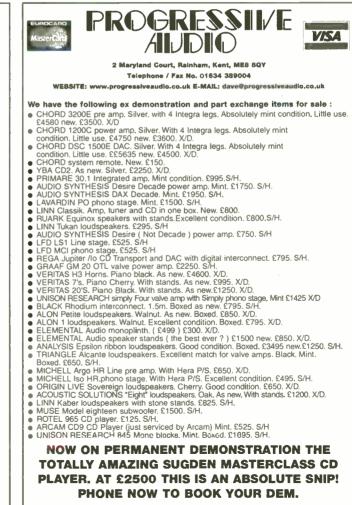

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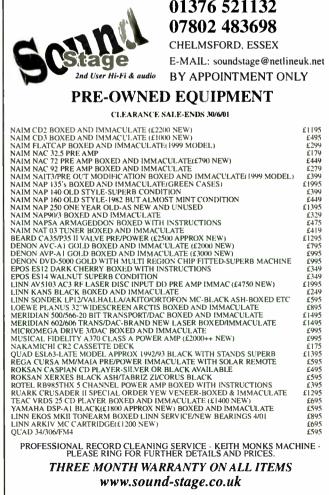

One Epos M12 of our review pair had a respectably flat response but the other was poorly matched, with a dip between bass/mid-range and the treble unit.

Working properly the loudspeaker has an even frequency response characterised by a small treble roll down - just sufficient to give the loudspeaker a reasonably smooth and warm presentation.

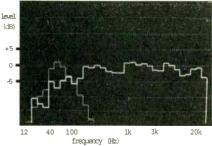
Also obvious is a bass roll down, suggesting the loudspeaker uses a highly damped alignment for a tight sound that sounds best when the loudspeaker is used close to a rear wall.

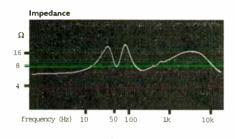
There's a rear port, so some space needs to be left behind; this is not a bookshelf design, so much as a standmounter. The port covers a fairly narrow band centred at 50Hz. Unusually, the port overlaps forward output, suggesting its output is quite low in amplitude.

The M12 has a high overall impedance, our analysis shows, although the bass unit drops to a DCR of 6.4ohms. However, overall impedance measured a high 10ohms, which partly explains the unusually low sensitivity of 81dB from one watt of input. To go loud the M12 will need a lot of power, around 100W. Otherwise the impedance curve is fairly smooth and non-reactive.

This Epos is a bit dated. Speakers of this size manage 86dB or so from one watt these days, and metal domes are becoming increasingly rare, because they are always audible. The M12 is a neat design, but of course pair matching needs to be better. **NK**







SHAHINIAN ELF

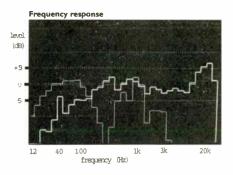
There were some surprises here, unfortunately not good ones. The Elf's tweeter is far, far from the woofer, contrary to usual practice, where the tweeter is placed as close as possible to approximate a 'point source' and minimise inter-driver phase changes. Not surprisingly there were large phase changes as the measuring microphone was moved to various positions in front of the speaker (this effect is plainly audible when listening too; the speaker changes its sound as the head is moved).

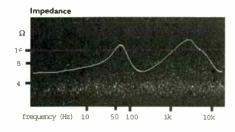
At its best, on the woofer axis, there's least treble lift (+3dB or so) but the Elfs would have to be placed high up to be heard like this. On the usual measuring axis (equidistant between drivers) around +7dB lift existed. Our averaged forward response gives about the best realistic picture obtainable, where no less than +6dB treble lift is provided by the metal dome tweeter. Both speakers were identical.

This amount of lift will be overwhelmingly audible. I'd expect more than mere brightness; the sound is likely to be piercing on most music. Since the lift starts at 8kHz - quite high - there will be material where such a lift is not obvious. Some classical has little or no energy above 8kHz. Modern wideband Rock will suffer though (and some older analogue recordings strong in treble, like Cat Stevens). I mention this because what you hear does depend upon the material used.

Low frequency output starts to roll off below 160Hz - very high for the box volume. This suggests an overdamped acoustic alignment intended for near-towall use. There's a rear port, so it is not a bookshelf design. The port appears to have internal damping to increase acoustic resistance. Even the light foam offered as an alternative acoustic plug by many UK manufacturers turns a reflex effectively into an infinite baffle, measurement shows, and so it is with the Elf. The impedance curve shows the port has little effect, having the single peak characteristic of an infinite baffle. However, there is a small amount of port output and its broad tuning suggests the damping works in extending response downward, albeit at a low and likely not very significant acoustic level. There is also a lot of midband information from the port, but this should be largely lost rearward.

A reasonably smooth impedance curve free from sudden changes indicates the Elf is less reactive than most loudspeakers, potentially making it an easy load. However, the speaker is insensitive, providing just 83dB SPL for one nominal watt of input. A high overall impedance of 9.5ohms is the main reason for this. The Elf will need a powerful amplifier to go loud, but its small woofer will likely not take too much power, so high acoustic levels are not going to be a good idea. This is a loudspeaker for smaller rooms.





The sturdy plywood cabinet was crudely finished, the top ply layer chipped around holes, the front panel surface finish rough. This was one of the worst finished commercial products I have ever seen.

The Elf is likely someone's personal vision of how a loudspeaker should be. It isn't a vision I share, nor many designers who value basic accuracy. Expect well damped "fast" bass when driven from a powerful amplifier, but appreciating it, and the midband, will be difficult because of prominent output from the tweeter. **NK**

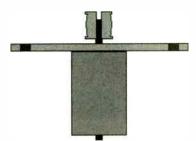

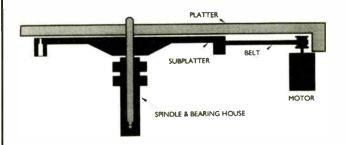

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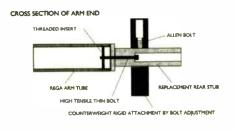

BOSTON VR-M50

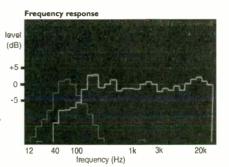
Small loudspeakers like this are commonly arranged to work close to, or against a wall. The usual design approach for this situation is to over-damp their bass, which rolls down lower bass and provides compensation for the bass boost a rear wall provides. It's not a perfect compromise since a rear wall actually gives peaky bass, making for a lumpy sound, and this cannot be perfectly cancelled. All the same, the small Boston VR-M50 rolls off below 100Hz to suit wall placement, its port providing some output in this region to help ensure there's some output left to work with. A peak at around 100Hz should give the 'speaker a little bass speed and some feeling of suppleness, but equally if taken too far this sort of thing can add some boominess - it's all a matter of degree.

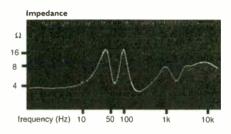
Further up the frequency range the

Boston looks smooth enough for a small budget design. There is, however, a pronounced rise in output from the tweeter, which will inject some brightness into the sound. This feature, along with the lack of a crossover suckout will ensure there's plenty of detail in the Boston's sound. It won't sound dull by any means.

The impedance characteristic is quite well controlled, being flat and largely resistive across most of the audio band. This is essentially a 40hm loudspeaker, like most nowadays, in that it uses a 40hm bass unit for best voltage sensitivity (i.e. maximum loudness at any volume control setting), matched to an 80hm tweeter. This invariably gives a 60hm nominal impedance, the VR-M50 measuring out at 5.50hms.

Boston's VR-M50 is a tidy enough package, one where the tweeter needs to be good since it is prominent. **NK**

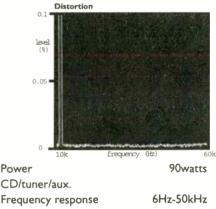
MUSICAL FIDELITY X-A200R

The X-A200R is compact, ignoring the separate power supply, yet it produces no less than 90W into 80hms, so there's plenty enough volume for most domestic situations. A lot of modern loudspeakers are more 40hm than 80hm however, using 40hm bass drivers to get high voltage sensitivity. Into loudspeakers like this the Musical Fidelity will deliver 150W, so it has some grunt, even though it doesn't weigh too much.

Frequency response measured a wideish 6Hz-50kHz, output being -4dB down at 100kHz, the upper limit of SACD and DVD-A. This is a new consideration for amplifiers, and the X-A200R is good enough in this respect I believe. Distortion in Musical Fidelity amplifiers is always well suppressed, especially at high frequencies, which is quite important. This unit was no different from its peers, producing around 0.008% in the mid-band and at high frequencies, the worst case being 0.01% of innocuous second harmonic distortion at full output, 10kHz.

Noise was low at -100dB, considering the amount of gain available, input sensitivity measuring a useful 270mV.

The X-A200R offers a lot in a small package - and by the way it has an alloy case, which helps sound quality. It measured very well in all respects and will likely be a tidy performer. **NK**



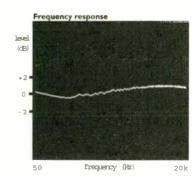

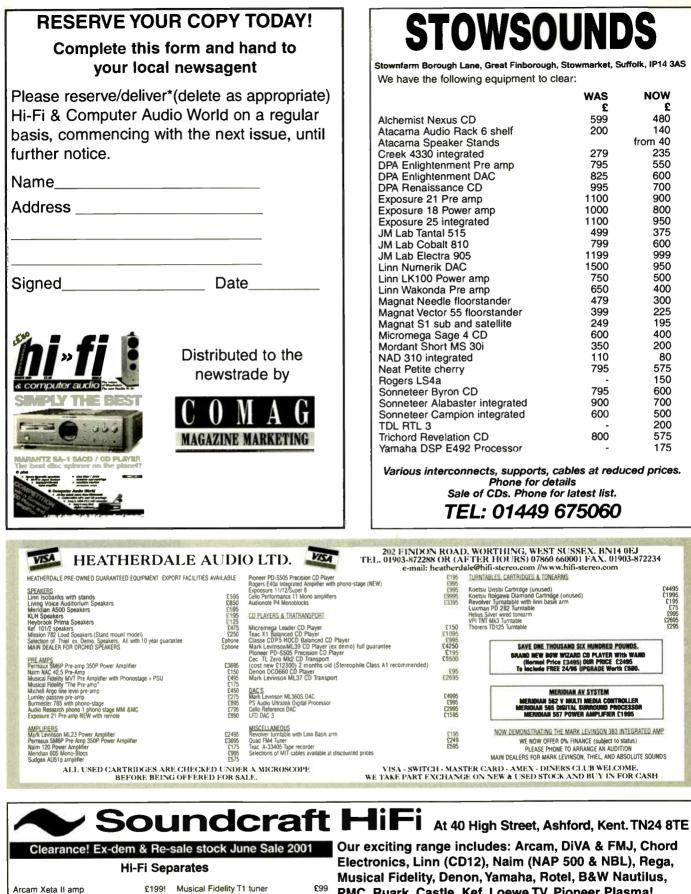
TRICHORD MICHELL DINO PHONO STAGE

The Dino is very flexible in that it caters for all cartridge types, from very low output Moving Coils (top-end MCs) to very high output moving magnets (budget MMs). The underside has switchable gains that range from x150 for budget MMs up to a massive x3500 for lowest output MCs, but the latter figure is right for the task, if rarely available even in MC phono stages. So the Dino will handle absolutely every cartridge available, past and present - not so common an ability.

The only confusion is the DIP switches are labelled 'Gain' but the legends (e.g. MM Low) refer to cartridge output, rather than gain (i.e. MM Low output, rather than MM Low gain). They should stick to one parameter, preferably that of the preamp, which is gain. If cartridge output is to be referred to it needs to be clearly identified as such. The DIP switch labelling isn't a model of clarity, but most users will have enough knowledge to navigate through all this I suspect. At least these switches are available externally, which is a great convenience. especially for those who are not sure of their cartridge spec.

Our response analysis shows the Dino has a small amount of high frequency lift (0.5dB) which will enhance detailing and clarity. Gain falls off below 23Hz (-1dB point) to provide some attenuation of

warps, so a balance has been struck between deep bass and warp suppression, no bad thing. Keeping gain at full level below 20Hz, as the Japanese and Americans prefer to do, does cause a lot of cone flap with reflex loudspeakers when a disc is warped or rippled. But the IEC specified gain roll off to prevent this is too drastic, audibly lightening bass. The Dino compromise is a good one.

Like most external phono stages based on op. amps running from standard supply lines, the Dino will swing 11V output. With the lowest gain available of x150, input overload should therefore be 73mV, which it was under measurement. It

ELECTROCOMPANIET ECI-4

This is a massive amplifier, with remote control of volume and input selection. It turns out a lot of power, in line with its size. I measured 120W into 80hms and no less than 180W into 40hms, plenty enough to drive even the most unco-operative loudspeakers. The output stage goes into asymmetric clip, which isn't too nice, but it should rarely be pushed to this state in practice, because of the amount of power available.

Distortion levels were low in the midband at all output powers, just a trace of second and third harmonic showing in the spectrum analysis. At 10kHz and one watt output distortion residuals were again low, a trace of second harmonic measuring just 0.01%. At higher power levels the amplifier started to produce higher order harmonwill be 3mV at highest gain for the lowest output MCs. Both these values are normal enough and satisfactory.

Channel separation measured 68dB. more than enough for the medium, where 30dB or so at most is available.

Noise (equivalent input noise) figures were reasonably low, if not exceptional.

The Dino measured well in all respects. It is well thought out and can cope with anything thrown at it. **NK**

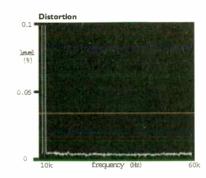

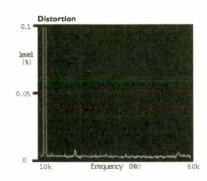
Input sensitivities were surprisingly low. Using the +6dB rear panel switch set for maximum gain and the most sensitive Tap (tape) input sensitivity was just 1.1V peculiarly low. A figure of around 200-300mV is common and most appropriate to cope with 'legacy' tuners and cassette decks in a system. Such items will not drive the Electrocompaniet fully and are not suitable for it.

This is a powerful amplifier, but with some top end distortion and a not-tooimpressive clip state. It is also peculiarly insensitive. **NK**

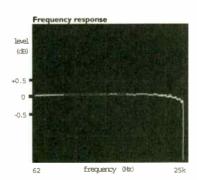

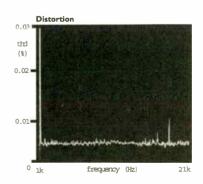
Arcam have kept to their preferred frequency response characteristic, our analysis shows. From the beginning Arcam CD players have had, to a greater or lesser degree, a slowly falling high frequency response. The DV88 comes into the "lesser degree" category. All the same, the DV88's basic presentation will be strongly influenced by this characteristic and such a top-end roll-off helps ensure not only smoothness but also cohesiveness, where treble seemingly integrates with all else, instead of sounding divorced - as can happen with over-bright sounding digital.

The distortion analysis at -30dB shows a clean enough noise floor, free from distortion harmonics and quantisation noise, except for the mildest of disturbances. Distortion levels (16bit) were relatively low from 0dB right down to -90dB, showing that the Arcam uses good quality DACs. There should be little of the harshness that once characterised CD. Channel separation was wide and noise very low at -110dB (IEC A weighted), with emphasis on or off. Output from the audio sockets was 2.2V at 0dB, close to standard.

The DV88 produces a tldy measured audio performance in all areas. It should give good sound quality. **NK**

PIONEER DV-939A

Pioneer's DV-939A had some interesting features. Most striking was its lack of distortion at low signal levels, the -90dB result of 7% being considerably less than the 30% figure that is an inevitable byproduct of 16bit's linear coding. Low level information will sound clean. Denon and Kenwood use additional signal processing to get a similar result and their players sound smoother as a result. So in a nutshell, the Pioneer offers lower distortion than usual and almost certainly a smoother sound. Not surprisingly, our distortion analysis has a low noise floor and there's no sign of distortion products, right up to 20kHz.

There's just a slight rol! down in frequency response, enough to enhance this player's sense of smoothness I believe. The noise floor was very low at -120dB, but I can never tell whether players mute at digital zero to achieve such a result.

DYNAVECTOR DV-104X MkII

Frequency response of the DV-104X MkII was flat near outside grooves, our analysis shows. It's likely to have a brighter sound with more detail than traditional MMs, but with smoother treble.

On inner grooves with a shorter mechanical wavelength there was significant tracing loss due to the stylus minor radius not being able to fully read the groove. Our analysis shows around -4dB loss at 20kHz due to this effect, which all cartridges suffer to a greater or lesser degree. The stylus is good, but the best manage 2dB or so loss at most.

The Dynavector rides high, as they always do. Trouble is, this means vertical tracking angle is way too high - over 30degrees - which produces 6% distortion on vertical modulation. Luckily it is mainly second harmonic so the subjective effect is minimal. Lateral distortion was low, which is important, since Channel separation was high and output normal at 2.2V.

Pioneer's DV-939 has obviously had some special effort put into it to lift sound quality to a high standard. It's a good player from an audio point of view. **NK**
