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he Bristol Sound and Vision show is an enjoyable annual foray into all aspects of the audio/visual market. It gathers a varied and eclectic crowd who are friendly and apprecia-

tive. The show also attracts a younger crowd too, which is particularly pleasing.

However, the Show also highlights some of the downsides of the business. These can be summarised in a selection of conditions unique to the industry that many readers may be unaware of, and ones that we all suffer in silence. I therefore feel they need bringing to light.

The first condition is known as Power Amp Back. This condition rears its ugly head after about three years of lugging around ridiculously overweight equipment. It slowly creeps up on you with the odd twinge or two followed by the hammerblow strike. This invariably happens when unloading the van the evening before a show - resulting in having to stand around for three days with the posture of Quasimodo. This is incidentally a good way of discerning how long someone's been in the industry - the more ungainly the gait, the more experienced the individual. Show me one long serving member of the business that hasn't at one stage suffered from this most unpleasant of conditions and I'll show you a flying pig.

Next on my list is the condition known as Brubeck Ear, in my mind one of the nastiest afflictions of all. This strikes the general public as well as the professional. It is caused by over exposure to bland jazz that many hi-fi exhibitors mistake for emotionally communicating, enjoyable music. However, it can make hi-fi sound quite good, hence the profusion of this type of musical tat on many audiophile labels. But after five minutes of such fare watch listeners' eyes start to wander as the Van Gogh reproductions in the hotel room turn into the Sistine Chapel, or the show guide miraculously transforms into the latest lack Higgins thriller. Some have been known to start living exclusively on roast turkey and tofu as the condition leads the sufferer to crave

more extreme forms of blandness.

Finally we have a very common affliction known as Exhibitor's Thirst. This starts to raise its ugly head about four hours into the first day of exhibiting, or if it's valve amps you're showing off, about thirty minutes. With all that heat flying around in what is usually an already stuffy room the climate moves toward that of a Finnish sauna.

Add to this the fact that most of the time is spent answering questions and chatting to the general throng and you soon have a throat as dry as a Crocodile's undercarriage. No matter how much water is supped throughout the day, the only effective cure for this complaint seems to be found in a post-show mini-tour of the very fine taverns and wine bars of Bristol, where one will invariably bump into 90% of fellow exhibitors, all in jubilant mood. This condition seems to be the most widespread.

If you think from this tirade that I can't abide shows and all that goes with them, you'd actually be wrong. We often forget how important they are for the industry - for example, it's a chance for the public to judge whether journalists are actually accurate in their descriptions of sound quality, if nothing else!

I have a whale of a time and actually enjoy attempting to answer questions and generally nattering to the hi-fi adoring public. As long as they buy me a throat soother afterwards that, is...

• which came up with the very first dual standard machine that plays SACDs too? Super Audio Compact Disc is, lest we forget, the brainchild of Philips and Sony - a format developed independently of the DVD Forum and a not inconsiderable threat to the rosy future of DVD-A!

The story so far: In the finest tradition of London Transport buses, after waiting in vain for twenty years for something to appear, suddenly two brand new 'high resolution' audio formats arrive at once. Arguments rage about their respective sound quality, but Sony's success in getting vast numbers of SACD discs into Japanese shops (which are also available here, via the internet, Vivante and a few other outlets) speaks volumes about which is the more viable.

By contrast, what have we seen from the rival DVD-A camp until

recently - practically nothing! What then of the two new formats' respective sonics? To date, the best sounding player I've heard is Marantz's £5,000 SA-1. It has quite comfortably trounced any DVD-A players I've come across, but to be fair, it costs around five times as much, so maybe it should?

Down in the sub-£1,000 sector, it's Sony that rules the roost. Its SCD-555ES isn't the best CD player at the price, but makes very nice noises with SACD. Its main DVD-A rival has been Pioneer's now-defunct DV-939, which coaxes excellent results from 24/192, and even Denon's bargain basement £499 DVD-1600 is little short of a revelation against most CD players.

It's into this context that the new DV-747A slots. It attempts to consolidate on the 939's success, and grab much of the SACD market from Sony. Its killer 'sales proposition' is total format freedom - it plays virtually any round shiny object you can think of, short of a silver painted beer mat. For the record, this means DVD-A, DVD-Video, Multi-channel SACD, MP3, CD-R, CD-RVV, DVD-R and DVD-RVV, and there's even full Dolby Digital & DTS Decoders built in for good measure. Phew!

Considering this machine's significance, and hefty £1,000 price tag, you can't help feeling a little underwhelmed in the flesh. Quite small at 420x97.5x278 mm, it comes in a nice bright silver brushed aluminium case which is less substantial than it looks, weighing just 4.5kg. Offering DVD video playback as well as its aforementioned audio capabilities, it boasts a wealth of picture-related facilities (including full Multi Region, 108MHz/12-bit video DAC, Fine Focus digital filter, 540 line horizontal resolution and extensive picture parameter adjustment), but ties this together with some clever audio DSP features.

Legato Pro is Pioneer's latest attempt to give digital a more

Analogue feel, using upsampling to boost both DVD video and CD sound from 48kHz (or 44.1kHz for CD) to 192kHz or (or 176.4kHz with CD). Hi-Bit then 'pads out' 16 or 20bit words to 24bits, adding dither. The greatly enhanced digital audio stream is then converted into analogue by its high quality 24bit, 192kHz Burr Brown DAC. Clever stuff, and reminiscent of what many high end digital aficionados have been doing for years - using systems like the dCS Elgar.

> Full MP3 compatibility is built-in - with up to 250 folders with 250 files able to be played back - and there's even an on screen Bit-rate Meter! Round the back you get a wealth of connections, including two SCARTs, two S-Video outs, a Component video out, two RGB video outs, two RCA stereo line outputs and full 5.1 audio outputs, plus a single optical & coaxial digital in and out.

So how does it sound? First a word about its CD replay capabilities. Compare it to the likes of Arcam's FMJ CD23T and you won't give the 747 a second look - or listen. It isn't bad - it's quite rich and full sounding, with no nasties and a decently refined and polished sound, but you hardly get pushed to the edge of your seat with excitement. It does the job perfectly well, but don't buy this primarily as a standard 16bit/44.1kHz CD player. As an aside, you can't say the same about its video capabilities, which are excellent.

The real action is, of course, when you feed it a DVD-A or SACD disc. Frankly, the relative paucity of software with both formats prevents direct comparisons, but live with the Pioneer playing different discs for a week or so and you get the general impression that both its DVD-A and SACD abilities are excellent - but different. In a nutshell, DVD-As sound more powerful and dynamic, and a



little brighter, more edgy and 'digital', whereas SACDs are smoother, warmer and slightly more beguiling. To use an analogue analogy, it's like the difference between an SME V (DVD-A) and a Graham unipivot (SACD).

My much played Denon 24/192 DVD-A disc of Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 5 (Kyoko Tabe on piano, Martin Sieghart conducting the Bruckner Orchestra Linz) was edgeof-the-seat stuff. The DV-747 conjures up a very wide and expansive soundstage, with impressive depth the music hangs in space in a way that no CD player can achieve at any price can (but vinyl users will know what I'm talking about). Bass is deep and strong, but noticeably less 'lumpy' than 16/44 CD - it's more even and seems to go at least an octave lower.

The midband is a joy - oodles of detail, tremendous low level resolving ability and a refreshing lack of grain. Suddenly all the 'fuzz' and 'muzz' of I 6bit disappears, to be replaced by a glass-clear window on the music. Treble is a joy - the total absence of digital tizz is uncanny, and there's a palpable sense of atmosphere which really adds to the experience.

The downside of the Pioneer's DVD-A performance is that it still sounds 'digital' - it's a long way from the beautifully beguiling, natural and organic performance you get from vinyl.

Switching to SACD somewhat alleviates this sense - although it doesn't go as far as it could. My favourite DSD SACD disc right now is Marvin Gaye's 'Midnight Love'. This is not because it's a seminal hi-fi recording - it isn't - but thanks to the great music which shines through with top players like Marantz's SA-1. The DV-747 proved surprisingly adept at carrying 'Sexual Healing'; the contrast between the gritty early drum machine and Marvin's velveteen voice was striking. Here the Pioneer really 'emoted', and I found myself locked into the music rather than the whizz-bang hi-fi quality of DVD-A. Tonally, the 747 is smoother and duller with SACD than DVD-A, with a richer, fuller bass and wider, less precise soundstage - this seems to reflect the relative differences between the two formats in general.

This machine is neither the world's best DVD-A player or SACD spinner, but it sounds way better than CD all the same. Its impressive fidelity with either format, plus its raft of other abilities, makes it superb value for money. It's very hard to find a reason not to buy Pioneer's new DV-747A.

Make no mistake - neither new format is perfect. Aside from watermarking issues, DVD-Audio's main theoretical drawback is the brickwall filtering it needs to eliminate high frequency digital noise. This chops off all HF content above half the sampling frequency (with 24/192 DVD-A it's 96kHz). When CD was invented, it was assumed we couldn't hear anything above 20kHz, but psycho-acousticians now agree we can 'perceive' far higher up the audio band.

SACD circumvents this by using a completely different coding system to DVD-A's Pulse Code Modulation (PCM). Direct Stream Digital gives naturally extended high frequencies up to 100kHz by taking tiny 1bit samples at a dramatically higher sampling rate of 2.8224MHz. However, this too has limitations -Professor Malcolm Hawksford of

Pioneer's multi-function player handled audio CDs very well, returning a ruler-flat audio frequency response our analysis shows. An upper limit of 21.87kHz is higher than usual, showing Pioneer use effective filtering. With good downward extension to 4Hz the DV-747A is well designed in this area.

Distortion levels were low throughout the players dynamic range, but especially so below -60dB. Pioneer have used additional Legato Pro processing to reduce low level quantisation noise, since it is impossible to reduce 'distortion' at -90dB from CD much below 28% without it, The DV474A returned a distortion figure of just 6.6% at this level, so it is very different. Experience shows this detectably smooths out and deepens the sound from CD; it is a significant benefit. Essex University has argued that the system simply doesn't work at a high enough sampling frequency to give decent resolution, particularly in the treble range. Indeed DPA's Rob Watts says that, "most of DSD's 2.8 million pulses per second are needed just to reach 16bit standard, let alone better it".

There are practical as well as theoretical drawbacks for both systems, too, Few high resolution PCM or DSD analogue to digital converters exist in studios, and - at the moment at least - the 24/192 converters in DVD-A players struggle to give anywhere near that resolution. Rob Watts reckons they're not much better than true 18bit performance, currently, LFD's Richard Bews adds that, "without proper power supplies, earthing and parts even the best DAC won't sound right". Railing against what he calls 'specmanship', he argues that sampling frequencies and word size are more useful to marketing men than digital engineers, "you can't have a free lunch with digital".

Lastly, there's the vexed question of software availability. Here, SACD has the clear lead right now. Eighteen months since the first commercial DVD-A disc release, they're still not in High Street stores. There's a sprinkling of titles from the likes of Warner, BMG, EMI and Universal, but it's still early days. By contrast, there are about ten times as many titles available on SACD, from giants like Sony (and its CBS back catalogue) plus a number of small, audiophile labels like Linn, Opus 3 and AudioQuest. A good place to find either discs is Vivante Music Ltd. (www.vivante.co.uk).

Ultimately, the new wave of DVD video players incorporating DVD-A at dramatically lower prices, should assure the format's popularity. SACD will likely become a specialist audiophile format, like vinyl. The beauty of Pioneer's DV-747a - and similar players likely to follow it - is that you can simply buy discs on the grounds of musical content, rather than format politics.

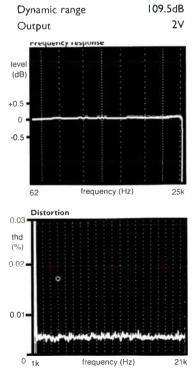

All other figures from this player were exceptionally good, suggesting Pioneer have put quite a lot of effort into its development. I'd expect the DV 474A to turn in good results since its measured performance is exceptional.

Forget DVD players or CD spinners - Arcam's real 'heartland' is upmarket integrated amplifiers like this. David Price listens to the brand new A32, surely the spiritual successor to the famous A60?

est we forget, A&R Cambridge Ltd's launch pad into High Street stardom was the late, lamented A60 integrated amplifier. Back in the tail-end of the seventies, this sold for over £200 - about four times the cost of your average budget separate of the day. As well as having a comparable price point, the £1,100 A32's actual design brief is incredibly similar to its forebear all those years ago. At a time when it was trendy to shave off all excess fat, the A60 proudly sported balance and tone controls. Defiantly offering 'real world' facilities, it went against the 'purist' ethos of the day and duly sold like hot cakes.

It's into this context that Arcam's self-proclaimed "best ever integrated amplifier" fits. Said to "set new standards for its class", this is the Huntingdon company's stab at getting a piece of the upmarket separates sector back. Okay - blah, blah, woof, woof - everyone talks up their products, but Arcam has put its money where its mouth is, in the shape of a purposeful 100W per channel power amp section (8 ohms), claimed to give a straight 150W into 4 ohms. This is in no small part due to a toroidal transformer the size of a tractor tyre. It weighs a ton, and a particularly portly - obese, even - one at that.

True to its roots, the A32 doesn't shirk on the functionality front. To wit, you get five line inputs, plus two tape monitors, plus discrete power amp in

and pre out socketry, plus two pairs of speaker terminals at the back. Up front is a headphone socket, large volume control, push buttons for all the inputs and a bright green multi function display. This normally shows volume, but press the 'Select' button and it goes into an elaborate 'edit' mode. This offers Treble, Bass and Balance controls, plus a 'Customise' [sic] option which gives, variously, type of volume control display, volume control sensitivity, global or localised tone control selection (i.e. individual tone controls on each input, or overall) and input trimming (i.e. individual level controls for each input). Get the picture?

There's more. You can even alter the 'welcome message'. Needless to say, the A32 has various optional extras, from a plug-in MM/MC phono module (which should be good if past history is anything to go by), to a matching P35 100W RMS per side power amplifier, which can be purchased in either 2 channel or 3 channel versions to bi-amp (or triamp) your speakers, or provide multi-channel functionality. In three channel guise, you've got 3x90W. Of course, all this stuff is controllable from the supplied remote commander - including the optional power amps!

As I've already suggested, the A32 is a well built piece of kit. Its silver finished 430x370x110mm case is a precision-machined aluminium extrusion with a heavy gauge aluminium cover and steel chassis. It feels a lot swisher than Arcam's budget fare, and its 13kg weight rather underlines the fact that this is for big boys. To wit, I decided to try it out through my big reference Yamaha NS1000M loudspeakers, with a Michell Orbe turntable and Linn CD12 CD player feeding it. The first twist of the solid metal volume knob suggested this was going to be fun!

Without doubt, the Arcam packs a punch. I rarely hear integrateds that can really extend the powers of my Yamaha NS1000M loudspeakers, but this one had a darn good go and got up to flare-flapping levels before showing any undue signs of stress. Kicking off with Roxy Music's 'Take a Chance with Me' from the Avalon LP, the Arcam thumped out the opening drum sequence most purposefully. Attack transients weren't quite as lightening-fast as the Naim NAIT 5 I had to hand, but there was a good degree more 'oomph'. When the guitars, bass, keyboards and vocals kicked in, the A32 exhibited more bass weight, giving it a much fuller, gutsier presentation.

Further up the frequency band the Naim showed greater grip. With a tighter control on the proceedings, the A32 was made to look slightly wrong footed. Still, for its sins it pushed out a wider, more expansive and breathy soundstage than the Naim, giving a noticeably more Phil Spector-like 'wall of sound'. Its

Salisbury rival was less concerned with the minutiae of production details, and just cut to the chase, giving a more engaging if less 'hi-fi' sound.

Moving to the simpler strains of Madness's 'The Sun and the Rain', the A32 dived in with aplomb. The opening piano break was rich and fullbodied, with an impressively natural tone, good dynamics and big, bold outof-the-box image articulation. Unlike the Naim, when the wick was really turned up in anger (to -7.5dB on the display, so it was getting loud), the Arcam kept driving the bass hard, letting those tuneful piano cadences and bouncy bass guitar shine through. Indeed, this kind of rhythmically straightforward pop seemed to suit the Arcam down to the ground.

Moving to the more sinuous drum and bass of Appaloosa's 'Travelling' on CD, this amp again conjured up an expansive acoustic, with sumptuous basslines and a peppy and tuneful midband. Interestingly though, you could hear things go slightly awry as the song built up in intensity. The Nait carried the midband far better,

MEASURED PERFORMANCE

Arcam's chunky FMJ A32 amplifier has plenty of punch. It turns out a useful 112W into 8ohms and no less than 200W into 4ohms. Since most loudspeaker bass units are 4ohms nowadays, the Arcam can drive them hard if need be. This amp will certainly go loud.

Arcam have tailored the bandwidth neatly to suit SACD and DVD-A at both ends of the spectrum. The amplifier reaches down to 3Hz, so it will push subsonics, and it extends up to 90kHz, the upper limit of the new disc formats. Distortion levels were fairly low in all areas, but there was a little more high frequency distortion than that for many amplifiers. It comprised mainly second and third harmonics. Subjectively this should not amount to much.

The Moving Magnet disc stage was insensitive but is otherwise well engineered, with accurate equalirevelling in the complex twists and turns of the snare drums, and their interplay with the hi-hats. The Arcam lost some of this, preferring simply to bash things out with as much wallop as it could muster. Again, both amps' respective readings of the song were great fun, but quite different!

It was The Crusaders' 'Street Life' on Japanese vinyl that signposted the A32's shortcomings most clearly. Again, it sounded big-hearted and engaging (reminiscent of an old NAD3020 on steroids, methinks!), with big, fat bass that pushed the song along with glee. The problem was Randy Crawford's voice, which seemed a little too grey and uninspiring. It certainly wasn't harsh or fatiguing - far from it - it's just that the big Arcam wasn't really able to capture the grain of her incredibly 'breathy' tones in the way that either the Naim or my Cyrus 7 did. Of course, you don't expect valve levels of tonal accuracy from a product like this, but I still feel it rather steamrollered through the proceedings at the expense of a good

deal of subtlety. Nor did it prove the most delicate reproducer of acoustic cymbals - things sounded just a touch too genetically modified for my liking.

This is the key to the A32. It's not the most transparent or self-effacing performer at the price, preferring to play music with great gusto and a fine sense of fun, regardless of what's actually on the disc. At this price, you can't have your cake and eat it - it's either power or poise - and the Arcam nails its colours to the wall just like a Harley Davidson or Chevrolet Corvette would. You could say it's more early Bruce Springsteen than late Nick Drake! So if you're looking for a go anywhere, do everything amplifier, then this should be at the top of your shortlist. In my experience, products with this kind of flexibility and feature count rarely ever sound this fun. 📒 📥

sation and low noise. The Moving Coil stage was similarly not too sensitive, being for high output designs. The MM stage gain rolls off below 20Hz and MC below 32Hz, so there is some attenuation of warps around 5Hz but good bass coverage all the same.

The FMJ A32 is a powerhouse with plenty of facilities. It measured well all round, if not quite bettering rivals in any particular area. **NK**

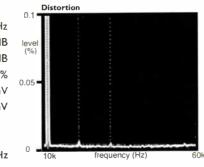

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LA VIE EN ROSE

After being impressed by last month's Rosette 1 integrated amplifier, Simon Pope relishes the chance to hear Red Rose's new entry level 'speaker, the Rosebud.

espite the slightly schmaltzy names of the new range of entry level hi-fi products from Red Rose ('Rosebud', 'Passion', etc.!) I have to admit to being so impressed by the cute little Rosette amplifier that I couldn't wait to get my ears around the new range of 'speakers, which on paper look an even more interesting product than the solid-state amp range.

This has much to do with the inclusion of a ribbon tweeter, much loved by manufacturers and audiophiles alike since the good old days of mono back in the 1930s and championed to great effect by the likes of Celestion, Apogee and Elac. Others have experimented but many fallen prey to simple practical limitations.

The particular ribbon used in the Red Rose range has its own history which requires a little explanation. Those of you who missed last month's review of the Rosette amplifier (shame upon you) or know nothing or little of the company may appreciate this. Those who did read or do know - I'll make it as concise as possible!

Red Rose Music was founded by Mark Levinson and Victor Tiscareno and its first products consisted of a range of valve amplifiers and ribbon tweetered 'speakers available only in full system form. The company are famously adverse to all things PCM and favour DSD/SACD technology (to the extent that they have an SACD recording facility in their New York showroom) and, of course, good old vinyl. The ribbons used in the first 'speaker models were designed by the veteran Swedish ribbon designer Bo Bengstton, and the entry level model standmounter featured two ribbons in close parallel configuration raised above the main cabinet as a sort of attachment. In the new Rosebud the same Bengstton design remains but this time it is a single ribbon incorporated into the main cabinet in a more traditional manner.

There are two new 'speakers in the latest range (the larger Classic is a floorstander) that join the four new amplifiers, and a phono stage. This range differs from later products in that they are part-designed and assembled in China, using drive units made there too.

The Rosebud reviewed here is basically a pretty ordinary looking design for a rather exotic price, apart from the aforementioned ribbon tweeter and the far deeper than usual dimensions of the cabinet (more of which later).

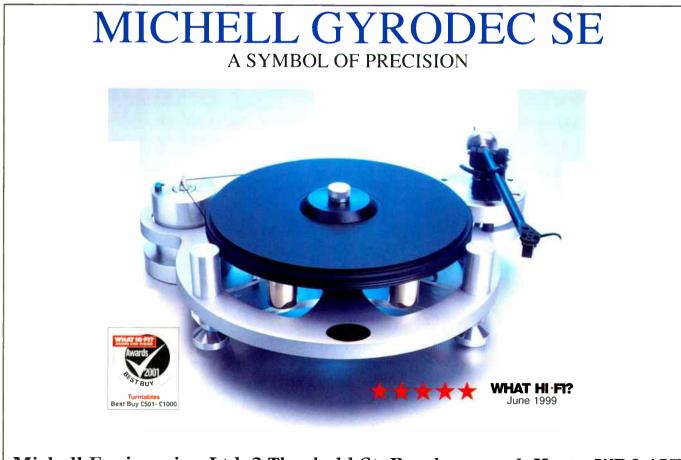
The main design criteria for this 'speaker, as with most standmounts, were to create more bass and a larger sound than you would expect from the dimensions. The crossover is voiced by Mr. Levinson himself in typical labour intensive fashion, one would imagine. Build quality is high; the speakers have a sturdy feel and a nice dead sounding 'thock' from a rap with the knuckles confirms a solidly built cabinet.

The hand built mid/bass unit is of typical for the breed and around the back we have a single pair of workmanlike binding posts. This feature brings up something which cannot be avoided. The price for this 'speaker isn't cheap - even if it were designed and hand built by the Queen of England herself over a period of three months (and included bi-wiring posts!), £,3000 is still a whole heap of money for this product - period (as our stateside friends would put it).

Now that's over with I can tell you that when it comes to sound quality and nothing more they are one of the best sounding 'speakers that have ever graced my hallowed halls. When you encounter this size of 'speaker - even at the top end you roughly know what you're going to get: where it will pass and where it will fail. Not so here.

Mr. Levinson has an uncanny and annoying habit of making things sound very good indeed and these were a real surprise, especially at lower frequencies. With an SACD of Frankie Goes To Hollywood's finest pieces ("a blank disc, then" I hear you cry) the classic 'Welcome To The Pleasuredome' with its bells, whistles and general jungle noises was

wonderfully clear and detailed, with especially impressive imaging. But it was only when the self-Indulgent intro stopped and the music kicked in that the Rosebuds showed what they could really do. Here was a good grip with rhythm and quite amazing bass control, which was also impressively deep for the cabinet size. Bass notes vibrated the floorboards in a satisfyingly tight manner. I've not heard such depth and quality from a 'speaker of the size before.

Another trait of the Rosebud is the openness of its midrange. This was best demonstrated with orchestral music such as Mahler's seventh symphony, with the spooky woodwind and brass writing of the second movement (the old Castroi GTX advert, for those with a good memory). Flutes and oboes flitted gracefully above the 'speakers and a fine spread of orchestral sound was created at tutti passages that raised the 'speaker to levels found only in similarly priced 'speakers of a much larger physical stature.

Also highlighted was the magical treble that's found with the best ribbon designs - sweet and airy yet smooth and detailed. Playing vinyl LPs of both Thelonius Monk (with the rather modestly and dubiously titled 'Genius Of Modern Music') and Miles Davis's Sketches Of Spain, a fine sense of line and phrase was demonstrated, with very good tonal balance and instrumental colour. This was especially good when used with valve amps - fairly powerful ones, as the Rosebuds take a bit of driving.

The Rosebud is one of the finest standmounters available on the market. They have real hi-fi purist appeal, yet avoid the sterility and forced detail of some designs, which can distract from sheer musical enjoyment.

My one and only gripe rest with the price. If these 'speakers were \pounds 1,500 they would be world beaters

but £3,000 is a lot of money for what at first glance seems a fairly ordinary design - and one that's completely assembled in low cost China. Thus, at £,3000 they have some strong competition - albeit in the larger floorstander and electrostatic markets. As high-end standmounts perhaps only Wilson Benesch's superb £6,000 Discovery comes close performance wise - which is praise indeed.

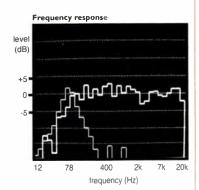
The Rosebud loudspeaker has a long element pleated ribbon tweeter. Conventional ribbon tweeters have problems, not going low enough to match a cone bass/mid-range unit easily and with limited vertical dispersion, a property that makes them beam strongly. The ribbon unit here largely avoids such problems measurement showed. It integrated well with the bass/mid., at a low crossover point around 2.5kHz, and dispersion was relatively good. The designers have tailored a nice, smooth response with treble level being IdB-2dB lower than the midrange in order to give the 'speaker some body. A good ribbon tweeter can sound sweeter and more open than a normal dome tweeter.

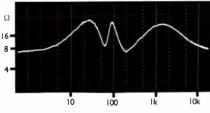
Bass output was limited, the small bass unit cone reaching down

to 80Hz before rolling off slowly. The port was tuned to 63Hz, above the resonant frequency of the bass unit our impedance analysis shows. This loudspeaker may well give fast bass with good, resonant impact. The port gets down fairly low.

Sensitivity was a mediocre 83dB. Although small loudspeakers are always insensitive, this is a little below the norm., the main reason being a very high overall impedance of 12ohms. Together with a smooth impedance characteristic free from sharp changes caused by reactance, the Rosebud is an easy load. It draws little current, tests showed.

This loudspeaker sounded unusually smooth during noise tests. Its tweeter works well and it is an easy load too, although a 60W amplifier is required just for voltage swing. With light but fast bass it should sound good. **NK**

TWEAK EASY

David Price rages against those who doubt the fine art of tweaking, and introduces a revolutionary new free product, for just one easy payment.

he fact that 'tweaking' is still regarded by many as a ridiculous activity, practiced by a bunch of hairshirted audiophile extremists with nothing better to spend their money on, is a disgrace. Indeed, it's a sign of the hi-fi community's tragic lack of collective imagination that the very word 'tweak' is used at all. It sounds odd, idiosyncratic and just plain barmy - terms to which this vital 'intrlcate practice of audio enrichment' (as I prefer to call it) most definitely do not apply.

Such is the paucity of the average audiophile's imagination that anyone who pays more than the slightest attention to the electrical or mechanical well being of their system is dismissed as some kind of snake oil pedalling charlatan out to make a fast buck, or a certifiable lunatic who doesn't quite have both oars in the water.

Speaking in my capacity as a world-renown top international audio journalist (of quite some repute), I now intend to nail my cards to the table - so to speak - and declare here and now that all this malicious, misguided and malevolent antitweaking 'propaganda' stinks!

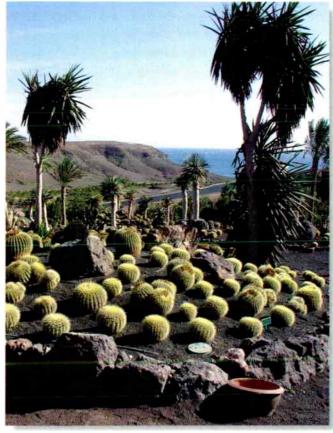
The anti-tweaking lobby would have you believe that there's actually something strange about this country's hi-fi journalists exhorting readers to lavish vast sums of their hard earned cash on premium priced squidgy rubber balls, bespoke pointy metal spikes, expertly torn pieces of paper to put in books or electrically polarised hardwoods grown by Buddhist monks in Japan at great personal expense. What could possibly be wrong with that, I ask you?

Worse still, these 'preachers of the church of the poison mind', these 'disciples of the unenlightened', actually dare to suggest that far from being a sound investment, these bespoke 'audio enrichers' are actually nothing more than a rip-off. Outrageous! Next thing you know, they'll be telling us 'premium' priced interconnects, hewn from rare earth supermetals by Tibetan transcendental meditationists, are a plain waste of cash!

Well, I for one intend to put a stop to all this nonsense. Never let it be said that I sat back impassive when the call came to defend the Holy Tweak, At a stroke, I'll stop the rot written about the alleged dubiousness of audio enrichment by revealing exclusively - a remedy to transform the sickest of systems into a living, breathing window on the world of music. And to silence the doubters, this one is free!

Yes folks, the solution to the riddle of history, the answer to life's ills and the best way of tightening loose bass and speeding attack transients is - Cactus Damping. Following on from the Japanese audiophile craze for exotic African hardwoods as mass damping, extensive research into the electromechanical properties of one secret genus of cacti, indigenous to the Spanish territory of Fuerteventura in the Canary Islands, has born incredible fruit.

Cactus Damping is a long, exhaustive and sometimes dangerous process, involving the rendering of the plant - cutting the prickly bits off - and the application thereof to critical areas of your system components using a special organic glue. Used as a lining for the pressed steel cases of CD, DVD and RDA



players, not to mention the subchassis and plinths of turntables, dramatic results can be obtained. Without wishing to blind you with science, the molecules in this particular type of cactus vibrate in sympathy with the sound - rather like flashing lights in a disco - thus cancelling out all the badness.

REVOLUTION



Rega has truly turned the tables on its budget beginnings with the release of the latest P9, says David Price.

n typical Rega style, it took the company an amazing two decades from the launch of its first Planet vinyl spinner to release its high end 'statement' turntable, the Planar 9. Although it's been quietly successful, Rega has been relatively quick off the mark to upgrade it with this, the new revised P9. At £2,250 it's a cost-noobject, no expense spared exercise in analogue excellence. It's really gone to town on the design and build -Rega says that the ceramic platter alone costs more to produce than its P25 turntable!

The fun doesn't stop there, though. As we all now know, to get any kind of decent sound off black discs, you have to design the plinth properly, or (better still, some might say) dispense with it all together. In the P9's case, Rega have designed a complex CNC machined skeletal structure, encased in highly ridged phenolic resin laminates. The inner skeletal structure is also hewn from ultra lightweight fibre composite. Claimed to be the equivalent to the carbon fibre 'monocoque' chassis found in modern FI racing cars, it provides an ultra lightweight and rigid foundation for the moving parts.

The theme continues with the aforementioned platter, which is the most exotic material Rega has used to date in a turntable. Made from pure ceramic, it's not only the hardest material known to man apart from diamond, but is also a popular favourite of the aerospace industry you'll find it on missile nose cones and NASA Space Shuttle insulation tiles. As an aside, it's also a popular accoutrement on ultra high end Japanese esoterica - every self respecting Far Eastern digital disc spinner sporting a telephone number price tag uses ceramic isolation feet, for example. The beauty of this stuff is that it is sonically extremely self effacing - unlike felt damped Mazak (aluminium) found in decks like Linn's LP12, it adds very little to the closed loop of the vinyl replay system.

Every P9 sports a decorative surround of exotic solid woods, which can be interchanged, should you wish to give your deck a breath of fresh air. Rega says that it's light for superior sonics and uses the same three hollow-rubber feet (tuned to slightly different frequencies) found on all Rega turntables. The singlepoint main bearing assembly is also said to be engineered to extremely tight tolerances.

As you'd expect, the hard mounted twin-phase AC synchronous motor gets a sophisticated drive circuit courtesy of Rega's chief electronics whizz, Terry Bateman, designed to minimise vibration and keep speed irregularities to the minimum. Its separate quartz crystal referenced power supply has extensive filtering to ensure the lowest motor noise possible - housed in one of the company's full width

'separates boxes', this is one of the biggest and heaviest off-board turntable PSUs I've ever seen!

As you'd expect, the famous Rega arm also gets the treatment - and unlike the previous RB900, which was little more than a (usefully) 'breathed on' RB300, the 'all new' RB1000 is said to carry more technological changes over previous Rega tonearms than any produced during the last twenty years! Key areas of improvement include the bearing assemblies, wiring and materials used. Mass has been redistributed to areas of the tonearm where it is less critical to performance, as evinced by the new polished aluminium arm tube which has no coatings of any type. The result is a tonearm which takes thirty times longer to produce than an RB300, claimed to have extremely high structural rigidity, ultra low bearing friction and massive stability oh, and it also looks drop-deadgorgeous, too.

Setting up the P9 is pretty much the same as with other Rega 'tables, which is refreshingly rapid and fussfree. Unlike Linn's 'dealer knows best' philosophy or Michell's 'build-ityourself' creed, with a Planar it's basically a question of getting it out of the box, putting the platter on and plugging in. You have to take care to remove the little cardboard spacer between the plinth and sub platter, and screw the counterweight on, but this aside it's practically plug and play. For this reason - plus the deck's beautiful finish (not quite up with Michell or SME but great all the same) - I found myself rather charmed by the P9 before I even plugged it in.

The review sample came with the £249 Exact moving magnet, which was an obvious starting point. Plugged into my Michell Dino phono stage, Cyrus 7/PSX-R and Mission 782s, I found listening to it a curiously familiar experience. This is because I've owned a Planar 3 since I was 17 years old (it was my first 'proper' deck) and still really rate it. The P9

gives a profoundly bigger and more powerful sound, but still has that trademark even-handedness. It's not 'impressive' (as Michells may sometimes be accused of sounding) or 'charismatic' (Linn LP12), but Just gets on with the job of playing music in a characteristically open and unfussy way.

Cueing up a reissue of The Beach Boys' 'Surf's Up', the P9 just cut through the silt covering this rather oddly produced album. The vocals on 'Till I Die' were able to shine through the murky mix, their rich, resonant character carried beautifully. Unlike the Linn LP12 however, the P9 has the characteristic Rega 'dryness' - there's less upper bass/lower mid bloom than the Sondek and slightly less extension and articulation than the Orbe. Rather, the Rega summons up a tight, taut, fast and fluid low frequency performance, which impresses less than its Linn or Michell rivals, but gives nothing away in terms of musicality.

Indeed, this rather 'liberal' bass character lets you focus more on what's happening in the midband than the Michell. The latter attempts to scale and proportion the stereo image over a wider space, showing a better contrast between close and distant images, but the Rega - rather like the LP12 in this respect - pulls things closer together slightly and goes, ferret-like, for the musical centre of attraction. ABC's 'Date Stamp' was a perfect exemplar rather than sitting at the back of the studio, you feel thrust into the fray. The P9 went straight for the central bass guitar and drum interplay, giving the song an extremely strong and propulsive feel as a result. It retrieved massive amounts of detail - more than a Sondek is capable of - and conjured a wide and tight stereo image, if a little flattened in terms of depth perspective compared to the Orbe.

Treble is another delight - it's very sweet and extended. Here,



substituting the Exact (which is a fine MM - one of the best if you like the more cerebral, Audio Technica style of presentation) for the brilliant Ortofon Kontrapunkt B moving coil brought real rewards. There's a great sense of atmosphere - it really gives an exhaustively detailed recreation of the recorded acoustic. Lee Morgan's 'The Sidewinder' showed a very finely etched and intricate HF performance, more atmospheric than the LP12 and more 'alive' than the Orbe.

Weaknesses? It lacks the crushing power and attack of the Orbe, or the sinuous rhythmic charms of the LP12. Instead, it treads a third way which gets you very close to the recording yet draws absolutely no attention to itself in so doing. Its depth perspective, bass extension and stereo imaging aren't the very best you'll hear, but its beautifully stable, lively yet refined, smooth and even sound is ample compensation. Unlike either the Linn or Michell, there's a sense that you can completely forget that you're listening to a turntable at all, and simply turn the music up! A brilliant product, and a welcome addition to the 'affordable high end' turntable market. 📕 📥

The superbly constructed Maestro CD player from Audio Analogue is the company's latest top of the range discs spinner. Simon Pope listens with intent. . .

hen this very magazine first encountered the PucciniSE integrated amplifier, it could be fair Audio Analogue's presence in the UK was only a faction of what it is now.We were so impressed by the midpriced integrated's sound quality that we praised from the rafters and the UK audio industry woke up to one the bargains in of the hi-fi universe. The company's product continued to develop with remote versions of the Puccini range, a monoblock version of the Donizetti power amp and lastly a new version of the Paganini and Maestro CD players. Along the way they also designed and constructed a monster sized integrated amplifier in the high end American mould that was also called the Maestro - the CD player reviewed here is a perfect aesthetic match for this product.

Audio Analogue was formed back in 1995 by a collection five Italian hi-fi industry professionals and electronic experts. The companies products have a concerted sonic stamp which is one of overall smoothness and ease (in the typical Italian style) as opposed to the 'wham, bam, thank you maam' school of audio engineering. This trait is mainly instigated by the 'golden ears' of the gang, a certain Sr. Claudio Bertini who as well as being a hi-fi amd music lover, is also a keen tinkler of Ferraris and a wine enthusiast (ever

get the feeling you're in the wrong business?). Bertini apparently has the knack of being able to name components in a blind test - much akin to a wine taster on tasting duties! This results in experienced and knowledgable choice of electronic components and in the top end product such as this, a peak inside the lid (if you can lift it off) results in an eyeful of audiophile goodies. This machine has little in common with its similarly name predecessor except for the name. Here we have a top dog Philips transport replacing the Sony design of old and a completely new DAC and power supply design. We have two 24-bit/96kHz Analog Devices AD1855 DACs used in parallel along with a Crystal CS8420 sample rate convertorfor every type of digital signal - thereofre even CD signals are 'upsampled' and effectively converted at high resolution.

The analogue section features high quality discrete compnenets such as polyproprylene and Os-Con capacitors, low noise resistors and high linearity FETs. The analogue devices 24/96 DAC is kept heavily isolated from the transport system making the Maestro a true two-boxin-one player. The Maestro improves on the Pagainini's (reviewed as part of a system last month) physical and sonic stature. The build of the player is quite superb - weight wise it's up there with the Musical Fidelity 3D nu-vista CD player - no mean feat. There's a lot of up to date technology to be found here, which is refereshing, as it retains the staus and look of a hard core high end stereo hi-fi product.

A peek at the rear panel results in the discovery of something slightly different from the norm. In addition to the traditional digital outputs we also have the inclusion of a digital input stage. This can be untilised by a DVD player, for example, to make use of the internal high quality 24/96 DAC - handyy for those who wish to upgrade their DVD players performance as well as replay CDs to audiophile quality. The digital output can be set from the front panel to work in 44.1 or 96kHzz mode and a loop function is also present allowing the internal transpoort signal to be processed by an external compenent (if you should wish for such a thing). Also on the rear we have the inclusion of XLR sockets for balanced coonection, rasing the Maestro furter into high end territory.

The sound of the Maestro is at once smooth and relaxed in the traditional Audio Analogue mould but also very clean. Beethoven's seventh symphony conudted by the outstanding Carlos Kleiber and the Vienna Philharmonic on a DG reissue had pleny of life, bounce and attack as well as grace and refinement. Strings



sounded tight and visceral and timpani fast yet it still amanged to be lyrical and light when necessary, making for a pleasing balance. You may not have the overall transparency and 'brightness' of the Musical Fidelity 3D nu-vista but the sound was certainly heading in this ballpark - at half the price. It's a very user firendly sound, as confrmed with Soundgarden's Superunkown album, This can either sound fantastically alive and full or resemble a tranny radio immersed in oil, luckily it was the former here. Imaging of the mix was highlighted to great effect and there was a constant underlying power in the bass and drums which drove the music on, never becoming to overblown or messy. If I had to pick out a downside, I'd say that with mid eighties rough and ready digital recordings (such as Kleiber's Brahms fourth symphony - a great performance ruined by a rotten recording) it veered to the over lush

with a slightly covered sound, although the CD quality isn't exactly the best around. 'Kind Of Blue' had a nice forward presence that was also light of touch - it can sometimes sound stodgy, strident and ultimately boring with lesser equipment, here, though, there was enough variety of instrumental tone to make the sound realistic and interesting - essential for me with such an old warhorse (no matter how good it is!). Using and external trasnport in the shape of Merdian's 506.24 and a NAD DVD player the Maestro showed what a fine DAC section it has, exploring every avenue of detail and bringing real presence and life into the NAD especially, and agility to the Meridian.

Recomended then? Definitely. there's stronmg competition at the price from Arcam's FMJCD23T (good coherence) and Meridian's 506.24 (plenty of insight). Whilst it doesn't havee the insight of the latter it also doesn't suffer from sthe sluggish bass than can occur with some recordings. It has all the cohernce of the Arcam, though, with a little more cleanless to my ear, too. Although it looks like a montser it doesn;t sound like one and is sirprisngly smooth and subtle at times. At £1,500 it stands as a fine buy, with a pleasing, all round sound that takes the 'everyday player' appeal one step further, It's not quite up there with the awesome 3D Nu-vista offering when it comes to overall detail but at half its price its by no means out of the running and competes easily on the build front.

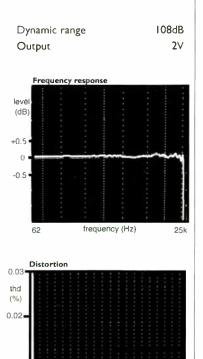
MEASURED PERFORMANCE

Measured frequency response of the Maestro CD was flat to a high figure of 21.4kHz. Our response analysis clearly shows the basic characteristic is flat, with some top end ripple suggesting a slightly different filter design to usual. With the other end of the spectrum reaching down to a low 4Hz this player has wide bandwidth.

Through the dynamic range distortion was low, except down at -60dB, where the figures were a little up on what is possible nowadays. A figure of 0.44% is none too impressive, consisting as it does of random quantisation noise and mush. This brought the EIAJ dynamic range figure down to 108dB - still respectable all the same. I doubt if this minor blemish will affect things too much, although every little improvement is worth having with 16-bit. Our distortion analysis at -30dB, representing typical music level, shows a low noise floor and an absence of distortion at this level, which is encouraging.

With a normal output of 2V and wide channel separation of 100dB or more the Maestro measures well, even if it doesn't quite match the best players around in terms of measured performance at least. NK

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CROFT HIGHLY



Croft has a reputation for delivering high quality audio at a sensible price. Will their latest integrated amplifier carry on this tradition?

n 'rip off' Britain there are still a few people dedicated to the cause of giving genuine value for money, offering the best possible product at the best possible price. Although it doesn't always seem this way - being perceived by many outsiders as a luxury for show offs – specialist hi-fi has its share of like-minded individuals intended on delivering this service.

> Croft is one such company. Specialising in valve amplifiers, the company manufactures a range of products with price tags more akin to the midrange black boxes of the major Japanese companies. Having said this, there's nothing particularly special about the prices themselves, as there are a few valve specialists around who also manage to keep retail prices to a minimum. The crux of the matter here is that Croft manufacture entirely in the UK and the price competitors look to foreign shores (mainly Chinese) to keep prices low. Indeed, many perceived British hi-fi companies manufacture abroad for this reason alone, sometimes with an injection of foreign cash to boot.

To be fair, though, there are still those that manufacture over here, even though their prices often reflect this much. As a rough 'ball park' figure the retail price of a hi-fi product needs to be at least five-to-six times the material and labour cost in order to make some kind of profit, once all cash draining factors have been considered. Croft's Cameleon integrated amplifier reviewed here at £875 would therefore seem a bit of a bargain on paper.

The relatively low price of the Cameleon is reflected in its build quality – although a more stylish aluminium front panel finish is available for those who want more aesthetic appeal and a bit of pizzazz for an extra £300.

The basic finish isn't going to win any innovative design awards. And it also isn't going to win Robot Wars, as the Cameleon is no Ali or George Foreman, weighing in at less than 10kilos! There are no fancy bells or whistles – this is h-fi at its most basic. Inputs are almost minimal and there's only a single pair of 'speaker terminals.

On the front fascia we have three knobs, one for input selection and one for the volume of each channel. Oh, and forget the remote control. If you therefore want the volume of each channel to exactly equal you've got a tough job on your hands, as there are no markings around the volume controls.

If this is - as I said earlier - hi-fi at its most basic it's also hi-fi at its most purist and let's not forget that this is the goal of many audiophiles attracted to this kind of product. In this respect, internally it's as pure as the driven snow.

The preamp section of the Cameleon, consisting of the two channel potentiometers and input selector, is passive and the power amplifier section is exactly the same as that found in the company's Vista power amp. This is a circuit discarding as many unnecessary components as the company sees fit – one's that Croft feel inhibit the performance. Croft feels that without this electronic 'dead wood' the amp is free to "express a kaleidoscope of sound".

Another bonus of this, of course, is that a low cost can be maintained. Taking off the lid reveals very little, as there's very little in there! It does, however, reveal four smallish ECL805 triode output pentode valves, not a valve I'm too familiar with, but it does have a warm and sweet characteristics.

There is a noticeable absence of circuit boards in the design, making for very simple circuitry that includes seventeen resistors and four coupling capacitors. The output transformers are designed in-house and the Cameleon works in fixed bias operation. The lack of PCBs means that everything inside is point to point hard wired and the power output is quoted at a modest but adequate I SW.

The overall sound of the Cameleon came as no real surprise as we've encountered the Croft sound previously in their simple yet highly effective Vitale preamp, which excelled when it came to transparency and purity – doing everything a hi-end preamp does but at a fraction of the price. To ensure the best from the Cameleon I used a pair of Diapason's 92dB sensitivity Adamantes III 'speakers (for a 'real

world' design I also used Mission's 782s) with Meridian's 506 24 CD player as source. Chord Company Anthem interconnects and Kimber 'speaker cable completed the system.

A CD of the Emerson Quartet playing Shostakovich's fifth and sixth string quartets showed up the Cameleon in its true light. This type of design is well suited to chamber music, which is presented in a natural and highly detailed manner. The strings had a keen sense of life and realism and there was a healthy amount of weight to the sound, which rounded it out nicely. There was little to fault in the sound quality here, as the amp did everything it should have done in relaying an intense, immediate and detailed performance.

One thing I did note about the Shostakovich was the slightly forward nature of the upper midrange and this became further accentuated with Eric Bibb's musically bland but well recorded 'Good Stuff' on Opus3 records. Whilst there was excellent clarity and transparency, plus good detail on acoustic guitars and a nice resonant and fairly deep sound from the upright bass, the vocals I found too forward sounding at times and a little grating when dynamically

pushed. Staging and imaging were very good indeed, however, with a deep, pin-point sound that's rarely found at this price. Miles Davis's 'Sketches Of Spain' called upon the Cameleon to show its sweetness with upper frequencies. Percussion had a nice sheen but violins again had a slight edge in climaxes that was found with Bibb's

voice. Again, there was good depth to the sound.

Here is a taste of a real enthusiast product. In many ways it's for die-hards or those wishing to get a first taste of the valve. This amplifier has excellent transparency and a surprisingly full sound for those who expect a lot of midrange and not much else from valve amps. However, the upper midrange can be a tad hard at times, which ultimately mars the natural timbre of voices and instruments somewhat.

What you can't take away from

this amp is its ability to perform with most of the traits of high-end valve amps, but at a lower price point and for that Croft can be congratulated. It would make a good starter valve amp for many that want to take the tube but balk at the fares!

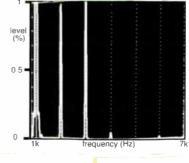
MEASURED PERFORMANCE

This is a low output valve amplifier best matched with sensitive 80hm loudspeakers. It produces just 3W for a 3% distortion threshold, but will manage 10W before severe clipping sets in, albeit at greatly increased levels of third harmonic distortion. Used in this region the sound will be sharpened up, as it were. Some people like this sort of incisiveness brightness, so how the amp will be perceived subjectively can be down to taste and expectation.

Power apart, the Croft measured tolerably well, with a useful input sensitivity of 380mV, channel separation of 82dB and frequency response stretching from 10Hz-53kHz. There was some 100Hz hum though and distortion at low levels never fell below 1%, where with many valve amplifiers it effectively falls to near zero. Second and third harmonics dominated; this is not a second-harmonic only amplifier.

The Croft was a little idiosyncratic, I could say. It does not measure very well, as valve amps go, but it may offer a sound not met elsewhere that some listeners will appreciate. NK

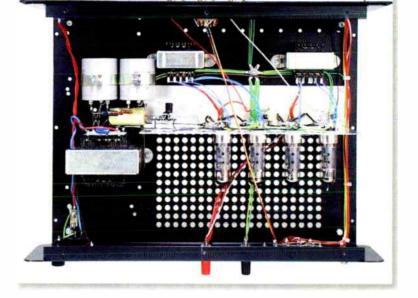

Simon Popes gets connected with cables priced under £50.

CHORD COMPANY CALYPSO £30/metre

This is the entry level interconnect from the highly regarded Salisbury-based specialist. The Calypso is specifically designed to work with entry level equipment and is available in 1, 2 and 5 metre lengths. It's suitable for both hi-fi and AV systems.The Chord Company make all their products inhouse and even at the budget



end of the market, the Calypso is no exception. It uses a coaxial construction, the conductor comprising seventeen strands of oxygen free copper. Use is made of a lapped shield, as opposed to a braided design, to ensure the cable is flexible, and to ensure coverage remains consistent under flexure.

Insulation comes in the form of a gas-foamed polyethylene used for low dielectric constant. The outer protective PVC comes finished in a workmanlike grey colour - actually described as sliver by the manufacturer!

This is a fine cable for the money, with a smooth and almost over lyrical stamp as opposed to the bright and fast sound of other budget cables. Unaccompanied choral music had a nice flow to the sound with the voices well blended and never rough

of tone. Whilst not up there with £50-plus cables, the Calypso has a fair amount of detail and depth. The acoustic folk/rock of Turin Brakes's 'Underdog' had a lively and musical sound with the vocal lines strong and full and acoustic guitars warm rather than over-rhythmic.

When all is considered, although this is a very good buy, I found there was a certain lack of focus with choral music and maybe a slight slowing of tempi with percussive detail. All the same, the Calypso offers a giant leap up from your basic 'patch cables' supplied with budget components. This makes the Calypso an affordable and effective upgrade and at this price it is at the top of the tree.

VAN DEN HUL THE BAY £38/0.8 metre

Again, like the Calypso, The Bay is the entry level interconnect from the carbon technology cable pioneers. Also like the Chord Company, van den Hul pride themselves on the fact that they research and design every cable in-house. The Bay replaces the Storm Gold as the entry level interconnect in the range and is priced 20% cheaper than its predecessor. It features their unique proprietary carbon technology, championed by van den Hul in their Linear Structured Carbon (LSC) hybrid configuration. Like the Calypso it is a coaxial construction consisting of forty 0.12mm strands with a dense silver coating of LSC carbon insulated with polyethylene. It has a double screen of stranded braid over a LSC saturated layer to protect against RF noise. The cable comes with a tenyear guarantee - not bad for a £38 product!

Sound wise, it's a top hole product. There's slightly more at the top end here than with the Calypso which makes for slightly more high frequency detail.

Choir voices had realistic presence, with precise consonants along with good body. The church acoustic was also well brought out in the recording, creating a rounded and full sound.With Turin Brake's 'Underdog' the acoustic guitars again had good body and rhythms were precise and fast. The lead voice was well catered for and presented forward in the

mix with the accompanying instruments doing exactly that and not intruding into the vocal line.

The Bay is a very good cable and a steal at the price. It follows the company's tradition of well-built cable with a very well balanced sound that will fit in well with most budget/midpriced systems. 📕 📤

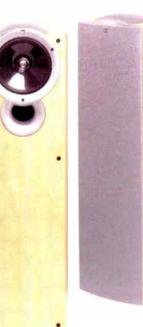

TO INFINITY.

The new Infinity range of 'speakers feature some cutting edge design, no more so than the sci-fi styled flagship Kappa 600 floorstander. Mani Sandher prepares for blast-off!

nfinity Systems is one of the brands that make up the new Harman Consumer International group. Since its inception in 1968, historical steps for Infinity include the first system with a separate subwoofer, the 'Servo Static 1', and the use of a polypropylene cone, back in 1978. Nowadays, European operations are located in the heart of the Loire Valley in France, though production of certain models, such as the Kappa 600s that we take a look at here, is undertaken in Denmark.

The 600s are very solidly built, matching the solidity of my more expensive B&W N803s. They stand reasonably tall, a tad below one metre, and are slim and deep, at 220mm and 425mm respectively. That depth is necessary to accommodate the sideward firing 250mm bass driver. Our review sample came in a light maple finish with a small grey plastic front baffle and grey grills. Overall, they look more futuristic than classical and wouldn't look out of place in a modern 'designer' room. Two-way binding posts sit at the back of the cabinets, allowing for bi-wiring or bi-amping.

The 600s are a three-way design, with all drivers incorporating 'Ceramic Metal Matrix Diaphragm' (CMMD) technology. This, claims Infinity, helps to control unwanted inband resonant modes within the cone, therefore reducing colouration. With a quoted sensitivity of 90dB/ 2.83V/1m, the 600s should be easily driven by most amplifiers, though their nominal impedance of 6 ohms might be problematic for some very low powered amplifiers.

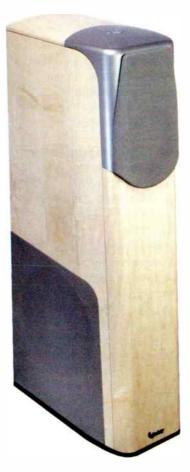
I connected the 600s to my current reference system: Marantz SA-I, Pass Labs XI/Aleph4, Purenote Epsilon interconnects and speaker cables, Cardas Golden Cross power cords and Townshend seismic sinks. Placement of the 600s is particularly important, due to their sideward firing bass drivers. These I had firing inwards, towards the centre position with the speakers slightly toed in. The 600s are rear ported and, to me, sounded best over 1.5m from the rear wall and over 1m from the side walls. Bearing in mind their depth, this particular placement may not be practical in many rooms. To ensure proper 'warm-up', the 600s were left playing for a good few days before any serious evaluation.

These 'speakers could not have been more sonically different from the JMLab 906s I reviewed last month. The immediate impression the 600s give is one of good lowend extension. I doubt that the subwoofer brigade would be disappointed. Prince's 'Diamonds & Pearls' CD is full of heavy bass lines and thumping kick drums. The 600s had no problems in getting my window panes to dance in sympathy to this music.

The new Telarc SACD release of Tchaikovsky's '1812 Overture' is a full DSD recording and, for me, redefines the meaning of low-end extension. Through the 600s, the artificially added canons sounded immensely powerful and ominous.

The same was true playing James Horner's 'Titanic' sound track on SACD. Track one starts peacefully enough, until the deep, deep bass notes come into play. All of this sounded great through the 600s!

The 600s are tonally well balanced across the audio band too, though this will be heavily affected by their positioning. 'No Chaser' by the Bill Holman Band (JVC XRCD2) can sound too forward through many speaker systems. Through the 600s, however, the top end was nice and



sweet, if a little reticent. Mid-range purity was generally good, with no boxiness from the cabinets discernible. I did feel that the midrange sounded slightly edgy though. The saxophones and trumpets on 'No Chaser' had an edge to them that I'm not accustomed to, though this was a very minor distraction.

Vocals on both the Prince CD and Talk Talk's 'Colour of Spring' CD were more revealing, sounding slightly hollow and thin. The Baritone on track four of Carmina Burana (Telarc pure DSD SACD) seemed to have lost his lower octave and, worst of all, Celine Dion's voice on 'Titanic' sounded even more grating than usual.

Unfortunately, the low-end transient and dynamic response of the 600s does not match their lowend extension capabilities. This has implications on overall sound integration and on musicality. The kick drums on the opening track of 'Colour of Spring', though well

extended, sounded smeared and slow. They lacked the bite that I know they have. The exact same effect was apparent playing Prince's 'Willing and Able' track. Here, the kick drums are important to drive the rhythm of the music. The 600s didn't manage to do this music justice. On 'No Chaser', the double bass didn't lead the rhythm of the music, seeming instead to lag behind the horns. This was true for virtually every CD/SACD I tried. I wanted to be sure that this low-end smearing and timing issue was not due to a lack of power from my beloved single-ended, class A power amp, which will only manage 100W output unconditionally into any load. I had at hand a pair of push-pull monoblocks capable of delivering 900W/ch. into 6 ohms! The situation with these in place was little different

In conclusion, the 600s have great low-end extension and a laid back sound that is generally sweet and non-fatiguing. However, the former trait is a double-edged sword. 'Real' music, requires good timing, rhythm and pace, which the 600s simply do not deliver low-down. I would imagine the 600s to be perfect for a high-end AV setup, where impressive sound effects are a must.

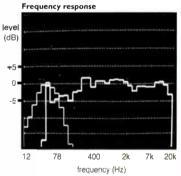
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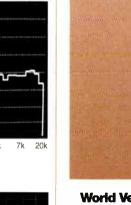
The Kappa 600 looks smooth enough in its frequency response, but the measuring mic. was placed quite low - on axis with the midrange unit - for this result. It means the Kappa 600 works best when listened to from a low-ish seating position. Above axis the drivers move out of phase fairly rapidly, causing a crossover suckout to appear. The 'speaker will sound softer as a result, listened to from above. Whilst this is not uncommon, the Kappa 600 was a little less well integrated than many modern designs.

The side firing bass unit works over the range where our forward response shows falling energy (below 200Hz) and should fill in well enough in a normal living room. The port peaks at 40Hz and extends down to very low frequencies so this loudspeaker will not lack bass. In all, the Kappa 600 looks smooth enough in response terms. It will sound detailed yet well balanced on-axis and the floor mounted bass units should deliver strong lows.

As a load though the Kappa is a level (dB) bit wild by today's standards. Large rates of change of impedance right across the band indicate strong reactance and absolute level ranges from 30ohms or so down to 4ohms. The Kappa 600 will challenge any amplifier, delivering energy back to it, likely affecting feedback behaviour. In its favour It Is reasonably sensitive, delivering a healthy 87.5dB from one nominal watt of input.

A 'speaker like this is best auditioned with the amplifier it is to be used with. Reactive loudspeaker highlight amplifier differences. In itself the Kappa will likely sound fast, clean and dynamic, with firm bass but it must be matched with care. **NK**

It was here the audio bug took its initial bite and the young Qvortrup's first student grant (in true student style) was blown on a valve based hi-fi system.

After a stint as a professional marine broker and an amateur audiophile (during which time he discovered he most definitely preferred valves to transistors) he packed in his job in 1977 and started importing classic British hi-fi into Denmark. After setting up a dedicated dealership in his homeland, he sold up and moved to the UK with a view to carrying on his work with classic valve-based hi-fi.

Audio Note UK was started in 1989 as a vehicle for closer collaboration with the Audio Note company in Japan, headed by the legendary Mr. Kondo. In 1990, under agreement, Audio Note UK started designing and producing products that shared the same name as those made in Japan. Eventually the two companies each went their separate ways.

Audio Note UK now still produces those high-end same-named products such as the 300B Kegon power amps and the aforementioned Ongaku, as well as a wide range of other valve amplifiers, digital sources, filterless DACs, turntables and cartridges.

What perhaps marks Audio Note out from other companies is its total dedication to the art of music reproduction, where the performance is always the main factor, pure and simple.

The Zero system we have to giveaway consists of the CDT Zero CD transport, a DAC Zero convertor, the M Zero Remote preamplifier, a pair of P Zero power amp monoblocks, plus a pair of AZ Two loudspeakers. This system delivers true and faithful reproduction of a recording something rarely found at this level. There is a wonderful sense of transparency and detail, and the overall impression is one of being there with the performers. Audio Note gear simply makes music. David Price tries out the mightily powerful HGS-12 subwoofer from Velodyne. Is this the best way to reproduce an earthquake?

ubwoofers have been around for many years now. As far back as the mid seventies, JR Loudspeakers made one to partner its LS3/5A-based JR 149s, and there was Celestion's superb dipole design for the SL600 at the tail end of the eighties. By the mid nineties however, they'd filtered down from the specialist speaker accessory market to the everyday hi-fi buyer. Tragically, a rash of dire sounding cheapo boom boxes ensued, and the breed rather fell from fashion again.

The problem is that if you don't want bass that's half a second behind the rest of the audio spectrum, you have to pay for a decently designed and built product. Companies such as REL and Velodyne fit into this category - their products are pricey, but work well. The latter is a Californian company, based in San Hose, which has been making subwoofers for decades. In 1983 it patented High Gain Servo technology, an active signal sensing and control system which sees its modern expression in its Dynamic Driver Control System. This is claimed to ensure linear cone movement via active monitoring of the drive unit's excursions, while also preventing both driver and amplifier from being overdriven.

The HGS-12 is the second model up the company's audiophile range, so called due to its use of the aforementioned servo technology, and a twelve inch forward firing drive unit. Inside it packs a muscular 1250W RMS (3000W peak) Class D amplifier. It has a built-in low pass crossover with 12dB/ octave initial, and 48dB/ octave ultimate roll-off, plus a subsonic filter working at 20Hz or 35Hz. There's an anti-clipping circuit to prevent the HGS-12 being overdriven, and auto power on and off switching.

The aforementioned 300mm magnetically shielded woofer has 5cm of excursion, and uses the company's proprietary multi-layer laminate cone with an oversized progressive spider, 75mm Dual Tandem push-pull voice coil, variable thickness EPDM surround and die-cast basket. It's a hefty affair, as you'd expect, its magnet structure weighing in at 8.8kg! The 368x355x355mm enclosure is no less 'industrial' - it's a sealed, infinite baffle design (as opposed to the ported types you find on lesser products) with a strong, durable black finish giving a total mass of 27kg. Round the back, there are controls for the low pass crossover, which ranges from 40-120Hz, along with a phase control (0 or 180 degrees), gain control, RCA line inputs and outputs, and a subwoofer direct for surround sound duties. Gadget fans will doubtless appreciate the option of a remote control.

As I've said, your average cheapo sub is a consummate waste of money - you can never get these things working right. But even serious designs such as this Velodyne are

fussier than you'd think. Although the textbooks tell us that low frequencies aren't directional, I still find it's well worth taking some time to position a sub carefully in the room. There's no strict rule here, as every listening environment is different, but suffice to stay that they should not be stuck right in the corner, where they'll boom whatever you do.

Suitably set up, the Velodyne sounded superb. Consummately deep and powerful with incredibly fast attack, it's undoubtedly a breed apart from your average budget boombox. The trick is to back off on the gain so much that you can barely detect the sub at all - at this point you don't think you're listening to it, until you switch it off and your system suddenly sounds bass-light. The HGS-12 brilliantly compensated for the relative lack of low end welly of my valve power amp, making my speakers seem less leaden right the way through the bass range. Things tightened up considerably, my amp losing its slightly breathless quality at high levels, because bass was filtered out, to be handled by the Velodyne alone. Even when extended, the Velodyne showed no signs of distress whatever type of music was playing.

At £2,125 this an extraordinarily expensive way to boost bass, but the qualitative improvements it brings are quite something. It would be pointless to recommend it for any system costing less than around £10,000 but if you're fortunate enough to possess such as set-up, you'll find it surprisingly effective at raising its game.Valve users will be particularly impressed by the rewards it brings while there's no disputing the superior, more liquid midband and treble you get from tubes, gut-churning tracts of low bass aren't exactly a forte of this particular type of amplifier design. A good sub - and this is more than that - really gives you the best of both worlds. All you'd then have to do would be to add a pair of Tannoy Super Tweeters for a fearsome full range system - that would really be saying something! 📕 📥

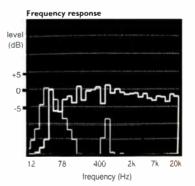
The HGS-12 sits either in an amplifier's tape loop or between preamp and power amp. It's useful for valve amps because it actually removes low bass (below 80Hz) from the main amplifying channel. The unit sums both channels to a single drive unit and it can be adjusted to work from 40Hz-120Hz, down to a lower limit of either 20Hz or 35Hz, according to the handbook.

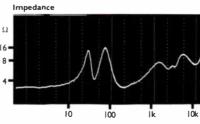
A subsonic sweep test signal from 4Hz to 125Hz showed the unit reaches down to 16Hz (-6dB) and is flat otherwise to 20Hz, as claimed. It reaches up to a maximum of 125Hz measurement confirmed. Our thirdoctave analysis clearly shows this. The lower limit has been imposed doubtless to restrict cone excursion Otherwise, sub-sonic signals from CD will throw the cone against its mechanical end-stops, since the power amplifier used has plenty enough grunt to do this.

Having an input amplifier the subwoofer does not have a varying impedance curve of course, so there is no impedance analysis here.

Velodyne use motional feedback from an 22 accelerometer to control cone 164 motion and reduce distortion. 8 Technically, this is quite a 44 package and measurement shows it performs well. NK

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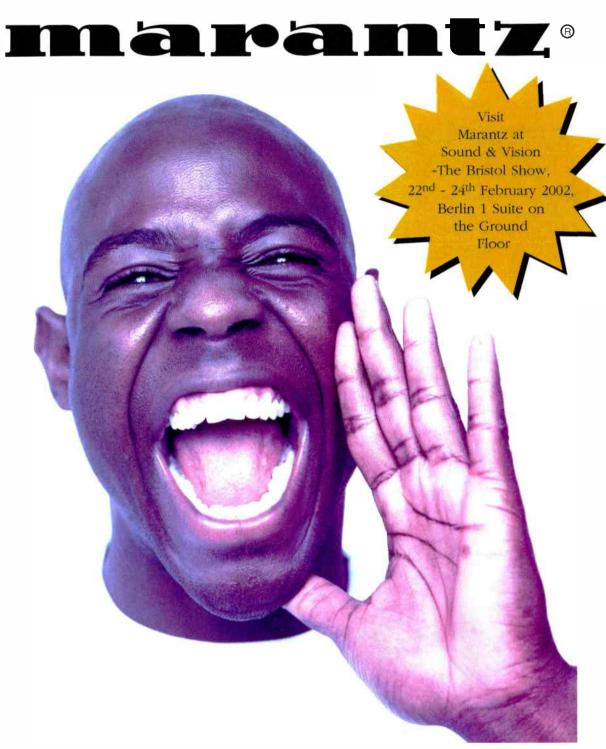

Musical Fidelity's A1 integrated amplifier was a 24 carat classic. David Price takes up the story.

usical Fidelity's A1 is one of those products that just wouldn't be made these days - it's too charismatic. A bizarre combination of incredible 'eighties modernist' styling and distinctly retro full Class A circuit design, it makes today's mass market middleweights seem terminally dull by comparison.

The company's first product, The Preamp, created quite a storm within weeks of its 1982 launch. Reputedly designed on company founder Anthony Michaelson's kitchen table, it created its own merry band of fans who soon came back for more when The Synthesis integrated was launched soon after. Michaelson duly moved out of the kitchen and into a proper factory, whereupon the A1 integrated was born.

Selling for just under £250 in 1985, it was pitched just slightly above Naim's original NAIT and Mission's Cyrus 2 - which were both formidable opponents. It had several aces up its sleeve however.

First it looked incredible - a delicious combination of semi circles and hard, eighties-style straight lines, there was something very 'Bauhaus' about its aesthetics. The (then) stylish black casework allied to rather risque powder blue silk screened fascia legends made it all the more striking.

Next was its build. That casework was a joy to behold - the perfect combination of form and function, the heavy grooving on the cast aluminium top plate was the unit's only form of heat sinking. Reaching temperatures of between 55-60 degrees Celsius, some said it could have done with a little more help. Inside, a 160VA toroidal transformer puffed and wheezed through four 10,000uF reservoir caps. An ALPS volume pot hooked up to a line amplifier with unusually high 200mV sensitivity.

Being a little challenged in the output department meant that Musical Fidelity had to sell it to those with particularly sensitive loudspeakers, with relatively benign load characteristics. The problem was that this was 1985, when such speakers were about as fashionable as a mid-seventies supergroup. By this time, most audiophiles aspired to big, butch (heavily Class B biased) transistor amps, and tiny power sapping mini-monitors (Acoustic Energy AE-1s, anyone?) The A1 was not of that ilk, and found itself being marginalised by many reviewers as 'bonkers', 'tweaky' or - to put it mildly - a 'niche product'.

Many potential customers soon found themselves being put off the A1 by a tirade of knocking copy in certain magazines, and a rapidly deteriorating reputation for reliability. In truth, the amp was designed to run flat out with almost no leeway for cooling problems. If it didn't get the careful placement it demanded (with at least 50mm behind it and 250mm above it), things were liable to go bang. It wasn't this simple though, as dealers reported that some batches were far worse than others - with a terrible rate of attrition. The fact that switching the A1 on before you'd connected it to a pair of loudspeakers could cause the output stage to throw in the towel didn't help, either.

Properly placed and matched to sympathetic loudspeaker loads, a good specimen of an A1 sounds superb. Basically it's very soft and warm, but with oodles of musicality and tactility. It had tonal colour in spades, too - the A1 told you better than all its rivals whether recordings were done on Denon PCM recorders or ye olde Ampex reel-to-reel tape. The fun factor was there in abundance, and you got the sense that you were listening to music rather than hi-fi. Where it failed, it covered its tracks beautifully although treble was veiled, it was also deliciously sweet, while the bass was hopelessly loose but pleasantly sumptuous too!

For such an unreliable, hard to match, difficult to get the best from, integrated amp (usually such perils are reserved for high end products, after all!) it sold incredibly well. Musical Fidelity say they shifted nearly 200,000 units before it got the chop in the early nineties. To put it another way, if you put all of them end-to-end, the line would stretch for fifty miles!

These days, Darwinian natural selection has taken its course, and the ones still surviving are likely to be as reliable as any other amp of its age. (Of course, a new set of power supply caps wouldn't go amiss). A good one will set you back under £200, which is a bargain for such a rare and charismatic beast - as always, go for boxed, 'one careful owner' specimens.

FOREVER CHANGERS



Philips has been doing its homework about where the CD market is going, and the result you see before you. David Price researches the new CD-R802 CD changer/recorder.

ACDR' is what the industry calls things like this. It stands for Audio CD Recorder, and if you believe what pony-tailed, big suited market research types are telling you, then this is, ermm, the future of CD. How so?

Well, standalone CD separates sales are now in freefall. Right now, the poor old bog standard silver disc player has reached bargain-basement, lowest common denominator status. With the various new DVD-based formats finally reaching the mass market, CD is no longer considered sexy (shock horror!) and simply can't command a premium price anymore. To wit, we have ever-cheaper midprice software releases and CD players in twenty five quid portables. LP has trotted up market (where some say it always belonged) and ye olde Compact Diske is now the generic bog standard, dirt-cheap music medium.

Fair enough, say I - nothing wrong with that! And this has become allthe-more salient with the advent of recordable CD (CD-R). Thanks to the vast economies of scale derived from the computer industry, the price has fallen dramatically in the space of just a few years. Lest we forget, Meridian's long lost CD-R cost over £3,000 in the late eighties, Pioneer's first midnineties machine cost £1,200 and then came Philips seminal CD-R870 in 1998, which set the cat amongst the pigeons by selling for a whisker under £400. Prices have gone into freefall, to the extent that what you see before you here offers much more for just £300.

Indeed, Philips' own market intelligence suggests this is the place to be if you want to flog any CDbased product these days. In the US, 'ACDR' products outsold all audio products including turntables, cassettes, MiniDisc players and CD players. "According to two-year industry sales figures from several CE manufacturers, more than 2.7 million Audio CD-Recorders have been sold world-wide, making the Audio CD-Recorder the fastest-growing audio product in the history of the consumer electronics industry," quoth Andy Mintz, senior Philips suit, North America. Fair enough, then.

So, is the CD-R802 simply an exercise in printing money from the low lands, or does it have some abiding virtue that might make us

poor, left-out-in-the-cold audiophiles want to buy it? Well, I'll let you into a secret - it's no Linn CD12.Yet how would it work as an audio recorder/ general purpose party music machine - a sort of twenty first century double cassette deck?

Eagle-eyed readers will have noticed that it's a digital double decker with a difference - the difference being it has both a 3-CD autochanger and a single CD recorder. As per NAD's C660 it uses a computer CD-R drive to give double speed recording - meaning you can copy your average disc in a little over half an hour. It's also MP3 CD compatible, with the full Fraunhofer Monty of bitrates up to 320kbps, as well as Variable Bit Rate. If you do your sums, then you can continuously play 4 MP3 CDs, each with 12 hours of music (at reasonable 128kbps quality), giving two whole days worth of music, roughly equivalent to half the entire Chicago back catalogue.

The clever stuff doesn't end there - full CD text (read and write) is provided, and a sampling rate converter takes care of digital signals from 12-96kHz (but is bypassed at



44.1 kHz, allowing bit-for-bit copying unlike Philips earlier ACDRs - this in turn means even HDCDs can be copied all their glory). There's also a rather handy Automatic Digital Record Level Control, which automatically equalises all CDs up to the same level. This is a boon because even today, not all discs are mastered up to 0dB.As usual there's manual record level adjustment too, but it doesn't just work on the analogue input - you can change the gain on external digital sources too.

The list of features is endless there's strength in depth here, too. You're recording digitally from one of your MD or DAT tapes, and the CD-R802 comes across the dreaded SCMS copy prohibition, so what does it do? Where lesser decks would go into pause mode and halt your recording, this one simply carries on recording via its analogue ins instead (until it subsequently finds a non-copy protected digital source again). Clever!

There's also all the usual play, repeat and monitor modes, and recording is made easy with Synchro Start and simple one-touch 'Copy CD' and 'Compile CD' buttons.

A great package then, but at this price you're hardly going to get a beautifully built bit of kit. The finish is good enough, and at 6kg for its

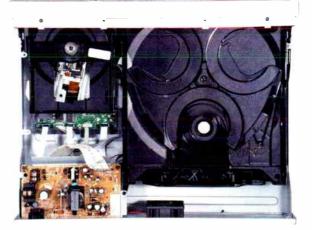

Philips CD players and recorders generally measure well and this one was no exception, but for one peculiarity. In record pause its monitor circuits roll off treble strongly, so the signal you hear will sound dull. It is unrepresentative of recording quality, which measurement showed was fine; frequency response reached 20kHz flat. In record pause it reached just 3kHz! Even though this problem does not directly affect sound quality I can't help feeling it should not be there.

Otherwise, the CDR-802 worked fine as a playback machine or a recorder. Our playback response analysis clearly shows a slight roll down in high frequency output, which should give it a smooth sound. Distortion was very low, the 0.015% figure at normal music level of -30dB being as good as it gets. Noise on 435x122x347mm dimensions, it's less flimsy than the likes of LG's ADR-620 tested in February, but it's still nothing special. Philips say that it's hiding its light under a bushel though, thanks to the quality Analog Devices AD1877 and AD1854 digital converters lurking inside - as used in the audiophile CD-R950.

Despite this, the CD-R802 is nothing special when playing back CDs. It's hardly seat of the pants stuff - bland and uninvolving and rather inoffensive. Still, it's smooth and listenable in a quintessentially 'modern Bitstream' way. The frequency extremes are noticeably curtailed, but the midband still fails to grate. I ran through a host of reissues from Blondie's 'Parallel Lines' to Dexys Midnight Runners 'Searching for the Young Soul Rebels' and at no time did the Philips show any undue signs of stress - or emotion for that matter. In a phrase - it's light, bright and fluffy.

Of course, this was never going to be the machine's forte anyway. The point of this deck is the copying (for your own personal purposes only, M'lud) - and this it does reasonably well. Given a decent audio CD-R or CD-RW, you get a clean, open, smooth sound with just a touch of looseness in the bass, hardening of the midband and smudging of the treble. The low frequencies lose some



of their energy and articulation -REM's 'Driver 8' lacked the driving force behind the bass guitar. In the midband, all is even and tidy, with a slight flattening of stereo perspective, as Blondie's 'Heart of Glass' showed. Treble lost a little of its sheen, and the track's glorious ride cymbal work sounded a touch too splashy for my liking.

Overall then, this recorder has a decent performance, plus a welter of facilities; a lot of thought gone into its conception. It's a fine package - but if it's brilliant bit-for-bit disc copying you want, then best buy the NAD instead.

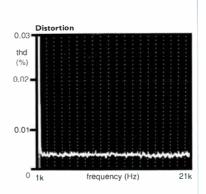

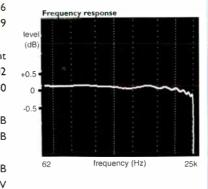

but the time is right to update or upgrade it. It comprises an Arcam 170 CD transport plus original Black Box, Naim NAC72 /140 amps and Rega ELA speakers. Room size is 22x14 and my music preferences are classical, jazz and female vocal. My budget is £1,500 at the present time, with additional funds available later. Whilst the Naim is very good I find it dry and uninvolving for my taste these days and the ELAs are somewhat compressed. My father in law is also on the upgrade trail with a pair of Epos M15 on order and as a consequence I will be the recipient of a nice pair of Spendor SP2/2s. Should 1 upgrade the front-end first with a new DAC, or alternatively with a one-box player, upgrading the amplifier later whilst keeping the Spendors? Your guidance would be very much appreciated. regards

Interesting one, this. You've got an impressively well balanced system, with no gaping weak links - credit to you! If anything, I'd say your Rega speakers are holding things back, but the imminent arrival of the Spendors should solve this. They're great speakers, in their way, and to be frank I'm not sure if your father-in-law is making the right move, so best not show him a copy of this mag! You'll find they're a little warm and soft certainly less 'impressive' sounding than the Eposes - with a very smooth midband that should excel at precisely the sort of music you like, especially jazz and female vocals. Best get them onto good, strong stands as soon as you can.

What then of the rest of your system? The Naims are undoubtedly fine amps, and you might find you get on with them better using your new speakers - the ELAs are also pretty dry and the two together won't exactly let the tonal flavours flood out.

It's tricky to recommend replacements. If you want more

involvement, then upgrading to a better power amp (i.e. NAP250) would certainly do the trick. If you want more grip, then one of Naim's power supply options - or even a new preamp from higher up the range - would help.

For a different sound, try tubes. An easy, one-step solution could be Unison Research's $\pm 1,600$ S.6. This liquid, velvety sounding parallel single ended integrated would give you a more beguiling, if less powerful, listen.

Another obvious candidate would be a second-hand Michell Argo/Alecto Stereo. This solid state, pure Class A transistor combination would give you much of your Naim

combo's power and most of the S.6's tonal colour. As for your source, do you hang on to what is a very respectable

I 6bit set up, upgrade it to one of the leading £1,000 machines, or wait until DVD-Audio truly comes on stream later this year? Arcam's new FMJ CD23T would bring greater detail and grip to your traditional silver discs, whilst retaining your old two





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box set-up's beguiling musicality. Meridian's 506.24 would add extra bass weight and depth to the equation, sacrificing just a smidgen of the CD23T's bouncy rhythms. If it were me, I'd go for the Cyrus 7/PSX-R, which isn't quite as warm but offers more punch and attack. Judging by your musical tastes, you'd find that this would partner valve or Class A transistor amplification better, whereas the aforementioned Arcam or Meridian would work better with your Naims. **DP** chain. To wit, a DC motor mod will transform your LP12 more than any tonearm - and after hearing the Michell DC upgrade I'm in no doubt about that! So go for this first, and then get a basic RB250 with the counterweight mod. Frankly your E70s aren't the most transparent, and any extra spent on fancy tonearm wiring with be missed on them. Indeed, it's only when you're using modern, £1000-plus loudspeakers that you'll fully hear the difference from this, methinks.

It could be time to take the tube with the S6...

II > THE VINYL FRONTIER

Please could you give me some advice on the best way to upgrade my turntable? My system comprises a Linn LP12, Lingo, Akito tone arm and Dynavector 20x MC cartridge, Music Fidelity F25 pre-amp and F16 power amp, and Wharfedale E70s (bought in 1977) that I have modified by hard wiring with I mm solid core cable. I have been thinking of changing the tonearm of the LP12 as I have read that the Akito is not the best tone arm in the world, but buying an Ekos is a bit out of my price range.

Recently I have been reading about the Origin Live RB250 of which there are several versions, the most expensive being the RB250 Silver at £600.00 and the rewired version costing about £300.00. They also supply a DC motor kit which apparently can make a substantial improvement to the sound quality. Should I go for the DC motor upgrade and the £300.00 RB250 or should I just get the RB250 silver and possibly get the DC motor upgrade at a later date when funds allow. Is the £300.00 difference between these two RB250's worth the outlay? **Denis Keating**

As Linn's Ivor Tiefenbrun always said, you should always get your source right from the very first link in the

Still, the basic OL RB250 will trounce the Akito, which itself is not a bad arm on an LP12. The OL Silver 250 is a great arm that would make an ideal pick-up in a cost-no-object system, but frankly yours isn't - yet! It's noticeably better than a basic modded OL RB250, but not dramatically so - most of the improvements come in texturality, atmosphere and fine detail, all of which are lost on your E70s, which as you know are hardly the subtlest of loudspeakers! This done, I'd upgrade your DV20 to an Ortofon Kontrapunkt B when funds permit. DP

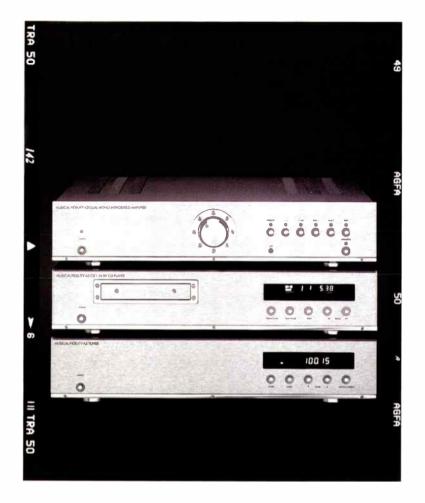
II>BREAKING THE MOULD

I've recently dug out some old CDs and noticed what appears to be a mould or crystalline deposit growing on the label side! The CDs most affected are first generation and usually have clear labels. There's a little mould on the playing surfaces of a couple of CDs, but not nearly as much as on the labels. I set to with a little filtered water and a microfibre cloth and everything wiped off quite well. A few of the worst affected still felt a little 'sticky' on the label side and the 'mould' seemed to smear. I also noticed that they seemed to have more pinholes than I remembered - although that could just be pure paranoia! I was wondering if this could be the result of my move from the cold and damp UK to hot and humid Sydney ten years ago or if I'm suffering the first stages of the CD self-destruction that was suggested by the head of Nimbus Records many years ago.

So - in addition to CD's much mentioned 'rusting' problems, along with its penchant for perforations, it looks like there's a serious 'mould' issue now arising for those living in hot climes, lust think - with the number silver discs now in existence, not least all those early pressings with silver label surfaces, and their burgeoning popularity in places with good weather - the world could be sitting on a ticking time bomb of slime. One day, every audiophile in a sub-equatorial region could wake up covered in green fungus, as the little microbe critters crawl off their discs, out of the iewelcases, across the floor and onto the duvet. I'd recommend that you implement the British government's long forgotten plan for saving your life in the event of a Cold War nuclear attack - 'protect and survive'. Paint your CDs white, put a brown paper bag on your head and hide under the table until the fateful day comes.

Seriously Jeff, I would not worry about this. Early CDs had problems but I doubt very much if your whole collection will rot away. Modern discs are quite stable, because accelerated life testing is now used to assess this. **DP**

Hi Greg. At £200 for a pair of 'speakers the world is literally your oyster and to be fair the money will get you some better current options than the Mordaunt Shorts. You can first look to Mission's m73s, which have all the traits of a fine budget 'speaker such as bass depth, imaging and speed. Sand loading them will bring even greater audiophile rewards, too. There's also Wharfedale's Diamond 8.3 or KEF's Cresta 3 - these both have a natural fluid nature and a slightly more 'closed in' but musical sound than found with the Missions. Whatever you plump for make sure you get a listen to all that's available and recommended as each contender has its different characteristics. SP

There are a couple of other new purchase choices that would fit the bill, such as the Cyrus 5, also at £500 and the Monrio Asty Remote at £550. The former has a good all-round quality and a fine grip on rhythm, whilst the latter has the lyricism of Italian hi-fi but with a bit more drive and clout than usual. SP

I'm presuming that you're referring to the now defunct Alpha Series when you talk of your aversion to Arcam's aesthetics, as the new DiVA range represents a stylish turn for the company - gone are the workmanlike grey boxes in favour of a range of sleek and smart units available in both black or silver. Fitting your particular bill would be the CD72, a recently re-vamped model which is in a class of its own in the £400 bracket. You'll have all the traits of the

Alpha 7SE sound, such as control and rhythmic attack, along with plenty of detail and insight. If you want something cheaper, the even newer CD62 is available for £100 or so less. It simply lacks the upgrades of the more expensive brother but performance is still fine.

If you don't fancy Arcam at all then there are a few options available. For something completely different and very 'upgradeable' you could have a listen to Sony's SCD-XB670 or 770 multichannel SACD players. These of course will play both two channel SACDs and CDs to a very high standard for the money and a trait of Sony's digital sound is plenty of detail in the upper frequencies. Some find them a bit hard on the ears, though. These are priced around £300 and £400 respectively and whilst not having the sheen, perhaps, of the Arcam styling they are nonetheless smart and modern in a high tech sort of way.

All these will give a better presentation from CD than your Marantz, which while good at the time is not on the pace now. **SP**

Until recently, there were few - if any - realistically priced soundcards that offer full 24/96 functionality. Help is at hand though thanks to the just released TerraTec EWS96M (www.terratec.net/ttuk). This is an 'affordable' card (price yet to be finalised at the time of writing) that majors on high quality audio processing. It has a 24/96 A-D onboard, offering a quoted 117dB S/N, and a 24/96 DAC with a guoted 120dB S/N. You also get full 24/96 digital ins and outs (also capable of 16/44, etc.) and full MIDI. Look out for a review of this next month. Suffice to say its EWS88T predecessor got a big thumbs up when CAW tested it a couple of years back.

As for software, I'd personally go for Syntrillium's Cool Edit 2000, which is a brilliant value package offering recording quality up to 32bit resolution, along with a very handy dither facility to bolster your plain old 16-bit recordings. The best value version is Cool Edit 2000 v1.1, available for \$69 via a download from the company's website (www.syntrillium.com) - there's even a freeware version to play with for 30 days if you wish. Good luck!

I AN THE

JPW's Sonata was one of the kings of the mini loudspeaker brigade back in the late eighties, so they have plenty of experience in the field. Dominic Todd encounters the new 210 baby bookshelf design from the relaunched company.



PW are no stranger to the art of giant-slaying mini 'speakers. During the late eighties their Sonata won countless awards and sold by the bucket load, no doubt going a fair way to explaining their Queen's Award for export in the early nineties. The JPW Mini Monitor carried on this tradition and can still be found in digs, halls of residence and first time homes up and down the country.

Things all seemed to go a little pear shaped in 1997, though, with the launch of their Millennium Series. It wasn't that the ML310 and ML510 were poor 'speakers, far from it in fact. They simply didn't sell as well as their forebears. Now JPW have returned to steal back some of their lost market. Not that they'll find it at all easy. At £150, the new 210s find themselves priced against some serious opposition. Wharfedale's Diamond 8.1 and Mission's M71 both undercut the newcomer by at least £20, and at the same price you could have Mordaunt Short's hi-tech 902.

Visually the 'speaker sends mixed messages. It's very compact, smaller than even the baby Missions, suggesting that bass might be limited. Yet the narrow, tapered front panel should be good for imaging. The soft dome tweeter and carbon weave woofer are pretty much de rigueur these days, but the snap on metal grill came as something of a nasty surprise and should really be left off.

Surprisingly, the 210s are not biwirable which is unusual when compared with the current competition. This shouldn't be a cause for concern as bi-wiring makes little difference at this level and bi-amping, which makes a considerable difference, would be unlikely at this price point.

On listening to the JPWs, their sound quality very much lived up to

what I'd expected. Claire Martin's 'Some Cats' was mostly an enjoyable listen. The timing was excellent, with detailed percussion and a spacious soundstage all helping to give the illusion of "invisible 'speakers". As expected, bass was rather lightweight. It had fine integrity with the lower mid-range, yet couldn't quite match that of the rival Mission and Wharfedale 'speakers. This also appeared to have a knock on effect in other aspects. Although the piano's timbre was generally good it could, on occasion, lack substance. Likewise, whilst Martin's vocals were well projected, they occasionally sounded slightly 'pinched'.

Steely Dan's 'Janie Runaway' proved surprisingly dynamic for one so small. Although it's a top-notch recording, the 210s did impress with their ability to keep a tight grip on the pace. Anyone used to ponderous floorstanders would be amazed as to

just how much slop appears to have been removed from the music. In short, the 210s have musical agility beyond their humble price. Furthermore, there was fine texture present from the vocals. It's a cliché to say, but one could quite easily follow the breaths of the singers throughout. The brass section was suitably vibrant, yet the solo sax again sounded a little thin. The projection into the room couldn't be faulted however.

Perhaps it was unfair of me to play Mission Control's 'The Last Trumpet'. This has a near sub sonic bass line that the 210s, unsurprisingly, merely hinted at. Again, slightly larger rivals are slightly more adept here. That having been said, the rest of the performance was thoroughly enjoyable. Trumpet and vocals were both well separated, and the piece had terrific drive and rhythm. Best of all was that this sense of bounce and enthusiasm was matched by a fine level of refinement. The treble response, in particular, managed to draw the fine line between detail and harshness immaculately.

Such traits were carried through to the portrayal of classical music to.

The March (Seventeen Come Sunday) from Vaughan Williams's English Folk Song Suite, provided another enjoyable listen. Although the piece did lack scale, it always sounded eager and involving. Once again, the balance between excitement and refinement was spot on. The timing proved fluid and the instrumental timbre engaging. The only real fly in the ointment here was a slight boxiness that set in during more complex passages, a trait I feel is inherent from such a small cabinet design.

The JPW 210s aren't going to suit everybody. Looked at rationally they can't quite compete with either the Mission M71 or Wharfedale Diamond 8.1s. They just lack a sense of scale with classical music and sheer bass response with pop. At £150 I also can't help but feel that they are also a touch on the expensive side. However, despite these reservations, the 210s really do have much to offer. They have an immediacy, and fleet of foot response that could be just the tonic for a rather tired and dull system. Soundstaging is also first class thanks to the cabinets being so narrow. With this also comes with an apparently seamless frequency response, fine timbral reproduction and excellent timing. These are all the type of qualities that get your toe tapping. Yet these qualities, perhaps surprisingly, don't come at the expense of refinement. The higher frequencies always remained smooth, and I didn't find myself wincing as volume levels were raised.

The 210s have to be one of the smallest full range 'speakers available. If you have to have to something minuscule, look here first. If not, then you'll probably prefer a few of the rivals, but take a listen anyway. Its range of qualities could just surprise you.

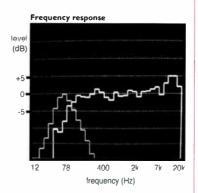
Small loudspeakers can measure surprisingly well. Good dispersion around a small cabinet and excellent integration between drivers, because small bass cones deliver high frequencies better than bigger cones, conspire to give a smooth frequency response if all else is engineered well. JPW's 201 is a good enough example of this, having an unusually smooth response curve. It isn't perfect, in this case treble lift meaning the speaker will sound a little bright. And the small bass unit rolls off fairly early too, output falling steadily below 100Hz. The port peaks at 63Hz and produces useful output at 40Hz so

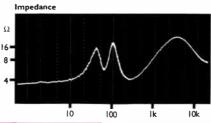
there should be some lower bass too, but small loudspeakers rarely have real bass weight.

Sensitivity measured 85.5dB, quite a reasonable value considering the JPW's small size. To achieve this it uses a 40hm bass unit, which draws current. Further up the audio band impedance rises smoothly, giving the 'speaker an overall value of 6 ohms. It is a reasonable load by today's standards.

World Radio History

The small 201 is a tidy piece of engineering. It will, however, have a light, bright sound that may be a little too much for some. **NK**

Dominic Todd listens to Marantz's latest midprice integrated amplifier, the stylish PM8200. Will it match their reputed CD players for quality?

his is one amp I'd been rather sceptical of. In the past I've always found budget Marantz amps to be, at best, rather average. Their KI range and valve specials are something else, but below £400 the range is somewhat lacklustre. The new PM8200 lies above this category, at £599 putting it up against the likes of Cyrus, Exposure and Audio Analogue.

The new PM8200 seeks to address this aformentioned lack lustre-ness with the promise that "power isn't everything". Even so, at 60W per channel the Marantz is hardly a lightweight, and the copper chassis, toroidal power supply transformer, high current capacitors, shielded binding posts and generally solid build quality make for a decent starting block. The star-framed blue LED has also been a signature of higher grade Marantz products in the past.Yet this is no minimalist design. The remote control, twin tape loops, pre outs and moving magnet phono stage are all well and good, but the loudness control rather undermines the "audiophile" pretensions.

I set the Marantz up using one of their own CD6000OSE CD players and a pair of Mission 773e speakers. The overall impression with Space's 'The Unluckiest Man in the World' was one of a rather bright and aggressive balance. The vocals were very well projected, yet otherwise the staging I found only average. 'Fran in Japan' from the same group suited the amp far better. There was good detail, even during more complex sections and a strong, powerful bass. In fact, the bass was almost too strident at times, and would require care with partnering speakers. Ponderous floorstanders could find themselves rather overwhelmed.

As with the previous track, although the performance wasn't too bad technically, I found it hard to really engage with the music. It was all rather mechanical, as though fluidity had been sacrificed to dynamic contrasts.

Dido's 'Thankyou' didn't really improve matters. There appeared to be an odd coloration in the upper bass response that led to a rather turgid and boxy bottom end. Vocals sounded a little nasal, and there was something forced about the whole performance. The piano timbre sounded rather strange too. There was a lack of solidity to the timbre that I've heard before from some Marantz CD players. Once again, the song didn't ebb and flow as it should, despite the strong bass response to drive the track along.

Vaughan Williams's In the Fen Country, with Sir Adrian Boult conducting the New Philharmonia Orchestra, proved an equally mixed bag. The orchestral soloists lacked a certain body to their individual performances. The Marantz gave them enough presence, but robbed them of subtle details such as reedy textures, breaths and bow strokes. In short, the instrumental timbre had been depersonalised and sounded somewhat synthetic.

On a brighter note, at least there was decent scale when the double bass entered the fray, and the separation was fine too. It was quite possible, as the old trick goes, to follow individual instruments. Yet, you might not actually be inclined to follow the instruments in the first place, as the sound just didn't really gel.

By now you've probably got a good idea of the Marantz's sonics. Sadly, Jamiroquai's 'Blow Your Mind' did little to alter my impression of the PM8200 as a curiously soulless amp'. Again, there appeared to be a lumpiness to the sound that simply didn't get my foot tapping, even with the funkiest of tunes. At least the brass section had a bit of pizzazz about it, but it simply served to show just how blandly portrayed the rest of the mix was. A quick try out of the phono stage with Bob Marley's 'Exodus' found the Marantz in slightly better shape, with good detail. Some of the inherent smoothness in the recording was overlooked in favour of projection, which was a shame as the bass was decent and, again, the brass had some life.





I have to say the PM8200 came as something of a disappointment, after a promising start. Build quality was excellent and, loudness control apart, there's a well-chosen and comprehensive selection of features. Yet the sound quality lets it down.

During the listening test I couldn't help but feel that I was listening to a car stereo. There was the sort of power and presence that

The sturdy Marantz 8200 amplifier felt like a real power house, but in fact delivers a useful but not massive 66W into a normal 80hm load. In practice most loudspeakers nowadays have 40hm bass units and into this sort of load it delivered a healthy 100W, showing the power supply has good regulation.

Distortion was minimal right across the audio band, at all power outputs, low or high. Our distortion analysis has just two small blips along the bottom axis, indicating the presence of a little second and third harmonic.

I was not surprised to measure an SACD/DVD-A ready bandwidth that reached up flat to 91kHz, before rolling down gently. At the other end of the audio spectrum this amplifier reaches down to the lower limit of CD, around 5Hz. With good sensitivity and channel separation the you'd expect to drown out all the road noise and impress pedestrians four streets away.

As a party animal, the Marantz performs. No one could argue with its bass clout or powerful dynamic range. Yet, when the party's over and the wick's turned down, it loses its appeal. Although vocals are well projected, the rest of the staging is only average. There's often some

unit measures tidily in all areas.

A phono stage has been included and it offers a conventional set of figures appropriate for Moving Magnet cartridges, namely 3.3mV input sensitivity with a healthy I 16mV overload ceiling. There was dead accurate RIAA equalisation, but with no IEC warp filter at 40Hz, so whilst the response goes low and bass from LP will be strong, warped records will cause cone flap. Hiss was satisfactorily low to be about inaudible.

The 8200 measured very well in all areas, as expected. It is a well screwed together sturdy design obviously intended to offer quality.

Power

CD/tuner/aux. Frequency response rather odd colorations going on that could effect both vocals and piano. Although brass often sparkled, other instruments suffered from a rather mechanical, "grey" presentation. Finally, and most disappointingly of all, is the timing, which simply fails to get the listener involved, whatever the music genre.

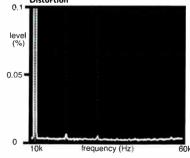
I could see how the PM8200 could fit the bill for some as it has plenty of clout and presence. If it was my money, however, I'd wait for a KI version which, if experience is anything to go by, would be a far more appealing proposition - for me at least,

ELAC isn't a familiar name to British audiophiles, but David Price thinks it should be, if its new 510 standmounting loudspeakers are anything to go by.

LAC Electroacoustic was born on September 1st, 1926. Initially specialising in the research and development of nautical equipment, it wasn't until 1948 that its first turntable was produced. This sold until 1980, with over 4.5 million units made! Elac patented the electromagnetic cartridge in 1957, and has come up with a good deal of clever technology since - some of which is used in these very loudspeakers.

Rather than being a box stuffer, ELAC designs and manufacturers all its own drive units in its Kiel factory in Germany. Currently employing 70 people in an 8,000 square metre manufacturing facility, it produces 100,000 loudspeakers a year. Thirty percent of these go abroad - mostly to Taiwan and China, and now hopefully - to Britain too. I say hopefully, because - at the risk of starting my review with the conclusion - I really rate these speakers. Being a jaded old cynic, many boxes pass through my clutches every year, but few impress like these did.

The build quality speaks for itself

- the cabinets are beautifully veneered, and at 9.9kg a piece, you'd think they were made of gold. Rap one with your knuckles, and you get a dull thud - no flimsy MDF affairs, these. At 385x200x307mm, they're good old fashioned 'bookshelf' designs - to wit, they found themselves perched atop a pair of Atacama SE20s, which they complimented perfectly. A two-way 24.6 litre bass reflex design, round the back you'll find a smallish bass port above a particularly chunky set of four gold plated binding posts (complete with bi-wire jumpers, if you need them).

More interesting though is the sight you see if you pull the front grilles off - there's a sea of space age silver, the like of which I haven't seen since the last episode of Dr Who and The Return of The Cybermen. The 'Jet Tweeter' looks bonkers enough, but ELAC claims real benefits from its novel construction. The membrane area of this tweeter is said to be approximately 10 times larger than that of a conventional 25mm dome tweeter. Along with the special lamella type foil membrane and

strong neodymium rod magnetic system, this is said to give very high efficiency and dynamic range. They're also said to offer excellent extension - to 35kHz no less, which should come in handy with all these new DVD Audio players! The 180mm mid/bass unit is another novel looking affair employing an aluminium sandwich membrane, running from a claimed 32Hz up to 2.8kHz. Thanks to the extended low bass and smallish cabinets, don't expect these babies to go louder than a pair of Tannoy Westminster Royals per Watt. At a published 85dB sensitivity and a nominal impedance of just 40hms, they don't make obvious partners for tube amps. However, I found my modified World Audio K5881 had little trouble with them, and sounded a lot cleaner than the big transistor integrated I kicked off the listening session with. In fact, their bright balance means you've got to use the best front-end and amp you can find they don't suffer fools gladly. Oh, and best keep the grilles on, for both sonic and aesthetic reasons!

Essentially, the ELACs sound as bright as their drivers look - they're

very upfront and open, but most emphatically not harsh. No, they only sound coarse if you feed them with something rather crass. Properly aspirated - especially using vinyl front ends they're like a sharp intake of crisp autumn air. Starting with John Lennon's '(Just Like) Starting Over', the 510s caught the recording's crisp balance brilliantly. They sounded amazingly

> vivid and dynamic - snare drums were unusually tight for a bass reflex design, while hi-hat cymbals were deliciously sweet and sonorous. You can really hear that extended high end - there's bags of ambience and a real sense of being there.

The midband integrates nicely with the treble - it too is quite 'out there' for all to hear. Certainly not recessed, these speakers image forward and really kick out dynamic accents. Madonna's 'Holiday' is an ideal torture track for any system her voice is naturally quite hard and cold, and the Sony PCM-F1 digital recorder used in the studio (not to mention those very early digital synths) doesn't make life any easier. The 510s were well able to stay smooth as Ms. Ciccone's voice ran up and down the scale, showing no integration problems and surprising



smoothness. By contrast, the fizzy electronic percussion (probably 8bit samples, but they sound like 4!) sounded suitably crunchy - the point being that these ELACs are incredibly transparent - if the music's hard then so are they, if not then they aren't either. Impressive.

Moving to Lee Morgan's 'The Rajah' - a sweet sixties BlueNote jazz recording - the 510s duly obliged with a deliciously subtle and detailed sound. Again, the cymbals had a fantastically airy, metallic clang, the brass a deep, satisfying rasp and double bass a decent degree of body. Ironically, because these ELACs are so adept at mid and upper frequencies, the lows are a bit of a disappointment - being merely 'good'. Tight, supple, bouncy and rhythmic, the bass units do their job perfectly well - and there's a refreshing lack of overhang from the cabinets and no obvious signs of the ports puffing either - it's just, well, they're nothing special. Imaging was superb instruments jump out of the mix with heady abandon, the whole recorded acoustic sounding amazingly spacious and uninhibited, with pinpoint precision within. I really rate

these speakers - they're

a genuinely mature and well rounded product, designed for people who appreciate strength in depth rather than just a quick fix of 'boom and tizz'. Fast, punchy, musical, rhythmically engaging, dynamic, transparent, detailed - they get all the essentials so right you almost wonder why it's worth buying anything bigger. The answer is, of course, bass extension. Suitably set up with a decent sub, I imagine these ELACs would be absolute dynamite.

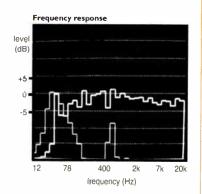
MEASURED PERFORMANCE

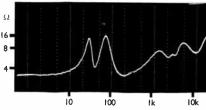
Elac loudspeakers always measure well and the 510 was no different. It's ribbon tweeter is superbly integrated, giving the loudspeaker an impressively smooth response with just a slight downward trend toward high frequencies. This will give the 510 a clean sound with good treble but should ensure there's no brightness or glassiness. The absence of a crossover suckout will ensure good delivery of detail. The wide dispersion of this tweeter means quite a lot of treble energy is put into a room.

Bass output rolls down slowly then peaks up at 40Hz. The port works just below this frequency, peaking at 35Hz. This peculiar characteristic suggests the 'speaker will sound bass light generally, but will deliver occasional deep lows.

Sensitivity measured a healthy (dB) 86dB, so the 510 will appear relatively loud for any volurne +5 setting. However, to help achieve 0 this it uses a low impedance bass -5 unit that gets down to 3.40hms - a very low figure. The 510 draws quite a lot of current and although it has a reasonably even impedance 1 characteristic it will benefit from being used with a beefy amplifier.

In every area the 510 has been very well engineered. In some areas it is exceptional. Used with a good amplifier of at least 60W it will likely give superb results. NK

RECALLING REGA

David Price tells the Rega story, and interviews its chief designer Terry Bateman.

ur story starts with a fourteen year old Roy Gandy not getting his way. His mother famously asked him whether he wanted a record player or a TV, and despite begging for the former, got the latter. This - for all we know could have started the hunger that got him into hi-fi. By his eighteenth year, young Roy had fashioned his first pair of loudspeakers, was listening to LPs and constantly going to concerts.

His first system a-proper was a 'make do and mend affair', based on a Colaro turntable (sourced from a rubbish dump and heavily modded). This soon gave way to the ubiquitous Connoisseur turntable, which formed the base of his system which was to be featured in Hi-Fi Sound magazine's reader's system spot. The reviewer was reportedly surprised at the quality of the sound, and put it down to Roy's vast home made concrete cabineted loudspeakers. At the time, no one realised that it was the source, and not the speakers, in a system which was the primary influence on sound. We pray for them in their darkness!

In time off from his job as a technical editor for the Ford Motor Company, Roy could be found playing with friends' hi-fi systems and building and selling his own loudspeakers. He became a part time retailer, which necessitated him spending an inordinate amount of time repairing turntables (they were, of course, the primary source back then).

With the distinct impression that he could do better, in 1973 he and a partner Tony Relph registered the name Rega (RElphGAndy) and started making the very first Planet turntable.

A brilliantly simple design, it featured the familiar blend of belt drive, solid plinth with decoupled feet and superb build quality that was to make the Planar turntables such a success subsequently. The plinth consisting of several cast alloy 'podules' for supporting the record was not quite as timeless a design concept! After a couple of years of manufacturing in his spare time, the decks were becoming increasingly popular in the UK, West Germany, France and Denmark, and so a 'proper' distribution deal was agreed. Roy left Ford and used his redundancy money on a factory in Rochford. Soon after this, his partnership with Tony ended and Terry Davies joined as Rega's financial administrator.

What followed was critical to the success of the company - the Planar 2 was launched in 1975 and ironed out all the Planet's idiosyncrasies at a stroke. The combination of an excellent medium mass Lustrederived S-shaped tonearm, nicely implemented Impex motor and a thin glass platter with rubber mat was dynamite. The £95 selling price was also a masterstroke - just a little more than the mass market Japanese direct drives which were selling like hot cakes but couldn't hold a candle to the P2 in sonic terms. Then in June 1977 the Planar 3 was launched, offering more of the same - but better. A selected tonearm, thicker plinth and more substantial glass platter allied to a felt mat made a surprisingly big improvement in sound. The P3 was now a worthwhile rival to more expensive suspended subchassis decks like Thorens' TD160.

It was an instant hit and by 1980

Rega employed thirteen staff, exported to twelve countries, had twenty UK dealers. In 1980 Rega moved into a new factory on the site of an old mill, painting it green to affirm Roy's love for this hue. The company was now really going places.

> 1983 saw the next major moment in the Rega story. After using Japanese and Danish-sourced arms for years, the first batch of RB300equipped Planar 3s hit the dealers in August. Using a gently tapered, onepiece tube made by an entirely new production method, the new arm soon won a Modern Metals award 'for excellence in the field of Aluminium Die Casting'. This was just the start - the arm was a stunner, totally demolishing all its competition at or anywhere near the price. Selling for £90, it bettered Linn's £253 lttok

LVII in many respects, and blew anything cheaper clean out of the water. That the £188 Planar 3s came with one as standard only made Rega's supply problem even worse! The RB250, and the thusequipped Planar 2, soon followed.

Not content to rest on its laurels, the Supex-sourced Rega R100 cartridge was replaced by a homedesigned RB100, selling for an affordable £36, and then superseded by the Bias and Elys cartridges in March 1988. Soon after in summer 1989 the Ela loudspeaker was introduced. A Rega design originally made in Denmark, production was guickly moved back in house.

In 1991 the electronics arrived, in the shape of the Elex and Elicit amplifiers. This completed the Rega system. Soon after, a new factory was built in 1992 on the Temple Farm Industrial Estate in Southend-on-Sea, under Roy's design. The original Planet CD player then became another legend - although not garnering the critical acclaim of some other rival products, it proved incredibly popular with dealers. For many audiophiles, it was their very first digital disc spinner, bought to complement their high end vinyl sources.

Now, Rega employs fifty-five people and is growing steadily. The Planar 2 and 3 decks have just received a mild makeover, and there's an updated P9 also available, along with the successful P25.The electronics are now all '2000 series' designs, and the Planet is one of the very strongest budget audiophile CD spinners around.

The Terry Bateman-designed Mira amplifier is the company's most sophisticated integrated yet, boasting a slick control system with high quality loss-less switches, relays and specially selected Alps volume controls.

In almost three decades, the company has gone from cottage industry to a successful yet very individual hi-fi manufacturer.

TB - I was doing design and R&D tasks in the pro-audio market, working with products like power amps, mixing desks, crossovers, equalisers and many other audio gadgets. My first job on leaving school was building valve guitar amplifiers, and later going on to design and R&D work on the same valve products. To

DAVID PRICE INTERVIEWS DESIGNER **TERRY BATEMAN**

DP - WHAT IS YOUR JOB AT REGA?

TB - I design the electronic products - amplifiers and CD players plus any electronic parts associated with the other Rega products. For example, with the Brio I designed and developed the circuit using CAD and a rats nest hook-up, and I also designed the PCB and performed the EMC testing as well. This gave me complete control over all the electronic aspects of the product. Rega is a team-led company, so I wouldn't be able to do the electronics without the rest of the team members, who do the mechanical design, styling and pre-production.

DP - HOW DID YOU BECOME INVOLVED WITH THE COMPANY?

TB - Through a mutual friend. Rega had the beginnings of the Elex and Elicit amplifiers, but weren't able to

In fact there are some overlooked goodies in the run-of-themill parts catalogues which give interesting results. Take a look at the level of distortion in some of the better sounding valve amplifiers! Therefore, amazingly low levels of distortion and super specs will not automatically ensure a good sounding product. There's also a knack of knowing what is right - this rule of thumb approach based on sound (no pun intended) experience, which I picked up in my early days working with the "old guys" in the audio industry, is invaluable. I remember one guy Frank working on a 2x12" speaker cabinet, but when it came to the port, he picked up a coffee lid laying on the shelf saying "that's' about the right diameter", and when this speaker was finished it sounded great!

DP - HOW DID YOU GET INTO HI-FI?

TB I've always had a keen interest in radio, electronics and music since I was a young lad. In fact, I had my first radio apart when I was five, so hi-fi was a natural progression! It all started with getting old record players and radiograms from the local rubbish dump and then modifying them in various ways to suit my own needs. The big break came at the age of thirteen when I got a Quad 22 system, which was heading for a jumble sale. Thanks to my mum, it found its way to me.

This complete system comprised two Quad II power amps, a 22 preamplifier, AM & FM tuner, Garrard LAB 80 turntable and a box of spare KT66 valves. It's still my favourite system, because of how it changed my life. I still have it today, along with Leak, Radford and Beam-Echo equipment. Just prior to joining Rega I had Quad 44/405-2 with a pair of custom built KEF loaded speakers (BI39, BI10 & T27) and a Goldring turntable. I have also had various systems in the past comprising of PA power amplifiers both valve and solid state.

DP - WHAT ARE YOUR MOST IMPORTANT HI-FI PRODUCTS EVER?

TB - Difficult. To be honest, as an engineer it would be easier to focus on innovations rather than products.

For example, in the 1930s Blumlein patented binaural or stereophonic sound.

A lot of work was performed during the Second World War and the 1950s gave us Microgroove 33.3RPM records, Williamson, Leak and Quad II amplifiers and FM Radio. In the 60s it would be Compact

Cassettes, FM Stereo radio, efficient multiple speakers (LF, MF, HF) and complementary push-pull transistor circuits.

In the 70s there were good transistor amplifiers and the improvements in semiconductor

technology which generally helped hifi.

In the 80s it was digital audio and CD, the reappearance of valve amplifiers and MOSFET transistors. The 1990s had MiniDisc, CD-R, DVD, DAB and MPEG, which wasn't true hi-fi, but still an innovation.

DP - WHERE DO YOU STAND IN THE VINYL-CD & VALVES-SOLID STATE DEBATES?

TB I think that modern CD players with high performance DACs have gone a long way in closing the gap with vinyl, the Planet and Jupiter being included amongst them. But when it gets down to a good two channel system - both valve and solid state - you can't beat the atmosphere and depth that a good turntable and cartridge can get from a piece of vinyl. Someone said recently that, "there must be a planet somewhere in the universe that has all the atmosphere on it (along with all the pens), that was lost when all the master tapes were converted to PCM CD data"!

Being the proud designer of Rega electronics, I can quite easily listen to solid state amps - good ones, that is. However, I also have a collection of valve amps, and tend to use my Leak Stereo 60 and TL25+'s with 25% screen grid UL taps, which have a harder sound, plus a little more grunt (35VV) than the Stereo 20 and TL12+'s (12-15W). As I write this, I'm listening to a Triode connected EL34 amplifier. I must add that I feel the old original valve pre-amplifiers are not viable due to the changes in signal sources, so I use solid-state preamplifiers with valve power

amplifiers. To conclude the answer, I am at home with all! I need to have an open mind and not exclude certain formats and technology just because they don't fit into my idea of hi-fi, but I do feel that home entertainment cinema systems are not hi-fi, so I do exclude these!



DP - WHAT IS HI-FI'S FUTURE? WILL IT DISSOLVE INTO HOME ENTERTAINMENT?

TB - Hope not! If I want the full-on audio-visual experience I will take the kids to the cinema along with the popcorn, crisps, etc., and if I want to listen to music I will use my two channel 'hi-fi'. I can't see the point in filling my lounge with loads of speakers, to try to emulate the sound you get in a cinema, where they use much large power amplifiers and speakers. You cannot expect one of these cinema systems to reproduce LPs and CDs faithfully. One aspect I especially don't like is the analogue input for the turntable, which is converted to a digital signal usually by a sub-standard ADC.

Another worrying aspect is the general 'dumbing down' of the signal quality. People are getting used to lower quality sources - for example, the BBC was transmitting Radios 1,2 and 4 at 192kb/s True Stereo on DAB (which was acceptable), but dropped it down to 128kb/s Joint Stereo last December (although sometimes it goes up to 160kb/s in the evening but still in Joint stereo). Home entertainment will take-over the mainstream market, but whilst the requirements for a good two channel hi-fi are in conflict with the quality and nature of home entertainment systems, there will always be a small market for two channel hi-fi systems. Imagine 5.1 or 7.1 valve-based systems, or even trying to get the best from your single ended triode amp with a 128kb/s data rate from your DAB or Hard disk using MPEGI Layer 2 and 3! 📰 📥

The Kel84 will highlight all the intricacies and depth of detail in your favourite recordings whilst retaining a warmth and fullness that is almost exclusive to pure valve amps and is rare at this price point."

KAT88 VALVE POWER AMPLIFIER KIT

Here is the amazing KaT88. The circuit is similar to that of our popular KEL34 with a few changes to incorporate the Tesla, JJ branded KT88 power tetrode. This is a pure Class A push-pull design providing 36 watts into an 80hm load. Andy Grove has come up with a gem of an output transformer (E/I). KaT88 didn't hang around when it came to exploiting the virtues of its four output valves on numbers such as 'Leaves' and 'Suspect Sustain' from Cirrus' Land's End Jazz CD. Saxophone had a wonderfully smooth, realistic character, and acoustic guitar mixed speed with harmonic richness to very impressive effect. Asian Dub Foundation and Moloko showed no sign at all of the sluggish, woolly bottom-end and poorly-delineated bass beats that most valve amps are to blame for Which makes the KaT88 an all-round, high-end bargain." 'm always interested in technology and what new goodies lie just around the corner, seemingly to make life easier, more convenient, cheaper – and all that. VVe all know that in practice these things usually make life more difficult, as we struggle with arcane complexity – and always more expensive of course. But who cares; the DIY side in me is always alert to new and interesting possibilities. Looked at as toys rather than necessities I'm willing to overlook a certain loss of wonga if in turn it brings me hours of perhaps-perverse fun.

This month seems to be the month of disc drives, new, current and expiring. Let me talk about expiry first – in this particular case "the click of death". This is the repeated clicking, or

clunking, that comes from an Iomega Zip drive as it struggles to read a disc. Like so many offices I suspect, at Hi-Fi World we use Zip drives for short term storage and file transfer, or 'sneakernet" as it's sometimes called. Most of them have worked well, but a few have left this mortal coil a little prematurely in my view. Now a relatively new one is starting to click away and I am becoming concerned. Having used 40MB Syquests in the past, like all publishing houses, we moved to their smaller, higher density EZ Flyers. These things would regularly peg out at critical moments, like when trying to assemble all files for the film makers at the very last moment, which always happened to be late Friday night when we were all tired and dreaming of a bit of writer's relaxation down at the local. The EZ Flyer sealed the fate of once great Syquest and left lomega, their competitors, a free field with the Zip drive.Our Zips have to date worked well enough for us to rely on them, but I wonder whether this will continue.

There's Internet discussion on the subject and a site at http://members.aol.com/zipcod1/zip.ht ml which describes this problem in detail. I wonder whether our Zip drives will end up in a heap in the corner of the office like our Syquests.

It isn't just this problem that has dampened my enthusiasm for building

Zip into our computers to replace the floppy, for fast, hassle free file interchange. It is the upcoming Mount Rainier CD format from Philips. Here's a development that appeals to me especially, because I am convinced about the potential of 8cm mini-CD and MR could well see turn it into the replacement for floppy disc that computers so need.

Mount Rainier is a packet writing format to CD-RW that integrates with operating systems. It will be available for both PCs and Macs. Discs will be UDF formatted and files can be simply

and quickly dragged and dropped to disc.

At present we write to mini-CDRs and fling these around the office, using larger 12cm CDRs for long term storage. It's not ideal though, because old files clutter discs unless stringent housekeeping sees them into the waste bin at the right moment. Zips are more convenient. Trouble is, they are seven times more expensive than CDs and the "click of death" comes from head clogging and surface damage it seems.

I'm reminded by this that one of the enduring strengths of CD is that it's a non-contact medium and it doesn't have a ferromagnetic surface layer either, nor read/write heads. I've never heard of a laser or sensing head crashing onto the surface of a CD.

So all of a sudden the audio CD, launched way back in 1983, looks set to take over from the clanky old floppy disc and the Zip too. One mini-CD can hold 180MB and costs around £1. There's nothing that can compete on price and, with an updateable TOC, on convenience.

But that's not all. Yamaha make some great CD writers and they've been busy improving CD too. Their CRW3200E includes Yamaha's Audio Master Quality Recording technology which widens both pits and lands to lower jitter and improve audio sound quality. Some playing time is lost, but not much. This drive supports the new CD-MRW Mount Rainier format as well. The audio CD just goes from strength to strength it seems.

It strikes me that MR will allow us to record tracks to CD much as we once did with cassette. If I understand what Philips (www.mt-rainier.org) and Yamaha are saying correctly, this will be possible, but only using players that are Mount Rainier savy.

In other words, after updating our hi-fi systems/ cars/ computers/ with machines capable of sensing low reflectance CD-RWs, we will shortly be expected to do the same again with MR recorders. How Philips ever made a loss last year I'll never know!

Whilst Philips and Yamaha wrestle to make the CD all-conquering, others dream of replacing it - Constellation 3D for example (www.c-3D.net), with Fluorescent Multi-layer Discs (FMDs). Their "CD sized FMD ROM discs will hold 20-100 GBs. In comparison, a standard DVD disc holds just 4.7 GBs". FMDs are under development and will be with us soon, Constellation tell us. Doubtless just after we have all bought our Audio Master Quality, Mount Rainier CDs and recordable DVDs.

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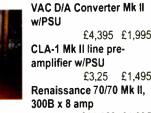
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etail is detail. A pithy line that does hold true, yet one that many in manufacturing still have a problem grasping. The factors that make a new format successful can be many and varied, but the design detail can be the greatest stumbling block. Advertising, marketing, and software back up are, of course, crucial to a new format's success. Yet, if I may be bold enough to say, the user friendliness or design detail of a product often counts for more than ultimate sound, picture or even build quality. Take a look at the evidence.

At its time of launch, DCC was generally considered to offer superior sound quality to MiniDisc. You don't need me to tell you the outcome of the two formats, but whilst one

died an embarrassing death six years ago, the other still has a strong following. The problem with DCC was not with the marketing, software (which at launch was just as poor as MiniDisc), or the sound quality. Believe it or not, many where turned off DCC simply because of its slow access speed. Not that it was any slower than cassette, but the near instant access afforded by MD meant it appeared cumbersome. Philips realised this by fitting a 'turbo drive' mechanism to their latter models to speed things up, but it was too little too late.

Oddly enough, little seems to have been learned from this mistake with the launch of CDR. Now CDR is far more successful than DCC, and has seriously dented MD, yet it's presence in the recording market could be far greater but for a couple of silly niggles. The first is the fact that, when launched, re-recordable discs (CD-RW) wouldn't play back on the vast majority of conventional CD players. Philips responded by ensuring that all their new players, and supplied transports, would play back CD-RW discs. Yet it's only been as late as last year when we finally saw rival manufacturers catch up. Even now, a sizeable number of brand new CD players won't play the format as well, of course, as the millions of older CD players. Although an inferior product sonically, it's worth

remembering that any recordable MiniDisc will play back on any machine. A blindlingly obvious observation and one that has in part lead to the continued success of MD.

Another niggle that has hindered sales of both formats, is that a copied disc can't be copied again digitally. This is a copyright issue, but as it stands it is a complete nonsense. Let me site an example as to why the system makes no sense. A budding DJ buys a hi-fi CD-R to make a disc of his work. This disc then needs to be copied, to be sent to various friends, clubs, music moguls and

> whoever. The problem here is that the recording has to be made through the analogue outputs, as the original disc is a copy. There's a loss of sound quality but, more importantly, there's no reliable way of track marking the disc. The auto system doesn't work unless there's silence within the music, and when tracks run into one another this is totally hopeless. The only way of marking the tracks is to sit whilst the recording is taking place, manually pressing a button every time a new track is required. A pain for a one-off recording, but down right unacceptable when one needs 60 or 70 copies. Of course there needs to be copyright protection, yet this is the DJ's own work

The person concerned brought his CD-R machine back to me and purchased a computer that had no problem in coping with these basic requirements. Either all CD-R systems should have copy protection systems or, far better, original discs should be protected instead. As it stands the system is prejudicial towards the hi-fi industry.

Had this problem been sorted out by the industry as a whole, as it may finally be with the introduction of copy protected discs, and if all discs were rewritable and could be played back on any CD player, then CD-R would be a more successful format than it is now. As it is, such unnecessary complexity has put potential customers off the format.

One thing the explosion in DVD sales has shown me is that the best selling machines that we sold were the most flexible in what they played. All the top sellers were multi-region and CD-R, CD-RW, VCD and MP3 compatible. Never mind that the picture or sound quality wasn't quite as good as others, it was these players that sold. Most people simply want a machine that they can just chuck any disc into and it will play. They may not even be aware of all the different formats but, in short, they want something that gets on with the job without making a fuss.

With this in mind, imagine my disappointment with recordable DVD. At present there are three systems with a list of compatibility problems that I simply haven't the space to list here. No doubt, in four or five years time there'll be a budget Chinese machine that will play all formats with no sweat. Others will then follow. But is it really worth the intervening years of uncertainty and muddle just to get to this point? The manufacturing industry still has much to learn.

ou don't have to be the most astute observer of current affairs to realise that the world is changing - the new European single currency being one of the many reminders. But Britain is - as always - a little less aware of events outside its borders. We are, after all, an island nation and have a natural tendency to look inward, rather than outward.

This is glaringly obvious to anyone, such as myself, who has lived outside Blighty for a considerable length of time. Great as this country is, it's certainly a tad parochial. The cultural

implications of this aren't really relevant to this particular column, but the way we treat 'foreign' hifi is. Although things have radically improved over the past decade or so, the UK hi-fi press has been traditionally prone to navel gazing. Indeed, on a bad day, you could almost accuse it of xenophobia,

such is the way it paints UK based specialist hi-fi companies as 'good', and foreign (invariably Japanese until recently) mass market manufacturers as 'bad'.

Last month I spoke to Pioneer GB's John Bamford and found myself agreeing with much of what he said about the hi-fi equivalent of the 'little Englander' mentality in this country. He pointed out that as a journalist, he'd been privileged to visit Pioneer's Japanbased design and manufacturing facilities. He confesses, "they made a huge impression on me. I'd been led to believe that lapanese companies were blaggards that only manufactured massmarket junk, and didn't care about sound. Yet when I met some of Pioneer's design engineers I discovered that the majority of them were vinyl enthusiasts, I was flabbergasted to see how passionate they were, and by their attention to fine detail - not simply circuit design, but things such as vibration and temperature analysis on components and chassis."

This chimes with my own experience of living in Japan, where I found the most obsessive and exhaustive audiophiles I've ever met many of whom actually worked for the very electronics giants that the British press used to decry as 'Jap crap'.

John adds that, "I discovered that these guys were working on a higher level of engineering science entirely. Plus, of course, they had R&D facilities beyond one's wildest dreams. I realised I'd been fed a line for a decade or more that it was only 'specialist' manufacturers who knew what they were doing when it came to sound reproduction, and I could see that these Japanese guys' only crime was that they tried to make many of their products affordable for as many people

as possible, rather than simply for the privileged few."

The upshot is that in the UK at least, many audiophiles have been indoctrinated into the ways of the 'specialist company'. I know many folk who - out of sheer snobbery alone would never countenance owning something made by Sony, Marantz, Pioneer or Yamaha simply because it doesn't compute. Such has been the hegemony of the UK press that these names are regarded simply as the stuff of Argos catalogues or downmarket High Street stores.

John puts it down to the marketing skills of, "a few entrepreneurs who have been lucky guys in the right place at the right time", certain cowering British hi-fi figures who've managed to charm and seduce this country's opinion formers and no less importantly - their dealer networks. From this has sprung the cult of the specialist. which you also find in Germany, France, Italy and the US to a lesser extent. It propagates the idea that small is good and, ergo, big is bad. This in turn results in a kind of hi-fi

xenophobia, which as JB puts it, "saddens me immensely".

I think there's something in this -I'm not arguing with the success of Britain's indigenous hi-fi manufacturers for one minute. Audio is a tough business, and to succeed you've got to make the right product and sell it, which is easier said than done. In fact, one of the reasons I'm proud to be British is our nation's excellence in this area. But the obverse is our tendency to poo-poo the big Japanese manufacturers - this is misguided in the extreme, and just plain wrong. May I respectfully suggest that when you buy hi-fi, don't buy into a brand, an image, a lifestyle, and philosophy or a creed buy the stuff that plays music the way you like it.

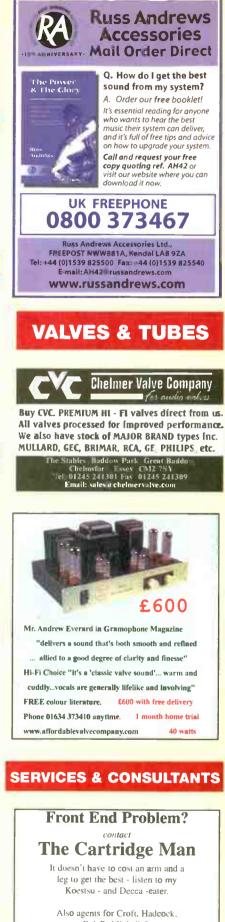


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Almost thirty-two years on and Andy Giles still gets off to Neil Young's early solo effort, 'After The Gold Rush'.

970 saw the emergence of some damn fine male solo albums. Nick Drake's 'Bryter Later', Van Morrison's 'Moondance' and Neil Young's outstanding 'After The Gold Rush', being just three. And it is the latter which, today. still grabs my attention with the same intensity as it did back in the acid-yellow hazy sun of the early '70s.

In thirty-five years as a recording artist, Neil Young has endured as much near to the ground critical and commercial success as he has enjoyed lofty but, with little argument, he is one of the most significant rock composers and performers North America - Canada to be precise - has produced. His moniker whining voice, piercing guitar work, introspective songs, and flower-child, reclusiverancher stance have all contributed to his strangely charming, enigmatic reputation. Through his experimentation with every musical facet, from hoedown to techno, Young has fashioned a timbre and sense unique to himself. Born in Toronto on November 12th 1945, the son of a former quiz show panelist on Canadian Television and Scott Young, a leading sportswriter for the Toronto Sun, Young first came into real prominence with Buffalo Springfield, whose eponymous debut album achieved cult-status when released in 1967

'After The Gold Rush', though Young's third solo album, was his first solo effort after joining Crosby, Stills & Nash. Now, after basking in the benefit of super-group status, the onus was on him to produce the goods on his own, under the scrutiny that comes with being in one of the most talked-about bands of the '70s. Young had contributed with admirable alacrity to 'Déjà vu', the first CSNY studio recording and much was expected. In eventuality

'After The Gold Rush' is uncomplicated, down-to-earth, and delivers raw emotion. Neil Young has never been accused of overproduction, and 'After The Gold Rush' is no exception; the songs are usually just comprised of an acoustic guitar, bass, drums, sometimes piano, and Young's plaintive wail. If there is any place where Young can be indulgent, it's with his background vocals and harmonies, where he layers voice upon voice to achieve an effect almost equal to the remarkable harmonies achieved by Crosby, Stills & Nash (indeed, Stephen Stills does lend background vocals on some tracks).

The mood of 'After The Gold Rush' is surprisingly subdued, especially when one looks at Young's later solo efforts that were heavy on the loud guitar and fist-pumping rock anthems. Of the eleven tracks on the album, only two, the brutal 'Southern Man', and 'When You Dance You Can Really Love' even feature the loud bombast that some might associate with Neil Young. The rest of the songs are fairly reflective and quiet, usually featuring a piano instead of a Marshall amp cranked to '11'. The real focus of this album is on Young's song-writing and distinctive voice. With the production laid bare, and nothing to depend on but his guitar and his singing, Young performs estimably.

A screenplay for a movie titled 'After The Gold Rush' which, ironically, was never actually filmed, inspired most of the songs on this album. Although greatly appreciated by many, US soft-rock band Lynyrd Skynyrd (how can you be taken seriously with a name like that?) did not approve of the way Young's songs, in particular 'Southern Man', implied that Americans living in the South dwelt in cabins and regularly lynched African-Americans. The witless Lynyrd



Skynyrd smugly wrote the lamentable 'Sweet Home Alabama' in reply to Young, even referring to him in the song. Missed the point – or what?

Although 'After The Gold Rush' is a seminal album, the first time I listened to it, I thought that 'Southern Man' was the only truly outstanding track on the album. But soon I learned to appreciate the refined lyrics of 'Tell Me Why', and the ingenious melody of 'Don't Let It Bring You Down'. And 'After The Gold Rush' sums up the album, as a title track should. A mostly acoustic recording, it tends to be a bit soft in places, especially Young's drifting cover version of Don Gibson's 'Oh Lonesome Me'. But, on the whole, the arrangements underline what might be Neil Young's finest collection of tender melodies.

Over the years, Young has embodied everything from the angry young songwriter, to the sensitive acoustic cowboy crooner, to the electric madman, to the father of grunge, to the industry-bucking rebel, and back again to the soulful acoustic artist. There is no denying that over his career, he has touched millions with his effortless lyrics and emotional voice. 'After The Gold Rush' is really where it all started. What followed was as unpredictable as the album itself.

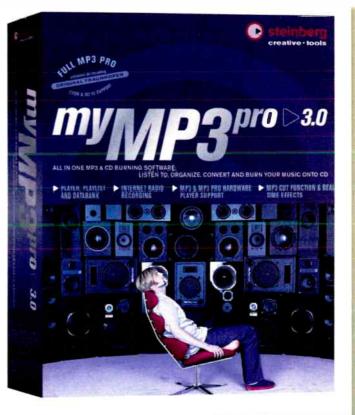
David Price looks at the latest in a long line of compressed audio file formats - MP3 Pro - and tries its first commercial implementation, in the shape of Steinberg's MyMP3Pro 'jukebox' software.

ust what the world was waiting for, another compressed audio file format! Oh go on then; I'm all for as many new file formats as we can possibly get. They can't do any real harm and it's not as if any of the major music labels are going to make any money from them, is it.? These days, it's codecs (COderDECoders) that count, and they're in software. If they turn out to be rubbish you can ignore them and move on - gone are the days when you have throw thousands of pounds on the fire by unloading your priceless record collection at the local car boot sale, only to invest in the latest silver frisbees!

The new kid on the block is MP3 Pro. After AAC (Advanced Audio Coding) which Fraunhofer developed in conjunction with AT&T, Dolby, Sony, comes this new update of MP3 which is - lest we forget - largely the brainchild of Fraunhofer, and uses a lot of technology from Philips late but unlamented DCC (Digital Compact Cassette). Confused? Well, don't be! Also in on the MP3 Pro party is French consumer electronics giant Thomson, which obviously reckons there's something in this compressed digital audio lark, thanks to its not inconsiderable financial investment. The idea is to "extend the MP3 music format in a bid to catch

up with the audio quality and level of compression offered by Microsoft's Windows Media Player audio technology".

Now, between you and I.WMA is more impressive for its compression stats than its sound quality. It isn't bad at all, but pitch it against Fraunhofer's MP3 Professional Codec (available for download as part of its MP3 Producer Pro ripper you'll find it by typing the name into Google at www.google.com) and WMA is suddenly struggling. It's only when you ratchet down MP3's bitrate that does it sound woefully inadequate - at 64 kbps for example, it's forced to choose between a bandwidth of only 10kHz or introducing easily detectable coding artefacts - both of which severely detract from the listening experience. MP3 Pro is about giving '128Kbps quality' at 64Kbps file sizes, if you believe what Thomson said at its launch at the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas late last year. In layman's terms, you get 'CD quality'

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audio at a file size that would previously only provide 'FM radio quality'.

MP3 Pro's killer punch is its backwards compatibility with ye olde MP3. This is no bad thing, as MP3 continues to thrive, and thanks in no small part to Napster is THE 'legacy' compressed audio file format. Think of it as a modern day virtual CD love it or loathe it, everyone's got it.

It's claimed to be sufficiently backward compatible with existing MP3s to work with all the software out there now, but you won't get the extra audio/compression benefits. So what's the deal, Neil? The bottom line is that - like the original MP3 (should we call it 'MP3 Classic'?), MP3 Pro is free to writers of noncommercial audio

decoders, but producers of encoding software and commercial decoders will have to pay to use it. Commercial MP3 Pro royalties are around 50 per cent higher than their MP3 equivalents.

As yet, MP3 Pro has had no official backing from any of the major digital music companies.

Thomson itself will use the technology in its own MP3 players during the second half of 2002, according to Rocky Caldwell, the company's strategic audio business development and product planning manager. Interestingly though, Steinberg has got the scoop - in the shape of MyMP3Pro tested here. MP3 Pro's creators hope it to succeed MP3 as the de facto standard in audio compression, and presumably they will submit the new technology to MPEG for inclusion in the official spec.

It's generally agreed that MP3 isn't half bad at high bit rates. The highest 320kbps offered by Fraunhofer's Advanced codec sounds



excellent, and quite worthy of being termed 'real hi-fi', but it's incredibly 'resource intensive'. For example, your average 64MB digital audio portable will give around 2 hours of playing time with low bit rate MP3s, but cranked up to 320kbps, this falls to just half an hour. The challenge therefore was to develop something that worked better at low bitrates, which is where MP3 Pro comes in. It employs an enhancement technology called "Spectral Band Replication" (SBR) which is said to be a very efficient method of replicating high frequency components of an audio signal.

MP3 Pro uses MP3's coding algorithm to take care of the lower frequencies, along with SBR for the highs. Since this latter 'bolt on' bit needs only a few kbps, it affords backwards compatibility with existing MP3 codecs which simply ignore the SBR part. The problem is that conventional MP3 codecs playing MP3 Pro files won't be able to handle the SBR aspect, and as a result could sound muffled. The thinking goes that 'reasonable compatibility' with the world's most popular compressed audio format is better than nothing at all - which is precisely what its rival AAC affords! New players supporting MP3Pro technology will of course utilise both parts of the new format to take full advantage of the 'Pro'

enhancement, since this is still an important part of the new format.

There's a freely downloadable demo of MP3 Pro available from Thomson's website. The company reports that the general consensus of opinion is that the quality of 64 kbps MP3 Pro is similar to 96-128 kbps mp3. This then means that you can get nearly twice the amount of music on a portable or MP3 CD player with MP3 Pro. Thomson says that the forthcoming MP3 Pro CD players will be able to cram over 300 songs on a single compressed CD-R. Its creators claim that at lower bit rates the new format is ideal for web casting and Internet radio, while at higher bit rates it's perfect for high quality audio transmission and storage. The first MP3 Pro products will offer 24, 32, 40 and 48 kbps mono bitrates, along with 32, 40, 48, 56, 64, 80, 96 kbps. For more information, click on:-

STEINBERG MY MP3 PRO

First off the MP3 Pro grid is this 'audio jukebox' from the Mamburg-based music software specialist. Along with MP3 support it offers full MP3 Pro functionality in a beautifulty integrated piece of software that should give the latest. RealJukebox a real run for its money. It combines a player, playlister, equaliser, effects and sophisticated database in combination with internet radio recording. FTP and hardware player support

Installation is a breeze - as you'd expect from a company like Steinberg - and the software works completely ditchlessly. Upon loading up, in proffers a beautifully styled screen invinen into lour separate areas. Along with easily discernible 'transport' controls (i.e. play, track skip etc.), there's a sophisticated 'EQ' section which even lets you use optional additional steinnerg VST ploych effects (heely downloadstre from the Internet), and a Playlist section which takes care of the usual playlist ing duties. To the right is the 'Pool' section which shows all the audio tracks on your computer - the it MP3_WAV_AIFF or Odd Vorbis (there it is right)

Pressing the SEARCH button will get the program to scan through your system and add all your audio to the 'Pool'. SCAN lets you find a tile of a specified name. ADD lets you add a music file from any of your PC's devices (CD-ROM hard drive, ZIP etc) and REMOVE will er remove its presence on the list, or physically delete the file itself (depending on what you choose) You can also record CD-ROM music files to your hard drive (via the 'pool') in WAV format (Le. uncompressed 16/44 PCM) or rin in MP3_MP3 Pro_AIEE or OGG formats and here's a nice touch - you can even choose your MP3 codes without having to go into the Windows Control Panel. This is the first time. I've seen this facility - and big respect due to Steinberg for it!

With the new Track Editor MP3 files can be easily edited without the need to convert

them beforehand - even real-time tade-in and lade-outs are no problem. Automatic, seaml transmons between tracks are also pussible with the Crossfade Function while MetaNormalise ensures a balanced volume level across the various songs on a playlist another very handy function. There's even an integrated Spround Module which lets you position the listener within a surround sound acoustic - It's a kind of 4-channel balance control. Additional features include the CD Cover and CD Labelling Functions for making vo very own covers. A new Visualisation Module enables a breath-taking array of light and colour effects to be inquered directly from the keyboard - Steinberg suggests attaching your PC to a projector for hallucinopenic effects! All in all it's a brilliant package - and one which further advances the art. For £34.99 it's great value too. David Price tries out two interesting new connection options for computers from Xitel, the Analogue and Digital Hi-Fi Links.

WELL

et's be brutally frank here - if you want to get sound out of your PC, the only reliable way to do it is to buy and fit a decent soundcard. If you've done this a number of times, as I have, it really isn't a problem. It's far less fiddly than - say installing a cartridge in your tonearm and there's no risk of one slip of the finger taking out hundreds of pounds worth of delicate cantilever and stylus.

However, if you haven't found yourself whipping the cover off your PC every other week, ready to install (yet) another super soundcard, you could be justifiably disinclined to start fiddling around. If you aren't into the nuts and bolts of computer audio, you're left in the invidious position of having to trust to luck and your PC manufacturer's judgement. After all, every bit of audio that comes out of your computer will be going through his choice of soundcard, one which is informed (inevitably) by matters of price and availability, rather than sonics. As a result, don't go expecting anything better than the digital din that issues from your neighbour's micro system.

For many people, the sheer inconvenience of having to sort soundcards out themselves - and/or the hassle of getting their PCs down to the local computer dealer or technician - has meant its audio capabilities have been largely ignored. Until now. In the past couple of months we've witness the arrival of several new 'PC audio interfaces', such as the Edirol MA-3 tested last month. Now, Australian company Xitel has joined the party with its new Digital Hi-Fi Link and Analogue Hi-Fi Link. Unlike the Edirol, these aren't semipro/musician oriented - quite the reverse. They're very simple, no-nonsense products which are designed for folk who simply don't want to trust to luck and suffer their built in soundcards - but do want decent sound. The two units work in an identical way. Both plug into the USB output found on practically every PC made since the midnineties. The Digital Hi-Fi Link offers a standard TOSLINK digital optical output, whereas the Analogue Hi-Fi Link proffers a 3.5mm analogue minijack.

CONNECTED

First, the Analogue version. Xitel points out that it offers two benefits over conventional soundcards - first is the 20bit DAC and carefully selected audio electronics it uses for high quality sound, and second is the fact that all this resides outside the electrically noisy environment of a PC. By taking all 'audio rendering' outside, it removes any possibility of distortion being introduced through latent electromagnetic radiation.

I tested it by plugging it into my notebook PC (complete with internal TEAC CD-ROM drive), and running a top quality Linn Silver interconnect (via a 3.5mm mlnl-jack adapter) from it to my reference Cyrus 7/PSX-R where I could hear it through my Mission 782 loudspeakers. Essentially it has a very smooth, even sound with a surprisingly strong and agile bass. Treble is quite sweet, but not as extended as, say, my reference Cyrus CD7/PSX-R, and the mid band is clean and open with plenty of detail. Overall, it's an incredible change from my notebook's

built-in soundcard and not far off a good budget CD player like a Marantz CD6000. Impressive!

Next on was the Digital Hi-Fi Link, claimed to be developed for audiophiles. It's said to employ a custom digital engine with buffered synchronization and clock matching, as well as a high output optical transmitter to ensure stable transmission over extended distances. The result is claimed to be an 'exact replication' of the digital audiostream. I used it to feed the digital input of a Sony MDS-JA555ES MiniDisc player (which acted as a DAC) and the sound was superb - A-B-ing my notebook and the Digital Hi-Fi Link against the transport of the Linn CD12 showed a clear difference. Of course, you'd expect this as the Linn is a £12,000 dedicated hi-fi CD spinner - but still the notebook PC/Xitel combination was no slouch. What a result!

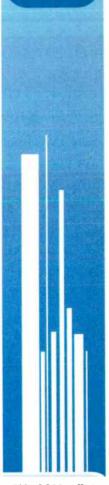
Overall then, these links are highly recommended if quick and easy 'plug and play' computer audio is what you want.

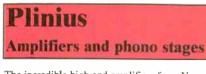

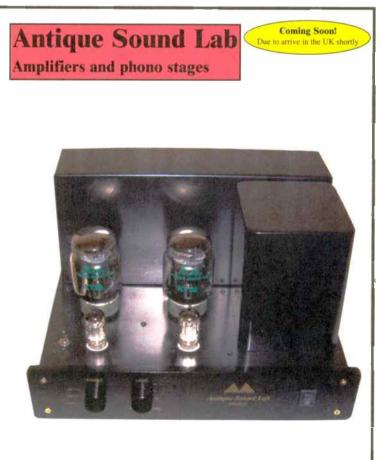

MYSTIK MUSIK

David Price tries out an eerlly familiar audio editing package from Mystik Media, AudioEdit Deluxe 1.2 for Windows.

his is probably the easiest audio editing software I've ever used. Where Steinberg's WaveLab and Syntrillium's Cool Edit try to reinvent the wheel in their struggle to add functionality, AudioEdit simply asks, 'what do you need?' and obliges. It's simple.

Mystik media is an American company that offers a range of multimedia products for use under the Windows operating system.The company is happy to let anyone try them out for free, for 15 days.After that, if you like AudioEdit, you'll have to pay \$40 for the pleasure of using it again.

AudioEdit Deluxe is an audio editing tool that lets you create, edit, copy, move, select and mix different audio clips into one. The set-up program takes about twenty minutes to load through a standard dial-up modem, after which it installs faultlessly.

AudioEdit Deluxe is soberly divided into FILE, EDIT, COMMAND and HELP menus. Most of these functions are duplicated in toolbars placed below. To wit, the FILE menu has a range of icons for OPEN, SAVE etc, next to most of the EDIT command icons such as CUT and PASTE, Underneath this tool bar is another with all the COMMAND functions, which I'll go into later. To the right of the main waveform display are level sliders for playback and recording (very useful!) and an advanced ZOOM facility which lets you focus on one particular part of the waveform. Under all this is a bar graph type meter display, along with info on the file you're editing (i.e. bitrate, sampling frequency, size, filename, path etc.). All good, straightforward stuff - and it works a treat.

The FILE menu proffers a couple of interesting functions. First is



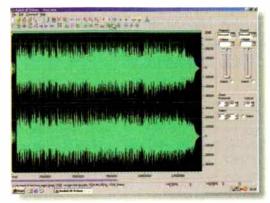
CONVERT which lets you variously record an audio CD into a WAV file (for editing in AudioEdit Deluxe), convert a WAV file to MP3 or vice versa, convert a WMA to WAV, MP3 or OGG (that's right trainspotters finally we've found something that reads the long, lost Ogg Vorbis format!) and vice versa.

SELECT CODEC goes straight into your Windows Control Panel and lets you choose an available codec, frequency, bits per sample, channel(s), and other appropriate settings, depending on the codec selected, for use in future save operations.

AUDIO INFORMATION opens a window displaying information on the currently loaded file. You can add or change the information. Any additions or changes you make are saved with the audio file and can be read by audio software when opened in the future.

The EDIT menu offers the usual CUT, PASTE, UNDO, REDO, INSERT SILENCE, INSERT NOISE, SELECT and COPY as well as an interesting MIX FROM FILE facility which automatically overlays one file over another.

The COMMAND menu, in conjunction with its toolbar, offers the following myriad digital signal processing facilities: AMPLIFY, NULL



SIGNAL, FADE IN/OUT, INVERT, NORMALIZE, REVERSE, BAND PASS FILTER, DELAY, FFT FILTER, FLANGER, HIGH PASS FILTER, HIGH SHELF FILTER, LOW PASS FILTER, LOW SHELF FILTER, INSET NOISE, INSERT PULSE, INSERT SINE, VIBRATO, NOTCH FILTER, STRETCH and MERGE TO STEREO. Essentially, these are the useful features from Cool Edit - albeit sometimes slightly curtailed - plus a couple of new ones thrown in for good measure.

There are three great things about AudioEdit Deluxe. First are those superb, fuss-free ergonomics that make just about the easiest program of its type to use. Second is its economy - it doesn't need a super-computer to run on (all Mystik Media ask are a Pentium Processor, 128MB RAM, 30MB HD, soundcard and CD-ROM drive) and won't take over your hard drive. Third are its file conversion and encoding capabilities. Installing it adds a host of new audio codecs to your system - including a Fraunhofer Advanced for MP3 playback, and the brilliant sounding, enhanced LAME for MP3 recording.

Recommended wholeheartedly then - the only cloud on the horizon is the fact that the even-more-flexible Cool Edit 2000 costs a mere \$29 more to download. Still, the great thing is that you can try it for yourself first, by downloading a copy from:

Sony's new NW-MS9 'Network Walkman' is the Japanese giant's latest digital audio portable. David Price listens in.

he first 'Network Walkman' range, launched in Japan in October 2000, comprised the flagship NW-MS7 (using Sony's proprietory Memory Stick memory card) and the NW-E3 (sporting built-in flash memory). Now, the new NW-MS9 you see before you attempts to improve on its predecessor while keeping the formula - small size, high performance, premium price.

At over £220 this is an expensive, top of the range product. It uses Sony's OpenMG technology for storing and transferring files, which is the company's name for its secure (SDMI-compliant) way of copying music and sending it to and from the player. Its new Sony OpenMG 2.0 Jukebox software lets users create different music compilations everyday, from files downloaded from the Internet or ripped from CD, and usefully, you can also create back catalogues on the jukebox, ready to download onto the Memory Stick at any time.

The user interface is better than that of yore, but still fussy due to Sony's paranoia about piracy. If you're going to use the NW-MS9 everyday (as most commuters would), this is an extremely important point. When the software's been installed, the NW-MS9 thoughtfully appears as a disk drive under 'My Computer' on your desktop. Unfortunately though, you can't then simply drag and drop music files to and from the player as you would, say, a USB digital camera. Rather, you have to go via Sony's 'Check-out/Check-in' copy protection scheme, meaning you first have to load the OpenMG Jukebox and convert your files to Sony's proprietary, encrypted ATRAC3 format. This is a pain because - if you're transferring pre-existing MP3 or WMA files rather than ripping them from CD - it means you have to store your music in both MP3 (or WMA) and ATRAC3 formats, thus

doubling the usage of hard disk space. Then there's the dubious process of compressing already compressed audio (i.e. MP3 to ATRAC3).

CHECK THIS OUT!

Other problems include the limited ATRAC3 compression options - the supplied software at least was limited to just three bitrates of 132, 105 and 66 kbps - and the restriction on the number of copies of CDs you can make. If you choose to rip from CD, which is understandable considering the rigmarole of converting from MP3, OpenMG only lets you 'Check Out' files to the player three times, and no more. After that, you have to 'Check In' a copy to the computer before you can 'Check Out' another - which is a bloody pain. One wonders whether this will really prevent piracy? Ho hum.

It's looks that sell 'product' in this particular market though, and in this respect the new NW-MS9 is sublime. Beautifully small and light, and finished in a luxurious matt silver, this digital walkie is pretty much the coolest looking thing around right now.A single two-way rocker button starts or stops playback and lets you skip between tracks, while three small recessed buttons control the dinky LC display, plus built-in bass booster.

The power management functions are a bit fussy. It boasts up to 10 hours of continuous playback via an internal rechargeable 'gum stick' style nickel metal hydride (NiMH) battery, but unfortunately you have to pop it out to recharge it, via the supplied AC adapter/charger. The supplied 64MB MagicGate Memory Stick stores up to 120 minutes of music, although half this is more realistic if you want hi-fi quality.

The unit is a dream to use and carry around. Problems arise when you want to squirt music into it (as mentioned), and when you're wanting

than just background music to soothe your passage to the office. Put directly, it doesn't sound too hot. As I found early last year, ATRAC at the permitted bitrates of 132, 105 and 66 kbps just isn't good enough. No matter what Sony says, it doesn't hold a candle to decent Fraunhofer-coded MP3s, and AACs give it an even harder time at a lower bitrate. When you drop the coding density to 66kbps, you get an admittedly bouncy but very ragged sound - mechanical and full of artefacts, it's about as musical as listening to your PC's modem. Ratcheting things up to 132kbps helps no end, but it's still just a touch

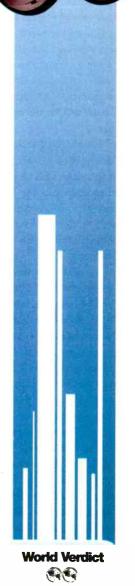

too phasey and processed sounding for my liking. A-B this against, say, Philips Rush SA-126 MP3 player running 128kbps MP3s and it's night and day.

The Sony is a brilliant product that's been hidebound by politics. First is the silly SDMI compliance, which turns the 'Check In/Check Out' thing into a chore. Second is its manufacturer's desire to go it alone and run with its beloved ATRAC coding technology. If only these two constraints were circumvented, it would beat the living daylights out of the Rio et al., but they aren't. A beautiful bit of kit, but this one isn't for me. 📕 📥

NEW GOLDPOINT GOODIES

There are some interesting new products available from Goldpoint, based in Sunnydale, California. Last month saw the launch of their SA-1 "volume control box" passive preamp kit which they say can be used as a "complete preamp solution for audiophile purists". It's also intended to be used in applications on the audio test bench. Measuring 2.6"x4.2"x5.6", it consists of two line level inputs with a two position C&K brand selector rocker switch and uses a precision Goldpoint 24 position stepped attenuator for apparently low noise and high quality channel to channel signal level tracking. Construction is from cold rolled steel with a semi-gloss, fine pattern black powder coat paint finish, that also claims to be chip resistant. The front and back panel lettering is baked on for high durability. Internal wiring is high grade multistrand type with Teflon jacketing and the rear panel RCA jacks are gold plated Tiffany style. Due to input impedance of valve power amps, valve users may prefer to employ a 100k stepped attenuator in place of the 50k model

supplied as standard. The price of the SA-1 kit is \$253.

Also from the same company, you can purchase a whole age of mini-sized stepped attenuators for high quality audio and general instrumentation applications. The 24 position Series, Ladder and Shunt designs claim to offer lower noise and better channel to channel signal level than common potentiometers. Mini-V (series type), Mini-L (ladder type), and Mini-H (shunt type) units come fully assembled or as kits. Mini-V stocked values include 1K, 10K, 25K, 50K, 100K, and 250K designs. Blank switches with printed circuit boards attached are also available for user customised controls.

Neville Roberts builds the interestingly named Njoe Tjoeb 4000 Valve output CD Player from the Netherlands. We provide an English translation.

aving re-discovered my record collection thanks to the magic of valves, my CD have taken a back seat when it comes to choosing music to listen to. Unfortunately, records are not without their problems. They have become increasingly difficult to obtain and classical recordings have not been released on vinyl for some years. They are susceptible to clicks and pops caused by dust, scratches and static electricity as well as distortions introduced by a combination of RIAA equalisation and tracking errors during playback. It really is amazing that they sound as good as they do. Enter the Compact Disk! Playing the numbers game effectively eliminates all of the above problems, but unfortunately introduces others. Transistors and integrated circuits are, of course, necessary and the elimination of semiconductors from a CD player would create a machine containing thousands of valves and needing a small warehouse to accommodate it. But it is not all gloom and doom, the trick is realising that digital technology relies on the storage and processing of numbers. In essence, it doesn't matter whether you add

up a column of figures with the aid of a quill pen or use a calculator, the answers will be identical if it is done accurately. Looking at the design of a CD player, you can use semiconductors to handle the digital data and

logic controls and introduce valve technology only when the signal becomes analogue. A CD player with a valve output stage therefore becomes a very feasible proposition. However, the inability of high quality audio equipment to interface satisfactorily with one's bank account has attracted many to the joys of DIY! Wouldn't it be great if someone produced a high quality but affordable valve CD player that would allow the odd tweak or two?

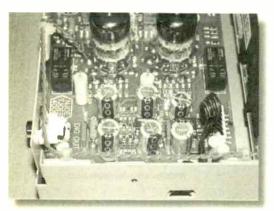
DUTCH COURAGE

My hunt for such a beast led me to a company called DÉ HIFIWINKEL based in Holland that advertises on the web and is run by Frank van Duijvenvoorde and Herman van den Dungen who have over 25 years of highend audio experience. They market their products under the appealing name of AH!. Clicking on Error! Reference source not found. takes you to a section in

English and I homed in on their third generation CD player with valve output – the Njoe Tjoeb (pronounced 'new tube') 4000. In order to find out more on the cost of going Dutch, I fired off an email to the company and almost by return I received a friendly and

review

informative response from Herman with more details. Purchasing is very simple. You simply send your credit card details to them and they debit your card in the local currency -now, of course, the Euro! After some enquiries I was informed no import duty is payable within the EEC and you only pay VAT once in the country of origin; in this case 19% in Holland. There are currently two versions available - a standard model at about £356 and a 'SuperTjoeb 4000' at £441 including local VAT. Carriage charges to the UK for either model are an $\pounds 12$ or so. The player is based around a modified OEM CD4000 chassis fitted with a valve output stage. The company obviously recognise that many audiophiles will want to get inside the box and do some tweaking, so they even supply a Torx #10 screwdriver! The standard model now includes items that were extra on previous versions, such as a coax digital output, AC NoiseKiller and SuperCrystal oscillator. The 'Super' version is fitted with a

digital output transformer, quality feet (called 'TjoebSjoes'), a quality mains lead, CD mat and 'Tjoeb Ribs' for extra damping. In the end, I decided on the standard version, reviewed here, knowing that I can fit the clogs (sorry, TjoebSjoes) etc. at a later date. My card details were emailed and my Njoe CD player duly arrived within a few days. The first job was, of course, to put the Torx screwdriver to good use and remove the lid to examine my new purchase on the inside! Actually, this is an essential first step as the valves and the CD upper clamp are packaged

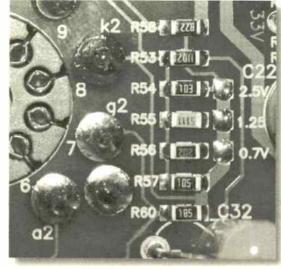
separately and have to be fitted before use.

The most obvious features are the pair of valve sockets on a circuit board next to a bank of electrolytics. These capacitors are the power supply filter bank and total in excess of 0.03F (yes, Farads!). Some may argue that all this filtering is 'guildering the lily', but this proved to be just the right amount based on extensive listening tests, according to the manufacturers.

TUBULAR BELLE

I was immediately impressed with the overall quality of the electronics. The valves are seated in heavy-duty sockets, acknowledging that many DIY'ers will want to experiment with different makes of valve. A toroidal mains transformer provides the HT and filament supply and this is switched via a relay that is controlled by the digital electronics. Another nice touch is the bypassing of the transistorised muting circuit. This function is now undertaken with a relay in each channel. All that remains is a barely audible but pleasing "click" from inside the unit when the CD starts playing. All the valve pin connections are clearly marked on

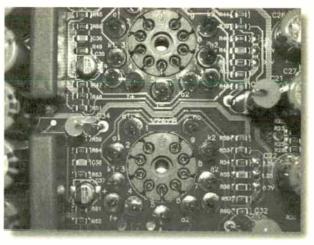
the printed circuit board. To the right of each valve base is a group of resistors for changing the output level of the unit. Output is factoryset at 2.5V, but if this proves too high for

your amplifier, you can easily reduce it by following some clear instructions and soldering across adjacent solder pads. The OEM CD4000 includes full remote control facilities and sports the Philips VAM 1201 transport mechanism which allows the unit to play both re-writable and conventional Cds.

Early on in my use of the unit, I noticed that when a CD is removed and the player allowed to detect that there is no CD in place (the display changes from "READING" to "NO DISK" after a few seconds), the mains relay does not deactivate when the player is

switched off, leaving the valves powered up. If, however, the CD player is switched off before this time or with the disk tray out (the tray is automatically retracted before the unit powers down) or with a CD in place, the whole unit powers off normally. A short email was sent to Herman who confirmed that this was, in fact, a "feature" of the OEM CD4000 firmware! In reality, this is guite a useful feature as it effectively provides a "standby" facility by leaving the valves powered up ready for use next time and eliminating the warm-up time. However, I decided to fit a small blue LED powered from the 6.3VDC filament supply to show when the valves are on. This is quite easy to do as there are 'f+' and 'f-' pads clearly marked on the printed circuit board. I fitted a pair of wires from here to the LED via a 150 ohm resistor to provide the required 20mA current. A small hole was drilled to the left of the 'Power On/Standby' switch to accommodate the LED.

44SOUND INVESTMENT?

So much for the technical details - what does it sound like? I started off by listening to a few of my 'old favourites' on my existing CD player and then on the Njoe Tjoeb. I have not named my existing CD player as the difference was so startlingly, I soon realised why I hardly listened to my CDs in recent years! The Njoe Tjoeb is in a totally different league, having an overall cleaner sound, more extended bass and a much clearer and less harsh top end. I could detect more instruments that had been masked by my old CD player. In addition to listening to a range of music CDs, I also included a couple of recordings that were available on both CD and vinyl. Of course, a comparison of the same recording transcribed onto record and CD can only be used as a guide as you are at the mercy of the recording engineer who may use slightly different mixes for each type of media. However, an 'identical' recording of Vivaldi's The Four Seasons (The Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields conducted by Neville Marriner) on record and CD showed that the Njoe Tjoeb considerably reduced the harshness and 'toppy' sound of my old player and the overall balance of the orchestra was much closer to the sound from the vinyl. Similarly, a friend's copy of Brian Wilson's selftitled album yielded similar results. Repeated switching of the 'Love and Mercy' track between record and CD player showed that the bass of the Njoe Tjoeb was tight,

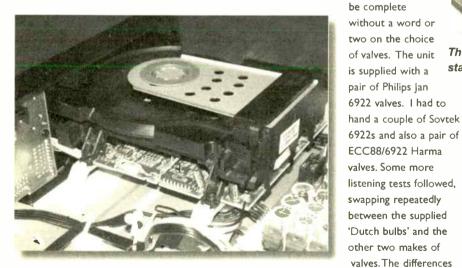
realism to the sound than it's solid state counterpart. Indeed, listening to 'Why Does my Heart Feel so Bad' from 'Moby Plays LivE' on the 4000 provided a far greater sense of being there with the audience. The easiest way to describe the overall effect of the sound is by reference to traditional musical instruments that many readers will be able to compare to 'the real thing'. The strident sounds of trumpets

come through without sounding harsh or edgy. Pianos and harpsichords have a realism and presence in the room. Vocals that can sound strained when reproduced on many CD players come thorough clear and effortless as though the artist is actually enjoying the performance. The sharp punch of a bass drum is tight and well controlled and less like the instrument has been filled with treacle! At the other end of the spectrum, the xylophone has a lovely 'milky' musicality with the same presence, detail and clarity as with other instruments.

No review of the Njoe Tjoeb would

extended and well controlled which had not been the case with my old player.

At this point, I borrowed a Marantz CD-63 Mk2 KI Signature Edition to provide a more realistic CD player reference. It was clear from the outset that this player was far closer to the vinyl sound, but A/B tests between it and the Njoe Tjoeb clearly demonstrated that the valve output of the 4000 offered more presence, clarity and

Sovteks and the Harmas to have a clearer and more 'alive' sound than that the Philips, together with a slightly tighter bass and more overall depth to the image. However, the Sovteks made the strings sound a little too far back and 'grainy' when compared to the Harma valves. For me, the Harmas produce music that is more compelling and conveying more emotion. sound with a more controlled bass response compared to the Sovteks. So which sounded better - record or CD? Well, in all honesty I would be lying if I said the CDs sounded better than the records. To my ears, vinyl still

has the edge over the CD, but the gap had considerably narrowed to the point where the difference was only quantifiable through the A/B testing process mentioned earlier. I have been fortunate to hear similar comparisons of records against CDs with players costing many thousands of pounds and I came to the same conclusion. However, the Njoe Tjoeb can certainly compete with these expensive units.

My overall verdict? If you like the sound of valves and vinyl and you want your CDs to fight back, then my advice is to grab your credit card and head for your PC! This is truly a Dutch delight with an amazing price/performance ratio.

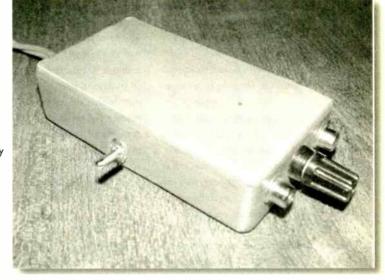
Ordering direct from Holland is as easy as buying from the UK and with an impressively rapid delivery. In my opinion, this is an excellent player which allows your CD collection to take their rightful place alongside your records and not sound like 'the poor relation'. 🔳 📥



Neville Roberts designs a Moving Coil cartridge head amplifier for those who crave vinyl but not wallet ache!

he moving coil cartridge seems to be able to extract those elusive refinements tucked away in the groove of your record that elude most moving magnet designs. Of course, a moving coil cartridge has the disadvantage of not having a replaceable stylus, so it is important for manufacturers to fit a good one in the first place knowing that the customer will be less inclined to buy the cartridge unless it is significantly better than one with a detachable stylus. Whether it is a case of a good stylus "reaching the parts that other styli cannot reach" or that a fully integrated stylus/cantilever/coil assembly is inherently superior, a good moving coil cartridge is certainly a worthwhile upgrade for any vinyl enthusiast.

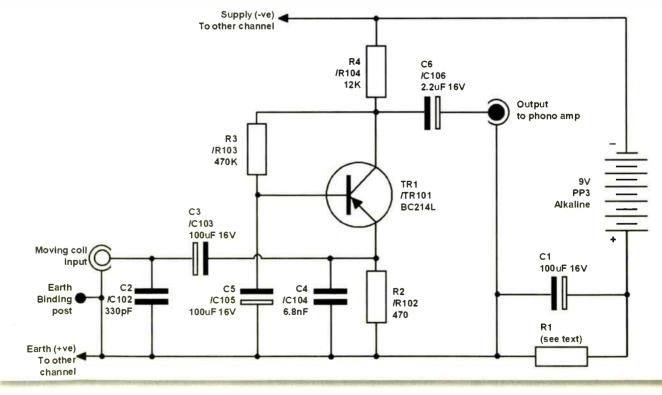
This brings us onto the other problem associated with most moving coil cartridges: their relatively low output impedance. If your amplifier already supports this type of cartridge, then there is no problem. However, many amplifiers only support the



higher output moving magnet cartridges. There are two solutions to this problem: an impedance-matching transformer or a head amplifier.

I should say at this point that modern moving coil step-up transformers have come a long way since the types being sold when moving coil cartridges first made an appearance. Those available today are, in my opinion, considerably superior to the ones available in the late 1970s. Indeed, you cannot get away from transformers in the signal path of a valve amplifier. However, judging from some correspondence I have seen on the World Audio Design bulletin board, some people prefer not to have their moving coil cartridges feeding into an impedancematching transformer and a head amplifier is therefore the only other option.

I must confess to feeling a bit of a traitor to the cause of valve enthusiasts by publishing the design of a transistorised amplifier, being a

confirmed valve addict myself! My reasons for doing so are that the design presented here is very simple and will drive any phono stage, be it valve or transistorised. Furthermore, as it is battery powered, it can be situated close to the record deck without fear of induced mains hum and no additional power sockets are needed.

Turning our attention to the circuit, the required characteristics of the head amplifier are a low input impedance, gain, and a higher output impedance in order to match into the moving magnet input of the phono amplifier. A common base configuration is ideally suited to this task as it has all these characteristics. No RIAA equalisation is required as the phono amplifier already provides that.

Note that on the circuit diagram, component numbers starting from 100 refer to the other channel. R1 and C1, being common to both channels, only occur once. The input from the cartridge is delivered to the emitter of the BC214L via a coupling capacitor, C3. C2 ensures no RF finds its way into the system. The input impedance of the amplifier is about 2000hm, with a load capacitance of 6.8nF, which should suit most moving coil cartridges. If a higher load capacitance is required, then an appropriate value can be strapped across C2.

The output comes from the collector through C6 to remove the DC component from signal. It presents an output impedance of about 12kohms and will happily drive a 47kohm phono stage. The frequency response of the amplifier is essentially flat from 10Hz to about 45kHz and the signal to noise ratio is in the region of 60dB, which should keep most audiophiles satisfied!

We also require a circuit that can be easily adapted to suit the wide range of cartridges available. With reference to the

circuit diagram, it can be seen that the power comes in through a single resistor (RI) that is common to both channels. The value chosen for this resistor sets the gain of the amplifier. It also has an effect on the current consumption of the unit and hence the battery life. The table below shows the value of R1 for the required gain and the current drawn from the battery. As a guide, a 9-volt alkaline PP3 size battery will last about a year at a gain of x10. If desired, an on/off switch can be fitted so the unit can be switched off when not in use, thus prolonging the life of the battery. Battery replacement is indicated by an increase in noise and reduction in gain.

Working out the optimum gain for your cartridge is best performed by fitting a 250kohm potentiometer in place of RI and adjusting it until the required level is achieved. Then remove the potentiometer, measure the value and find the nearest preferred value resistor and solder in permanently.

CONSTRUCTION TIME

The amplifier can be built on a piece of stripboard, or a small PCB can be fabricated if desired. The unit should be housed in a metal die cast box for maximum shielding. The input connections should be high quality chassismounted phono sockets,

preferably gold plated. Most record decks require a separate earth connection and a suitable binding post can be fitted between the phono sockets to accommodate this connection. It is important to ensure that the metal box is earthed and this can be achieved by ensuring a good metal-to-metal contact of the binding post with the box. On the circuit board, fit metal pins for the input, output and earth connections, as this will facilitate wiring the external connections in the box later. It is also a good idea to fit pins where R I will be fitted to make it easy to set this value. The circuit board will need insulating from the metal box, of course. To this end, I cut a piece of clear plastic from an old CD jewel case just larger than the circuit board and glued it in place in the box. The finished circuit board was then fastened to this piece of plastic with a double-sided adhesive fixer, which makes a neat and resilient assembly.

If desired, an on/off switch can be fitted in the side of the box. Now wire the circuit board to the phono sockets, binding post and PP3 battery clip. The output connections can soldered directly to twin screened flying leads passed through a hole drilled in the box and terminating in a pair of gold plated phono plugs for connecting to the main amplifier. For initial testing, fit a 100kohm resistor across the appropriate pins for R1. All that remains is to connect the unit into your system and attach a battery. Once you have determined that the unit is working satisfactorily, set the gain for your cartridge as previously described.

All the components used in the design are readily available. Ceramic capacitors can be used for C2 and C4. The transistors cost less than 15p each from Maplin including VAT. In fact, the most expensive component is the box! Finally, I would recommend the use of Black Gate electrolytic capacitors throughout which are less than \pounds 2 each at these values and voltages.

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Can good cables reveal the true abilities of your system? One reader thinks so, especially if you carefully wind your own.

hanks to Nick and in particular to your contributor Neville Roberts for the feature in the November 2001 DIY Supplement titled Build a Quality Mains Lead.

I purchased supplies and made up one lead terminating in the IEC Socket and another with a 13A Mains Socket so that I could test with equipment having either the IEC input or fixed mains lead. The result was quite amazing.

I looked for better components, including an IEC Plug to attach to mains leads cut off about 6" from the cabinet. Maplins sold a Permaplug 13A Mains Plug which was ideal but they have just substituted it with one less suitable of the same name.

Apart from 13A plugs and earth wire I purchased from Farnell Electronic Components: -

140339 16/0.2 Black Wire 100M 140341 16/0.2 Red Wire 100M

964505 IEC Socket (Schurter)) These Schurter Plugs and sockets are superb components

146766 IEC Plug (for cut leads)) rated at 10amp and the socket easily accepts the 13 wires

107445 Heat Shrink 5M

All parts were sent mail order, carriage paid (over £10). They sent me a full catalogue and I have since received a CD - all free. Phone O113 263 6311 for instant attention and immediate despatch!

From experience I suggest you need an old wooden bobbin and plastic straight sided pen or pencil to wind with. Cut off 5M lengths of cable (about 4M earth), tear off about six 2" strips of PVC tape and locate along path of operation, wind up a pair then move some object such as corner of a table to the bobbin for reference for the next and ensure a similar number of turns. Tug hard and then let off some pressure at the bobbin to allow unwinding, whilst ensuring it is carefully relaxed to prevent tangling.

When all six are completed wrap with tape to hold all with the earth, as well as hold the six pairs side-by-side and wrap around the earth cable until it is found difficult, then secure with tape.

Untangle the mess behind you then proceed again and repeat. Tidy up the ends and bare wires and solder all 13 to a length of stiff wire, such as 3-core round, to use as a pullthrough for the heatshrink. Neatly tape the join.

Cut the heatshrink to suit and feed the pull through and attach to door handle (not inside house). Smear some form of lubricant onto a paper towel and wipe over cable. I used a silicone spray, left in the car after service. The heat shrink can easily be persuaded over the wire - or add more lubricant. Separate each colour and remove about 1/2" of insulation, align and twist together. Then cut off surplus wire.

After fitting to plugs check that each cable is actually secured. I shrunk the sheath, after fitting plugs and sockets which do not require soldering.

I have separate 13A wall sockets for each item and from the top of the rack there is a voltage controlled power supply for SE turntable with DC Motor, Pace Digibox, Naim Power Supply for Pre-Amp, Meridian 508-24 CD Player, Sony 830 Receiver, Naim 180 power amp, and Rel Strata 111. The tape player and VCR will soon be connected by a common cable with twin 13A free sockets.

Over many years I have made up interconnects, which is not easy with the Naim 5 pin DIN Plugs. I have purchased others, but appraisal of these has been confusing and I have even changed equipment, which in hindsight was due to the inconsistent quality and voltage of the mains!

Similarly, the subwoofer was never right due to the failure of the power amp to supply accurate and consistent information.

Thanks to you I can now fine-tune everything. I have bass detail from Satellite Digital Radio, vinyl, CDs and produce information both previously not known to exist. I can even set up the Sony to produce a front soundstage, which I suppose you would call integrated.

The speakers are Daline kits by Falcon, fitted with Focal Drive Units, but modified with external crossovers and originally MDF varnished, but since laminated, which also improved the sound.

Returning from Tesco with a piece of bubblewrap when I had a spare 12mm MDF shelf to hand. I attached the wrap to the shelf with about six pieces of masking tape and slid this under the turntable. The improvement was astounding. I have repeated this with the power amp, the Sony, and then ran out of spare shelves! I found an offcut of oak about 1/4" thick and 3" wide and cut two pieces to match the shelf depth and taped front and back a piece of bubble wrap which is easy to put under the feet of any unit to assess the result. It worked very well under the Naim Power Supply but looked untidy so I purposecut one piece of 15mm MDF to match the size of the Naim Box. Guess what? The result is not the same and has been replaced by two pieces!

My Naim pre-amp now has four $3^{"} \times 3^{"} \times 1/4"$ similar 'feet'. The shelves are a mix of MDF and marble mounted on Spurr slotted supports with their deep brackets which mostly I have welded nuts with spikes. The brackets are almost filled with Underseal.

I am amazed that quality products may never achieve their design performance unless tweaked like this. **R.Johnson, York**

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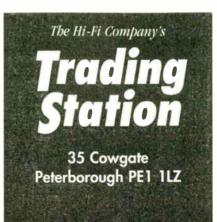
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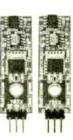
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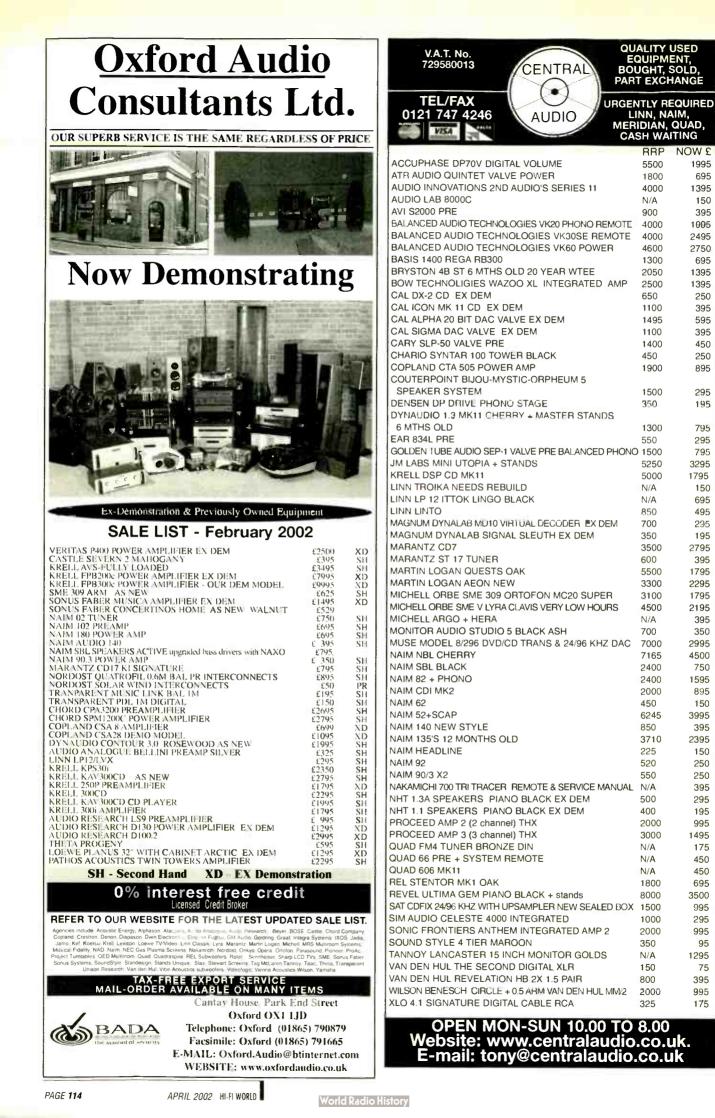
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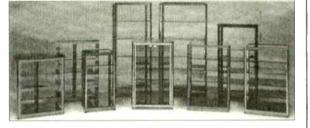
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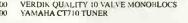
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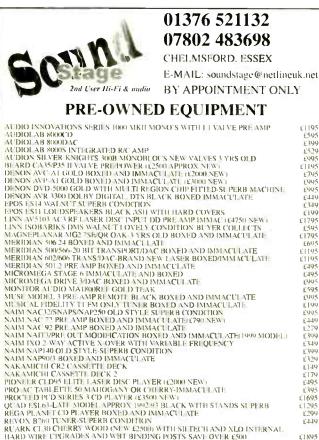
