

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ome of you misguided souls out there may well think I have the enviable task of listening to the stuff of audiophile dreams all day and retiring to bed after a hard day on the listening sofa. On return to the office you're then greeted with 145 e-mails. However, I've just returned from a press launch that actually merited the effort. The amassed media troops weren't treated to the delights of a two-hour technical head-scratcher, but a line-up of about 25 varied but compatible players, a catalogue of 405 discs (of admittedly varying quality) and some common sense on how DVD-Audio could become a household format. More details can be gleaned from our report in this issue but basically it appears that the powers that be in the music industry intend to release titles of mainstream and contemporary artists on DVD-A. That's not all, though. These titles, we were told, will be launched at the same time as the equivalent CD release and, more importantly, at the same price!

All this makes sense if DVD-Audio is to take off. A DVD-Audio disc will of course play at CD quality on a DVD-Video machine and we're told there are no fewer than 80million of these around the globe. They are used as 'CD' players too. That's one hell of a target audience for a new format.

Soon, at least a quarter of all new DVD machines will soon be DVD-A compatible - at affordable prices. Add to this the impressive extra visual material such as lyric sheets, interviews and video footage available with DVD-A discs and you have a situation where DVD-A becomes a mainstream music carrier.

It's a convincing argument; all the industry has to do now is convince the buying public that the enjoyment possible from the format really does merit a room full of wires and boxes!

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## NAD'S LATEST HIGH END SPINNER

Although mostly noted for their giant-slaying budget products, NAD also have a high-end Silver range. At the top is the S 500 CD player that recently followed its affordable stablemates by being upgraded to 'i' status, resulting in what the company describe as their 'best ever' CD player. As well as the usual RCA outputs, the S 500i features XLR balanced analogue outputs for better quality in professional applications. An XLR digital output is also fitted, in addition to a co-axial output. The 500i's analogue sections operate in pure Class A and the player is also DC coupled. Each section of the player has its own dedicated power regulators for freedom from noise and interference. A 24bit Crystal DAC is the chosen number cruncher for the 500i and a 5-pole filter is used in the analogue stage as opposed to the usual 4-pole. This apparently removes RF interference more effectively and reduces group delay. A three beam laser is used in the transport mechanism, which also uses a brushless motor (known as a Hall effect) to help minimise jitter.



# **STAND AND DELIVER**



There's a lot to be said for the humble standmount 'speaker, namely detail and accuracy as opposed to outright grunt. Noel Keywood works his way through half a dozen standmount 'speakers priced £200-£300.

n the loudspeaker world, being small has many advantages. A small 'speaker can outgun a big one quite easily in many areas, especially in its ability to throw a panorama of sound into the room that seems quite divorced from the boxes themselves. This little trick makes a small speaker sound large, although at present few small loudspeakers are sufficiently well engineered to do this effectively. One new model in this group I have reviewed did do so though, raising the issue - and the stakes - for the others. All six pairs gave a pretty good account of themselves all the same, showing just how good a small one can be.

With surround-sound now starting to appear on SACD and DVD-A the need for small, high quality loudspeakers becomes even greater. Upgrading to surroundsound means ditching the stereo pair for no fewer than five loudspeakers and a sub-woofer. Installing an unobtrusive pair of small, high quality stereo front speakers is a good first step to adding a pair of rears and a centre channel at a later date, plus a subwoofer. Manufacturers commonly provide such an upgrade path by making complementary sets or individual loudspeakers, like centres and subwoofers, available. It's best to contact a manufacturer or retailer direct about options like this.

At present most surround systems 'in a box' are of comparatively low quality, yet both SACD and DVD-A provide better-than-CD quality on all channels, (i.e. on rear speakers, as well as the front centre speaker), so there's an innate contradiction here. To get the full benefit of either DVD-A or SACD, very high quality small loudspeakers like those reviewed here must be used if the full impact of modern 24/96 digital recordings is to be fully realised.

So small loudspeakers are a sensible modern choice, but they have drawbacks of course. The classic one of limited bass holds as true today as it ever did. Very small loudspeakers just cannot go low and if you try to force the issue they will start to sound confused and overwhelmed. The general design aim is to get a small 'speaker down to 40-60Hz or so, allowing it to reproduce bass guitar or acoustic bass with believable impact. This will be sufficient for most people most of the time. If it isn't, a powered subwoofer can be used, good big ones being able to reach down to room shaking frequencies with useful levels of acoustic power.

Unfortunately, subs that are a rock bottom price aren't up to high quality audio - you'll have to splash out about £300 minimum for an adequate model. The subwoofer option is built into surround-sound modes, so again if you plan to upgrade in future, when DVD-A and SACD discs become more common, it's best to lay the foundations now by buying a pair of high quality small loudspeakers for which a subwoofer is likely available.

# ACOUSTIC ENERGY AESPRIT 300C

The compact Acoustic Energy Aesprit 300C combines a small aluminium cone bass/mid-range unit with a fabric dome tweeter. It has a slightly smaller bass driver than the 300 we reviewed back in our July 2002 issue, a lower quoted power handling of 100W as a result and front firing ports to facilitate wall or shelf mounting.

### SOUND QUALITY

Like the 300, the 300C could be a little enigmatic. Faced with Toy Matinee's well recorded 'Last Plane Out' on DVD-A its bass grumbled a little, which was distracting. Yet when the next track kicked in, without conflicting bass line, the AE 300Cs seemingly took off, sounding superbly detailed, lively and dynamic, yet also smooth. In fact the smoothness of these loudspeakers is almost syrup like; they seemingly border on sounding warm, yet that is not actually the case. DVD-A tracks like the Corrs Breathless sounded appropriately energetic at high frequencies, but the tweeter has very little colour of its own and remains acoustically hidden from view, as it were.

However, the apparently enigmatic sound of the 300Cs was

further explained by this Corrs track. It showed quite clearly that the front firing ports make internal cabinet coloration audible to listeners, bringing a peculiar warmth and heaviness to the sound. With bass

grumble and cabinet coloration the 300Cs may seem less than impressive, yet they are impressive all the same. They deliver plenty of detail, good insight into a performance and relatively strong dynamics. This last property made them fine for rock music, even if they may not be class leaders.

The smooth treble worked wonders with orchestral works, massed strings of the Berliner Staatskapelle sounding mellow, fulsome yet detailed and authentic with Beethoven's Eroica symphony on DVD-A. Moving back to Rock and Fleetwood Mac's Rumours, again on DVD-A, showed the constantly changing nature of the 300Cs. Whilst

there was a delicious sense of insight in Never Going Back Again that made it an intriguing listen, drum strikes on 'Go Your Own Way' were

so boxily resonant the effect was

distracting - and a little damning.

In a nutshell, the AE 300Cs sounded warm, smooth, coloured but often delightfully enthusiastic and detailed. They are both obviously flawed and delightfully entertaining.

### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**


The Aesprit 300C has some bass lift in its frequency response, likely to add a little body and warmth to its sound. The tweeter response extends smoothly up to 20kHz, a small rise in output suggesting it works well past this high upper limit. As there is no top-end roll off bright CDs may well sound a little challenging.

Forward bass output reaches down to 40Hz. Below this frequency the port takes over, extending output down to a low 20Hz or so. So the 300C manages to cover bass frequencies effectively.

With a sensitivity of 95dB a reasonably powerful amplifier of 60W or more will generally be needed to get good volume levels. The 300C measured out at 80hms nominal though, giving it a higher overall impedance than most rivals. This is a good balance of load properties, (dB) so the 300C should be reasonably easy to drive, although it is a little reactive over most of the audio band.

Acoustic Energy's 300C will sound a little warm and fulsome. Although treble is extended it is also very smooth. The 300C measures well. **NK**

# CASTLE **RICHMOND 3**

The Richmond 3 is handed into left and right speakers, the tweeter being offset on the front baffle to be closest to the 'inside' edge of each speaker. This is meant to improve stereo imaging. Castle use a polyamide tweeter, rather than the increasingly common metal dome, and they match it with a small woven carbon fibre bass/mid-range unit, reflex loaded by a small port on the rear panel. The Richmond only accepts single wire connection; it cannot be bi-wired. This is a small loudspeaker, well finished with a choice of real wood veneers.

### SOUND QUALITY

Live speech from the Steve Wright afternoon show on Radio 2 showed immediately that the Richmonds do things very differently to the metal coned loudspeakers in this group, sounding altogether darker in their basic presentation. Metal cones sound bright and vivid; carbon fibre cones seem much less forward by way of contrast. However, carbon fibre gives superb resolution of tonal colour within vocals and instruments and Steve Wright and others in the studio sounded natural enough as a result. Detailing was good, there was a fine sense of liveliness and dynamic. However, there was also an obvious warmth and boxiness that made the Richmonds sound coloured, even without contrast to the other speakers of the group. This coloration is clearly revealed in measurement and proved to be a fairly major drawback to what was otherwise a very nice sound. Toni Braxton's



sumptuous tones were beautifully resolved in Spanish Guitar, largely as a result of the carbon fibre driver's great ability to resolve tonal colour, well revealing contrasts and inflexions. Accompanying vocalists were very well resolved as a group of individual singers, rather than as an homogenous group. In this respect the Richmond's were very detailed. However, this testing track had the small cabinet thrumming obviously, resulting in a box-bound sound.

Larisa Stowe's 'Living In Your Eyes', a dynamic DVD-A recording, came over as punchy and clear, but the port and general low-end loading was quite obviously running into problems here, bass sounding boxy and slow. Staying with DVD-A, Fleetwood Mac's 'Second Hand

News' kicked off with a coloured, boxy sound that although fast and dynamic was also a little laboured in its bass. The simpler Dreams was entertaining enough, but DVD-A could over stress the Richmonds if any volume was required. I suspect the small port was running into severe non-linearity.

The Richmonds are smooth and entertaining, if not pushed too hard. They image well and sound both lively and large. Yet their limitations are a little obvious for today's marketplace.

### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

I expected this latest version of the bookshelf Richmond to display Castle's brand-value sound - and it did. The noise test signal sounded silky rather than fierce, the latter being more common nowadays, and our response analysis clearly shows a gentle overall tilt downwards toward high frequencies. Treble is smooth and extended, and there is no crossover suckout to erase detail, so the Richmond is not lacking. Castle have balanced it to possess a small amount of warmth, as is their preference.

There is a strong lift in output at lower frequencies that will add body to the sound and may just add a little colour too. Bass output starts to roll away below 80Hz. The port works at 60Hz and damps the bass driver effectively, making the Richmond tidy enough at low frequencies. It doesn't

go super-low but it should sound fast in bass quality.


Like other Castles the Richmond is an easy load as far as an amplifier is


concerned. Above 200Hz there's little reactance and impedance stays high. Castle use a 60hm bass unit, which draws less current than most, and the speaker measures out at 80hms overall - a high value nowadays. The downside is a mediocre sensitivity figure of 84dB SPL, so at any particular volume control setting the Richmond will not appear especially loud.

The Richmond is nicely balanced to give the Castle sound from a small loudspeaker. There may be

some colour from the upper-bass peak. NK W 165mm, H 280mm, D 205mm; weight 4.6kg

World Verdict Well finished and attractive, the Castle's image well and have good detail but could be a bit too warm and 'coloured' for some.

Monitor Audio's SI uses an attractive looking ceramic coated, aluminiummagnesium alloy cone bass unit with parasitic dust cap. It is mated to a gold anodised tweeter whose dome is made of the same alloy, only thinner to reduce mass. The SIs are neatly finished, and can be bi-wired. The rear panel carries a bass reflex port.

### **SOUND QUALITY**

Renee Fleming's voice was projected with a vividness that defied the other speakers of the group. Madame Butterfly had never sounded so clear, although there was a little bit of creaminess to the sound suggestive of some loss of midrange detail resolution. Classical works were generally reproduced with a vivid clarity that was almost startling; massed violins in Wagner's Reinzi Overture were wonderfully resolved as a cohesive orchestral section, although again I felt that individual violins seemed a little smeared together as a result of limited resolution. Woodwind came over as full and fruity though and the general sense of orchestral scale was well conveyed.

Toni Braxton's Spanish Guitar rather shook the SIs. Strong dynamics

energy spectrum showed the tweeter has a distinct sting to it, heard as strengthening of sibilance in 'wish' and 'Spanish'. I have heard worse; the SIs have quite fierce treble with recordings like this but although it made them sound a little clattery, there wasn't the coarseness that characterises really poor tweeters.

and an extended

Moving into DVD-A showed the S1s as clear, vivid and

dramatically forward, but the drive units do at times sound a little metallic. There is also a little boxiness that tends to keep the sound boxbound; I could not divorce the sound stage from the speakers in my mind as a result. Vocal harmonies from the Corrs were projected with a vivid clarity that defied the other loudspeakers and similarly Fleetwood Mac's 'Dreams', also on DVD-A, came across well.

The S1s have enthusiastic bass and were able to deliver a fairly convincing bass line with Toy Matinee's 'Last Plane Out' on DVD-A. However, the initial drum strike of Angelique Kidjo's 'Agolo' was muted



and the accentuated bass line of this track lacked fundamental energy. The S1s try hard, but they are unable to reproduce real lows.

Live speech from Radio 2 studio DJs interestingly highlighted the very specific qualities of the S1s, with superb vocal clarity, but emphasised sibilance and some boxiness, yet reasonably convincing tonal balance. These speakers are both vivid and characterful.

### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

The most unusual feature of this loudspeaker is a sharp rise in output at 20kHz from the tweeter. The output of most tweeters starts to decline here, as it should if dome behaviour is well damped. Although the +7dB peak in our analysis is visually obvious, luckily the effect should not be overtly audible, since the ear is insensitive at such high frequencies. A certain amount of "hiss" characterising treble quality may be evident with CDs that already contain strong treble though.

Otherwise, the Silver I has a flat frequency response that reaches down to 80Hz before forward output starts to roll away. A well damped port extends bass output downward, but all the same in small rooms the Silver I may well sound a bit dry or light in bass output. Measurement suggests the speaker is best used close to a real wall to gain some low frequency reinforcement.


The impedance characteristic is reasonably well controlled as modern loudspeakers go, but it has the usual inconsistency that comes about when a nominally 40hm (dB) bass unit is matched with an 80hm tweeter to enhance +5 sensitivity. There are minima of 3.60hms where current will be drawn, making this a demanding loudspeaker. All the same, the Silver I does go respectably loud, delivering 87dB SPL for one nominal Watt of input (2.84V).

Measurement reveals a competently designed loudspeaker, adhering to current practice. It will likely have a bright, but detailed sound.The

Silver 1 is fundamentally accurate. NK

Fine clarity and dynamics but are naturally forward which, whilst exciting, also means that the Silver S1s can be harsh at the top end when pushed.

# MORDAUNT SHORT MS912

The 912 is a large-ish speaker for a stand or bookshelf, but this should mean it has a little more bass oomph and in practice it does. Mordaunt Short use their own aluminium cone bass/mid-range unit, matched to an aluminium dome tweeter. A second-order crossover mates the two and bi-wire terminals are fitted. The rear panel carries a port.

### **SOUND QUALITY**

Uniquely in this group the MS912 displayed a cohesiveness that seamlessly matched tweeter to woofer, giving it a smooth and natural presentation apparently divorced from the cabinets producing the sound. Good small loudspeakers can do this, where small size and good surface wave behaviour conspire to give them a degree of projection beyond that of even large expensive loudspeakers. Better still, the 912s were aided by using similar cone/dome material, aluminium, which further reduces tonal discontinuity.

In balance the 912s have solid but supple bass, which goes low enough to handle rock bass lines, such as that of Angelique Kidjo's Houngbati. The emphasised bass line of this recording strode along firmly. There's a smooth, clear mid-band and easy, fluid treble, albeit with a little emphasis that on occasion can make itself known. Take a squeaky clean, dynamic DVD-A track like Larissa Stowe's Living In Your Eyes and the 912s really



deliver, with great dynamics, finely etched clarity and a good sense of revelation. They stay clean, although a little edginess to treble is there.

Going back in time to Janis Joplin's Me and Bobby McGee shows the 912s do a great job, in a modern way. They are a little bright in balance but resolve Joplin's gritty vocals superbly, bringing an old recording to life. Terry Wogan on Radio 2 sounded full bodied, and a little chesty coloration was evident, but his voice hung between the speakers in a very convincing manner. The 912s sound dramatic in this respect. With orchestral classical, massed violins were projected clearly yet cleanly, with superb detailing but natural tonal colour. The tweeter didn't screech or sound unpleasant here; the 912s handled classical well.

The 912 was nothing short of impressive. It offers levels of clarity, tonal resolution and dynamic contrast ahead of current standards. Together with superb imaging this loudspeaker offers extraordinary value.


### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

This is a chunky loudspeaker that looks as if it will be a bass machine. However, measurement shows it has well damped bass output with no attempt at bass peaking to give the sound extra weight. The port operates around 40-60Hz, high up the band relatively speaking, and over the same range as forward output. The port exerts strong damping over a potentially large fundamental cone resonance and this will translate into tight but enthusiastic sounding bass.


Like others, Mordaunt Short use a 40hm bass unit to achieve good sensitivity with solid-state amplifiers and the 812 produces a healthy 88dB SPL from one nominal watt of input, more than most rivals. It will be louder at any particular volume control setting as a result. Mordaunt Short disregard the affects of reactance upon amplifier feedback behaviour though.With an impedance curve like a camel's back the MS912 is very reactive.

Our frequency response analysis shows the 912 is pretty accurate and has well maintained treble output to 20kHz. It will likely sound bright and detailed.

The MS912 measures well enough in most areas but it is a difficult load, which in practice means it will interact with amplifiers more than most and highlight amplifier differences. W 205mm, H 355mm, D 315mm; weight 8kg

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# REGA ARA

The small Ara uses a shallow fibre cone bass/mid-range unit matched to a fabric dome tweeter. It can only be single-wired; bi-wiring is not possible. Nicely finished, this diminutive unit has a small rear port and is really best off close to a rear wall, due to its limited bass output.

### SOUND QUALITY

Live speech from Radio 2 showed the Aras don't suffer the same levels of box coloration as many of the other speakers in this group. However, they were quite obviously bright and even on Radio 2 - a mild and clean source - could sound strident.

Moving straight into the challenge of wideband DVD-A, the Corrs hit Breathless had the Aras again sounding very obviously bright, the tweeter coming across as relatively coarse by today's standards when excited by cymbals on this track. There was little sense of real depth resolution from the Ara and it seemed disinclined to eke out detail, offering a bland and cursory version of what was on this disc. The Ara, it seemed to me, sounded dated and crude, falling way behind the marketplace in general and today's requirements in particular.

Things looked up with Toy Matinee's 'Last Plane Out'. Here the Ara was faster, tighter and rhythmically more on the ball than any of the loudspeakers of the group. It moved from note to note with astonishing precision, giving it a time domain footprint free from slur, smear or overhang. However,



there was little deep bass and quite clearly this factor, together with low cabinet coloration was contributing to the loudspeaker's superb sense of timing. In a similar vein, Foreigner's Juke Box Hero, also on DVD-A, came across as clean and fast, but there was little in the way of real detail or stage depth, the two being linked.

The Ara gave a clean enough outline of events, but it did little to flesh out details. Toni Braxton's 'Spanish Guitar' better suited this loudspeaker's abilities, however, possessing razor sharp percussive transients and an almost-vicious grip on timing. Any listener focussing in on this aspect of behaviour could well rate the Ara above its competitors, but I would not.

The Ara will appeal to particular tastes. It offers an unrelenting sense of time-domain control that escapes its rivals. However, I don't suspect that will worry them unduly because the Ara forsakes much to achieve this.

### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

The small Rega uses unusual drive units and in some ways stands current convention on its head. Where nearly all modern loudspeakers use 40hm bass units for high sensitivity, Rega use an 80hm unit equipped with what looks like a lightweight paper cone. As a result the little Ara is an easy amplifier load, demanding little current, but it is sensitive all the same, producing 86dB SPL from one nominal Watt of input.


It's likely Rega have designed it this way in order to give amplifiers an easy time, which optimises sound quality. To what extent it does so depends upon the amplifier though and in this case there's a qualification: above 2kHz impedance plunges and the Ara becomes reactive, which Is less than ideal since it can affect amplifier feedback behaviour. This gives the Ara a peculiar range of properties as a load, both good and bad.


The Ara is a small loudspeaker and bass output from cone front radiation starts to roll down below 160Hz or so - quite a level high value. However, the roll (dB) off is slow and suits wall mounting, so the Ara isn't likely to sound balanced out on a stand. The port works at 63Hz, just right for fast, bouncy bass. Otherwise, frequency response is flat enough right across the audio band, suggesting good resolution of detail and a fast, precise sound.


The little Ara measures reasonably well, but it does differ from the norm. and will likely have it's own type of presentation. NK

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# UK SUBS

### Hi-Fi World listens to two contrasting subwoofers from two British bass specialists.

### MJ ACOUSTICS REFERENCE 1 £699

Although described as "compact"

by its makers, this is a medium sized (421x491x320mm) device which is very solidly built (at just under 21kg). The cabinetry is superb, constructed from a combination of sturdy 18mm and 25mm MDF panels, and looks beautiful if you're prepared to pay £100 extra for real wood finishes. Into this is bolted a down-firing bass driver sporting a solid die-cast aluminium chassis and 'one-piece' 10" long-throw aluminium cone, with a bonded aluminium voice coil.

Onboard amplification is a muscular 120W RMS DC-coupled affair.The Reference I's crossover is interesting, being computer controlled. This gets the silly acronym DAMP (Digitally Accurate MicroProcessor)! A digital display is featured, so that the upper response limit can be varied in increments between 30Hz and 120Hz, with the option of bypassing the filter circuit altogether. Balanced low-level XLR ins and outs are provided, plus conventional RCA phonos and gold plated Neutrik connectors.

For its price, the sub proved pretty good. I always find it hard to assess the value for money that subwoofers represent - after all they're pretty expensive things. It tightened the low bass up very impressively, and despite being able to deliver vast quantities of low frequency oscillations, it never buzzed or boomed once. The sub showed itself to be decently tuneful too. Despite its prodigious power, it showed impressive finesse and was able to seamlessly run up and down the fretboard of bass guitar without sounding rough or ragged. Well worth a dem then, if you've got an otherwise well sorted system needing some extra weight, although it doesn't quite cut the mustard as well as REL's Strata III, for example.

### REL QUAKE £350

For a subwoofer this is small - very small! Measuring just 29.4 x 25.3 x 27.2 cm the Quake is smaller than many subs supplied with computer 'speaker packages. However, this is no 'multimedia' product, it's primarily meant for linking up to your hi-fi or AV system (although linkage to a PC is an option). As part of the company's superb Q Series it adheres to the rest of the range's specifications and performance requirements.

The Quake is a sealed box design that uses a very long throw 8" drive unit featuring a vented pole plece, to help avoid power compression, along with a 100W mosfet amplifier. Despite its humble dimensions and price the Quake features the company's "ABC" roll-off filtering for seamless integration. We have REL's usual choice of either a Neutrik connection (high) input or a phono (low) input, each with its own gain control. There's also the usual four position mode switch for stereo/multichannel tuning and a slam/depth switch, plus a PC compatible input.

Providing you're not hoping to plumb the depths reached by the company's larger products, then the Ouake is a real eye - and ear opener. Using the Quake in both music and movie applications resulted in impressive listening. The depth setting should be used for music (the 'slam' is for movies where it delivers, er, less refinement). You'll get quite a civilised sound that can muster up impressive ambient sonics for classical music and deep tight bass with dance music or rock. It's tuneful and focussed with no slackness or flab.

This is a great choice for those with small or boomy rooms that want to use a sub that's not intrusive, yet is effective. It's not quite as visceral as the company's upper priced models but there's nothing with its small size on the market to touch it. Highly recommended.

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**World Radio History** 



Cyrus's newly tweaked 'audiophile DVD player' has just reached the shops. David Price sums up the new DVD7+.

> hen DVD players hit the market en masse, they set off a tsunami that

transformed the hi-fi landscape. After many years of turning out similar CD players year on year, with only minor tweaks and facelifts to distinguish them, the manufacturers found themselves being forced to work with different transports (designed for reading DVDs) and new DACs (working at up to 24bit, 192kHz in 5.1 channels). Suddenly the world turned upside down and the old established order was broken. This has resulted in a welter of new DVD players selling at the same price point as CD players had just a few years back. It has left many buyers dazed and confused.

Fortunately some companies like Cyrus still offer the choice - its widely acclaimed CD7 remains on the books at £800 (with the tweaked Q version retailing for £1150), while you can purchase its new 'audiophile DVD player' you see here, the DVD7+ for £1000. Both products have the option of using the PSX-R power supply at an additional £350 which I for one regard as a very worthy upgrade. Although the DVD7+ features video circuitry (obviously), much of its engineering and componentry is shared with the

# CD7, which is no bad thing.

True to tradition, it boasts a beautifully hewn, half-width 78x215x360mm case weighing 3kg, which is both anti-magnetic and nonresonant. All video and audio circuitry is kept separate in 'dual domains', to eliminate interference between the two. A backlit LC display is used, which - unlike rival machines' fluorescent displays doesn't generate interference. Extensive attention has been paid to clean power, with the result that the DVD7+ runs twelve fully regulated power supply lines, plus a toroidal mains transformer and star-earthing as per Cyrus's original Discmaster high end CD transport.

The specially isolated transport mechanism uses a dual laser pickup for optimum DVD and CD replay compatibility. A single, high accuracy master clock drives all major signal processing functions including MPEG decoding, video encoding, the onscreen display and audio decoding. This new 'plus' derivative of the DVD7 has a better On Screen Display, improved video features, wider compatibility with early 'problem' DVD discs, plus the PSX-R upgradeability which powers the motor and disc servo mechanism directly, and the option of Cyrus's Q7 plug-in audiophile DAC upgrade. The result is a machine that

looks and feels very much like the CD7, aside from the different display and menu systems, and marginally increased track access times - the time it takes to load and play an audio disc is a little annoying if you're coming from a dedicated CD player. Still it's a versatile little thing, reading DVD Video, DVD-R, DVD+RW and Video CDs, plus the usual audio CD/CD-R/CD-RW discs. Usefully, a DTS decoder is also included, making it compatible with a number of high quality DTS audio discs. Connections are all via the crowded rear panel aside from the usual video outs (Composite Video, S-Video, RGB via SCART), you get coaxial and optical digital outputs, RCA stereo line outs, plus Cyrus's MC-Bus remote connectors and the PSX-R port.

Suitably warmed through and hooked up to a Musical Fidelity A370 integrated and Yamaha NS1000M loudspeakers, the DVD7+ made deeply impressive noises for something whose major purpose in life is to play movies. Indeed, short of multi-thousand pound esoterica, I don't think I've heard a DVD spinner make a better job of my CD collection yet. Essentially, it's a very

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www.hi-fiworld.co.uk World Radio History clean and open sounding performer, with a particularly lucid midband and tight, tuneful bass.

Prefab Sprout's beautiful 'Cowboy Dreams' got a fitting rendition from the Cyrus. As soon as the first verse kicked in, I was struck by the DVD7+'s musical bass. Although a tad less sumptuous than a CD7, it made a sterling job of communicating exactly when each bass guitar note started and stopped, the result being a very bouncy and beguiling bottom end. Tonally it wasn't as fulsome as, say, and Arcam FMI CD23T, but the Cyrus still made an extremely musically coherent job of things. Again, although it didn't describe the texture of each note with forensic precision, the musical fundamentals were there in abundance, making every timing and phrasing nuance as clear as day.

Midband was an interesting area of the DVD7+'s performance. In one respect - that of front to back image projection and soundstaging, it was simply superb. It pushed out the vocals of The Dandy Warhols' 'Bohemian Like You' with tremendous authority, along with stacks of detail. You could delve right into the mix and hear a welter of guitars pounding away with great clarity. Strangely though, stereo perspective was someone curtailed - this player seeming unhappy to place images far to the left or right of the acoustic. The result was that this great slice of U.S. pop sounded a little shut in, and constrained.

Still, once again the Cyrus was rhythmically and dynamically right on the money. It's a very grippy performer by DVD standards (and pretty good by plain old CD player standards too), and just loves to go loud when called upon so to do. Yet it's also great with subtle dynamic accents, the result being a very engaging and musically satisfying sound. All in all - left to right imaging aside - this player boasts a superb midband for the money.

Its tonality was where it fell down a little. Unlike classic Cyrus CD players of yore, it doesn't have a particularly smooth and sumptuous sound. As Air's 'All I Need' proved, its upper midband is slightly 'thin' sounding. The player lacks the ability to really capture female voices in all their rich, resonant glory. The result is a rather matter-of-fact digital facsimile. It's not unpleasant to listen to, it's just that being so able in other respects, this kind of lets the side down. This is also obvious in the treble, which lacks finesse or atmosphere - again it's perfectly pleasant but simply not as 'airy' as it could be. Methinks this is where the £350 Q24 DAC module would work wonders.

Picture quality is impressive, too, less we forget that the machine performs another function! Fight sequences on 'Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon' were fast, furious and exciting with good clarity and resolution.

Overall then, I'd say this is the best sounding 'realistically' priced DVD spinner. It really is good enough to hold its own in the company of decent hi-fi CD players. Better still is its tremendous upgradeability. Knowing what the Q24 and PSX-R do to the CD7, I'd expect them to transform the DVD7+ into a CD spinner to be reckoned with at any price. Aside from its slightly slow disc transport then, I can't recommend this DVD too strongly - a brilliant, genuine crossover product and great value too.



The frequency response of this player stretched to 21kHz - fine for normal CD but inadequate for 96kHz sample rate audio where this is provided on a video DVD.Video players now commonly reproduce (analogue) audio up 48kHz, to convey the music energy above 21kHz found in modern recordings, but the DVD 7+ will not, which was a little disappointing. A smooth roll off at high frequencies will give it an easy going presentation with CD however.

At higher audio levels there was little distortion, but as level decreased linearity fell below that of a good CD player, the DVD 7+ producing 0.6% distortion. Whilst this isn't out of line with current DVD video players It Is no better either. Much the same figures were returned with 24bit sampled audio; little improvement occurred. The DVD 7+ returned lacklustre results for CD and was unable to exploit 24/96 digital code, so in audio terms it's measured performance is not distinguished. **NK**

If you think the days of analogue tuners are over, think again, says Simon Pope as he encounters Arcam's new T61 'budget' tuner.

Ithough a DAB tuner still exists at the upper end of Arcam's models (in the FMJ range), Arcam have resolutely stuck with analogue at the lower end. Their new £250 T61 FM/AM tuner is a bit of a bargain.

The T61 is well built and robust, yet with a modern, clean style. The display window is easy to read and comprehensive, with a signal strength meter on constant display between the preset number and the station name/frequency. The T61 is RDS compatible, the first such tuner from the company, and when no station name is available or one is required for AM (RDS is FM only), it can be programmed in by the listener. There are 30 presets available for FM and 6 for AM and there are a number of features such as two sets of audio outputs and rear connections for remote switching that make it custom install compatible. It comes with Arcam's CR-3889 audio system remote.

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A whole host of FM stations were easily found with just the supplied pink 'T' indoor aerial - and the strength of signal was good, too, in a usually poor area. This improved with a roof mounted external aerial. In both cases the sound was mightily impressive - matching that of the excellent and £150 more expensive Creek T43. Radio 3 was clean and voices well rounded and live broadcasts had a realistic quality. Something the T61 had in common with all the best tuners, in my view, was it's ability to make the best of studio processed stations. Radio I was full and rich sounding without the overt sibilance than can often occur. Bass was firm and tuneful and treble smooth - indeed with a good aerial the T61 almost matched the quality of my £750 reference Naim Nat 05, only lacking some of that tuner's low noise floor and ultimate refinement. A great buy and perhaps one of the last bargain analogue tuners.

The T61's frequency response runs smoothly up to 14.3kHz (-1dB) our analysis shows. This is a normal enough result for a good VHF/FM tuner. Above 15kHz a 19kHz pilot tone notch filter takes effect, providing a deep –70dB suppression to pilot and sub-carrier, so the T61 has a clean enough output.


Channel separation was a reasonable 35dB and distortion a low 0.1% or so under most conditions


Hiss measured -71dB (IEC A wtd) at full quieting. The norm is around -73dB so the T41 isn't the best. With a strong enough aerial signal to achieve full quieting, which measurement showed was 0.8mV, hiss will rarely be audible in use all the same.

Sensitivity was satisfactory at 50uV for stereo and 2.5uV mono.

The T61 turns in a neat set of results. It doesn't match the best, but measurement suggests it will offer a clean, natural sound. NK

company launched the Cyrus 3 integrated. This product started the new wave of Cyrus amplifiers that we have seen develop into their current range. It had superb build quality, using the die-cast case found in today's range, plus slick microprocessor controlled electronic switching, along with remote volume control. It was also at this time that the PSX-R external power supply appeared on the scene - it was the natural upgrade path for the company's electronics and offered a large reserve of regulated DC power. This increased the quality of the sound by offering a smoother and more detailed midrange along with improved focus.

The Cyrus arm of Mission became an independent group in October 1998 but, like Mission, is based in the UK's hi-fi capital of Huntingdon, having sales in excess of three million units a year. The company immediately started work on its '7' range of products and they were launched onto the market in the year 2000. The Cyrus 7 integrated amplifier had technology passed on and refined from the '3' series. Crucially, it also had the same high quality casework. This was one of the company's most appealing products and became something of a reference among hi-fi journalists and pundits. It offered a clean, tight, musical presentation that was also great value for money. By adding the PSX-R you had a serious audiophile product on your hands.

Now, as 2002 draws to a close we have the latest generation integrated from the company, the excellent Cyrus 8, reviewed in this very issue. There's no denying the 7 was a tough act to follow but the superb in-house R&D team at Cyrus have come up trumps with the Cyrus 8. The new amp has increased output power (80W per channel into 80hms) thanks to the inclusion of the beefiest power supply that could practically fit into the slim line case.

This gives the 8 greater drive capability than the 7 - which was relatively impressive anyway. A new power supply to the preamp section and higher grade capacitors developed the design into a dedicated pre/power combination in one box. The resulting sound is, as we found, an improvement on the 7 and a supremely musical performer with grip, transparency and smoothness in one domestically acceptable package. Partner it with the PSX-R power supply and the resultant sound is something akin to electronics twice the price.

And we have a Cyrus 8 integrated and PSX-R external power supply to give away. Simply answer all four questions correctly on a postcard to arrive no later than December 31st 2002. The first name out of the hat will soon be playing their favourite discs with the aid of Cyrus amplification!



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# Pioneer seek to bring high resolution audio the mass market with their new affordable 'universal' player, the DV-656. Dominic Todd is suitably impressed.

ever has a DVD player had so much to live up to as the Pioneer DV-656. Before I even set eyes upon it I knew that, if Pioneer gets it right, the DV-656 will be the hit of the year. The reason is that the DV-656 plays just about any disc known to man, and costs only £400 into the bargain. The last player to be so versatile (another Pioneer as it happened) cost the best part of £1000. Just for the record, as well as DVD, VCD and CD, the Pioneer will also play DVD-Audio, SACD, CD-R, CD-RW, DVD-R, DVD-RW and Compressed Audio Compatible MP3 files. In short, it will just about play everything, and means you don't have to worry about the ongoing battle between DVD-A and SACD as both are covered here.

Pioneer hasn't skimped on the socketry or features. There's a component video output, two Scarts, two S-VHS and, of course, a six channel output. The menu is clear and comprehensive, even with MP3 discs, which can catch some rivals out. It's also good to see Pioneer have included a zoom feature, something previous models lacked. It seems rather fruitless to list rivals as, in effect, there aren't any. However, Sony's DVP-NS905 is pretty good if you don't mind missing out on DVD-A, and Marantz's DV4200 OSE leads the field if you're not bothered by DVD-A or SACD!

To see if the new Pioneer really is a consummate all-rounder, or master of none, I began with a conventional video DVD, Swordfish, to assess picture and sound quality. In terms of picture quality the Pioneer is certainly a match for the best at this price. Compared with IVC's XV-SA72, which I tested earlier this year, the Pioneer had a far greater sense of depth. Images were bold and sharply defined, which allowed the DV-656 to still impress even on larger screens such as the 42" plasma I used for the test. Whilst flesh tones could have been a touch more realistic, I had no qualms with the contrast and colour definition which gave deep inky blacks and strong vivid reds.

In terms of sound quality, though, the Pioneer couldn't quite match the powerful dynamics of the Marantz DV4200 OSE. Digital steering was good though, and the Pioneer's overall level of refinement allowed for high volume levels without the viewer suffering an aural assault.

Switching to DVD-A, with Tchaikovsky's Waltz of the Flowers, opened up the sound stage noticeably. Background noise was extremely low, which enhanced the dynamics and brought out detail nuances within the music. String tone was a little syrupy, although this could well have emanated from the recording. Over all, however, the DV-656 demonstrated that there is plenty of potential in the format. Its sound with DVD-A was spacious and lively, with ambience and air aplenty.

Unsurprisingly, much the same was true when using the SACD decoder. I had a David Bridie disc to hand that has both conventional and SACD layers. Again, the SACD format showed improved dynamics, fine detail and excellent timing. Having said that, against a conventional CD player of this price, such as the Rotel RCD 1070, with CD quality the Pioneer did lack a little in terms of weight and body of sound. Prokofiev's Dance of the Five Couples, played by the Berlin Philharmonic, sounded just a little too polite and lacking weight and authority. On the plus side, however, the timing was fleet of foot, string tone very sweet, and the whole performance well staged and refined - good traits at this

price. Instrumental timbre was far better than many DVD players can manage and I doubt its performance with classical music would offend too many.

Jennifer Warnes 'Big noise, New York' had similar characteristics. It lacked impact in the bass, which rather spoiled the dynamic contrast. But again, there was fine separation and a distinct vocal rendition. The whole song was portrayed in a fluid yet not especially engaging manner.

There's no denying the DV-656 is one heck of a bargain, but I have to say that it was a slight disappointment when it comes to CD replay. Compared to a conventional CD player of the same price it lacks the depth of sound and involvement. Rather like the JVC SA72 it reminded me of a competent, refined £200 CD player, but not one costing twice the price. However, things certainly improve with SACD and DVD-A, yet not by as much as you might imagine. Strangely, I still preferred the standard performance of Bridie's 'Dive' on the Rotel than the two channel SACD version on the Pioneer.

That's the criticism's out of the way. Simply to compare the Pioneer with a CD player of the same price is rather missing the point. No CD player offers multi-channel sound or pictures, and these are areas in which the DV-656 simply excels. As a conventional DVD player the Pioneer is already one of the best at its price in terms of picture and sound quality. It certainly has JVC beaten, and can easily match rivals from Sony and Toshiba.

Music lovers should look upon the SACD and DVD-A chips as a handy addition rather than a crucial reason for buying this machine. If you do so, then you should be delighted with your purchase. Buy it expecting the finest sonic performance available at the price though, and you'll be disappointed - remember it's only £400. It represents a good buy for an audiophile who still uses a top spec turntable and CD player yet wants a machine for A/V use that will also bridge the gap whilst the new audio formats develop.

The Pioneer's strengths lie in its astonishing features and compatibility at a price point which was previously unattainable. Because of this alone it deserves to succeed. It is a very tempting proposition for a whole range of customers, since it matches almost all needs.

### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**


Pioneer's budget universal player is no second-rate cousin to its firstgeneration DV-747A, despite the ~107dB A-wtd S/N ratio falling below the 110dB recorded for the inaugural machine. Its performance is largely determined by Pioneer's choice of Burr-Brown DACs, with PCM1738's at the front and dualchannel PCM1702's for the surround, centre and subwoofer channels. These DACs will accept both PCM (DVD-A and CD) and DSD (SACD) data, addressing both to a single bitconverter.

Distortion is low at just 0.009% with 16bit CD data but falls still further to 0.0006% with 24bit DVD-A and 0.0003% with SACD at -3dBFs. High frequency performance is far better than that achieved by the DV-747A, with 20kHz distortion reduced from 0.04% to 0.006% and maintained as low as 0.007% at 40kHz with 96kHz and 192kHz DVD-A. Graph I shows that SACD's ultrasonic output is dominated by the characteristic sweep of noise (bright blue trace) which, while burying the harmonics and digital spuriae present with DVD-A (dark blue trace), also progressively reduces its dynamic range at higher frequencies. This is one of the subjective trade-offs between the two formats, as is the susceptibility of the partnering amplifier to SACD's higher noise levels.

SACD does not require digital filtering, unlike CD/DVD's PCM data, but its response is still affected by the <analogue> filtering implemented to keep this noise under control.As such, the DV-656A is pretty flat to 30kHz, rolling-off thereafter to -0.9dB/40kHz, -3.6dB/60kHz, -8dB/80kHz and -14.7dB/100kHz.With 192kHz DVD-A, the player is just -5.5dB down at 80kHz. Finally, as depicted by Graph 2, digital jitter is impressively low at 180psec particularly bearing in mind the 'hybrid' nature of the player. The red markers show this is primarily low-level data-induced jitter in origin. Overall, the DV-656A represents a remarkable combination of technologies for the price. PM

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# TRI THIS FOR SIZE



Musical Fidelity have hit the market with apparently their finest amplifier to date, the Tri-Vista 300 integrated. Heard it all before? Simon Pope thought he had. . .

he first products to be launched in Musical Fidelity's new Tri-Vista range are the 300 integrated amplifier seen here, and a stereo CD/SACD player. Both are of tremendous proportions, if not quite as gargantuan as the A-470 and A-570 of yore.

The 300 integrated has an external power supply that weighs nearly as much as the massively proportioned amp itself. It is connected by two fat, Neutrik terminated, connecting cables (one for each channel) and a single XLRtype pre-amp power cable. The beautifully finished front panel is adorned with two luxuriously oversized knobs - for volume and source selection - that have a wonderful weighted feel in operation. This doesn't leave much for anything else! Four bright blue LEDs illuminate the centre section, one for each channel's preamplifier stage and one each for the power amp section. In the middle of these there is a button for tape monitoring and the remote control sensor. Gone is the gold trimming of the Nu-Vista M3 integrated for a cleaner and more striking look.

Perhaps most striking of all are the feet which - wait for it - change colour! Fear not, it's not actually as tacky as it may sound. Whilst in standby mode, the lights that illuminate the feet are red; when in operational mode they then turn to amber for around forty-five minutes until the amp is fully warmed up, then they change to - and remain blue (breaking with the traffic light theme). This is all done quite subtly, by the way, and doesn't detract from what you're listening to. Those expecting a light show in the style of a Wurlitzer juke box will be a tad disappointed.

As far as connections are concerned, the 300 is adequately geared-up. We have line inputs for CD, SACD (catering for the upcoming SACD player, no doubt), tuner, aux and a tape loop. There's also an internally switchable MM/MC phono input as found in most upper bracket Musical Fidelity amplifiers. Hefty bi-wire binding posts are located at the rear for loudspeaker connection.

### **BOMB TRACK**

When it comes to internal design the most obvious difference this amp has to the competition is the inclusion of a 'trivistor' valve (see information



box). The 'trivistor' is, like the nuvistor, a miniature tube which was designed solely for military use. Its apparent sonic traits are low microphony, good reliability and a rugged, robust build. So tough are they that they were apparently designed in response to the effects of a nuclear explosion upon solid-state electronics - tough enough for you?

Musical Fidelity managed to procure a batch of these little monsters towards the end of the year 2000 and judged their anniversary range to be a suitable platform for this tube's tubes' strengths. Musical Fidelity's own tests have apparently shown that the

trivistor has an approximate life of around 100,000 hours (lifetimes usage) from each set. The 300 has a totally unique

circuit topology and the output has its own, separate choke regulated power supply. It's a true dual-mono configured integrated. A separate power supply is also used for the driver stage, which has its own dedicated transformer.

Musical Fidelity claim that due to this configuration, large swings of output voltage and current do not affect earlier stages. An isolated power supply like this enables the 300 to produce a massive amount of power, without hum problems from the huge transformers required. Not only are the amp's dimensions big, so is its power output - the company claim no less than 340W into 80hms.

### **BIG SMOOTHIE**

I set up the 300 with an Audio

Analogue Maestro CD player and Musical Fidelity's own Tri-Vista SACD player (more of which next month) for the front end, my trusty Quad ESL-988s were hauled out for use and cabling was courtesy of the Chord Company and Ecosse Reference.

Being Musical Fidelity I expected the Trivistor would sound big, bold and transparent, with oodles of headroom. This was so. What I didn't expect was the innate smoothness of the 300 - a very different property from the latest batch of MF products. In this respect the Tri-Vista 300 was a total shock. Just as the company's statement Nu-Vista 3D CD player surprised with a decidedly different but highly effective way with the music's top end, so the 300

integrated does the same with not only the upper frequencies but also its comprehensive subtlety. For an amp with such evident power it also does delicacy very well. This is no muscle-bound fatneck, it's quite a sophisticate that has a way of playing music, first and foremost. Mahler's Das Lied Von Der Erde On a

> wonderfully transparent

Reference Recordings CD showed immediately the 300's warmth. This is a highly detailed recording and as a result can sound a little cold and detached with much equipment. The 300 focussed in straight away on what mattered, such as instrumentalist's phrasing and orchestral section coherence. Instrumental colour was very impressive too, with woodwind and strings - especially violins - having a natural sounding tone. There was a good sense of space and air here that wasn't always realised with lesser recordings due to the 300's concentration on phrasing.

Equally impressive was a recording of Trevor Pinnock working his way through the sublime Bach Partitas on that most telling of instruments, the harpsichord. This is a splendid disc for testing out systems as it has great ambience and the instrument can stress both extremes of the frequency spectrum, as well as

speed.A harpsichord through a hard edged amp can take your fillings out (Beecham's comment about "two skeletons copulating on a tin roof" springs to mind) but with the 300 it sounded perfectly natural and neutral, too. Speed and dexterity were good, if perhaps not the zippiest I've heard (although this amp is no slouch) but the overall sound was beautifully focussed and 'whole', with detail exemplary. Feeding an SACD of Fauré and Ravel's piano trios into the 300 resulted in, again, a feast of phrasing and sheer enjoyment, with the string playing visceral and realistic. Piano had a good, rounded tone too, with no harshness or tonal 'hang-over'. This recording emphasises the depth and three-dimensionality of the amp. the sound field stretched way back to the rear wall.

Miles Davis's ubiquitous 'Kind Of Blue' was next on and the silky smooth nature of the playing on this recording suited the 300 superbly. It wasn't too rich for the blood, though, as there remained a freshness of detail which stopped it all turning to slush. Drums had great detail (such as the subtle brushwork on the snare in 'Flamenco Sketches') and the natural tone of each instrument highlighted the individuality of each participant more than usual.

With rock and pop music the 300 doesn't have the forwardness and edge of other Musical Fidelity amps that some rock aficionados crave. It still sounds big and superbly powerful, though. Soundgarden's 'Superunknown' had a massive, fruity sound. In places a howler of a recording but the 300 made pretty consistent work of it, which is no bad thing in my book - although some purists may disagree.

Feed the 300 with a top drawer recording and it takes it to another level. There's an incredible amount of power and drive on tap but it's channeled into other areas such as depth of field and overall control as opposed to sheer ballsy clout. The detailed recording of Paul Weller's 'Stanley Road' was impressive, exhibiting for the first time the amp's simply awesome bass extension. Drums were fast and muscular and the overall sound had a grippy bounce that is often the trait of top quality pure valve designs with



'proper' output transformers. Imaging was also impressive, stretching the soundstage wide through the electrostatics.

#### **TRI'D AND TESTED**


Whilst undeniably impressive the 300 is actually hard to describe. Just like the 3D CD player that surprised me last year, the 300 plays music and recordings you think you knew well with new insight - but you can't exactly pin point why. It sounds incredibly different to many rivals, which makes it a truly endearing product. To give you some idea, this isn't a high-end sound in the somewhat dry and sterilised (but still impressive) American tradition of, say, Pass Labs or Krell. Here, the sound is more in the high-end Italian or Sugden mould, but with more immediate slam, where music becomes the primary concern and very much a living thing.

It's also somewhat different in sound to the company's other amps and this point should be emphasised. It has their detail retrieval and muscle, but delivers it in an altogether more complete way and with more fluidity. The result is that it excels with classical music ranging from solo piano to full orchestral, but those who crave Naim NAP500-like attack with their rock music may be a little disappointed.

Nothing is sacrificed for the smoothness though. Treble is smooth but remains highly detailed (although a bright front end in the shape of Sony's XA-

555ES SACD player resulted in a harsher sound). Bass is still deep and tight but more rounded, and midrange is beautifully transparent without become scientific. There's smoothness and body to the sound but it remains incredibly neutral.

For a classical or jazz music lover its very, very difficult to get an amplifier as good or better than this at the price - or even at twice the price. Although incredibly powerful, hardcore rock fans may find its fluidity not to their liking, but that



depends upon the type of Rock to be played and expectations. The speed and slam of upcoming DVD-A - in stereo of course! - is a potential counterbalance too. If you want extreme power with superb grace the new Trivista 300 is quite exceptional.

## WHEN IS A TRIVISTOR NOT A TRIVISTOR?

When it's a 5703WB! Actually, there's no such thing as a 'trivistor' valve. Just who was stringing who along here is a tough call but basically the valves found inside the 300 are 5703WB models made by an American company called Raytheon. The nuvistor was indeed called a nuvistor but in a metal casing - the 5703WB is glass, like a real audio tube! The 'tri' is relevant in as much as that it is a triode designed tube. This is indeed a military valve that was used, as the MF batch testify, by both the Army and Navy.




#### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

The Trivista 300 follows in Musical Fidelity's tradition of building huge power-house amplifiers, often with choke regulated power supplies. The 300 turns out no less than 300W into 80hms and a massive 500W into 40hms. It does it with alacrity too, distortion levels hovering right down at miniscule levels of 0.003% or so, much of this coming from the test generator.

It takes a large, multi-driver design to be able to absorb such power without overheating and turn it into reasonably undistorted sound in the room. However, big amps like this, if well engineered, do sound both dynamic and relaxed in use when producing a fraction of their rated output and measurement suggests the Trivista 300 will sound refined as well as powerful, like its predecessors. It measures very well. **NK**

impressive. A very smooth, powerful and sophisticated sound that often delights with subtlety as well as muscle.



The next stage in the re-emergence of Exposure Electronics is the launch of the new Classic Range of products. Simon Pope listens to the CD player, the XXII.

he first range of products from the newly launched Exposure Electronics departed with the Roman numerals of the company's

earlier models in favour of a '2010' series label. Now Exposure have reintroduced the Roman numerals for their latest, more expensive and specialist range, known as the Classis Series. This consists of a preamplifier, power amplifier, external phono stage and the XXII CD player featured here.

Gone are the bright blue LEDs of the entry level range for subtle red lights and displays. Basic design principles are just that. We have a solid but hardly Sherman tank-like chassis fronted by a fairly thick aluminium machined fascia. This houses a row of six metal buttons for basic operational commands and the red display window which reveals, when switched on, the familiar calendar configuration of a Sony mechanism.

Despite the somewhat uncharismatic look of the XXII, there's a serious number of quality components that make this an altogether different proposition to the 2010 CD player. It has one high quality PCM1704 DAC per channel (as opposed to the one PCM1716 stereo DAC in the 2010) which provide a high resolution signal to separate current-to-voltage convertors. These in turn feed the filter and output stage which is based on discrete transistors (the 2010 uses an IC filter/output stage). The clock oscillator is fed from two regulators in series which Exposure say ensures a very stable low jitter clock for both the DAC and the transport.

The transformer has separate sections for the transport and audio stages and the audio stage is fed from a high capacity supply that uses multiple stages of regulation. Finally, the custom made smoothing capacitors are of a higher value and grade from those used in the 2010. Outputs consist of BNC and optical outputs, plus the usual two RCA analogues.

The XXII has to hold its own in this sector of the market, as it's very strong indeed with players such as the Meridian 507, Naim CD5, Arcam FMJ23 and, if its predecessor is anything to go by, the new NAD S500i. This is a mean line up, all of them have the strengths a quality player in this region should have, namely detail and musical insight, along with smoothness and superior build quality.

On the build quality side perhaps the XXII lags a little behind, as it has neither the weight nor robustness of any on this list. For another couple of hundred quid more you're in the up-sampling, heavyweight league of the super smooth Audio Analogue Maestro (which we had around for comparison, along with a Meridian 507 and the NAD 'non-i' version S500).

When I first hooked up the XXII to the system (consisting of a Cyrus 7 & PSX-R power supply and Quad's ESL988s with an MJ Acoustics Pro 100 sub for lower duties) first impressions were somewhat unexciting. It sounded a tad veiled and uninvolving. However, after a good hour or so, when all the system components were in full flow, it started to sound like a genuine £1,000 mark player. More subtleties were discernable and detail increased, along with involvement. It showed itself to have a fast and grippy sound much in the Naim mould that although on the dry side was also very clear. This was displayed best in a JVC 20bit K2 'Blue Dumplings' disc of Japanese jazz pianist Mikio Masuda. The four instruments had great separation and there was a good, spacious spread of sound across the stage. The piano was solid and rounded, although the XXII appeared to concentrate more on the rhythmic qualities of the instrument as opposed to timbre and colour.

Initially the sound was very smooth, almost too smooth, but at the entrance of the ride cymbal it opened up and started to sparkle, which was a nice surprise. Bass depth was commendable but not as deep as



the likes of the Meridian 507 or the Audio Analogue Maestro. However, the bass is very tight and tuneful and perhaps because of this a bit more natural, which ironically may not appeal to some. With 'Kind Of Blue' the same precision of sound was encountered.Good detail in the form of snare brushwork and even good old tape hiss was discernable. Whilst the instruments were again nicely separated and exact, when Coltrane's sax entered it had a slightly grey, shouty tone which distracted me somewhat from the laid back cool of the music.

Putting the Foo Fighters latest blistering album into the XXII's drawer saw the player reacting appropriately. After the dead-pan intro of Dave Grohl's guitar and voice, the song erupts into an inyour-face onslaught. The XXII responded with a fully involving and precise account of what was happening, with good bass extension that wasn't revealed with the simple, acoustic jazz recordings. This music can make cheaper CD players sound pretty rough and harsh but as well as speed and involvement there was a sense of control and smoothness with the Exposure that wouldn't have been present with its half-priced 2010 brother.

The XXII is a more serious CD player than it, at first, seems. Whilst controlled and smooth to a certain extent, it is also quite realistic. This takes away some of the silky covering which many listeners like to calm down the natural harshness of the CD format. 'Smoother' players such as the Audio Analogue Maestro deliver a more cohesive and organic picture and the Meridian house style is better balanced and more ambient overall, but the XXII gives a fine account of itself. Although its sound is fast and rhythmic, it never escapes the leash. The new XXII just about squeezes itself into the upper echelons of the CD market our comparisons show and, with its distinctive delivery, it is worthy of consideration.

Having enjoyed some modest success with its 2010 CD player, Exposure has decided to tickle-up the brew by replacing its PCM1716 DAC with a PCM1704, a newer chip from the same Burr-Brown stable. In practice, distortion is fractionally higher in the XXII, not sufficiently to cause subjective alarm but more than enough to distinguish it from the 2010. So, at its 2V peak output, distortion reaches 0.003% (0.001%), increasing to 0.007% (0.001%) at -10dBFs and 0.009% (0.005%) at -30dBFs. The figures in brackets are those for the CD2010 under identical conditions. At 20kHz, the XXII's output includes a 2nd harmonic that adds up to 0.018%.


The response of our sample was

also modified with a much more obvious treble roll-off, amounting to -0.8dB at 20kHz. Figure (1) indicates that the CD2010's response is ruler flat though, having tested a number of XXII's at Exposure's factory, I can say that a figure of -0.3dB is more common. On a more positive note, jitter is reduced to a mere 140psec while the PCM1704's superior digital filter offers >105dB rejection of digital images, comparing favourably with the 79dB offered by the PCM1716. The overall S/N ratio is up too, with the XXII providing a 3-4dB advantage at 103dB.

Taking all this on board, while the XXII does not represent a significant technological advance on the 2010, it does offer an alternative slant on a modern-day classic. It's all about choice. **PM**

# FRONT C

## KEF's famous Uni-Q designs are a perennial favourite with audiophiles. Alan Sircom listens to the top dog in the latest range to feature Uni-Q, the floorstanding Q7.

EF is usually bang on the money with its loudspeakers, but every now and again it comes up with something special. The £800

KEF Q7 is a prime example of this – it's one of the best in the KEF catalogue, KEF's more expensive XQ and Reference speaker ranges notwithstanding.

The Q7 is top of the Q Series speaker system. It's a three-

way design, two drive units being combined in one Uni-Q unit at top:This features a 19mm aluminium dome tweeter within a 165mm plastic midrange cone driver. Low frequencies come from a 228mm x 152mm oval plastic driver that KEF call a

'Racetrack' cone. The speaker has a pair of ports; a small round one at the front which loads the Uni-Q unit, and an oval design round the back, which does allow a high degree of alteration and tweakery with foam bungs that are supplied. The Q7 is at its most free sounding when completely bung-free, but depending on positioning, the front, rear

or both bungs in place can fine-tune out nasty resonances. This allows a good deal of personal tailoring to be applied, to suit the different characteristics of particular listening environments.

The Q7 can be bi-wired. It is magnetically shielded and beautifully finished in a wrap-round ash veneer. Despite the cabinet's fairly meaty proportions, it's not a particularly heavy speaker though, and the drivers make it top-heavy, so spiking into a wooden floor is best for stability. Unlike 'speakers from Mission and Tannoy, the Q7s have no chamber for mass loading with sand, reinforcing the need for spiking down.

For best results the Q7s must be run-in, bi-wired and partnered with good quality equipment. I gave the review samples a few weeks of replay to get the best from them. The loudspeaker sets a good standard straight away, but improves and improves over weeks. Bi-wiring – or better still – bi-amplification makes the Q7 considerably better at separating treble from midband and bass. It's not exactly muddy at the worst of times, but it is worth the extra.

Although the Q7 works well with similarly-priced electronics - a Rega Planet CD player and the Audio Analogue Puccini SE amplifier spring to mind - it won't let the side down when partnered with exotic kit. This 'speaker works with valve amplifiers and decent, solid sounding CD players. It is slightly less happy with vinyl and rhythmically-oriented solidstate amplification (Naim-users take note!). That 'Racetrack' bass driver needs a lot of driving however, so either choose a big, powerful solidstate amplifier or a valve amplifier (40hm) with a good set of transformers.

Good KEF Uni-Q designs are often an ideal tool for reviewers, as they offer stark insight into changes elsewhere in the system. The Q7 is no exception, although it is not as system fussy as it could be. Change a cable or table, or use a new gizmo and you can hear the difference readily through the Q7. This is both good and bad; good because that level of detail means there is a wealth of information on show, but bad because it can cause audiophillia nervosa, constantly switching components and accessories to find some unattainable hi-fi nirvana.

One of the joys of the UniQ system is its off-axis response. For example, there's no need to toe them in dramatically and consequently their 'sweet spot' is wider than most designs. The extended dynamic range of the speaker gives it a visceral, realistic presentation. This becomes especially noticeable with vocals, which stand out with great clarity and solidity in three-dimensional space. It also suits SACD and DVD-Audio's extended frequency range, although not as well as the new XQ range, with their dedicated 'hyper-tweeters'.

Overall, the Q7's sound coherent right across the audio range, without over or understatement. This also makes the speaker a great musical leveller, as it puts no emphasis on any genre of music over another, all of which suggests that finding the perfect disc to describe a particular aspect of the performance of the speaker is almost impossible. The Q7 is dynamic enough to make mincemeat of Mahler or Prokofiev, lucid enough to bring out all the detail in hi-fi oriented discs like Rare on Air or Bruce Springsteen's 'Ghost of Tom Joad' and even has all the drive needed to keep up with The Strokes, which sounded fast and









controlled, without the 'muddle' that can occur with lesser designs. The only obvious fingerprint of the Q7 is its 'big' sound. Whatever you listen to, it sounds larger than most other 'speakers.

Big sound notwithstanding, the speaker has plenty of detail on offer. This becomes apparent with difficult to define vocals, usually male vocals that are deliberately badly recorded (like The Strokes, for example). For once, you get to hear past the distortion of the microphone and still follow the diction of the singer.

So, why spend any more money on a more expensive speaker? What is missing is that elegance and grace of a Sonus Faber speaker, the warmth of a top-end Castle design like the Howard, the gutsy punch of a Naim speaker or the absolute clarity of a Quad Electrostatic. The Q7 offers a good sense of balance between all the value of which shouldn't be underestimated. It has balance - and if you want more whilst retaining this property, you need to part with a larger sum of money.

Ultimately, the KEF Q7 is a fantastic bit of hi-fi performance without a fantastic hi-fi price. It is also a fine no-nonsense speaker, too; it does best with high-end kit, but doesn't automatically require it. Tweaking and careful selection of matching equipment pay dividends I found and the Q7 may end up being the cheapest part of your hi-fi system!




The O7 is a little different from the norm, It uses KEF's own co-axial Uni-Q driver where a tweeter fires out through the centre of the bass/mid cone, providing a nearperfect point-source. The benefit is even dispersion and a consistent sound from all listening angles. The unit predictably gives smooth, even output right across the audio band under measurement. Our analysis shows this quite clearly. It also shows that output from the tweeter is rolled down smoothly at high frequencies, possibly to ensure that some peaking at 8kHz doesn't make itself aurally intrusive. With output up to 10kHz well maintained though the Q7 is likely to sound fairly clear and bright all the same.

The main Uni-Q driver is loaded by a reflex enclosure with a front vent, whilst the large bass unit has its own chamber with rear vent. Forward radiation from the bass unit reaches down to 40Hz, whilst the rear port works down to 20Hz. Not surprisingly the Q7 goes low and the dedicated bass unit unit will give it good power handling, plus low bass distortion.

Big floor standers are usually sensitive. However, although 88dB is good, in truth it isn't exceptional in view of the fact that the Q7 uses a 40hm bass unit and has a measured nominal impedance of just 50hms. It draws current as a result and is quite a tough load, made worse by significant reactance across most of the audio band. It may seem rather more amplifier sensitive than most loudspeakers as a result

The Q7 is likely to sound focussed and muscular, in view of its drive unit line up and measured response. It needs to be partnered with a good strong amplifier though. **NK**

I have been buying Hi-Fi World since the first issue, although this is the first time that I have asked for your opinions. My hi-fi has remained unchanged for around seven years or so and consists of both turntable and CD front end - Roksan DP I and DA I and LP I 2 with Ittok. Over the last few years emphasis has changed from turntable to CDs. Amplification is generally all Rotel - RHB I 0, RHC I 0 and RHQ I 0 plus an EAR 845P which is used from time to time. Speakers are Sonus Faber Electa.

I am very happy with the sound quality. However, I feel that it is time for an update and I can use the Roksan in a second system (Quad 33/303 ESL57s).

As it will probably be my last purchase of a CD player I wish to update and improve my existing system without deviating too far from the sound style that I have. Would you please suggest a replacement for my CD and secondly make alternative suggestions for improvement that you feel would be beneficial. The budget for the CD is up to £4000 and say another £2000 for other changes if considered necessary.

One aspect that I find particularly irritating about my system is the difficulty in getting set-up instructions out of Linn for the LP12, so I would like to buy a "last" turntable to overcame this frustration. I could budget separately for this. Regards.

Greetings to all our readers in Abu Dhabi! Whilst this question may on the surface seem a simple one it opens up a real can of worms. Should you go for the best CD reproduction you can afford or would your money be better spent on a top-grade SACD, DVD-A or universal player? If you plan to make this your last purchase of a source player you have to make sure it will last you in years to come, not just when it comes to reliability but also in relation to software. This said though, CD will be around for many years to come and its highly unlikely that either DVD-A or SACD will take over as primary music carriers for at least another ten years or so, if at all.

I take it that you're not interested in surround-sound and wish to stick with two channel only, too.

So, first let me recommend a few CD-only players. There are a couple of obvious choices that spring to mind. Audionet's awesome ART V2 is a real German heavyweight contender, with strap-mounted transport, a granite base and top loading mechanism giving it esoteric high-end appeal. It also sounds superb, too. It has smoothness (not always the way with German hifi) and splendid detail and an overall grip over the music that is irresistible. It is pretty good value at £2,400.

Another option in your price bracket is Wadia's 'budget' 301 CD spinner at  $\pounds$ 3,650. This is one of the most 'analogue' sounding CD players around and has a variable output, so it can be connected straight to a power amplifier. Like the Audionet, build quality is superb and you'll want to play all of your collection over and over again just to remind yourself of how good it sounds. It's surprisingly uncomplicated and easy sounding for such a high-end disc player, with superb timing and delicate, subtle phrasing too.

Two 'limited edition' CD-only options to look out for secondhand are Marantz's excellent CD7 (when Marantz get it right, they really do) and Musical Fidelity's Nu-Vista 3D. Neither of these will be cheap secondhand buys as they're collectors' items, but they show what can be done with CD.

Next is to consider a 'combination' player. The first SACD player, the classic Sony SCD-1, is an excellent stand alone unit and offers the best build quality money can buy. It also plays CDs, of course, but only in two channel, so it's somewhat of a dinosaur in these days of multichannel hi-fi (although the latest Musical Fidelity Tri-Vista SACD player is only stereo!).An SCD-1 can still be picked up from a retailer for not much above £2000, which is a top-rank bargain in my view.

For a multichannel CD/SACD option, the Marantz SA-12SI is a brand new and safe buy at  $\pounds$ ,3500.

Going the DVD-Audio route you can afford Meridian's 569 DVD-A player which will not only play DVD-Audio discs but also CDs to an extremely high standard, with the capability of movie-watching as an added bonus.

As for your turntable, keep the LP12/Ittock. I've contacted Linn and there is a dealer down the coast in Dubai that is trained in LP12 setup who could help you out. As an added extra, it would be worth investing in one of the new Linn Lingo power supplies (recognisable from the old version by its 'full' size, not shoebox appearance). This will bring added sonic delights to your vinyl replay, with greater focus and depth. Staying with the Linn theme, their top specification MC, the Arkiv, although not cheap, will give a smooth and fluid sound combined with good detail.

Otherwise, if you like more top end detail spend your money on an Ortofon Kontrapunkt B for around £650. **SP**

#### **MISSIONS POSSIBLE?**

My system consists of the following: Linn Sondek/Ittok 2/Roksan Corus Black, Arcam Alpha CD, Naim 72/140/Snaps, Linn Helix II Speakers. I'm very happy with the sound but following a major redecoration of the living room my wife has questioned the possibility of replacing the speakers with some floorstanders finished in a light wood veneer. Looking at past issues I came across Noel's review of the Mission M73 and wonder if they might fit the bill. They're about to be upgraded so are available at prices as low as £100.

My musical tastes are wide and varied - do you think these speakers could fit the bill? My next upgrade is likely to be a new CD player which I would look to acquire second-hand for up to £500. Any suggestions? Many thanks,

The Mission M73s you mention are indeed fine loudspeakers for their (very) modest retail price, but your Linns were considerably more expensive when new and this fact is still reflected in their respective sound qualities. The Missions will not represent any kind of upgrade on your Linns - you'll find them more closed in, dynamically compressed and ragged, although they may well image slightly better and have faster bass (such are the oft-unsung benefits of standmounters).

If your budget is limited, as you imply, I'd advise you to think in terms of picking up a second-hand pair of early nineteen nineties Epos ESII, Harbeth HL-P3, ProAc SuperTablettes or even the original Linn Kan (in Mk I or Mk 2 guise).

If you really must have a 'modern' looking standmounter then a great buy would be a pair of late nineties Mission 75 I s. For the best possible sound use Linn Kan II stands, or Atacama SE24s if you want something more visually contemporary. Any of these loudspeakers would give a considerably better sound than the M73s. And fortunately, the rest of your system is good enough to get the best from any of the aforementioned.

As for a sub £500 second-hand CD player, it depends on how old you want to go. Obviously you could afford some amazing early nineties designs (Marantz CD94, Pioneer PD-91 etc.), but I'd go for a reasonably 'fresh' Cyrus dAD3Q or Marantz CD-17KIS. DP


#### **DRIVE ME CRAZY**

I need help with some conflicting advice.I have been listening for some months now to Harbeth HL-P3 "miracle shoeboxes" using Marantz CD19 and PM19 which are baby sisters to CD17 & PM17. The PM19 has a 'nice' 60W of output but I suspect not enough to control the 83dB, 60hm Harbeths. I would dearly like to use a valve power amp but have been advised that the low sensitivity of the Harbeths means that affordable valve amps would be too low powered. Another opinion suggests 25W Class A solid-state is more than enough, whilst a local manufacturer says 120W MOSFET power is "adequate". What would be the minimum valve power rating you would recommend? Or should I forget valves and go for something like MF 3.2 or Arcam 85.

lar sounding device. The obvious choice is Unison Research's £800 Unico integrated which has great build, a sweet little R.F. remote and a big, rounded and smooth sound with around 80W of muscular power.

Staying in Italy, an Audio Analogue Puccini SE would fit the bill nicely, too.

On UK shores, you're right to mention Cyrus. This company actually has a sound that is closer to the hybrid/Class A mould than most of the solid-state competition but has plenty of power to drive tough loads, too. A simple choice like the Cyrus 7 would do well, but a pair of SmartPower amps would give you the same sound with that bit more clout. **SP** 



Another suggestion is to add Marantz SM17 and bi amp the Harbeths or just add a good solid-state power amp such as Cyrus SmartPower x 2 and replace the PM19 at a later stage.

Any other ideas apart from replacing the speakers? My budget is approx £800. Many thanks Harvey Sutcliffe Victoria, Australia

Hi Harvey. If you're looking at pure valve designs at around £800 that will drive a pair of Harbeth HL-P3s (a fine 'speaker incidentally), unless you've got a best mate that's a secondhand hi-fi dealer, it's not good news! As for 25W of class A, then there's the fine Sugden A21a, which with its classic sound gives plenty of detail and musicality. It would just about drive the Harbeth's, but don't expect the floorboards to shake. You'd have to crank it a bit - not really ideal.

You will need at least the 60W that you currently use to be able to get the best from the power hungry Harbeth's.The best way to spend your money would be to go for a decent mosfet/valve hybrid or a simiA big sounding 'hybrid' such as the Unico should be Harvey's choice for the Harbeth's.

#### **SPANISH AYES**

Thank you for your excellent informative mag, which fortunately is available in a department store in Malaga, near where I live.During the past few months I have upgraded my previous system consisting of Marantz CD 63 Mkll Kl Signature, Marantz PM 66 KI Signature and Ruark Templar II 'speakers to a mint second-hand Denon DCD3300 connected to an equally mint used Naim NAC 62 / NAP 92 / II combo, via Chord Cobra II interconnects. This feeds the same Ruark speakers through Naim NAC A5 speaker cable (chosen in preference over the Nordost Super Flatline bi-wired cable I had before).

I also followed your guidance and bought a Musical Fidelity X-Cans V2 headphone amp for my trusted Sennheiser HD565 Ovation headphones, which I use a lot. Both the CD player and the amp were vast improvements over the previous ones, taking me closer to listening to music rather than listening to CDs.

Trouble is, I am (of course) still not quite happy, but as we live in the Spanish countryside I don't have a local

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

hi-fi shop I could badger with my questions. Right now the sound through the headphones is closer to what I am looking for - clarity, transparency, detail and involvement. At the same time, while I like the detail and the transparency of the sound via the headphones, quite a few recordings sound rather metallic and mechanical.

Although smoother the sound through the speakers is a lot less involving, but after the headphones I find myself straining to hear details, as though there was a filter somewhere along the line. With some recordings I can hear the singer but everything else seems to have moved several steps back on the soundstage. The music which sounds perfectly good to me on the phones thus becomes muffled, while the music which sounds too harsh on the phones is almost right but robbed of detail through the speakers!

I still remember how things livened up when I moved from a Linn Intek I briefly had to the Naim, hence I guess the culprit must be the speakers, as much as I like them for their looks and the way they have been assembled!

My question now is, what 'speakers do you think would help me achieve the clarity, transparency and involvement I look for, while at the same time opening up the rather messy soundstage? There's not much of a budget at the moment, I am afraid, but the sound bothers me so much that I would like to do something now. Anything in the region of £400 second-hand would be wonderful and I have been considering Spendor and Harbeth speakers recently, which from what I have read might fit the bill. What do you think?

I don't want to make a compromise which means that I'll have to trade-up again in a few months time, hence if there's nothing at this price I would rather wait for a few months and then be able to spend maybe £700 for something a bit better. I guess this would take me to the territory of speakers costing £1300 new.

We have holiday apartments in our house for people who come here for the peace and tranquillity, which means that for anything that requires high volumes I tend to use the headphones - hence the ability to play loud is not an issue, but good detail at low volumes would be very desirable. I would rather have a sound that is a bit too harsh but lets me know what is going on than one that is too smooth - that was the reason for selling the Marantz combo after all. The other area I am thinking about is the front-end. Do you think a separate and more recent DAC would improve matters and would go some way towards overcoming the mechanical element in the music? If so, from which model upwards would this move make sense? I believe that this is the part of the player which has progressed most over the last ten years.

Also, I have been considering fitting Audiocom's replacement clock to the Denon. It is such a beautifully constructed solid beast, I would much rather try to improve it than swap it for something newer.

My listening room has a tiled floor with a rug and is roughly 20x14ft, opening up to a much larger open plan space, with the speakers facing across the narrower part.

My musical taste is as varied as can be, ranging from classical Western and classical Indian music through solo singers like Ismael Serrano, Mary Black, Natalie Merchant and Pablo Milanes. This then goes through to rock and Jazz/Art/Prog Rock with Yes being the clear favourites and most listened to.

Maybe it is too late and I have badly caught the upgrade bug, but I hope that this is not so and some fine tuning is all that is required. I would be very grateful indeed if you could help me chose the right path. Thank you very much in advance. Regards Vichar Kroehnert Malaga, Spain

I can imagine the kind of sound you're getting from your Denon DCD-3300, which was a magnificent multibit player in its day. The trouble is that its day was a long time ago now - fifteen years, nearly! As a result, its big, vibrant, punchy sound will also be rather ragged around the edges and also a little on the mechanical side. Those old Japanese battleship CD spinners really do sound powerful, but they're nowhere near as musical as, say, a Meridian 207 from the same era.

With this in mind, I think you should start with sorting your CD player, and assign funds to this as required. Although I have no experience of the Audiocom master clock modification, I can certainly vouch for the Trichord Clock 3. Indeed, I had my old Sony CDP-557ESD (more or less a direct rival to your Denon, with similar underpinnings) 'done' and I was gobsmacked by the difference. Clocking it really smoothed things out tonally, and gave it a good deal of additional subtlety and finesse. Timing vastly improved, and that mechanical 'hi-fi' sound you refer to virtually disappeared. The player became a much more beguiling and organic performer, but still retained much of its bold, audacious nature. So impressive was this that I'd have no hesitation in recommending this mod, but you'll have to phone Trichord first and check it can be done on your particular machine, as always.

This done, you may not feel the need to get an offboard DAC. Personally, I'm not a huge fan of the breed, but if you're still not happy then your Trichorded Denon would make an excellent transport. Look no further than Pink Triangle's Da Capo, which is one of the best offboard converters ever made, in my opinion. It's very warm and full and musical in a quintessentially 'analogue' way. The only problem is that of reliability - it's not the most sturdy thing ever built, so if you do manage to pick one up in the classifieds, make sure it's a pristine one-owner specimen that's had nothing more exciting than a monthly polish with a feather duster.

Another fine DAC is DPA's Enlightenment. This is an extremely lively and musical performer, yet a bit (pardon the pun!) more ragged than the PT.

Now, with your front-end sorted, it's time to look at speakers. Your amplification is of good quality, but not the most powerful around, so I'd counsel a pair of efficient floorstanding loudspeakers with high technology drivers such as Mission's 752 (or 752 Freedom) or Castle's Avon. These have HDA or Carbon Fibre drivers respectively, and give a very fast, punchy sound with plenty of detail and spatial accuracy. Your Ruark Templars, by contrast, will sound a tad woolly and vague. You should be able to pick these up for under £250 now, but don't overlook a pair of late model Epos ES14s either. These are tighter and punchier still, yet need a bit more driving - your Naim will only just be up to the job.

Change your headphones to a pair of Sennheiser sublime HD580s and you'll discover how harsh your 565s are - and find they're a far closer tonal match for your new speakers. Happy upgrading! **DP**

#### FOURTH TIME LUCKY!

Scribes. Like many of your correspondents I am in the throws of a long overdue upgrade. I have made the classic 'do it in stages' error. The original set-up was as follows: Sugden A28 II, Linn Axis/Basik plus/K9, Denon DCD I 700 CD player into Ruark Sabre bookshelf on Ruark stands via 'quality' lighting cable (oops!) with freebie interconnects (okay, okay).

The niggle was predictable. It was soft, compressed and well, 'jolly boxy' really. All of the bits dated back to the late 80s and I was sure the 'speakers/cables would be the best place to start (note the flawed, piecemeal thinking already). I went to my favourite specialist hi-fi shop and did a lot of listening - resulting in a pair of B&W CM2s on stands, bi-wired with QED silver anniversary. Fantastic! - a detailed, spacious sound with a wonderful sound stage and efficiency of 89dB.

Another niggle is that the Denon is now revealing its age, with glassy and at times uncomfortable hard edges at higher frequencies. For all its well documented flaws, the Linn sounded great to me, thanks to Ringmat upgrade.

I went back to Eastbourne with the Denon to compare it to some new CD players, ending up with Arcam's FMJ CD23T and an Optimum Premier rack for good measure. Added some Monster Cable interconnects. Fantastic! Even more 'space' and definition with really sweet mid and upper ranges, plus an extended, cleaner bass. But there was another niggle - some low end coloration around 150Hz and the A28 preamp output didn't seem to enjoy right channel connection to my (newly added) Monitor Audio ASW100 (set to minimal gain and roll-off above 50Hz). There was no such problem with only the left channel connected. Hmm. I sent a question about this to Sugden - no answer.

I saw an 'ex-dem' Sugden A2 I a with phono stage, a steal at £695 with the full manufacturer's guarantee. A 'must have'.Twenty-four hours later, wow! Even more 'at a live performance' detail with a flat bass response, faster dynamics and.....oh dear! Initial impressions are 'a little bit of metallic harshness in the upper reaches of the violins and some sibilance on a few vocal recordings'. I haven't had the courage to re-connect the old A28 for a 'side-by-side' - I might prefer it. Aargh!

All is now well run-in (80+ hours). The new niggles seem to have, at least partially, gone away. Are my ears acclimatising or can it be sufficient 'cooking' of the equipment? Or both!

I wonder whether I should change the QED for something sweeter - DNM Reson or Chord Odyssey perhaps. I can't afford to ditch the B&Ws for Harbeth HL Compact 7s.Be ruthless! Yours in hope, **Philip Darwall-Smith.** 

In a round about way, you've ended up with a really nice system that shouldn't require radical surgery to give of its best. Essentially you've got two fairly smooth and warm sounding sources in the shape of your Linn turntable and Arcam CD player, a very open and neutral amplifier and some fine speakers with a slightly bright metal dome tweeter. This is where the problems are arising, but the good news is that there are many worse HF units than those fitted to your B&Ws, so with a bit of judicious tuning you should be able to smooth things out nicely.

First, get both sources as smooth as you can. This means that - in the case of the Linn Axis - you need a smoother cartridge. Buy a Dynavector DV10X4 (or ideally a DV20X-H). Not only will it give a much nicer tone but you'll get bags more musicality, too. Linn has just released a new tone arm lead too, reputed to give a far fuller tone. This would also be a fine mod.

Place both the Axis and your CD23T on Audiophile Furniture Base SP-01 sub-tables, along with your amplifier if possible. These will really smooth things out, giving a much bigger, fuller and more musical sound.

Next, turn your focus to your interconnects. Use LFD Spirolink III between the CD player and amp. This is the most neutral, self-effacing cable I've come across. Then sell your Monster Cable - which is perfectly good stuff, just a little forward - and get the aforementioned DNM Reson speaker cable.

Go through your entire system with Kontak, cleaning every last connection including your mains plugs, fuses and - if you're aware of the obvious safety and warranty considerations - the internal fuses inside your amp and CD player. Then run a Densen DeMagic 'demagnetiser' through it. This done, you'll be amazed how different your system can sound. It will be far sweeter yet more musically engaging. The only trouble is that with all this 'hands on' activity, you'll probably have caught the upgrade bug again. DP

#### WHICH WIRE WORKS?

Greetings O Knowledgeable Ones.

Help, help, help! My current system consists of a Michell GyroDec SE and Gyropower, running into an Exposure Pre 21 and 18 power amps via a Trichord Dino phono stage. On the digital side 1 have a Tag McLaren CDT20 feeding a DAC20. The whole lot sings through a pair of Monitor Audio 20SEs.

My first quandary is in relation to the analogue side of my set up. In the heat of the moment recently I purchased a Kontrapunkt B, to hook onto my Incognito rewired Rega RB300. While I am amazed by the sound quality when the ruby hits the groove, I am pretty sure that this is not the best of places to sit the Kontrapunkt, thus I am not hearing what it really can do. So admittedly an upgrade is called for and this is where my problem lies. Should I go for a full Origin Live modification to my RB300 and can I keep the Incognito wiring if so (otherwise it will be a complete waste of £130), or do I sell the RB300 and purchase an SME IV which will probably provoke a dose of turntable 'upgraditis'?

My next question is in regards to CD replay. Is the DAC20 a bit long in the tooth now compared with current 24bit upsampling units.Will I notice a significant leap in performance if I replace my current converter with one of the newer fashionable models?

I suppose the logical step might be to go for something along the lines of Tag McLaren's DPA32. However, I don't think I could give up my Exposure units just yet.

Finally, while I still have your attention, what is in your opinion the best way of joining the Dino to the pre-amp? Would Nordost's Blue Heaven suit? Thanks

Greetings - seeker of wisdom and truth! No, don't junk your RB300. Get the Origin Live mod. and keep the wiring. I'm sure Mark Baker at Origin Live is prepared to admit that 'other Rega arm wiring types are also available' and can live with it! The new counterweight stub will bring untold joys to you and your Kontrapunkt B, and get you chomping at the bit for more. To wit, I'd forget about lavishing all that cash on a new SME and give your GyroDec the DC motor mod, which will do to it what the OL tweak did to your arm - bring oodles more depth, power and grip.

Next, think about the new Dino power supply mod. which I haven't had time to review fully yet, but is reputed to - you've guessed it - do to the Dino what the DC motor does to the Gyro. Hook it up with LFD Spirolink III.

As for upsamplers, I really have to say how underwhelmed I am with what I've heard so far. Yes, there is a difference and yes, you could say a marginal improvement, but to my ears at least it's a profoundly small one considering the funds you have to part with. Frankly, putting your CDT20 on a Townsend Selsmic Sink will reap greater rewards at a fraction of the price.

I'd save the rest of the money, and put it towards a serious DVD-Audio/SACD player in around six months to a year from now. There are some darn good ones around at the moment (Marantz DVD-12, Denon DVD-AI, etc) but I'd still hold fire until the market's settled down a bit before I make a purchase.

The main thing we're all holding our breath for (at the time of writing) is the universal fitment of a full 24/192 *digital* output to these players. Once this arrives you can go ahead and buy with confidence, knowing you can upgrade at a later with an external convertor if need be. High resolution 24bit digital audio is far better than upsampled 16bit, but still not quite there yet. DP

#### DAB-LING HERE AND THERE

After reading Simon's leader page on DAB, I felt that I had to put finger to keyboard (still doesn't sound as good as pen to paper, but that's progress I suppose!) to comment.

I do think that Simon is living in a bit of a virtual reality world with analogue radio. Now before people start jumping around about my comments, let me first state that I personally choose vinyl replay over CD any day of the week. The difference in sound quality, in my opinion, is marked - and vinyl is cheaper than CD in the shops anyway!

I have only ever used radio to listen to live sport. If I want to listen to music, I want to listen to what I want, when I want - and on vinyl. And if I haven't got it, I'll go and find it!

With music on the radio, you never get that personal choice - just some inane chattering "personality", who prefers his own voice to playing records.

I recently acquired a Sony D777ES (a DAB, FM and MW machine), solely for the additional Radio 5 Live sports channel. You probably know that 5 Live was previously only available on medium wave and let me tell you that DAB sounds fantastic compared to that! I can even listen to test match cricket (previously on long wave only!!) in crystal clear, quality sound. I can also say that I have never listened to FM or MW for longer than checking that they worked on the Sony, except when friends want to compare FM to DAB. I have even discovered the delights of Planet Rock - another digital only station, which does get "tuned in" on a frequent basis (at least once a day - even if over my Cornflakes!). Now, I will admit that DAB is probably not as good as a top quality FM tuner, but it really depends on your use of radio as a medium, I would suggest.

Surely I am not alone out here? DAB is useful for a huge number of scenarios and those who are beginning to mourn the loss of their Troughlines - go and get a decent turntable - it will pale into memory rather quickly I would suggest!

Hi Alex. I think the main point here is that you don't primarily use the radio for listening to music! Not that I'm one to preach the classical gospel by any means, but if perhaps you listened to BBC Radio 3 regularly then you'd think differently. You certainly don't get an "inane chattering personality" announcing the latest Wagner production live from the Met - God forbid! I actually find that programs such as the station's much heralded Late Junction offer a brilliant variety of decent music from pretty much across the board that seem to press all the right buttons. I

As a hi-fi magazine concerned with music and its reproduction, I was trying to put across in my editorial comment that for BBC Radio 3 to drop their bitrate from 196kbps to128kbps is kind of defeating one of the objects of the station, the maintenance of quality in the broadest sense, and does absolutely no favours for digital radio. It's pretty obvious that appealing to discriminating listeners isn't at the top of the agenda for the powers that be. After all, the majority of radio listening is in short stints in the car or shower, as opposed to languorously in the front room - or in bed! SP

Hard disk drive-based CD recorders are very much the machines of the moment. In the CDR-HD1300, Yamaha has one of the very best, says David Price.

lick open the CDR-HD1300's instruction manual and you'll see that one of the lead sections is entitled, "Copying from a CD

onto the HDD". These very words will doubtless send shivers of fear through every self-respecting music industry executive, for it is products like this that are dramatically re-shaping the market for recorded music.

Global music sales are in deep decline (down from \$37billion in 2000 to \$33.6 billion in 2001), but music consumption is rising strongly (6 billion tracks consumed per month in 1996, 9.3 billion in 2001). Machines like the Yamaha have been conceived as a direct result of this information. People love CD as a music carrier - it's become the digital descendent of the Compact Cassette - it's just that they don't want to pay for them anymore, unless they're of the 'ten a penny' CD-R variety of course.

The CDR-HD1300 is the pinnacle of the CD recording breed. It has a large 80GB hard drive (that can be changed for an even larger one, should the need arise), onto which music CDs are 'ripped' at ten times normal speed via the built-in CD drive. You can then edit them, move or delete them to your heart's content and then burn them to either CD-R or CD-RW via that same CD drive at eight or four speed respectively. Neat, as the Americans would say.

Moreover, the Yamaha functions as a fully functioning digital recorder that records direct to its HDD (Hard Disk Drive) from one of two digital inputs (optical or coaxial) or one analogue input via its internal 24bit analogue-to-digital converter. Full sampling rate conversion is offered via the digital inputs, recording from 32, 44.1, 48 and - interestingly -96kHz. Up to 999 albums with up to 99 songs in each can be recorded, until its 80GB hard drive has swallowed some 120 hours of music at 16bit, 44.1kHz resolution. Oh, and it also plays conventional CDs through its 24bit DAC too ...

Pulling it out of the box, this Yamaha feels quite different to other HD-based recorders I've tried. At 435x116x415mm, and weighing 8kg, it feels solid as a piece of 'pro' recording gear. Aside from a rather baffling strip of pulsating blue and orange light under the fluorescent yellow-orange display, it's a brilliantly fuss-free design too - no funny buttons, legends and lights as per Onkyo's MusicBank here. The transport controls are neatly positioned on the right, while two buttons labeled HDD and CDR let you switch between the two drives. This system is elegantly simple, but it's a pity you can't open the CD drive while the HDD is playing. To copy a music CD, it's simply a case of inserting one, pressing the COPY button, stabbing PLAY and you're off - seven minutes later it's committed the entire contents to its internal drive.

This done, you can edit the recording at great length - individual tracks can be combined, split, faded in/out, moved, erased and more. Editing is possible from your PC via the rear panel RS232C port and the free Title Editor software on the Yamaha website, which comes as a IIIkb ZIP file. It's also possible to compile playlists called 'Albums' by selecting songs on the hard disk and marking them with bookmarks - up to 999 Albums, each with up to 99 songs can be stored. If you have a monitor, then all this can be followed on the OSD (On Screen Display) via the rear panel S-Video or video connectors - clever, but it's a shame there's no RGB SCART jack.

As with DAT or MiniDisc machines the Serial Copyright Management System is used, but in



an interesting way. Yamaha's Digital Move system lets you transfer copyprotected data from the hard disk to CD-R, but then erases it from the hard disk automatically. Not everyone will like this - myself included - but it has to be said that it does follow the true spirit of SCMS! I think this is more about pleasing lawyers than a genuine attempt at 'rights management', because if you first copy the music CD on a PC and then rip it to the Yamaha's HDD then you can keep it there forever, as PC CD authoring packages don't write the SCMS flag to the first copy.

How then does it sound? As CD player, the Yamaha is uncannily similar to the company's own late nineties budget silver disc spinners like the old £230 CDX-590. It's smooth and svelte with bell-like clarity, excellent low level detailing, sharply drawn stereo images, good strong bass and crisp and open treble. Rhythmically it's probably a little better in fact,

#### AUDIO MASTER QUALITY RECORDING

Yamaha's AMOR system is claimed to be exclusive technology that gives better quality CD burns. It works by reducing the fragmentation of recorded data increasing the linear recording velocity from 1.2m/s to 1.4m/s. In this way, the disc has larger pits and lands (the space between pits) burned onto it, which are more easily readable by other players and cause less jitter. It also automatically selects 4x recording, which Yamaha engineers believe to be "optimum". This tallies with my findings that "slowest is best". The result is that the transport (and ultimately the DAC) of the playback machine has to work less hard, making for smoother sound. When Audio Master Quality Recording mode is used, several minutes of disc recording time Is lost - 74 minute discs can record 63 minutes while 79 minute discs give just 68 minutes.

with a decently musical and fluid sound that lets the likes of Roxy Music's 'Angel Eyes' bounce along with aplomb. Despite the fact that a computer CD-ROM drive is used, there's certainly no sense that this product is compromised. Hard disk

copies aren't quite identical to the original source CDs. Just as Onkyo's MusicBank

introduces a small amount of treble splash and fizz, so the Yamaha does too. When listening from HDD you're aware of a slight fuzziness to hi-hat cymbals, along with a subtle diminution of treble 'air' and 'space'. Bass is also subtly lightened too, meaning that Kraftwerk's 'Metropolis' lacked the grunt of the CD drive. In other respects, there was little difference between the two sources, the midband being practically identical. The Yamaha didn't fall into the trap, like other HDD recorders, of flattening depth perspectives. CD copies made from the HDD were excellent, with a slight softening and smoothing effect which complemented the hard drive's tendency to do the opposite. The result was a very respectable sounding copy with just a scintilla of low level detail and



focus missing compared to the original music CD.

An excellent product, then - I think this is the most mature and evolved hard disk recorder I've yet encountered. I'd like to have seen a PC editing software CD-ROM supplied, along with a USB interface instead of an RS232 port, the deletion of Yamaha's Digital Move system (fat chance!) and most importantly the ability to go online and get artist and track titles for the hard drive automatically.These quibbles aside, it's a superb effort.




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
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# HIGH RESOLUTION SOLUTION

The music business wants DVD-Audio to succeed. In the first of a two-part feature on this new high resolution disc, Hi-Fi World's Simon Pope reports from a recent DVD-A Seminar held in London.

ondon traffic is bad any time of the day. It's much worse when it rains - and when it rains on a Friday it moves into chaos. How much more bearable it might have been with full surroundsound in the car I thought, as I crawled four miles in fifty minutes on my way to Olympic Studios in Barnes, South West London, to hear the latest news on DVD-Audio, a potential successor to CD.

When I say the "latest" news I was expecting a re-run of the speeches and seminars I'd heard in the past, with maybe the bonus of a few more new titles at inflated prices to tempt (or enrage) a few of the press and an even smaller section of the public. Admittedly the weather didn't help my mood, but neither did past experience.

Once parked up (another fifteen minutes) I entered - sodden and late - the upstairs studio, to be greeted by at least 25 pieces of current DVD-A hardware to my right and a wall of 250 or so DVD-A titles ahead of me - a sobering reminder that the discs do exist. To the left on a long table sat an important looking array of software and hardware experts, plus record company executives, many from the US. The turnout was impressive...

#### NEXT PLEASE


Warner music were the first major record company to see the viability of DVD-A and released a good number of varied titles over a year ago. Other smaller companies have also released selected titles and a good number of classical discs are available, but until recently the only Rock or Pop titles available were by no means mainstream. Now, however, the DVD-A catalogue has expanded to over four hundred titles, so things are changing.

All the same, David Dorn, Senior Vice President of Warner's Media division stood up to pledge further allegiance to the cause and to outline their plan for the future. We were told how music consumption had increased but the revenue from recorded music sales had slumped. The music business is convinced people are listening to more music it's just that they don't want to pay for it! Warners, and others, hope that the emergence of a new music carrier format will put a stop to this trend and get people back into the

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Of the four hundred DVD-A discs available there were over two hundred on show

high street shops. They see DVD-A as having the potential to achieve this.

Whether DVD can boost music sales the way it has boosted film sales remains to be seen, but there's no doubting the company's commitment to the format. Latest releases from Warner deliberately include titles that will attract not just older music lovers or audiophiles, but future buyers of discs - the younger generation. Titles from bands such as Linkin Park, Bjork, Missy Elliot and REM are now available which could help whip up interest.

Whilst relatively few people will initially be able to play DVD-A discs to their full potential, there are a reported 80million DVD video players being used around the world, and this doesn't include computer DVD ROM drives, XBox or Playstation 2 units! All DVD-A discs would be playable on these machines in both stereo or multi-channel, if only in CD quality. As DVD players replace the CD players in the home which is happening at the lower end of the market where real market penetration occurs - then DVD-A has an enormous platform on which to develop - the largest of a new format ever.

That's all well and good, but how will they get the public to buy into DVD-A if the discs remain at the prices they are now ( $\pounds 16-\pounds 20$  in the UK)? This is where it gets interesting. All credit to Warners for realising the current retail price of the discs is crippling sales. From now on, Warner told us, those new titles selected for DVD-A release will be launched coincidentally with the CD at the same price as the CD. On the cover of these DVD-A discs will be a sticker stating that the discs will play on all DVD players, including the aforementioned gaming machines, therefore targeting DVD video owners with a DVD-A disc. Whilst these discs will not play on a CD player in a hi-fi system, which may be a drawback to some, the likelihood of bonus material may well swing a floating buyer.

#### ARTISTIC INTEGRITY

Due to the vast storage capability of a DVD-A disc, material such as video footage, lyric sheets and interviews can all be added, making it an attractive interactive experience. Robin Hurley of Rhino Records (a subsidiary of Warner) emphasised this aspect of the format as one way of tempting buyers by giving them something they can't get with their current CD - such as the video footage we were shown of a presumably stoned Neil Young grumbling monosyllables in a farm field!

To the music companies the most important aspect of any new format in these times of rampant piracy is the matter of copy protection. With the vast proliferation of CD burners, both artist and record company want to ensure the same can't happen with DVD-A as happened with CD. Here the DVD Forum had Meridian's Bob Stuart to throw a few facts around.

Firstly, the 'dreaded' watermarking that audiophiles fear will ruin any potential sound quality improvement is actually discretionary - it needn't be there if the artist or record company don't want it. Copyright encryption is also optional but it is accurate and has "zero impact on sound quality" we were told. The encryption process basically stops pirated discs from being played on a DVD-Audio player, so the pirated discs can go into the usual duplication process of mastering and mass production, but they will be rejected by the player, which will have to be CPPM (encryption) compliant.

#### HARD WARING

So, finally all seems in place for the development of the format itself, but what of those who want to play DVD-Audio discs to their full potential (two channels of 24bit/192kHz or six channels of 24bit/96kHz music)? A DVD-Videoonly device will play a DVD-A disc only in surround-sound (5 channels and subwoofer) or two channels of 16bit/44.1kHz (i.e. CD quality). If you want to get the best from a DVD-A disc you need a dedicated player with the compatible mechanism and digital to analogue conversion.

There are currently thirty models of DVD-A player in the UK, ranging from specialist units from Meridian to a portable compatible DVD player from Panasonic! Whilst these are more expensive than your average DVD-Video player you can get hold of one for around £250 and Pioneer have a "universal" player - reviewed in this issue - which will also read SACD discs for around £400.As time goes on, so prices will drop - and there are a good number of compatible players waiting for launch date. Watch out for the first DVD-A player on your supermarket shelves sooner than you think!

We were also told a number of car manufacturer are signed up or interested in including DVD-A compatibility in their vehicles.

It's taken a long enough for the record industry to see the full potential of DVD-A. It was once viewed as too specialist for general use. Now there's no doubting that DVD-A has great potential. A list of over four hundred software titles and thirty players is a good start for a medium and there's much more to come - crucially at lower prices.

Next month David Price continues our DVD-A feature, interviewing key industry figures and discussing the format in detail.

enon doesn't make budget CD separates any more. Such is the speed the market has moved that the company once

famous for its eighties 'budget audiophile' designs no longer has a conventional silver disc spinner on its books. Strange isn't it? I for one remember the likes of the DCD-820 cleaning up in the early nineties £250 price point.

Nowadays, if you want a Denon in a full-width box that plays audio CDs, it's a DVD - not a CD - that you must buy. The 900 model here is the company's cheapest to date at just £250, but is still claimed to be serious about both audio and video. To wit, it has 24-bit/192kHz high resolution audio DACs, although it is a DVD video player, so it doesn't actually play DVD-A discs. It will, however, play the older type of 24/96 super (video) discs (if you can find any) and olde worlde 16bit CDs plus DVD videos of course. DVD-R, MP3 CD and CD-R/RW playback is also provided.

Whereas budget Denon CD players of yesteryear were substantial affairs, the DVD-900 is a slight, slimline design (at just 75mm high) that packs more than its fair share of air inside. Still, what there is of it is nicely finished. The brushed aluminium fascia (available in a choice of black or gold) looks good and the buttons are tactile. Okay, so it's not a Denon DVD-A1, but nor is it a tacky supermarket special either.

Round the back you get the bare minimum of necessary socketry including stereo analogue outputs via RCA phonos, optical and coaxial digital outputs, plus RGB on SCART, as well as Composite and S-Video video outputs.

It's important to note that the digital audio output can output pure PCM at up to 24/96 resolution. This is a nice surprise to find on a budget product. It also outputs Dolby AC3 and DTS, although alas there is no DTS decoding on board.

As DVD spinners go, this Denon is very easy to use. The On Screen Display (should you choose to use it with a telly) is clear and concise, and in conjunction with the front panel mounted, four-arrow keypad (duplicated on the remote control) you can scroll around its various setup and cueing options easily. The usual playback modes (Resume Play, Slow Play, Repeat Play (A-B, Chapter, Track, Disc), Random Play and Program Play are all there. The only other thing of note is an SRS TruSurround button, which gives enhanced stereo surround from DVDs encoded with two-channel stereo soundtracks.

Connected to my Cyrus 7/PSX-R/Mission 782 reference system, the Denon made nice enough noises playing 16/44 audio CDs. It's an interesting point that a high quality £250 DVD player such as this can make a sound that's easier on the ear than many purpose designed CD separates of ten years back. Think, for example, of Marantz's long-lost CD50 - its 16bit, four times oversampling chipset was musical alright, but could be quite strident. Denon's DVD-900 by contrast is smooth, smooth, smooth. In fact, it's bland, Fun Lovin' Criminals' 'King of New York' showed its bass to be warm - almost sumptuously so - but loose. Bass notes stop and start in a decently rhythmic fashion, but it's hardly razor sharp stuff. The Denon seems to be able to keep the momentum of the song going, but hardly thrills you with the energy and articulation of its low frequencies. Contrast this to NAD's £200 C521i (admittedly not a direct rival, as it isn't a DVD player) which is positively propulsive, and you realise it is possible to get true musicality at a beer budget price.

Still, moving up the frequency band, the Denon's midrange seems a tad crisper. Again, it's a little on the languid side as Nirvana's 'Come As You Are' proved. That famous lead guitar refrain was commanding as ever, but there was a slight lack of



urgency to it, as if the band was slacking. Still, it was nicely placed in the stereo soundstage, just a little ahead of the plane of the speakers, with the studio acoustic appearing to drop back quite some way. Although it hardly had the soundstaging of a high-end purpose-built CD spinner, it made a good stab at placing instruments in space, both left-toright and front-to-back.

Also quite impressive was the Denon's tonality - it was less grey than some dedicated hi-fi players. There was a decent amount of grain and texture to Kurt Cobain's plaintive vocals.

Whereas the midband was a nice

surprise, the treble rather let the side down. Herbie Hancock's 'The Prisoner' showed it lacking in bite or definition. Whereas NAD's C5211 could get right into the hi-hat sound on this beautifully recorded BlueNote CD, the Denon always sounded rather perfunctory uninterested in conveying the instrument's sheen and shimmer. On a more general scale, this resulted in a rather unatmospheric performance, the player appearing to strip recordings of their air and space. This, combined with the warm, loose bass performance, goes a long way to explain the machines 'over smooth' and rhythmically ponderous sound.

If Denon's DVD-900 is anything to go by, then audiophiles should still go for a dedicated CD player, such as the aforementioned NAD, if sound is the priority. The Denon doesn't sound bad - far from it - it's just that it consummately fails to involve the listener thanks to its loose bass, relatively uninspiring dynamics and slightly 'closed in' treble.

For hi-fi buyers then, I would not recommend the DVD-900. But if you're after something that makes a good job of video discs then it really starts to shine. Its exceptional picture (at the price) makes it likely to be a success - it's just not a budget audiophile blockbuster like Denons of yore used to be.



#### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

First and foremost, this DVD-Video player is incompatible with new DVD-A media. As such, the use of "192kHz/24bit DACs" as declared on its fascia is neither here nor there as, in practice, the maximum sample rate will be derived from 96kHz/24bit DVD-V music software. With 44.1kHz (CD) and 48kHz (DVD-V) media, the DVD-900 achieves a low 0.0009% distortion through the midrange at -6dBFs but this increases to a poorer 0.3% at -60dBFs and 0.015% at 20kHz/-6dBFs where the rejection of digital 'images' is just 54.5dB. Distortion increases still further with the extended HF output of 96kHz DVD-V media, reaching 0.04% at 40kHz. The rejection of digital images is also reduced to just 30dB with 96kHz DVD-V

The latter is a function of the digital filter, which fortunately exerts




little influence over the player's gentle HF roll-off (-0.4dB @ 20kHz with CD). Provided the DVD-900 is not set to downsample 96kHz DVD-V software to 48kHz, its response extends to -0.15dB at 40kHz and -0.45dB at 44kHz. In any event, low-level linearity is affected by the relatively poor (sub-16bit) 94.5dB Awtd S/N ratio, leading to errors of +/-1dB at -90dBFs. Channel separation is good at >105dB across the audioband but the channel balance, by contrast, is less impressive at ~0.15dB.

Jitter is well controlled at just 230psec, although the very low-rate artefacts (clustered about the central peak in Graph 2) could do with tidying-up. The remainder of the jitter (marked in red) is principally data-induced in origin and low enough to exert no subjective impact. Noise and increased HF distortion are its key limitations, not jitter. Overall, the DVD-900 is a marked improvement on budget DVD players from a season or two back, but its performance is readily exceeded by costlier machines. **PM**

# **ON THE**

The Cyrus 7 was one of the best integrated amps of the past two years. Now comes its successor, the Cyrus 8. It has a lot to live up to - so will it, asks Simon Pope?

s has been mentioned before in these very pages, the Cyrus design philosophy was perhaps way ahead of its time when the original plastic shoebox Cyrus I was launched way back in 1981. Here was a highly original looking, 'midi' sized integrated amp with audiophile ambitions before the phrase 'lifestyle' was even a twinkling in a marketing director's eyes. The appeal of it was undeniable, punters liked the different look and size and the pundits liked the sound.

Every bit of Cyrus Electronics since has kept the dimensions of that first hit, it's only the casework material and insides that have changed. There was also the PSX optional external power supply that elevated the electronics into the super league without needing a remortgage for the privilege - exretailers have told me, incidentally that this was one of the easiest sells in the business.

Whilst the amplifiers after the I and 2 continued the overall theme, it's perhaps true to say that the products didn't quite live up to the standards of the predecessors. This all changed with the launch of the £500 Cyrus 5 and £700 Cyrus 7. Both of these included some advanced software programming and had a smooth and controlled sound.

The Cyrus 7 with PSX-R could rival the sound of products twice the price. It was a reviewers dream - a good, mid-price sector reference product that not only did the job sonically but for once was small and portable - a veritable miracle! All good things come to an end though, and as in-house design teams research and develop, so do products and now we have the launch of the brand new, unsurprisingly named Cyrus 8 priced, yet again un-surprisingly at £800 (it doesn't take Sherlock Holmes to see a pattern here!).

The 7 is a tough one to top. Whilst by no means perfect it nevertheless delivered an incredibly effortless yet powerful and controlled sound from its humble dimensions. The apparent brief for the 8 was to take the basic formula of the Cyrus 7 further and create more output power, higher output current and better power supply rejection. The overall control system has apparently been improved, too.

The Cyrus 8 delivers 70W per channel into 80hms (an improvement of 10W on its predecessor) which is the most power ever squeezed from the classic chassis. Many of the improvements have apparently been possible due to new higher efficiency power amp circuitry, new "thermal management" techniques and a higher current output stage.

The new amp also features a traditionally designed power supply with an "oversize" (but obviously not that big!) 330VA power transformer and extra-larger audiophile electrolytic reservoir caps. Higher grade audiophile components have been chosen for improved transparency of sound.

Like its predecessor, there's a lot going on inside the Cyrus 8, and although it has 'plug and play' simplicity about it, it also has

advanced engineering in the shape of both circuit design and electronic system switching and control. On the technical side, dual charge pumps and linear post-regulators are used in an attempt to increase the voltage and stabilise the power supply for the voltage amplifier stage. This apparently creates extra headroom which swings the current amplifier further towards its rails resulting in the improved power output. Cyrus's designers have effectively doubled the peak current capability of the power amp section and halved its output impedance to result in a greater transfer of energy from the power supply into tough 'speaker loads.

There's also been a concerted effort to improve the amplifier's performance with the external PSX-R DC power supply. In the Cyrus 8 the PSX-R is applied solely and directly to the pre-amp stage through a solid state switch. The internal power supply is then kept entirely for the power amplifier. This separation of power sources makes the system closer to a true two box pre/power combination. New circuitry has been introduced for "soft" standby switching (a traditional feature in Cyrus's electronics) which aims to make operation more sophisticated and effective.

So, there's a list of 'improvements' as long as your arm but do they have any effect on the sound and is it better than the Cyrus 7? To answer this question I hooked up the Cyrus 8 to a pair of unforgiving Quad ESL988s, with an Audio Analogue Maestro CD player and Sony's XA-555ES SACD player for sources. I also had our 'reference' Cyrus 7 to hand and a PSX-R power supply for comparing the 'upgraded' versions.

Although thankfully very subtle, the Cyrus 8 does have a different overall sound signature to the 7. Immediately I noticed improved clarity. The Cyrus 7 was always well detailed for the money but at times when compared to more expensive equipment, it could sound a tad muddled in the midrange, but this has been improved. There's a nice feel about the midrange which keeps the 7's excellent fluidity and smoothness but increases the separation of instruments and detail to great effect. With the 8, an SACD of Fauré and Ravel Piano Trios played by the Florestan Trio on the Hyperion label had a more realistic and insightful sound when compared to with the 7. Details such as the sound of the bow on the cello's strings were heightened further, creating a life-like, visceral sound to the playing. The

piano, too was brought more to life with a slightly less synthetic sound. Other improved traits were also discernable, such as an extension of the depth of field.

One of the appealing factors of the Cyrus 7 was its ability to relay the delicacy and musicality of chamber music, yet also provide solid and controlled reproduction of rock and dance music. The 8 has not lost any of this. Thrashing out the Queens Of The Stoneage's superb 'No One Knows' saw the Cyrus rocking with the best of them. However, it may not appeal to out and out headbangers as it does it with an amount of control and smoothness that manages to take nothing away from the involvement, speed or impact, but rounds off the rough edges, resulting in what I feel is a highly listenable and ultimately nonfatiguing sound.

Linking up the easily connected 'plug 'n' play' PSX-R resulted in a great value and easy upgrade. Your extra £350 buys you added control and smoothness with increased detail and insight - this is one company's power supply that actually justifies the outlay (not all of them do). It improves the sound of the Cyrus 8 (or 7 for that matter) to the performance of something twice the price - for a third of it! Bass is tighter and the treble sweeter and the midrange has increased transparency. It also works equally effectively with all types of music and recordings.

So, it's thumbs up all round for the latest Cyrus integrated amplifier. It's a worthy successor that retains the sonic appeal of the 7 but adds a few more audiophile traits. The only slight downside that remains lies with those who want more pound for pound clout and power to the sound. You don't always get the ultimate slam that other amps (albeit more expensive) can deliver. On the flipside, though, they don't have the endearing 'big boy in a little box' appeal of the Cyrus 8. Good stuff, indeed.

#### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

For such a small package the Cyrus 8 produces a surprising amount of power, our measurements showing no less than 78W into 80hms, rising to 132W into 40hms. That's plenty enough for most domestic situations, as it is for most loudspeakers. The PSX-R auxiliary power supply makes no difference to these power figures. Even into a low 40hm load the Cyrus 8 receives no current boost, measurements show, from the PSX-R.


The Cyrus 8 has a frequency response tailored to be suitable for SACD and DVD-A, its –1dB upper limit being 60kHz with a gentle roll off above this frequency to a few dB down at 100kHz. With a lower limit at 4Hz the Cyrus covers subsonics as well as supersonics.

Always low in distortion, Cyrus amplifiers are noted for their clean, easy delivery and it looks like the new 8 will be no different. It produces a negligible 0.003% in the midband and 0.007% at 10kHz, these figures holding constant at all power levels. The figures deteriorated little into a low 40hm load,

reaching 0.01%, still a very low figure.

With useful input sensitivity and low dc offset the Cyrus 8 measures well in all areas, much like its predecessor. **NK**

# KORA BLIMEY!



For those of you unfamiliar with the name, Kora - known for their top-range Kronos valve monoblocks - they are French valve amps. Dominic Todd starts at the other end with their entry level hybrid integrated, the Explorer.

e all have our hi-fi wish lists. If only we could have the dynamic drive of a

Naim amp combined with the exquisite fluidity of a decent 300B valve amp, for example. It seems that the French company, Kora, has been thinking along the same lines. This is by no means the first time that an amp has combined valves with transistors, yet it's one of the most carefully thought through designs I've seen in some time.

Essentially the pre-amp stage is valve based, designed around the Russian Electro Harmonix 12AT7EH (ECC81). Refreshingly, Kora also suggest a list of alternative valves and the effect they have upon the sound quality. Clearly, here is a company keen to involve their customers.

The power amp stage is a mosfet design. Mosfets are renowned for their efficiency and high power handling capacity, but they can sound a little harsh at times. So the combination of a smooth valve preamp and punchy mosfet power amp should give an ideal balance.

It's good to see that Kora haven't just left it at that though. There's a toroidal power supply with separate feeds for pre and power, an Alps volume pot and 10k uf Kendeil output capacitors. The claimed 60 watt power output should be ample compared with most rivals, although the wildcard NAD C370 takes some beating in the oomph stakes with a mighty 120W. Also, Unison Research's Unico hybrid integrated takes some beating with its powerful wattage and superb build for £800.

With the valves thoroughly warmed through, I began by listening to Coldplay's 'High Speed'. My initial impression was that given the colourful characteristics usually associated with both types of amplification involved, the outcome was surprisingly neutral. The bass response was slightly soft, and it certainly didn't have the authority of something like the C370. That having been said, this didn't distract from a balance that was quite beguiling and drew the listener into the music without them really being aware of the hi-fi. I would say that this was brought about by the natural, articulate vocal rendition, and the finely textured guitar.

The Kora certainly responded well to a decent recording, as was shown by Jennifer Warnes's 'The Nightingale'. The sound stage really opened up here, and there was a strong vocal presence from Warnes. The only downside I found to the vocals was a very slight harshness at higher frequencies. I suspect the mosfets have stamped their sonic trait here.

Other than that, there was much to praise. Whilst the bass lacked a little control with the deepest notes, the upper bass response was strong, and the timing still good. The guitar had the same natural timbre as it had had with Coldplay, and the layers of backing vocals were well structured and easy to identify. Similarly, the piano showed fine definition, giving a sense of realism to the whole track.

The Pet Shop Boys's, Birthday Boy showed similar characteristics. Again there was something of a mid range/bass split.Whilst the bass lacked solidity and was somewhat ponderous, instruments and vocals within the mid-range excelled. The slightly stodgy bass response was a little one-note and spoiled the timing to a degree. Yet the wailing electric guitar had a strong character with plenty of fizz - enough to encourage listeners to join in with their air guitars. Percussion was detailed, with good separation and staging. Vocals too, were well resolved, and finely judged; not too recessed within the mix, yet not too forward sounding either.

Perhaps Copland's Appalachian Spring wasn't the best classical



# **BARGAIN BULBS**

If you've always thought of valve amps as temperamental and expensive beasts, think again. World Audio Design's latest kit is designed with the budget conscious beginner in mind.

The Kecl82 was created from a brief that demanded simplicity, ease of build and a super low cost. In order to achieve a reasonable power output we went for a push-pull amplifier.

We chose the ECL82, a triode/output pentode. This tube is readily available and has a good sound. In push-pull mode it delivers 8Watts. Realistically you need a speaker of around 89dB or above. This is possible at a budget price - try the smaller Triangle models, or a Tannoy mX3 or even one of the older Missions like the 773e, or if you like building your own speakers, try the Adire Audio HE10.1, as reviewed in HFW October 2002 issue.

You will see that the front has only a volume control, and it is fed by one pair of phono sockets. A selector and tape/source switch were not used in this amplifier as they are tricky to wire up, and the aim was to make it easy to build. In fact, in many ways the Kecl82 would be great powering a second system, using a CD player as a source, and will definitely give you a taster of what valves can offer. Measuring 30cm wide, 23.5cm deep and 11cm height with feet, it is entirely self-enclosed. The valves are visible through the four upper circular vent holes (one directly above each valve). We have kept the look simple with the minimalist front panel holding the volume potentiometer. The two-part chassis is constructed from 1.6mm mild steel with a durable black powder-coat finish. The whole unit is very sturdy, weighing in at 9kgs.

The signal input is in the form of a pair of gold plated RCA phono sockets that sit at the rear of the chassis. The speaker sockets accept 4mm banana plugs as well as bare wire. The mains switch is positioned at the rear of the amplifier, on the right hand corner for easy access. Mains power is received via an IEC lead. The Kecl82 is based on a printed circuit board (PCB). The PCB is easy to follow with all component names, locations and orientations shown clearly. The amplifier requires no set up, you just turn it on. The kit will come with comprehensive instructions taking you through the build step-b-step.

#### **SOUND QUALITY BY SIMON POPE**

Purity is the key to this amplifier's design and sound. Because there's very little to get in the way of the signal what you get is an exceptionally sweet and simple sound that also has a superbly wholesome roundness to it.A high quality recording of Mahler's Das Lied Von Der Erde on Reference Recordings showed that the Kecl82 faithfully reproduced all the depth and space of a full symphonic orchestra without any problems. Violins were smooth and sweet, as was percussion (which virtually sparkled) and the woodwind section was especially impressive, with a spacious and airy sound.

A run through Miles Davis's Kind Of Blue saw the little integrated delivering a detailed and precise sound that highlighted the warmth of Coltrane's tenor sax and the rich, deep sound of the upright bass. Rock and Pop records such as Radiohead's 'Lucky' demonstrated that the valves inside the amp, whilst small, are quite robust sounding, with commendable clout and bass depth for a humble budget 8W valve amp. This is a great introduction to the sonic art of the valve amp and a big upgrade for anybody with a mid-price solid-state amp that wishes to swap over to something more musically engaging, for a price that's virtually as cheap as chips

choice to display the Explorer's virtues. Those familiar with the piece will know the swift dynamic changes within the music, and these were moods that the Kora wasn't always entirely happy with. Starting with the good news, the gentler passages involving the flute were delicately relayed, subtle and moving. Yet when the pace quickened, the Kora simply wasn't strident enough. The brass lacked sufficient rasp, and deeper notes from the wind section could 'bloom' somewhat. In short, it just didn't seem terribly enthusiastic, softening the dynamics rather than driving them through. To add salt to

the wound, there was some grain with high frequency string notes. All in all then, I found my attention wandering, only to be engaged again during the more pastoral sections.

Just as the Explorers internals are something of a mixed bag, so are its sonic characteristics. By and large the mixture of valve and mosfet is successful. Certainly with acoustic and smaller scale music, the Kora can sound fluid and beguiling in the manner of the best valve amp. designs. There's texture and subtle detail to be found in instrumentation and vocalists that would elude many a pure transistor design. Likewise, the sound staging appeared well judged, without being too flat or upfront.

Yet whilst this amp. shows the positive characteristics of both technologies used, the negative sides of both were unfortunately present too. Higher frequencies from vocal and violin weren't quite as smooth as they could be. Similarly, the bass response was rather too soft for my liking, surprisingly lacking the control that mos-fet designs are often good at. Perhaps a change of valve would tighten things up here - and that is the Kora's real forte. If one doesn't like the sound it's quite straightforward to tweak it by means other than changing cables.

Those wanting a little more involvement with their hi-fi without going the whole valve hog, could find the Explorer ideal. Given a sympathetic 'speaker partner and a little tweaking, it could prove a rewarding listen. One to put on the demo wish list. However, there's very strong competition.

#### **MEASURED PERFORMANCE**

The idea that lots of distortion from solid-state devices is no different from lots of distortion from valves is a dangerous one. Valves become increasingly linear at low levels, unlike transistors, and their harmonic structure is more benign. The ear is more sensitive to patterns than levels and here the Kora amplifier injudiciously ignores the audibly perceptible patterns of solid-state. It produces high amounts of distortion even at low power outputs, around 0.5% at 10kHz/1W, and distortion harmonics are extended.

I would expect the Kora to sound quite obviously a little coarse, and the presence of third-order at high levels will likely make the sound a little sharp too.

Even if the primary aim has been to reduce feedback to improve

sound-stage depth, this isn't something that solid-state devices, fets or transistors, are very amenable to, unlike valves. There is a trade-off here of course: stage-depth against smoothness. The judgement of such a thing is ultimately subjective.


High levels of distortion apart, the Kora measured well enough, producing 55W into 80hms and 90W into 40hms – useful amounts of power. Input sensitivity was high at 260mV and noise low, even though a valve is used in the preamp stages.

An amplifier as radical as this needs to be auditioned with care. It produces large amounts of distortion, even at low signal levels, and the distortion pattern changes strongly with level. I'd expect a nottoo-smooth sound, but one that

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perhaps conveys atmosphere and ambience. Only listening tests can tell. **NK**

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

# **CLASSIC CUTS**

#### Andy Giles opts for Van Morrison's Moondance as a true Classic Cut in preference to the much praised Astral Weeks.

es, I know Astral Weeks is a fine album – I've played it to death over the years, believe me. I dug out my original vinyl copy for this

review and it was, as you would imagine, largely unplayable (more's the pity). Yes, when the night is dark and the atmosphere heady with herbal smoke and wine, talk of Van Morrison's greatest moment regularly rests on his debut (post Bang recordings) solo album. But for me, good as Astral Weeks was (is) – the 1970 follow-up, Moondance, surpasses anything he did before or has done since. And that is a pretty tall order in anybody's book. The man is almost faultless - and Moondance is flawless.

It has been said that Astral Weeks and Moondance are so dissimilar it is hard to believe the same person created them. I couldn't agree more. With Astral Weeks having established Van Morrison as a major figure in a burgeoning world of more serious musicians and as a truly exceptional performer, he took his time over putting together its successor.

Another collection in a comparable style, regardless of its merit, was guaranteed to be criticised by a rapacious press – second albums to an adjudged masterpiece always are. Aware of this and, even then, being highly distrustful and irritated by the likes of Rolling Stone magazine (1 know, 1 was a contributor in 1969) he devised an album which succeeded absolutely in making comparisons unfeasible.

Brilliant as it is, Astral Weeks is dense, often inexplicable, makeshift, impulsive, and in parts untried. I've always heard an unqualified (though justified) sugary Irishness in some of the songs but there is no real overall thematic quality. Moondance, on the other hand, is almost in your face from the opening track,

wholly transparent, comprehensible, understandable, tidy, structured and clearly influenced by Morrison's musical preferences and roots.

Looked at closer, nearly every characteristic of Moondance, from the compositions to the playing, manifest Morrison's strong wish to make a new album in the proper sense of the word and to, in a way, distance himself from Astral Weeks. Moondance is very much nearer to blues, soul (Van Morrison could always sing soul), arguably jazz and certainly the black rhythm and blues of the Chess, Stax and Atlantic recordings of the time.

The other striking difference between the two albums is based around Morrison's own confidence as a studio artist. Following such a tour de force as Astral Weeks, he had little need to prove himself. His performances on Astral Weeks, driven by the need to prove his talents as a singer (as if they needed it), were continually pushing at the strictures of meter, language, and range. On Moondance he is an almost swaggering, self-assured proficient front man who, instead of stunning his listeners with vocal pyrotechnics, is content with merely seducing them.


Mention must be made of Moondance's instrumental moniker with the hermetically sealed harmonies created by Jack Schroer's alto and Collin Tillton's tenor saxophones. Although these eloquently melodious saxophone



elements may at first sound familiar you'll find it hard to find antecedents in jazz, rhythm and blues or soul as their true source lies in the traditional Celtic music so well known to Morrison. The resultant fusion is breathtakingly simple yet remarkably effective.

I don't intend to go through every track - there isn't space - but will briefly refer to some highlights. "And It Stoned Me," brilliantly demonstrates Morrison's fondness for locating mystical enlightenment in even the most mundane occurrences. You'll have to listen to it, I'm afraid, to fully understand that. Next, "Moondance," features one of Morrison's most sparkling melodies featured alongside a suave swing beat. Then there's "Crazy Love," an acoustic ballad delivered in a captivating falsetto, and the blockbuster "Caravan." Combined, these songs make known the overwhelming range of Morrison's compositional skills and performing prowess. The transcendent "Into the Mystic" contains enigmatic yearnings and wanderlust that communicate, with tremendous power, a kind of delirious mysticism. It is one of the greatest recordings ever made. And this album is amongst the best you'll ever hear - there isn't a bad track on it. Believe me.

Of course, you could say the ones downstairs have got video on them and those upstairs have only got still pictures and better sound, which may seem a little more succinct but I can't help feel that baffled shoppers will be asking "which can I use?" and "which is best?". To these questions there are no simple answers.

The universality of CD and the clarity of its purpose make life easy and hassle free for all those people who just want to listen to music and not worry about it. Gone are the days of bent styli and nervous excursions across bouncy floors to "change sides". No more do we have to extract mangled tape from capstans or feel sea sick when a cheap C-zero produces more wow than Copocabana. The CD isn't perfect by any means and it is doing, imperfectly, jobs it was never meant for, such a working in portables and cars. But the hoards of shoppers at HMV at least don't have to worry

about whether their disc will play or not, let alone which of many disc types to buy.

The SACD hybrid disc was a good way around this potential problem, having a CD layer that would work in CD players and a high resolution DSD layer that would work in SACD players. But this solution was cleverly turned into a

> problem when less expensive single layer discs without such compatibility appeared, so forcing buyers to distinguish between the two on shop shelves, introducing even more difficulty.

As things stand, CDs provide music and DVDs provide films. It all seems so well worked out. But will all this change?

The world's C.E. business (think Sony, Philips, Toshiba, Panasonic, et al) wants to sell kit; it isn't interested in stasis. And DVD is the new main chance. Dolby Labs interestingly note that Hollywood's fortunes were revived by the arrival of the video tape, contrary to expectation. The film companies have been given an even bigger boost by DVD, which was designed for them – hence surround-sound.

Experiencing this, it is hardly surprising that companies like Warner's feel they can revive music sales by giving consumers a new improved medium, as they did with DVD video, nor that DVD-A prices are to be dropped to compete with CD. They want change and I strongly suspect that the death of the CD player will be followed at attempts on the life of the CD. This means the hoardes of teenage girls who constitute 99% of buyers for major acts like Robbie Williams are just going to have to learn about the meaning of '24/96, PPCM in 5.1 surround' if they want to hear and experience his every last word. I'm not convinced this is going to be good for music sales!

am surprised by the speed at which CD players have been phased out in favour of DVD players and unsettled by the precedent it sets. It appears to be a simple enough example of market forces. If a DVD video

player that can also play CDs costs just £100, why buy a CD? At the same time I can't help feeling that there seems to be an inde-

cent haste by manufacturers to phase them out. Is the CD next I wonder?

From a purely personal point of view I've got nothing against the disappearance of the CD. From the moment it was launched I felt it was pretty obviously flawed and

measurement proved it. What I am talking about isn't the optical disc, which is a stunning success, but the old late-1970s digital coding scheme used to store music on it, namely 16bit at 44.1kHz sampling rate.

With SACD and DVD-A, we have not one but many shiny new coding schemes before us as a potential replacement and they offer superb results. I am happy about this, as you might expect, but at the same time, as I wander around HMV on Oxford Street I have reservations about how it's all going to pan out.

The CD is now a near-universal music carrier, one that people are familiar and happy with. Sound quality is a lot better than it was in the early days, due to SBM, dither and, most importantly, vastly improved digital recording equipment in the studios. Modern CDs generally do a good enough job and HMV on a Saturday before Christmas is a testament to this.

A rack holding SACDs and DVD-A discs is growing in size at a healthy rate. At present, whenever 1 go there I don't have to fight to see what's new. A few wandering shoppers squint at the packages and probably think they are looking at

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
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
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

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ccessories, by which I primarily mean interconnects, 'speaker cables, racks and stands, used to be the pre-

serve of the specialist dealer, but now they can be found everywhere. And I mean everywhere. Only a few years ago it would have been

unheard of for Argos to be selling 'premium' interconnect and S-VHS leads for up to £25, and 'speaker stands that don't wobble when someone in the room sneezes.

Whilst £25 isn't a typical Hi-Fi World reader's idea of a

premium lead, to an average Argos customer this outlay represents quite some leap of faith. When a lead costing a fifth of the price will do the same job why should they pay the extra? But it does appear that the public at large is now willing to pay extra for better quality leads and stands. So to whom does the accessory market owe their thanks and livelihood?

In actual fact the burgeoning accessory trade of today doesn't go back as far as you might think. Twenty-five years or so ago, there were very few tweaky bits for even the most die hard of audiophiles. Those that did exist, along with anti-static guns and sticky-roller record cleaners, were very specialist and often of questionable worth.

From the beginning of the 1980s however, the importance of decent hi-fi supports began to become clear to the hi-fi separates market. Companies such as Target, Sound Organisation and Partington were proving that a decent 'speaker stand and rack unit could actually improve the sound of your system.

This is still a busy market although, thankfully, many of today's equipment supports don't look like GCSE CDT students' projects. Glass rather than black ash vinyl, and smooth, coloured paint or wood has replaced black Hammerite to form rather more harmonious designs. If you're really serious about supports then companies such as Mana or Torlyte will happily stretch your budget to 4 figures.

> The accessory that changed the whole status quo was QED's 79 strand cable. Launched in the late 1970s, it was the 'speaker cable that was responsible for weaning the British enthusiast off scrawny bell wire. Ten years on and QED were still selling the stuff by the mile, yet by the late eighties the competition had caught up. DNM and the Swedish Supra cable were the new budget kings, and the Americans had very much arrived with Monster, Audioquest and Kimber all enjoying a high profile within the accessory market. Yet, despite the proliferation of brands, better quality cables and the like were still very much the preserve of the enthusiast even though, by now, pretty much all buyers of hi-fi separates were aware of the benefits.

> It took the increasing popularity of home cinema, incorporating DVD, to give second wind to the market. By the late 1990s, leads that had previously only sold in relatively small quantities, were now beginning to motor out of retailers at an astonishing rate. Look to further than humble optical and coax digital leads as an example. Before the advent of DVD they had

only really ever sold to a tiny proportion of buyers with separate CD transports and DACs. Now, with record breaking sales of DVD players, a vast new market suddenly opened up for such leads, as they were needed to link a DVD to a surround-sound receiver or an active 'speaker package.

OED overlooked this market. In the early-to-mid 1990s it was companies such as Ixos, Vivanco and Bandridge that divided the spoils. Yet as the count down to the millenium began, QED did get its act together and produced the highly successful Scart range of AV leads. This time they were proving that enthusiasts at all levels would happily pay £50 for a Scart lead just as they had paid a heady £1 per meter instead of 10p for 'speaker cable 20 years ago. The trouble is that once you've paid £50 for a lead and noticed the difference, there can be no stopping the upgrade

This is a phenomenon that cable specialist Russ Andrews is well aware of. Andrews has built a highly successful business around the adage that one should spend 90% of one's budget on cables and 10% on the equipment (fancy that!), rather than vice versa! This seems difficult until you see that it's quite possible to spend £8435 on a 3.4m pair of Kimber 'speaker cables, £923 on an interconnect and £1049 on a mains purifier block. That's before you've even taken into account racks, stands, bi-wirable jumpers and oak feet!

Clearly one could develop a serious fetish here. At these sorts of prices, the term 'premium' is truly justified. Somehow though, I should think that the chances of Argos stocking this sort of kit are pretty extreme. Then again, twentyfive years ago, paying extra for cables would be seen as a joke, so whose laughing now?

# FAST TRACKER

David Price looks at one of Pioneer's most interesting products of the nineties, the D-07 double-speed DAT recorder.

ike most of Japan's electronics manufacturers, Pioneer does video and car audio in addition to its hi-fi range, but unlike many it does not make

air conditioners, rice cookers or washing machines. This is a telling indication as to where the company's loyalties lie - it's seriously into audio and not just doing it to maintain a market share. As a result, it has come up with some pretty remarkable products over the years, giving it the deserved reputation (in its home country at least) of a forward-looking, go-ahead manufacturer.

Just as we've seen with DVD, Pioneer has often played a leading role in new formats and technologies as they've rolled out through the years. In the seventies, it came up with some cracking open reel tape decks (RT-707, RT-909) which led the way in user-friendliness thanks to superb guartz-locked, direct drive auto-reverse transports. It was a big shot in cassette too, making decks that pushed the format to the limit and gave it that all-important audiophile respectability (CTF-950, CTF-1000). Then there was LaserDisc (or LD as it's called in Japan) - Pioneer virtually singlehandedly made this format the huge success it has been - in the Far East, at least.

When DAT arrived in 1987, it didn't come as a huge surprise to find the company right behind the new format. The D-1000 was the company's first effort introduced in April of that year. Built like a leadclad brick outhouse and finished in classic eighties black with rosewood side-cheeks (nice!), it both looked and sounded the part. Pioneer followed it up with the cheaper D-900, and then the D-50 and D-80, all of which offered sleeker ergonomics and

more svelte nineties-style aesthetics. These all sold well, but the company's first real push into the big league was in October 1992, when Pioneer came up with a fiendishly good idea.

The D-07 borrowed an idea from the old days of analogue tape. Back in the late seventies, Marantz launched a cassette deck that offered a choice of two speeds - either the standard 4.75cm/s or 9.5cm/s. Obviously, double speed used the tape twice as fast, but offered stunning sound quality, particularly with the (then) new metal tape formulations. With the D-07, Pioneer did exactly the same, which in the digital domain equated to upping the sampling frequency from DAT's standard 48kHz to 96kHz. Thus was born the first 'Super DAT' recorder.

Two things determine the quality of a digital recording - bit depth and sampling frequency. The former describes the dynamic range and resolution of the sound, the latter the frequency response and indirectly - high frequency distortion. Raising the sampling rate moves the upper end of the frequency range (where PCM is most ragged and distortion-prone) higher away from the audio band, making more a smoother, more natural and atmospheric sound.

While Pioneer couldn't increase DAT's bit depth from its existing 16bits without completely voiding its specification, fitting a front panel



switch allowing users to push up the sampling frequency to 96kHz was a clever wheeze. Users could choose 48kHz (or 44.1kHz or 32kHz) as per DAT's existing specifications, but if they wanted particularly high quality recordings (that would play back on Pioneer S-DAT decks only), they could twiddle their knob. The only trade-off was - of course - the playing time of the tape was reduced by half. Yet, a 120 minute DAT tape would still give an hour's continuous recording, so all was not lost.

Unlike Sony's Super Bit Mapping (SBM) system, which dithered the least significant bit to squeeze a little extra from DAT's 16bit digital word, S-DAT wasn't compatible with all DAT machines, but in its defence, it gave dramatically better results. The flat frequency response from 25-44000Hz made for a beautifully smooth and open sound - far better than that of Compact Disc and any rival DAT machine, for that matter.

These days, you'll have to look hard for a D-07. The internet is a good place, as they do come up from time to time as recording studios or home musicians sell their gear. It was a big (440x141x375mm), heavy (8kg) and expensive (£1,500) machine when new, so don't expect to get it for a song. Find a good one for under £500 however and you'll have a brilliantly effective way of recording analogue music and a perfect partner for a new PC-based 24/96 music system.

eviewing Origin Live's Illustrious tonearm kind-of made me think back to 1987, the year that saw the economy boom,

house prices soar and Kylie Minogue hit the top of the charts (any of this sound familiar?). It also gave us analogue addicts a mess of high-end

'super arms' to aspire to. Within the space of twelve months or so, three of the world's best ever tonearms arrived -SME's Series V, Linn's Ekos and Naim's ARO. Remembering my favourite Oscar Wilde aphorism, "I can resist anything but temptation", as a young Linn Sondek-owning vinyl junkie I felt compelled to hot foot it down to my local hi-fi dealer to get a piece of the action.

Having just blown most of my student grant (remember them?) on a shiny new Linn Ittok LVII, the solemn decision was made to audition the aforementioned new pickups and be prepared for the worst. which was that I'd invariably have to blow another six months worth of 'bread, beer and book' allowance on the most expensive of the three. In fact, after auditioning them in three separate locations (thanks Reading Hi-Fi, Aylesbury Audio and Westwood and Mason as was!) I came to the curious conclusion that none were as transcendentally, transplendently or sublimely superior to my humble LVII, whatever the magazine reviews had suggested to the contrary. True, all of them bettered ex-'best arm in the world' in some ways, but none managed to comprehensively outclass it. Crestfallen, I emerged from my protracted listening sessions without the anticipated sizeable addition to my already well cultivated overdraft, and was forced to splash out on some vinyl instead, by way of compensation.

This left me with a dilemma. I'd heard what my Ittok was doing wrong - or rather what it wasn't doing right - but still hadn't heard a musically convincing alternative without the Tik-Tok's faults. I'd learned that the Linn was a little course in the treble, had a tonally thin and slightly ragged midband

> with a good deal of low level muddle, and a bass that although tuneful enough seemed like that of AM radio compared to the SME Series V.

The new Linn Ekos sounded a good bit better than my Ittok - a little tighter, smoother, cleaner, more composed, better focussed and musically cohesive - but that's all it was, just a usefully 'improved' version of the same

The SME was so dramatically different to the Ekos that my initial response had been one of shock incredibly tight, tonally and texturally detailed, great dynamics and a bass to blow my socks off - it was a real stunner. However, protracted listening had me seriously worried about its rhythmic abilities, and capacity to musically involve me.

The ARO was the unexpected surprise. Initially quite disappointing, it was unshowy, dynamically curtailed and not particularly forthcoming. The longer I listened however, the more I was convinced of this arm's intrinsic rhythmic 'rightness' - to the point that after hour upon hour of wading through the first side of Kraftwerk's then just-released 'Electric Café', I seriously couldn't listen to any other arm. Confusing stuff!

I returned to my lttok and all its failings, only to live with it happily for another four years until I got the bug again. This time it was a plain, unmodded Rega RB300 that threatened the LVII's place on my Sondek armboard, and this time the Linn lost. I was amazed by how good the Rega arm was, and particularly

> by its midband smoothness and detail. A simple yet complex one-piece casting with tapered arm tube and integral headshell, this arm was unique in its construction. Every detail had been well thought out and executed, from tungsten counterweight to low friction bearings. However, it was -

perversely - a budget design built down to a price that introduced some compromises and I did realise it was miles behind in the bass and in the treble, where it sounded curtailed and uninvolving compared to my previous arm.

It was fortuitous that I moved to the Rega at this time, for the next decade saw a raft of mods to catapult it right to the top of the tree. Within months of its introduction in 1983, the RB300 established itself as something of a giant killer. Originally retailing for £88, it pasted a good number of arms at five times the price. More amazing was that the standard offthe-shelf item was a long way off giving of its best. A few well chosen tweaks could expunge its greyish, dry sound and turn it into an incredibly open and self-effacing tool. For this we have Origin Live's Mark Baker to thank. All his knowledge, time and effort has gone into the Illustrious, and the result is a tonearm that comfortably surpasses those in the class of '87. Twenty years after the launch of the Rega, who'd have thought that a company most famous for tweaking it would have come up with such a world beater?

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
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## LINKED BOXES

In this month's cable round-up Hi-Fi World's wire master listens to two 'speaker cables for the serious minded upgrader.

#### CHORD COMPANY ODYSSEY 2 £17.99 PER METRE



hord hold a firm place in the market for delivering high quality cable that has a well balance sonic signature for relatively little

money - a traditional 'real world' hi-fi product. Their range of 'speaker cable caters more for the affordable end of the market. Indeed at £17.99 per metre, the single wire Odyssey 2 featured here represents their top of the range 'speaker cable at a price that many other cables start at.

The Odyssey 2 is a two core construction (Odyssey 4 is the biwire version which uses four cores) and uses a twisted pair design with Teflon insulation, which attempts to keep capacitance low and maintain a consistently low dielectic constant.

Each one of the twelve conductors consists of nineteen 0.045mm strands of silver plated oxygen free copper which are heavily plated because most of the signal travels on the conductor's surface.

Various terminations are available. We had Chords usual 4mm plugs. It's a fairly thick cable with a tough outer jacket, finished in pure white. This is apparently to ensure it looks "inconspicuous against a typical skirting board." Well, mine are stained wood but that's another matter!

Being the top dog in Chord's speaker cable range means that the Odyssey has more space and transparency than the lower priced cables. This manifests itself in good recordings such as Mahler's Das Lied von der Erde on Reference Recordings. The depth of stage was very deep and spacious and instruments had fine lucidity. Wood wind was especially light and realistic. Rock music relayed much of Chord's traditionally impressive traits such as excellent tonal balance and smoothness. There was little overt sibilance to Beth Orton's voice in her 'Trailerpark' CD and each layer of the mix was discernable and lyrical. Ultimately, this doesn't have the kind of transparency you'll find with the likes of Nordost's products, but then they're at least three times as expensive. So a great buy then, the Odyssey represents specialist audiophile sounding cable at a real world price and a great upgrade from your entry level fare.

#### HI-DIAMOND POWER +4 £110 PER 2 METRE PAIR (TERMINATED)



Exotically named Hi-Diamond hail from Italy. Although we're well aware of Italy's hi-fi industry, this is the first cable manufacturer from the nation of opera that we've encountered.

The Power +4 is an entry level 'speaker cable in the company's range so this is no budget minded operation and the product has to work at this price sector. It comes with forked connectors that whilst a bit fiddly, ensure a good signal when connected. Not much in the way of technical specification was available to us but there is heavy screening and sheathing involved and capacitance claims to be very low. There are two conductors, each made of eighty 0.22mm copper strands. The company claim to concentrate, among other things, in relaying realistic dynamic information. The outer layer is a very flexible, black PVC jacket and it's worth noting that Italians even like their cable to look and feel good - it's very well constructed and nice to the touch. To top it all, it even comes in a highly desirable and stylish blue drawstring suede bag!

This is impressive cable, especially in terms of transparency and openness. The soundstaging is wide and clarity is tip-top. In Das Lied von der Erde, the orchestra was very natural sounding with no synthetic timbre or harshness. The +4 cable managed to marry fine low level detail and good dynamics with a sweet treble that did not grate violins were very rich, yet high percussion open and sparkling. Whilst not up there with the Mahler piece for ultimate showmanship, the Hi-Diamond made good work of Beth Orton's folky warblings and acoustic guitar strumming. Vocals were very impressive and natural, yet also well controlled and balanced perfectly with the rest of the mix. Not cheap then, but a good performer, the Hi-Diamond range judging from the +4 promises much.

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#### PLAY IT AGAIN, CREATIVE

The people behind the innovative DAP Jukebox have come up with its replacement, the imaginatively titled Jukebox 2. Said to be Creative Labs' first MP3 player to feature fast USB 2.0 connectivity, it comes with a IOGB hard disk that holds 2000 MP3 or 4000 WMA songs, as well as being able to back-up, store, manage, and transport photo, text and video files. Its rechargeable battery gives up to 16 hours of playing time, and the player is claimed to offer "exceptional audio quality" with a quoted signal-to-noise ratio of 98dB. It features AudioSync, which lets users synchronise music files with multiple PCs, a four-band custom equaliser and Smart Volume Management, which matches volume variations across tracks. <u>www.europe.creative.com</u>

#### MORE MUSIC BIZ WOES.

MP3 piracy and CD copying are cited by the IFPI (International

Federation of the Phonographic Industry) as reasons for the latest reported slump in music sales. It says the value of global recorded music shipments in the first six months of 2002 was down 9.2% from the same period last year, accompanying an 11.2% drop in units shipped world-wide. This contrasts with the same period last year, where there was a value dip of 5%, and two years ago when there was a 6.7% decline in units. This appears to tie in with another study, which shows that soundtrack album sales have been hit of late, thanks to illegal downloading. Panelists at the Hollywood Reporter/ Billboard Film & TV Music Conference in L.A. said that some 25 to 30 soundtracks reached gold disc status, or better, every year from 1996 to 99, but only 10 to 15 have sold as well since.

#### **AUDIO STREAMIUM**

From MP3 CD portables to digital audio players, Philips has long been at the forefront of computer audio devices. The new Streamium MC-i200 takes the idea a step further, as the world's first micro hi-fi system with a built-in broadband Internet connection. At the press of a button, it connects to the Internet and automatically streams music from all over the world, as easily as a conventional tuner selects a broadcast radio station. Philips says it offers 'always-on' access to thousands of online radio stations by working in conjunction with a dedicated website, which also lets users upgrade their system's internal audio codecs, effectively future-proofing it.

The company says this is 'only just the very beginning' of the Streamium concept. It has linked up with the likes of AOL Music, Andante, MP3.com, Musicmatch, Radio Free Virgin and LIVE365.com to deliver a selection of features and services available through my.philips.com. 'Personalised Internet Radio' lets users create their own customised radio stations, which seeks out and plays specific material from the huge range available online. There are even dedicated 'Online Music Charts', updated daily and ready to select songs from the user's preferred musical genre. Insert a standard CD and the system goes online to get its text information, or even e-mail information about it to the user's registered e-mail address.

The £400 package plays regular audio CDs, CD-Rs, CD-RWs, MP3 CDs and even the new MP3PRO format. A full-function RDS FM/MW/LW radio tuner is included, plus a 2x50 Watts RMS amplifier and 'speakers featuring flat, aluminium-alloy speaker cones. As the first in a series of 'Internet infotainment' products that Philips says will become the mainstay of its strategy in years to come, it's a significant product. http://my.philips.com.



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#### **MULTI-CHOICE**

The notorious DVD format war could be coming to an end, with the news of new drives from Sony and NEC that read and write all formats. The Sony products, out around now, comprise the DRU500A internal and DRX500UL external drives, priced at £249 and £379

respectively. They offer 4x DVD-R writing speed, 2.4x DVD+R/+RW and 2x DVD-RW writing, and can read all DVDs at 8x. NEC's MultiSpin ND-1100A internal multiformat burner will cost about £249 and promises to be the first to work with the new 4x DVD+R specification. It also reads DVDs at 12x and writes DVD-R at 4x, DVD-RW at 2x and DVD+RW at 2.4x.

#### PLAY ON

Imation's new MusicUS-B player/burner uses DataPlay digital media, which are double-sided micro-optical discs about the size of a fifty pence piece. They can

record 500MB of digital content (11 hours of MP3 music, or books, games, images, computer files, etc) on a single disc and play it back on any DataPlay-enabled device,

such as digital music players, e-books, portable games or digital cameras. Available in a choice of amethyst, red and gold, the discs have an estimated archival life of 100 years. BMG has just shipped its first thirteen DataPlay disc releases in the US, including albums by Pink, Outkast, Brooks & Dunn, and Britney Spears. Priced at \$15.98, they also include music videos, cover art, bios, and other material. www.imation.com.

#### **HI-FI PC IS HERE**

Motherboard manufacturer VIA Technologies' new Hi-Fi PC is first ever to feature a multimedia player application that resides in BIOS. A computer's Basic Input Output System is usually just used to configure hardware and boot the operating system, but the Hi-Fi PC's design means it works as a media player instantly upon switch on (just like hifi), without having to first load up software. The system is called, fittingly, PlayNow! and comes with a remote control and a small character-based LCD panel on the computer fascia to display playlists. Hi-Fi PC is said to work within five seconds of switch on, but if no button is pressed on the remote control then the computer boots up its standard Windows XP operating system.

The system is initially to be sold on an OEM basis to other manufacturers, who'll turn it into a fully featured, branded product. It's expected to cost around £799 for the complete system including monitor. The Hi-Fi has been previewed in a brushed aluminium casing, designed to make it look like audio equipment. Several hi-fi manufacturers are said to be interested, along with a number of PC brands. At its heart is VIA's EPIA-M motherboard, boasting a 933MHz C3 processor, a new Castle Rock graphics engine and an updated chipset called CLE266 which supports up to IGB of 266MHZ DDR memory. There's also a hardware MPEG decoder which makes it possible to pay full-screen DVDs at 30 frames per second - hardware DVD encoding and 24bit audio support will be optional. #### WHAT THE WORLD IS WAITING FOR!

This is it! The new recordable DVD-Audio specification has been announced, letting users record, edit and replay audio at very high resolutions, on writable DVDs. Not only can it record in Linear PCM or packed PCM (using Meridian Lossless Packing), but there's the option of using any one of six lossy codecs (such as Dolby Digital and DTS) for extended playing times. As well as audio, DVD-AR lets users store still pictures and text.

The v0.9 issue of recordable DVD-A was completed and approved by the DVD Forum's Steering Committee in late July, with the finalised v1.0 spec becoming a reality early in the new year. The only thorny issue now is - you've guessed it copy-protection, 4C, the group behind the Content Protection for Pre-recorded Media (CPPM) scheme used for current DVD-Audio releases is now busy working on DVD-AR version. The Firewire (IEEE-1394) interface is said to make the transmission of copy-protected digital data to and from recorder and players possible.

DVD-AR discs can be created using both lossless and lossy compression, or lossy codecs alone -PCM (or either the packed or unpacked variety) isn't required on the disc. A welter of audio formats feature in its specification, at a dizzying number of bitrates. They include two channel Linear or Packed PCM at 44, 48, 88, 96, 176 or 192kHz sampling frequencies, or six channel at 44, 48, 88 or 96kHz. Dolby Digital is included at 44 and 48kHz, two channel DTS at 44, 48, 88, 96, 176 or 192kHz with six channel at 44, 48, 88 and 96kHz. MPEG-1/2 Layer Il is at 44 or 48kHz running at 384kbps and MPEG-2 at 912kb/s. Six channel ATRAC-3 is provided at 44 and 48kHz sampling frequencies at a bitrate of 750kbps. Two channel MP3PRO working at 44 or 48kHz runs at up to 320kbps, and MPEG-2 AAC is provided in up to six channels working at 44, 48, 88 and 96kHz sampling rates and a bitrate of 1,500kbps. Playing times depend on the format, obviously, but PCM and PPCM should give up to eleven hours of recording time, whereas low rate compressed codecs could give up to eighty hours on a single disc. Watch this space!

## PRO LINK

If you're of the opinion that the only good soundcard is no soundcard, then you'll love this. David Price listens to Xitel's Pro Hi-Fi Link.

> ix months ago, I tried out two curious creations by Xitel - the Analogue Link and the Digital Link. The Pro Hi-Fi Link you see

before you is basically an amalgam of the two, with some added functionality, some great bundled software and enough cabling to wire up a large Scottish island.

If you missed the original review, the idea behind both was simple - the soundcards built into most PCs are awful enough to dispense with at the earliest possible moment, and that instead of having to pull your PC apart, there is an easier way! All Xitel Hi-Fi Links use the USB port, fitted to virtually every PC since 1998, as a way of piping out the pure, unsullied digital audio stream direct from your motherboard to the outside world, where you may do with it what you wish!

Actually, the Analogue Hi-Fi Link came complete with a digital-toanalogue converter, thus giving a line level analogue audio feed via RCA phono sockets. The Digital Hi-Fi Link yes, you've guessed it - simply provided coaxial and optical digital outs. At £99.95 (or less) the Pro Hi-Fi Link offers the functionality of both (and then some), and costs less than the price of both of the former put together.

The box itself is a lightweight, but decently well made piece of silver painted plastic. Inside is a small 20-bit DAC chip and shielded analogue output op-amp. Digital output socketry is fitted, featuring clock matching and buffered synchronisation. One side of the case has the analogue and digital outputs, the other sports the USB digital Input socket.

The cabling supplied with this unit is its major distinguishing feature. The retail carton weighs a tonne, mainly on account of the thirty feet of 'studio grade' TOSLINK fibre optical cable, thirty feet of shielded coaxial digital cable and thirty feet of analogue interconnect. Also inside is the USB connection cable and a CD-ROM, complete with Power DVD software - more of which later.

Installation with Windows XP was easy - simple plug in the Pro Hi-Fi Link and wait for the 'pling' as Windows tells you its found it! In the instruction manual, Xitel recommends doing a Restart for good measure, however. Then you can install the Power DVD XP 4.0 software (if required). This is a standalone application simply to let you watch DVDs on your PC (assuming it has a DVD-ROM built in) - and pipe a 5.1 channel Dolby AC3 or DTS audiostream out of the Xitel's digital outputs.

The Pro Hi-Fi Link does not contain a decoder for either, but lets you connect your PC to a 5.1 preamp, amplifier or receiver with a digital in, which can then do the decoding. Speaking as an avowed DTS fan, I can only applaud this - some of those 5.1 audio discs are quite special! Power DVD even has a Dolby Pro Logic II decoder, for virtual surround-sound, plus SRS TruSurroundXT and Dolby Digital Dynamic Range Control. There's even the option to mix Low Frequency Effect into headphones or two or four-speaker systems. Versatile stuff!

So how does it sound? Via digital it's excellent, giving an utterly convincing digital datastream into either 16/44 two channel hi-fl DACs (such as my reference Cambridge Audio DAC3), or a multichannel preamp/processor.

Its analogue output is impressive, but obviously not up to the standards of a decent hi-fi DAC (it is, after all, just a low price audio accessory). Much like the Analogue Link, it has a smooth, even sound with a decently fulsome bass and sweet treble. Still, it's well up to the likes of Pure Digital's SonicXplosion, and miles better than your average PC soundcard. Indeed, it's a revelation with notebook computers, such are their low standards of multimedia equipment.

Overall then, a great package. I find these Xitel gizmos are particularly handy with notebooks, but the benefits the Pro Hi-Fi Link confers are no less apparent with desktops. Assuming you've got the requisite digital converter, it's a quick and easy way to get decent basic hi-fi sound from your MP3 files, internet radio, CDs and DVDs - and yet there's power enough to really go to town and listen to DTS or Dolby Digital if you like. Excellent value! Now, does anybody want to buy ninety feet of cheap audio interconnects?

After the SonicFury comes the SonicXplosion DVD, Pure's latest affront to the established sub-£100 soundcard order. David Price holds on to his hat.



wo years ago, VideoLogic (as was) unleashed the SonicFury upon us - a seventy pound soundcard with much of the

functionality of Creative Labs' SoundBlaster Live, but none of the gimmicks. Now, recently renamed as Pure, we have the SonicXplosion, set to do the same to Creative's Audigy.

The SonicFury was notable as the first 'high-performance' six channel soundcard. The SonicXplosion continues this theme, presenting itself as the first soundcard product to support all major home theatre standards, including DTS, Pro Logic II and Dolby Headphone. The gold-plated back-end of the card is packed with socketry, including three stereo minijacks giving a 5.1 channel line output, TOSLINK digital inputs and outputs (offering Dolby AC-3 passthrough as well as pure PCM), a microphone input and a stereo line input - also configurable as a headphone output.

On the board itself, four edge connectors give two CD inputs, an Aux input and a digital input for the CD-ROM drive. There's also a Gameport connector - MIDI comes supplied in the form of a separate 15-pin port.

The brain of the card is Cirrus Logic's Crystal CS4630 audio DSP, with 96 stream DirectSound / DirectSound3D acceleration and 64 voice hardware wavetable engine. This handles all music decoding and playback duties, talking the load off the CPU whether it's DirectSound 3D for games, MP3s or WAV files for music or wavetable effects for MIDI.

This soundcard's programmable design means you can make firmware upgrades for future audio codecs. Its analogue section has a claimed 97dB signal-to-noise ratio, and an 18-bit A-D converter is provided for recording, accompanied by six 20-bit DACs for playback.

Fitting the SonicXplosion was totally straightforward. The card slotted straight into my PC's motherboard PCI socket, was

secured in place and then the system switched on. The supplied set-up CD-ROM took over, and the SonicXplosion was soon operational. If for any reason you experience installation problems, there's a technical support section on the website. The driver control panel offers individual level controls for each input, along with a presetable 10-band graphic equaliser (via hardware). The control panel also lets you set the card up for variously two, four or six speakers, each optimisable by the DSP engine for best sound. Indeed, there's a handy

speaker positioning and testing feature.

All well and good, but how does it sound? It's not bad with 16bit CD, with a smooth and slightly softened presentation that's a long way from the raucous distortion that emanates from many a cheap card. Compared to my reference Cambridge Audio DACMagic, it sounded much as 1 remember the SonicFury. Just a little lighter and faster in the bass, a tad faster and grippier and a touch more tonally forward. DTS was a different story of course, with sweet sonics from the small range of DTS encoded audio discs available.

Without a doubt, SonicXplosion advances the art of cheap multichannel soundcards. But if it's two channel that floats your boat then you should remember that paying twice the price will buy you one of the new generation of 24/96 designs. A good, well presented product then, that's ideal if you want 5.1 on the cheap, but stereophiles might look elsewhere.

# EASY DRIVER



MP3 is moving off computers and into cars, but how does it sound? David Price traces the transition and test drives JVC's KD-SH99RB MP3-CD tuner.



sn't it amazing how the uses that people put to audio formats is often so different to those envisaged by their creators? Take the classic example of Philips, who in 1963

introduced a mobile dictation medium called the 'Compact Cassette'. Twenty five years later, in 1988, it was the world's best selling format for pre-recorded music, outselling both the previously all-conquering Long Playing vinyl record and the high tech Compact Disc which was already five years into its lifetime!

Although MP3 has only been around for five years, there are already some parallels to be drawn. Its originators had no grand designs for it - unlike so many other formats such as Elcaset, DCC and MiniDisc. Rather, it was a humble music carrier for use on computers. A way of compressing music down to a manageable size (a four minute song would take 40MB in WAV format, but you could reduce it to 4MB in MP3) so that it could be conveniently electronically transferred, few other formats were as unprepossessing. The rest, as they say, is history.

Within two years of its birth, it was the subject of a major lawsuit in the US involving the entire recording industry, which saw it as the end of civilisation as they knew it. It shocked the music companies into changing their whole approach to music marketing. Music 'file-swapping' networks like Napster suddenly made it possible for anyone (online) anywhere to hear any music they could possibly imagine. Wave after wave of 'digital audio portables'

JVC KD-SH99RB

This beautifully made £350 CD-tuner-amplifier plays MP3s along with standard CDs, CD-Rs and CD-RWs, and will also control an external DVD player or Digital Radio module. It's expensive, but this is reflected in the svelte cast aluminium faceplate that slides out and clips off for security. The disc transport proved faultless - fast and decisive no matter whether it was a 'real' CD or cheap CD-R media, it didn't skip or jump during the test period once. This is hooked up to a 24bit DAC. The FM tuner section was very impressive too - giving a crisp and smooth sound with no reception difficulties. Shame there's no Radio Text, though.

The equaliser gives a vast number of adjustments (bass, mid and treble frequencies, gain, slope, etc.) that let you get a really convincing sound regardless of your car's acoustic environment. Other clever features include a front panel 3.5mm auxiliary input jack - great for hooking up your MiniDisc portable or Apple iPod - and a rear line input. A subwoofer output completes the package.

Sound via standard CD is excellent - close to Nakamichi levels and a good way above rival Kenwoods and Sonys. MP3 sound depends on the quality of the original encoder of course, but 320kbps Fraunhofer files were impressive - sounding just a little looser and flatter than uncompressed PCM - more than good enough for a noisy car and mediocre door speakers. The four channel 50W RMS amplifier section packs a hefty punch, although really bass heavy music played at high levels for long periods had it saturating. Overall, it's a great argument for automotive MP3! arrived, bringing untold freedom to those who listen to music on the move. And then, just when the heat seemed to be going out of the 'MP3 boom', so the format evolved further still.

From initially being a hard diskbased format and then one carried in the flash memory of portable players, MP3 duly moved onto Compact Disc - or data CD-R to be precise. A whole new wave of hi-fi hardware has duly come out sporting computer CD-ROM (as opposed to hi-fi CD) transports, offering a vast increase in playback possibilities. Now, with products like JVC's KD-SH99RB below, these have moved into the domain of the car, too.

So why have an MP3 car CD player? Well, instead of going to the trouble of physically installing a car CD changer unit in your boot, you can get similar amounts of music on one MP3 CD-R disc. Instead of having to fiddle around loading the changer 'magazines' with discs, you just slot your single MP3 CD into the dashboard mounted head unit. Then there's cost - CD changers can cost up to £250 to have installed, assuming your car's 'head unit' will actually accept one in the first place whereas every modern PC comes with a CD burner that lets you make MP3 CDs for free. Until the advent of cheap hard disk-based car players, MP3 pretty much wins the day.





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# WORLD WINNERS 2002

#### Here's our round up the best products of the year.

A/V AMPLIFIERS

**CYRUS** AV8

#### £1,100.00



The AV8 is essentially the AV5 with the bugs ironed out. Visually almost identical, it's housed in the same inverted half-width (73x215x360mm) alloy case with large backlit green LC display. Inside, its predecessor's 40VA toroidal PSU is retained but the circuitry is tweaked for an improved signal to noise ratio, with better clocking for lower jitter. The former's Spartan feature set is bolstered by Dolby Pro Logic II (which brings separate full bandwidth surround channel decoding, configurable for either movies or music). This is worth having, but it's hardly earth-shattering stuff. Audiophiles know that DTS is where it's happening right now, the omission of DTS-ES Extended Surround is a shame. Still, better sub bass bandwidth, improved MC-BUS software, an enhanced bass management system and new DTS mixdown options are added. Best of all for us two-channel migrants is the new provision of a 'stereo and sub' mode, which lets you run multichannel sources into ye olde twochannel hi-fi speaker pairs.

In 5.1 channel line-level mode, the extra resolution from a DVD-A pressing of America's 'Homecoming' really got the Cyrus singing. Whereas your average £2,000 Japanese AV amp sounds edgy and forward with high resolution digital, the AV8 positively shone, giving a beautifully full and open performance. Treble was sweet and atmospheric, with plenty of air and space. Midband was vast, with a walkaround soundstage, and bass full and powerful. A great performance, and head and shoulders above its non-specialist competition. DTS sound was great - rich and sweet and rhythmically very involving, I'd always recommend searching out movies encoded in DTS over Dolby.

This product is a great bridge for twochannel users wishing to go multi-channel. Unless you're running a high-end specialist preamp (of Michell Orca quality, or thereabouts), you'll lose little if any quality by switching to the AV8, and it will improve on the preamp stages of most integrateds. The bonus is, of course, that you'll also have full 5.1 channel capability (for movies or music) and DTS decoding (which is a boon for music-only multichannel devotees) which betters practically any foreign competition in sonic, ergonomic and aesthetic terms. Short of spending £2,500 on Naim's superb AV2 (which is £1,400 more than the Cyrus), I can think of few multichannel preamps than even come close. A true audiophile bargain.

#### **MARANTZ PS17**

#### £2000.00

Indeed, you get some of the best of both worlds. With its large volume control twisted a fair way clockwise, the PS17 showed no signs of strain pushing my hard-to-drive Yamaha monitors to very high levels. To be fair, the VSA-AX10 goes considerably louder still, albeit with less finesse. The Eagles 'Hotel California' on DVD-A showed its bass to be much tighter and faster than my reference World Audio K5881, although it still kept a degree of its fluidity. The result is a punchy and powerful sound that's more beguiling and fluid than many of its two-channel rivals.

Further up the frequency spectrum, the PS17 isn't quite as detailed as I remember the Pioneer being, proving just a little 'oversmooth'. However, like a good valve amp, it's very adept at separating out the different textures of instruments. In other respects it's a little behind its Japanese rival - image placement isn't as exactingly accurate, low level detail isn't as forensically excavated, and there's less sense of a sense of the recorded acoustic falling back to the horizon.

Despite this, the PS17 is still far more musically convincing. Once again it comes back to the natural, cohesive, unforced, (dare I say it) 'organic' way it lets the music flow past you. Treble quality was pure 'PM17' - silky, even when it's not supposed to be! Nice though it is, the phrase 'airbrushed' did cross my mind.

Hooked up to a pair of SM17s, the PS17

makes a cracking multichannel amplifier. The onboard processor is excellent, offering fine sound from DTS and Dolby Digital. A DTS 5.1 disc of Wings' 'Band on the Run' was a joy, brilliantly musically engaging with bags of power, grip, punch and poise.

Done properly in this way, multichannel is very hard to argue with. Once again, that midband really made the Marantz combo a joy - smooth but with loads of textural detailing, it really lets the music's flavour flood out. Paul McCartney's voice was brilliantly full, and rich, and raw.

I am deeply, deeply impressed with this product. It bridges the gap between twochannel and five-point-one brilliantly. It has more features than I've room to go into here, beautiful build and finish, and most importantly superb sound. It gives only a little away to the likes of, say, a Cyrus 7/PSX-R in stereo mode but can be easily upgraded to a serious surround set-up. In a sense, it's what many dyed-in-the-grain audiophiles will have been waiting for - a painless path to multichannel.

#### CARTRIDGES

LINN ADIKT

£195.00



The Adikt sounds superb. It's an altogether more sophisticated performer than the K9 of yore, with a very smooth and even character that still - in true Linn style - cuts straight to the rhythmic chase. Cue up Be Bop Deluxe's 'Modern Music' and you get an impressively expansive soundstage inside which there's a vast amount of detail vying to get out. Bass is dry alright, but considerably warmer and more willing than the K9.

Moving up to the midband, and there's no hint of its predecessor's glare or hardness. Okay, so it's not the softest and mellowest around, but this is still a very even performer

with a particularly grippy nature. Rarely have I heard the rhythm guitars in Corduroy's 'Don't Wait for Monday' so enthusiastically carried. It's as if this cartridge goes straight for the song's jugular, and throws bags of light on it instead of trying to strangle it. Factor its incredible ability go loud then quiet 'at the drop of a hat' and you've got an extremely agile and willing performer.

Treble performance is good, but doesn't match the Dynavector DV10x4, which is altogether more spacious and airy, and also blessed with a delightfully warm nature. By contrast the Adikt is dry and analytical, but such is the massive amount of midband detailing that it doesn't sound out of place.

Downsides? Very few. Indeed, I'd say the Adikt is neck-to-neck with the class of the sub-£200 field (the Dynavector) and in some ways better. Ultimately, it lacks the latter's tonal palette, but makes up for it with an incredibly big hearted, musical sound with bags and detail and decent refinement too. This makes an extremely persuasive case for you to upgrade your old Linn MM, or simply to get a great new cartridge that plays your records with passion. This is a piece of quality hi-fi that, like Ortofon's Kontrapunkt MC models, also has a great element of fun to it. It gets up and boogies but doesn't get on your nerves; your only wish is to join it. It's a cartridge I could get used to.

CD PLAYERS

ARCAM FMJ CD23

Feed the FMJ natural acoustic recordings, such as Lee Morgan's 'The Rajah' - using little more than a pair of crossed mics and a tape whirring away at 15ips - and you begin to suspect that this player sprinkles magic dust on everything it touches. It goes right for the musical jugular and lets the sun shine in. Put against the Naim CD5, and you begin to see what it's doing wrong. Bass is a touch too warm and possesses a little bit too much overhang, the treble is just a little too good (i.e. sweet) to be true and there's a subtle flattening of dynamics.

The new Arcam FMJ CD23 is not dramatically better than its forbear, but the mods have still injected some welcome bite and punch into what was already an extremely fulfilling listen. This player knows the difference between 'thoroughly recreating' the music and deconstructing it, whereas some of its more superficially detailed and punchy rivals do not. Better than ever, if you want a jack of all trades and master of many for under  $\pounds1200$ , I can think of no other machine which comes close.

#### AUDIO ANALOGUE MAESTRO £1500.00



A great, smooth player with digital input capability as a bonus. Using and external transport in the shape of Meridian's 506.24 and a NAD T500 DVD player the Maestro showed what a fine DAC section it has, exploring every avenue of detail and bringing real presence and life into the NAD especially, and agility to the Meridian.

Recommended then? Definitely. there's strong competition at the price from Arcam's FMICD23T (good coherence) and Meridian's 506.24 (plenty of insight). Whilst it doesn't have the insight of the latter it also doesn't suffer from the sluggish bass than can occur with some recordings. It has all the coherence of the Arcam, though, with a little more lyricism to my ear, too. Although it looks like a monster it doesn't sound like one and is surprisingly smooth and subtle at times. At  $\pounds$ 1,500 it stands as a fine buy, with a pleasing. all round sound that takes the 'everyday player' appeal one step further. It's not quite up there with the awesome 3D Nu-vista when it comes to overall detail but at half its price its by no means out of the running and competes easily on the build front.

Moving up the range, the midband is beautifully clean. I was impressed with the lack of distortion - there's little sense of any 'mush' or 'haze'. Instead, you get a clear, open and expressive midband that lets the music flood out. By the standards of its price class, it's superb - I don't think I've heard anything come close. Maybe the Rega Planet 2000 (£200 more cxpensive) betters it, but not by much. Images are big and strong and wide and tall - this CD player is a confident, 'out there' performer. Again, by £1000 standards, you notice a slight lack of grip and imaging precision, and a subtle curtailing of depth perspective.

Air's 'All I Need' showcased the NAD's superb treble. Just as you'd expect from the marque, it's silky sweet (perhaps too much so) and extremely pleasant to listen to. Ultimately you could say it lacks air and space, but again it's nine tenths as good as you'll get from a high end player. Its lack of splash is also particularly impressive for a player at this price - ride cymbals are a joy to behold. Factor in strong dynamics, plenty of speed, lots of grip, fine detailing and the ability to recreate a soundstage convincingly and this player does a lot for the money. The HDCD facility is icing on the cake - it sounded quite superb playing the remastered re-release of Talking Heads' 'Stop Making Sense'.

'Hi-Fi' details aside, the best part of the NAD's performance is the way it knits every element in the mix into an extremely cohesive and musically convincing whole. This player isn't obsessed with detail retrieval like rival Japanese designs, and has a good deal more zest and refinement than its rather bland sounding British price rivals. The result is great music for a relatively modest outlay.

#### **REGA JUPITER 2000**

True, compared to the likes of Naim's CD5 it's just a tad polite, but the overall effect blends well with the Jupiter's sweet, clean and enveloping mid-band. Indeed, female voices are a joy there's no hint of shrillness and this player gets surprisingly close to their grains and textures.

Very 'analogue', the Jupiter goes deep to the heart and soul of the music, leaving very little to criticise behind. The treble is possibly a little over-sweet, and the bass is a tad overblown and detached - but the mid-band is a joy to behold.

The biggest problem I have with the new Jupiter 2000 is its Planet 2000 little brother. Although the former has a noticeably more generous bass and a more organic mid-band, the latter is just so ridiculously good at the price that it almost makes you want to pocket the cash and go for the cheapie. On its own terms though it's superb - one of the very best at the price.

#### **ROTEL RCD 1070**

It was quite surprising to find just how upfront Nelly Furtado's 'Turn Off The Light' sounded. Such was the presence given by the Rotel to her vocals that, at times they could sound just a little too forward. Yet, thanks again to that expansive sound stage, the vocals never managed to sound out of proportion. The deep chested bass response pushed the track along with plenty of gusto although, somewhat curiously, this didn't prevent the impression of slightly turgid timing. There didn't seem to be anything fundamentally wrong here. Just a slight lack of pizzazz compared with a few rivals.

There were no such problems with Vaughan Williams's Intermezzo (My Bonny Boy). The '1070 seemed made for just such mellifluous Classical music. Despite a slight gloss to the strings, the music ebbed and flowed from the Rotel in an effortless manner. It proved delicate and articulate when needed, yet with plenty in reserve for the more dynamic moments. Furthermore, there was a seamlessness throughout the frequency response that led greatly towards a sense of realism.

In conclusion, the Rotel is one of the finest CD players that I've heard for sometime. Indeed I would go so far to say that, at this price, it is the finest no question. When one considers the not unimpressive competition from Marantz, Arcam and others this is no mean achievement. Yet none of these rivals can quite match the Rotel's combination of knock out punch, control and sublime refinement. Best of all, it doesn't seem to matter what the music genre is, the Rotel will always give of its best, remaining captivating even after a prolonged listening session. My only real gripes concern an occasional lack of 'bounce' that can sometimes slow the timing down. Also, there was the odd occasion when the balance was perhaps just a little too smooth. Otherwise, though, this is a superb sounding machine that's solidly built and great value for money.

#### **CD RECORDERS**

#### LACIE FUSION

#### £151.75

The Lacie Fusion is an external CD writer for PCs that possesses the new USB 2.0 interface. It has a 24x12x40x mech, which means it can record a full CD in less than 4 minutes, meaning data backup can be performed at 12x and the drive reads CDs at 40x. It weighs 570g, and measures a highly portable 35x130x173 mm.

USB 2.0, lest we forget, means it's hotpluggable (so it connects to any USB-equipped computer and can easily be shared between users, and is easily installed in a few seconds without rebooting) and also a lot faster than the original USB 1.1 generation of devices. USB 2.0 is expected to gradually come as standard on new PCs. Forty times faster than USB 1.1, the new interface delivers transfer rates of up to 480 Mbits/sec while retaining backward compatibility with USB 1.1 controllers. When plugged into a USB1.1 port, the LaCie Fusion downshifts to 4x4x6x speeds.

The package comes complete with an international power supply, USB 2 cable, and user manuals on CD. It's also bundled with Easy CD Creator for Windows 98SE/2000/ME/XP, and a two-year warranty. It's easy to use - just switch on and plug in, and your Windows OS says it's detected new software and is searching for the drivers. Point it in the direction of the supplied set-up CD, and you're off - simple as that. Then it's just a case of loading the supplied EzCD 5 CD authoring software. This, as regular readers will know, is a fine piece of code, but it's tailored for ease of use, rather than 'power users'. To wit, if you want to know where every sector of the data you're writing is going, you'll have to get Nero instead.

The LaCie works brilliantly. It feels great to use and burns fine sounding CDs, but as always if it's audio CDs you're burning it's safest to keep the speeds down. Sound is excellent - clean and smooth with just the merest scintilla of blurring and softening of the soundstage. If FireWire and BURN-Proof functionality aren't at the top of your list, then this is the one. Beautiful!



Ironically, the NAD's copying abilities far exceed its replay capability. At 1x speed the NAD makes incredibly close copies - with just the merest scintilla of coloration. The stereo image recedes back towards the plane of the speakers a tad, bass is just a touch looser and treble loses a touch of atmosphere. Crank the old girl up to 4x and things barely change - there's just a fraction more clouding and lack of bite. Ironically though, through the C660 none of these differences are audible - it's only when you fire up something of the calibre of, say, a Cyrus CD7/PSX-R that you notice anything. Even through the CD12 with the volume at top whack it was hard to tell the difference.

Another piece of budget esoterica from NAD, then. My thinking goes thus: If you want to get into the CD recording game, then why not buy a double decker? If you're going to buy a double decker, then this is the one to have. Use it by itself and it makes perfectly nice noises, or plug it into a decent DAC and make it sing like a thousand guid CD player. If you've already got a respectable silver disc spinner, then you can just use the NAD for copying duties, which it will perform four times faster than any single deck CD recorder. Now, before I dissolve in a puff of logic, I shall retire to spin off three copies of the new 4hero album - all for my own use, officer.

#### DVD RECORDER PANASONIC DMR-E30 £999



Audio sound quality was very good, from CDs and from recordings. Bass drive was reasonably firm and there was quite a good sense of clarity and time domain resolution. I really couldn't seriously fault the machine in this area, even though audio is not its primary function. It is a very respectable audio recorder all the same, far better than cassette and little different from a normal CD recorder, excepting good ones costing £350 or more. Most people will not want to record a few megabytes of audio permanently to a £25 4.7GB cartridge I'm sure. However, it has the flexibility to provide audio-only recording, whilst also acting as a good quality CD player, as well as being a video player and recorder. That's a lot of ability and it's all handled very slickly.

This is a well honed, quality DVD recorder at a competitive price. Whether buyers will accept DVD-RAM cartridge prices, which remain stubbornly high, is the big question hanging over this DVD recording format.

#### DIGITAL AUDIO RECORDER

#### **TERBATEC CAB4000**

The Terratec Car4000 is a hard disk drive based digital audio recorder (that records up to 540 hours of 128kbp/s mp3), a CD player of no small ability and a digital jukebox for thousands of compressed music tracks (its 40GB capacity is so large that space isn't really a consideration). It boasts onboard analogue to digital converters, meaning you can record direct onto its hard disk via the stereo RCA phono inputs, to record radio for example, or capture speech from a microphone to quarter inch (i.e. 6.3mm) jack sockets. Alternatively, you can take a direct digital line in, bypassing the onboard converters completely, to record from an external DAT or MiniDisc player.

In playback mode, the CAR4000 sounds quite nice. It's obviously curtailed at frequency extremes (particularly the treble), resulting in a very smooth (overly, perhaps) character. Bass is rich and fulsome, albeit lacking in grip and articulation. It is, however, very tuneful making Fun Lovin' Criminal's eponymous album track riotously good fun. In a sense, it reminded me of the old, first generation of CD players, such was its warm, bouncy and musical character. Listen hard for midband detail and you may be disappointed. It's a little fuzzier and less transparent than, say, a NAD C521, but the big, wide, expansive stereo image sort of makes up for it. Hook the unit up to an external DAC or decoder however, and you can bypass its warm and woolly nature and get a very fine sound out, using it as a transport only.

Its uncompressed recording was no less satisfying. Frankly, the internal DACs weren't really able to discern the difference between the original and the recording, but via a high quality outboard Sony unit, just the slightest thinning of the soundstage and lightening of the bass was evident. Still, this is so subtle that it's hard to complain, especially considering the price.

MP3 recording was excellent too. It's unclear as to whether the Fraunhofer codec has been used (it certainly sounds like it, though), but it still does a very good job at bitrates of 192kbps and higher.

Overall, Terratec's CAR4000 is a fine machine. Compared to its deadliest rival, Onkyo's Music Bank, it has a less fussy user interface, a better display, warmer and smoother sound and greater recording

flexibility. The only place it fails is finish, which is a bit 'agricultural'.

#### DIGITAL AUDIO PLAYERS

#### **APPLE IPOD**

Apple's iPod is an important product for two reasons. First, it's a brilliant bit of kit in its own right that raises the digital walkie game still higher. Second - and more importantly it's further confirmation, as if we needed it, of which way the wind is blowing for both the recording and IT industries. Here we see one of the computer business's most influential players (with a tremendous canon of innovative design behind it) going out on a limb to bring digital music to the masses. And when it's Apple, you just know it's gonna be tasty!

The iPod plays music in MP3 and MP3 VBR (variable bit rate) formats at up to 320kbps, as well as AIF and WAV formats. Shame there's no support for AAC though, although this should only be a matter of time. Certainly, there's upgradeable firmware for precisely this reason. Interestingly, Apple has paid attention to the non-headline matters of the analogue output stage - iPod is equipped with a (relatively) beefy 60mW amplifier and even the bundled headphones have halfdecent neodymium magnets for better sound. The package also includes the aforementioned iTunes 2 CD, FireWire cable and FireWirebased power adapter.

#### **FRONTIER LABS NEX II**

The new NEX sounds much like the old one, which is no bad thing. Essentially it has a warm and sumptuous sound - not a million miles from Philips' Rush SA 126 in fact - which makes MP3s of all gualities and bitrates perfectly listenable. Crank up your ripper to 320kbps and use a Fraunhofer codec, and Bob's your Chinese Uncle - the sound becomes sweet, clean and very powerful with fine imaging and a good, musical character. There are far more expensive players which impress less. A fine design then, and incredibly cheap if you buy it online (via secure server) from -

For the price, the Music Bank sounds absolutely superb. Ultimately it is not equipped with the world's best digital converters, so don't expect Linn CD12 levels of performance unless you pipe the audiostream out to an external DAC. However, even via its internal hardware you get a very smooth, sophisticated and sweet musical performance that's almost worthy of being mentioned in the same breath as, say, Arcam's FMJ CD23. This means a decently tight but enjoyably warm bassline, a very smooth and open midband and sweet, silky highs. it's 'hi-fi' in the nicest sense - refined and texturally sophisticated.

As a recorder it is superb - via the digital line in from a Sony TC-D8 DAT source, the MB-S1 shows excellent fidelity to the original. In the top uncompressed PCM mode, there's just a tiny softening and flattening of the stereo perspective, but don't let that put you off - I've yet to hear any digital recorder that doesn't do this. More importantly though, the Onkyo retains the rhythms, dynamics, detail and scale of the recording brilliantly. Likewise, recording uncompressed via the internal CD drive, the results are superb - virtually indistinguishable from the original with just a slight lightening of the bass.

No less impressive is the Music Bank's compressed audio performance - at 192kbps it introduces only a slight 'fuzzing' and clouding of the original. Tonally it's fractionally brighter with bass losing a smidgen of its energy and articulation. Images lose some definition and the soundstage doesn't fall back so convincingly. Old 'tape heads' will best understand the effect as being like using a Ferric tape instead of a full-price Metal on their Nakamichis! Frankly though, I've heard uncompressed PCM sound far worse through cheap CD players.

Aside from the slightly fiddly control layout, cluttered and poorly legible display, there's little to criticise in the MB-S1. It was obviously designed by serious computer audio users and MP3 fans to boot - the 'care and attention' speaks volumes. It's a brilliant product then, with massive potential - it does the job of a CD player, CD multichanger, MiniDisc recorder and DAT deck all in one. This, plus a cheap separate hi-fi CD recorder (or indeed computer CD burner) would be a dynamite combination.

#### STEINBERG CLEAN 3.0 PLUS £69.99



It was back in 1999 that Computer Audio World reviewed the first incarnation of Steinberg Clean! Since then it has lost its exclamation mark and gained two revisions, the latest of which - version 3.0 - is tested here.

For those unfamiliar with the original, Clean is an 'audio restoration' tool that lets you record your distressed LPs onto your computer's hard drive, process them and then burn them to CD-R using your CD-writer. The package isn't designed just for vinyl though because Clean also works its magic on old cassette and open reel tapes, and even iffysounding MP3 music files downloaded from the internet.

Clean 3.0 works superbly - if used sparingly. Simply cranking all the effects up to maximum will make any music sound like it was recorded in a bathroom through a rack of old rock guitar effects pedals. If you go easy and take some time to get it right, however, you'll be amazed at the music's new found clarity and lustre. Settings suitably attuned, as you go through processing each track, the program builds up a playlist for you automatically. When you're done, you can click on the CD-R/CREATE CD-R menu and watch Clean even burn the CD for you.

A brilliant package then, but there's a caveat - the more effects you run, the more your PC will struggle. If you exceed your machine's processing ability, it will start skipping like a scratched record. I found my 750MHz Pentium III with 128MB RAM could just about handle it, but anything less simply isn't enough - for heavy duty work you need a beefy PC.

#### STEINBERG CUBASIS VST 3.0 £59.95

It's true that Cubasis can be used without recourse to the instruction manual, but if you're doing anything seriously then a bit of bedtime reading is definitely in order. Once you've added all your tracks, sounds and MIDI music parts, you save it as a song, arrangement or part, which can then be burned onto CD using the supplied Master Unit software. With up to 48 audio channels and 64 MIDI tracks, you do need some practice to get to give its best.

Essentially then, Cool Edit 2000 and Cubasis VST 3.0 are designed for subtly different users. DV jockeys already using serious video editing applications - and who want the audio equivalent - will love Cool Edit.

Steinberg's Cubasis VST does far more it's all you need for quite intricate soundtracks for your video masterpiece. It combines audio recordings with MIDI and music pretty seamlessly, then lets you burn it to CD. It will even make straight digital copies of music and import MP3 files. That it isn't too far behind CE 2000 in the pure audio stakes is a tribute to the depth and breadth of this package

#### STEINBERG MYMP3PRO £34.99



MP3 Pro uses MP3's coding algorithm to take care of the lower frequencies, along with SBR for the highs. Since this latter 'bolt on' bit needs only a few kbps, it affords backwards compatibility with existing MP3 codecs which simply ignore the SBR part. The problem is that conventional MP3 codecs playing MP3 Pro files won't be able to handle the SBR aspect, and as a result could sound muffled. The thinking goes that 'reasonable compatibility' with the world's most popular compressed audio format is better than nothing at all - which is precisely what its rival AAC affords! New players supporting MP3Pro technology will of course utilise both parts of the new format to take full advantage of the 'Pro' enhancement, since this is still an important part of the new format.

There's a freely downloadable demo of MP3 Pro available from Thomson's website. The company reports that the general consensus of opinion is that the quality of 64 kbps MP3 Pro is similar to 96-128 kbps MP3. This then means that you can get nearly twice the amount of music on a portable or MP3 CD player with MP3 Pro. Thomson says that the forthcoming MP3 Pro CD players will be able to cram over 300 songs on a single compressed CD-R. Its creators claim that at lower bit rates the new format is ideal for web casting and Internet radio, while at higher bit rates it's perfect for high quality audio transmission and storage. The first MP3 Pro products will offer 24, 32, 40 and 48 kbps mono bitrates, along with 32, 40, 48, 56, 64, 80, 96 kbps. For more information, click on:www.mp3prozone.com/

We were mightily impressed with this little package. Any hi-fi fanatic wishing to set up a system in the bedroom/kitchen/study etc. will be pleasantly surprised by the UD-M30 and SC-M50 'speakers. The combination gives a clean and detailed performance, to which the 'speakers contribute much. In this respect Denon's little system is the best option around £300 by far, showing that one-box CD receivers are not the also-rans they were in the past.

#### LINN CLASSIK MOVIE System

Retailing for £1,995 the CMS is a lot more expensive than the original Classik, but it does a lot more too. Its 80x320x325mm dimensions and 5kg weight are pretty similar, but inside you'll find a fully featured DVD player (which plays CDs too, obviously) and a 5.1 channel preamp with a host of facilities (which can also work in standard 2-channel stereo). There's also full Dolby Digital, Dolby Pro-Logic and DTS decoding, a high quality stereo radio tuner with 80 definable presets and a 5 channel power amp offering 40W (into 80hms) per speaker output.

Running through the CMS's own pre and power amps, things were no less impressive. Being a multi-channel amp in a small box, you wouldn't expect thunderous levels of power, but you do get a very taut, grippy and fast sound that retains the refinement of the source. There's a good deal of depth and space to the recorded acoustic, with strongly articulated stereo images and a fine sense of proportion. Dynamics are great - given benign speaker loads this little box goes surprisingly loud with little sign of stress.

Like its audio-only little brother, the new Classik sounds far better than any budget hi-fi amplifier - you'd have to get into £500 plus territory to really improve on it. In absolute terms, it's a little dry and lacking in tonal colour, and the addition of a separate power amp wouldn't hurt with less sensitive speakers, but - considering what it does for the money - it's almost churlish to criticise. As you'd expect, FM and AM sound was excellent - streets ahead of the rubbish you get from your average one-boxers.

Without doubt, this is a genuinely important and special product - it will probably do more to bring audiophiles into the DVD fold than any other to date.

#### RED ROSE SPIRIT SYSTEM £2000.00

Whatever you choose, the Red Rose Spirit system has practically all the sonic benefits of more exotic kit at the sort of price tag normally populated by me-too humble stuff. In fact, it gets to within a hair's whisker of The Rosette/Rosebud kit reviewed in these pages at the start of the year, but shaving almost four grand off the asking price! Oh, the joys of mass-production.

It's a fabulously open, holographic sound with a touch of warmth and a lot of beauty. If you want to experience three-dimensional sound without resort to electrostatics and OTL amps, this gets you closer than it has hitherto been possible at the price. You get a decently wide, extremely deep soundstage with even some semblance of image height. Stick on something well-recorded with a fine soundstage - Ruben Gonzalez for example and the Spirit has Tardis-like expansion qualities to the living room. This fine soundstaging is partnered with a highly listenable, lovely sound. It is warm for solid state gear, but not so warm that it masks information dramatically. It is clear and slightly rich sounding too. All of which adds up to a sound that is extremely natural and pleasing. So you can play disc after disc without the merest hint of fatigue.

Better still, in the average British living room, this is all the speaker you will need unless you live for organ music or dub reggae. It goes surprisingly deep for a small, free space box.

So, why buy anything more expensive? The Spirit system is not the most detailed klt on the planet; rich and warm yes, clean, definitely, but absolutely detailed, no. You never get that feeling on knowing what gauge of strings the guitarist is using or what colour socks the conductor likes to wear that real high-end detail freaks crave. This is where it ultimately differs from the far more expensive Rossette/Rosebud pairing. Nor is this the system for those so tied to the rhythmic qualities of a piece of music they try to tap their foot to a dial tone. And, as you move higher up the Red Rose price list, so you get more of what proves so attractive in the Spirit system in the first place; warmth, beauty and holographic imaging.

For £2,000, the Spirit system is a steal. Put simply, you need to spend double to get a similar level of high-endity, at least in purely sonic virtues.

#### **DENON DVD-A1**

This behemoth build DVD-Audio player is a highly impressive performer with the new high-res format. It has the extension of space, the air and the majesty that is possible. DVD-A discs sound impressively realistic.

What then of its 16/44 performance? This was another impressive area, to say the least. Let's get this straight - it's not the best CD player around, but it has a damn good go at playing these nasty little eighties throwback frisbees. I'd put it into the territory of Arcam's CD23 - possibly just below - which is no mean feat. Once again, that bass impresses. The Clash's 'London Calling' proved that a bit of that DVD-A magic is still there when it's asked to reproduce more primitive formats. It's deep and strong alright, although there's a slight softening and slowing too.

The midband is again smooth and sweet with oodles of detail, and a very conscientious effort is made to recreate the recorded acoustic.

The DVD-A1 is by far the best DVD-Audio player I've heard so far. I reckon the now discontinued Marantz SA-I SACD spinner might teach it a thing or two about subtlety, delicacy and musicality, but what the Denon lacks in this area it makes up in authority, poise, power, grip, control and punch. But then, the Marantz cost twice as much - and didn't play movies, either. That's the strength of this player. If you were going to buy a decent DVD video player anyway, then spending a bit extra for superb sonics seems eminently sensible. You'll certainly find yourself buying loads of new discs - a week with the Denon has got me rummaging around Vivante's website - which is the classic sign of a great machine.

#### DENON DVD 1600

No doubt about it - this is brilliant value. After all, why buy a standard DVD video player when you can get one that does the movie bit and gives dramatically better sonics from DVD-A discs? I get the feeling that DVD Audio will be on every DVD player within a year or two, and more and more we'll be able to hear the difference between all the respective machines. I got far better sound from the DVD-1600 simply by sticking a few lumps of sorbothane under its feet, and a flat square of the stuff on top of that very flimsy, resonant casing. As manufacturers struggle to slash build costs, I can foresee a whole new tweaking fad start around these machines!

Thoroughly recommended then, if you're sure that DVD-A is where you want to be but don't expect it, or any other machines like it, to sound perfect out of the box. Digital audio has now come a long way - far enough for us to see clearly what a long, long way it still has to go!

#### **NAD T531**

Tonally, the T531 is NAD through and through - which means warm and sugary, even if the original recording isn't. It's a great characteristic to have for a budget CD spinner, because the ancillaries are likely to be rough but through higher-end kit it can often sound a bit samey and predictable. Nevertheless, Lonnie Smith's 'Think!' - a nicely judged late sixties Blue Note recording - sounded fantastic. Frequency extremes and image location could have been better, but the song's emotional force and delicate rhythms were carried surprising well. As a video player it's tops too, with a clear and lucid picture, as a DVD of New Order revealed. Colours were natural and functions such as pause and fast forward operated well.

It's a top little deck, the T531. NAD is right to claim its status as a legitimate piece of hi-fi - it sounds better than many budget CD-only Sonys, Pioneers and Marantzs at (almost) the same price - and of course plays DVD movies beautifully.

MERIDIAN 800V3



Very little equipment that enters the HFW portals is greeted with a stunned silence as it emerges from the box but the 800/861 combination almost demands it. The look, never mind the theory, behind the 800/861 combination is awesome. It's only when you start to even comprehend a mere fraction of what's going on inside that you realise just how awesome it is. Here is one very, very serious example of both high fidelity and digital engineering - the 800 DVD-Audio/Video player is quite possibly the most technically advanced optical disc player in existence.

Another important feature in the 800 is its upsampling capability where a complex digital filter doubles the rate of samples from the source so that the system that follows can produce the sound more accurately. So CD information, for example, starts at 44.1kHz/16-bit and the Meridian proprietary DSP upsamples this to 88.2kHz and 24-bit. DVDs with 48kHz sampling are upsampled to 96kHz and 24-bit. It can handle sampling frequencies of up to 192kHz and the output analogue cards use a very high quality, studio grade digital-to-analogue conversion system.

The 800 is, of course, a very high quality DVD video player which has an optional progressive output card for improved picture quality with less shimmer, and it also has a translation feature for PAL or NTSC for those displays that don't support one of the formats. It will decode Dolby Digital and DTS DVD video discs and provide both multichannel and two channel outputs.

It's both very easy to sum this up, yet very difficult! Obviously, it's frighteningly expensive, but then again, lest we forget, so are many cars that you get shot of in three years and will have depreciated by an equivalent amount.

This isn't a transitory gadget - it's more an investment for the soul! Soundwise, it's perhaps not ultimately as ultra-detailed and intricate as the very top, similarly priced super high-end hi-fi I've heard, but to me it's more musical. What's important is that you never lose sight of the fact that this is for edification and enjoyment, as opposed to hi-fi for hi-fi's sake - techo-religion where the 'listener' kneels at the shrine of the blessed rack and pays more attention to the manual than the music.

Overall, the 800 is perhaps the finest overall CD player I've ever laid ears on. When you consider that there are some CD-only players round that demand this outlay, the price tag doesn't seem all that eye-watering. In the past I've been lucky enough to be in close proximity to top class orchestras banging out the best music, and at times this combination with DVD-Audio discs honestly brought me the closest to the experience than any other hi-fi system I've encountered. And that is no mean feat.

With the enjoyment I've experienced from using this system, I'd buy it tomorrow if I was in the position to. However, like many others, I can't. Unless I become President of the World Bank overnight, sell my family into slavery or poison any wealthy relatives!

#### **PHILIPS DVD 962SA**

It was with some Chesky 24/96 DVD Video demonstration discs that the potential advantages of higher resolution recording became most clear, showing what the Philips could do. Clarity and dynamics take a whole step up. Playing tracks like Rebecca Pidgeon's MacDougall's Men (24/96 stereo) this player gave the sort of conspicuous dynamics you would hope to hear from a medium that claims to be better than CD. Unfortunately, it is early days for high resolution recordings; there are few that can show what is possible and they are on demo discs - not usually the most entertaining performances. And that was the difficulty I had with judging the 962SA as a stereo SACD player. If you want SACD for surround-sound then its benefits will be obvious enough, but at present the SACDs | have show no clear benefit over 24/96, largely due to the quality of the masters used it appears. Until they do I can't make a judgement on SACD quality other than to say at present it sounds clean and nice, but isn't a match for 24/96 from DVD Video. But the 962SA plays both, as well as CD, so it has a broad span of ability.

What the Philips does not play is DVD Audio discs – which is not to say it won't play them! DVD is nothing but confusing. Some of these discs have extra DVD Video tracks, in Dolby stereo or PCM, just so they will play on any DVD Video machine. Playing a DTS demo disc of Larisa Stow, the 962SA showed Dolby D2 (i.e. Digital 2ch.) on its display and replayed what is compressed (i.e. data reduced) stereo. It sounded clean, enormously detailed and dynamic. Transferring this disc to a Denon DVD1600 to play the 24/96 version did show, however, just how much more detailed this coding can be.

As a video player the machine worked well. Connected up by Scart it gave fine picture quality and has a whole host of trick functions.

This is a great player. It provides superb sound quality from CD, DVD Video tracks and SACD. Not only does it resolve CD well, but it also clearly delivers the enhanced dynamics, richer detailing and more open sound of enhanced coding schemes. Up to now, too many players have been unable to do this, their circuits tending to compress and fudge over differences. If you are in the market for a DVD video player or a CD player - get this machine! It's dramatic.

#### **PIONEER DV-747A**

The downside of the Pioneer's DVD-A performance is that it still sounds 'digital' - it's a long way from the beautifully beguiling, natural and organic performance you get from vinyl.

Switching to SACD somewhat alleviates this sense - although it doesn't go as far as it could. My favourite DSD SACD disc right now is Marvin Gaye's 'Midnight Love'. This is not because it's a seminal hi-fi recording - it isn't but thanks to the great music which shines through with top players like Marantz's SA-1. The DV-747 proved surprisingly adept at carrying 'Sexual Healing'; the contrast between the gritty early drum machine and Marvin's velveteen voice was striking. Here the Pioneer really 'emoted', and I found myself locked into the music rather than the whizzbang hi-fi quality of DVD-A. Tonally, the 747 is smoother and duller with SACD than DVD-A, with a richer, fuller bass and wider, less precise soundstage - this seems to reflect the relative differences between the two formats in general.

This machine is neither the world's best DVD-A player or SACD spinner, but it sounds way better than CD all the same. Its

impressive fidelity with either format, plus its raft of other abilities, makes it superb value for money. It's very hard to find a reason not to buy Pioneer's new DV-747A.

#### INTEGRATED AMPLIFIERS ARCAM FMJ A32 £1099.00



You don't expect valve levels of tonal accuracy from a product like this, but I still feel it rather steamrollered through the proceedings at the expense of a good deal of subtlety. Nor did it prove the most delicate reproducer of acoustic cymbals - things sounded just a touch too genetically modified for my liking.

This is the key to the A32. It's not the most transparent or self-effacing performer at the price, preferring to play music with great gusto and a fine sense of fun, regardless of what's actually on the disc. At this price, you can't have your cake and eat it - it's either power or poise - and the Arcam nails its colours to the wall just like a Harley Davidson or Chevrolet Corvette would. You could say it's more early Bruce Springsteen than late Nick Drake! So if you're looking for a go anywhere, do everything amplifier, then this should be at the top of your shortlist. In my experience, products with this kind of flexibility and feature count rarely ever sound this fun.

#### **CAMBRIDGE AUDIO A5**

#### So you want a sonic miracle, a super-budget

amplifier that sounds like high-end audio? Well, the A5 gets closer than most. It has the silky smooth tonality, the bandwidth and the dynamic punch of an amplifier costing far, far more.

What the A5 gives you is a sense of scale that comes from a fundamental neutrality. This neutrality makes the A5 (with a pair of wellbalanced speakers) sound more like a near-field monitoring rig. It does not offer a holographic insight into the studio, compared to more up-market models, but it gives a profound sense of what the recording artists put on disc. Its presentation could seem laid back, were it not for a hefty slice of bottom end grunt; the gut-churning dub bass of the Spacemonkeyz vs Gorillaz track 19/2000 kicked out and gave my woofers a thorough workout.

There is also a sense of balance that is hard to come by at this price point. This amplifier sounds consistently good with all kinds of CDs, from the most structurally dense opera to the smallest jazz combo - and everything in between.

Soundstaging was wide and deep. And it is more powerful than most, allowing the amplifier to partner more exotic speakers than usual. This doesn't make it necessarily louder than the others, but it does control the speakers.

If ever there was a product that fights above its weight it is the Cambridge Audio A5. It won't make audiophiles chuck out their Naims, nor their valve amps, but for the cost of a good night out, this is a fantastic bargain that sounds far more expensive than you might expect.

#### **CROFT CAMELEON**

The preamp section of the Cameleon, consisting of the two channel potentiometers and input selector, is passive and the power amplifier section is exactly the same as that found in the company's Vista power amp. This is a circuit discarding as many unnecessary components as the company sees fit – one's that Croft feel inhibit the performance. Croft feels that without this electronic 'dead wood' the amp is free to "express a kaleidoscope of sound".

Another bonus of this, of course, is that a low cost can be maintained. Taking off the lid reveals very little, as there's very little in there! It does, however, reveal four smallish ECL805 triode output pentode valves, not a valve I'm too familiar with, but it does have a warm and sweet characteristics.

There is a noticeable absence of circuit boards in the design, making for very simple circuitry that includes seventeen resistors and four coupling capacitors. The output transformers are designed in-house and the Cameleon works in fixed bias operation. The lack of PCBs means that everything inside is point to point hard wired and the power output is quoted at a modest but adequate 15VV.

The overall sound of the Cameleon came as no real surprise as we've encountered the Croft sound previously in their simple yet highly effective Vitale preamp, which excelled when it came to transparency and purity – doing everything a hi-end preamp does but at a fraction of the price.

What you can't take away from this amp is its ability to perform with most of the traits of high-end valve amps, but at a lower price point and for that Croft can be congratulated. It would make a good starter valve amp for many that want to take the tube but balk at the fares!

With acoustic jazz and classical discs the C320BEE gave a good account of itself in a field where budget amps traditionally suffer. The sense of space and breadth that this amplifier has helped to emphasise the airiness of Japanese jazz pianist Mikio Masuda's 'Blue Dumplings' CD on a superb JVC K2 20-bit recording. This well recorded jazz trio set had a clear and focussed sound with good depth of bass in the left hand of the piano and an overall sweetness that is usually the trade of £600-plus amps. Likewise, the piano trios of Fauré and Ravel on a Hyperion SACD had good detail and presence that belied the BEE's humble price. There was an almost life-like sense of focus, with the sinuous bowing of the cellist being a highlight.


NAD have got it right yet again. Very few hi-fi companies at this end of the market can deliver the goods when it comes to sheer quality of sound, with the exception perhaps of Cambridge Audio (even lower priced still). Japanese rivals may have a little more pizazz when it comes to looks, overall features and flashing lights but that's not what NAD are about. Very very few come anywhere near the C320BEE in terms of sound quality.

There's no doubt that whilst the budget end of the hi-fi market was once the shining light of audio, those days are past. It's different with 'speakers of course, which can fulfill a multitude of tasks, but two-channel audio electronics at the lower end of the market is a virtually extinct sector, with the exception of NAD, who undoubtedly do it best.

The C320BEE is not going to change the world of hi-fi like the 3020 did but it could well be the last great budget stereo amp.

Rhythmically, the Unico is impressive. It's definitely 'up for it' when it comes to pushing a tune along, and really tries its best to impart the twists and turns of Grace Jones. It doesn't have the grip of a Naim - it's fast alright, but the bass is just a little looser and it tends to sit on transients just a touch more, too. Still, that bass drum showed slam that can only come from an amp packing some serious firepower. A Naim simply doesn't have the grunt to pin you back in your seat like the Unico, when it could be persuaded.

Overall then, the Unico is a brilliant alternative to the Naim/Cyrus/Arcam (etc) treadmill. If you want something a little different, yet no less competent, this is a brilliant bet. It's very rare to find sound and especially build quality at this price and it offers a superb option in the midprice integrated market. Bellisimo!

The OTO SE is extremely impressive throughout. It takes you a step back from the microphone and gives a more panoramic, widescreen view of things. Treble is sweet and open, with yet more atmosphere and a wonderful (albeit not strictly accurate) silkiness that's hard to live without after a while.

Prefab Sprout's 'Electric Guitars' showed the OTO SE to be a consummately musical performer - it set up a decently large acoustic, served up some beautifully bouncy bass, plenty of midband detailing and a decently defined stereo image. It's obvious that this amp is far from neutral - tonally it does the old valve trick of investing everything with a deliciously sugary texture.

The great thing about the OTO SE though is its combination of brilliant rhythmic ability and the aforementioned sepla tinged tonal colouring. This thing doesn't rock so much as 'slink' - it lacks any real large scale dynamics but makes up for it with incredibly liquid, visceral 'microdynamics', letting the music's accents and phrasing shine through. In this respect it's a textbook example of singleended tubes, and it's so hypnotic that you begin to wonder why you ever liked your Naim six pack. It gets into the groove like no other equivalently priced amp of any type can - even at low volumes it's an utterly addictive listen - well worth the title of 'budget esoterica'.

Some of the intimacy of John Coltrane's 'A Love Supreme' was lost, but overall there was a nice frequency spread in the sound and cymbals remained sweet and detailed. There was also a nice tone to Coltrane's tenor sax, albeit not quite as smooth as I've heard.

These are well engineered speakers that produce as good a bass sound as you'll get at the price, from the dimensions. If space is a domestic concern then the 48s will easily fit the bill. They're not perfect and suffer a bit from a synthetic sound with acoustic material but rock recordings are often a revelation, with that remarkable imaging ability being a real bonus. Those who favour quality bass won't be disappointed either as whilst it's not earth rumblingly low, coloration is minimal and it's very fast, too. I'm looking forward to getting my ears around some more AAD products.

It seems that Acoustic Energy have a real winner on their hands here. Apart from occasionally ponderous bass, the EVO 1s sound remarkably good for their price. Given enough space from a rear wall and carefully matched ancillaries, even this becomes less of a concern. It's hard not to be impressed by their sense of articulation, solid sound-staging, natural timbre and foot tapping timing.

The last point is key here, as even when I found the EVOs at their most heavy handed in terms of bass, they still provided an enjoyable listen. Factor in their excellent build quality and the picture looks good all-round. Anyone looking for a 'speaker they can enjoy listening to a variety of music on, at around £200, the AEs are a must-listen. Just make sure they have plenty of space away from the rear wall.

These ELACs are incredibly transparent - if the music's hard then so are they, if not then they aren't either. Impressive.

We really rate these speakers - they're a genuinely mature and well rounded product, designed for people who appreciate strength in depth rather than just a quick fix of 'boom and tizz'. Fast, punchy, musical, rhythmically engaging, dynamic, transparent, detailed - they get all the essentials so right you almost wonder why it's worth buying anything bigger. The answer is, of course, bass extension. Suitably set up with a decent sub, I imagine these ELACs would be absolute dynamite.

The Q1 had fine tonal resolution; it was far from a 'grey sounding' loudspeaker. Plenty of colour and texture was given to both vocals and instruments alike.

KEF's perseverance with their coaxial Uni-Q drive technology seems to have paid off. In general the Q1s are a likeable 'speaker that show few unpleasant traits and work well with a wide variety of music. They do lack a little scale, and won't attempt to reach the sort of bass frequencies that some floorstanders of this price would have little trouble with. That metal dome tweeter could also just occasionally betray its construction by sounding a little harsh at times.

Other than these small gripes though, the KEFs impress with their expansive sound staging, excellent detail retrieval and generally cohesive nature. They're the sort of 'speaker that one could live happily for many years with, knowing that their sonic characteristics won't become tiring after time. Furthermore, such is their transparency, they could withstand several upgrades from amplifier and source before they became out of their depth. Highly recommended.

The IILs can be easily summarised - they're a bargain! Detail, speed and presence is up there with the best bookshelf designs of at least twice the price. The competition's good at this price point but the IILs are in a different ball park. Nothing I can think of comes near to them when it comes to sheer quality of build - in this respect you could say they are underpriced.

The likes of Mission's 780 have a similar neutrality and speed but the Quads have that extra touch of monitor-like finesse that brings them out of the midprice bracket and into the upper echelons of audiophilia, just as the Wharfedale Diamonds belie their humble price tag. I'd go one step further and say that the IILs beat the Diamonds in terms of value for money.

As for downsides, it's difficult to find any. When fed with duff rock recordings, the midrange could become a tad shouty, especially when pushed, but this is about all. They are also fairly hungry when it comes to power, needing a good 60W per channel or thereabouts. Such comments are a bit churlish, though. Put the 11Ls in front of any experienced listener, with a good recording (or a bad one for that matter), and ask them to put a price to both the sound and the finish and I would guarantee even the most parsimonious would guess at least £300 over top.

Place the satellites a couple of metres apart and the sub just off the floor (it has a tendency to boom a touch too much), and connect up to your source with a high quality interconnect, and you'll be gobsmacked by the S80s. The sound is smooth and airy, with oodles of detail, tremendous speed, excellent attack transients and an incredible lack of boxiness. It simply floats in mid-air with complete ease, giving a massively impressive 'wall of sound' you can't get enough of. The amazing thing is when you go back to conventional box loudspeakers - they sound slow, leaden, wheezy, imprecise, shut in and boxy by comparison, Electrostatic users will know what I mean!

Unlike the FS-mm Is and the X-Space before them, these NXT designs have a deliciously subtle and sweet treble - at the price it's staggering. The whole plot sounds beautifully sophisticated yet lightning fast and musically involving. Of course, it doesn't go particularly loud, but whether it's a high end turntable and valve preamp or a humble MP3 portable you plug in, you'll still be amazed.



Producing a motherboard running valves is one thing, but making it reliable for many years of use is another. With ever-higher clock speeds, things are getting hotter and hotter under your computer's 'hood'. To wit Aopen has used every trick in the book to get things right. For the valve circuitry (which requires voltages of up to 300V), a switched mode power supply and a Maxim 668 DC-DC voltage converter is used. The transformer has a high quality El ferrite core with 0.3mm AWG hyper copper wire, which can withstand operating temperatures of 130 degrees centigrade. A Nichicon electrolytic power capacitor is used for voltage output, its fine conductive particles of high purity graphite reducing the distortion inherent in standard electrolytic capacitors, 1% toleranced Vishays are used as power resistors.

It makes a very nice noise, one that's quite different to your average standalone soundcard. There's a real refinement, smoothness and depth here, of the sort you'd only expect in high-end hi-fi. Much of this is down to the aforementioned tube audio output section - running a line into the 'monitor loop' of an amplifier and comparing the signal against the original shows it to be quite superb. The Aopen board adds very little to the picture, and what it contributes is either benign or 'euphonic', depending on your point of view. Treble smoothes out just a touch, the soundstage widens slightly, and bass acquires an extra pound or two of added heft. Thanks to its deliciously couthy midband, female voices are a particularly pleasant listen.

It is detailed, too, although the top end is laid-back, especially for those seeking an easy route into valve technology. Even something solidly made on valve equipment, like classic rock from AC/DC or Led Zep, manages to combine valve spaciousness with solid-state graunch though this amplifier.


The amp's dynamic range is excellent, with enough bottom end energy to cope with even the might of Mahler at full rant. Thanks to the MOSFET output stage, it can control even valve-hating bass drivers and relatively insensitive speakers in practical use. The only slight down-side is vocal articulation, which although good, is not as wonderful as a good valve amplifier; a quick blast of The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy made a sound that was rolled off, even by 1970s BBC Radio 4 standards.

Generally, the hybrid power amplifier – that uses both valves and solid state components – falls into the latter camp. The Unico DM is the exception: it's as good as the preamplifier you partner it with. It makes a sound that is extremely likeable and wellbalanced. You may want a more pacey sound, or a warmer sound, but to do so – especially at this price – may make a power amplifier that is less of an all-rounder. Heartily recommended.

(In fact, the Extigy's latency is 40ms, compared to the Audigy's 2ms or less).

Value is the name of the game here - plus a bucketload of flexibility. It's a brilliant companion to those forced to use their notebooks for audio duties. I can't honestly say the bundled software is the best of its type, and frankly there's too much of it (and it clogs up your hard drive), but ignoring this, it's still great value for money. It feeds 44.1kHz, 16bit digits into your computer, with native operating system driver compatibility (either Windows MME or Mac Sound Manager) for a noiseless, glitch free feed of sound. There's even a 'Direct Hardware Monitoring' function which allows for zero-latency performance while recording, too. The result is that whatever soundcard you're running, you get a very high quality sound-stream into your computer which you can then process, edit (or whatever) to your heart's desire, and then burn to CD-R (using, if necessary, an external USB CD writer).

Brilliant, then. And the £149 retail price makes it all the more convincing. It's a great gadget. Along with a decent external USB CD burner (such as Plextor's S88TU), I can now turn my notebook PC into a fully specified, mobile music studio! Highly recommended -Just what I always wanted!

interface card, which gives extremely stable, low jitter direct digital ins and outs. Feeding a Cambridge Audio DACMagic 3, there was no detectable difference in sound between WAV files playing through CEP via the TerraTec or Zefiro. I then fed a low jitter signal from a Trichord Clock 3 modded Sony CDP-X303ES CD player into both the ZA2 and EWX 24/96 - and again there was no discernible difference in sound. This alone is a great result - because the Zefiro is a serious bit of digital kit.

Thumbs firmly aloft then for this product. Not only does it offer fine 'real hifi' sound quality at bog standard 16/44 resolution, but it goes all the way to 24/96, where it sounds superb through its built in analogue-to-digital, and digital-to-analogue converters. The bundled software isn't prodigious, but does its job brilliantly. The card is totally stable, and suffered not one glitch over the review period. If you want a real high resolution soundcard, right now I can't think of anything better. Michell. The fact that it can be mentioned in the same breath as a Gyro SE is a remarkable feat for a £500 box of bits though - only a slight lack of clarity and grip differentiates the two.

Overall a deeply impressive deck then. It runs designs at nearly twice the price extremely close in many respects. Building it will take you an evening, but it's fun to get your hands dirty once in a while and you've got massive room for experimentation and tweaking. The 'engineering depth' of this kit is remarkable - building it gives you the impression the Origin Live have specified every last nut and bolt with sound in mind - something that auditioning only confirms. Running the gamut of my jazz LPs, the Ultra proved extremely adept at imparting both the groove and the texturality of the sound - it swings and it sings. You hear a bunch of musicians playing together, but you can also stop to enjoy the deliciously raspy brass sounds, the deep, resonant pianos and the full bodied bass. The latter is perhaps the most impressive - there's no overhang and bags of articulation. Treble is sweet and open - although not quite as neutral as a With the RPM 6 you get the feeling of a solid acoustic space and the separate tones and dynamic ranges of the instruments. Voices, especially female voices had striking diction and excellent tonality.

Because there's no suspension, you have to be a little careful about siting the RPM 6, but the same can be said about every turntable really, suspended or not. In fact, it even copes with the potential ultra-fine tracking potential of a cartridge like the MC 25 FL with ease.

Fitting a good MC cartridge that costs 60% the price of the turntable shows just how much confidence Henley has in the RPM 6 deck . And that's not just arrogance – this really is a deck with plenty of potential and it's worth partnering it with something decent. It gets you surprisingly close to some of the high-end, legendary turntables for a fraction of the cash... but it The P9 went straight for the central bass guitar and drum interplay, giving the song an extremely strong and propulsive feel as a result. It retrieved massive amounts of detail - more than a basic Sondek is capable of - and conjured a wide and tight stereo image, if a little flattened in terms of depth perspective compared to the Orbe.

Treble is another delight - it's very sweet and extended. There's a great sense of atmosphere - it really gives an exhaustively detailed recreation of the recorded acoustic. Lee Morgan's 'The Sidewinder' showed a very finely etched and intricate HF performance, more atmospheric than the LP12 and more 'alive' than the Orbe.

Weaknesses? It lacks the crushing power and attack of the Orbe, or the sinuous rhythmic charms of the LPI2. Instead, it treads a third way which gets you very close to the recording yet draws absolutely no attention to itself in so doing. Its depth perspective, bass extension and stereo imaging aren't the very best you'll hear, but its beautifully stable, lively yet refined, smooth and even sound is ample compensation. Unlike either the Linn or Michell, there's a sense that you can completely forget that you're listening to a turntable at all, and simply turn the music up! A brilliant product, and a welcome addition to the 'affordable high end' turntable market.

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
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
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
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


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


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
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
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
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
