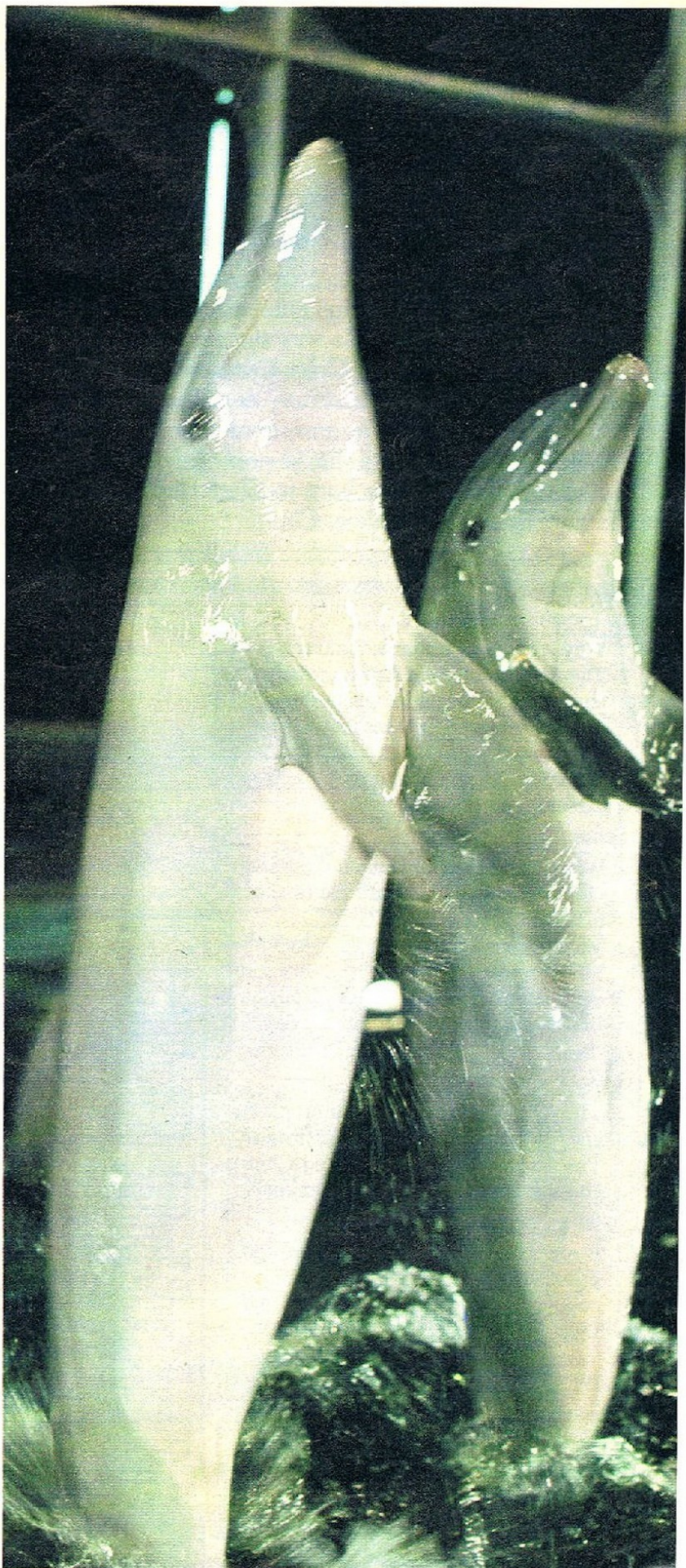
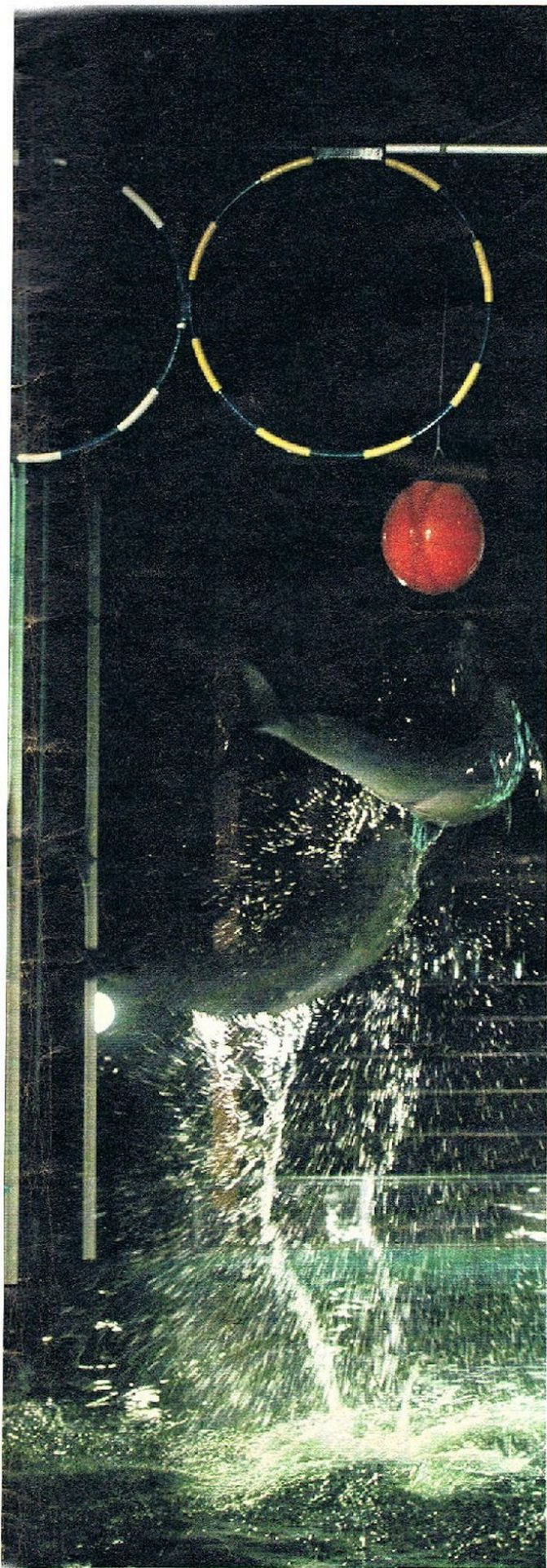
Dudley Smith also gave Sue some interesting facts about the dolphins. They are mammals and though they can be bred successfully in captivity, they will pine unless they have human company.

Trapping a Three-Tonner!

I'VE NEVER BEEN SO FRIGHTENED IN MY LIFE. Ken Randall, ace animal-catcher from Kenya, drove the 'catching truck' right alongside the galloping white rhino, while Pat O'Connell, his partner, slid a lasso—on the end of a bamboo pole—over the creature's great snout.

It was the first time anyone had ever tried *roping* one of these three-ton monsters. White rhinos have the reputation of being nice, peaceful creatures. But just what happens when you chase one at thirty-miles-an-hour and rope it, we were about to find out!

That three-tonner hammered the truck, stuck its horn through the side, charged and pulled and charged again, until I thought either the truck would turn over or we'd be shaken off!

Finally, Pat and his African crew went over the side and tied the great animal's hind legs together. Then we were able

to get the female rhino on the ground and tie her up for loading.

What were we doing 'annoying' an innocent wild animal like this? The fact was that in those days—way back in 1961—there was no other way of catching a rhino. If we *didn't* manage to trap the remainder of this herd in the far north of Uganda, then the poachers would catch them for their horns. Then the white rhino would die out as a species, as far as Uganda was concerned. So our task was to shift as many as possible to the safety of Murchison Falls National Park—one-hundred-and-fifty-miles away.

Such 'Wild West' tactics are past history now. Soon after we successfully completed our desperate operation, scientists perfected the drugs that make it easy to shoot an anaesthetic dart into the rhino with the use of a crossbow.

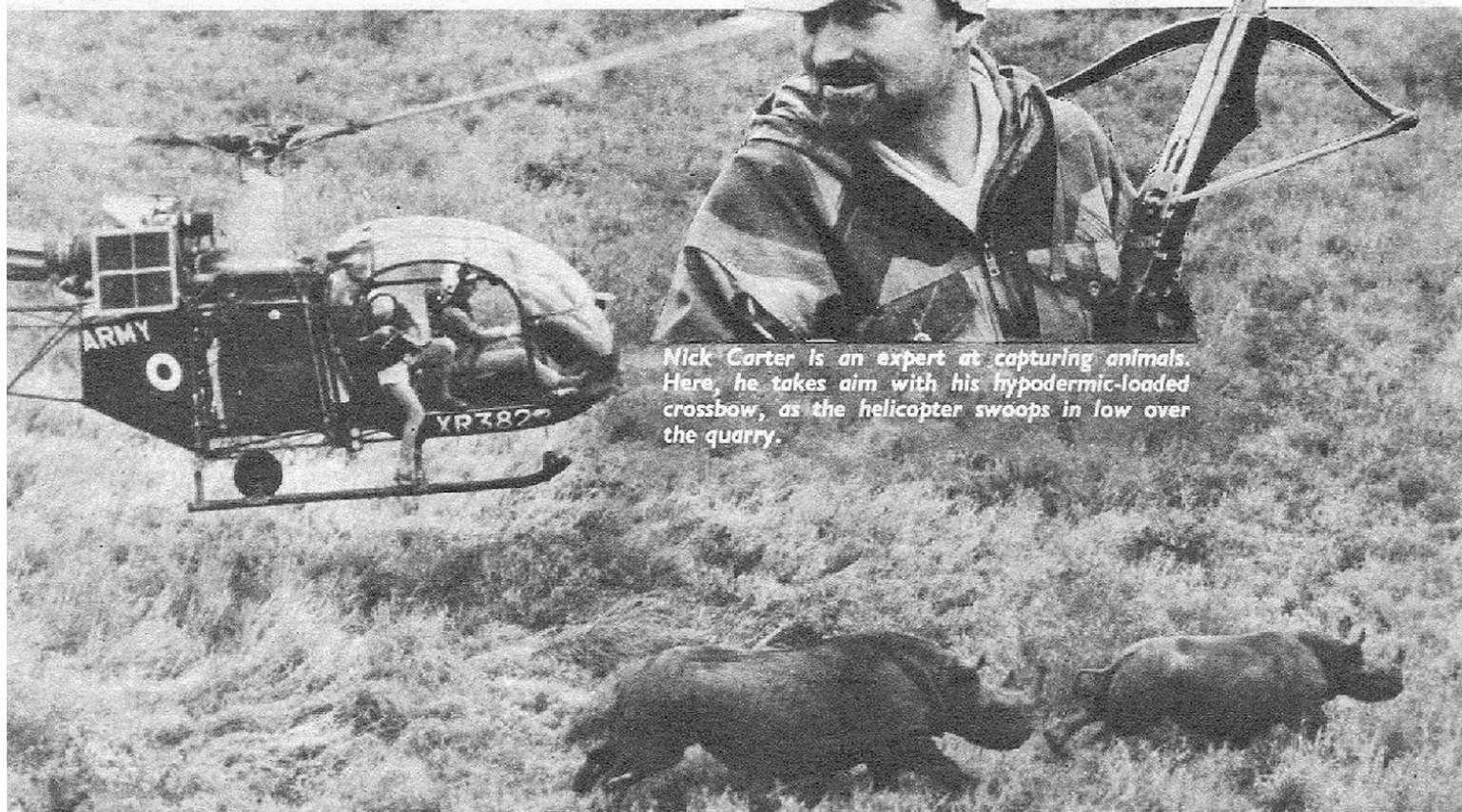
Nowadays, moving rhinos is an easy task. You fire the anaesthetic dart and wait for the rhino to become unsteady on its feet, which usually takes about twenty minutes. Then you move in, give the animal a tranquiliser and quietly push it into a large crate.

The white rhino is in very short supply, except in one or two parts of Africa. Most of the survivors live in Natal, in South Africa. Fortunately, the Natal Parks have been very successful in shifting their surplus to other parts of Africa where the species has been wiped out in the past by hunting.

But don't expect to see any whiter-than-white rhinos. They're grey—just like the other species, the black rhino! 'White' stands for the Dutch word—*weide*—meaning wide. They should be called wide-mouthed rhinos. Look at them and you'll see the name is well-deserved!

You don't have to go to Africa to see a rhino, either.

There is an entire breeding herd of twenty rhinos at Whipsnade Zoo. If you go there this summer, you can ride through their enclosure on a special train.

A black rhino in the Ngorongoro Crater. This species is generally slightly larger than the white rhino and far more aggressive. Often they will charge upon sight. They are 'browsers', eating a great deal of thorns. Perhaps, that accounts for their prickly temper!

I can go to sleep anywhere, and for any length of time, under any conditions.

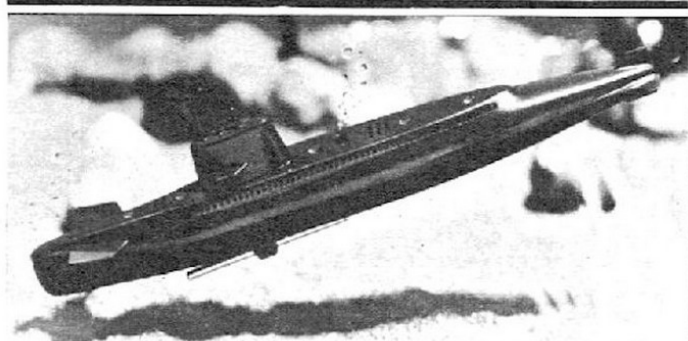
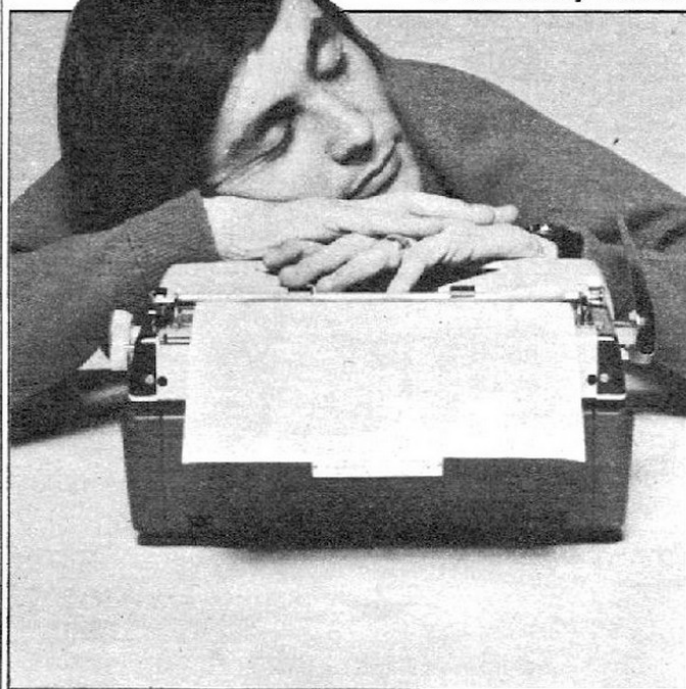

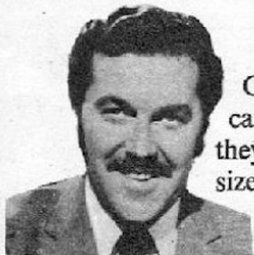

High-Speed Karting

Richard Davies looks at this popular form of racing



Go-karts are far from being the 'toy' cars that many people think. To prove they more than make up for their small size, a kart conquered the Silverstone circuit at an average speed of 90 m.p.h.

"When you start karting, you are amazed at the great sense of speed. This is partly because you are so low on the ground." That's what eighteen-year-old Annie Ingram told me. She is one of a dozen girls racing in the full International class, and started at the age of thirteen.

She continued: "My father paid £45 for my first machine. It was powered by a lawn-mower engine, but it was a bit faster than a mower. I managed to get 45 m.p.h. out of it!"

So impressed with Annie's progress was her father, that when she was fifteen he bought her a new kart capable of doing 80 m.p.h. With this, she became much more competitive and she finally won two annual club trophies.

Now she has moved to bigger events, and has started competing abroad. To reach the greater speeds required, she currently owns a Barlotti Monza—capable of 120 m.p.h.

Is karting safe? Annie said: "I think it's as safe as hockey. I've had my spills. Once I somersaulted and finished on a bank. I just put the kart back on the track and carried on with the race. Of course, you must wear leathers and a crash helmet."

Judging from what Annie told me about this fast-and-furious sport, they're certainly needed, too!

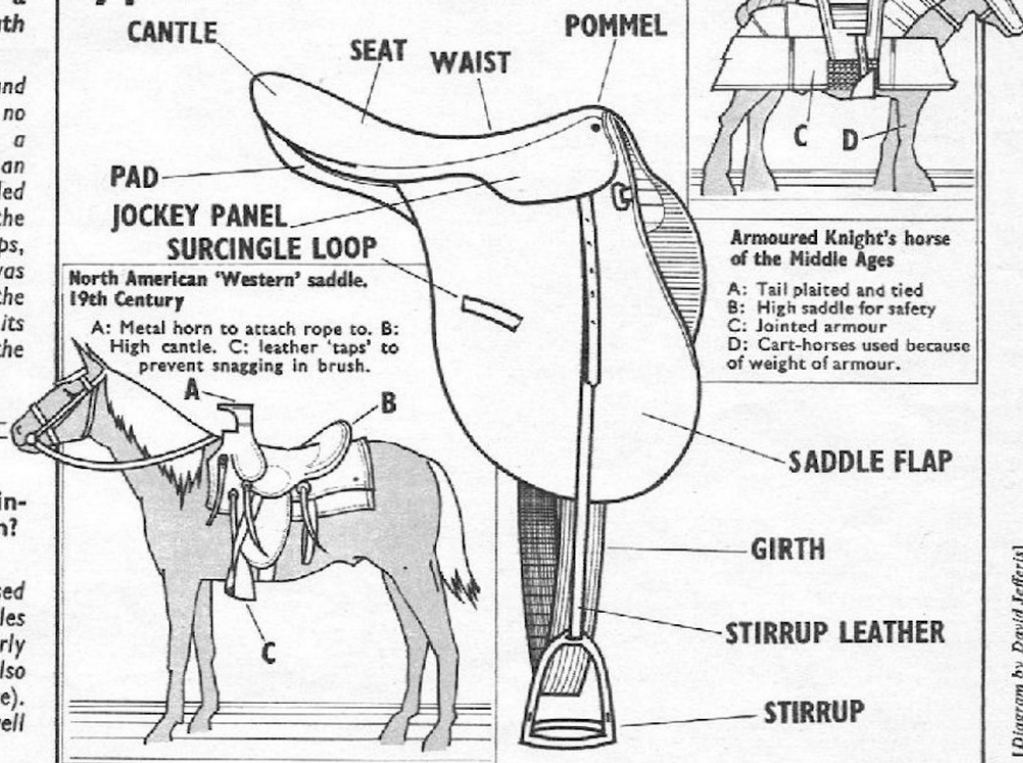
HOW do we come to use the words Port and Starboard to describe the sides of a ship? Edward Fatharby, South Ockendon, Essex.

The origin of 'port' as the left hand side of a ship, facing forwards, no doubt comes from port meaning a harbour. It has gradually replaced an earlier word, larboard, which muddled people as it was too like starboard, the right hand side of a ship. Perhaps, when the steering gear of a ship was the starboard (the steerboard) side, the ship had to enter port and tie up with its larboard side to the port, hence the port side!

HOW was the saddle invented and by whom? Gillian Ferguson, Edinburgh.

Some ancient races and tribes used blankets as saddles, but real saddles seem to have been used by the early Chinese, some East Europeans and also the Gauls (who once inhabited France). In other words, saddles date back well before Christ.

Typical Modern Saddle

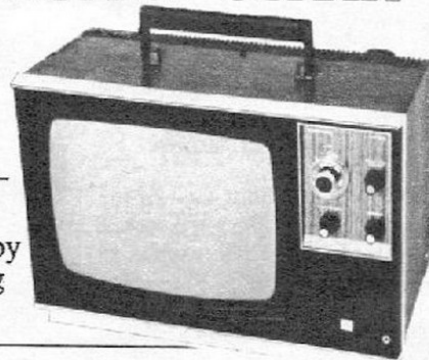

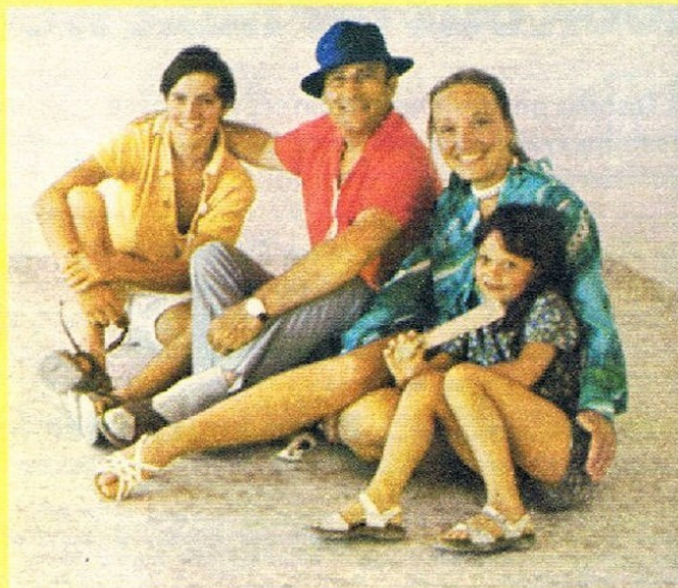
Number three in LOOK-IN's series about some of TV's top 'pops' . . .



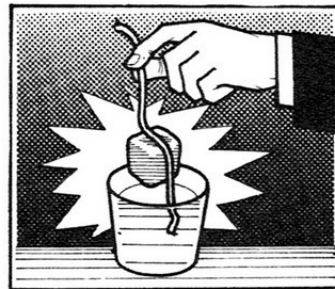

An Icy Problem

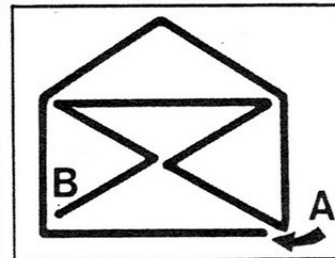
Show your friends a glass of water with a cube of ice floating in it. Give them a piece of string and ask them to lift the ice from the glass without tying any knots.

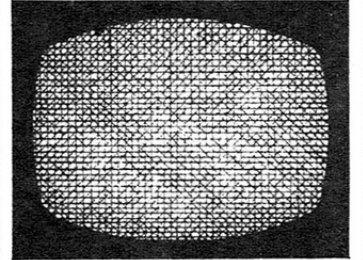

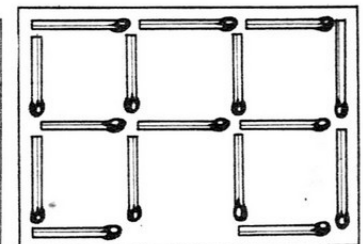

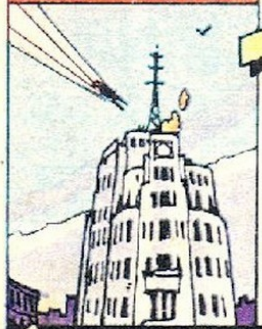
