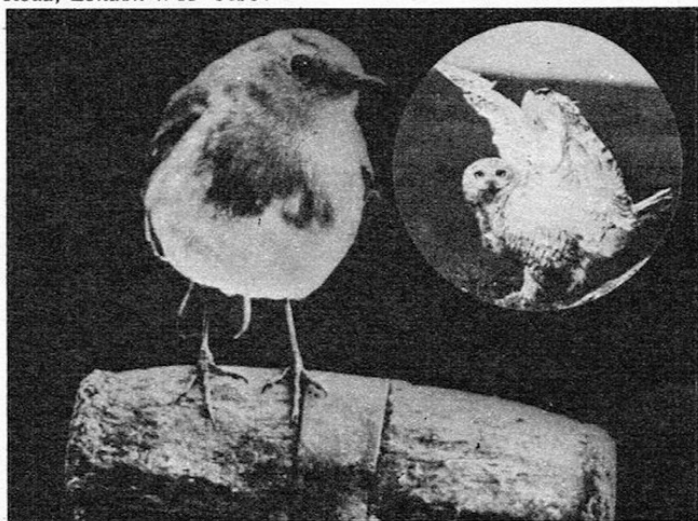

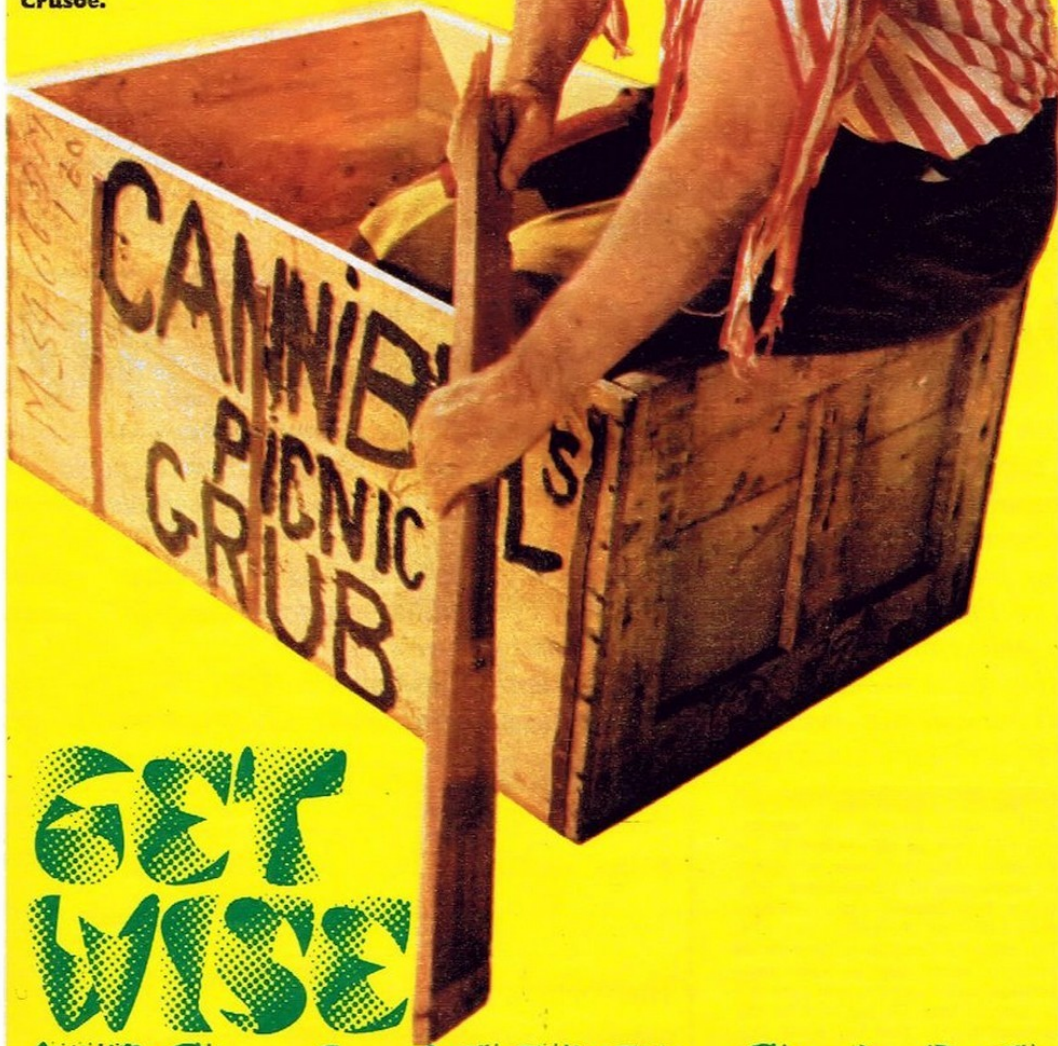

he could revive himself in comfort. For his 'encore', Signalman Wisdom decided to take three days' sick leave before returning to regular duties. He had proved beyond doubt that he could get away with such behaviour—if he wanted to.

Grinning broadly, that was how comedian Norman Wisdom described one of his funnier days in the army. But Norman did not resent his army career. In fact it was quite the opposite. It was during his army service that Norman embarked on a career in show business that was to take him right to the top.

Military Memories

It all started when he began to entertain his colleagues in the army. His act consisted of playing musical instruments and tap-dancing (a feat he performed in heavy duty army boots). He was so successful, however, that he was promoted—to entertaining the officers.

He continued: "I began my routine—and everything went wonderfully until I reached the tap-dancing spot. It was then that the audience began to laugh. I can tell you, I was dead worried—and hurt! The following night I began my act again

and exactly the same thing happened—they all laughed again! So, I decided to put my plan into action. During my dance I tripped up—intentionally! The result was fantastic—everybody folded up in hysterics! From then on, I knew humour was right for me."

To his credit are films like *Trouble in Store* (for which he

won an Academy Award) and *The Night They Raided Minsk's*. Norman was voted top British comedian in 1967 and he

was fifth in the International poll the same year. His notable stage successes include *Where's Charlie?*, and *Aladdin*.

Born on 4th February, 1915, Norman has a variety of hobbies—whenever he has time. He likes writing music and comedy sketches and enjoys football—he used to be a director of Brighton Football Club.

Talking of his most memorable moment, Norman recalled: "Perhaps it was working in Australia. After the show there was a knock on my dressing room door. It was Sir Robert Menzies, the Australian Prime Minister. He'd come to congratulate me. I was flattered and deeply honoured."

COOL BOSS OF THE NEW WEST

WAY out West, the times sure are a-changing. The rustlers who swoop down on the herds are now likely to ride helicopters instead of cow-ponies. The bandits who plan to grab the gold shipment on its way to the bank will find themselves faced with the problem of stopping an armoured truck instead of a rattling stage-coach. And just across the prairie, out there in the wild blue yonder, is a nuclear missile base.

Sam Cade, sheriff of rugged Madrid County in Thames TV's series *CADE'S COUNTY*, rides the range in a jeep. What he has in common with the fearless law-men of the Old West is the Stetson hat that shades his weather-beaten features, the Colt revolver strapped to his hip, the star that is his badge of office—and his unshakable determination to uphold the law at all costs.

To the part of Cade, veteran actor Glenn Ford brings experience gained in more than a hundred and thirty movies. His personality—cool, slow-speaking, fast-acting—has been the mainstay of many films in which he has portrayed a hero of the Old West, among the

most famous being *3:10 to Yuma* and *Cimarron*.

In *Sam Cade*, the first part he has undertaken for a television series, Glenn Ford has a rôle that combines the colour and violence of the Old West with the problems that face a present-day law officer. Instead of swaggering gunmen and hard-riding outlaws, Cade has to deal with ruthless businessmen, crooks armed with the latest mechanical and electronic devices, smugglers running contraband over the nearby Mexican border, and even enemy agents spying on that missile base. And the Indians, Comanches from the reservation, are as likely to be helping him track down wrongdoers as they are to be on the warpath themselves.

The producers of *CADE'S COUNTY*, who were responsible for such popular series as *Nanny and the Professor*, *The F.B.I.* and *The Ghost and Mrs Muir*, have assembled a strong cast to support their star. Edgar Buchanan, who plays 'J. J. Jackson', has already appeared in ten or more Westerns with Glenn Ford.

Glenn's twenty-six year-old son Peter, a recording star as well as an actor, also appears in the series from time to time. ★The theme music for *CADE'S COUNTY* is written by Henry Mancini, who has won three 'Oscars' for his film music, which includes the chart-topping themes for *Breakfast at Tiffany's* ('Moon River') and *Doctor Zhivago* ('Somewhere My Love').

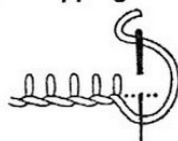

Continuing LOOK-IN's ABC of Football, this week's letter—'E'—is for Everton. Why not cut out this item and keep it with the others to form a complete soccer scrapbook?

One of the First Division's most distinguished clubs, Everton, once had in its side two of the all-time greats in soccer—Dixie Dean and Tommy Lawton. These two both played at the centre-forward position for the 'Toffees' (Everton's nickname). And Dixie Dean, in the 1927-8 season scored sixty League goals—an English League record to this day.

Goodison Park, Everton's home ground and one of the finest in the country, has its records, too. The Park had its biggest-ever attendance in a League match with neighbouring rivals, Liverpool, in 1948. Seventy-eight thousand, two-hundred and ninety-nine people turned up to watch the game. The record receipts were taken in 1963 when Everton played Inter-Milan in the European Cup. A mammoth £31,709 passed through the clinking turnstiles.

Harry Catterick replaced John Carey as team manager in 1961 and much of the credit must go to Harry for making Everton's football so enjoyable to watch.

Everton's football also gets results. They have won the League title seven times and appeared in seven F.A. Cup Finals—winning three of them.

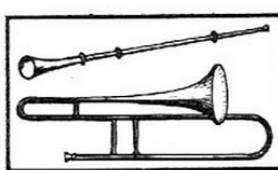
Magpie Music Makers



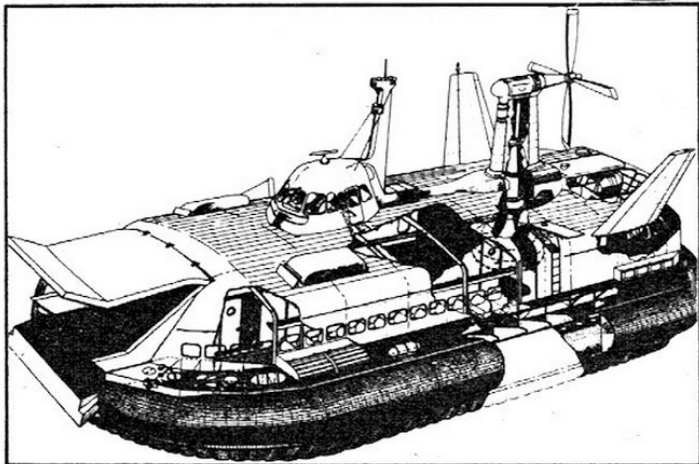
Continuing his series on musical history, Will Yeomans looks this week at another wind instrument.

THE TROMBONE is said to have developed from the long Buzine, an unwieldy form of straight trumpet,

as shown above. The sliding-tube instrument was most likely invented in the late 14th century and it soon became known as the Sackbut. These instruments later came to be made in various sizes from the Treble down to Double-Bass.

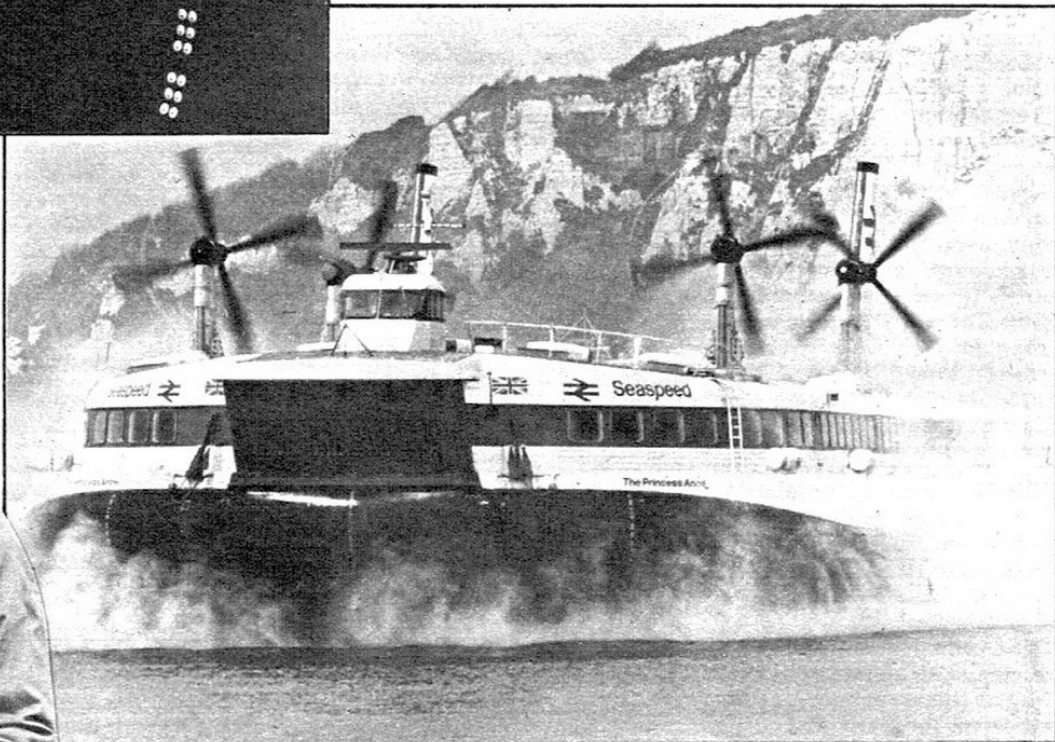
The engines of the one-hundred-and-sixty-five ton SRN4 hovercraft roared into life—putting a layer of air between its base and the water. Its huge load, two-hundred-and-fifty passengers and thirty cars did not affect its performance. Leaving Dover at 6.30 a.m., it began its journey—destination Calais, France. Reaching speeds of up to seventy miles an hour, the hovering monster sped across the choppy waters of the English Channel, arriving in France just thirty minutes later.

This was another routine trip for British Rail's Seaspeed hovercraft service, which carried ninety-eight-thousand-and-forty-four vehicles and over half-a-million passengers on its cross-Channel 'flights' during the last year.

The all-year-round cross-Channel services—Dover to Calais and Dover to Boulogne—are operated by two SRN4 hovercraft, *The Princess Margaret* and *The Princess Anne*. The results achieved prove that the hovercraft is now a major form of Channel transport.

Hovercraft are used for a variety of purposes other than commercial travel. Many of the smaller craft, including the BH7 and the SRN5, were built for military service and are currently in operation in Canada and America.

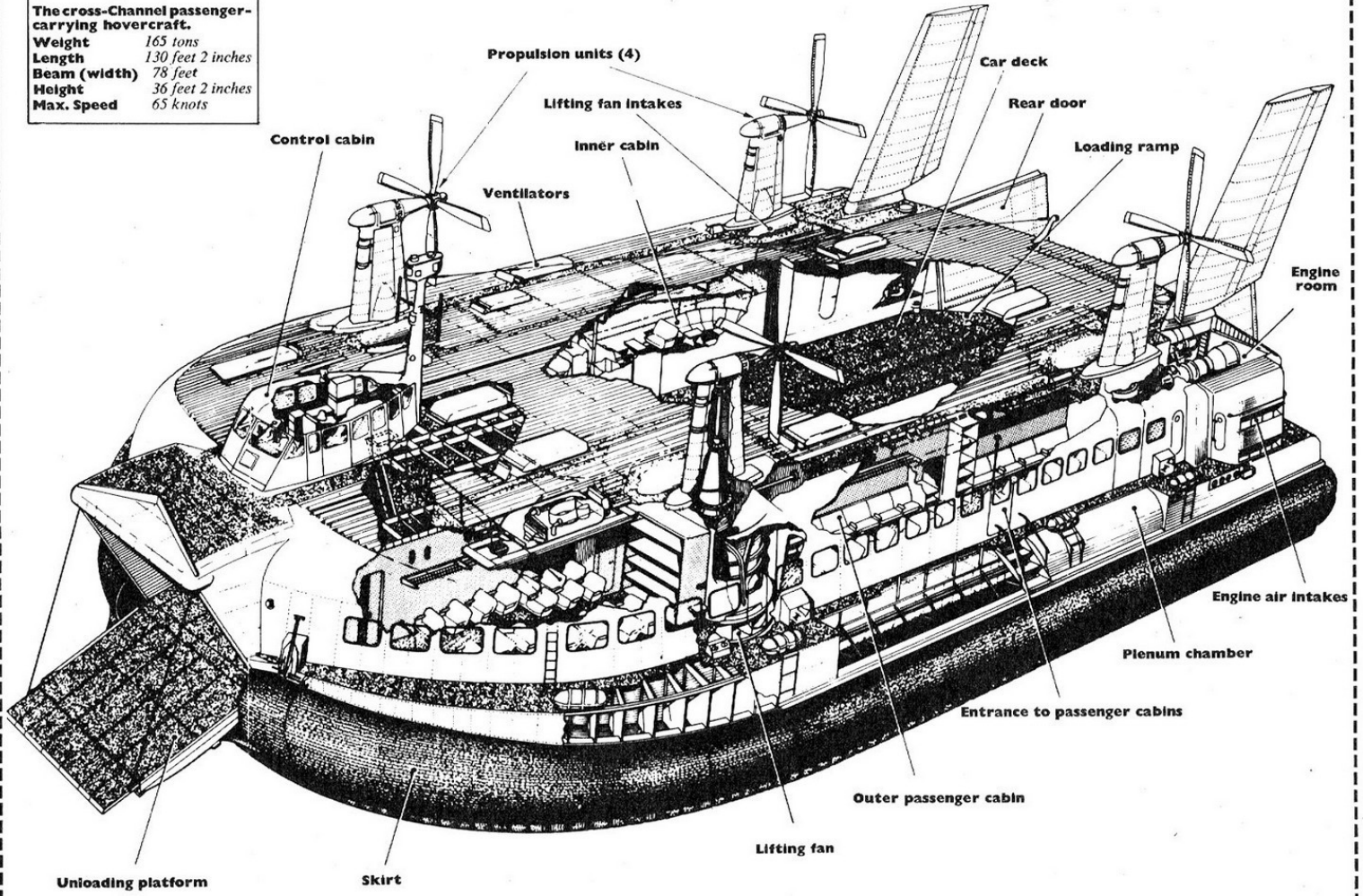
An Englishman, Sir Christopher Cockerell, invented the hovercraft, after years of research. He demonstrated his first working model in 1956 and on 25th July, 1959, only three short years later, the world's first hovercraft, the SRN1, crossed the English Channel. It was a colossal victory for English technology, and experts agree that there will always be a place for hovercraft in the modern age to come!

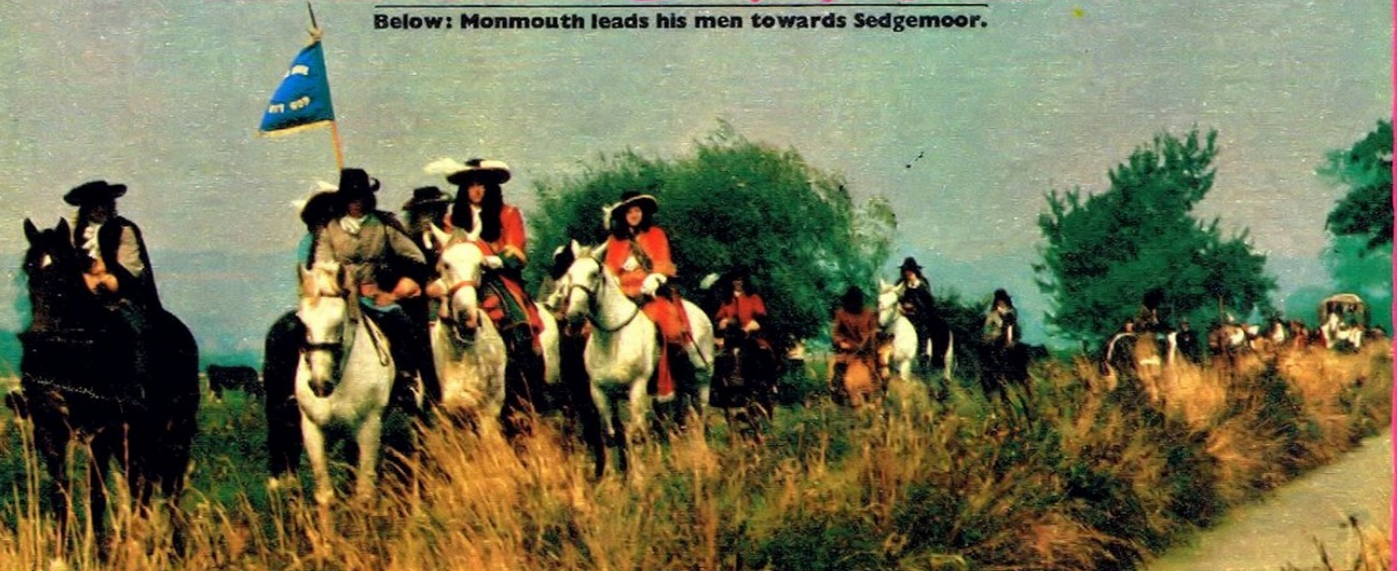

Thunder in the West!

ON June 11, 1685, when King James II had reigned for only four months, the Duke of Monmouth landed at Lyme Regis with the intention of wresting the throne from his unpopular uncle. Expecting recruits to flock to his banners in the West Country, where he had been joyfully received on his return from his earlier exile, he brought with him only one hundred and fifty men. It seemed his confidence was justified, for within twenty-four hours nearly one-thousand men had volunteered to fight for 'the Protestant Duke' or, as he was soon called, 'King Monmouth'.

TOWARDS SEDGEMOOR

On June 20, Monmouth was proclaimed king in Taunton. His army now numbered around five-thousand men — but in the series of marches from town to town that followed, in drenching rain that lasted for days, many volunteers grew discouraged and slipped away to their homes. At the end of June, after abandoning an attack on Bristol, Monmouth arrived in Bridgwater. His men were grumbling — and he himself talked of giving up and escaping to France. But a small success in a fierce skirmish with the king's troops along the hedgerows of Norton St. Philip had encouraged his commanders: they decided

that all must be risked on an immediate battle with the king's main forces.

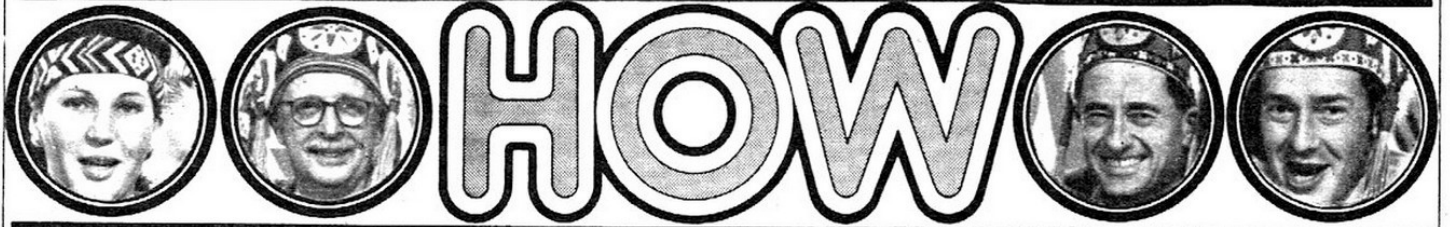
The king's army was commanded by Lord Faversham, an unpopular Frenchman, but his second-in-command was Lord Churchill who, as the Duke of Marlborough, was to become one of England's greatest generals. His two-thousand foot-soldiers were mostly well-trained veterans, equipped with the wheel-lock musket which was lighter, more accurate and much quicker to load and fire than the matchlock muskets of Monmouth's men. He had seven-hundred cavalry and fifteen cannon, served by trained gunners.

ILL-ARMED ARMY

Against this small but efficient force, Monmouth had a rabble of around four-thousand foot-soldiers, many armed only with pikes or scythes. His five-hundred horsemen were mostly poorly mounted and were commanded by the unreliable Lord Grey. He had only three cannon, old and small. And this force he now planned to launch across Sedgemoor in a surprise night attack on the king's army.

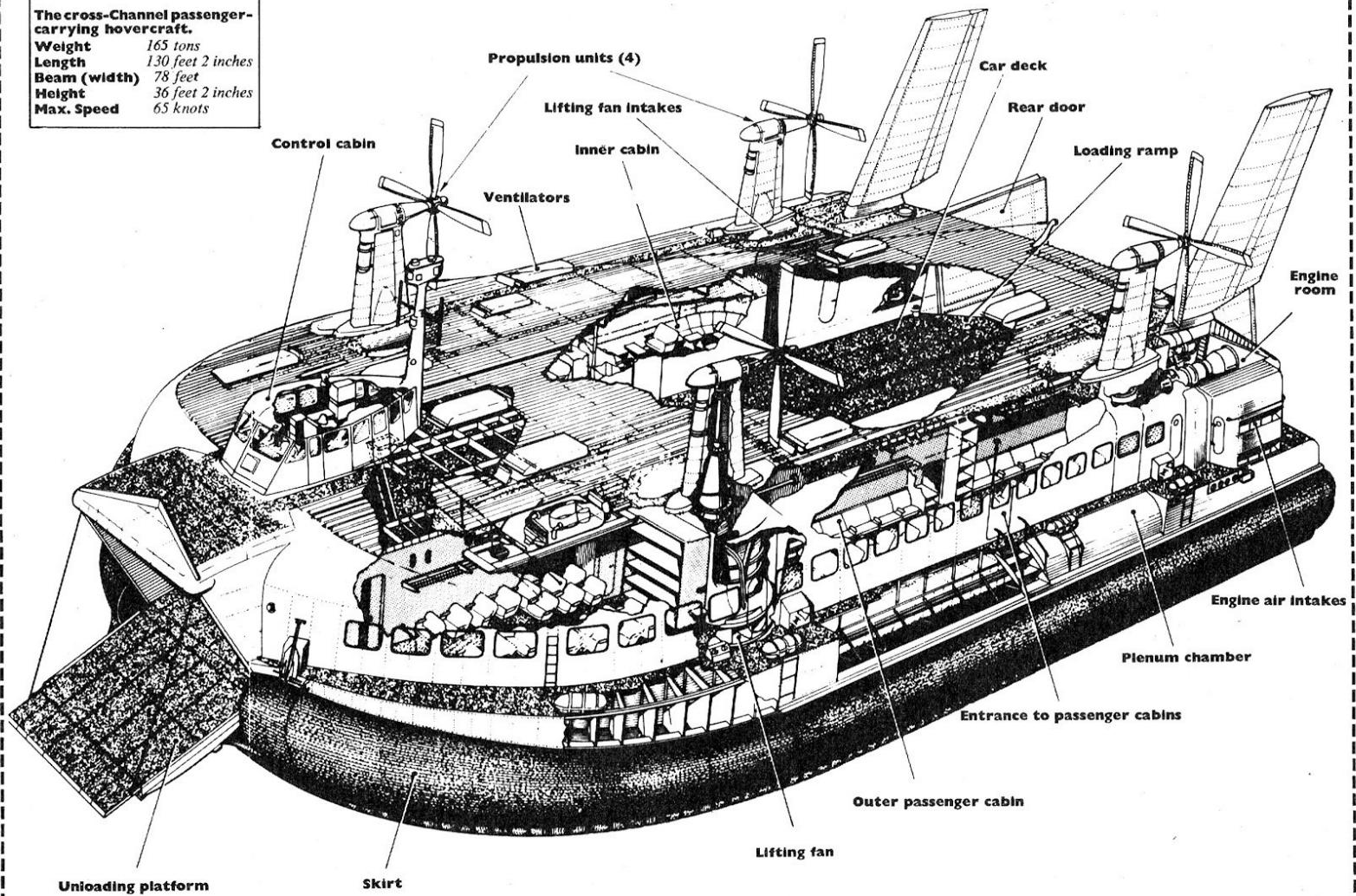
