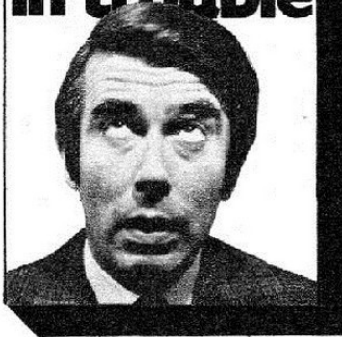

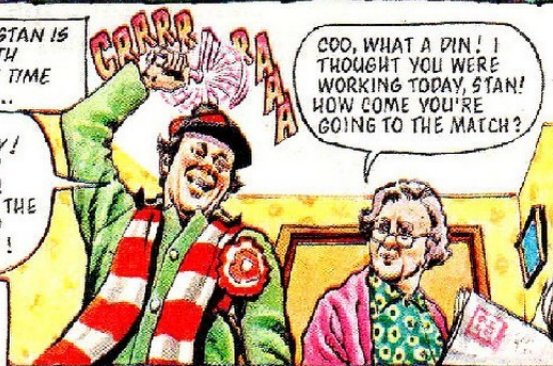

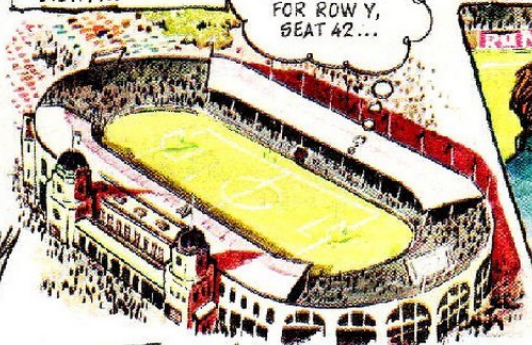

The point of all this—is always try and put on a happy face and be polite. It makes other people nicer to you.

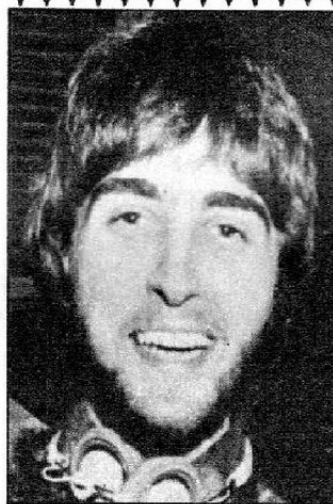



Feeling depressed? Run down? In need of a tonic? Take some good advice, and pay regular visits to the hospital for the next twenty-seven weeks! Not *any* old hospital, of course. Where the prescription is strictly for laughs, the place in question must be Saint Swithin's! Based on the brilliantly successful books by Richard Gordon, the 'Doctor' series on television began with 'Doctor In The House', continuing with 'Doctor At Large'. And now the favourite characters are back on the screen for a third run in 'Doctor In Charge'. The new stories are set in and around Saint Swithin's Hospital, and this time the central figure is to be Dr. Duncan Waring, played by Robin Nedwell, whom older fans will remember seeing as a medical student in the first series. Supposedly coming back to Britain after a two-year stint in the United States,

DOCTOR IN CHARGE

← Dr. Waring takes up an appointment as Senior House Surgeon to Loftus, the irascible Professor of Surgery, played by Ernest Clark. Needless to say, Waring isn't back five minutes before the unfortunate professor is reaching for his nerve tonic.

The happy-go-lucky Waring is assisted, hindered, involved and misguided by that suave man-of-the-world, the anaesthetist Dr. Dick Stuart-Clark, portrayed by Geoffrey Davies. Then there's Dr. Paul Collier, Stuart-Clark's companion in hearty drinking and hare-brained thinking—played as before by George Layton, and a distracting newcomer to the scene in the delightful shape of Sammie Winmill, who plays Nurse Sandra Crumpton.

Just add Bingham—whom we know to be the greatest medical brain of the century, because he told us himself—Dr. Laurence Bingham, made satisfyingly hate-worthy by actor Richard O'Sullivan—and you have all the main ingredients for a sure-fire anti-gloom medicine.

Off-set, the actors who play these parts are much the same as we see them on the screen. With two exceptions. Richard O'Sullivan is neither brash nor pompous, and Ernest Clark is anything but fiery and irascible. Broadly, though—and this is perhaps some of the charm of

the series—they portray real people. People whom viewers can believe in. It raises a frightening train of thought. Suppose real doctors could be found who were as zany as this lot!

The mind boggles, for example, to think of a surgeon having the hobby of the real-life Robin Nedwell. He collects those terrifying, keen-bladed Japanese swords! And Richard O'Sullivan, sharing with some of the others a passion for a

game of darts . . . it would be a brave patient who submitted to his attentions with a hypodermic needle!

Oddly, one of the cast could have entered the medical profession. George Layton comes from a doctor's family, and his grandfather was City Pathologist of his home town, Bradford.

'Doctor In Charge', which is presented by London Weekend Television, promises to be one of the top comedy series of 1972. Its predecessor, 'Doctor At Large', made TV history by being the first British comedy programme to be screened in America.

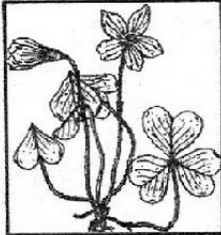


COWSLIP

There is so much bird activity taking place that you could spend every day carrying out observations. The birds that you see or hear will depend largely upon whereabouts you live. But even in the heart of the city, you may be able to see some of the new arrivals if you keep an eye on the parks. Nest-building and egg-laying will be going on all around you as April continues,

Last week, I talked about the activity of the animal world during this month. But also in April, most of our migrant birds choose to return for the summer. So keep your ears pinned for an exciting chorus of new bird songs.

Among the early arrivals is the willow warbler. Later on the blackcap, sedge warbler, wood warbler, white-throat, turtle dove, garden warbler and nightingale will join the migrant masses.

THE CLARINET is a single beating reed instrument and was known to Ancient Egypt. A primitive form is the Pibcorn or Hornpipe, having the sounding tube of wood or bone holding the reed attached to pieces of horn. Denner of Nurnberg is said to have been the creator of the modern clarinet pattern in the early 18th century. The top illustration shows a sketch of the Pibcorn or Hornpipe, while the lower one shows an early 19th century clarinet.

Farewell, Beautiful Belle

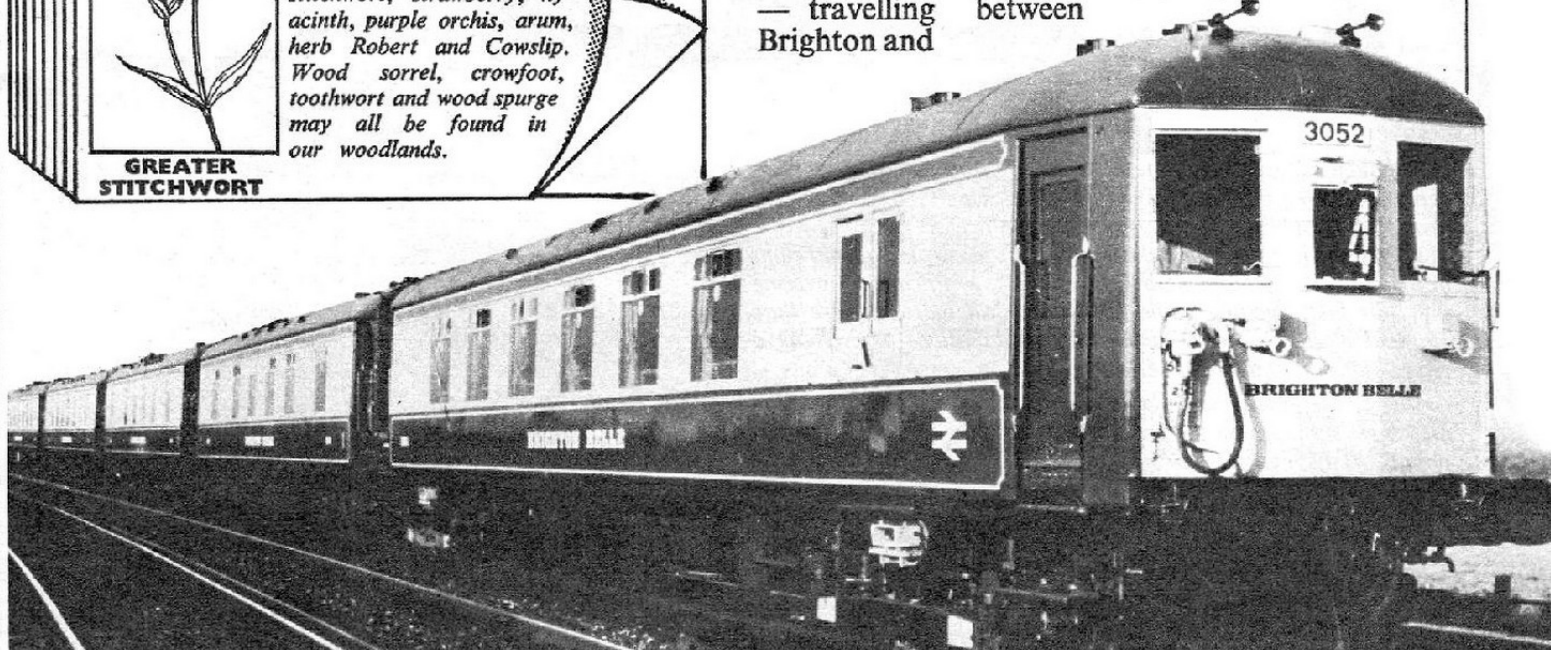

HEY-UP AND OVER!



"It's like no other race: any jockey is proud just to finish the course. To win it—that would be fantastic!" That's former Champion National Hunt jockey Josh Gifford's opinion of the Grand National, the world's greatest steeplechase.

Run over a four-and-a-half mile course at Aintree, Liverpool (you can watch it for yourself, on Saturday, April 8th), the National is the longest event in the British horse-racing calendar. And it is certainly the toughest. In a double circuit of the course, the riders and their mounts must navigate the fifteen fences twice each; fences like the formidable 'Chair'—a six-foot-wide ditch with a fence of layered spruce as high as a man beyond it.

THE RACE BEGINS

In 1837, the name 'Grand National' was given to a steeplechase run either at Aintree or nearby Maghull. But the National as we know it really came into being in 1839, when a group of gentlemen headed by Lord Stanley decided to organise an annual 'four-mile race across country for gentlemen riders'. That year the race, watched by around 50,000 spectators, was won by a horse called Lottery—but it is best remembered for the fall of Captain Becher from his mount, Conrad, at the obstacle which has been called Becher's Brook ever since.

One of the most attractive features of the National is that amateur riders are still able to enter their own mounts to compete with the professional jockeys and the best horses that the big commercial stables can produce. And the National is such an 'open' race that no horse can really be said to be 'without a chance'. Remember 1967, when a single horse, falling at the twenty-third fence, brought down most of the strongest contestants, leaving a 'no-hoper'—far enough back until then—to take evasive action

Becher's Brook has been nearly a century since Captain Becher took his famous fall there in 1839.

Anyone For Squash?

Although squash is a game with aristocratic ancestry—it probably developed around 1850 at Harrow School—it is no longer restricted to public schoolboys and army officers.

Within the last ten years, the number of squash players and clubs in Britain has doubled. People from all walks of life are discovering that this fast, exciting game—in which skill matters more than physical strength—provides first-class relaxation, as well as a ready-made slimming course.

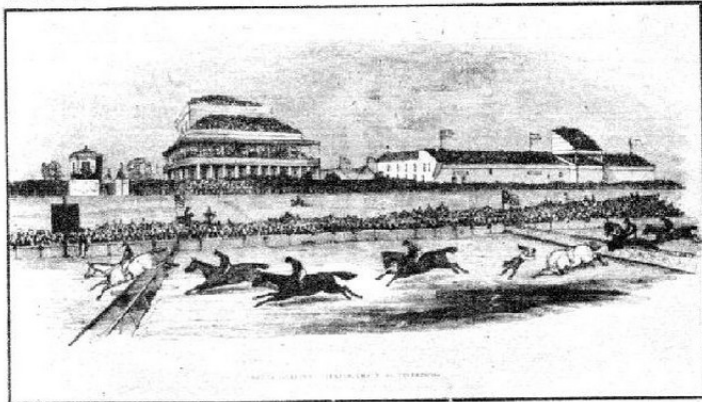
One of the new squash players is Magpie's Douglas Rae. You may have seen him on the programme recently, learning the basic points of the game from Jonah Barrington, the thirty-year-old Cornishman who has won every major squash event in the world. Points are scored by striking the ball against the front wall of the squash court in such a way that your opponent is unable to return it. Douglas managed to take several points, although playing against a champion—proving that even a complete beginner can put up a good showing and enjoy the game.

MEMORABLE MOMENTS

Even that pile-up couldn't compare with that of 1928, when forty-one of the forty-two horses fell! But the National is rich in drama: in 1902 it was run in a snowstorm and the winner, Grudon, had its hooves packed with butter to prevent slippery snow 'balling' on them. In 1934, Golden Miller, perhaps the greatest ever horse 'over the sticks', was ridden to victory in the record time of nine minutes, twenty-four seconds.

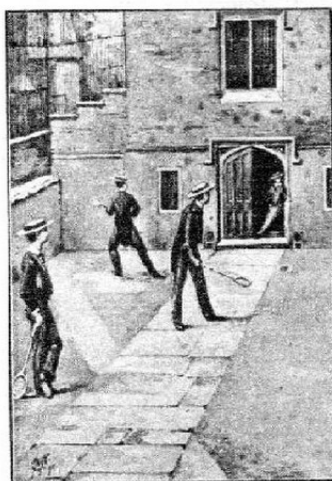
TRAGIC ENDING

In 1956, Devon Loch, owned by the Queen Mother, came over the last fence well clear of the rest, only to fall on level ground—fifty yards from victory!

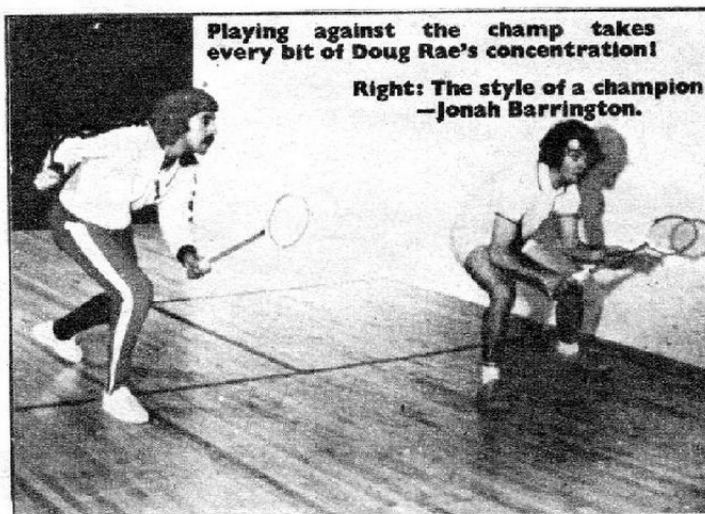
As early as the first National

in 1839, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (founded in 1824, 'Royal' since 1840) was protesting about the severity of the Aintree fences. In recent years, the obstacles have been modified, but they still remain the toughest of all tests for horse and rider — and provide one of the most exciting spectacles that British sport has to offer.

Early squash rackets at Harrow School.

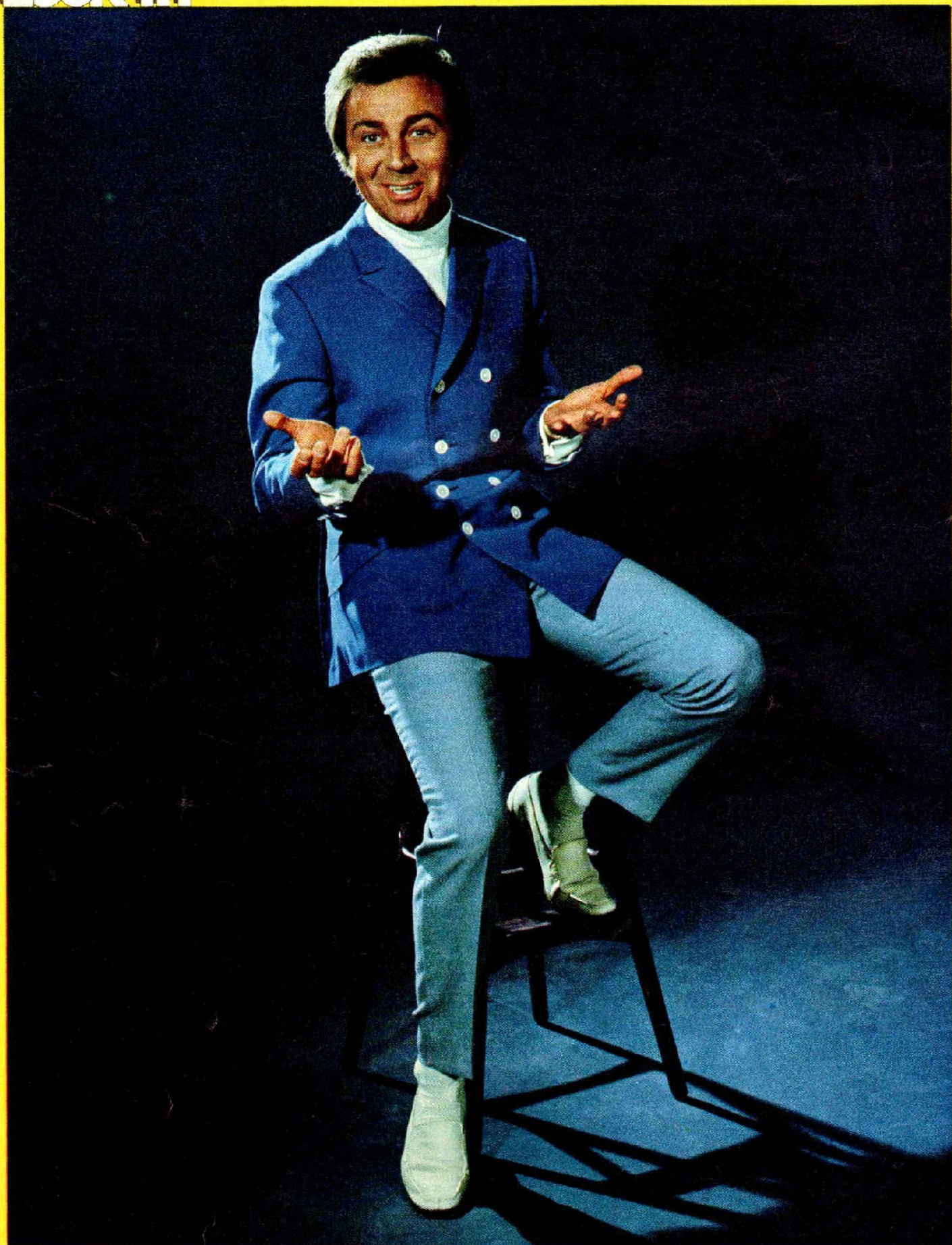

HOW does blushing come about?

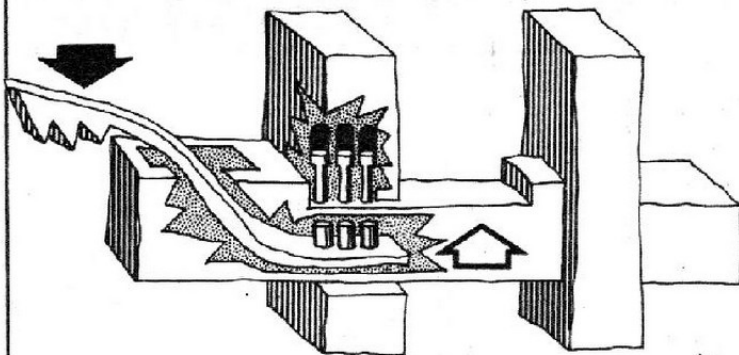

Blushing happens when the skin's tiny blood vessels swell with blood all of a sudden. These vessels are called 'capillaries' and the swelling is caused by 'vasodilator' nerves which, as those who blush know (even if they don't know that very scientific word), are set off by something which suddenly embarrasses them or, perhaps, makes them very happy. It's nothing to worry about, though people who blush *do* worry about it. Usually, once you grow up, this seemingly uncontrollable happening only occurs occasionally. And, let's face it, if you blush it is said to mean that you have a warm heart!

HOW and when were the first locks and keys made?

The first locks and keys date back to Egyptian times, some 4,000 years ago, Peter. They were big wooden bolts operated by wooden keys which looked not unlike modern toothbrushes, but bigger. These were attached to gates. The principle on which the Egyptian lock worked was a simple one: pegs fell into holes in the bolt and could only be pushed up by the toothbrush-key, which was slipped into a special hole in the bolt. The pegs of the key had to match the pins of the lock or the pegs could not be pushed up.



HOW did the saying 'double Dutch' originate?

'Dutch' was quite often used in the past as another word for foreign. This was taken one step further in the last century, when people began saying 'double Dutch' when they meant gibberish, or something quite beyond their understanding.

HOW many different breeds of horses are there approximately in the world?

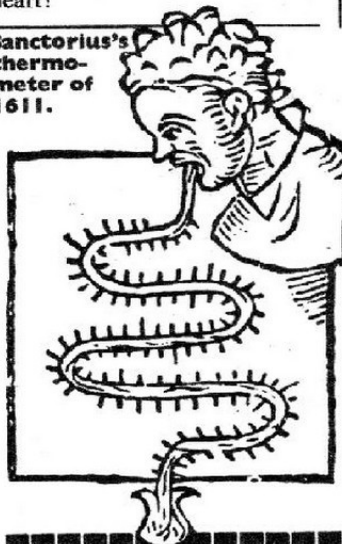
There are roughly sixty breeds of domesticated horses, Pat, and one wild breed—the tarpan of

Central Asia. There are other wild horses in the world, but the point to remember is that they are descended from domestic ones run wild. The other name of the tarpan is Przewalski's horse, after a Russian explorer.

HOW does a thermometer work and who invented it?

Julie Purslow, Cheshire.

Water and other substances swell when they are heated and shrink when they are cooled. Thus, it is on this fact that most thermometers depend. The ancient Greeks knew that air expands when it is heated, and a Greek named Philo made a 'thermoscope' some 2,000 years ago. This probably resembled the first air thermometer, made by the great Italian scientist Galileo in 1592. He put a scale

beside his tube so that he could tell the difference between temperature and heat. And they are different! A burning ember is far hotter than a hot drink, but the drink contains more heat, because there is more of it.

A friend of Galileo's called Sanctorius improved on his thermometer by making one in which a coloured liquid was forced down by the air expanding. This had a glass bulb which the patient held in his mouth: the higher his temperature, the lower went the water level.

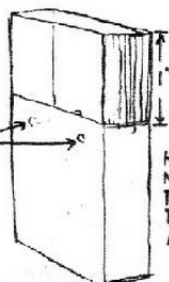

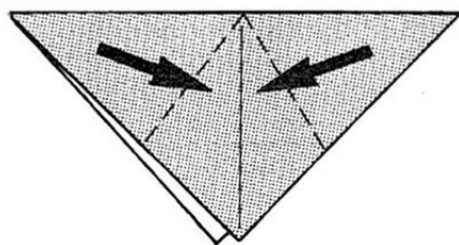

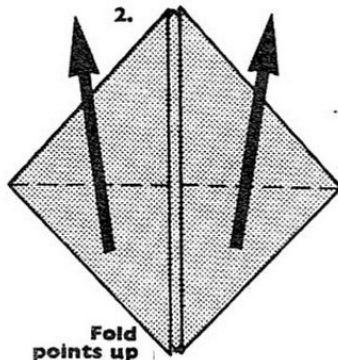
The Cicada

APOLLO 16 MOON MISSION BADGE THIS FABULOUS REPLICIA FOR 65p

ON APRIL 20, when John Young and Charlie Duke manoeuvre the Apollo 16 Moonship ready for final touchdown as Ken Mattingly circles above, their landing will be the most tricky yet.
