COWBOY IN AFRICA

← rhinoceroses aren't the easiest of creatures to photograph! Her clicking camera had enraged the huge beast which turned into a ton of charging fury. Running amok the rhino had stampeded straight into a poacher's trap—and only a fast rescue operation would save its life. This was where Jim and Tom would fit in—for looking after Africa's fast-shrinking game population was part of their job!

A typical incident from one of the exciting television series—'Cowboy in Africa'! And playing the lead rôle of Jim Sinclair is a man who is famous for tough parts—Chuck Connors. It was in 'Branded', the story of a disgraced army officer wrongly accused of cowardice, that Chuck gained a following of devoted fans second to none. He followed up the series with another—which was just as popular—'Rifleman'. In it he portrayed a fast-shooting cowboy who had an unbreakable partnership with his Winchester rifle.

In 'Cowboy in Africa', Chuck Connors keeps his cowboy image—but with a big difference. He makes a historic switch from cattle-ranching to game-ranching! With his companion Tom Nardini (played by John Henry), the two of them no longer ride the range in search of trophies as they did in their rodeo days. Instead they meet the challenge of capturing and domesticating wild animals.

Filed on location in the 'dark continent' Chuck and his partner are always involved with some sort of drama—either with man, animal or Africa's untamed and menacing terrain.

Born in Brooklyn, New York, Chuck was an athlete almost from the day he could walk. By the time he graduated, he had no fewer than twenty-seven college athletic scholarships to choose from. At that time his ambition was to be a professional basketball player. Eventually, though, he decided to

switch games and become a 'pro' baseball player. This was the luckiest move in his life. For he joined a team in Los Angeles—often visited by celebrities from nearby Hollywood.

Chuck was a natural to catch the eye of the famous and influential people. Consequently, it was agreed that this six-foot-five-inch giant, should be given the odd film part here and there. It was a break that was destined to make Chuck Connors one of the biggest names in Hollywood! 'Cowboy in Africa' has already been shown in some regions. 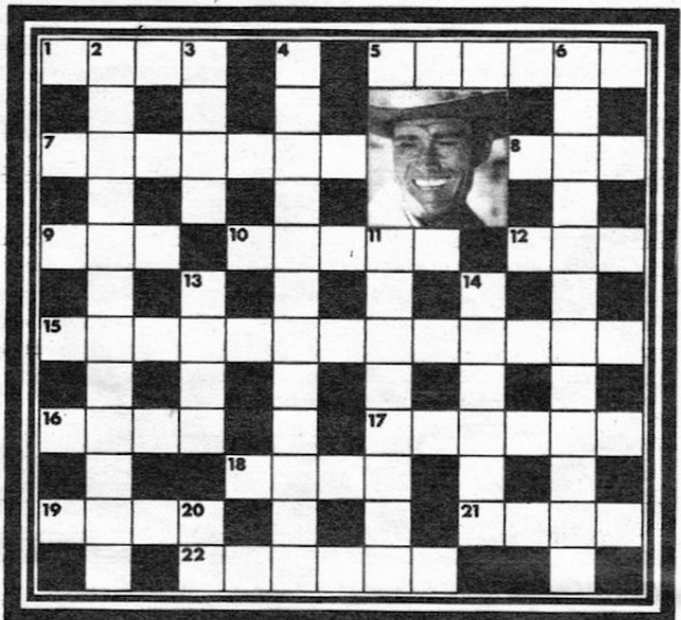


Below: Chuck Connors and John Henry in 'Cowboy in Africa'

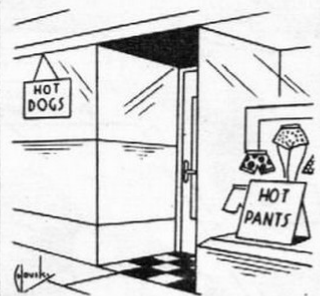

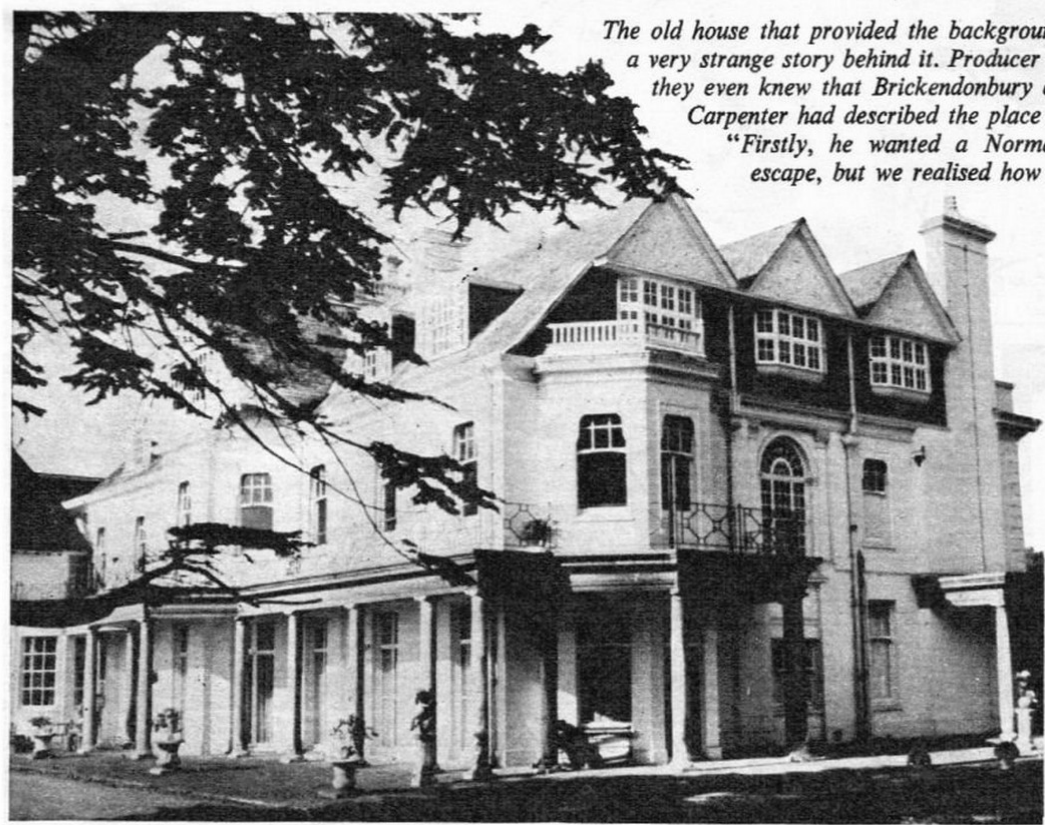

Catweazle's Castle



The old house that provided the background to the series 'Catweazle' has a very strange story behind it. Producer Carl Mannin retells how, before they even knew that Brickendonbury existed, the scriptwriter Richard Carpenter had described the place he wanted Catweazle to live in.

"Firstly, he wanted a Norman castle to show Catweazle's escape, but we realised how difficult it would be to find one we could use. So then Richard wrote that the house he imagined was situated on the site of the old castle which was burnt down in the 1850s and was rebuilt by the owners.

Then we found Brickendonbury. There were stories that it had been used during the war to train British agents, and that Winston Churchill used it as his secret headquarters.

But what really stunned us was that we discovered it actually had been built on an old castle site, and it really had been burnt down in the 1850s!"

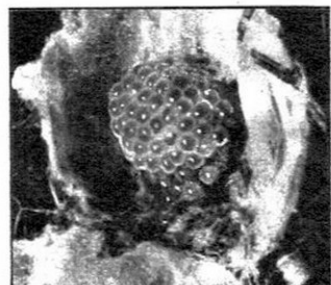

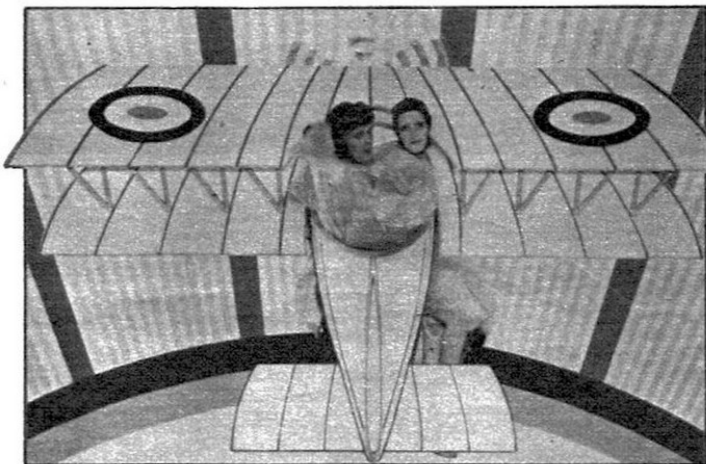

days, but because we were always behind schedule it used to take between twelve and thirteen—or sometimes fifteen days, by which time the producers were chewing on their fingernails.

How did you manage all that fighting in 'The Avengers'?

With a lot of help! First, we had stunt men—and they are the bravest and best people you can possibly work with. All I had to do was poke one—and he'd turn a somersault and make it look as if I'd knocked him out!

What was it like filming 'On Her Majesty's Secret Service'?

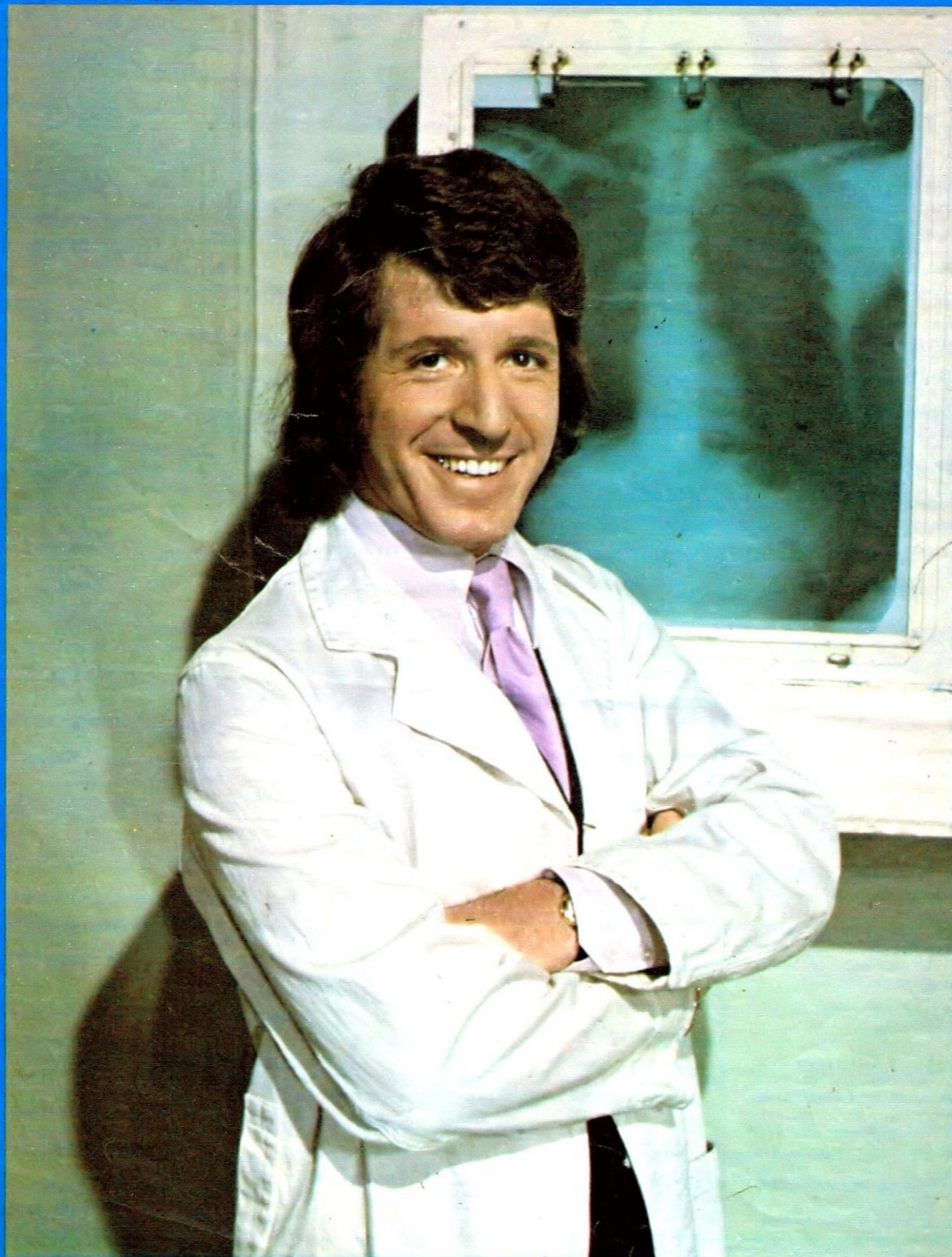
It was great fun. I love doing location filming, because it's about the smartest way to travel—all first class, and the best hotels—and you see countries. And filming is a form of madness: film moguls live grandly, and it was quite interesting to watch this madness and even take part in it for a while.

Do you prefer to work in films, on television or on the stage?

I like the stage best because I like people best—and the stage has most to do with people.



HOW did the pomegranate get its name?

It literally means 'an apple which has many grains or seeds', though 'pome' in botany includes other similar fruits, like pears and quinces. Pomegranates grow on shrubs or bushy trees and were originally found in the Mediterranean area and southern Asia. It takes quite a time to eat one as there are so many seeds. Its flowers are beautiful.

HOW did the four-leaf clover first become lucky, and why?

Until around the 18th century, nearly everyone believed in witches and witchcraft, and a very good way to fend them off was thought to be with a piece of clover! Better still was a four-leaf clover, which is rare. Armed with a bit of this you could see fairies, spot any evil spirits that were lurking near you, and detect a witch, however well disguised. If you wore the

special clover, you were safe. Legend has it that if a girl wore a leaf in her right shoe, the first man she met on her first outing of the day would become her husband. Superstitions die hard, so today, long after the age of belief in witches, the four-leaf clover is still thought to be very lucky.

HOW did the poppy become the emblem of Poppy Day?

It was chosen by the British Legion (now the Royal British Legion) as its emblem because so many poppies grew in the fields of Flanders in Belgium where so much of the worst

fighting of the First World War took place. No soldier who fought there could forget those flowers. And, of course, the colour of poppies is sadly suitable for remembering the fallen.

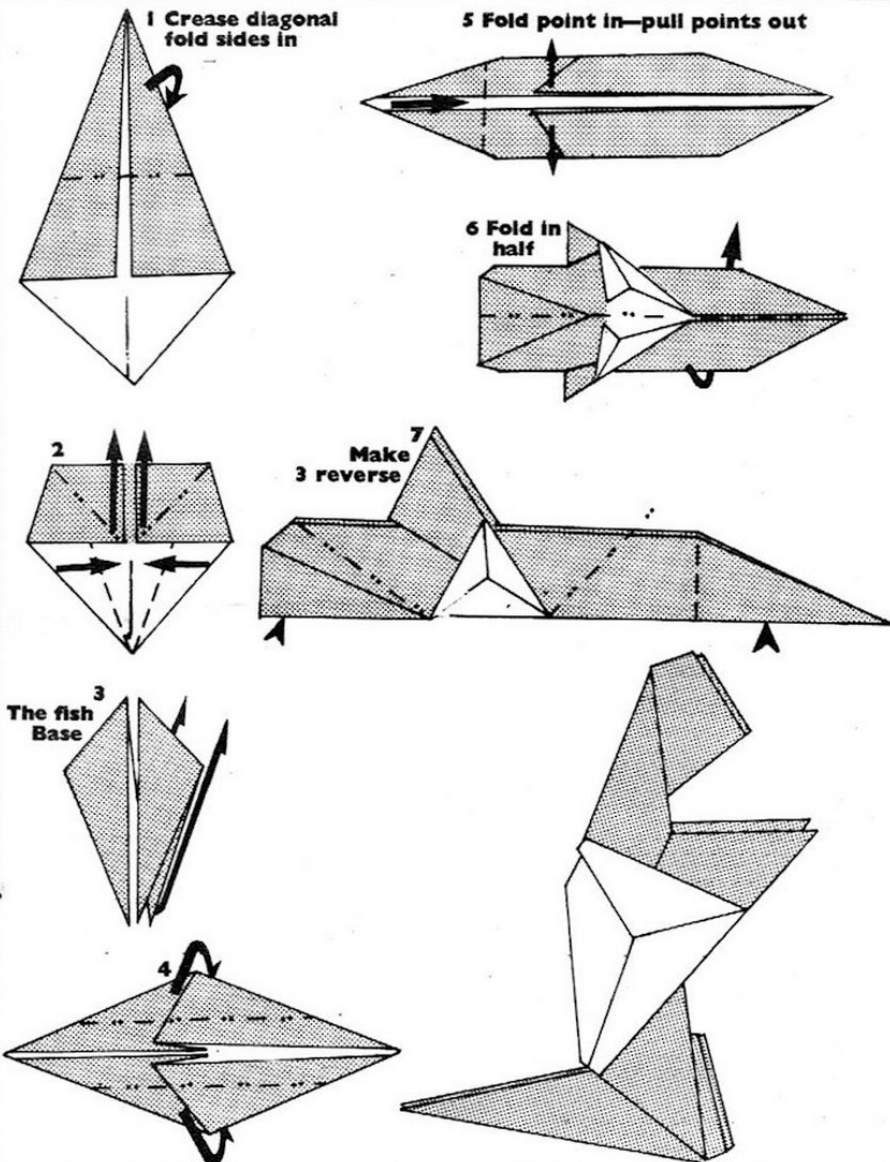
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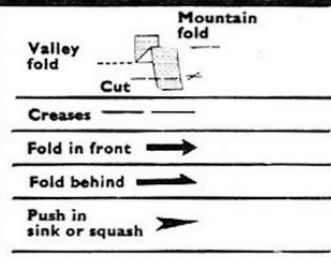
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
