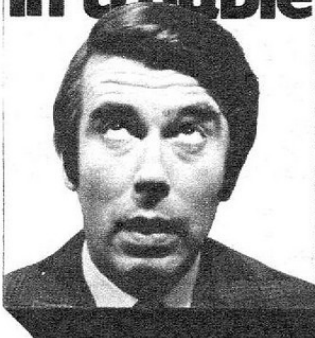

# FACT FILE

## ON TV'S MOST ACTIVE AGENT!

UNTIL ABOUT FIVE YEARS AGO, Edward Woodward was what you might call an 'actors' actor'. His talent was recognised by his colleagues in the profession and by West End theatre-goers who saw his brilliant performance as a North Country lad 'oop for t'Cup' in *Rattle of a Simple Man*. But, in spite of a number of television appearances, the Great British Public only knew Woodward as another face on the 'box'. And then—there was *Callan*!

As the unwilling assassin, the tough trigger-man with a Cockney accent and a sensitive streak, Edward Woodward became a household name. When one programme series ended with *Callan* apparently dead, thousands of viewers protested, and the slogan 'Callan Lives!' mysteriously appeared on walls all over the country. And *Callan* is still very much alive.

Unlike some actors who have found themselves identified with a single part, Woodward bears *Callan* no grudge. "It's a wonderful part," he says, "and I never get bored with it. We have a magnificent team of actors and technicians, and our scriptwriters are the best in the business. I'd like to star in a *Callan* movie if I ever get the chance—and the time."

Finding time is obviously a major problem for Woodward. In the last two years, he has starred in two productions with the National Theatre Company of his life-long idol, Lord Olivier; he has made three films which will be released soon—including *The Young Winston*, based on the early life of Sir Winston Churchill, and *Sitting Target*, with Oliver Reed; and he has starred in singing and comedy spectacles on TV ("I'd like to work with Nina again: she's a wonderful person—and the greatest girl singer there is.").

And he likes to make as much time as he can to relax with his family at his country home in Kent. His daughter, nine-year-old Sarah is "a bit bored with *Callan*—everyone she meets asks her

← to get my autograph! Sarah and the boys are very critical of me, and take the mickey on every possible occasion.

"Tim, my nineteen-year-old son, is an Assistant Stage Manager at Richmond Repertory Theatre and will soon take his R.A.D.A. examination. I suppose it *may* be some help to him to be my son, but I think he sometimes worries that he may be offered work on that account—and not because of his own talents.

"If ever I have the chance, I'd like to do a children's TV series on a really big scale. It would be about two children who travel all over the world—maybe with a diplomat father—and get to know the people in the countries they visit. They wouldn't have hair-raising adventures all the time, but the programme would really get to the heart of each country, what makes its people tick... it might do a bit for international understanding. Of course, it would be fearfully expensive to make..."

## SECRET OF SUCCESS

Woodward, whose long climb to fame began at R.A.D.A. way back in 1946,

It can be the hardest of hard work: you've got to want it desperately, all the time—and you've got to be sure that when you're sixty years old, you'll still want to be an actor as much as you did when you were six, sixteen or twenty-six."

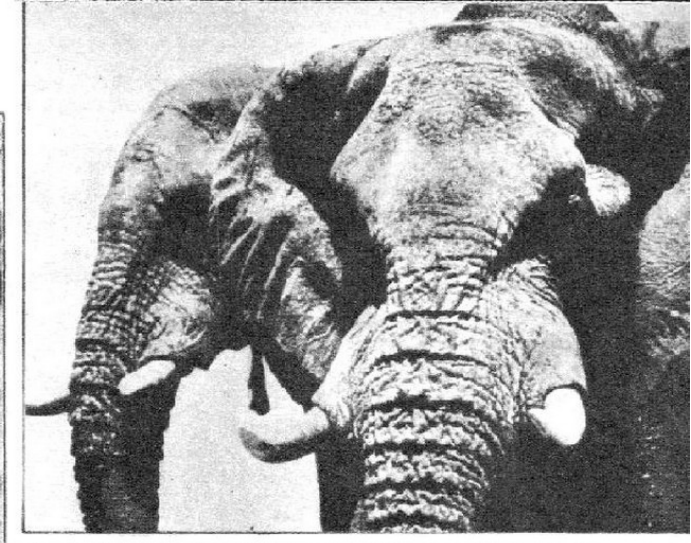
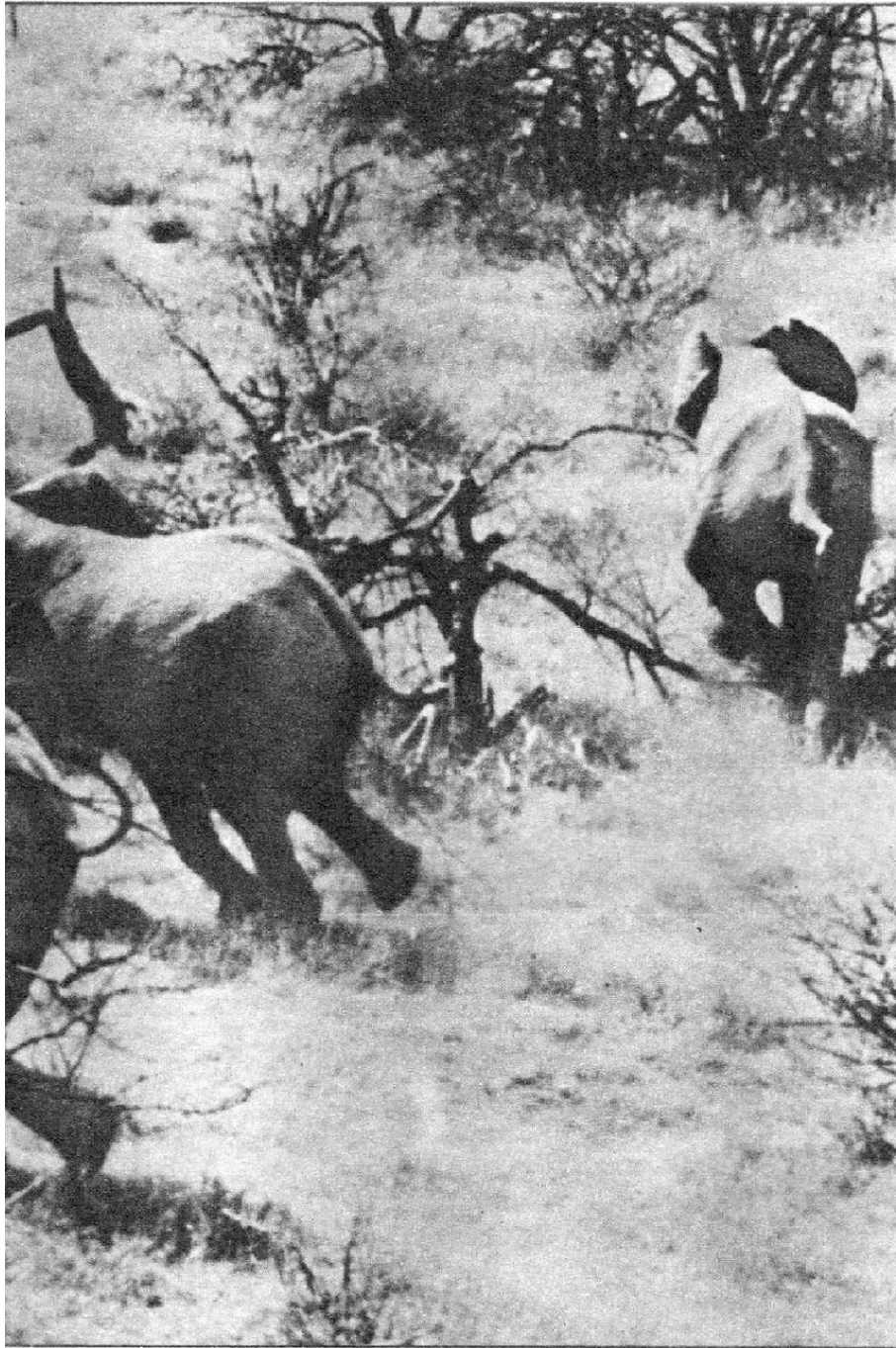


Naturalist Colin Willock introduces a range-rider who herds elephants on horse-back...

## Elephants Out-Of-Bounds

*If you have ever had much to do with horses—and I certainly have, because my eighteen-year-old daughter is a mad-keen show-jumper—you will realise that horses are as temperamental as film stars and opera prima donnas, and are easily spooked, or upset, by unusual situations.*

For a horse, what situation could be more unusual than facing a herd of angry elephants? I can't think of one. And yet a man I know regularly herds elephants with a sheriff's posse



mounted on spirited horses that include his own stars of the show ring.

His name is Peter Stark. He's head ranger of the vast Etosha National Park in South West Africa. He also happens to be a dressage rider of international standard. Dressage, by the way, is the highest form of competitive riding skill. It means schooling the horse to be completely obedient to its rider's every movement and thought—and perhaps this is why Peter is so successful with elephants.

At Etosha, during the dry season, the elephant herds smash through the so-called elephant-proof fence on the boundary of the park and go raiding crops and water-holes on the neighbouring farms.

If they can't be driven back safely into the park, the farmers are well within their rights in shooting them to protect the water and food supplies of their own herds.

Herding hundreds of tons of rampaging elephant for several miles in thick bush country is by no means easy. You might be able to do it by using Land Rovers, but unfortunately

the Etosha bush is too thick for vehicles.

So Peter hit on the idea of using horsemen as cowboys or, rather, elephant boys. He trained carefully selected riders from his staff of bushmen rangers. The hardest thing of all was to persuade riders and horses not to panic when faced by a trumpeting elephant.

He did this by choosing a place for training at one of the park's water holes, where there was a narrow channel between elephants and riders. Slowly, his cowboys and their mounts got used to having the monsters only a few yards away from them.

Peter's method has been highly successful—his posse has now saved the lives of hundreds of elephants by driving them back through the fence into the safety of Etosha National Park.

## The Penetrating Penny

Would you like to be able to put a penny on the table and then hit it so hard with a matchbox that it goes right through the table and falls on the floor? Incredible? Here's how it's done.

Beforehand you secretly attach a duplicate penny under the table with a dab of wax. Then on the underside of the matchbox you fix a tiny ball of chewing gum. Now when you hit the coin on the table it will stick underneath the box, and apparently disappear.

The force of the blow, however, will dislodge the coin UNDER the table. Two important points to note: the table

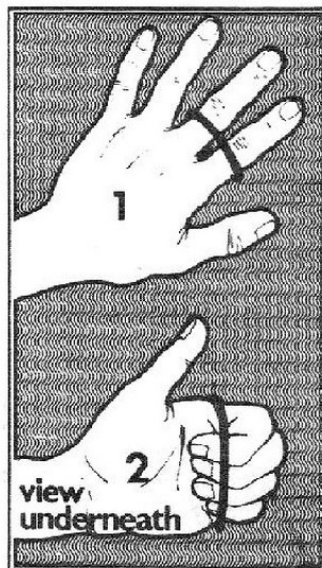


should not be too thick and you must put away the matchbox quickly, while everyone is looking at the coin on the floor.

## The Acrobatic Band

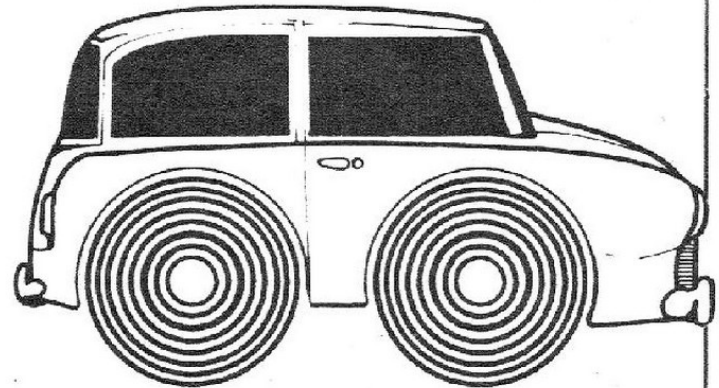
Place a small rubber band over your first two fingers, as shown in picture 1. Hold the hand palm down, and with the other hand stretch the band downwards to enable you to bend all your fingers and get the fingertips inside the band (Picture 2).

From the audience's view of the top of the hand, it still looks as though the band is around the first two fingers—but if you straighten all the fingers very quickly, the band will jump to around the third and fourth fingers. Try it and see!



## Whirling Wheels

Here's a very interesting optical illusion. Hold this page between both hands and quickly move it round and round with a small clockwise circular motion. If you do this correctly the wheels of the car will appear to be turning round. If you make the motion anti-clockwise the car will seem to go backwards.



## Tricky Tear

Get a postcard and make two cuts in it, as shown by the dotted lines. Tell your victim to hold the card between his hands at A and B, and pull outwards so that the card finishes up in three separate pieces. It is really impossible—the middle portion always stays attached

to one of the end pieces.

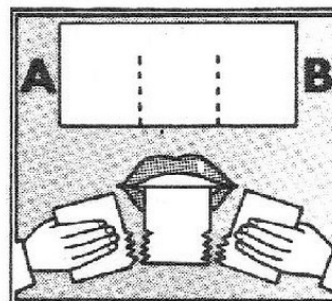
But you can do it easily by cheating just a little bit. Simply lift the card to your mouth, grip the centre portion between your teeth—and pull!

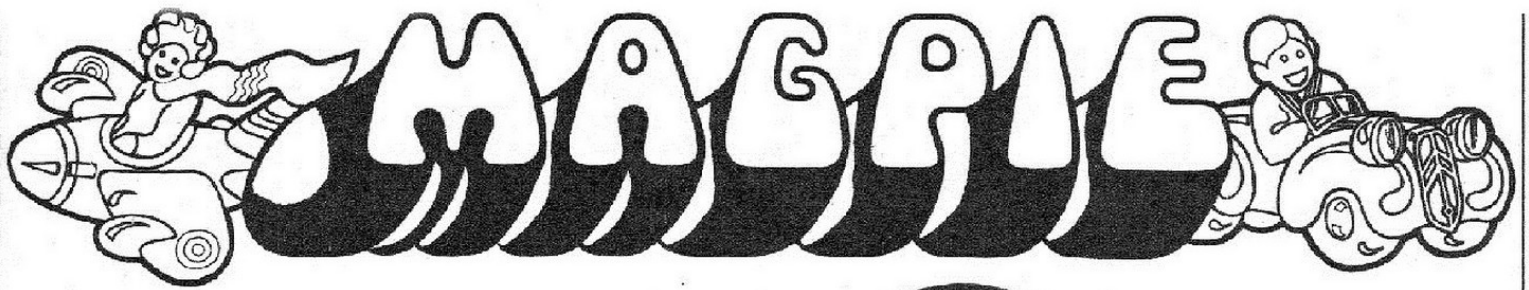

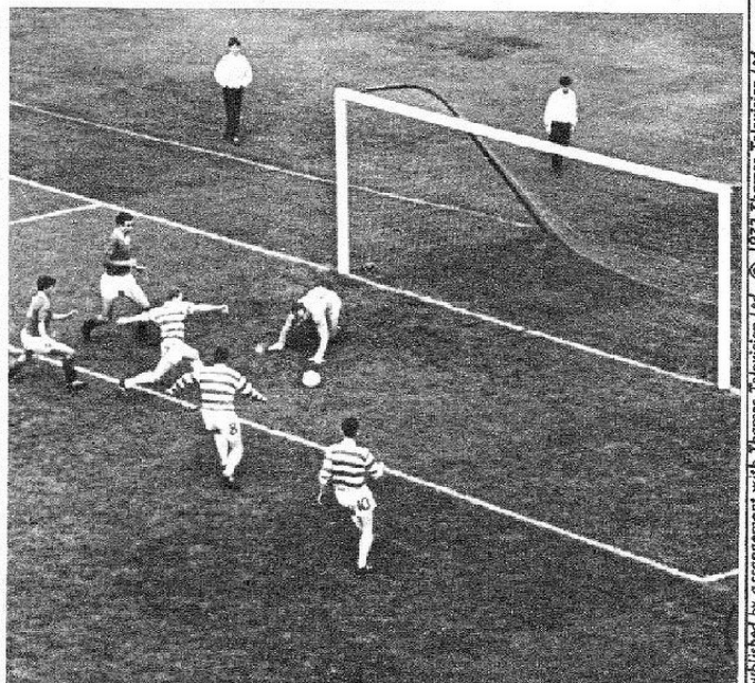


LOOK-IN's alphabetical examination of the soccer scene reaches the letter 'I'—and takes a look at a top team from north of the border.

'I' is for Ibrox Stadium, home of mighty Glasgow Rangers. Together with their 'auld enemy', Glasgow Celtic, Rangers have dominated Scottish football for many years. They have won the Scottish Cup nineteen times, the Scottish League Cup seven times and have taken the Scottish League Championship on no fewer than thirty-four occasions.

On New Year's Day, 1939, when Rangers met Celtic at Ibrox, a record 118,561 spectators packed into the ground. In 1964, Rangers pulled off a hat-trick, taking all three Scottish titles—but in recent years Celtic have taken the majority of Scottish honours. Nevertheless, it's certain that Rangers will be fighting to carry their famous colours—royal blue shirts, white shorts and red stockings with white hooped tops—to the top once more.

And this could be their year for the European Cup Winners' Cup: they meet Moscow Dynamo at Barcelona in the Final on May 24th.

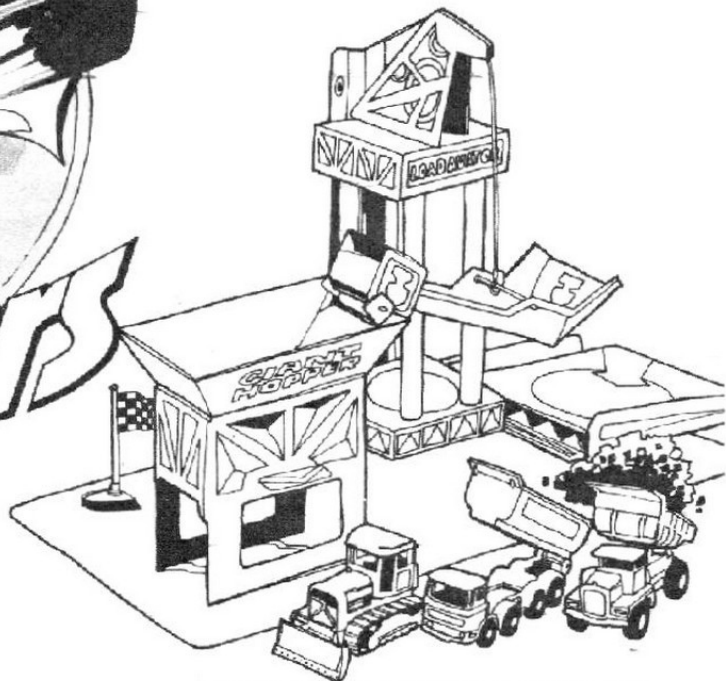

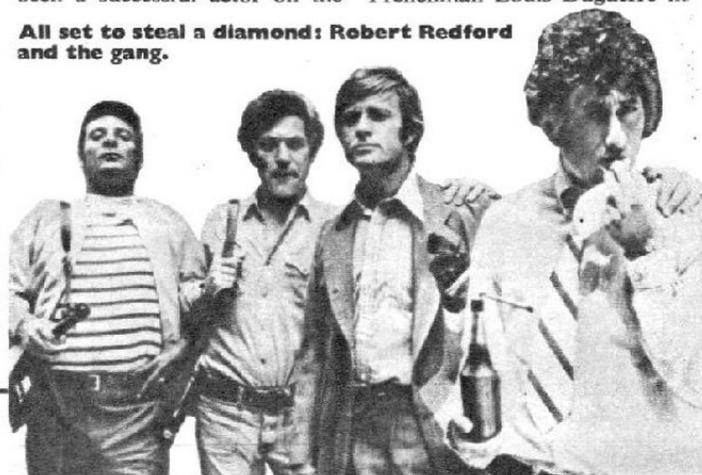

## THE MOVIE-MAKERS 1: THE PIONEERS

☆☆☆☆☆☆☆☆☆☆

★Beginning this week, LOOK-IN focuses on the history of the cinema, in the first of a series of articles that traces the development of the motion picture from 'magic lantern' to Cinerama.

★As early as the year 1640, when a certain Athanasius Kirchner astounded the citizens of Rome with a kind of 'magic lantern' in which drawings seemed to move, inventors were working towards 'moving pictures'. The work of Kirchner and others led to the 'stroboscope', a hand-held device in which scenes painted on the rim of a wheel, spun round and viewed through a slit, seemed to take on life.

★It was not until after the Frenchman Louis Daguerre in-

vented the photographic process in the early 19th century that the development of the moving picture as we know it became possible. In the 1880s, the great American scientist Thomas Alva Edison encouraged his assistant, William Kennedy Dixon, to work on the problem.

★After nine year's work, Dixon came up with what he called the 'kinetograph'—inside a light-proof box, a series of photographs on celluloid film was displayed, with the aid of a motor and gearing device, at the rate of forty-eight 'frames', or single pictures, each second. To the viewer, looking through a slit in the front of the box, the pictures moved so rapidly that what seemed to be a scene of continuous action was produced.

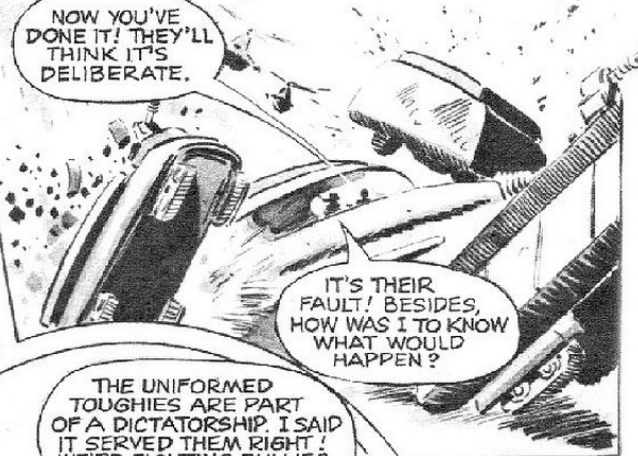

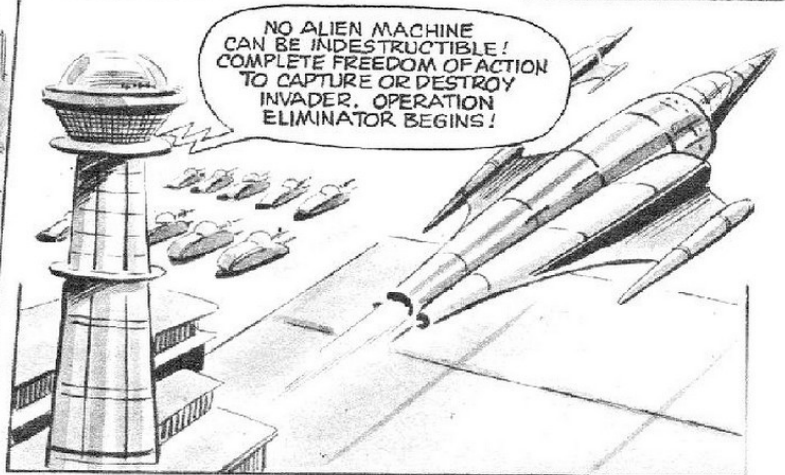

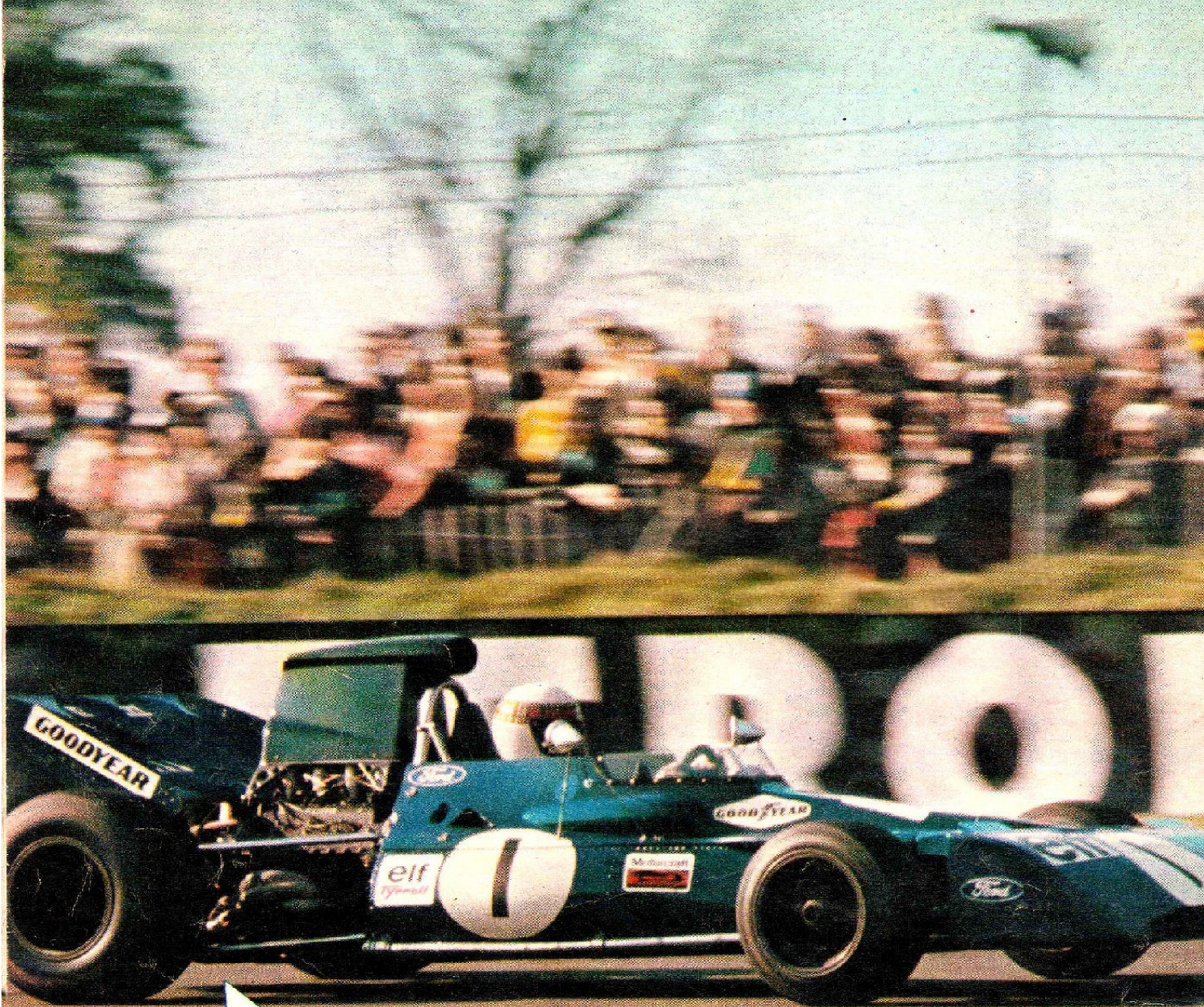

## Jackie Stewart

From petrol-pump attendant to the greatest racing driver in the world! That, in brief, is the incredible story of Jackie Stewart—'The Flying Scot'.

Twice winner of the World Drivers' Championship, Jackie is the son of a garage owner at Dumbarton, and as a boy always dreamed of one day driving high-powered racing motors.

He wanted to follow in the footsteps of his elder brother who was a racing driver, though not in top class.

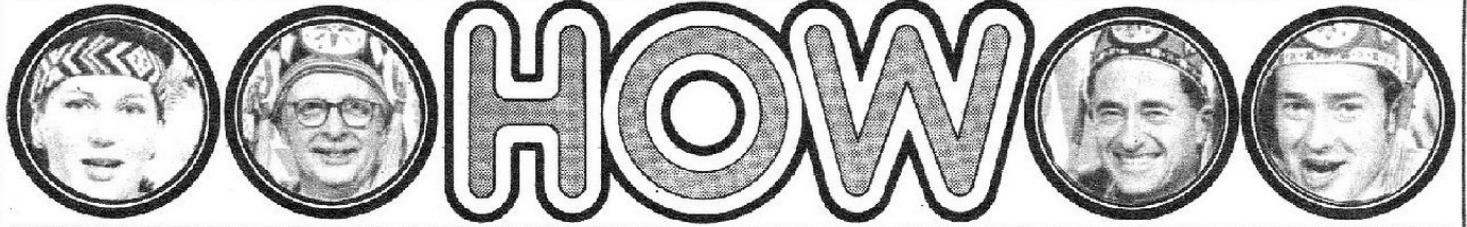
In 1964 after driving cars in local and club competitions, he was offered the chance of driving a Cooper Grand Prix Car—which hallmarked the beginning of his successful career behind the steering wheel.

Today, Jackie Stewart is a wealthy man and lives in Geneva. During the year, he flies over 450,000 miles to all parts of the world to drive the finest cars.

★*Born:* Dumbartonshire, 1939. *1961:* took up car racing. *1965:* won his first Grand Prix at Monza, Italy, in an BRM. *1969:* was World Champion in a Matra. *1970:* drove a March F1 car. *1971:* his greatest season with six Grand Prix victories, (Spain, Monaco, France, Britain, Germany and Canada) in a Tyrrell-Ford cars. *1972:* he won the opening Grand Prix of the season at Buenos Aires—his 19th Grand Prix victory since 1969. **HOW** did the guitar get its name, and when was it invented?

It is wrongly named after an ancient Greek instrument, the kithara, which centuries later became 'guitarra' in Spanish. The Spanish guitar, which can be said to be the guitar, came to Spain about 800 years ago via the Moors, who at that time occupied much of the country. They had come there from North Africa and the instrument had reached them at an unknown date from the East. There have been similar instruments down the years, but some people think that the guitar has a unique beauty of tone.

**HOW** much is the most expensive painting worth and what is it?  
Neil Baldock, Copthorne, Sussex.

Nobody knows the answer to this, Neil, as many of the world's greatest paintings will never come onto the market and be sold. Some people think that the most valuable of all is the Mona Lisa, (right) in the Louvre in Paris. An insurance company once insured it for nearly £40 million when it was destined for exhibition in America, but it is really priceless, like the Crown Jewels. A painting by Leonardo da Vinci of a young woman was bought by the National Gallery of Art in Washington in 1967 for a secret sum, possibly about

£2 million, and at an auction in 1961 a painting by Rembrandt was sold for over £800,000.



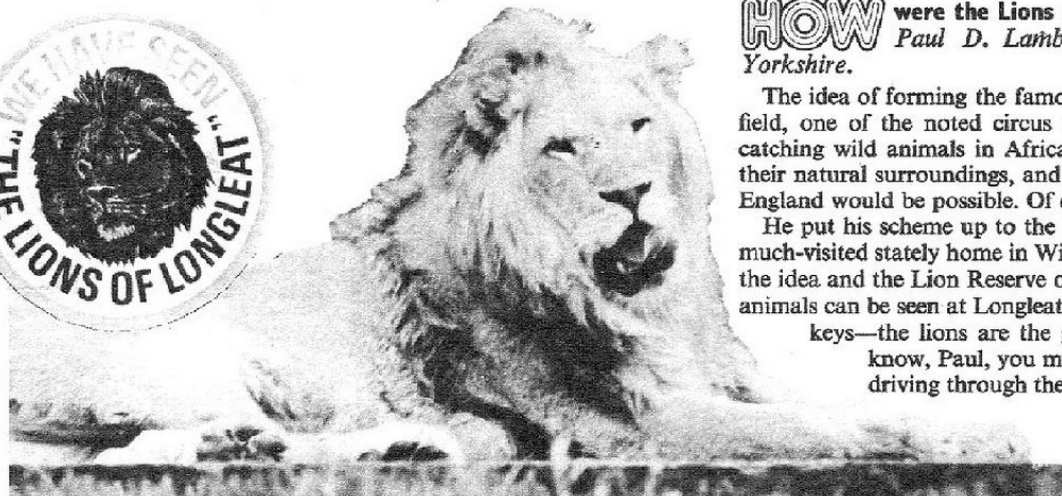
**HOW** did old English sailors get the name 'Limes'?.

We think you mean Limeys, Cheryl! This is still sometimes used by Americans as a nickname for Britons, just as we sometimes call them Yanks. It dates back to the days of sailing ships when Americans called British sailors—and, sometimes, their ships—Limeys because they were issued with lime juice. This was done to prevent their getting the dread disease scurvy, which used to afflict sailors on long voyages without fresh food, on a diet of salt meat and 'hard tack'.



**HOW** were the Lions of Longleat formed, and by whom?  
Paul D. Lamb, West Bretton, near Wakefield, Yorkshire.

The idea of forming the famous lions was that of Jimmy Chipperfield, one of the noted circus family. He had spent a long time catching wild animals in Africa, where he learnt about their life in their natural surroundings, and he decided that an animal reserve in England would be possible. Of course, he knew it would be popular! He put his scheme up to the Marquess of Bath, the owner of that much-visited stately home in Wiltshire, Longleat. The Marquess liked the idea and the Lion Reserve opened in 1966. Although many other animals can be seen at Longleat—including rhinos, giraffes and monkeys—the lions are the greatest attraction. As you probably know, Paul, you must keep all car windows closed while driving through the reserve!

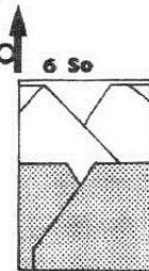
2 Fold above and below



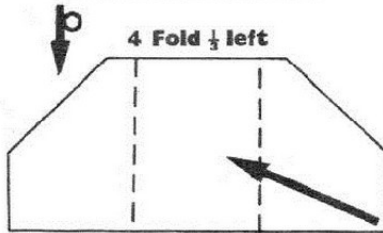
7 Push in corners then open bobsleigh



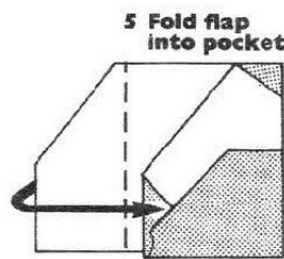

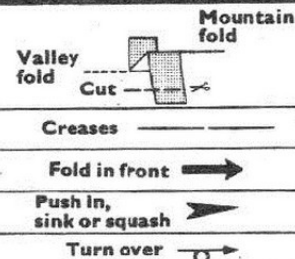
