Of a family gone to roam. It seems that time has been unkind.





Inter Milan.


This season, Celtic brought off the Scottish double, winning the League Championship and beating Hibernian by six goals to one in the Scottish Cup Final.



Jimmy Johnstone slams home Celtic's fourth goal against Motherwell, despite the efforts of goalkeeper MaCrae.


## NATURE NOTES

Recently, I talked about the activity of birds and mammals. But amphibians, too, will be pretty busy at the moment, with tadpoles growing steadily and gradually transforming into froglets, and newts still laying their eggs.



The insect world mustn't be forgotten, either. Wasps are building their nests now—so let's hope none chooses your home as a good nesting site. Did you know that a wasp's nest is begun by just one solitary wasp? In spite of this, the nest may produce up to twenty-thousand wasps during the summer!

You will probably have noticed that trees and wild flowers are in full bloom everywhere so it would be a good idea to get hold of a reference book and, with a few friends, see how many plants you can identify.




The common wasp.

Before you start, here's a little tip. It is best to be systematic in your 'field detection'. Try investigating hedgerows first, then woodland, commons and meadowland.

This is a marvellous time of year for discovery in the countryside so why not see what **you** can find. But please remember, never pick rare flowers.



## Spooky Matches



You need a couple of matches and a piece of cycle valve rubber, about 11 inches long. Insert the bottom ends of the matches into the rubber tube until they meet (figure 1).

Then fold the matches to-

gether and hold them firmly between thumb and forefingerkeeping the rubber tube concealed (figure 2).

Now wave your other hand around the matches and slowly relax the pressure on the valve rubber. The matches will open out in a very spooky and mysterious manner (figure 3).


## Copy Cat

Here's a marvellous way to transfer pictures and drawings from a newspaper on to white paper.

Make a mixture of water and turpentine-four parts of water to one of turpentine-add a tiny piece of soap, and shake the mixture well until the soap has

completely dissolved.

Lay the newspaper that you want to copy on a hard flat surface and moisten it with some of the liquid, using a small piece of sponge. Then lay a sheet of white paper on top and rub it hard all over with the back of a spoon. The result will be a perfect copy of the print and picture-in reverse of course. It works best with a fresh newspaper.

old are the oldest playing cards and who invented card games? Jill Whitmarsh, Rickmansworth, Herts.

It is thought that the Chinese invented playing cards, Jill. The earliest reference we have to them dates back to A.D. 969. But hundreds of years before that the Chinese used paper money which looked so like their playing cards that no one knows when the two sorts merged. Early cards were often used for fortune-telling as well as for games.

The cards reached Europe around the 14th century, either carried by wandering gypsies or by Crusaders returning from wars in the East-if not by both methods. As to the oldest cards. there are some in existence in museums which date back to the early days of card-playing in 15th-century Europe.

18th centuries. John Clayton, the Rector of Corfton near Wakefield, lit some coal gas around 1684, though details of his feat were not published for many years. He had found some gas burning on the ground, collected some and lit it with a candle. He seems to have been the first to discover gas. But we are not prepared to swear to it!
