
# High-Speed Hunter!

Recently, as I was driving in my Land Rover through West Africa's Etosha National Park, I was lucky enough to see a hunting cheetah close to a track. The cheetah, often said to be the fastest land animal on earth, was stalking a springbok.

For a time I was able to keep up with the beautiful spotted cat as it sprinted in pursuit of its prey. When the cheetah broke off the attack—fortunately for the springbok—the speedometer in my vehicle was touching forty-five miles per hour!

Cheetahs, though, can run much faster than that. Speeds of over seventy miles per hour have been claimed for them. But so far no one has been able to make an accurate check.

In the 1920s an enterprising sports promoter brought over African cheetahs to Wembley to race against

← greyhounds. The cheetahs clocked up speeds of over forty miles per hour but then usually became bored with the proceedings and sat down to watch the dogs chase the electric hare.

One look at this creature with its rakish body and long legs tells you that it is built for speed. It is ranked as one of the big cats, yet it has some doglike characteristics.

For instance it can't retract its claws like a lion or, for that matter, a domestic cat. Its claws are blunt, just like those of a dog, and only retract a short way.

Cheetahs are plains animals. They need long straight stretches of grassland on which to sight and catch their prey. They are supposed to be capable of only very short, high-speed sprints. But wildlife cameraman Alan Root told me that he had filmed cheetahs chasing gazelles flat out for over half a mile on the Serengeti Plains of Tanzania.

Cheetahs are threatened animals because, just like leopards, they have beautiful spotted fur which makes luxury ladies' coats. Some countries, led by Britain, have recently banned the import of cheetah skins to give this lovely big cat a chance to survive in the wild.

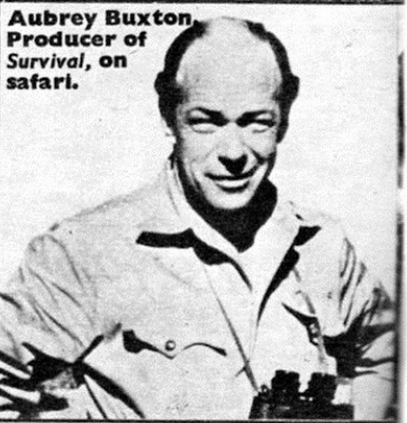
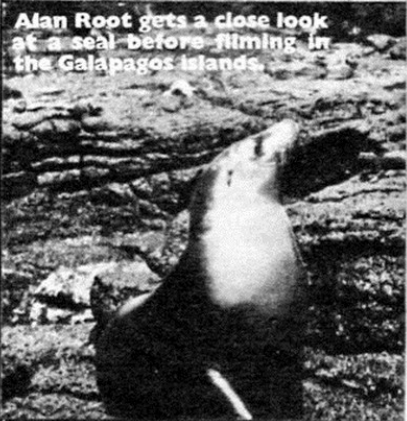
## Film Figures

The glamorous figures, of course, are the cameramen who film all over the world. As many of you will know, they include Australian-born Des Bartlett, Alan Root and his wife, Joan, and a young German, Dieter Plage.

There are other ace cameramen who do a great deal of filming in Britain. The team of cameramen under their Norfolk resident Director Ron Downing, who produced the recent *Survival* programme *Norfolk in Trust*, included John Buxton, Ted Eales, Warden of Blakeney Point Reserve, Chris Knights, a Norfolk farmer, and Philip Wayre, Director of a Norfolk Wildlife Park and an authority on pheasants.

Colin Willock, who writes *Survival* both for TV and LOOK-IN, is also Head of Anglia Television's Natural History Unit. The *Survival* director is Stanley Joseph.

world-wide operation from his office in Mayfair, London. He is a member of both the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution and the Countryside Commission, a trustee of the World Wildlife Fund, and vice-President of the London Zoological Society.

## Cameras and Courage

But you can dismiss any idea that *Survival* cameramen are leisurely gentlemen who stroll out on a sunny morning with a camera. These men are hard-bitten professionals and *Survival* productions are planned like a military operation.

In addition to demanding endless patience and 'know-how', one other quality is required—*cold nerve!*

To prove the point, when filming buffalo in Northern Canada for *Survival*, John Buxton narrowly escaped being trampled to death in a stampede.

Alan Root, who filmed the now-famous award-winning story of the Galapagos Islands called *The Enchanted Isles*, has been bitten by a leopard and nearly died after his hand received the attention of a puff-adder.

Dieter Plage, too, had a nasty experience when filming crocodiles underwater. He was attacked by an eight-foot-long monster that bit through his camera mounting.

Finally, Des Bartlett, who made *The World of the Beaver*—a sensational success in America—filmed a lot of it under the ice of a frozen lake in the Wyoming Rockies and had to be revived with brandy.

So, with regular field trips, a lot of hard work and a good deal of planning and determination, the *Survival Set* not only manage to produce a series of exciting programmes but perform another vital mission—making people aware of the animals about them and thus, perhaps, saving many species from possible extinction.

# DAVID NIXON'S MAGIC BOX



## Coin in the Knot

Place a coin in the corner of a handkerchief and fold it over so that the coin is hidden (figure 1). Take the handkerchief by that corner, with the hidden coin between the fingers and thumb, and shake the handkerchief to 'prove' that there is nothing in it. Then take the opposite corner in your other hand, and twirl the handkerchief into a rope.



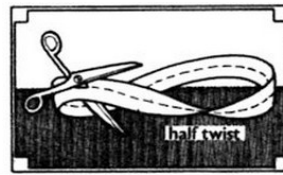
## Baffling Band

Bring the ends together ready to tie a knot, release your grip on the coin which will slide down to the centre (figure 2), then tie the knot. Now give it to someone to untie. Won't they be surprised to find the coin hidden in the knot?

In this clever trick a long loop of paper is made by pasting together the ends of a strip of newspaper about two feet long, by two inches wide. Now if you cut along the centre of the loop you would expect the result to be *two* narrow loops of the same

length. Instead you finish up with *one* loop of *double* the size. How is this possible?

When you stick the ends of the paper strip together, you secretly give the strip a half twist, as shown in the diagram. Now when you cut along the centre, the big single loop will result automatically. Try it!



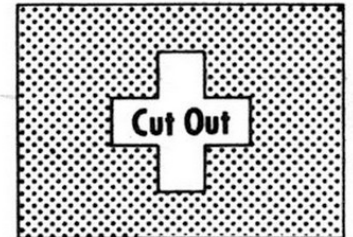

# Tim Dean talks about his collection of photos.



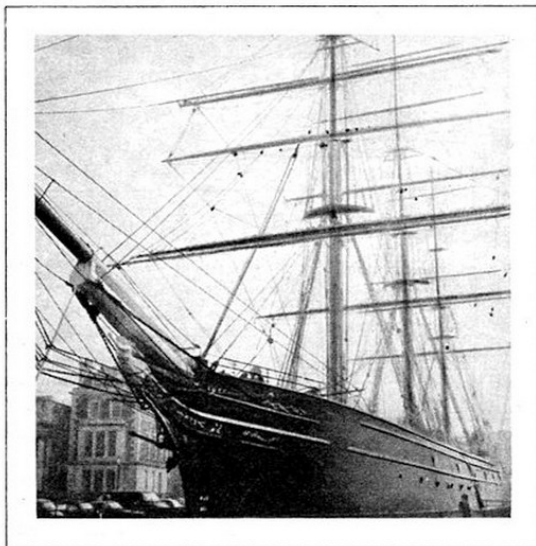

My mum thinks this photo is silly. She thinks you should just take pictures of aunts and uncles, but I really liked this huge monster working on the motorway.



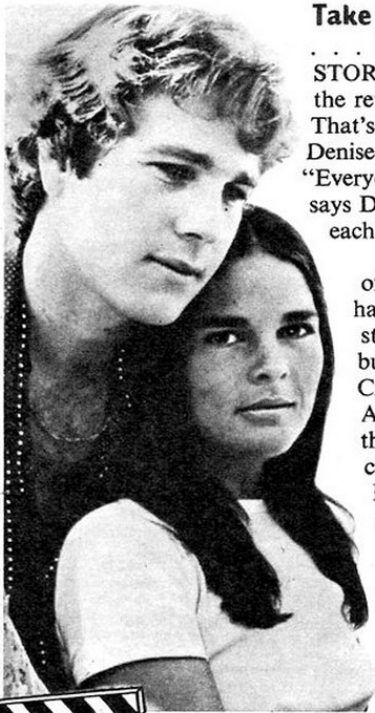

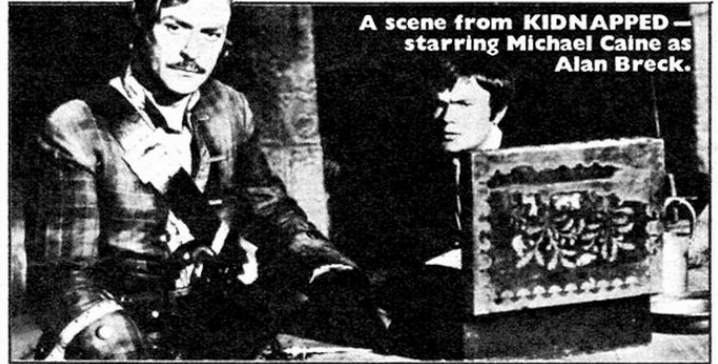

## IV: "The Cinema is Dead!"

Thanks to inventors like Dixon and Thomas Armat in America and the Lumière brothers in France, the cinema was born in the 1890s. Unfortunately, after the novelty wore off, audiences were no longer prepared to pay to see the short scenes of everyday life that were the movies of the time. There was a brief sensation when Edison staged a 'train wreck' in front of his cameras—and when he introduced 'romance' with a brief scene of an actor and actress kissing. But by about 1900, music-hall proprietors and theatre managers were announcing, with great relief, that the cinema was 'dead' as a competitor with 'live' entertainment. But they were reckoning without a man called Georges Méliès . . .

## HOW was the first book made?

Books date back to the times of the ancient Egyptians, many centuries before the invention of printing. More than 4,000 years ago, the Egyptians wrote on paper made from the papyrus reed. They were written on parchment made from animal skins and, like all books until the age of printing began in the 15th century, they had to be written by hand.

## HOW do Mexican jumping beans jump?

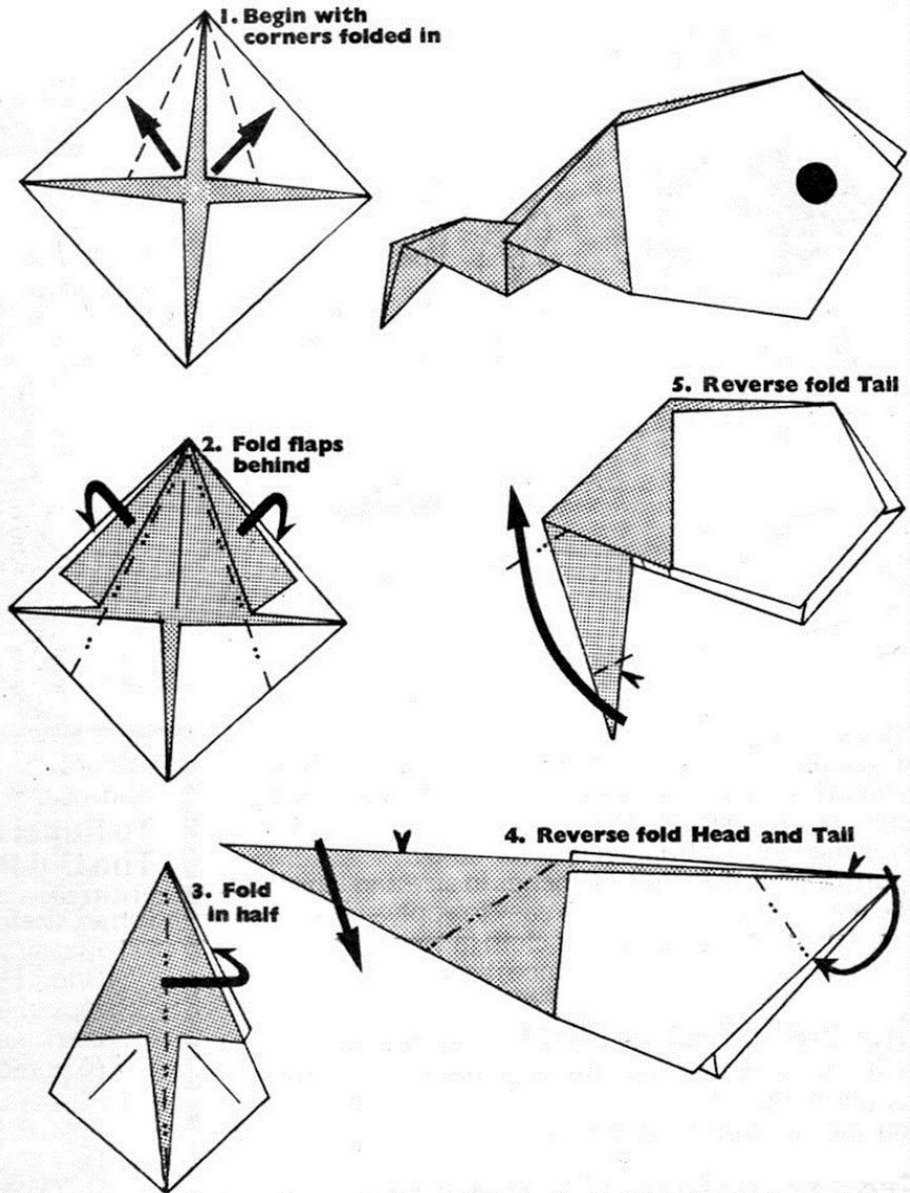

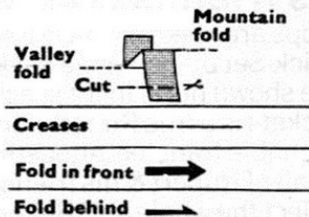

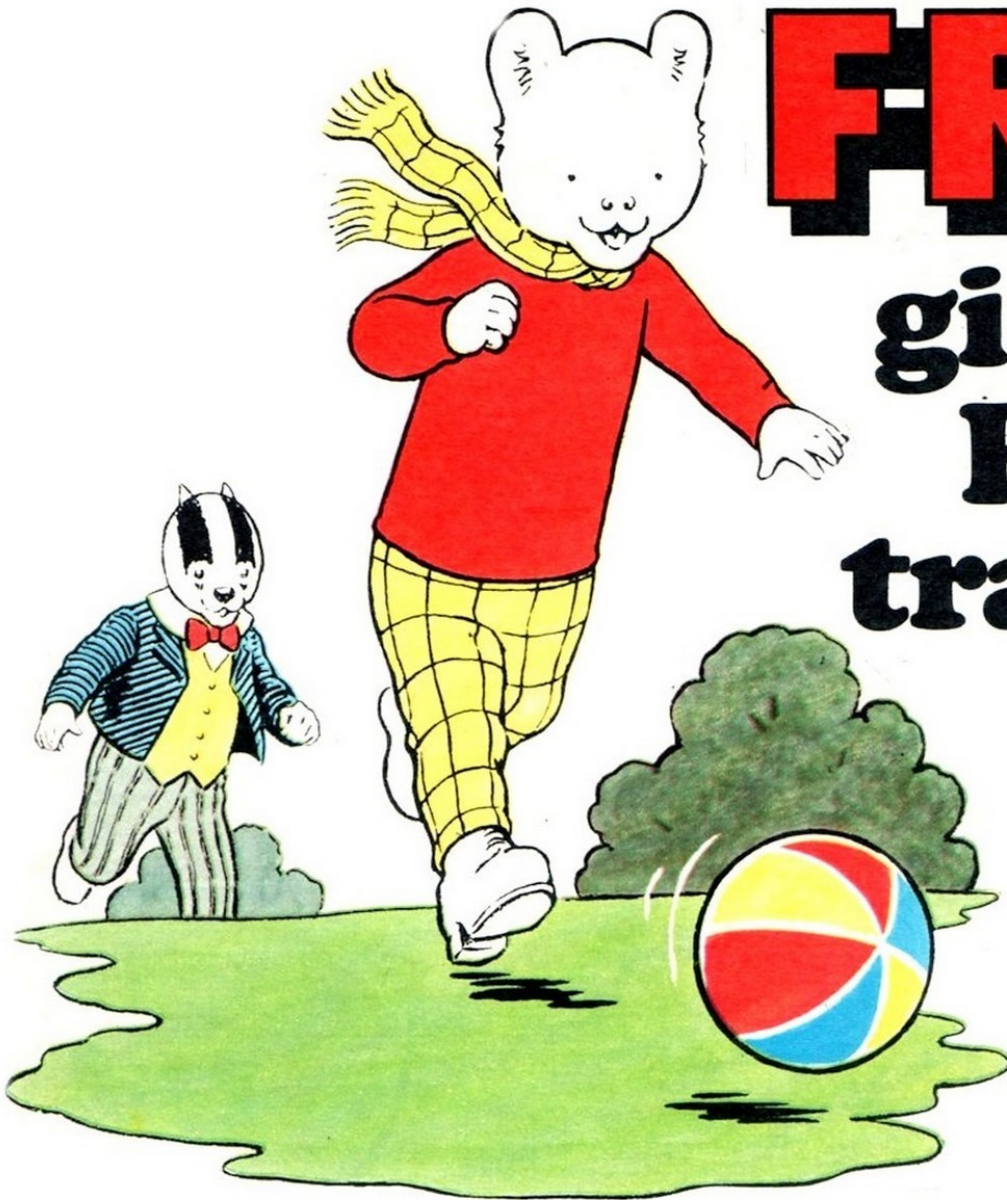
