James Brown is the first to encourage young people to take advantage of the opportunities life offers them today, because he knows what it's like to go through hard times.

Soul's 'Mister Showbusiness', now a multi-millionaire, had a tough and miserable childhood in a shack in Augusta, in America's deep South.

For years his life was a day-to-day existence which depended on the few coins tossed to him by soldiers at the local camp and shining shoes whenever he could.

In 1956 Brown formed a trio and went to King Records—and was an immediate hit.

His many singles and LP's on Polydor Records are now a legend in their own time, but for me the wonderful thing about James Brown is that his early years haven't left him bitter.

He has founded homes for poor children, donated large sums to charity, and says everywhere he goes that people, young or old, should use moderation and understanding in attaining their ambitions.

Incredibly, he owns the Augusta Radio Station, outside which he once shined shoes, and his personal possessions include two jet planes and six cars!

But still there is no sign of a let up in the life he leads. From the hysteria of his fans to the gratitude of those he helps, James Brown says: "For as long as I live, I want to do things for people." What a great ideal, and one we should all think about now and again.

HOW and when did trotting races start?
Yvonne Smith, Uttoxeter, Staffs.

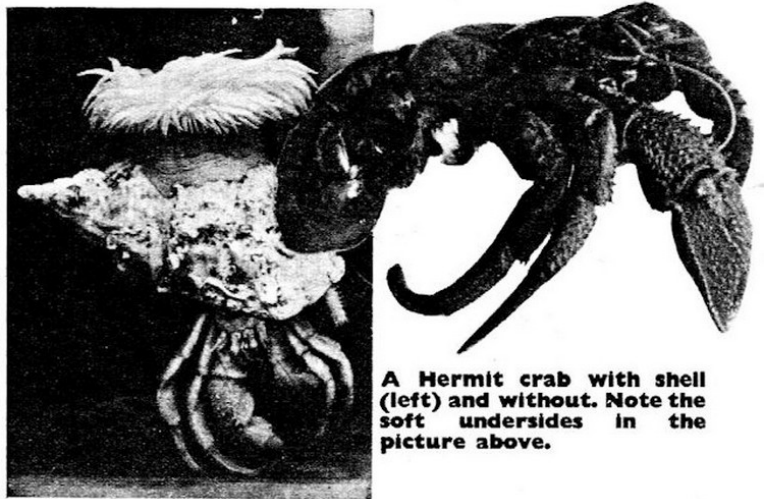
Unlike modern horse-racing, which began in Britain, trotting-horse racing—which is part of light-harness racing—began in America. The sport goes back to the 17th century, not so long after the first English settlers arrived. But it really got under way in the 19th century. In 1825, the New York Trotting Club built a special track and drew up rules to govern trotting and pacing races. Today, this very elegant sport is as popular as ever in the U.S.A. and is also enjoyed in Europe, Australia, New Zealand and elsewhere, especially in Canada.

We must make the difference between trotting and pacing clear, though. Both are part of light-harness racing and both look alike at first glance. The trotter steps high and its left front foot goes forward at the same time as its right back foot—and vice versa! The pacer does not have quite such a proud gait. Its right front and right back legs go forward together, so it sways as it goes along! As for the riders, they sit on a contraption called a sulky.



HOW did the Hermit Crab get its name?

As you know, Deborah, hermits are people who choose to lead a lonely life on their own, often miles from anyone else. Hermit Crabs are rather the same! Incidentally, these crabs have soft undersides, so they search for the empty shells of other sea creatures and make their homes in them for safety.

HOW did tennis originate?

Lawn tennis, called tennis by nearly everyone, stems from a game played in indoor walled and roofed courts, which is called Real Tennis. This ancient game, which Henry VIII enjoyed, is still played by some enthusiasts. Lawn tennis was invented in 1873 by a Major Walter Wingfield. He simplified the old game and, instead of an expensive indoor court, turned it into a sport which simply needed a net and a decent surface of grass. Though, as you know, Catrin, it is now often played on hard surfaces as well. The first Wimbledon Championships were held in 1877.

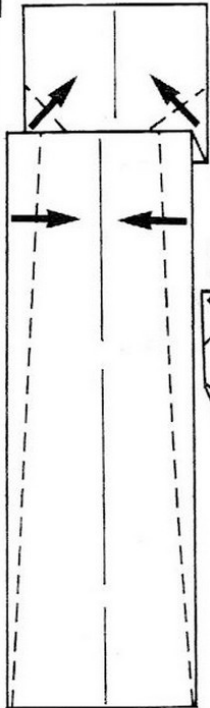

1. Crease middle line, make crimp

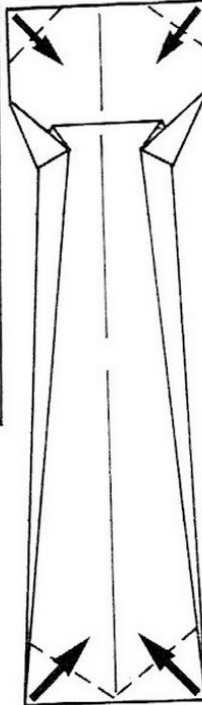


4 x 1 rectangle

3. Fold 4 corners



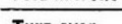

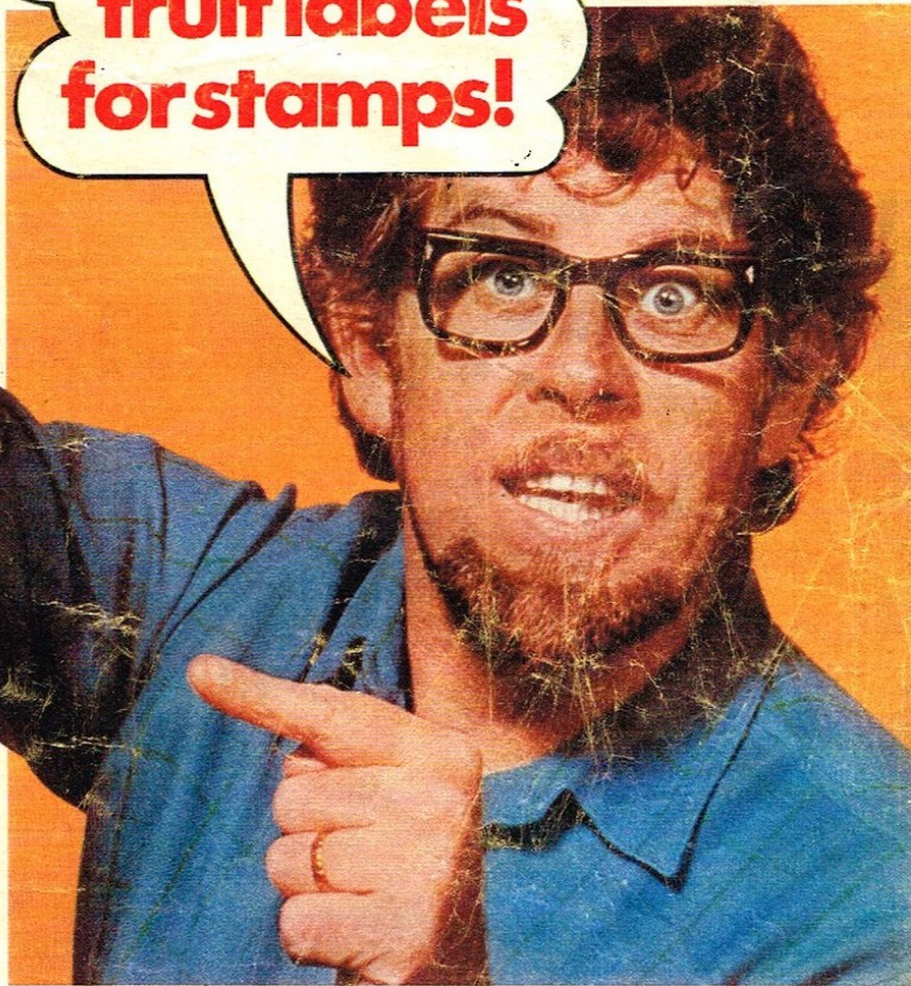
