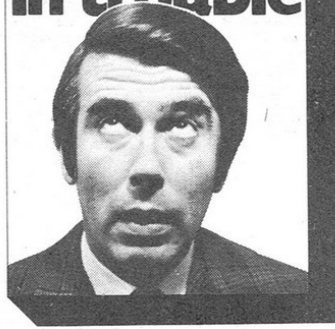

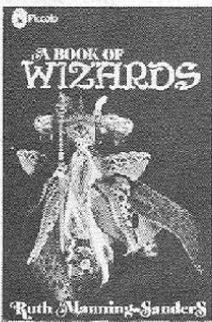
STEW POT'S LOOK-OUT

"Here I am again at the entrance to the 'Lion Reserve' just before the tour."



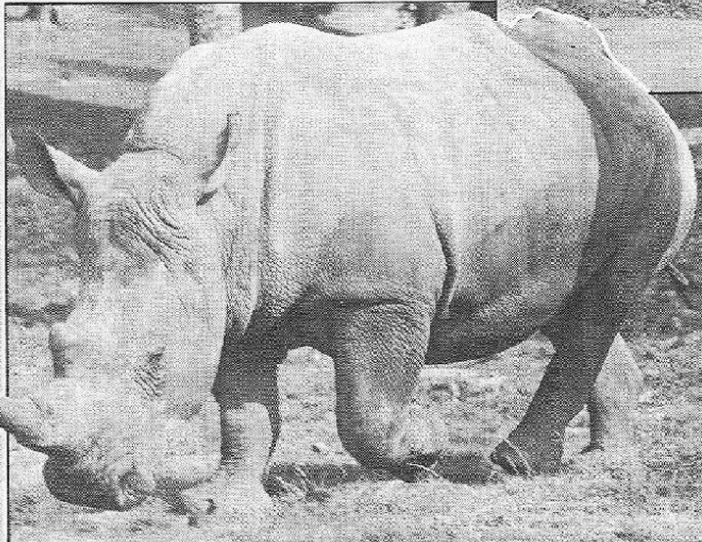
Marquess of Bath. I must admit, I was a little frightened at the prospect of meeting the Marquess. But he soon put me at my ease.

"It was wonderful seeing the giraffes wandering about and people able to get so close to them."

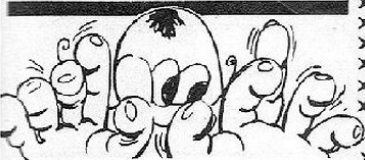


Young Cooks' Club



Welcome to the Young Cooks' Club once again. Kathie Webber, TVTimes Cookery Editor speaking. Regular readers of this page will know that I have been featuring vegetables, and the various ways to prepare and cook them. Now I offer you a recipe in which you can put some of what I have been talking about into use.

Old Chef Cat comes up with the last essential ingredient of food and this week Ferdie Fingers introduces some freshwater fish for you to learn about.

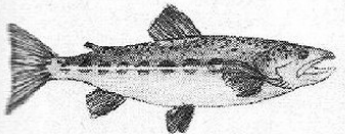


FRESHWATER FISH

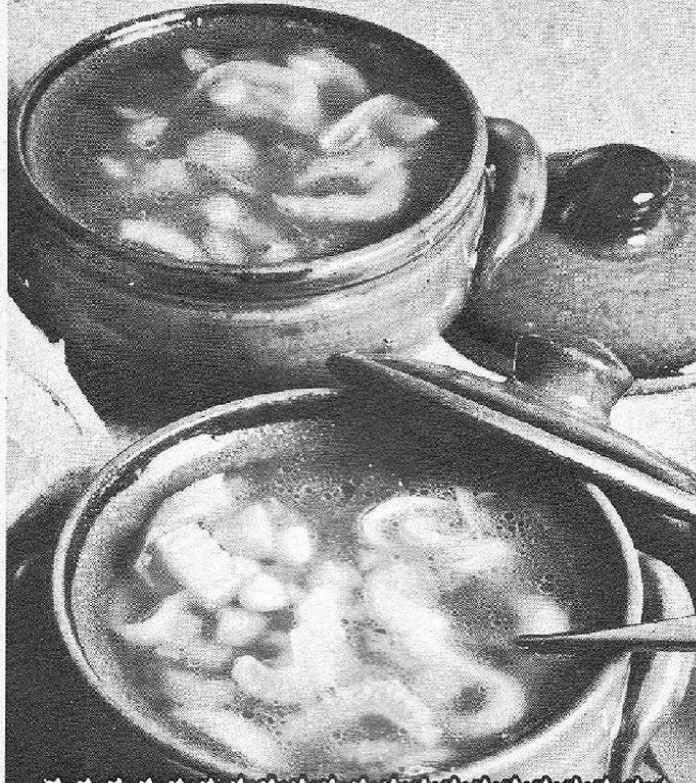
People are saying that I'm getting more like a fish finger every day. Anyway, I now have much pleasure in introducing you to two freshwater fish that are among my favourites.



SALMON Has an oily, red and well flavoured flesh and is very expensive. Best English salmon is available during June and July, but chilled salmon which is not so good, is available all year round. Poach, steam, grill or shallow-fry.



TROUT Two kinds, brown river and rainbow trout, the latter being the most popular and available all the year round. Fairly expensive. Has a delicate flavour and white flesh. Bake, grill, poach or shallow-fry.



Simple Vegetable Soup

You will need:

- 1 large onion
- 1 large carrot
- 2 sticks of celery
- 1 oz. butter
- 1 beef stock cube

- 1 pint of boiling water
- 4 oz. bag of frozen sweet-corn kernels
- 2 level teaspoons tomato purée
- Salt and pepper
- 2 level teaspoons cornflour

Skin and roughly chop the onion. Peel the carrot and cut off the top and root. Roughly chop the carrot. Scrub the celery and cut off the root and leafy top. Cut celery into 1/2 inch slices. Melt the butter in a large saucepan and fry the vegetables very gently for 5 minutes until soft and golden brown.

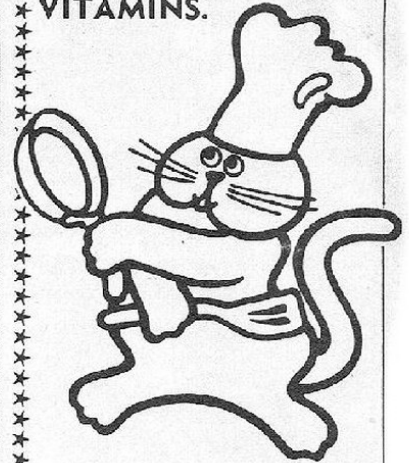
Dissolve the stock cube in the boiling water and add it to the pan. Bring the soup to the boil, then simmer it gently for 20 minutes. Add the sweetcorn kernels and the tomato purée. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Blend the cornflour with a little cold water to make a creamy liquid. Spoon a little of the hot soup into the cornflour, mix well and pour it all into the soup. Bring to the boil stirring all the time, then reduce the heat and simmer gently for 5 minutes. Serve the soup in hot bowls with French bread and butter. Makes enough for four people. ■

Staying with vegetables for a little while, have a look at the three rather exotic varieties below. They are all delicious, if a little unusual.



1. ASPARAGUS. Trim off woody ends and scrape the white part. Be careful the tips break easily. Boil for 30 minutes or until tender, with the heads above the water. Serve with butter.
2. AUBERGINES. Trim off stem and leaves at top. Wash but do not peel. Cut into 1 inch cubes. Heat some oil and stew. They may take from 5-20 minutes depending on how ripe they were when they were picked.
3. GLOBE ARTICHOKEs. Wash well in running water. Trim off stem at bottom and tops of leaves. Cook in boiling, salted water, steam downwards so top steams for 45 minutes to 1 hour. Serve hot with butter or cold with vinaigrette dressing allowing one globe artichoke per person as a first course.

Our feline friend Chef Cat presents the last essential ingredient of food, namely VITAMINS.



There are different vitamins and some foods have more of one kind than another.



The main vitamins are:
1 VITAMIN A Found in butter, margarine, cheese, kidneys, herrings, carrots.

2 VITAMIN B Found in pork and beef, bread, flour, cereals, liver, eggs and cheese.

3 VITAMIN C Found in blackcurrants, raw green vegetables, cabbage, oranges, lemons and grapefruit.

4 VITAMIN D Found in herrings, salmon, margarine, sardines and dairy produce.

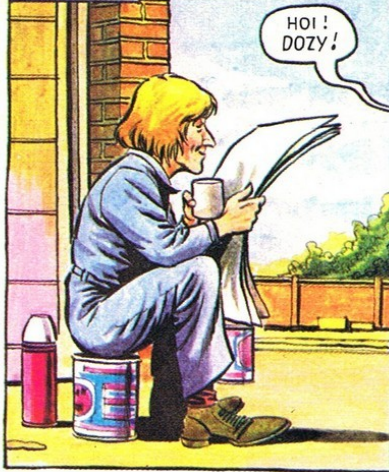

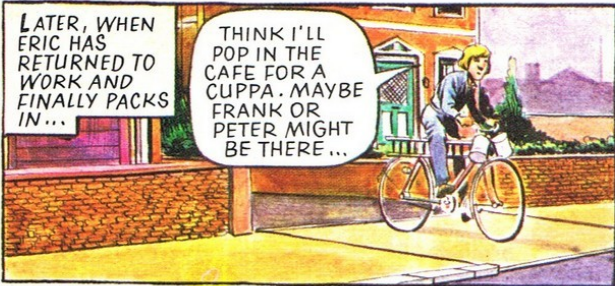

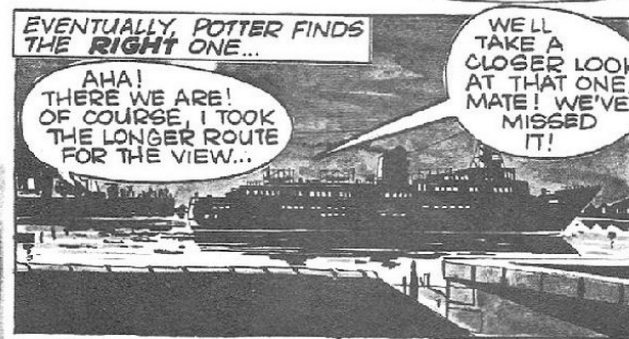

HOW

HOW can you count the number of people watching a TV programme?

Janette Hill, Renfrew, Scotland.

Well, Janette, ITV uses an interesting method. Of course, you cannot check the entire country any more than opinion polls can, so various 'panels' are chosen in each area. In London 350 households are used, which represent 990 individual viewers. Over the whole country 2,650 households are used. Each home has an electronic device called a SET meter which has a tape in it recording how long the set is on. The housewife sends the tape in each Monday together with a diary she has kept stating who has watched what the previous week. At headquarters, computers get to work to examine the information, and the result is that the firm running the service can say with some certainty—for a careful cross-section of the community is chosen—just how many millions watch each programme that goes out.

HOW did the tank get its name?

Jonathan Cheyne, Kenton, Newcastle upon Tyne.

Tanks were invented by the British in the First World War, and they were given their unusual name so that the Germans would not be able to find out what they were if they intercepted a telegram or letter about them. The word tank could have meant anything! They first went into action in September 1916, and if only the generals had not been so suspicious of such new-fangled machines and allowed them to be used properly, they might have shortened the war.

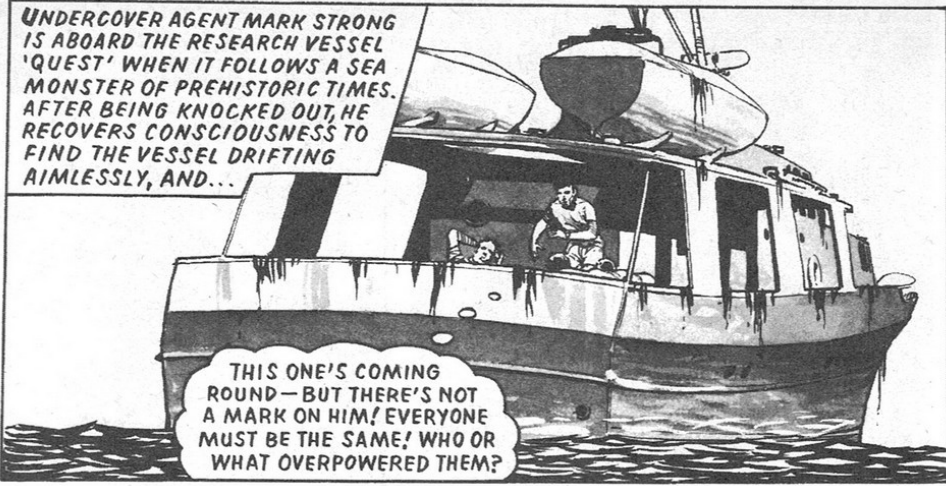

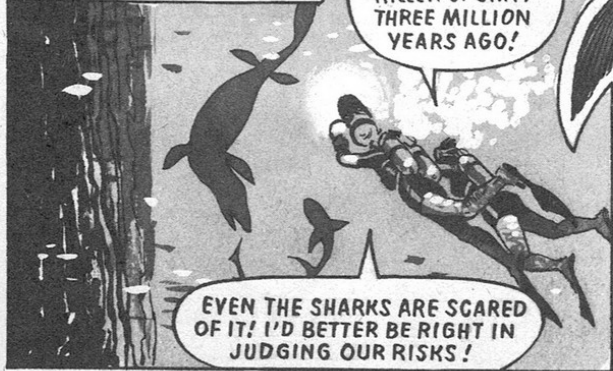

The Way to the Top

It was a hard life, at first. Steve McQueen's long road began in Slater, Missouri, on March 24, 1930 as the son of a hard-up farming family. Young Steve made his first getaway at the age of seventeen, when he enlisted in the Marine Corps. Then it was back to tramping the sidewalks in search of work, with spells as a merchant seaman, lumberjack and fairground barker.

In 1952, McQueen was servicing TV sets and laying bathroom tiles in New York, when a friend suggested he should try acting. He tried — and landed a one-line part at forty dollars a week. But when McQueen does anything, he does it well: after a year or so taking any part that he was offered to gain experience he was one of only five actors out of 2,000 hopefuls accepted for training at Actors' Studio, where great stars like Marlon Brando and Marilyn Monroe studied their craft.

McQUEEN reached Hollywood in 1958, and was very soon being seen country-wide as the gun-slinging hero of a western series 'Wanted — Dead or Alive', on television. Then two minor appearances, in 'Never Love A Stranger' and a 'horror' film called 'The Blob' in 1958, led to a part with Frank Sinatra in 'Never So Few' (1959). The six-foot-tall actor with blue eyes and quiet Mid-West drawl had his foot on the ladder to superstardom.

In 1960, world-wide audiences recognized the star quality of the

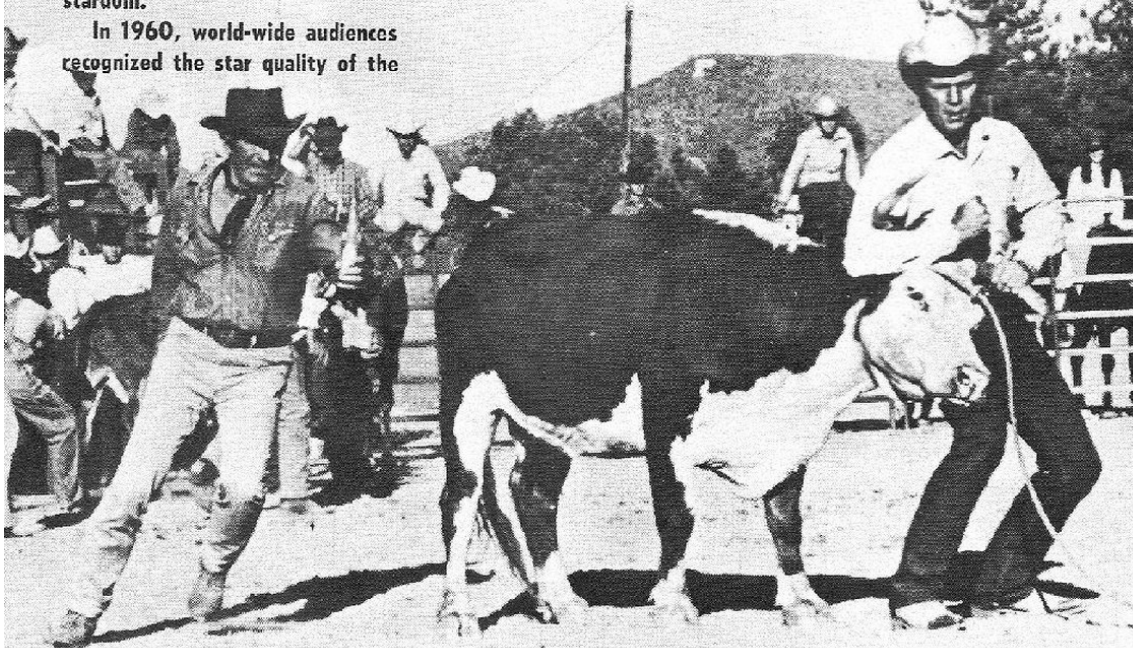
smiling gun-man who joined Yul Brynner in the opening 'funeral' scenes of 'The Magnificent Seven' with the words: "Ain't never rode shot-gun on a hearse before!" In 1963, McQueen put his love for speed to good use in the motorcycle stunts of 'The Great Escape'. He was a gambler in 'The Cincinnati Kid' (1965), a hard-fighting sailor in 'The Sand Pebbles' (1966), and a tough San Francisco cop in 'Bullitt' (1968).

The Way He Wants It

McQueen has already put his money and know-how behind documentary films on motorcycle and car racing. And maybe we'll be seeing feature films from his own studio soon: it is reported that he has set up a production company in partnership with his friends Paul Newman, Sidney Poitier and Barbra Streisand.

What kind of films will they be? Well, McQueen is on record as saying that he hates horses, westerns and playing love scenes—so it could be that Junior Bonner (1972), in which he plays a rodeo rider, will be the last time we'll see him in 'western' gear.

But whatever he chooses to do, millions of fans all over the world will be right in there cheering for him. Not that that will make much difference to McQueen: he does his own thing—and if all those millions were jeering instead of cheering, he'd go right on doing it!

Taking Knocks

More than most actors, McQueen is identified with the kind of parts he plays: rough, tough, slow-speaking, fast-acting. His private life does tend to be that way. He races cars and motorcycles regularly, walking away from spills as if he had a charmed life. All the same, his nose is broken in three places and he is deaf in one ear from the batterings he has

taken. He admits: "I guess I've broken every bone in my body—except my skull." For the racing sequences in the film 'Le Mans' (1970) he hired the Le Mans circuit and held his own private Grand Prix every day, battling it out with the world's top drivers at speeds of over 200 miles an hour.

Roaring crowds and engines provide the background to 'Le Mans' in which Steve takes to the track.
