

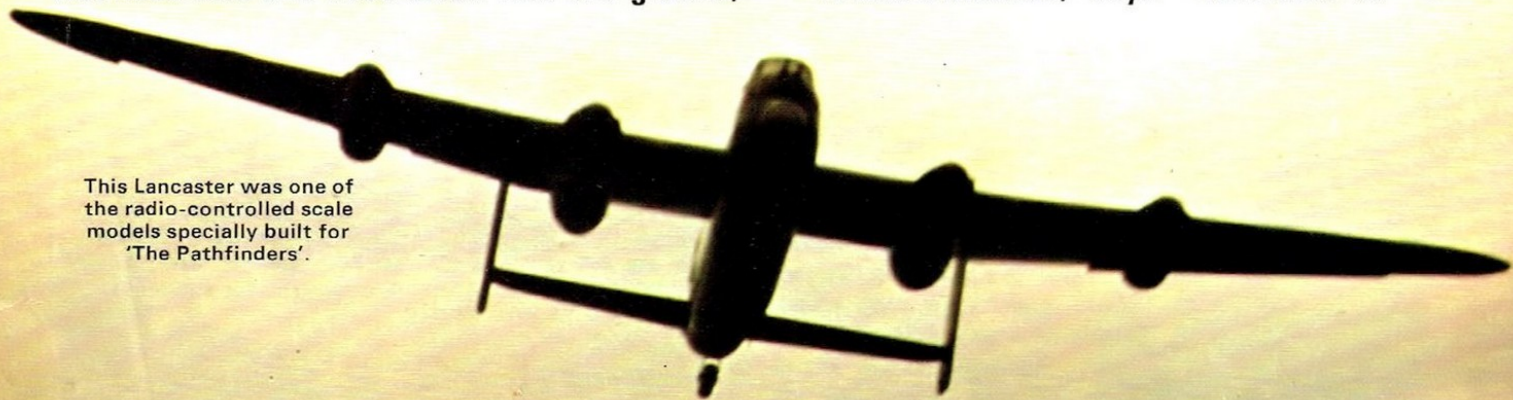
**W**ith all four engines roaring as they built up to take-off speed, the Lancaster bomber thundered down the runway at R.A.F. West Malling, a Kentish airfield. Moments later it was airborne, ready to set off on its mission. And then—disaster!

As the bomber plunged from the sky like a wounded bird and nose-dived into the ground,

men ran from all over the airfield to the scene of the crash. But ambulances for the injured weren't necessary: the Lancaster was one of the radio-controlled scale models specially built for the flying sequences of 'The Pathfinders', the thrilling TV series that tells the story of the crack R.A.F. fliers of World War II.

→ producer Gerry Brown of the crash, "The models cost more than £2,000 each. They have a wing-span of twelve feet and can fly up to 1,000 feet at eighty five miles an hour." What caused the crash? "Probably a very powerful radio transmitter about four miles away; it was blacking out the radio frequencies which control our models. It succeeded in doing what Goering (the wartime leader of the German airforce) could never do—grounding the Pathfinders!"

But now 'The Pathfinders' are flying high every week, as the series re-creates the real-life adventures of the crews who flew ahead of the main bomber fleets to mark the targets by dropping coloured flares. Before Pathfinder Force took on this job in the summer of 1942, bombers often went astray when trying to locate targets on pitch-black nights—with the only light coming from enemy searchlights and the muzzles of German anti-aircraft guns.

'The Pathfinders' represents the fulfilment of a dream for


Gerry Brown. Gerry's father was a wartime R.A.F.-type, and his son has vivid memories of crawling under a barbed-wire fence surrounding his dad's airfield to watch the bomb-laden Lancasters taking off for their targets in Germany. Gerry's ambition to tell the story of these heroic flyers led him to work as a technician on the famous 'Dam Busters' movie—and then, after years of research, planning and hard work—along with his partner Christopher Davis—to the creation of 'The Pathfinders'.



The keynote of the series is authenticity: telling the story as it really was. It's chief technical adviser, Group Captain 'Hamish' Mahaddie, was himself a leading member of Pathfinder Force, and many of the scripts are based on the memories of the men who flew Lancasters through shell-torn skies, night after night, to blaze the path to victory.

Watch out for 'The Pathfinders' picture strip starting soon in LOOK-IN.

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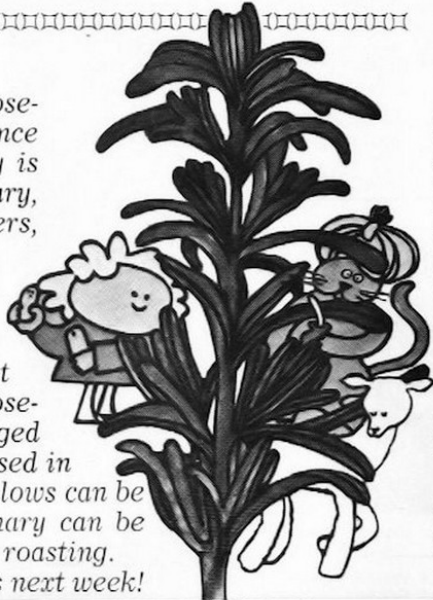

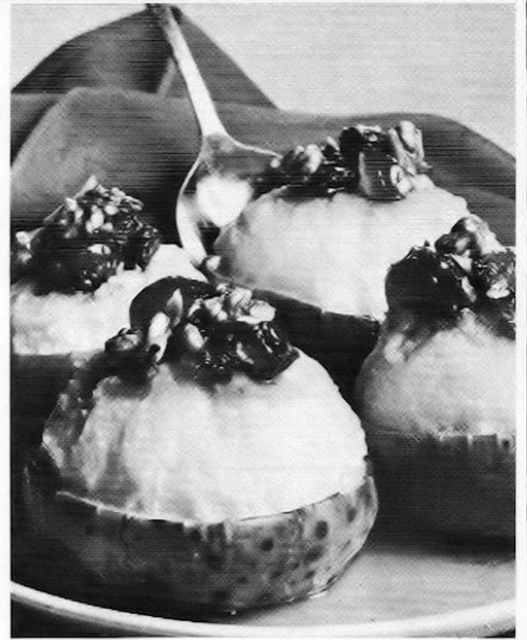
## Rosemary

The flower of the rosemary plant was said once to be white. The story is that the Virgin Mary, fleeing Herod's soldiers, with the baby Jesus in her arms, slung her sky-blue cloak on a rosemary bush as she passed. From that day the colour of the rosemary flowers was changed to blue. Rosemary is used in some cosmetics and pillows can be stuffed with it. Rosemary can be added to lamb before roasting. ## Baked Apples

4 large cooking apples  
8 glacé cherries  
4 walnut halves  
2oz. sultanas  
2 level table-spoons honey



Turn on the oven and set the Regulo to Mark 4. Wash the apples but leave on the skins. Make a cut just through the equator of the apple. Remove the cores using a corer so that there is a hole right through the centre of each apple.

Stand the apples in a baking tin. Chop the cherries and walnut halves and mix them with the sultanas and honey. Push this mixture into the centre holes piling it over the top.

Pour 4 tablespoons of water round the apples and bake them in the centre of the oven for about 1 hour or until the apples are really soft. Remove the top half of the skin to serve and pour some of the honey liquid over each one.



This week we present a double dose of our series on soccer through the alphabet with the letters 'R' and 'S'—and these stand for Sir Alf RAMSEY, boss-man of England's international team, and SOUTHAMPTON, the club with which Sir Alf began his career.

ALFRED ERNEST RAMSEY born in Dagenham Essex, in 1920, became a professional with Southampton in 1946. He won the first of his thirty-two caps as England's right-back in 1948, and in 1949 joined Tottenham Hotspur. But Ramsey's greatest triumphs have come since his retirement as a player in 1955. He became manager of Ipswich, steering them from the Third Division to the First Division Championship in 1962. Also in 1962, he became England's Team Manager. One year later, he received a knighthood.

SOUTHAMPTON haven't always found life easy in the First Division, since they last won promotion in 1966. Their biggest achievements date from way back: F.A. Cup finalists in 1889-90 and 1901-02, and semi-finalists four times, the latest in 1926-27. The club was founded in 1885 as Southampton St. Mary (hence their nickname — 'The Saints'), and moved to their present ground, The Dell, in 1898. Manager Ted Bates — appointed in 1955 and now the longest-serving manager in the Football League — must be hoping that the men in the red-and-white striped shirts and socks and black shorts will be among the honours this season.

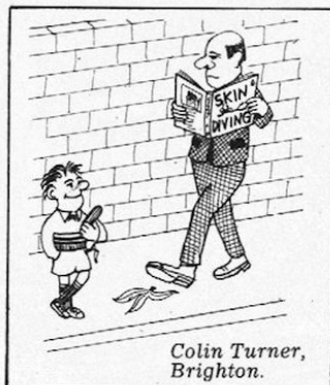

# THE FACE OF

OF THE TIME Rod started playing the guitar, he says: "I just picked it up and there I was." It was at an early age but he can't recall exactly when.

Born Roderick David Stewart on January 10th., 1945, he hails from London of parents of Scottish descent.

It was around the time of his high school days that Rod also learned the harmonica

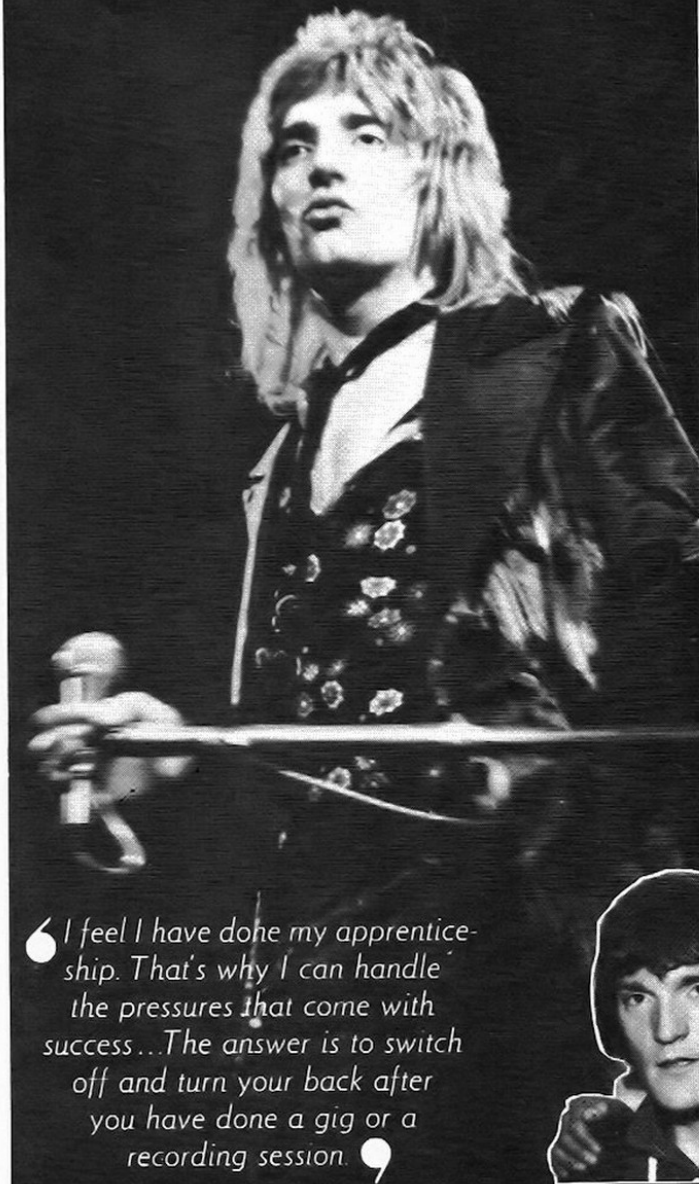


Early in his career Rod teamed up with Long John Baldry (above).

"It wasn't bad sleeping on the beaches," Rod recalls.

His first real show-biz job was singing with a group called Jimmy Powell and the Five Dimensions, at an English club. Another group also appeared there in those days — the Rolling Stones! And Stewart would come on stage during the Stones' 'breaks'.

Then Rod teamed up with John Baldry's Steam Packet which was to produce not only Baldry as a well-known performer but also Julie Driscoll. Rod eventually moved on to the Jeff Beck group after a stint with Brian Auger and the Trinity. From there he emerged in his own right with his group, the Faces.

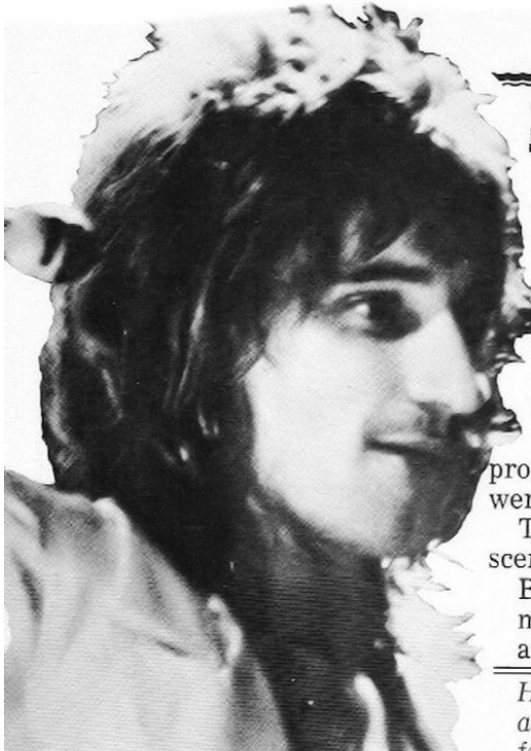

## Not such old 'Chestnuts'

Autumn is the time for 'conkers'; Jack Hargreaves, though, would like to remind you that if you go out collecting suitable specimens for boring (a heated meat-skewer is best for the job) and threading, you should be careful not to damage the horse-chestnut tree which bears them. Ask for the help of a grown-up with a ladder; don't tear down branches or shy half-bricks into the tree.

Unlike the sweet-chestnut, or Spanish chestnut, which was introduced into Britain by the Romans (they must have liked nuts, for they introduced the walnut, too), the horse-chestnut is a comparative newcomer among British trees. It was introduced from central Europe in the sixteenth century: probably for its ornamental qualities, as its timber isn't of

much value. It is certainly a handsome tree in May and June, when its flowers (red or white, and the best conkers are said to come from white-flowering trees) are in blossom.

There are two explanations as to why it is called the 'horse'-chestnut. One is that Balkan peasants used to make a medicine for their horses from its nuts. The other, which you can test for yourself, is that if a stalk is pulled from a leaf, the end of the stalk bears the impression of a tiny horse's hoof, complete with shoe and nail marks. And the name 'conker' comes, because of its shape, it is thought, from the French word *conque*, a shell.

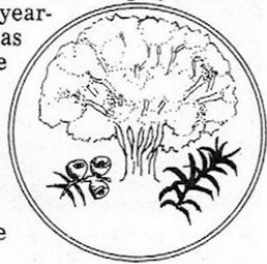
The horse-chestnut, like most fast-growing trees, doesn't live to a great age — unlike those aristocrats among British trees, the oak and the yew. Both



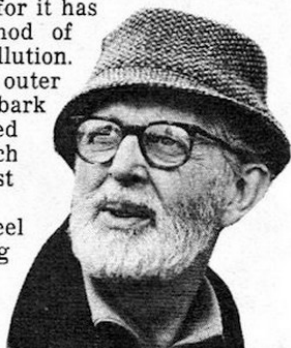
The oak, with inset leaf design and acorn 'fruit'.

these trees have played an important part in British history: the wooden warships with which 'Britannia ruled the waves' were built largely of oak (two-hundred-year-old timber was reckoned the best), and the long-bows with which English archers routed the French at Crecy and Agincourt were made of yew wood.

If you live in a town, then the tree you're most likely to be familiar with is another 'foreigner': the London Plane. This tree, artificially produced by grafting the Oriental and American planes, is never found in the wild state. But it is ideally suited for life in cities, for it has its own method of resisting pollution. When the outer layers of its bark become clogged with dirt, which would kill most other trees, they simply peel away, exposing new bark beneath.

## XX: The Coming of Colour

Although the 'talking film' revolution happened very quickly, another extremely important development in film-making took much longer to come about—the use of colour. Some very early colour movies were made with the use of hand-coloured stencils, rather like those used in producing animated cartoons today. Additionally a number of movies from the 1920s included colour sequences. But the first feature film to be made entirely in colour did not appear until 1935. It was called BECKY SHARP, and was based on the famous novel 'Vanity Fair'.

Earlier colour techniques involved the use of two or more negatives of the same film. Each negative was given a single colour, so that when they were projected superimposed on each other a multi-coloured effect was produced. The 'monopack process', by which colour film can be produced with a single negative, was introduced by Technicolor in 1942. (Incidentally, although

we tend to speak of any colour film as being in 'Technicolor', this is the name given to only one of several colour processes.)
