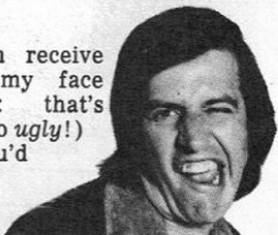
Let's face it

by the Wars of the Roses, a time when hatreds ran high and human lives were cheap.

At the heart of the mystery is young Richard Shelton, whose father has died in mysterious circumstances. Richard is under the 'protection' of Sir Daniel Brackley—but Sir Daniel himself, a blustering bully, comes under suspicion of causing Richard's father's death. Is Sir Daniel planning to get his hands on Richard's lands? And what part does lovely Joanna Sedley play in his villainous schemes?

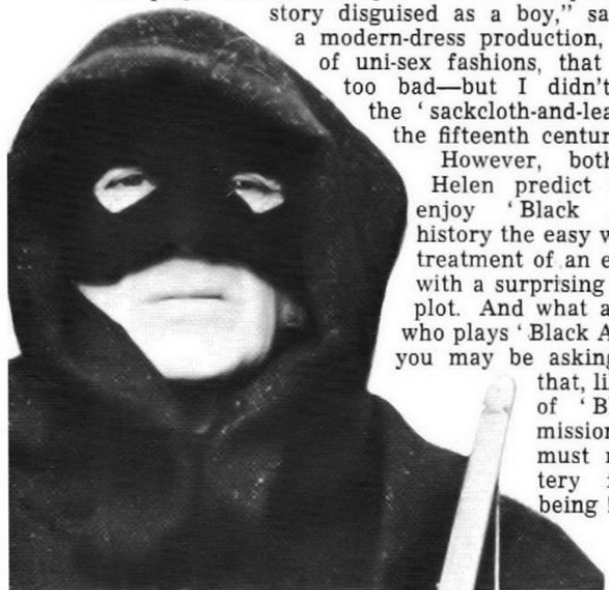
Nineteen-year-old Robin Langford, who plays Richard Shelton, as his first major television role, has something to say about the challenge of playing an 'historical' part. "It's very important to 'think' yourself into the character. You must get used to wearing the costume, which is often uncomfortable, and you must realize that the kind of person you are playing would have worn these clothes *all* the time. And since there were no laundrettes—and precious few bathrooms—in fifteenth-century England—he'd probably have been pretty dirty and smelly! But you must have some idea of what it was really like to be one of those people."

Peppermint rider

Robin found there were other problems. "I had to carry a crossbow everywhere with me—people got rather tired of tripping over it—and I had to spend a lot of time on horseback. Luckily, I found that my horse, a mare called Maria, loved peppermints. By carrying a packet with me all the time, I managed to keep her happy—but when I tried her with fruit-drops, she did her best to throw me off!"

There was a 'costume' problem, too, for Helen Stronge, who plays Joanna Sedley. "I have to spend part of the story disguised as a boy," says Helen. "In a modern-dress production, in these days of uni-sex fashions, that might not be too bad—but I didn't much enjoy the 'sackcloth-and-leather' gear of the fifteenth century!"

However, both Robin and Helen predict that you will enjoy 'Black Arrow'. It's history the easy way: a realistic treatment of an exciting period, with a surprising 'who-dunnit?' plot. And what about the actor who plays 'Black Arrow' himself, you may be asking? Sorry—but that, like the outcome of 'Black Arrow's' mission of vengeance, must remain a mystery for the time being!



This week our series of soccer through the alphabet brings us to the letter 'T' — for Tottenham Hotspur.

Founded in 1882, the club was originally called Hotspur but added the prefix Tottenham the following year.

Three seasons later, they moved to Northumberland Park, and in 1889 eventually settled at their current home ground in White Hart Lane.

Honours: Won the F.A. Cup in 1901, '21, '61, '62, and '67. **First Division League Champions:** in 1950, '51, '60, and '61. Won the European Cup in 1963 and the European Cup Winners' Cup in 1972.

First British team to win a European competition; only British club to win two major European Cups; first club to win the 'double' this century.

Colours: White shirts, navy blue shorts and white socks.

Manager: Bill Nicholson, appointed in 1958.

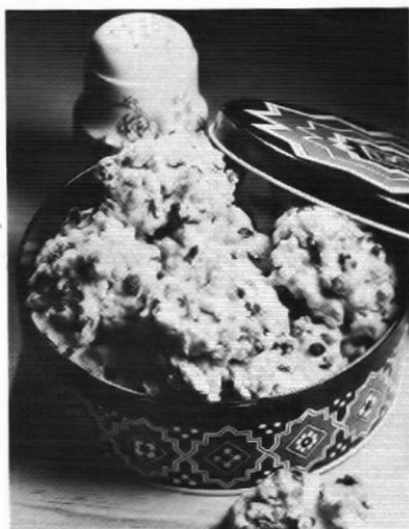

ROCK BUNS

½ lb. self raising flour
pinch of salt
4 oz. butter
pinch of mixed spice
4 oz. currants
1 oz. chopped mixed peel
4 oz. caster sugar
1 large egg
milk to mix



Turn on the oven and set the regulo at mark 7. Sift the flour and salt into a bowl, then rub in the butter until the mixture looks like bread-crumbs. Stir in the spice, currants, peel and sugar. Lightly beat the egg

and add it to the mixture with enough milk to make a very stiff dough.

Use a fork to mix the dough. Place the mixture in small, rock-like mounds on a greased baking sheet and bake in the centre of the oven for 10 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. Sprinkle the buns with a little caster sugar before serving. Makes about 12 buns.

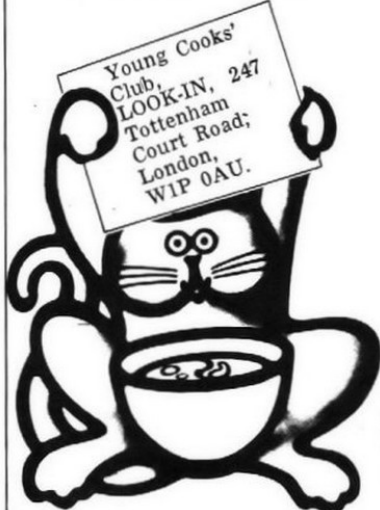

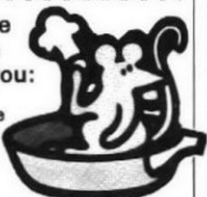

SIEVING To sieve means to remove lumps by passing the food through a fine mesh. Flour is sieved to make sure it is absolutely smooth before making a cake. Soups can also be sieved. In this case lumps have to be helped through the sieve by pushing them and rubbing them against the sieve with a wooden spoon. The resulting mixture is called puree.

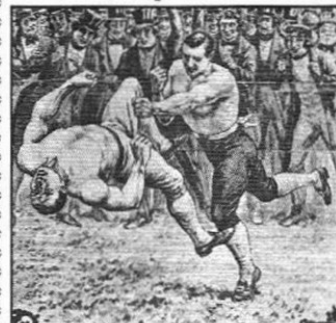
HOW

HOW long ago did boxing start, and how did it originate?

Ian Dessent, Norwich, Norfolk.

Boxing really dates from the eighteenth century, Ian, although the ancient Greeks and Romans fought with their fists for sport. In 1719, a fighter named James Figg announced that he was 'Champion', and offered to teach pupils how to fight with bare fists.

In 1743, Jack Broughton, Champion of England in 1729-50, drew up simple rules and introduced boxing 'gloves'. But gloves were not used in fights until the 1860s. Early fights were murderous affairs; one in 1825 lasted 278 rounds! A round only ended when one pugilist was knocked or thrown down—and was then given half-a-minute to recover. The rules of modern boxing date from 1867 and are called 'Queensberry Rules', after the Marquess of Queensberry, who helped to draw them up.

HOW did the dandelion get its name?

The Long Sleep

As you've probably noticed, a lot of creatures are missing from the countryside at this time of year. Many British insects, amphibia and mammals spend all or part of the winter months in hibernation—the long sleep. Among the creatures that go into full or part-hibernation are butterflies and moths, wasps, snails, frogs and toads, snakes, mice and voles, moles, hedgehogs, squirrels and bats.

Some, like the dormouse, sleep very deeply. The dormouse's metabolism

(the bodily processes that produce energy) drops to almost nothing: if you find a dormouse in its winter nest, it will probably appear to be dead—but don't hold a funeral, it'll be alive and kicking come spring! Other mammals, like squirrels and moles, will leave their winter retreats on sunny days to search for food. Insects do the same; it's not unusual to see a butterfly on a mild mid-

winter day. Bees, which don't hibernate but stay in their hives during winter, are often tempted out by a spell of sunshine—only to die if frost catches them too far from home.

Egg Thief

If you look along the dry bottoms of hedgerows, you may find a hibernating hedgehog in a deep bed of leaves (although this creature's favourite

winter-quarters is a disused rabbit-hole). Don't disturb him: he's a welcome visitor to gardens in summer, for his diet consists largely of snails, slugs and insect pests. It's true that he will take eggs when he can get them—but stories of hedgehogs sucking milk from sleeping cows are probably a bit far-fetched. The most unpleasant thing about the hedgehog is that he's generally infested with fleas: although these are not the kind that bother humans, they may be passed on to cats, dogs or birds.

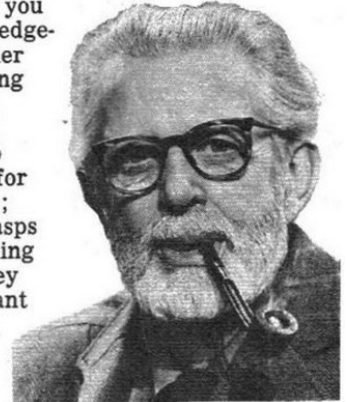
A full-grown male hedgehog may be

around ten inches long and weighs up to one-and-a-half pounds. He lives for about six years, hibernating each winter from October to April. Two country names for him are 'hedge-pig', because of his pig-like snout and grunting, snuffing voice, and 'urchin'. The second is very old: it comes from the Middle English (English written in this country between the twelfth and fifteenth centuries) word *herichon*, a hedgehog.

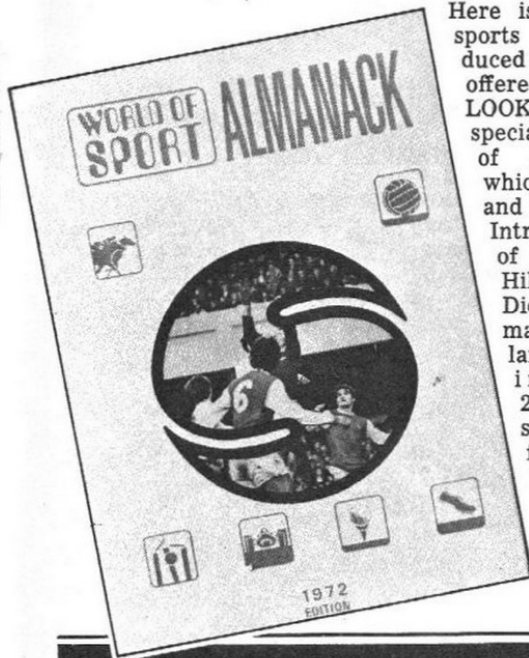
Do Not Disturb

We all know how the hedgehog protects himself by raising his prickles and then rolling into a spiky ball. This doesn't do him much good against his worst enemy, the badger, whose paws and jaws make short work of such an obstacle. However, it's a good defence against weaker hunters, although it's said that foxes have been known to make hedgehogs uncurl by rolling them into water. The hedgehog hates water, although strangely enough he's a good swimmer (and a good climber, too).

Remember, if you come across a hedgehog—or any other creature—taking its winter sleep, don't disturb it. It is tempting to break this rule for the queen wasp; but although wasps are the worst thing at a picnic, they have an important part to play in the cycle of insect life—so let 'em alone!

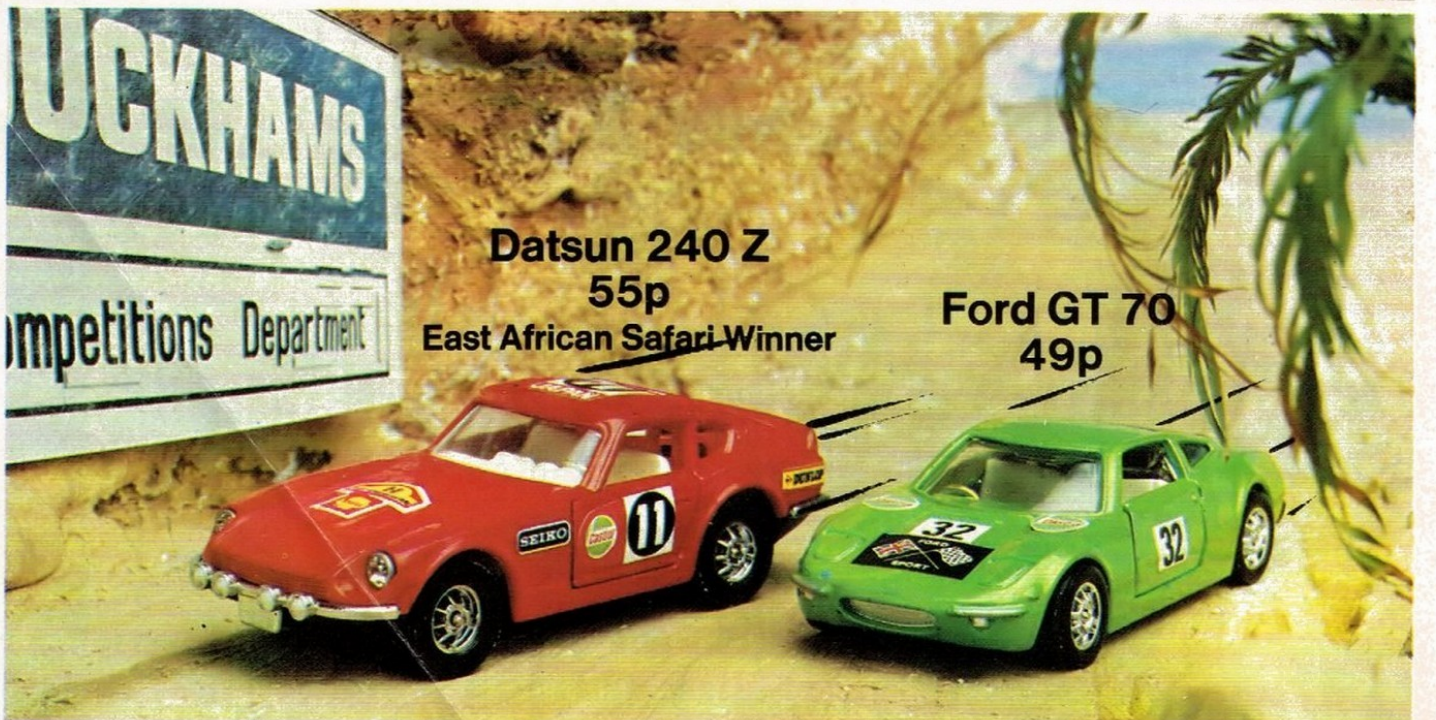


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
