LEAGUE CUP HIGHLIGHTS

This season's League Cup programme has produced some of the most exciting action in the history of the competition. So, in the week that holders Nottingham Forest try to win the trophy for the third time in succession when they meet Wolves at Wembley, let's take a look at some of the most interesting and outstanding moments that you may have forgotten . . .

Manchester United's pairing with Spurs in the second round saw England's Ray Wilkins back in London for the first time since his £900,000-plus transfer from Chelsea. It was Tottenham's Glenn Hoddle, however, who stole the show with what must be the 'goal of the season'.

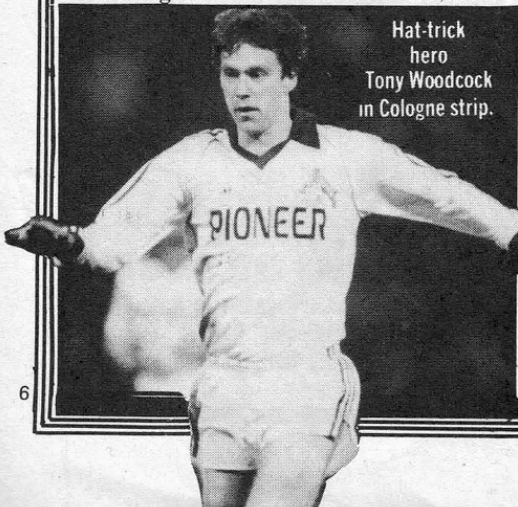

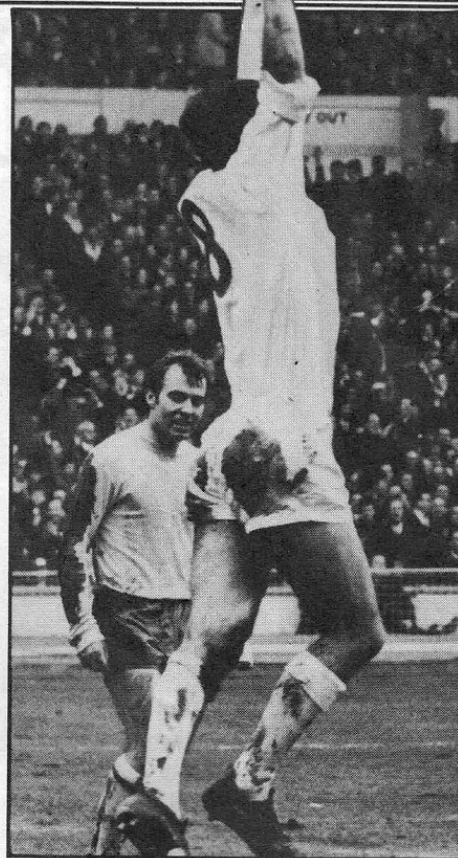
Nottingham Forest's quicksilver England striker Tony Woodcock blasted a brilliant hat-trick against Middlesbrough in the third round to see his side march into the last sixteen. Ironically it was in the next round against Bristol City at The City Ground that Tony played his last game for Forest before joining crack West German club Cologne for a fee of around £400,000.

Arsenal recorded their biggest win for many years when, with help from an Alan Sunderland hat-trick, they beat first division rivals Leeds United 7-0 at Highbury to gain a magnificent 8-1 aggregate win. The Gunners weren't the only high scorers of the round, though, for both Crystal Palace and Southampton also smashed eight goals past their rivals, Stockport County and Wrexham respectively.

After being knocked out of the tournament by Sunderland, Manchester City threatened to ask the Football League for the game to be replayed due to the ineligibility of Sunderland winger Barry Dunn.

In a repeat of the amazing 1969 League Cup Final when third division Swindon Town beat Arsenal, this year's quarter-final draw brought the two teams together again. Incredibly, Swindon came out on top again in a 4-3 victory, after extra time, to add another chapter to their great cup-fighting tradition.

Liverpool were astonished at their bad luck as they outplayed Nottingham Forest in both legs of their semi-final only to lose 2-1 on aggregate to two penalties converted by Scottish international winger John Robertson.

Back in 1967 the League Cup Final came of age in a really big way when, in front of a sell-out 100,000 crowd, Queens Park Rangers became the first third division side to play at Wembley in a Cup Final. Rangers couldn't have celebrated the occasion in a more spectacular fashion for they also became the first third division outfit to win a Cup Final.

Their opponents that day were first division West Bromwich Albion. Under the guidance of manager Alec Stock, now with Bournemouth, Rangers had developed into a fine team and in league competition had finished as third division Champions. A goal tally of 103 League goals that season proves beyond doubt that Rangers were an out-and-out attacking team. A 4-1 trouncing of Birmingham City in the semi-final at St. Andrew's further proved the point. Rangers were going to Wembley with their heads held high!

Yet thirty-six minutes into the final it certainly looked like the end for Q.P.R. Goals by Clive Clark (a former Rangers man) in the seventh and thirty-sixth minute had the London

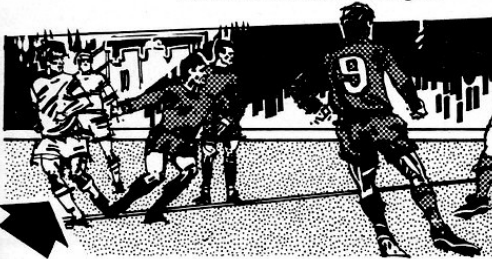
THE YEAR OF THE UNDERDOG!

side reeling. Albion went in at half-time thinking that all they had to do was play safe and the cup was theirs. Rangers had other ideas! Two goals down they had no choice but attack. Roger Morgan made it 2-1 with a neatly headed goal from a free-kick. Suddenly it was Albion who were under constant pressure. The tables were being slowly, but surely, turned. Then, twenty minutes into the second half, came an amazing solo goal from Rangers' gifted young striker Rodney Marsh. Receiving a pass from skipper Mike Keen, he dribbled across the area, before cracking the ball past 'keeper Sheppard. The crowd went mad and Albion were really on the rack. Just eight minutes from time Mark Lazarus picked up a loose ball and calmly slotted it home, completing the greatest come-back in League Cup history and securing the first-ever victory by a third division club in this competition (Swindon were to repeat the feat two years later).



The winning goal came from a mistake in the Albion defence. They just stood still as Ron Hunt went straight through them all! He hit the ball against Sheppard, colliding with him in the process. Mark Lazarus, following up, smacked the ball into the net.

This amusing funny face flan will be a great hit at tea time. You can make happy or sad faces by changing the shape of the mouth. For parties this flan recipe can be used to make small tarts so that each guest has a different funny face tart!

FUNNY FACE FLAN

(serves 6)



INGREDIENTS

175g (6oz.) plain flour

75g (3oz.) butter

30ml (6 teaspoons) water

60ml (4 tablespoons) strawberry jam

2 bananas

425g (15oz.) can ready-to-serve custard

liquorice allsorts

chocolate vermicelli

METHOD

To make the pastry, sieve the flour into a bowl, rub in the butter until mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs. Add the water and stir until the mixture together and forms a firm dough. Roll out the pastry to a 28cm (11 inch) round. Place this into a 25.5cm (10 inch) flan ring or tin and press it well into the base and sides. Trim off any extra pastry. Put a layer of greaseproof paper on the bottom, then cover with baking beans. Bake in the oven at 375 deg. F (180 deg. C) or gas mark 5 for about 15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove the beans and greaseproof paper and allow to cool. Spread the base of the flan with jam. Slice the bananas and arrange on top of the jam. Spoon the custard over the top. Make a face by arranging chocolate vermicelli for the hair and liquorice allsorts for the eyes, nose, cheeks and mouth.

WHAT'S SMURFING...?

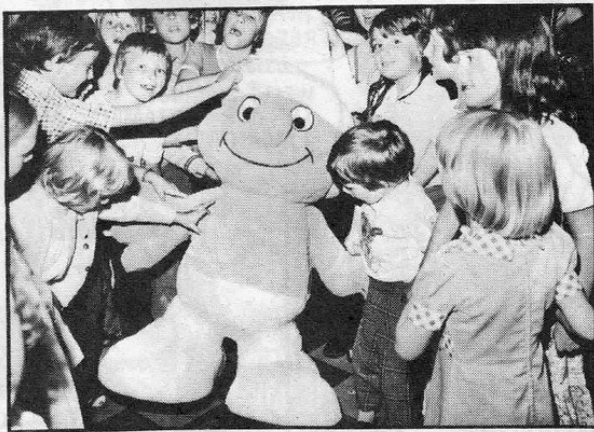

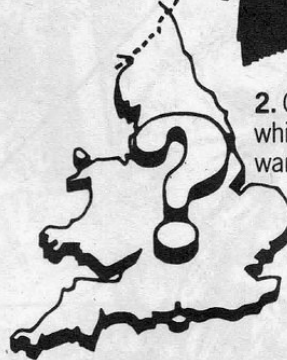

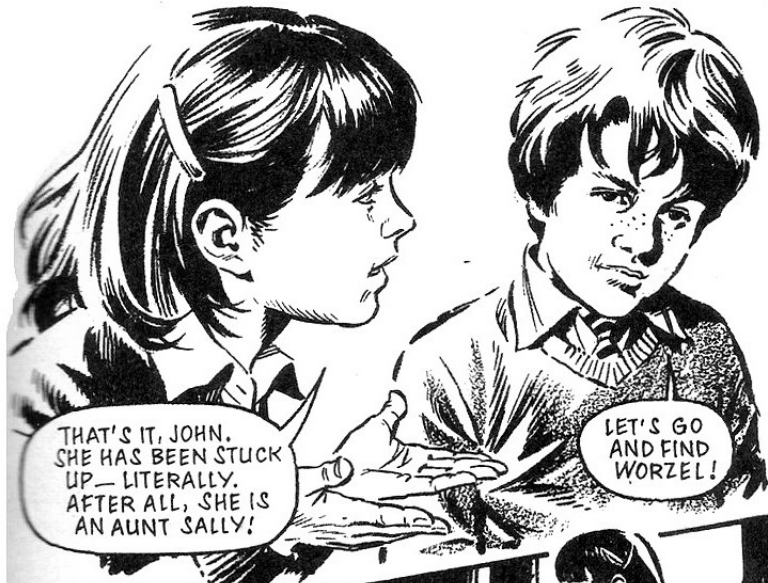

But those were the early days. Aware that Robin's blossoming popularity could spill over to big record sales, Casablanca Records signed him to a recording contract last year. The predominantly disco label (it also has Donna Summer and The Village People) hurriedly recorded his sell-out concerts at New York's Copacabana and San Francisco's The Boarding House.

The album, **Reality . . . What A Concept** (from a line in the act), shot up the U.S. charts and outsold many of the rock acts he once 'bombed' before!

But as happy as he is with this diversion from his popular TV role, Robin also has a fear about playing clubs. He dreads that familiar cry: "Do Mork!" Politely, but firmly, he refuses. "It's up to me to have other things going so they can't lock me into that one character," he says. "Three years from now I'd rather not have people approach me and say: 'Sit on your face, come on, just for the kids!'"

Robin continues: "I love getting a reaction from a live crowd. Often I can build up new material for the TV show from these gigs."

The man who gave **Mork And Mindy** the go-ahead was **Happy Days** producer Garry Marshall, who used the weird alien figure in an episode of the famous Fonz show. He noted the reaction of Americans to Mork and swung his TV hit machine into motion.

Says Marshall: "We gave Robin an idea to work with, but we had no control over what he did with it. Unfortunately, therefore, we can't really take much credit. The guy's nuts, but his craziness works brilliantly — he's a genius and the whole world loves him."

Robin's craziness as Mork is not limited to the half-baked lingo of "Nanu, Nanu" and "Shazbut", of course. He can thank his looks for at least a small part of his success. His rubbery, Mr. Punch face with that prominent aquiline nose has people falling about with laughter without Mr. Williams even muttering a word!

He talks sometimes as if he feels guilty about his success. But one aspect of it that he really enjoys is the fact that it coincides with the international acclaim earned by a friend who also made his debut as a creature from another planet.

Not too many years ago, Robin and Christopher Reeve were starstruck but struggling unknowns sharing a dismal flat in New York. Says Robin: "We shared just about everything — ups, downs, the lot. But in those days each of us could barely afford to feed ourselves, let alone buy a girl dinner."

Nowadays, of course, Robin's one-time hard-up flat-mate is better known as cinema's Superman . . .

Anyway, back to Williams' small-screen success. "I'm still in shock," he says. "One minute, you're lucky if you can make a handful of people laugh in a nightclub and the next they put you on the cover of **Time** magazine and call you a genius."

His view of **you** — the watching millions? "Traditionally, children control the channel switch at the time **Mork And Mindy** is shown and parents watch what the kids want to watch. But they're a critical audience. You can fool them for a while, but when they catch you out, you've lost them. You have to work for their loyalty."

"I like to make people laugh so hard they cry, and I can't believe there's a big difference between the American and the British sense of humour."

That would certainly seem to be the case with **Mork And Mindy**. Nanu, nanu . . .

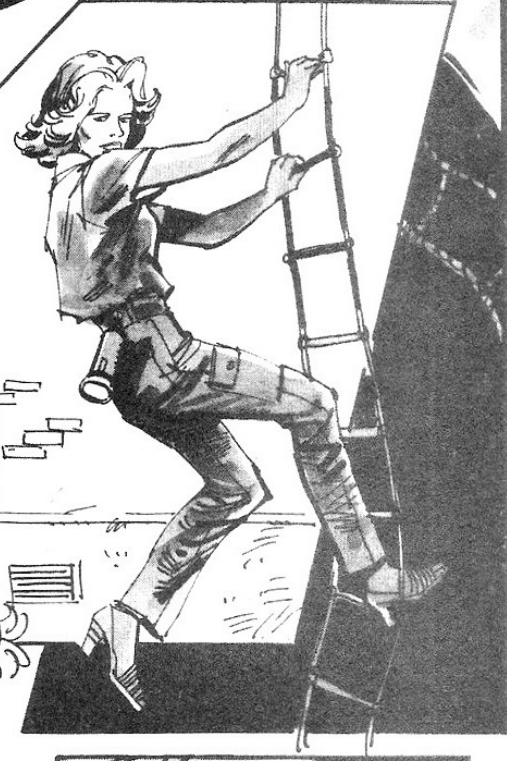

Buggles, Stars Of The Plastic Age

Buggles have hit the jackpot with their very own special brand of music. A year ago they were unknown, now after two successive hit singles Video Killed The Radio Star, and their latest, Living In The Plastic Age, they are well and truly top of the pops.

Recently Look-in's Peter Jeffries spoke to the men behind this revolutionary new sound. Trevor Horn and Geoffrey Downs.

It was roughly three years ago that Trevor and Geoff got together. They were session musicians and part-time record producers who got a bit fed up seeing other people making hit records so decided to make one of their own. But were they surprised at their instant success?

"Yes, I suppose we were," answered Geoffrey. "In a way, though, we had been knocking on the door for a couple of years previous to Video. We were quite confident that Video would become a hit, we knew it had the potential to put us on the map and it would interest people, but it is always a surprise when something good happens."

"We're very proud of Video", continued Trevor. "We wanted to make sure that it was right. It was all part of our master-plan and we were delighted that it did so well."

"We're into clean records. People who like rough records hate us, but that doesn't matter, we don't care if people think we're sterile and plastic, that's fair enough. We don't think we're sterile, but that's the impression some people get. You can only do what comes naturally, can't you?"
