



This Sunday the glamorous Grand Prix motor-racing "circus" moves to Brands Hatch for the British Grand Prix, and thousands of fans of Formula One — the highest level of motor sport in the world — will flock to Kent to witness this, the most exciting event in Britain's car-racing year.

In the past, such British heroes as Graham Hill, Jim Clark, Jackie Stewart and James Hunt have all performed heroics in front of their home fans, but this year the interest from these shores is down to a minimum, as the few British drivers competing in Formula One have no hope of winning the title.

Nevertheless, the international interest in this year's Brands Hatch epic is intense, as a whole selection of drivers are in the running for the supreme accolade. Indeed, last year's champ, South Africa's Jody Scheckter, has had a pretty disastrous 1980 season, his skilful driving being hampered by a Ferrari that has frequently let him down, with points slipping away round after round — and that's left the title wide open.

The names that have been hitting the headlines this season are those of Didier Pironi, Jacques Laffite and René Arnoux from France, Brazil's Nelson Piquet, Argentina's Carlos Reutemann, and Alan Jones from Australia, who, between them, have continually swapped places at the top of this season's championship. None of this determined sextet has ever before won the world title, and the 1980 battle has been concentrated so far over nine races, which began in the heat of Argentina last January, and have since moved across from the South American continent, up to the USA and through to Europe.

There have been numerous dramatic events in this year's championship, not the least the now-famous "flying leap" at the beginning of the Monaco Grand Prix in May, when Derek Daly's Tyrell car

his Renault Formula One car.

leaving Daly dazed but uninjured, and a handful of other cars stationary in his wake.

Not so lucky was the veteran of the Formula One scene, Clay Regazzoni of Switzerland, who was badly injured in an accident during the United States (West) Grand Prix in March, and was thus put out of competition for the rest of the season.

In fact, "Regga" was the winner of last year's British Grand Prix at Silverstone, and his popular presence will be sadly missed this

Accidents, of course, are part and parcel of the motor racing scene, and fortunately the majority of them leave drivers unscathed. A spectacular example was at the Spanish Grand Prix, when Jacques Laffite, dicing for the lead with Carlos Reutemann, lost control of his Ligier car as he attempted to overtake a tail-ender. He rebounded off the billboards at the side of the track — and careered into the Williams car of Reutemann, putting both of them out of the action and out of the points, leaving Didier Pironi to take over the lead.

This is what Formula One motor racing is all about — the fabulous speeds, the razor-sharp concentration and the split-second dramas that can change the whole course of a race.

And that's exactly what will thrill the summer crowd at Brands Hatch this Sunday!





But when he puts on his cookin' 'ead he makes such a mess in the kitchen that Aunt Sally sometimes finds it's easier to keep Worzel out of the kitchen and do the cooking herself. Aunt Sally says that this Fruit and Nut Tea Bread is one of Worzel's favourites, and she has kindly let me have the recipe.

Serve the cake sliced, on its own or with butter and jam - it's delicious.

Fruit And Rut

(serves 6-8)

50g (2oz.) dates 350g (12oz.) self raising flour 2.5ml (½ level teaspoon) salt 50g (2oz.) caster sugar 50g (2oz.) chopped walnuts 50g (2oz.) mixed chopped nuts 30ml (2 tablespoons) malt extract 50g (2oz.) butter 2 eggs, size 3 150ml (‡ pint) milk

Decoration

45ml (3 tablespoons) apricot jam

8 walnut halves

8 date halves

Grease a 1kg (2lb.) loaf tin. Stone and chop the dates. Sift the flour and salt into a bowl, stir in the sugar, nuts and dates. Place the malt extract and butter in a small saucepan and heat until melted. Blend the eggs and milk together. Pour the melted malt extract and butter into the eggs and milk. Mix together and then pour into the centre of flour mixture. Mix to a smooth, soft dough with a wooden spoon. Place the mixture in the tin. Bake in the oven at 180 deg. C. (350 deg. F.) or gas Regulo Mark 3 for 1 hour or until well risen and golden brown. Leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes, then remove from tin and cool on a cooling rack. To make the glaze, place the apricot iam and one teaspoon of water into a small saucepan. Heat slowly and stir until the iam is smooth. Remove from the heat. Place the walnut halves and dates alternatively along the top of the cake. Brush the jam over the top.

Now that Return Of The Saint is back on our TV screens for a second showing (you can see it every Saturday),*
Look-in's Terry Tatnell spoke to Simon Templar, alias Ian Ogilvy, to find out what he's been up to recently.

"I'm currently appearing in a play called Stage Struck at the Vaudeville Theatre in the West End of London," said Ian. "It's a comedy thriller, a funny murder play, written by Simon Gray, who also wrote Otherwise Engaged (another successful West End play). It's a very different role from The Saint. The character I play has been a stage manager and successful actor who now stays at home and cooks the meals. He's generally rather domesticated and quite pleased with his lot. But his wife becomes a highly successful West End star and she comes home one night and tells him that she's had enough of him - and that's when the murder plot starts."

Ian thinks that the play will possibly run until about October — does he prefer working in the theatre to filming?

"Well, when I'm in television I prefer the theatre, when I'm in the theatre I prefer the movies and when I'm in the movies I prefer something else. It's a case of 'the grass is always greener on the other side', really. In the theatre, though, you're doing the same thing every night, which can sometimes get slightly wearing.

Ian was a well-known face on our screens before Return Of The Saint came along, but

it was the role of Simon Templar that really made his a household name.

"It affected my career enormously," said Ian. "For a start I've got my name in lights in the West End — that never happened before. And I get recognised when I'm out and asked for autographs. I don't mind that, but it gets a little difficult at times. It restricts my private life in that I can't get away — it can be dodgy. I don't go on the tube any more, for instance."

Most of the characters that Mr Ogilvy played before The Saint were 'period' parts; you may remember him as a poet in Upstairs, Downstairs. What did he think of


such a change of roles?

"I was pleased to get away from period parts in a way," replied Ian. "It was nice to have new clothes made for me - frequently, the clothes I used to have to wear were so old and smelly they were likely to run away by themselves while I wasn't looking!"


Filming Return Of The Saint meant that Ian was away on location for a great deal of time. Did he find that it disrupted his home


"Not at all," replied Ian. "My wife came with me, and our two children joined us in the school holidays. They were both at >>> to p.18











boarding school then — my daughter has since left — and they had a marvellous time visiting different countries."

Do they want to follow in their father's footsteps?

"My daughter is seventeen and she works as assistant stage manager in a theatre — so she's got into the business, too. But she doesn't want to become an actress, she likes the other side. My son, who is eleven, is too young really to know yet what he wants to do. But I think he'd like to be very rich!"

Had Ian always wanted to 'tread the boards'?

"For most of my life, yes," he said. "I come from a vaguely theatrical background and to tell the truth I didn't get the qualifications to do anything else. That's what's good about this profession — you don't really need any qualifications. But it can be hard to make a name for yourself."

And what does he do when he's not working?

"I sit around hoping I'm going to get another job," laughed Ian. "Now I spend two hours a night doing my work, and the rest of my day is geared up to those two hours. I used to do a lot of amateur film-making, but when you spend a good deal of time in front of the camera yourself, you become less interested. I

read a tremendous amount and I try to write — but not terribly successfully!

"I do a lot around the house," continued Ian. "I'm a great do-it-yourselfer: painting, wallpapering, etc. I like building brick walls—there's an enormous amount of satisfaction in being able to stand back and think you've done that all by yourself!"

Talking about doing-it-yourself, some of the stunts performed by Simon Templar look rather hair-raising. Does Ian do those himself?

"No," replied Ian, "I don't do my own stunts, but I do my own action. There's a very big difference. The thing about stunts is that if you've got a good stuntman he's going to make you look frightfully good. A stunt is a very specialised job or is so dangerous that no insurance company would permit an actor to do it. It's doing trick driving or leaping off a very high building. But riding a horse or fighting is action, and I do that myself."

The big question that everyone must be asking is 'will there be another series of Return Of The Saint'?

Ian's answer to that is: "I'm afraid it's in the lap of the gods. I've had lots of letters from fans asking why don't I do another series, but it's not up to me. I'd love to, believe me, but it depends on the success of it abroad really."

Which means that only time will tell. Let's hope that it won't be too long before we're able to say a big 'halo' to Ian in a brand-new series!



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THE LAMBRETTAS SCOOT TO THE TOP

Sporting a name like The Lambrettas, and coming as they do from around Brighton, there is really only one kind of music that you could expect from the band . . . MOD.

But the blatant Mod image caused them as many problems as advantages until they swept high up the charts with their single **D-a-a-ance**.

The criticism which the group faced for allegedly jumping on a Mod bandwagon genuinely annoyed them, for it was not true, as singer Jez Bird explained to John Palmer: "We had been together for 18 months before we had any recognition, and we were Mod before there had even been a Mod revival. We did not get into it through the Mod music, it was more through the clothes — we used to go round to jumble sales and second-hand shops to try to pick up tonik suits and parkas. But at that time there was no great Mod movement.

"And although Brighton was originally one of the strong Mod areas back in the 1960s, it isn't now. It really started in London...while we were down here playing our music, without any recognition."

Jez, who used to work as a checking-in clerk at Gatwick airport, and guitarist Doug Saunders, a former milkman, were in a band called Shakedown before they formed The Lambrettas.

They were joined by drummer Paul Wincer, an ex-carpet salesman, who came from another local band, and bassist Mark Ellis, who had returned from America where he had done some session work, but had never played a live concert. "It was hard to get established, and we had to do a lot of small pub and club dates as support artists, when we humped our own equipment, and never got any sleep because we still had our day jobs." said Jez. "We chose the name 'The Lambrettas' (a make of motor-scooter popular with the original '60s Mods) because we thought that it would tell people who had never seen us what they could expect. But we have always played our own material, we are not a revival band who play lots of cover versions.

"Mod originally meant something new and different — and that's what we still see it as — it's not looking backwards."

So why did they release a cover version of a 1958 song, **Poison Ivy**? Jez explained: "Originally, we were invited to record a song for an album which the

Rocket Record Company were putting together, featuring all new bands. There were 12 groups on the album — we had been spotted playing support in a London-club, and invited to contribute a track — and our track Go Steady was chosen as the single."

Rocket then offered The Lambrettas a contract, and the group recorded three songs for a single. "One song was Poison Ivy, but we did it completely differently to the original version. We changed the words, added brass, and when we heard it, it seemed to be the obvious single. It was a bit ironic that it should be the only number which was not an original, but it felt right.

"We think that our music is getting stronger all the time, and that all the knocks have helped us. Our debut album Beat Boys In The Jet Age features a lot of recent material, and we feel that if we had recorded an album some time ago, it would not have been anywhere near as strong as this one," said Jez, who is the band's main writer. The band's experiences have helped them to mature, and their playing has developed because of all the live dates that they have performed. "We now have confidence, because we don't feel that we have to prove ourselves to anybody," he said.

However, the one thing that they are keeping their fingers crossed for is that the album will prove as successful as their singles. "It's one thing holding people's attention for three minutes of a single, but quite another to keep them interested for a whole album. But we have found that at our live gigs audiences have been surprised by what we play. Obviously, some people have turned up just to hear us play Poison Ivy but seem to have been impressed by the rest of the set."

But if Mod dies, do the Lambrettas run out of fuel, too? "I don't think so," said Jez. "I don't think Mod will be like the punk thing, the music has been accepted into the mainstream and we will just go on developing. We just hope that people will accept us as a band, playing our own material... we just hope that they like it."
