"The policy laid down by Blue Note five years ago to record present-day jazz in the essential spirit of the Blues tradition is being faithfully maintained. It took long years of struggle to become established with this policy in view.

"It will be of interest to you to learn that the great James P. Johnson has finally been recorded again; and this time on eight 12-in. Blue Note sides. The people in the know here say that he has been recorded right probably for the first time in his life. James P. Johnson himself claims that they are the greatest records he has made. The titles were:—


