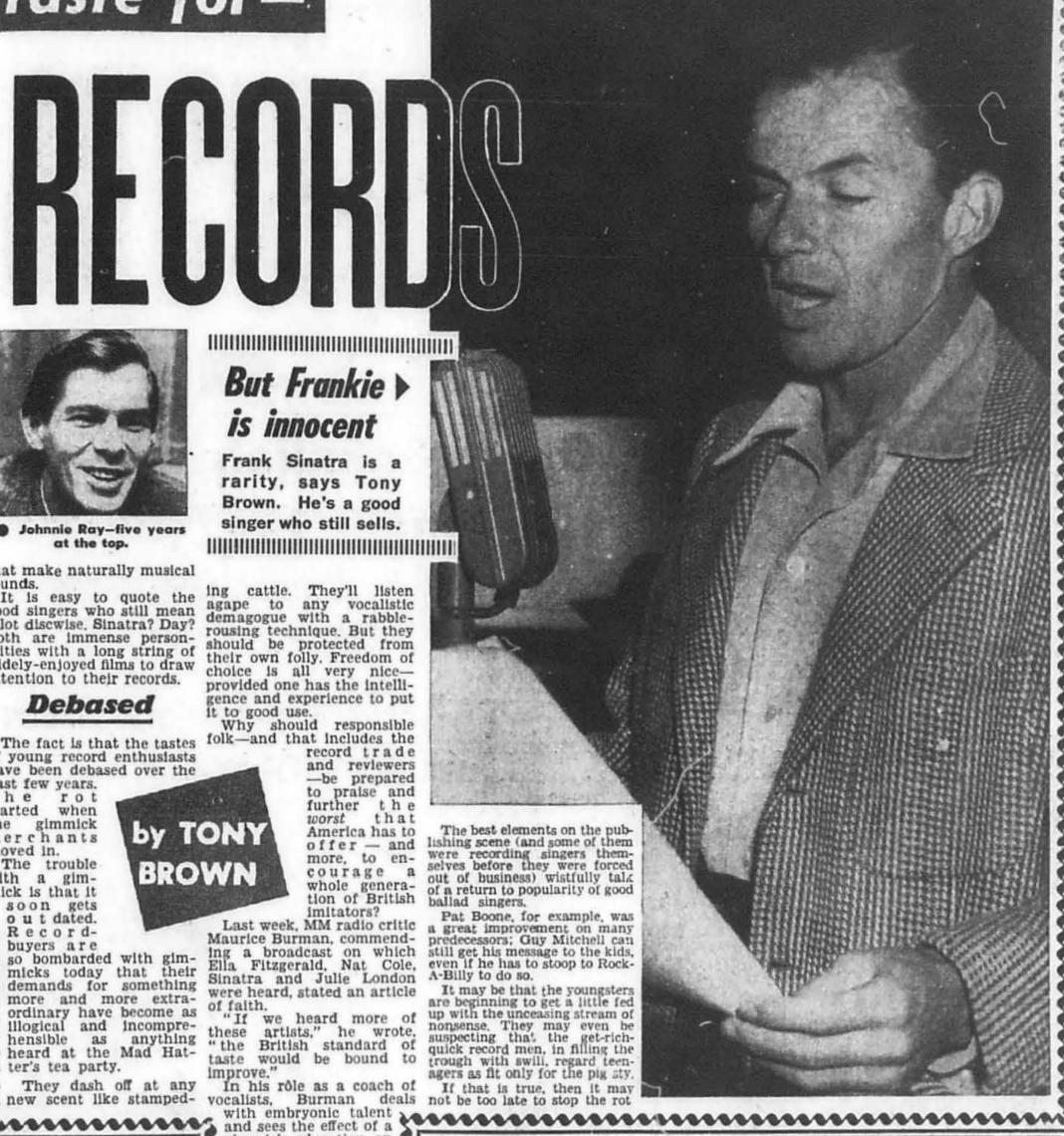

Rockin the village

Pianist-vicar of a village near Wellington. Somerset, the Rev. Lincoln Jones, has formed a seven-piece rock-'n'-roll band from youngsters in the village.

Speakers at the meeting included representatives of instrument dealers, music teachers and M.P.s. Mr. Harry Francis, who attending for the Musicians' Union, promised the support of the Union.

It was pointed out that the tax on instruments, at present 60 per cent. nets the Chancellor only £1.000,000 a year, compared to the vast sum of the total budget.

A deputation consisting of M.P.s of all the three political parties and a number of musical organisations has seen the Chancelior and told him that the tax is imposed by only one other Government throughout the civilised world. lised world.

#### £10m tax

In Japan there is a purchase tax of 30 per cent, on musical instruments but this is entirely refundable on all purchases by education authorities and insti-

education authorities and insti-tutions, youth organisations and the like.

Mr. Enoch Powell, Pinancial Secretary to the Treasury, stated in the Commons last week that the yield of purchase tax on musical instruments, including gramophones, radiograms, record players and records was approxi-mately £9.750,000 in the finan-cial year 1956-57.

few others gave our M usicians some encourage-

ment? They seem to get very little in the Press." wrote J. Stevens in last week's MELODY MAKER.

It is condescending and quite wrong for a critic to "encourage," that is to praise, musicians simply because they are British. Geography and misapplied patriotism are not the standards by which one judges music.

Attempts to base criticism on these standards not only harm music but are unhelpful to musicians themselves.

I speak from experience. Not so long ago a big British band composed of top jazzmen was formed to play Jazz. At that time, these particular musicians were demanding encouragement, from

It did no good and, after a little while, the band broke up. It would have been far more helpful if I had done the correct thing, as I have done before and since, and pointed out what was wrong so that the players could attempt to put them right.

Moral? Encourage and be proud of our musicians when they deserve it. But don't spoil things for reasons of misplaced nationalism.

corded in the thirties. The point is that the four albums give a better picture of 40 years' jazz than could have been drawn from any other single catalogue.

For the young jazz student who wonders about those years before his interest was awakened (or even before he was born) this set is required listening.

The first disc opens with King clarinet riff in thirds which was as something of a chronological jar, with its string bass and brushes, and the trumpet-clarinet riff in thirds which was so obviously worked out in advance as a backing to George Brunis's trombone.

golden crown

A WARNING

Although one doesn't object to the mere fact of preparation, it serves as a warning to the young listener, who must not imagine that jazz succumbed to the arranger's art within (so to speak) three minutes of its birth.

Johnny Dodds's "Wild Man Blues" is rightly a classic, glow-ing with the liquid perfection of Louis Armstrong's unforget-table chorus. For all the Dizzys, Brownies and Mileses I am prepared to go on record any time in support of Louis's claim to the golden crown of jazz: on this chorus alone his claim might well rest.

As to the extravagant praise lavished on clarinettist Johnny Dodds, I pass. The bland way he toots out an Eb against the rhythm section's Bb7 (the second chord of the piece) is surely enough to bar him from that Musicians' Hall of Fame in which Satchmo blows always the right note.

Certain critics have pointed out for years that the final artistic conviction in jazz playing is somehow denied to white musicians. It is a view I neither share nor wish to encourage, but when the next number starts (Red Nichols's "That's No Bar-gain") it is hard to avoid the impression of a bunch of college kids showing their betters how to play jazz.

OH, SO CLEVER

It's all so damnably efficient; from Nichols's so-clever break at the 15th bar to Jimmy Dor-sey's "my-next-trick-is-impos-sible" alto solo. One further point, which so far as I know has not been raised before: this must be the first-ever jazz record to feature a bar of 6/4 time. See If you can find it.

Even Jimmy Noone, who follows, was nearer to the heart of jazz than this, and in "My Mon-

day Date" he featured the then impossibly brilliant Earl Hines (For an evaluation of the present Hines, see my terse comment of last month, which I already regret! To enlarge a little, I feel that if the Earl had developed his fine, two-fisted style of those days, instead of listening to a thousand modernists from Teddy Wilson modernists from Teddy Wilson to Bud Powell, he could have out-played the whole pack of them today.)

I am afraid the genius of Jelly Roll Morton (here playing "King Porter Stomp") still eludes me, I must have been listening to him, off and on, for half a lifetime, but always with that blank expression which I wear equally when confronted with the work of Liszt, Donald Wolfit or the Ink Spots. The fault, clearly, lies within me, and there we had better leave the matter.

Over on Side 2 "Pinetop's Boogie-Woogie" acts as an appetiser for the exciting James P Johnson, whose "You've P. Johnson, whose "You've Gotta Be Modernistic" is a fine piece of piano jazz by any standards. After hearing it one regrets the passing of many things, including the earthy tradition of "stride" piano.

OUT OF TUNE

"Prince Of Wails" is frankly unworthy of inclusion, having by way of recommendation only the work of Frank Teschemacher, intolerably out of tune as usual. One scarcely even hears the clarinet in Benny Goodman's early "Muskrat Goodman's early "Muskrat Ramble," which follows, but the record is a joy for any listener who can train his ear to isolate the richly inventive tenor of Bud Freeman.

The last two tracks are among the most important in all jazz: the Venuti-Lang Farewell the Venuti-Lang Farewell Blues" because in it white middle-period jazz achieved one of its most signal successes, and the Duke's "East St. Louis Toddle-O" because it brought colour and shape to jazz,

With the former's emphasis on inventiveness through instrumental proficiency, and the latter's insistence that the arranger must have his roots in Jazz. the compiler could hardly have chosen two better records to usher in the fruitful 1930s.

How, and by whom, the dangers implicit in arranged virtuoso jazz were avoided, I hope to discuss next week.

READERS familiar with Sarah Vaughan's
"Shalle A Bop" must
sometimes have wondered
why she introduces the bass soloist as "Crazy Joe Ben-

I had met Benjamin, as part of Lena Horne's unit before I ever heard the record. Then I met him again in 1954, while he was touring U.S. camps here with Sarah and trio.

As a matter of fact, at the camp I visited, she sang "Shulle" and faithfully announced "Crazy Joe," though Benjamin remained steadfastly serious throughout his solo Nothing in his appearance or

Nothing in his appearance or demeanour then suggested instability of any sort. And when the recent Mulligan tour presented opportuni-ties for getting to know him, I decided that underneath the tall, studiousexterior lurked a studious, respectable and serious—though easily amused—man.

It seemed to be time to seek an ex-I said: "Joe, I shall have to ask you why Sarah Vaughan refers to you as 'Crazy Joe Benjamin'."

"And I shall have to disappoint you," Benjamin replied in the friendliest tone.
"I never have been able to find that out, either."

I now suspect that the adlec-

I now suspect that the adjective was used straight, simply to imply exceptional instrumen-tal ability.

Straight music

On the Mulligan trip, Ben-jamin's musicianship and swing made a very favourable impression. And since his story is not well known, I asked him to outline it for MELODY MAKER readers.

The majority of jazz musi-cians have some background of school dance bands, college jazz groups or the like. Benjamin made no such start.

He studied violin, and his in-

terests lay in the direction of "straight" musto until writing brought him into contact with the jazz scene.

"The beginning was with Billy Moore, Jr., Lunce-ford's chief arran-ger" Benjamin ger" Benjamin told me. "There was an orchestral society at the YMCA, headed by Troy Gorham, and I played violin in that symphony group—not professionally, you know; I'd had no professional experience then.

"Through these activities I

got to know Billy Moore particu-larly well and, through talking to him, a lot about the guys I was subsequently to work with.

No bass yet

"I started copying for Billy, around 1945 I suppose, and having to deliver scores to Lunceford allowed me to get my ears attuned to how a band

ears attuned to how a band should sound.

The bass still hadn't come into the picture. Then an old friend. George Duvivier, returned from the Army.

"He asked: 'You know a little about music; you play violin?'

"I said: 'Yes, I suppose so.'

"'Well, go and buy an instrument and I'll start you off.'

"My initial playing job came when Sy formed his own band. It included Bud Johnson, Billy Kyle, Bill Coleman and Wally Bishop. George, of course, was Bishop. George, of course, was playing bass.

George took sick one night: he 'phoned to ask me if I had a dark suit, if so to call by his house and pick up a letter on route to the Club Zanzibar.

"I went, and took the letter up to Sy. He'd heard me talk rbout bass, but had no ides I played. So he accepted the note and the replacement with fore-

To Mulligan

"They had arrangements which called for George to make a break or a modulation-things like that—and I got those off. Not as fluently as George would have done them, but they came off okay . . . to the amazement of the whole band and myself. "After that. Sy became another of the men who encour-

aged me.
"I've been knowing Gerry for "I some time," he went on. "I used to see him in New York and he used to ask me how I was fixed musically and otherwise. When Bill Crow left, Gerry called me and we talked I finally joined the group, and my first date with them was in

March this year.
"I find the work interesting because with no piano in the group I have a chance to explore myself, to test my responsibility as a musician. I find my interest increasing because the job is a challenge, and they keep the music changing a little within the harmonies.

Ellington

One constant enthusiasm of Benjamin's is for Duke Ellington (" He's just the most naturally remarkable musician I've ever known, and I'm glad to have been able to live in the same age as he and to have had the opportunity of working with him ").

Joe says that he began copy-ing Luther Henderson's stuff for Duke and got to know Ellington at that time. "I've been in and out of his pay-roll for years," he adds



"I got to play with the band at a Philadelphia concert when he didn't expect one of his two bassists to make it. Pettiford and Marshall were the two, and I was asked to be on hand as a precaution.

"The sick member showed up, though. Rather than leave me in the wings he used all three of us simultaneously. Parts? No, he didn't even have parts for Wendell and Oscar. Only difference was they knew the arrangements.

" That man really is fantastic. You can only know a little part of him. Anyway, that day was another lesson. After that, I was engaged to do the integrating of his band and the Robin

Hood Dell Symphony Orchestra of Philadelphia. That meant days and days of work-and nights, of course.

"At the same time I was re-hearsing with Wendell for a concert subsequently held at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York. I played on that in 1951, and that was the last big thing with Duke."

Benjamin's ambition is to become as good a bassist as he

He says: "I have a long way to go—this I'm sure of, because. being part of a good supporting cast is quite a responsible posi-tion, which a lot of musicians don't realise. If they did you would get more cohesion than you do with bands."

It is also a salutary reminder that caterwauling did not pass for singing with the record buyers of the early thirties.

THE PLATTERS are riding on the crest of four consecutive million sellers. So they have the laugh on critical snipers.

But it would be turning a tone deaf ear to ignore the fact that there's some pretty poor solo singing and harmonising on this disc. Lead singer Tony Williams's pitch is highly suspect on "I'll Get By," and the group's backing includes several moments that made me wince.

The sleeve note, which sustains a lyrical pitch throughout, winds up with: "If you are not yet an enthusiastic admirer of this group, this album will bring you into the fold."

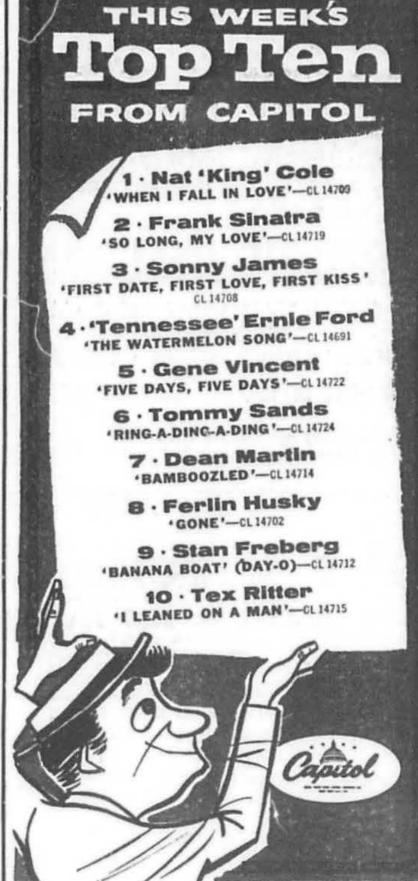

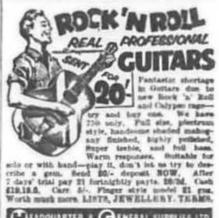

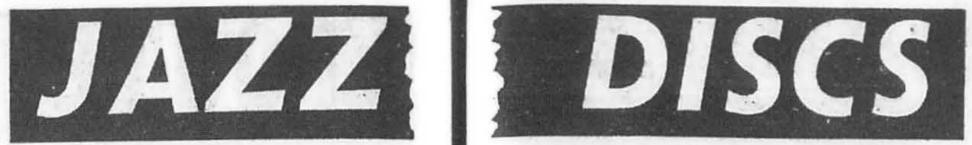
