





With more jazz records on the market than anybody can afford, frequent jazz concerts, numerous clubs—and now full-length films devoted to jazz—it could be said that jazz fans today are better off than ever before. But are they? There is another way of looking at it.

If a sudden lucky strike enabled everyone in the world to own a diamond the size of the Kohinoor, would we all be satisfied? Of course not.

Erstwhile millionaires would lose no time in putting it about that diamonds are no longer what they used to be.

Of the new diamond-owners, some would oling to the belief that somewhere, even bigger and better diamonds exist.
Others would find the much-vaunted king-size diamonds disappointing and really less inpressive than the lump of cut-glass which has stood on their mantelpiece for years.


