A RESOUNDING SUCCESS FOR THE MODERATIONISTS INFLUENCE IN THE LONDON BRANCH AND E.C. OF THE MUSICIANS' UNION IS MANIFEST IN THE RESULTS OF THE BALLOT ANNOUNCED ON THIS PAGE. THE NAMES HEREIN TABULATED REPRESENT A HEALTHY AUGURY FOR THE YEAR 1950. THESE OFFICIALS AND COMMITTEEMEN ARE ALREADY WELL KNOWN FOR THEIR VALUABLE SERVICES AND UNTING EFFORTS ON BEHALF OF THE UNION. THEY ARE KNOWN TO HAVE VIEWS WHICH LEAN TOWARDS THE NEED FOR REVISIONS OF TRADE UNIONISM MODIFIED BY THE SPECIALISED PROFESSIONAL REQUIREMENTS OF MUSIC.

Last year's successes, from which the names of these gentlemen are inseparable, include increased radio fees for musicians and the resumption of Outside Broadcasts. As this year draws to a close the deplorable conditions for the provincial theatre musicians are occupying the attention of the Union. There is now every possibility that this situation will be improved before the year is out.

The year 1950 will be a year of great opportunity. There is no doubt that during the 2 term of office of these officials the moderationists will give their attention to another blot on the face of professional music. That is the system by which union and branch men are allowed to work together, especially in number bands.

Hitherto the Union, it is understood, regarded a player of the cello as being outside Union jurisdiction. But if the Union rules that it members may not play with number bands, then surely patafutists, trumpeters, drummers, etc., all part of the number band, should be included in this arrangement. This matter needs clearing up once and for all, especially since many rumba rhythm players are getting well under Union influence.

GEORGE KAYE is now rapidly recovering from his recent serious accident and last Monday commenced part-time with the band. He is to undergo a further operation on the 2nd of January. It is sincerely hoped that this will enable him to get completely back into his stride.

Ronald Daines' pianist has shortly to relinquish his job with the band due to serious internal trouble. Bert Thomas, musical director, says that he was also badly injured recently and is now back on the job and is recovering from the cut crash.

For us there is no holiday in the true sense of the word. But the musical life is an integral part of the festivity. Two bank holidays this year will be the time when that musical folk will, we hope, all be hard at work. Show business is not the only profession which has no respite at Christmas. Many are the medical men who will groan at the thought of the time when others are enjoying themselves. But they are not alone. There are the doctors and nurses attached to the hospitals for whom Christmas means nothing more than a slice of turkey and some festive plans. Their labours go on through the night. 
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AMERICAN JAZZ FESTIVAL



Bop Mystery Explained: The new musical craze, Bop, brings New York's Bop missionary, Dave Lambert, to Hollywood to teach Capitol's singing star, Jo Stafford, her "ess" and "oss." Lambert's mathematical formula, by which balding singer Stafford learned Bop, has been sent to Prof. Albert Einstein for his opinion!

BIRDLAND, the Broadway nightclub that shuttered on the day it was scheduled to open several months ago, is now a new nightspot and will throw open its doors this month.

The first show, entitled "The American Jazz Festival," will feature a portion of the festival from the early 1950s through the "swing" era and into bop, progressive jazz and all the intermediate periods of the art form. Show will be grouped into four two-hour concerts following consecutive nights. The initial line-up consists of the most representative of all phases and eras of jazz with 22 soloists, most of them many-time winners of popularity polls.

In the Dixieland and "swing" section of the show there is Hot Lips Page on trumpet and Eddie Miller on drums. The Dixielanders, featuring Krasinsky on trumpet, Sol Yaged on clarinet, George Wettling, drums, Dick Hyman, piano, Munn Ware,

Vocalist in this section is barton Harry Belafonte, followed by the Lenny Tristano sextet, featuring Tristano and featuring Tristano, Metronome winner, on piano. Billy Bauer, also Met winner, on guitar. Louie Bellson, alto, Wardell Gray, tenor, Arnold Fishkin, bass, and Jeff Morton, drums.

The entire show is festival after the European jazz festival was held in Paris. The festival made to bring top artists from England and France into Birdland on later shows. The Jazz Festival will remain at the club for three weeks.

Birdland will follow the entire program pattern set for the earlier opening with birds in caged cages behind the bar and basement piano bar.

First dinner, including milk bar menu are featured and the admission charge will be \$2.00. The first show is at 8 o'clock and the last show at 2 a.m.

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
