ITURBI BRINGING SPANISH ORCH NINETY-SIX MUSICIANS FOR BRITISH CONCERT TOUR

Opens Jan. 29

AT THE END OF JANUARY MUSICAL HISTORY WILL BE MADE WHEN JOSE ITURBI, FAMOUS FILM STAR PIANIST AND CONDUCTOR, BRINGS THE VALENCIA ORCHESTRA OF NINETY-SIX MUSICIANS TO BRITAIN FOR CONCERT APPEARANCES. THIS WILL BE THE FIRST TIME A SPANISH ORCHESTRA HAS VISITED THIS COUNTRY.

Apart from the great musical interest this news will arouse, it has a human element. For Iturbi, who left his native Valencia unknown, returned a famous artist and was feted by his fellow countrymen. He did not forget his home town and operating from his orange grove farm in one of Spain's most beautiful districts, he set about building the Valencia Orchestra. After many months of rehearsal and planning, Iturbi has built an orchestra that is said to rate with the finest in the world.

New impresario Harold Fielding, has arranged a concert tour for the orchestra with the famous Iturbi as conductor and soloist. The orchestra will make its first appearance at Coliseum Theatre, London, on January 29 followed by the Albert Hall, Manchester, January 30 and City Hall Newcastle, January 31. From January 1 to February 10 the Orchestra, together with Iturbi will appear at the following concert halls: The Queen's Hall, Birmingham; Hall D'Orsay, St. Andrew's Hall, Glasgow; Liverpool Town Hall, Birmingham, Leeds, The Montfort Hall, Leicester, City Hall, Sheffield, and Royal Albert Hall, London.

The Orchestra arrive in England on January 28 and will remain until January 29 for their evening concert. It is anticipated that the programme will include several Spanish pieces, some popular and possibly some of these will not have been heard in this country before.

Their last broadcast at 12.30 p.m. on January 22.
