Thom Yorke speaks out as the band announce intimate UK shows for May

adiohead are planning to play their new album at six exclusive live shows in the UK this May.
The dates – in Blackpool,
Wolverhampton and London – are the band's first live outings in almost two years, and will give the group the chance to test out the songs they've been working on at their Oxford base this year with new producer Mark 'Spike' Stent.

The last time Radiohead road-tested new songs before releasing them was in 2002, when they spent the summer playing shows in Spain and Portugal.

"I was angling for the tour in the sun. You only live once!" singer **Thom Yorke** joked. "But no, Blackpool it is."

Bassist **Colin Greenwood** added: "We're doing these shows in the UK and some European ones. We had an option to play some bigger shows to 10,000 people in Eastern Europe, but it's the wrong time because they'd want to hear older songs and we want to use this time to play some new ones.

"We're playing these shows so we can do [new songs] and have people come and be excited about being in the space. In some ways we're going to be showing our sketchbook in public and trying to play old songs that we haven't played for a long time too. It's all going to be a challenge. We're going to half-play new songs and half-remember old songs!"

The experience of touring 'Hail To The Thief' before its release was a positive one for Radiohead. As a result of the audience reaction some tracks were dropped while others became instant fan favourites. Thom hopes the British audiences will be as honest as possible this time too.

"It's going to be hit and miss," he confessed. "Sometimes the only way you can tell where you're at with stuff is to play it for people. We hope that people will tell us what they think. If they think it's shite then we need to know that as well, really."

After seeing Franz's and Dizzee Rascal's performances at the event last year. Thom was turned on to the event - although not the more corporate side of it.

"I based [our decision to do it1 on seeing Franz Ferdinand last year. just watching it on TV. I thought they were good, and Dizzee Rascal was the best thing - he was fucking bonkers," Thom told NME. "It's a British festival. I obviously don't

necessarily agree with the sponsorship, but Glastonbury's not happening this year. I was thinking at the time it'd be good to remind ourselves of what we've done. To play lots of old stuff and get into that mode and see what it feels like, rather than rejecting it wholesale forever more. V was the first thing that came up, in a way. We started thinking it'd be good to get out a bit!'

This year's festival also features Beck and Morrissey and takes place at Hylands Park in Chelmsford and Weston Park in Stafford over the weekend of August 19-20. The event

has sold out.

he full Radiohead tour will open in Copenhagen on May 6, and the group will play across America in June, but before that Thom and Jonny Greenwod will play at London Camden KOKO (May 1) at a benefit show for Friends Of The Earth's The Big Ask Campaign. The show sold out in minutes, leading to some ticket holders deciding to sell on their tickets for profit - despite the fact the gig is for charity.

A spokesperson for the charity told NME they had done everything within their power to ensure that fans had access to the tickets at cost price - for

example, by limiting purchases to two tickets per person.

"It is extremely disappointing to find that some people are selling on tickets for personal gain," the spokesperson said, particularly as this is a charity event.

Thom is an ambassador for the charity, who recently asked him to meet Prime Minister Tony Blair to discuss climate change. For the Radiohead singer deciding whether or not to attend the meeting was one of the hardest decisions he'd ever had to make.

"Luckily, in the end the decision was kind of made for me," Thom told NME. "There's this whole thing going on at the moment with Blair and the nuclear thing. This all started kicking off about two or three weeks before I was supposed to meet with Blair, which I was not happy about anyway for obvious reasons, le Iraq.

It was, If we could just have a meeting beforehand where we could go through

how it would proceed ... It was like talking to Blair's spin doctors. It was all getting fucking weird. It was just obvious there was no point in meeting him anyway and I didn't want to. That was the illest I'd ever got. I got so stressed out and so freaked out about it. Initially when it came up I tried to be pragmatic. But Blair has no environmental credentials as far as I'm concerned.

"I came out of that whole period just thinking, 'I don't want to get involved

directly. it's poison. I'll just shout my mouth off from the sidelines. It's a nastv husiness. It's up to people

with pure integrity who know what they're talking about. Like Friends Of The Earth."

Thom also revealed that songs set to feature on Radiohead's new album include 'House Of Cards', 'Arpeggi' and 'Nude'. A release date is yet to be confirmed, although there's talk of a download-only EP around the time of the shows.



ourtney Love is planning to sell a share of Nirvana's publishing rights. **Kurt Cobain** had controlled most of the rights to his band's songs after an agreement between him and bandmates Kris Novoselic and Dave Grohl in 1993, and they passed to Love on his death. Now she says she's looking to sell part of the publishing to a "partner". So exactly what is happening?



Courtney: "this is the right thing to do for my family"

A share of the publishing rights on Nirvana's songs. At the moment, any time a song Kurt Cobain wrote is used, a royalty is paid for the privilege. Love is looking for someone to invest in the catalogue, who will then receive a share of that revenue.

WMY IS SHE SELLING NOW?

"I need some co-management and a strategic partner to help me as it's such a huge responsibility. This is the right thing to do for my family. This kind of deal has never been done before," Love has told NME.

Nirvana's songs are rarely used in films or on TV. If someone with a bit of industry nous invests, it's hoped they'll push the tracks more. Which means your iPod isn't the only place you'll be hearing Nirvana.

"if I wanted to make a lot of money really fast I would have just sold Nirvana songs to

adverts," declared Love.
"The entire reason to take on this partner is to build the catalogue much like the Elvis catalogue was rebuilt - hopefully avoiding crap adverts."

Unlikely, claims Love. "I've been offered yonks of cash for ads and always declined. I've never given Nirvana songs for licensing except on occasions where





Followills pen 'anthems' for third record

ings Of Leon are starting work on their third album this week and have provisionally called it 'Because Of The Times'. As NME went to press, The Followill brothers were planning to start recording the follow-up to 'Aha Shake Heartbreak' on Sunday (March 19) - with the album ultimately set for release in September or October this year.

"Man, we're sitting on a bunch of songs right now that we wish we could let the world hear!" drummer Nathan Followill said.

The band will be writing and recording at home for the present, with full sessions to follow. They are hoping to record in Nashville and producer Ethan Johns is one possible

candidate to work on the sessions.

There's at least seven songs completely written and ready to record, with a similar number of works in progress. Bassist Jared added: "We feel like we did in high school, when we used to tell people we were going to be famous and nobody believed us. We all feel like, 'Man, this record is going to be so big! So good!" Not big as in record sales, but just in the way it

sounds and how much better... it's going to be a lot more anthemic than anything we've previously done."

And singer Caleb added: "We'll sit there and say we have a song even if it's not completely finished just because we know how it makes us feel. We're always going to try to beat anything we've done [before].' Working titles include 'Arizona', 'The Trunk', 'I'm On Call', 'Being Fearless' and 'Song From Homegirls' Mix-tape'.





"Well exactly. Phil Oakey from The Human League, for example, came to see us at one of our gigs and he had an interesting, strange tweed suit and make-up on. I thought, 'Yeah. That's Phil Oakey.' He looked good. He was wearing ridiculous clothes. He was still a pop star. He still had the pop-star gene. I suppose you never lose it. Pop stars should be pop stars full-time."

Here, here. What's your hair doing today?

"I washed it this morning and it looks a lot better – it was just full of wax, hairspray and mousse. It's big, I can tell you that. It's fucking big. It's like a small black monkey resting on my head with arms coming down either side. It's powerful. It's powerful hair. It's protecting me from Wolverhampton."







This is nothing unusual for New Cross's finest (and indeed only) indie-disco postpunk sci-fi ravers. Described on their MySpace page as "when Buzz Aldrin returned from the moon and turned Muslim", they're a Day-Glo phenomenon with a small army of copycat followers and an anything-goes mentality. And asking them to explain themselves won't get you very far.

"We're the four horsemen of 2012, except we lost a horse. We were riding to Utopia and he got picked off in Cyprus,' offers keyboard player James Righton, unhelpfully. In reality they're an exrecord shop employee, a former call centre worker and a returning expatriate

> 'Sorry For Laughing'. It's crystal meth-pop. If you strip down old rave songs and take away the beats, they're essentially just incredibly melodic pop songs."

While their intense live shows could put most early-'90s M25 gatherings to shame, their music is more than just radio rental breakbeats and helium vocals. First single 'Gravity's Rainbow' is a pulsating disco shuffle guaranteed to gnaw on the nation's consciousness this summer, boasting the bestest, deftest mix of surreal verses and anthemic choruses since Bowie (who is, incidentally, the only influence the trio can all agree on). Recently joining forces with legendary London label Angular

Recording Corporation (who released the first offerings from Bloc Party and The Long Blondes), Klaxons work from a New Cross HO littered with literature, broken record decks and, of course, klaxons. Under the light of a small heater, they record hundred of ideas, translate these ideas to a map and draw lines across it to see which parts go with which. It's an unorthodox technique that's vielded follow-up 'Atlantis To. Interzone' (due in May), the sound of Gang Of Four trapped in the 808 state and a concise mash-up of everything

> from happy hardcore to trash-punk, it's also further proof of their obsession with all things sci-fi.

"Atlantis is a lost city, while Interzone is William Burroughs' concept of non-space, and we wanted it to be like this expanding of the entire universe, explains guitarist Simon Taylor. "We wanted to be the

tightrope between the two places." The bollocks is flowing thick and fast now. "We're going to make a trilogy of albums," says Jamie. "Future, past and present. Future first, then probably present, then past."

'If the world ends in 2012 we better get a move on," reminds Simon.

Jamie chips in: "And we want to make Klaxons: The Movie, like The Spice Girls. Maybe get Peter Jackson on board. although I can't imagine him chilling in New Cross."

And with that, these three shit-talking horsemen of the rave-punk apocalypse disappear in a cloud of brown powder and liquid nitrogen – probably heading off to party hard with The Shamen at an all-nighter somewhere in the giddy stratospheres. Tim Chester






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

n icy wind sweeps in off the Hudson; blustering at the boho café windows, blowing trash against the rusted metal security grates. It's

a bitter Sunday afternoon in mid-February and Williamsburg is battened down – the art-school cartoon graffiti is faded and peeling now, the dive bars sold off to Starbucks.

Just three years ago, this arty community in Brooklyn was the epicentre of the post-Strokes New York rock eruption - the subway shook to the rumble of slap bass, the paying slabs cracked to the disco stamp of fake Italian shoes, carnivals of punk-funksters in testicle-strangling trousers paraded the streets. But now the bands have dried up, broken down or been shunted out and the hyperavaged 'scene' has burrowed underground once more. In early 2006, Williamsburg's hipster talk is all of Ricky Kaiser's waistline and 'those Arsenic Monkey dudes' rather than its own self-made stars. But what's that? The stomp of

stiletto on monitor! The primal howl of a sweetie-pie art vampiress! The shred of highfashion latex hotpants! In a trailerstyle diner just off the main drag, the three-headed jerk-punk wonder-beast that is Yeah Yeah Yeahs is re-awakening, slapping on its glittery *Zorro* make-up and preparing to kick our pimply Limey asses all the way back to 'Rovram'. Karen O – fashionista farm girl, femme fatale with the style of Barbarella gone berserk in a fishnet factory and the split-personality of a catwalk Jekyll & Hyde! Nick Zinner – enigmatic goth elf possessed of a way with a jaggededge guitar that could see him switch careers to televised crocodile-

capturing without additional training! And Brian Chase – experimental Jazz noise 'adventurer' with the interview 'technique' of a bored four-year-old at a funeral! Observe.

So Karen, you're back in Williamsburg to record the new

album: how has the place changed?
"It seems like a lot more people live here," says Karen, "a lot more money has entered the area I don't know, I don't really live here. Brian lives here."

How do you think it's changed, Brian?

Brian goes glassy-eyed. "There's a lot more money, it seems like there's more people living here."

Brilliant! A quick note about Brian before we continue: Brian is a very pleasant and accommodating chap at heart. But Brian is the drummer in Yeah Yeah Yeahs, and no sentient human being gives a flying toss what the drummer from Yeah Yeah Yeahs has to say about anything on Earth. Hence Brian is approaching the end of four solid days of interviews during which he has been asked approximately two-anda-half direct questions, and Brian is bored out of his Saturn-sized brain. Ask Karen a string of three or more questions and he starts finger-drumming on the table. Mention a slightly-too-obvious musical

influence – Siouxsie And The Banshees, say – and Brian'll kick his chair loudly. Enquire after lyrical themes on the shoe-in for Album Of The Year that is their second LP 'proper' 'Show Your Bones', and he'll pretend to pass out against

the wall. Brian, bless him, should have gone to the zoo this afternoon. A shame, because Yeah Yeah Yeahs have some dark secrets to unravel While their contemporaries – The Strokes, Interpol, Hot Hot Heat, Stellastarr* – were blinded by the media spotlight of 2002 and blundered into worthy but predictable follow-up albums, Yeah Yeah Yeahs hid themselves away for three years, creating a record so shrouded in secrecy that for some time it was widely believed to be a concept album about the studio cat

entitled 'Coco Beware'. Inevitably, that wasn't the only myth There were also the ones about break-ups, walk-outs, fist-fights and countless albums recorded only to be scrapped amid vicious in-band bickering and choking studio tension. So, over beer and awkward giggles in the diner's back room, let us rummage in the darkness poke at the raw nerves and explode some rumours around the most *mysterious* album of this millennium. So, Brian, gonna tell us where the light is?

RUMOUR 1: THE TPEVER TO TELL! TOUR ALL ST KILLED THEM

Yeah Yeah Yeahs' live show, for the uninitiated, is a wild, savage, sexy, scary, mariachi-dancing, rock-posturing, ballerina-spinning, wolf-howling, tear-jerking thunderpunch of jitter-pop mayhem. Times a billion. It's astounding to witness, exhausting to perform. Particularly, as Yeah Yeah Yeahs found during the extensive 'Fever To Tell' outing, if you are doing so almost every night for almost three years solid. "Exhausting' is an

"Exhausting' is an understatement," Karen recalls. "I can't imagine it was very good for me. The amount that we put out every night, we put out major, like a putting-out machine, at least 100 per cent. After two and a half years of just touring it kinda drained us."

How were relations in the band at the end of the tour?

"We were a well-oiled machine,"
Karen laughs, "but we were
running out of oil."





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RUMOUR 2: RAPEN LEFT THE BAND TOGO HANG OUT WITH MOVIE STARS IN HOLLYWOOD

As the 'Fever To Tell' tour wound down in 2004, Karen's personal life started heating up. Having moved out of Williamsburg the previous year into a suburban house in New Jersey with then-boyfriend Angus Andrew from Liars, the couple split during the tour. What went wrong?

"Let me tell you all about it!"
Karen yelps sarcastically. "I've
been waiting to spill my guts.
No, it was just a break-up, a breakup in a long line of break-ups."

By the time the tour finished she was stepping out with LA video director Spike Jonze, making it an obvious choice for her to relocate to Hollywood. ("I'd lived in New Jersey and New York all my life, 25 years, and I just thought it'd be a good time to switch it up a little bit"). And even when her relationship with Jonze broke down (the couple's most public collaboration was on an adidas advert - directed by Spike, soundtracked in wafty atmospheric fashion by Karen), she stayed, comfortable in her new-found West Coast domesticity. There

Coast domesticity. There she spends her time "cooking and cleaning and buying doilies and, like, having friends over for dinner and playing charades," and getting to grips with the Tinseltown practice of, um, 'sausaging'.

"Have you heard about that?"
Karen asks. "It's what happens
when you go to a celebrity shindig
and you have to bring someone
either of your status or of higher
status. A sausage is someone who
doesn't make the grade. I know
because I couldn't get into Prince's
party. I was a sausage at Prince's
party, which was a bummer
because I was wearing a sequin
jacket and I thought that would
be my ticket in but I was wrong."

RUMOUR 3: THEY SCRAPED SEVEN ALBUM S' WORTH OFMATERIAL BEFORE RECORDING 'SHOW YOUR BONES'

Yeah Yeah Yeahs: "HAHAHAHA!" Nick: "We're hearing that from a lot of people actually. Maybe they're referring to the new songs that we were playing live that aren't on the record."

The O team: VYYs rock New York last year

It turns out there were only sevento-12 new songs that didn't make the cut, but that's not to say a lot of avenues weren't turned down and found to be cul-de-sacs. When the band re-convened in February 2005 in a rehearsal studio in LA, they were aware of the failings of their contemporaries' second efforts and determined that theirs would challenge, startle and shock.

Although how was another question.

"Whenever we do something as a band," says Nick, "except for the vague idea of making it 'different', we don't have any real idea of what direction we're going to go in, we

just kind of let the music take on a life of its own."

What sort of directions did you try? Acid jazz? Skiffle funk? Electrooompah metal-hop?

Nick: "I feel like I got a lot of metal out of me with other projects (check Nick's grindcore side venture Headwound City – Side Projects Ed) so that didn't seem appropriate. We'd try things and if they don't write themselves then we'd back off and move on."

How did you feel about the US bands that were filling your seat while you were away – The Killers, The Bravery, et al?

Karen's nose wrinkles. "I don't relate so well to them, I feel like they're coming up in a different time rather than in the wake of what we were doing. I don't particularly like it. I understand the pop appeal of it but it's not to my personal taste."



With such intensely high expectations, the atmosphere in Yeah Yeah Yeahs' studio over the summer of 2005 resembled Guantanamo Bay. Although, contrary to reports, stiletto never once connected with groin.

"It was like a pressure cooker,"
Karen explains. "We don't really
fight as a band That's an
interesting picture to paint!
HAHAHA! Of us kicking each
other's asses in the studio! We take
it out on our pets. We go home and

pummel our cats. The amount of concentration and meditation and all that kind of shit that had to do with it far exceeded anything we'd ever tried to do before. A studio album for a band that's so immediate – it's so much more pressure to try something that you haven't done before, that's not safe, that's not to the formula, you know what I'm saying?"

With only the scantest of reports leaking out, the news that Nick was leaving the studio to tour with Bright Eyes for a few months was taken as YYYs' death knell. In fact, Nick's hiatus was planned months in advance. But, by

Equals America's Album Of The Year! their admission, the sessions were "dark and scary".

In what way?

Karen muses. "Dark and scary... why don't you answer that, Brian?"

Brian's eyes glaze over. "There was this one time I had to pick up some gear early in the morning and our producer was sleeping in the live room. I didn't know that and the lights were off when I walked in. I was fumbling around for the light switch and I suddenly heard, 'Raaaaaaaar!'. It scared me. Right. So Karen, was it important

to make a successful record? To be the first NYC band to break the US mainstream.

"No, we just wanted it to sound good to us first, more than anything else," Karen argues. 'The songs are a lot more melodydriven than our other songs, but we weren't thinking we'd make a hit record. Although we did say that every now and then, to pump ourselves up. The first three songs we wrote for the record were 'Gold Lion', 'Turn Into' and 'Phenomena' and we were, like, 'Right on!' Then there was a huuuuuge period of nothing and we were, like, 'Fuck!'. We had this apple in the studio with a face drawn on and for the entire six weeks it didn't rot, it just hung out. Maybe it was preserved by all the tension and the pressure inside there."

RUMOUR 5: THEY VE MADE KAREN'S BREAK-UP RECORD

"Cheated by the opposite of love" 'Cheated Hearts'. "I messed up the missing of you... It's getting to sound like they've seen you around with her... I don't even know what

it's like not to go back to you/I don't even know who I like less/You or me"
- 'Mysteries'. "Who have you fallen for?/Whose lies?" - 'Sweets'

They'll use the usual swerve tactics of, "Our lyrics are open to so many interpretations", but 'Show Your Bones' - named, remember, after the classic cartoon image of electrocution, a transparent metaphor for emotional exposure is awash with the detritus of broken relationships. Infidelity, bitterness. claustrophobia, insecurity, defiance - it's essentially a Relate session gone punk rock. Right?

"I think there can be so many interpretations of those lyrics, swerves Karen. "You know when they say, like, when you have a dream, like, even if it's about you having sex with your mother or whatever it's, like, the mother is you, everyone in the dream is you. That's kind of how I felt with this album. I felt it's more like breaking up with myself rather than breaking up with Angus Andrew. That's how I felt with all the songs, I felt like all the characters were me, in the writing of it. All kinds of levels of betrayal and longing and running away and coming back, all that stuff has to do with getting away from yourself or coming back to yourself."

At this point, for some reason, Brian is pretending to fall asleep in his food. You alright there, Brian? Do you need a lie down?

"I was just wondering how close I could get my face to the plate without actually touching it."

OK, carry on. But, Karen, it sounds like the romanticism of 'Maps' has been chewed up and spat out by some cheating man-whore. It's like on 'Fever To Tell' you believed in love, whereas this time you're much more wary.



"Right, right," Karen nods. "Well, you might be totally right on the fuckin' nose with that one. It sounds familiar to me. You could be absolutely correct but I'll leave for the music to tell the story.'

RUMOUR 6: THEY'VE MADE THE ALBUM OF THE YEAR

Congratulations Yeah Yeah Yeahs! You've made the Album Of The Year! And it's only March!

"I swear to God we've always been outsiders to whatever scene is going on" K

Karen high-fives NME. "Thanks.

No really, 'Show Your Bones' is a sensational record - all the brutal ire, thunderous passion and melodic beauty that 'Fever To Tell' hinted at siphoned through a gauze of accessibility and topped off with a great big dollop of The Tunes. If first single 'Gold Lion' is a deliciously down-tempo introduction to the record, it sprints away towards the REM-ish pop chug of Way Out', the jolt-funk sex-swagger of 'Phenomena' and the sinister Throwing Muses-chewing-lava

'Fancy'. And then there's a clutch of dancefloor killers: 'Honey Bear' (Joan Jett riding a Harley through an Editors gig), 'Mysteries' (axe slaughter at a speed-fuelled Texan barn-dance), album highlight 'Cheated Hearts' ('Maps' gone schizo in disco pants) and 'Turn Into' (their 'All These Things That I've Done'). It stands as not just a gigantic leap forward for YYYs but a validation that the entire NY scene wasn't just one cool-looking lo-fi idea destined to be ploughed for eternity. So how does it feel knowing you're going to show Arctic Monkeys how to really sell

records this year?
"We're unshakeably cynical about our future," says Nick, "that's just the way we are. It's definitely not a record by an

underground art band though. "We always had one foot in that scene and one foot out of it," Karen argues. "So that side is obviously always gonna be there, but when it comes to Yeah Yeahs, I swear to God we've always been outsiders to whatever scene is going on

Modest, mysterious, secretly malevolent; Yeah Yeah Yeahs are back to high-kick Williamsburg out of its slumber. Come in New Yorkshire, your time is up.

uite why anyone would claim that Mystery Jets were an eccentric bunch is beyond us. What, for instance, is out-ofthe-ordinary about using your boathouse rehearsal space as a reverb chamber? What could possibly be deemed peculiar about writing a song called 'Rastamadeus', which documents the first meeting of Jesus and Bob Marley in heaven? And who could possibly find anything remotely berserk in a live show that incorporates kitchen utensils into the rhythm section?


"We've all got diverse interests," muses bassist Kai Fish, when we suggest that the band are all barking mad. "But it's not as if we bake our hats every morning. That would be obviously eccentric."

The sound of baking berets is

perhaps one of the few noises absent from the Jets' wonderful debut album 'Making Dens'. Recorded on Eel Pie Island and influenced by everyone from Talking Heads to the sound of planes flying overhead, it's a record of childlike wonder and infinite possibilities.

"When we decided to record on Eel Pie it opened up all these possibilities," says lead singer and pot thwacker Blaine Harrison. "We stumbled into lots of happy accidents that wouldn't happen in Abbey Road Studios. Things like the sound of church bells tolling over the river, or guys making tea."

Indeed, the inspirations that went into 'Making Dens' seem endless. To see where they got some of their weirder ideas from, we asked them to name their five favourite English eccentrics. Sit back and enjoy. And if you've got your trilby at the ready, it's gas mark five...



PATRICK WOLF

Will Rees (guitars): "There's nobody like him around at the moment, someone who actually lives and breathes through their music. He lives in a cottage in Hackney and gets up at 5am to go for longs walks in the Hackney Downs. Then he writes about nature and what he sees. It's just amazing when someone lives in a completely different way to everyone else."

Best track: 'Bloodbeat' (available on 'Lycanthropy' LP)



BRIAN ENO

Blaine Harrison (vocals, keyboards & percussion): "His music is so influential. You only have to look at him to see what makes him a great eccentric. There's footage of him on The Old Grey Whistie Test with a synthesiser and long flowing hair. He was like this glam-rock drag act, really. Musically, he did what bands are still trying to do now. It was so advanced." Best track: 'King's Lead Hat' (available on 'Before And After Science' LP)



MICHDRAKE

Henry Harrison (guitars): "He was only 26 when he died. His life is really a tale of someone who was incredibly shy and lonely. He was petrified of performing onstage and that effectively killed his career. Every time he got close to gaining a certain level of publicity, he'd throw it away by just walking out of gigs. But his songs still sound fresh today." Best track: 'One Of These Things First' (available on 'Bryter Layter' LP)



SHINGAI SHONTWA

Kai Fish (bass): "She's the lead singer in one of our favourite bands, the Noisettes. I can't think of anyone else who's so captivating and soulful and sexy onstage. She's prone to disappearing on occasions while recording stuff and she gets excited about really strange things. The new album is as weird as 'OK Computer'." Best track: 'Don't Give Up' (available on 'Three Moods Of The Noisettes' EP)



NOEL FIELDING

Kapil Trivedi (drums): "It's not music as such, but we all love The Mighty Boosh. And we've chosen Noel just because he does everything – the artwork, the music, the acting. He's an eccentric because... well, just look at him! He becomes all the characters and the accents are so funny and believable. On every tourbus there are bands watching it."

Meet Fall Out Boy's Pete Wentz, the mastermind behind the new US invasion



Overcast Kids who furtively stalk his every move, he is their bass-slinging emo godhead and you only have to dip a toe into the narcissistic netherworld that is MySpace to find hundreds of girls who would readily gouge out an eye if it meant they could stand in his presence for but a moment. Conversely, to the haters, he is the very manifestation of mainstreemo's manifold evils: eye-liner, pubescent angst and attention-seeking song titles such as 'I Liked You A Whole Lot More Before You Were A Fucking MySpace Whore'.

But to towering hip-hop impresario and Fall Out Boy fan Jay-Z, Wentz represents his brightest – and presumably his whitest – student. Why? Because over the past year, bolstered by the meteoric success of his day job, Wentz has taken a leaf out of the Rocfather's book and done the impossible: he has become poppunk's first bona fide entrepreneur. He is, for instance, the proud owner of a clothing line – Clandestine Industries, a business which also publishes Wentz's literary concerns, such as an impending novel recently co-written with The Academy Is...

singer William Beckett. He also runs a film production company (Bartskull Films) and, perhaps most intriguing of all, his own record label, Decaydance Records

Granted, the fact that a bass player in some band has started his own label is hardly the kind of story that sets pulses racing – after all, the history of rock is littered with dozens of successful artist-run labels (see below). What has set Decaydance apart is Wentz's

seemingly infallible A&R Midas touch, causing true-blood label folk across the US to grate their teeth in restrained annoyance. In fact, his talent at sourcing acts has not gone unnoticed by The Suits Upstairs.

"It's been weird," he coughs down the phone. "Because of Decaydance, I've had several major labels pleading, 'Please, move to New York and do A&R for us,' but that's not proactive for Fall Out Boy, obviously. That's not what interests me. The interesting thing about Decaydance is that I totally run the whole operation, I don't answer to anybody, and if something fails, it's on my shoulders."

So does he think that his position as a recording artist gives him an advantage over your typical grizzled

A&R stooge?

"Absolutely," he whispers,
conspiratorially. "From being on
tour and seeing bands play and
interacting with kids, I can
definitely tell the difference between
a band that have an actual buzz on
them compared to a band that have
created some fake MySpace buzz on
themselves. And the other thing is
that Fall Out Boy's fanbase are
really good at picking winners and
finding bands that lay in uncharted
territory. Being in a band is just that
extra resource I can tap into."

You only have to look at the overnight success of Panic! At The Disco to understand what the man is capable of. In fact, it was thanks to the Las Vegas quartet that Wentz decided there was more to life than swinging a bass around his neck and chasing skirt in the first place.

"I really had no aspirations to start a label to begin with – when I found The Academy Is... I just made sure they got signed to [Fall Out Boy's label home! Fueled By Ramen. But when I found Panic! At The Disco, I was like, 'Holy fuck! I have to work with this band!' It was from that moment on I realised I wanted to start a label."

Let there be no doubt, Decaydance is an emo label. But it's a fact mitigated by the diversity of talent Wentz has managed to sign, from P!@ TD's ostentatious Killers-style glitz to hotly-tipped backpack hiphop stars Gym Class Heroes, whose playful track "Taxi Driver" reads like a who's who of ghosts of an emo past (Sample verse: "I took Cutie for a ride in my Death Cab/She tipped me with a kiss, I dropped her off at the meth lab/Before she left she made a Dashboard Confessional").

"Decaydance is about working with bands that I've discovered, that I love, and that I want to bring to people's attention," says Wentz. "Every band on the label has to be somebody I believe in."

How exactly does he square his status as burgeoning emo-mogul with his position within Fall Out Boy?

"I think...," he starts hesitantly.
"I think they're pretty supportive
I think they're pretty supportive
I think everybody knows Fall Out
Boy are my main concern. But the
bigger problem is that as Fall Out
Boy gets bigger, how much that will
impact the artists on the label.
I don't want it to ever get to a point
where people are saying, "This band
is big because simply because
they're associated with Pete from
Fall Out Boy.' And I know that's
definitely a danger."



side from the deaf or those in a level of denial up there with David Irving's idiot pronouncements on the Holocaust, everyone's aware that we live in

great times for music. But while rock has been bursting forth with boys ready to put a foot on a monitor, the only woman of this decade to make waves has been Karen O of the Yeah Yeah Yeahs, Until now, that is.

Largely, it was Karen O who inspired the latest crop of great girl-rock bands (including The

Like, The Long Blondes and Suffrajets) but it's Be Your Own Pet who, with this debut, appear most fully formed, most ready to rule over the whole scene, not just some spurious media-invented girl-rock adjunct. And it's their singer Jemina Pearl who's set to inspire a whole host of new bands, like Karen O and Courtney Love before her.

Her band's self-titled debut carries her stamp, with deep imprints of ass-kicking

cool, while she's the foghorn focus for their snotty rock'n'roll. She's what anyone bored of boring, boring boys has long been waiting for, When she screams, "I'm an independent muthafucker!" on 'Bunk Trunk Skunk', you can almost hear the stampede of girls making a beeline for the rehearsal room. And, when she voices her adoration of hardcore gods Bad Brains on 'Let's Get Sandy (Big Problem)' with a squeal and a snarl, you can almost see the blood and guts of those boys trampled underfoot. She personifies everything great rock'n'roll should be; sexy, riotous, and dangerous. And with more air in her lungs than an overinflated Zeppelin.

See, much of the reason for bothering with BYOP lies in the absolute glory of hearing

Jemina Pearl personifies everything great rock'n'roll should be: sexy, riotous and dangerous

> Pearl succeed in making every lyrical couplet she spews forth sound as if she's been drinking cider since birth and is ready to hurl... anytime... now! Songs like 'Bog' might otherwise sound like kidnapped retards being given guitars and big fuck-off amps for the first time (and that's no criticism - this is a record smeared with the memory of The Stooges' sloppy soul after all), but it's Pearl's very being that makes them sound fun.

And, if there's a reason for this record's existence, it's to showcase Be Your Own Pet's relentless pursuit of fun. If it wasn't enough that they've got a song entitled 'Fuuuuuun' (which sounds like all those ace Elastica singles souished together into a minuteand-a-bit-long blast of stroppy clatter-punk), then the likes of 'Adventure' ("We are adventuring/We are adventurers") or the B-movie rumble of 'Girls On TV' (which sounds like a Cramps song doused in a bucket of costume blood) suggest this is a hand with little time for musical evolution. the fourth chord, or any of those other boring, boring things boring, boring boys in bands talk about.

Of course, there are boys at work here too, and what fine labour they toil. You can hear

Jonas Stein's guitar snapping away in the background and Nathan Vasquez's bass rumbling underfoot, while Jamin Orrall's drums take Be Your Own Pet's songs and beat and pound them ever, ever onward. Yet the bands that will spring up in the wake of Be Your Own Pet's dazzling debut will do so because of Jemina Pearl's burning-bright star. Here's one chord, here's another, and here's the first inspiring rock'n'roll

woman for a half-decade - now form a band. Let's make way for the second wave of boy / grrrl revolution... now!



My Life In The Bush Of Ghosts

n 2006 freedom of speech actually means you're free to speak about almost anything as long as you remember the correct thing to say. Terrified and hysterical self-hating Christian fascists parade up and down outside provincial theatres objecting to a piece of faintly amusing musical theatre. Lunatic Muslim extremists clearly weighed down with way too much fucking time on their hands torch Norwegian mobile phone shops when there's nothing Danish left to burn. Meanwhile, the rest of us, who realise that religions are just stories that some people are too frightened to leave behind with Father Christmas and the Tooth Fairy are left wondering where this madness began. Well, some of it began here.

in 1981 Byrne and Eno's groove-based, collaborative album introduced the waiting world to music made with "found" sound ie samples, samples of preachers, musicians, exorcists at work, natural noises, radio broadcasts, whatever the duo found inspring. One of the tracks on the original album, 'Ou'ran', featured a recording of Algerian Muslims chanting prayers and was a direct influence on the layered heat-isms. of DJ Shadow. Sadly, it's no longer here. In fact, in an attempt to appease the World Council of Islam, it's been missing for the last 24 years. Now, perhaps more than ever. we should mourn the loss of that piece, for 'My Life...' hums with a sort of rich religious, almost animistic fervour (on 'Midnight In Glory' the vocal is clipped so brutally it's like



the person is speaking in tongues), a heat and purpose that places sex and life and death all in together.

Nobody had ever made a record that sounded like this before, though plenty have since. There can't be many records that have influenced Japan, Coldcut, Kanye West, KLF and Public Enemy equally. As far from Byrne's clipped, asexual shtick as it is from Eno's cadaver-cold ambient experimentia, 'My Life...' is blood warm throughout. 'Come With Us' pulses hungrily 'The Jezebel Spirit' is taut and dynamic and was resurrected as an early acid house favourite, 'America Is Waiting' posits itself around the perimeter of the then very new world of hip-hop and ends up right at home next to Afrika Bambaata's Kraftwerkflavoured 'Planet Rock' from 1982.

Probably the greatest influence on the record was the Afro-funk sounds of Fela Kuti. On a trip to Africa, Eno was surprised to find the Afrobeat king listening to the same Talking Heads records he was trying to get away from. The world was getting

smaller every day, while culture, music and religion were getting crushed together in ways no-one had thought possible. A track like 'Regiment' may be a quarter of a century old, but its unafraid simplicity means it hasn't dated by a day; one superheavy bassline, one simple, head-nodding drum pattern, one ecstatic sample of Lebanese mountain singer, Dunya Yusin, that's pretty much it.

In 2006 terrible liberties are being taken with our liberties, yet no-one seems to have anything to say, any protest to make. Is it really going to fall to a record made during Ronald Reagan's reign to show us all the way forward? Rob Fitznatrick

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

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

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Kele and co's new material looks set to take them to the next level

ecently, it seems the whole world has finally come round to NME's way of thinking, dragging Indie bands - Kaisers, Monkeys, etc - into the mainstream with gongs and gold discs, claiming our heroes for their own and generally chasing the pack. But while all of this has been going on, Bloc Party have quietly sold a million records, criss-crossed the globe playing gigs, and set about planning their second album. Now, playing a fan-club only mini-tour of the UK to showcase 12 new songs, one of our most prolific and brilliant bands have upped the ante, by winding their live show so tightly, it's practically ready to explode. From the packed balcony at tonight's

400-capacity sweatbox you can only catch a glimpse of singer Kele Okereke's hair, and downstairs is just a swollen sea of bodies, jumping, cheering and flashing cameras. Bloc Party are playing five different new songs each night, to gather crowd reaction and experiment with tweaks and changes to their forthcoming album. As far away from snipey accusations of the band being aloof as you can get, it's the gig equivalent of those childhood *Choose Your Own Adventure* interactive books where the reader decides the outcome of the story.

Opener 'Waiting For The 7.18' will have no trouble making it if the reaction tonight is anything to go by. It leads to a mass singalong for 'She's Hearing Voices' and a subsequent stampede for 'Banquet'. Kele stops to announce that he hopes the next song will "bring everyone together", before the first few quiet lines of 'This Modern Love'. It's clear at this

moment that Kele is still sensitive to everything - from the tinlest mood change to the reaction of the crowd and that these old songs are as

New song 'Hunting For Witches' appears to be the fans' favourite (backed by rave reviews on the band's forums). It's a heavier, more electronic song than their usual punk-funk meets Joy Division sound, while 'Uniform' initially takes a slower turn.

Opening with Russell's yearning guitar riff (like the offspring of Johnny Buckland and Jonny Greenwood) it's winningly melancholic.

The jitter-rock of 'Like Eating Glass' gets the best reaction from the fevered crowd, until a searing 'So Here We Are' sends it all through the roof. Kele leaves the stage to play guitar among the throng on the steps, clearly enraptured by the rare intimacy of the night, throwing in added yelps for good measure.

The right ends with two more new songs, one of which ('Atonement') sounds like an epic, Cure-influenced rewrite of 'This Modern Love', with pulsing drums and a spoken word beginning. Even with the new

The new songs are ambitious, inspired, hook-laden and highly danceable

material still in progress, it's clear which direction Bloc Party are heading in: still ambitious, unpredictable, inspired, hookladen and highly danceable.

No-one could argue against the fact that British music is at an all-time high. Bloc Party might not be the only band around who show promise in spades and capture the hearts and imaginations of the alternative generation, but for a band to be this prolific, passionate and possess the unique bonus that your dad has never heard of them... that's practically unheard of. On the strength of tonight's show alone, we'll take Bloc Party over any other British band any night of the week. **Cat Goodwin**

f it ain't broke, don't fix it," my uncle used to say. "It's our little secret" was another favourite, but let's stick with the first. Tonight is all about good old-fashioned scally-rock. There's nothing fancy about The Rifles, but they're the architects of a brighter, bolder grot'n'roll London sound. Like urchinrock Polyfilla they squirt into the Libertines-shaped holes and expand to fill the cracks their forefathers left behind.

It isn't anywhere remotely near groundbreaking, but with a Top 20 hit to their name, The Rifles are more than good enough for a packed-out crowd - including Miquita Popworld and her pissed-up chums.

New single 'Repeat Offender' has been recorded every night and offered for download on the band's website, but, being a Jam-esque two-step about mates that get pissed and disgrace themselves (yawn), it isn't the highlight of the set. No, that accolade goes to 'She's Got Standards' both for its Specials-scrapping-with-The-Strokes clatter and the heartwarming lyrics: "If the NME say you're so cool and they really like your style/She'll be down south, Top Ten in her mouth within the blink of an eye... 'till the new band arrives". Nice.

Elsewhere, last year's single 'Peace And Quiet' is way too sedate, and loses its way in the flurry of newer songs. But the likes of 'Hometown Blues' show how much The Rifles have grown, coming complete with Status Quo-style poses from guitarists Rob Pyne and Lucus Crowther and a stage invasion that includes support band Milburn's singer Joe Carnall and his



maracas. By the time they resurface for 'No Love Lost' crowd and band have swapped places and the whole thing collapses into a sweaty loved-up heap: final proof that The Rifles are unbroken Tim Chester

Do you get nervous before a show? "Yes but the rider helps. We just get drunk."


