Back to the future

After their 2014 performance on the Late Show With David Letterman went viral, Future Islands' world blew up. As they gear up to release fifth album 'The Far Field', Samuel T. Herring talks survival...

SITTING AT THE TOP OF a flight of stairs, with the winter night air blowing in through the backstage fire exit, Samuel T. Herring takes a distracted drag on a cigarette. It's five minutes after Future Islands' first European show in 18 months. and it wasn't quite what the singer had planned.

A couple of hours before showtime at Copenhagan's Jazzhouse, he came down with food poisoning - "a dodgy piece of sandwich meat" - so spent the gig concentrating not on the but on not throwing up on stage.

Not that the 300 people at the intimate show would've known. Herring lunged, growled and stalked his way through the performance of 'Seasons (Waiting On You)' with the same spectacular moves that caught so many people's attention on the Late Show with David Letterman in 2014. "I'll be OK." he says afterwards, looking pale. "I just need a minute."

The trio are used to waiting for their moment. After Letterman. they say many people thought they were a new band. In fact, they started out 14 years ago as the ludicrously named Art Lord & The Self Portraits. Then they formed Future Islands,



moved to Baltimore and released three excellent but underground albums. By the time that TV moment came along, they'd slept on countless mates' floors, played 800 shows and made their breakthrough album 'Singles' without a record label.

But their TV appearance changed everything. "That's still a surreal moment," says Herring. "It's crazy that people are still talking about it. The biggest challenge is hoping it doesn't become a defining moment. You want to push past that, but it's undeniable what it's done for us, and we're proud of it. At 30, we finally got our spotlight moment."

Relishing their new-found audience, they didn't so much grab the opportunity as tackle it to the floor. They were used to playing, but the success 'Singles' brought was another level. They toured for 22 months, playing over 250 gigs, picking up famous fans like Noel Gallagher and Blondie along the way. But the brutal schedule took its toll, particularly on Herring, who collapsed from exhaustion at least once on the road. The band took their first break in almost 10 years.

eturning home was odd. There was some normality for bandmates William Cashion (bass) and Gerrit Welmers (keys), both in long-term relationships, but Herring found himself back at his apartment "alone in my room". He'd been gone for two years and life was different. His own relationship hadn't worked out. "Not having that, I was like: 'Why am I here?'" he says. "I could be anywhere in the world. Being on the road feels more like home, as I know on the road I mean something to people. On the road, I have purpose."

Herring is a devastatingly honest guy. When it comes to discussing his feelings openly "the filter came off" years ago. Like in his lyrics, in person, Herring is confessional, compassionate and disarmingly trusting. He's sensitive, too, taking to heart the band's press ("I'm not usually amused that I'm like Barry from EastEnders or things like that"). But Herring's willingness to be vulnerable is his greatest strength. On tracks like 'Light House', from the 2014 album 'Singles', he's written about depression and his own suicidal contemplations. People have "gravitated towards" his honesty, he says.

There's hardship to be found on new album 'The Far Field', like on lead track 'Ran' and standout moment 'Through The Roses', a song written on a lone car journey ("trying to cool off, get away from my own mind"). It's a melancholy record you can dance to. But perhaps more heart-warming is the story of the band themselves. For the first time in their career, they've made music knowing loads of people are waiting to hear it. "'Singles' taught me that a record could bring so much more than you expected," says Herring. "With most things in life, I try to keep expectations low so I'm not disappointed. But I really do believe in this record. Hopefully it's a home for a lot of people." **Greg Cochrane**




record, but one that's basically 37 minutes

Toronto artist Lydia Ainsworth gets all gothy on her sublime second album



AS THE CLANGING

keyboard chords that open 'The Road' ring out like sinister church bells, it's clear that Canadian composer and songwriter Lydia Ainsworth's second album is going to be something very special indeed. Following a spate of recent pop culture nods to a hip new activism-based kind of witchcraft - indie movie The Love Witch and Lana Del Rey's anti-Trump spell for starters this seems to be the sound of lush electronic pop throwing its pointy hat into the ring

"Astral mirrors guide the fall / Let's go on and on and on once more," murmurs Ainsworth, oozing sensuality, strength and supernatural sass over dark, unctuous beats. There are hints of Bat For Lashes' gloom and Chvrches' wondrous way with a synth-driven melody here, but Ainsworth's voice is indelibly her own. 'Afterglow' plugs into the same moody, mystical vibe, while lyrics about "the queen of angels" pitch this as a deeply female record, one that carries with it a womanly warmth.

Classically trained, the breadth of Ainsworth's talent is laid bare on 'Darling Of The Afterglow'. As well as towering gothic electropop, we also get stone cold bangers like 'Open Doors'. Boasting a majestic, beat-driven chorus that sounds like Katy Perry guesting on a Yeasayer track, it's a luxuriantly produced track, full of breathy glitches, velvety violins and layer upon layer of intrigue. If you're looking for a song to get utterly lost in this spring, then your search has come to an end.

The same goes for the meditative but massive 'Into The Blue', which has steamy hints of The Weeknd, while 'Spinning' comes over like Kate Bush after pulling an all-nighter at the Warehouse Project. If anything, an aching cover of Chris Isaak's 1990 'Wicked Game' - however beautiful seems a touch unnecessary, muddling Ainsworth's own vision with someone else's words and melody. Lydia Ainsworth has more than enough talent not to bother with other people's material. Leonie Cooper

How to turn your hidden treasure into a summer of fun

With festival line-ups being released on a weekly basis, you're probably dreaming of a summer spent watching your favourite bands in the sun. But with the average festival costing around £200 a ticket, it's not cheap. All is not lost - it's easy to raise funds by using eBay



PHONE

When you get a new phone, it's tempting to toss the old one into a drawer and forget about it. Dig it out, because smartphones, such as the iPhone and Samsung Galaxy can still sell for decent money, and more recent models can run into the hundreds. When selling, include three or four photos illustrating the condition of your phone. If you have the charger, make sure it switches on, and include as many original accessories as you can find.

CONSOLES

We all know retro consoles are collectable, but ones you might not consider to be nostalgia pieces - like the Nintendo DS or Sonv PSP - might still get you £25 and up, particularly if you have boxes, games and accessories to bundle in. Show everything you're including in photos, and test the console to make sure it works. Some games can get decent prices on their own, so search for titles you're thinking of including and figure out if they're worth listing separately.



YOUR IPOD

If you're the sort of person who once slavishly loaded music onto an iPod classic, you might find that now - with streaming, YouTube and Apple Music - you don't use the old one at all. In fact, Apple stopped making them, which means that they've held their value. Expect to get over £100 for the ones with the biggest storage.



They won't make you a fortune on their own, but some are worth a surprising amount. Make a dent in your festival fund totaliser by selling a few you can bear to part with. eBay's app makes listing similar items quick and easy, and it will even suggest an auction starting price or a Buy It Now price.



T-SHIRTS

Merch you bought at gigs may be worth more than you think: some official tour T-shirts can reach prices in the hundreds. Generally, the more popular the band and the older the shirt, the higher the price. But that doesn't mean you can't sell your old Arctic Monkeys tees. When selling any clothes, consider getting I someone to model them for the photos, and list all the sizing information in the item description.

All guns blazing

Ben Wheatley's trigger-happy shootout film is a Tarantino-esque bloodbath

THANK GOODNESS FOR Ben Wheatley. The mastermind behind modern British film classics Kill List, Sightseers and A Field In England made his name via a wonderfully warped approach that recalled Alfred Hitchcock directing a particularly perverse episode of The League

Of Gentlemen. It didn't take long for him to catch the eye of the mainstream, and last year a s**t-ton of money was thrown at him to create a confused but stylish adaptation of JG Ballard's dystopian thriller High-Rise.

Free Fire marks his first official foray into A-list territory. For a start, the film is set in the States – Boston, to be exact – but was actually filmed in Sussex. There are also big name American actors like Brie Larson and Armie Hammer accompanying Wheatley's gruff, unlikely muse Michael Smiley, Peaky Blinders' Cillian Murphy and Control's Sam Riley, suggesting that the

film is aiming for some serious box-office business. Wheatley has also softened up his trademark weirdness as a concession to the conventions of the A-list, but there are still plenty of odd thrills – and gruesome moments – to be found here.

Written by Wheatley and his wife Amy Jump, this tense action flick is set in the late 1970s and sees some shady criminals – in fittingly flammable postdisco attire – meeting up in a warehouse to swap lots of money for lots of guns. Unsurprisingly, things do not go to plan. Like a Harold Pinter stage play crossed with a Quentin Tarantino movie,

all of the action takes place in the one grimy location. Like Tarantino too, the soundtrack selections are on point, with John Denver's cheesy pop-folk ballad 'Annie's Song (You Fill Up My Senses)' used to stunning effect. If cinematic gunfire is your bag, then this trigger-happy flick will delight and rattle your eardrums in equal measure.

Although Free Fire isn't without its flaws – the relentless mocking of a South African character's accent swiftly becomes very dry indeed – the frenetic pace and outstanding gore make for an exhilarating 90 minutes.

Stefflon

Rising MC who wants to be "a mega, mega star"

TOUGH, TALENTED AND about to take over, Stephanie Allen is your new favourite Moschino-clad, rainbow-haired. teetotal rapper. "I don't want to sound like anyone," she states of her fiery brand of dancehallinfused hip-hop, which casually landed on an unsuspecting British public last year via her intoxicating, in-your-face mixtape 'Real Ting', which features the irrepressibly badass single '16 Shots'. "As a female rapper you have to be bossy with it," she explains of her nobulls**t, females-first stance, which follows in the feisty footsteps of Lil' Kim and Nicki Minaj. But she's not just here to entertain; she's here to inspire: "I want people to hear me and feel like they can be bold as well."

Currently an Essex girl, she

was one of seven siblings born in Birmingham to Jamaican parents. Raised in Holland on a diet of MTV Base and the reggae her folks played around the house, she headed back to the UK in her teens and followed school with short-lived stints in hairdressing and cakedecorating. One day she decided to ditch the bleach and icing and take music seriously as a career option. "That's when I found my sound," she explains. "I was singing R&B before I was rapping and I never really enjoyed it. But when I started rapping I was like, 'This is sick, I'm actually alright at rapping!"

Since then there've been collaborations with Giggs, Wretch 32 and Lethal B, and ambitions for the future are high. When asked where she sees herself in five years' time, Stefflon Don has no time for false modesty. "Definitely a mega, mega star," she grins. "Someone who has the most Grammys ever known to mankind." Roll on 2022.

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
