RIP Chester Bennington

The Linkin Park singer was a pivotal figure in the 21st Century US rock scene

CHESTER BENNINGTON, the singer in Linkin Park who died last week aged 41, was a pivotal figure in the 21st century US rock scene and a leading light of the nu-metal genre, selling over 70 million albums and working with an array of acts from Jay Z to Mötley Crüe and Santana. Yet his work was driven by his internal struggles – a troubled artist, he battled alcohol and drug abuse issues and spoke in interviews about being a victim of child abuse.

Born in Phoenix, Arizona, on March 20, 1976, Chester was raised by his mother, a nurse, and his detective father, who investigated child abuse cases, until his parents divorced and his father gained custody of him. His childhood was troubled; suffering sexual abuse by an older male friend from the age of seven until he was 13. Chester turned to drugs such as opium. amphetamine and cocaine, and was bullied at school - "I was knocked around like a rag doll, for being skinny and different," he said. He took solace in artistic work such as poetry, drawing and writing songs, and the music of Depeche Mode and Stone Temple Pilots.

Aged 17, Bennington moved in with his mother and began his music career singing in a band called Sean Dowdell And His Friends, and later, with Dowdell, Grey Daze, who recorded three Chester Bennington at 2007's Projekt Revolution, a festival hosted by Linkin Park

bums during the 1990s. In 1996, he married his first wife Samantha Olit, with whom he had a son, Draven. Leaving Grey Daze in 1998, Bennington was ready to quit music when Jeff Blue, vice-president of A&R at Zomba Music, gave him the chance to audition as lead singer with the band that would become Linkin Park. Finding a creative bond with co-vocalist 'N Mike Shinoda, Linkin Park

US Billboard chart with 2000 debut album 'Hybrid Theory'. Their amalgam of hard rock, rap and electronica, combined with Bennington's lyrics about his parents' divorce and drug abuse, helped the band become a culture-shifting phenomenon, selling 30 million copies of the album within two years, making it the biggest-selling debut album of the 21st Century so far.

Linkin Park's standing as heroes to a generation of rap-metal fans has barely waned since. Their 2003 follow-up 'Meteora', featuring global hit Linkin Park in 2017

'Numb', sold 27 million copies - the third bestselling album of 2003 - and gained the band further critical acclaim when several songs were mashed-up with Jay Z tracks on the collaborative 'Collision Course' EP; they would go on to perform their joint hit 'Numb/ Encore' together at Live 8 in Philadelphia. Four of their subsequent five albums hit US Number One, including this year's 'One More Light'. Linkin Park have enjoyed almost 20 years as one of the biggest US rock bands, headlining major festivals around the world and encouraging new acts such as My Chemical Romance and HIM by taking them on their Projekt Revolution tours.

Bennington also took time out from the band to indulge in several offshoots. Around the time he divorced his first wife, later to marry former Playboy model Talinda Bentley, he co-founded a "darker and moodier" band called Dead By Sunrise, which released album 'Out Of Ashes' in 2009, and fulfilled his ambition of fronting Stone Temple Pilots, replacing Scott Weiland as singer in 2013.

During his time in Linkin Park, Bennington kicked his drink and drug habits and appeared in several films including *Saw 3D: The Final Chapter, Crank* and the sequel *Crank: High Voltage*.

In 2017 interviews for the 'One More Light' album, Bennington opened up about the issues that inspired the album. He spoke specifically about the song 'Heavy', saying, "When I'm opening that song saying, 'I don't like my mind right now,'

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that's f**king real. It is not a safe place for me to be unless I'm doing what I need to do taking care of myself, being real, being open, getting it out, taking all the steps to make myself whole; then it's a pretty safe neighbourhood, but it goes bad real fast. I recommend that everyone goes and writes their problems down on a piece of paper, takes it outside and f**king burns that s**t. Talk to somebody about it. I'm fortunate enough to be a member of some 12-step programs, and we get in a room with a bunch of people who don't know each other and we all talk about our lives... I know exactly who I am, I know exactly what I'm made of and I'm totally happy with it. So it's great to be able to be doing what I do."

Bennington was found dead in his Palos Verdes Estates home in California, from an apparent suicide. He leaves behind a wife and six children.

The return of Mr Brightside

After five years away, The Killers are back with new album 'Wonderful Wonderful'. Frontman Brandon Flowers talks making peace with his past

You said new track 'The Man' looks back on the arrogance of your past. Are we talking about your early days? "Around about the time that The Killers started. I quess - that's where 'The Man' harkens back to, and years after as well. I can live with it, you know. It was nice to sort of go in and inhabit that character. I think a good chunk of this album is making peace with that. I've been cleaning it up for a long time. I don't think that was really a great representation, an honest representation of who I am. It came from a place of insecurity and I would just puff my chest out and say things and put a lot of negativity out there. I basically came to regret that, and I'm sure a lot of people can identify with that."

You write a lot about 'real' American life. Have you been inspired by the impact of politics in the US? "I'm turning it around. I'm

"I'm turning it around. I'm turning the pen around on myself. I'm looking in the mirror on this record and focusing a lot on my own personal experiences. What I like about it is that the songs that I love to perform the most are songs that sort of went into that territory and connected with people. Even 'Mr Brightside' was a personal song. They come from those real places. This is the more tender

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side. I'm more bare than I've ever been."

You've said that your last album 'Battle Born' just "wasn't good enough". Do you still feel that way?

"I think we were a little bit aimless on 'Battle Born'. We were searching. You're not always gonna touch what you're reaching for, and we didn't quite get there. I don't mean to take anything away from it; you know, there are songs on it that I love, but as a whole I wasn't very happy with it. This record is just different. There's a direction, and I think we got there. I hope that people recognise that and feel that."

The Killers release 'Wonderful Wonderful' on September 20, before a full UK and Ireland tour in November

Judd Apatow (*The 40-Year-Old Virgin* and *Knocked Up*) is back with *The Big Sick*, a true tale about a couple dealing with racial differences and illness

What Alex Turner's new beard really means

SO NOW WE FINALLY know the real reason Alex Turner moved to Los Angeles. It wasn't to work on a killer new Arctic Monkeys album or for the easy access to delicious tacos; it was to use the sweet California sunshine to help his chin follicles flourish and grow a bloody man beard.

Last week, a blurry selfie taken by some holidaying Brits emerged, featuring the frontman at a hip LA bar sporting brand-new facial fuzz. The ever-boyish Turner has finally become a man and he's got the stubble to prove it; part Satan on his summer holiday, part Mr Tumnus at the Ace Hotel, but full legend. Sure, on the scale of rock 'n' roll beards Turner's topiary is a mere tiddler – ZZ Top's Billy Gibbons and Slayer's Kerry King would laugh him off the tour bus – but his commitment to growing would make Monty Don proud.

THE ONE FOR MIDNIGHT ROOFTOP SNOGS WOLF ALICE Don't Delete The Kisses

Why it's great: Here, Wolf Alice conjure a twilit cityscape of sound, ideal for pumping from that roof terrace you only get to use for three weeks a year. Summeriest moment: Singer Ellie Rowsell dreaming of giddily covering a notebook with the words "you rock my world" like What they say: "I wanted to make one of those 'head out the window on a long drive' tunes. I wanted to try my hand at a hold-nothing-back love song" - Ellie Rowsell.

THE ONE FOR WHEN IT'S TOO HOT LANA DEL REY FT. A\$AP ROCKY Summer Bummer

Why it's great: This saucy slow jam is summer at its sultriest, for those nights when you have all the windows open and a fan constantly pointed at your sweaty bits. Old musical sparring partners Del Rey and A\$AP are never anything less than steamy. Summeriest moment: Lana's laid-back lines, on which she sounds even drowsier than usual. Get her antihistamines, stat. They say: "There probably are a lot of tracks somewhere that we're both on over the years. We do 'em and forget 'em and if one's better than all of them, like this one, we try to put it out" – Lana Del Rey.



THE ONE FOR #SUMMERBAE

DJ KHALED FT. RIHANNA Wild Thoughts

Why it's great: Rihanna does most of the work on this sizzling flamenco track, and Rihanna is the greatest pop star in the world. But then there's the OTT Santana sample and the smoky contribution from Bryson Tiller. That's some strangely sexy alchemy at work right there. Summeriest moment: The sultry Spanish guitar line underpinning each of the verses. 'Despacito', eat your heart out. They say: "I had this idea for years. I wanted for it to be the right time, but also to make sure I put the right artist on there and I knew for me to flip this record I wanted Rihanna. I didn't have a Plan B" - DJ Khaled.

THE ONE FOR TEQUILA-FUELLED NIGHTS LORDE Supercut

Why it's great: If you're too short on time to listen to all of Lorde's masterful 'Melodrama', make do with its literal 'Supercut', which distils Lorde's widescreen world of post-break-up emotion into one dancefloor-ready night. Summeriest moment: The rhythm of the piano line on the chorus here sounds like Whigfield's 'Saturday Night', and that was summery AF. They say: "I wanted it to feel like you were through the wall from a party. I liked the idea of this party leaking over" - Lorde.



THE ONE FOR A SUMMER WEDDING ARCADE FIRE

Everything Now

Why it's great: It sounds like ABBA. Oh, and the panpipes. And that rousing "*nah-nah*" bit. **Summeriest moment:** That piano line. We knew Arcade Fire were classy, but this kind of shimmering majesty is some next-level shiz.

They say: "It was kind of an accident to be honest. I was working on a remix of ['The Coffee Cola Song' by Francis Bebey] and just ended up writing a completely different song around it without even thinking about it" – Win Butler.



THE ONE FOR POST-BANANA BOAT SEASICKNESS MURA MASA FT. A\$AP ROCKY Love\$ick

Why it's great: This tropical smooth cut is built on the sort of house piano, marimba and terrace horn blasts that'll make your local Club Fingerbang feel like Rio Carnival.

Summeriest moment: When the steel drums kick in. I mean, when did you last see someone playing steel drums in drizzle?

They say: "It's been amazing for me to see people, real people care about this, beyond numbers ticking up on the internet" – Mura Masa.

THE ONE FOR THE IRISH PUB ED SHEERAN Galway Girl

Why it's great: 'Galway Girl' is either the most irritating song of the year or the most fun you can have with your felt Guinness hat on, depending on which side of the Great 'Galway Girl' Debate you're on - an issue that's split the country more than Brexit. Summeriest moment: Has any line said 'p**sed-up summer fling' more than "I walked her home. then she took me inside / To finish some Doritos and another bottle of wine"? They say: "... There's 400 million people in the world that say they're Irish, even if they're not... And those type of people are going to f**king love it"

THE ONE FOR ROMANTIC BEACH FROLICS MILEY CYRUS

Why it's great: It's a folkish frolic that perfectly captures the romance of snuggling up in the surf at sunset (even if lines like "The sky's so blue in Malibu, next to you" don't sound quite as exotic in Walton-on-the-Naze). Summeriest moment: "We are just like the waves that flow back and forth" Miley muses, and who among us can say we haven't thought the same while dosed up on ketamine in Ayia Napa? They say: "Why not put the power back in my relationship and say, 'This is how I feel'? – Miley Cyrus.

PERRY & BIG SEAN Feels

Why it's great: With this cast list, 'Feels' was never going to be anything less than epic. Catchier than chlamydia on Love Island. Summeriest moment: When Perry chimes in with "Don't be afraid to catch feels" and you're convinced she's saying "Don't be afraid to catch fish". We love flicking our rod too, Katy! Bad Liar

THE ONE FOR PLAYING IT COOL TOVE STYRKE Say My Name

Why it's great: The Swedish star's new tune loops around a laid-back ukulele line, but with its perky beats and vocal flourishes it also manages to be a total bop - proving you can have your deliciously chilled ice-cream cake and eat it too. Summeriest moment: The pre-chorus synth screech - it's like a funky pop macaw. They say: "This is the best thing I've ever created and I'm so proud of it. This song is basically just, 'I like you, can we just be together, don't complicate it'" - Tove Styrke.

THE ONE FOR STORMY NIGHTS LIL UZI VERT XO Tour Llif3

Why it's great: The Philly rapper found fame on this languid trap banger, which has been the sound of the summer since it was released back in March. Moody as anything, it's as close as a sticky summer's evening. Why it's great: The bassline on this thing is so funky you could smell it all the way from Brisbane. Musically heirs to The B-52's, Yeah Yeah Yeahs or CSS, their lyrics blast a needy BF for cooking elaborate breakfasts and wanting to talk all the time. Summeriest moment: Just before the final chorus, where vocalist Janet Planet commands: "Get down!" At this, reader, thou shalt indeed get down. They say: "For us, the band is kind of this new and exciting thing where the whole point is about dancing and getting down" - Janet Planet.

Selfridges' Ultralounge, the world's first in-store music venue, looks to put gigging back on the map


K, HERE'S THE BAD news. The Music Venue Trust charity estimates that 40 per cent of grassroots venues – small, intimate live music spaces in which emerging artists can cut their teeth – have disappeared in the past 10 years. This dizzying decline has been attributed to a perfect storm of increased rent prices and restrictive licensing laws.

The good news? The *Music Matters at Selfridges* campaign hopes to help with three months of in-store events in London, Birmingham and Manchester, plus a host of other musical events such as DJ sets and a pop-up record store.

In London, artists including the indie band Ten Fé, south London rappers 67 and R&B star Mabel will perform in the Ultralounge, a multidiscipline performance space and the world's first department store music venue, with 20 per cent of profits donated to the Music Venue Trust. Some of the artists involved told NME why Music Matters.

EO DUNCAN TEN FÉ SINGER-SONGWRITER

Forty per cent of grassroots venues have gone in the last 10 years. Could that be a problem for bands in the future?

It's already changed the live music scene, as fewer bands can go about those early stages by developing in a live arena. Nowadays, you attract attention by setting things up online, rather than getting out and learning whether a song works live.

Could that mean buzzy bands are quickly thrust into playing big shows that they're not necessarily prepared for?

Yeah, it puts artists in a place where they're trying to deliver the final product from the word go. Everyone grows when they play a lot live. It's a big thing to be losing that way of developing.

What's been a standout show for Ten Fé?

Bonnaroo Festival in Tennessee. It was just dangerous, man. We were like five Forrest Gumps running towards 3,000 Americans! But we could never have done that show unless we'd done 40 smaller shows during our West Coast tour in the three months before it.

Favourite grassroots venue: **Oslo, Hackney**

We used to live just around the corner and walk up there twice a week to busk. We used to say, "We're f**king definitely gonna play there one day." When we finally did, it was a very deep thing.

DIMZY MC IN RAP CREW 67

Have you faced challenges when attempting to book shows?

They say the urban events are gonna cause violence or destruction of the venues, so they lock it off. People can't really progress because of how many restrictions and boundaries there are against urban music.

What's been your best experience in a small venue?

That was in Bedford in 2015. We didn't go there in the best of cars - it was an old Hyundai - and we had to park around the corner so that no girls would see it. At that time 'Skengman' had just come out so people were buzzing for that. That stage was one of the tightest stages I've ever been on. It was crazy!

Are you concerned about the decline of grassroots live spaces?

Yeah, it doesn't let anvone have their little start-up in their career. Everyone needs to help each other to improve the situation, to be honest. They need to make these small venues that will allow all these other artists to climb up and reach the big venues.

Favourite grassroots venue: **Blueprint, Leicester**

Bugzy Malone was there, Giggs was there. The energy was crazy and it was amazing seeing people from another city saying our lyrics religiously.





MABEL MCVEY **R&B SINGER**

Why did you decided to get involved in the Music Matters campaign?

I got a taste of being a performer in small venues and I think it's really important to have those opportunities. It really helped my confidence. Standing in a room of 50 people who aren't even there to listen to you - that's terrifying.

What is it about grassroots live spaces that makes them so vital to emerging talent?


If you're young, you don't have a manager and you don't know where to start, those small spaces are important for a sense of community and finding like-minded people. I met a lot of people that way and ended up writing music with them. [The current situation] is a tragedy.

What's been a really memorable live experience in a small venue?

Notting Hill Arts Club was incredible; it was superintimate. At the time I thought, "Is it a bit embarrassing that I'm playing [in such a small place]?", but actually it was really important to my career.

Favourite grassroots venue: Moth Club, east London

It's one of those places with a great atmosphere. It's got these funny glittery curtains; there's a bit of a Liberace vibe. It feels like a Las Vegas show.

Hollywood forever

A banquet of lush orchestration and high-end guests



LANA DEL REY IS many things to many people, not least herself. She is at once the doomed starlet, a Trumphexing love witch, a

'gangster Nancy Sinatra' and, most importantly, a hugely successful global recording artist with four major label albums under her slinky belt. Her moody, vintage-indebted sound is now so distinct that it's practically its own sub-genre,



defined by its drowsy doo-wop stylings, laced with trap production and film-scoreworthy theatrics.

'Lust For Life' deals with themes that'll be familiar to Lana devotees; faded Hollywood glamour, skewed Americana and terrible love. But

this time around, Lana is even more grandiose than usual, with lush, sweeping orchestration draped elegantly over each of the album's 16 tracks. An epic

proposition, it's her longest album yet and starts as it means to go on with the shimmering, cinematic 'Love'. A post-modernist

playground, the iconic pop cultural references run wild throughout. 'Cherry' knowingly quotes Patsy Cline's 1961 country standard 'I Fall To Pieces'; 'Coachella – Woodstock in My Mind' namedrops Led Zeppelin's 'Stairway To Heaven'; the Sean Ono Lennon-featuring 'Tomorrow Never Came' is an all-out love song to The Beatles – and Elton John; and album closer 'Get Free' lifts more than some might think seemly from Radiohead's 'Creep', as well as dropping some Neil Young lyrics along the way.

The guests are almost as high-end as the references, with Stevie Nicks showing up on 'Beautiful People Beautiful Problems' to offer a husky glance into Lana's future, and old-school collaborator A\$AP Rocky lending his bars to two tracks, 'Summer Bummer' and 'Groupie Love'.

However, with such defined sonic parameters

- and so many damn tracks there are moments where Lana verges upon becoming a parody of herself, notably on title track 'Lust For Life', as she deadpan purrs "take off, take off, take off all your clothes" before a fabulous falsetto turn from The Weeknd. Sure, it's a bit silly, but also utterly fabulous too - and that's why we love Lana so. **Leonie Cooper**

Everything wow

Four years on from 'Reflektor', the Canadian artrockers are bigger, bolder and more fearful for the future than ever on their colossal fifth album



ARCADE FIRE HAVE spent their career making a virtue of their own pomposity. Since 2004 debut 'Funeral'.

they've been unafraid to wrestle with big ideas that most bands wouldn't touch with a bargepole. It can appear as though they believe society's ills can be solved – or at least diagnosed – through the medium of grandiose art-rock, but you have to admire their

conviction that music ought to represent something more than mere 'content'. Thankfully, after 2013's ambitious but uneven

> 'Reflektor', 'Everything Now' marks an emphatic return to those lofty standards. "Every song that I've ever

heard / Is playing at the same time, it's absurd," declares starry-eyed frontman Win Butler on the album's title track, which is certainly one way to describe its mash-up of ABBA's 'Dancing Queen' and Talking Heads' 'Road To Nowhere'. Uplifting, incisive and sublime would

be another. On the flipside, the empty hedonism of 'Signs Of Life' and the suicidal youths of 'Creature Comfort' - one of whom, Butler notes, "came so close / Filled up the bathtub and put on our first record" - serve as a reminder of the cruel irony that, in this age of total connectivity, we've somehow contrived to make ourselves more isolated than ever. 'Everything Now' might marvel at how far we've come. but it's tempered by notes of dread at where we're going.

Aptly enough for a record about information overload, it's also had the veritable kitchen sink thrown at it, employing myriad styles, multiple big-name producers and the sort of ingenious, overblown marketing campaign that's become the norm for this band. On the two-hander of 'Infinite Content' and 'Infinite_Content', the same song is presented in contrasting styles – a knowing postmodern thrash and a languid acoustic ramble – but ultimately it's the album's sense of humanity, not its innate clever-cleverness, that elevates it to something special.

"If you can't see the forest for the trees / Just burn it all down," urges Butler, no longer sermonising from his pulpit but howling in empathy from the ether as the mournful synthpop of closing track 'We Don't Deserve Love' builds to its climax. **Barry Nicolson**

THE BIG SICK

IT'S BEEN QUITE A WHILE since we've seen a really good romcom. Even just the term 'romcom' has probably made a good proportion of you switch off, bringing to mind Katherine Heigl or Anne Hathaway playing clumsy women who work with cakes falling for expensively jumpered B-list men who are extremely wealthy but,

like, so normal. The Big Sick is a reminder of what a great romcom should be: the story of two people who are excellent on their own but even better together.

Based on the real-life relationship of comedian Kumail Nanjiani (Silicon Valley) and Emily V Gordon, a writer and producer, The Big Sick actually has the fundamentals of a pretty depressing story. Kumail (Nanjiani, playing himself) is a Muslim Pakistani-American whose parents want him to marry a girl from the same background. Barely observant of his religion, Kumail just dates who he wants and doesn't tell his parents. He finds someone

special in Emily (Zoe Kazan), but his refusal to tell his family about her drives them apart.

This issue is dwarfed when Emily becomes ill and is put into a coma. Kumail stays at Emily's bedside, with her parents (Holly Hunter and Ray Romano, being an absolute treat), getting to know more about her and feeling closer to her, while her feelings are on pause.

There's a lot of blackness there from which to find humour and The Big Sick mines enormous amounts. Before things get weird, it establishes loveable characters, which lets it go to dark places without losing the warmth. Both Nanjiani

and Kazan are adorable but not sickly, and the film doesn't treat Kumail as some hero for 'sticking by' his sick not-quitegirlfriend. It plays with the shiver of creepiness in his courtship of someone unconscious, and there are consequences to his lying to everyone, as there should be. It carries all this weight - plus the politics of being Muslim in Trump's America - like it's featherlight, with frequent belly laughs. It's brilliant. Easily the funniest comedy of the year so far. **Olly Richards**

Girls Trip is, without doubt, for adults: a funny and filthy mix of d**k jokes, bar fights and public urination that sees lifelong friends

Ryan, Sasha, Lisa and Dina (AKA the Flossy Posse) travelling to New Orleans for Essence Festival, an annual celebration of black sisterhood. After five years of not seeing each other, they hope to rekindle friendships that careers, partners and babies have come between with a brash and boozy weekend. What follows is a riotous flick that breathes fresh life into the tired bachelor genre usually dominated by men in films like The Hangover, Due Date and Wedding Crashers. Pinkett Smith shines as Lisa,

the buttoned-up single mother with a wild past. Queen Latifah is on form as the gossipy Sasha. Regina Hall's Ryan is a high-powered celebrity trapped in a sham marriage.

The star of the show, however, is newcomer Tiffany Haddish as fierce, sex-obsessed Dina. One jaw-dropping set-piece sees her suspended on a zip wire 15 feet above Bourbon Street, her bladder bursting at just the wrong moment. These grosser gags may put some off, but most will cry with laughter. When these four share the screen, sparks fly and the chemistry is perfect. **Alex Flood**

Playful and punchy indie-rock

BEFORE THEY FINISH conquering this summer's festivals, Reading indie lads Sundara Karma swung by NME & BFI present Cinejam supported by Zig-Zag to play a super-intimate set to a handful of lucky fans. We caught up with Oscar Pollock (vocals/guitar) and Haydn Evans (drums) to talk about their debut album 'Youth Is Only Ever Fun In Retrospect', and future aspirations.

You released your debut album at the start of the year. Has 2017 panned out how you thought it would? Oscar: "It's hard to plan this kind of stuff. There were a lot of people that weren't so sure about us. But you put out an album and you don't really think too much about what or where it's gonna take you. It's been the organic growth from our shows that's really pushed us over the line for people to be like, 'OK, yeah, we like this.'"

So many bands get rushed into releasing a record before they're quite ready. Did you feel 100% prepared when you released yours? Oscar: "No, the record we put out originally wasn't even the record we wanted to put out! We recently put out the longer, updated version of the album, which is where we wanted to go with it from the start, but we couldn't convince enough people to do it. When you're 21, I don't know how ready you can be."

You played NME CineJam before *The Big Lebowski* was screened. What kind of films do you watch on tour? Oscar: "On tour, you need comfort – romcoms are always



really good for that. Anything with Adam Sandler, too." **Haydn:** "It's all pretty s**t stuff, really."

If you were approached to write a film soundtrack, would you jump at the opportunity? Oscar: "If it was a Disney film,

that would be sick! The Tarzan soundtrack and The Lion King soundtrack were the first bodies of work I got into – I had them on cassette. I was obsessed." Jamie Milton

THE MARKETING BEHIND Arcade Fire's new album 'Everything Now' has been ultra-self-aware. 

There are some songs that are just so good, you sit there and you go, 'I could never write that,' but those two were two that I really should have written."

THE SONG I CAN NO LONGER LISTEN TO ROY ORBISON Oh, Pretty Woman

"I love Roy Orbison and then Van Halen had the nerve to do it again. It was great when it came out, [but] it just got overplayed and 'Brown Eyed Girl' is getting like that too. You turn the radio on and that song is just on all the time."

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THE FIRST GIG I WENT TO THE ROLLING STONES

"I'm very proud of this: I went to see The Rolling Stones at this gigantic arena. It was the coolest thing. We didn't know what production was – there was no [special] lighting then, just white lights."

THE SONG THAT CHANGED MY LIFE THE BEATLES She Loves You

"It was the first song by The Beatles I ever heard and it literally changed something in my brain. It inspired what Alice Cooper became."



THE SONG THAT MAKES ME DANCE THE ROLLING STONES Brown Sugar

"It may be the best dance song of time. When we're doing covers and just having fun, we'll go and play a bar after a show and be a bar band and we'd start with that – it gets everyone dancing."

THE SONG I WANT PLAYED AT MY FUNERAL

How Great Thou Art "Oh man, it would have to be a hymn. It wouldn't be one of my songs. 'How Great Thou Art' is just one of those great hymns, one of those all time hymns that takes the focus off you and puts it where it should be. I really don't think it would be a rock song – 'Welcome To My Nightmare' I don't think would be appropriate!"
