SINGER, ACTOR AND activist Shirley Manson will be honoured for her inspirational contribution to music and beyond. "I am shocked but delighted to be recognised with this award," she says. "I read NME religiously as a young teen and into adulthood. I will always be grateful for their support in being one of the first British publications to help break Garbage back in 1995. So yeah... I'm chuffed.

Alongside her life in music, activism remains an integral focus of Shirley's career. From teaming up with animal rights organisation PETA to create a series of campaigns against the use of fur in fashion to working with MAC make-up to create a Viva Glam line in honour of international AIDS research funding and working with various LGBTQ charities, Shirley is a maverick who has used her fame to help others. She's also worked with children's cancer charity Pablove and Girls Rock - an international initiative that encourages girls from all socio-economic backgrounds to get involved in music.



To Croatia with love

While Glastonbury's away, here are five reasons you should head to Zagreb's dreamy INmusic festival to play

1T'S AS GOOD AS GLASTO

Now in its 13th year, INmusic traditionally takes place on the penultimate weekend of June, but this year it's been moved back a week while Glastonbury has its fallow year. Don't feel blue about the lack of Glasto good times: this is the perfect opportunity to try one of the best European festivals out there.

2 THE HEADLINERS ARE AMAZING

The top billing at this

year's INmusic festival will satisfy any fan of guitar music. Over in the gothic rock corner, headliners Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds will be strutting their stuff following a huge stadium tour during 2017. Frank Carter & The Rattlesnakes are repping punk-rock, while Alison Mosshart and Jamie Hince's The Kills have indie-rock covered. On top of that, witness living rock gods Queens Of The Stone Age, art-rock queen St Vincent, 'Feel It Still' hitmakers Portugal. The Man, 🛭 grunge legends Alice In

Chains, and Talking

Heads' David Byrne,

who's on the cusp of releasing yet another incredible album, 'American Utopia'.

3 IT WON'T BREAK THE BANK

Not only is a three-day festival ticket for INmusic just €53 (£46.50) until March 30, prices for food and drink are absurdly low. You can get a pint for just £2, while an average stir-fry meal will cost just £3-4. A steal.

I s**t you not: **Laura Marling** is Britain's most important songwriter

IT WAS A DECADE AGO this month that one of the most mind-blowing artists of this generation released her astonishing debut album and, frankly, I'm still not over it. Laura Marling's sublime 'Alas, I Cannot Swim' came out just three days after the songwriter turned 18, and it announced the arrival of a very singular talent. Though already known as a sometime member of Noah And The Whale, a collaborator with The Rakes, a woman with Mumford & Sons as a backing band and an artist who wasn't allowed into her own gigs because she was too young, Marling and her record eclipsed "She rewrote the all that had come before. It wasn't just her age and precociousness that made people take notice; it was the moody experimentalism that


she brought to the classic sound of British folk music. In the wake of the ultra-laddish second wave of Britpop, with The Kooks, Kaiser Chiefs and Babyshambles leading the tight-jeaned charge, Laura Marling's music offered a more intimate kind of emotional catharsis. Songs such as 'My Manic And I', 'Ghosts' and 'Night Terror' channelled the raw but delicate power of Joni Mitchell and popped it into the mind of a well-to-do teenager from Hampshire. But despite her clipped, Head Girl vocals, these weren't comfortable. nice

acoustic songs. Sure, they were beautiful, but they were also unsettling and eerie. Marling wasn't making sweet, mollifying music but challenging the expectations of young female singer-songwriters. Standing shoulder to shoulder with Kate Nash, Lily Allen and Amy Winehouse, she was rewriting the rulebook when it came to what British women in pop music were supposed to be.

Six albums and 10 years later, and Marling has more than lived up to the promise laid down by that first record. Last year's 'Semper Femina' is a bold record but one that's every

bit as left-of-centre as her debut, picking apart the way women see other women with sharp intelligence and a burning fire. Like all the best artists, there's so much more to her than the music, too. We get bright flashes of her character in her excellent Reversal Of The Muse podcast, which sees her in conversation with a collection of excellent women including Haim, Dolly Parton and producer Catherine Marks. discussing the role of femininity in creativity. Pop an episode on now and bask in the glory of Laura Marling and her brilliant mind. @leoniemaycooper






Quavo, Takeoff and Offset are the biggest thing in hip-hop right now, and they've brought \$50,000 to their NME interview. Leonie Cooper gets high on their own supply of success – and their weed

I'VE GOT SOME SERIOUS DRY mouth and a severe case of the munchies. It can only mean one thing: I am really quite high. This is the unsurprising side effect of sitting at close quarters with three of America's most prestigious weed smokers and about 10 of their mates, all of whom seem equally enthusiastic about the benefits of a Tuesday afternoon dose of THC.

We're in a swanky New York studio with world-dominating trap trio Migos, but you'd be forgiven for thinking we're at a warehouse party. Giant blunts are being passed around like candy as the snakehipped Quavo, Offset and Takeoff pick outfits for NME's cover shoot. They've brought a couple of Louis Vuitton cases filled with diamondencrusted jewellery, including a silver chain with a huge sparkly \$75,000 Yoda face dangling from it. Oh, and there are also stacks of \$100 bills knocking around, which add up to \$50,000 in total - spare change for Migos, who buy brandnew Bentleys as casually as you or I might buy Digestive biscuits.

"Can we get some tunes on?" asks Quavo as he peruses a table covered with Valentino trainers that average £505 a pair. The sonic innovators' de facto leader and production whizz, he's also taken to co-directing the group's videos. If you're looking for Migos' mastermind, he's your guy. "This great album came out just the other day," he suggests. He is, of course, talking about 'Culture II'. Migos' 24-track, 106-minute epic. Critics have said the new release is a "data dump", but its stone-cold bangers have seen it rocket to the top of the US Billboard album chart. Whatever you think of it, its hugeness can't be denied - in length and cultural impact. Drake, Cardi B - who is engaged to Offset - Gucci Mane and Nicki Minaj all make guest appearances, and there are production cameos from Kanve West and Pharrell Williams. As opening track 'Higher We Go' booms out of the meaty PA system that's been ushered into the studio for Migos' arrival, the group nod in approval.

and Quavo is Takeoff's uncle - after a month of cancelled plans. First we're supposed to join them in their hometown of Atlanta, but that doesn't happen. Then the interview is shifted to Los Angeles as they add the finishing touches to 'Culture II'. That doesn't happen either. Next, it's moved to New York ahead of the Grammy Awards. And yep, you guessed it: that's scuppered too. We finally get our chance two days after the Grammys, where the trio were nominated for Best Rap Album for 2017's 'Culture' and Best Rap Performance for the song that catabulted them to superstardom a year and a half ago and which defines their flashy, laid-back flow – the irrepressible 'Bad And Boujee', which is currently hovering around 614 million

So sure, they might be five hours late, but they're actually here. It's a miracle. But like herding particularly baked cats, much wrangling has to take place in order to get them onto a sofa to talk. First they have to eat some pizza. Then some chicken from Nas's very own chain has to be delivered. And of course, those blunts won't roll themselves. Once sat down, their responses are an unpredictable selection of shouted-out bars from their own songs, inspirational quotes, deafening silence, computer game noises, immediate shutdowns, passionate eloquence and - in one of many moments of utter madness a sound not unlike a private jet taking off. In a world full of media-trained. people-pleasing artists, their erratic nature is refreshing, if somewhat maddening. They are a meme come to life, three guys living the absolute dream and giving not one single f**k.

When I ask why the new album's quite so long, Takeoff casually starts beatboxing as Quavo half-raps, "It's

the king of clout. It's the realest s**t that never was wrote. The Hot Mamba 24. The greatest piece of art that you ever witnessed in this era todaaay." Which, y'know, doesn't technically answer the question, but certainly gives you a sense of the scope of their ambitions and easy confidence. If hip-hop is all about braggadocio, then Migos are Rocky, Bruce Lee and Kanye West rolled into one. Another thing they're certain of is that 'Culture II' should not be judged against its predecessor, 'Culture'. "We don't compare our beautiful, monumental two pieces together," explains Quavo. "Like, I can't compare this ring to this ring," he adds, flashing yet more expensive jewellery in NME's direction.

Despite their faith in 'Culture' and 'Bad And Boujee', neither won at the Grammys, losing out to Kendrick Lamar's 'DAMN.' and 'HUMBLE.' "They cheated us," says Offset as I ask if they had a good time at the ceremony. "There was nothing bigger than the f**king 'Culture' album this whole last year!" adds a disgruntled Quavo. "They're scared to handle the three-headed monster... Ooh! [But] we'll be back next year." His mumble then becomes a yell: "WE'LL BE F**KING BACK NEXT YEAR."

Formed in the Atlanta suburb of Lawrenceville, Migos released their first mixtape in 2011 but it was with 2013's 'Versace', a fabulously flashy ode to designer fashion and conspicuous consumption, that the world started to take notice, not least because of a Drake co-sign and remix. Bigger, bolder tunes such as 'Fight Night' followed – all typified by what has come to be known as 'the Migos flow', copied by everyone from Chance The Rapper on 'All We Got' to Kendrick Lamar on 'DNA' – as did controversy.

In 2015 – the same year they released their debut album 'Yung Rich Nation' – all three were arrested on drugs and firearms charges, with Offset spending eight months in custody. Then there are the numerous accusations of homophobia, most recently after Offset rapped, "I cannot vibe with queers" on fellow Atlanta artist YFN Lucci's track 'Boss Life'. A half-arsed apology followed, with Offset stating, "To me that 'queer'

I don't mean someone who's gay. I mean lame people who film you, post it and stalk you. Lingo that means strange or odd."
Hmm. Any chance to hold him to account for his comment, though, is nixed by Migos' label, who tell

Migos' first out-and-out pop song, this crossover hit sees them doing what they do best: showing off. It also namedrops Five Guys, burger fans. us the group will refuse to answer questions about homophobic comments or run-ins with the law. I chance my arm and ask instead about their drug-related lyrics. Has the death of Lil Peep, who overdosed on fentanyl and Xanax in November 2017, made them reassess their own lyrics about prescription drugs? Surely a group who have a track called 'Designer Drugs', which sees Quavo repeating the word "drugs" 16 times in the intro before admitting "I fell in love with the drugs / I think I'm a addict / Percocet, molly and Xanax", a group who named themselves after a slang word for a house where drugs are made and sold, a group who are literally smoking a massive blunt in front of me, will be open to discussing the topic. No such luck. Offset immediately shuts me down. "We don't talk about drugs. No comment. It shouldn't be in the article at all." As we take in another lungful of secondhand weed smoke, I start thinking about the box of doughnuts the photographer's bought with him to use in the shoot.

What they are willing to discuss is culture, and why they've named their past two albums in its honour. "Culture defines a new generation, a new sound of music, new change, a diversity of fans, all in one party, one event and

they all share good-ass music," says Quavo. "Culture is one colour and it's everybody's colour." Can we, then, expect a 'Culture III'? "The culture goes forever and we will never RIP the culture. You're trying to figure out if the culture will live on through one, two, three, four, five, six – that we don't know, we will make you WAIT ON IT. But the culture will not die, the culture will live forever."

n their music as in the interviews, Migos are not about doing things by the book. On last year's 'Get Right Witcha' they simply stated their manifesto: "Middle finger up, f**k the system". Offset breaks down the Migos approach to life. "You can do it your own way," he says. Quavo agrees. "It's about expressing yourself. F**k the programme. F**k the script. F**k the way it's supposed to be done. Do it your creative way." Bending and rewriting the rules - the next step in their haywire approach to world domination - is already in place.

"I look at us as a business," says
Takeoff. So where will Migos be
branching out to next? "You can
branch out, but you want to beat them
out," says Quavo, before revealing that
film is where Migos have their hearts
set. "Real theatre movies, with real top
A-list actors and s**t like that," says
Takeoff. Is something already in the
pipeline? "Shh, you about to spill the
beans right out of the can," he says,
pouring an imaginary tin of Heinz's
finest all over the floor. "No spilling."

Before we see Migos: The Movie, they're likely to be back in the UK, after hectic scenes greeted their one-off London show in April last year. "We love London, shout out to London," says Quavo. "I like the rough part too - shout out to Brixton. We pulled up to the club over there. S**t get crazy up in there!" How crazy? "Super-lit. Everybody mobbed." Do you mind getting mobbed? "I love that!" "Love that," echoes Takeoff. Something else they love is hearing their signature sound replicated by other artists such as Drake and Kanye. Rather than getting pissed, the boys are all for the omnipresence of the Migos flow. "I love it, it makes me happy inside, because I know we're influencing and they're inspired by us," says Takeoff. "The greatest!" chips in Quavo.

Yet for all the bravado and posturing, Migos aren't just about fast cars and expensive necklaces – they're also about giving back to their community. Last year Quavo and Takeoff filled a truck with 700 turkeys

and gave them away for free in the parking lot of an Atlanta supermarket and children's daycare centre. "You gotta give back - it's only right to give back to the people who need it and are less fortunate," explains Takeoff. "You gotta bless others so you can get blessed. Keep it real." An enthusiastic Quavo adds, "Turkey giveaway, we're giving them turkey! Brrr! Yeahhh!" They've also launched a campaign to raise half a million dollars for the American Cancer Society. "We hands on," says Quavo. Sure, they might be high as f**k, but in some ways their feet are NME still firmly on the ground.



ROCK'N'ROLL NEEDS EZRA FURMAN As a gender-fluid musician in America, has it been harder since

Chicagoan rocker Ezra Furman is passionate, deeply talented and unafraid to speak out. The 31-year-old talks to Alex Flood about Nazis, human beings who grow wings and trying to create "the greatest record ever made"

ZRA FURMAN IS A gender-fluid rocker from Chicago with a knack for writing bratty pop-punk tunes that sound a bit like the Ramones. Born to strict Jewish $\; \blacksquare \;$ parents in the '80s, he struggled with his identity for years before discovering music as an outlet. Now 31, he's 📱 flourishing in his own skin. His sexually subversive appearance – think silk dresses and bright lipstick – evokes images of a bygone era. There's more than a hint of the New York Dolls about him, and he has the gentle charisma of a young David Bowie. His music blends diverse genres like rockabilly and glam into new and exciting combinations, and his raw lyrics give the songs an honest feel that's hard to come by. This week, he releases his eighth album, 'Transangelic Exodus'. But despite enjoying a decade-long career already, he feels like he's on the edge of a breakthrough.

You described your last EP as "the end of a chapter musically". What makes these new songs so different?

"Ezra Furman And The Bov-Friends was a band with a specific mission – to be a really good rock'n'roll band. And we achieved it. We were really f**king good at it. There were moments of bleary-eyed transcendence, pure I enthusiasm, manic energy and rage. That's what rock'n'roll means to me."

Chuck Berry was one of your heroes. How did you react when he died last year?

"Chuck Berry invented rock'n'roll. He was one of the best songwriters of the 20th century. But, as with a lot of heroes, you gotta reckon with their disastrous ethical violations too. Chuck had his fair share of those. It sort of makes you want to stop praising him so much. But the fact is he's dead, and the people whose shows I will pay to get into are hopefully not gonna be sexual predators."

You're referring to his 1960 sexual assault conviction. Do you think the music industry does enough to combat things

"Probably not. Sometimes you see a good response to it and sometimes not. I'm glad that people are talking about sexual assault though. It is a scourge on humanity. Some people think, 'Well, it happens, it's not the best but what can you do?' I'll tell you what you can do – you can replace all of 📱 those people, just get them out! Stop going to their movies and stop buying their records."

Trump took power?

"So far, he hasn't enacted any significant legislation, thank goodness. Only the fear has really touched my actual life. The most significant thing is the way he's influenced the conversation about immigrants."

In the video for your recent track 'Driving Down To LA', you're in a car chase with some Nazis and your guardian angel. How was that to shoot?

"It was a really weird experience. The day before I flew out to Virginia to film it, the Charlottesville 'Unite The Right' rally turned deadly violent. The set was only a few towns away and anyone who drove by us was like, 'You're not from around here, are ya?' We thought, 'Are they gonna kill us?' We were there filming what was supposed to be a paranoid fantasy but it felt so real. It was such a strange coincidence of timing."

The evolution of Ezra

EZRA FURMAN AND THE HARPOONS 2006-2011 Albums: four Furman formed his first band while at Tufts University, ■ Massachusetts. Their debut was recorded in various dorm rooms and was followed by three more records of frantic indie-punk before Furman went solo.

Albums: one With no band, no money and no label, things looked bleak. But thanks to Kickstarter. Ezra was able to crowdfund 'The Year Of No Returning' – an emotional ■ batch of tunes that earned him a deal with New Jersey outfit Bar/None Records.

Albums: two Furman's most successful period to date. 'Day Of The Dog' drew critical acclaim in 2013, before 2015's 'Perpetual Motion People' vent Top 25. *NME* called it "a constantly surprising and relentlessly melodic pleasure."

In September last year, it was revealed that The Boy-Friends vere no more. The line-up would remain the same, but the group vere rebranded as The Visions 'Transangelic Exodus' was announced for February 2018.

At Coachella 2017, you ended your set by yelling, "F**k AEG". Why did you do that?

"AEG is the Anschutz Exploration Group, which owns Goldenvoice, which puts on Coachella. By going to Coachella you're helping to line the pockets of billionaires like AEG owner Philip Anschutz [who has funded various anti-LGBTQ organisations]. You have a say in whether that person stays rich. I would never pay to go to that event and I don't think that people should."

You took the money though?

"I did take the money. I got paid.
Where does that leave me? It leaves
me able to pay the rent and keep
playing music."

What do you hope to achieve with new album 'Transangelic Exodus'?

"I want to make the greatest record ever made. It's the only thing I can think about."

Have you managed it?

"No. I'm on to something though. This record feels alive to me, more alive than anything I've made in the past."

What does the title mean?

"Well, there is a condition, as I'm sure you've heard, called transangelicism. It involves a human being growing wings and turning into an angel. Naturally these people are distrusted. It's thought to be a disease or some kind of threat to the integrity of the human race. People want to quarantine them, even though it's not a contagious thing. It's actually not a threat to anyone."

Can you relate to that?

"People get stigmatised for their bodies and for their differences. Then those people become very vulnerable. I sometimes feel caught in the middle – between two warring factions that I'm not on either side of."





Call it a comeback

The psychedelic indie heroes make a surprise return to pop with their fun-filled fourth album

MGMT Little Dark Age * * * * PSYCHEDELIC POP TRUMP MGMT



IT'S OVER 10 YEARS SINCE MGMT released 'Oracular Spectacular', a poptastic glitterball of an album that spawned hit singles 'Time To Pretend' and 'Kids'. Three years later, Andrew VanWyngarden and Ben Goldwasser baffled fair-weather fans with the acid-jazz soup that was 2010's

'Congratulations'. And the odyssey continued: 2013's 'MGMT' was an inaccessible curio, implying the band had long disappeared down the rabbit hole.

In some ways, 'Little Dark Age' is the biggest curveball of the Connecticut pair's consistently unpredictable career. If there were a time

for an about-return, it was that third record. They'd enjoyed their foray into experimentation. and a self-titled album often indicates a band that's come back into focus. Here, though, we're treated to an overdue loop back to pop hookiness. Lead single 'Little Dark Age' starts with doomy synth and moody, throbbing bass before blooming into its whirling, Technicolor chorus, while the tinkling, '80s-influenced 'Me And Michael' is a smash that's waiting to happen.

After more than a decade of insularity, MGMT have thrown open the doors and welcomed you back into their world. In doing so, they've

had to engage with our messy, unpalatable reality. The record was partly written in the wake of Donald Trump's shock election and so concludes with the elegiac 'Hand It Over'. VanWyngarden recently explained the track "envisions an end to all of this". MGMT's return to pop is a much more welcome surprise.

Transangelic Exodus

LO-FI POP CELESTIAL

IT'S SURELY long overdue that the transangelic community – people born knowing they're angels and

transitioning with an operation to release their wings - should have their struggle documented in a leftfield alt-pop "queer outlaw saga" concept album. And, at long last, here it is. Chicago art-pop provocateur Ezra Furman's eighth album (with various backing bands) tells the "half-true memoir" of Furman falling for a transangel and having to go on the run while shadowy government agencies and Nazi gangs hunt the lovers down. Which toilet they use along the way is unspecified.

This romantic metaphor for the social and political oppression of the trans, non-binary and generally-not-slotting-into-your-Old-World-rules-granddad community is every bit as

confrontational musically as it is thematically. If the crunchy, lo-fi Springsteen vibe of opener 'Suck The Blood From My Wound' could be renamed 'Gabriel, We Were Born To Run', that's about as conventional as 'Transangelic Exodus' would get. Glitch rhumba road-trip tune 'Driving Down To LA' starts sounding like the bombastic showstopper from the world's first Al musical. A rabid, percussive slab of buzzing blues called 'No Place'

resembles Jack White being sacrificed at one of Goat's voodoo ceremonies. Sci-fi Beatles, Gallic Portishead, underwater

Velvets, hallucinogenic Wailers and speed-freaking ELO – all are present and wonderfully incorrect. There's a sense of emancipation both sonic and personal; it's with impish glee that this Jewish cross-dresser sings of avoiding synagogue in his 'Maraschino-Red Dress \$8.99 At Goodwill', or that "I lost my innocence to a boy named Vincent". All round, a heavenly journey. Mark Beaumont





A hard, unhappy watch



ZHENYA (MARYANA SPIVAK) and Boris (Aleksey Rozin), a Russian couple in Moscow, are going through a bitter divorce. Both are already seeing other people and as far as they're concerned their life together is already over. Only two things are keeping them in contact: the

flat they share and need to sell. and their pre-teen son, Alexey (Matvey Novikov). Alexey's feelings about the split are an afterthought, if indeed they're a thought at all. Zhenya and Boris fight not about who will get custody of Alexey, but who will be lumbered with him as part of their new life. One evening, shortly after his parents have a huge fight, Alexev doesn't come home. As days pass with no sign of him, his warring parents are forced together to find the child they very recently wanted rid of.

As you may imagine, Andrey Zvyagintsev's film - nominated for the Best Foreign Film Oscar – is a hard, unhappy watch, but it's a riveting, unforgettable one too. It's a film in which the only person you care about is almost entirely absent from the screen, but watching his parents transform from selfish ghouls into people who are at least aware of their failings is profoundly moving. It's a cold movie, set under a permanently grey sky and with long, chilled silences, but still




full of often unspoken feeling. It punches you with huge emotional moments – none more so than Alexey hysterically weeping as he hears his parents effectively say he is unwanted – and then lets them reverberate long after.

The Russian setting is vital, because this is not just a crime thriller but an account of what it's like to live in modern-day Russia, a country that has incompatible values of a staunch traditionalism (Boris works for a company so conservative that he will likely be fired if they find out he's divorcing) and a grasping, selfish need for everything that's new and modern – better homes, better clothes, better

sex, better than everyone else. It's a place where it's almost impossible to be happy, because what you have is not supposed to be enough. It's a devastating drama about losing something you didn't appreciate until you lost it, possibly forever.




